

Teurlings Faces Jeanerette Team

The Teurlings High Rebels get a taste of football tonight when they take on the Jeanerette Tigers in the final game of the Jeanerette Jamboree. The Rebels will be seeking revenge for a 20-0 setback by Jeanerette in the same Jamboree last year.

Teurlings will be in a little better shape this year, with more returning lettermen and no injuries. Eleven lettermen will grace the Rebel starting lineup headed by three-year lettermen Bryant Gilder and Stanley Arceneaux.

Gilder is a triple-threat halfback while Arceneaux is a pile-driving fullback. Both boys are outstanding on defense. Other experienced boys in the lineup are Arthur Courville, Kenneth Elliott, Joe Landry, Donald Abadie, Ellis Maturin, Keith Zimmerman, Robert Romero, George Gardiner and Robert Thomas. The starting line for the Rebs will average 170 pounds while the backs average 155.

Coaches Bill Michot and Dean Daigle are satisfied with the physical shape of their players. "We feel that these boys are in the best condition we have ever had," stated Michot. "We would be very fortunate to keep them in this condition since we have very little depth."

Strong point for the Rebels is the backfield, with all four starters returning. In Arceneaux and Gilder,

the Rebs have one of the finest one-two punches in the district. Gilder punts for a 40-yard average and is an accurate passer from his halfback post.

Teurlings Wins Jamboree Trophy

JEANERETTE — Teurlings of Lafayette earned a victory trophy by posting a first-down margin over Jeanerette High school in the Jeanerette Football Jamboree here last night.

The game ended in a 7-7 tie, and Teurlings posted a 4-1 margin in first downs to earn the victory.

In other Jamboree action, Hanson Memorial of Franklin played to a scoreless tie with New Iberia High school but won the trophy by posting an advantage in first downs.

Patterson defeated Loreauville 13-7 in the other Jamboree game.

The Teurlings Rebels had to fight back from a halftime deficit to win their game against the Jeanerette Tigers. Showing team aggressiveness and vicious tackling, the Rebs moved well during the first half and were knocking at the door when the lightning struck. On an attempted sweep, the Jeanerette back was hit by a vicious tackle from Stanley Arceneaux, who came in from his line, backer spot. The ball was jarred loose and recovered by Paul David of the Rebels on the Tiger 15. With first down inside the Jeanerette five yard line and the clock

running with 21 seconds to go, Bryant Gilder was hit while trying to throw a running pass and the fumble was picked up by Grizzafi of the Tigers who scampered 95 yards for a Jeanerette touchdown.

Robert Romero of the Rebels started with a 25 yard disadvantage, but nailed Grizzafi with a dive tackle on the 2-yard line, but it was ruled that Grizzafi fell into the end zone for the T. D. The Tigers converted to make the score 7-0 at the half.

The Rebs came back strong in the second half and after receiving a Tiger punt, drove 55 yards with Stanley Arceneaux sweeping left end from 11 yards out for the score.

Arceneaux repeated the play off the extra point.

The scoring drive was highlighted by a fine run of 15 yards by Gilder and a number of yard-gaining smashes by Arceneaux.

Teurlings ground out four first downs to one for the Tigers to walk off with the winning trophy. The Tigers didn't make a first down until the last two minutes of the brief game.

Twelve players got into action for the Rebels and each made a fine showing. Stanley Arceneaux, Bryant Gilder, Keitz Zimmerman and Joe Landry were tops on defense, while Paul David, Arthur Courville, Kenneth Elliott, Ellis Maturin, Donald Abadie, Ronald Piccione, George Gardiner, and Robert Romero all played exceptionally well to make the victory an entire team effort.

Patton Gets Golf Upset

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Three former champs and an Irish beller kept the United States Amateur Golf championship from being completely wide open today in play that will see only 32 survivors by nightfall.

Defending champion Deane Beman fell Tuesday before veteran Billy Joe Patton, but ex-titlists Harvie Ward Jr., Charlie Coe and Jack Nicklaus all whipped through the second round.

So did three-time British champion Joe Carr of Ireland, a witty fellow who laced a couple of drives about 300 yards while overwhelming Claude Wright of Englewood, Colo., 6 and 5. Not in 29 years has a foreigner won the U.S. Amateur title.

Exacting conditions of play over the 6,747-yard Pebble Beach course, with small greens, and weather conditions that vary almost hourly, give the advantage to the experienced golfer.

Even the dark horses were golfers with experience—Bob Gardner of Elmsford, N.Y., two-time former California champ and last year runner-up in the National to Beman and ex-pro Glen Fowler of Oklahoma City, both sub-par shooters the past two days.

Patton, 39, ousted Beman 2-up. The 1960 champ missed six putts of eight feet or less as his usually reliable putter failed.

Patton, of Morganton, N.C., outdrove his foe and hit beautiful chip shots on the 18th and 17th to preserve a one-hole lead. On the 18th, Beman hit into a trap and

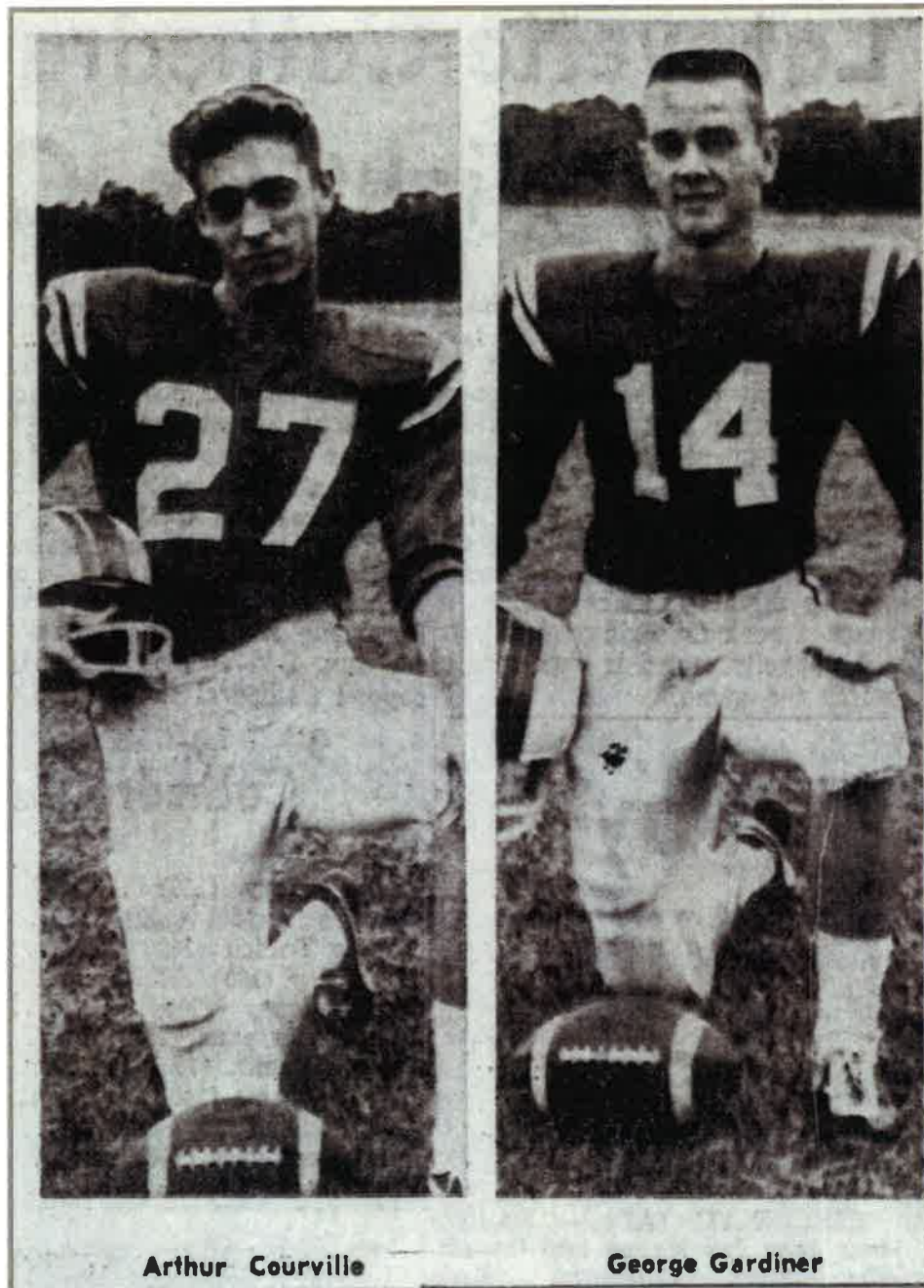

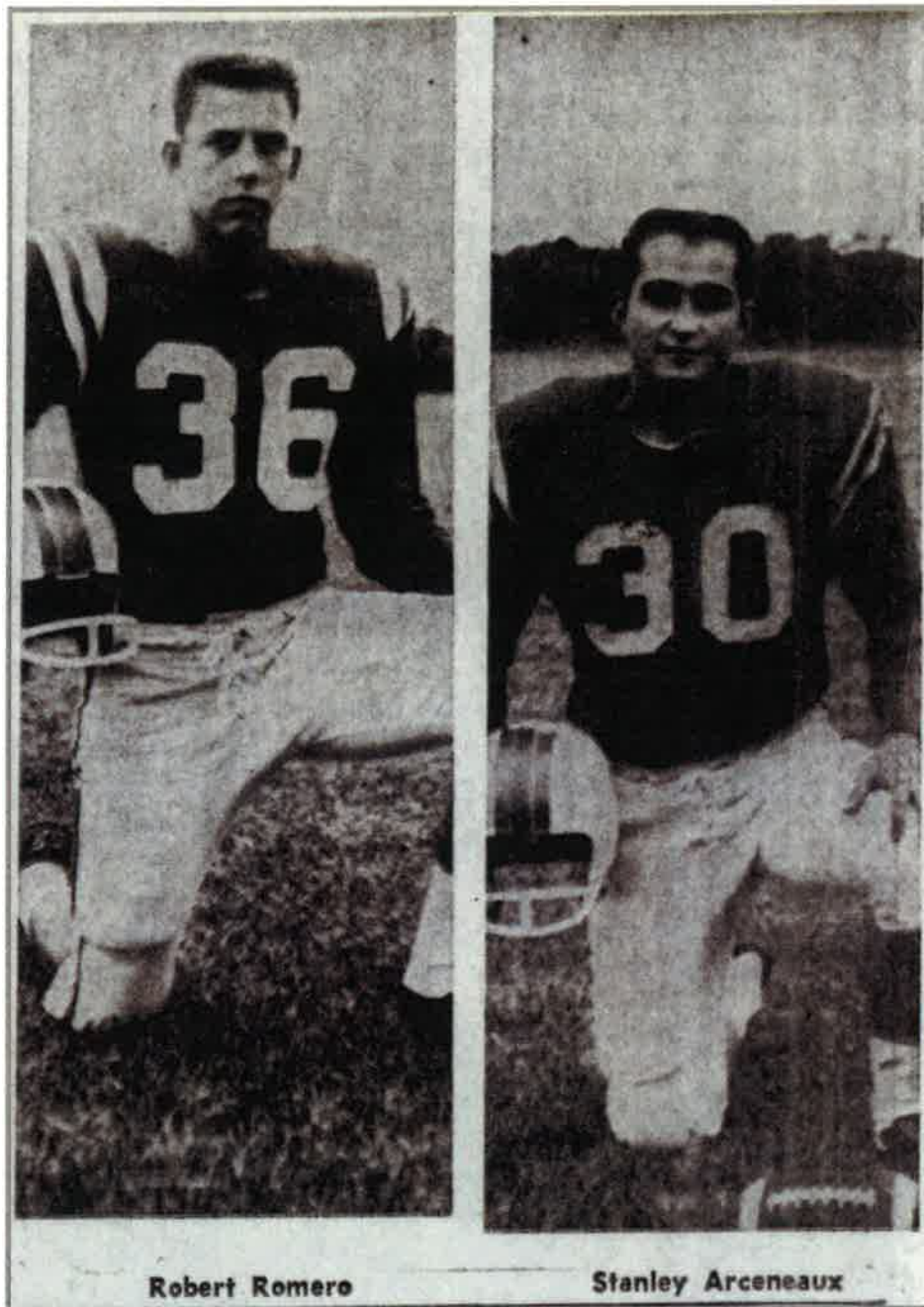

Teurlings Hosts Mt. Carmel Club

The Rebels of Teurlings High are looking forward to Saturday night when they face their first test of the 1961 football season. The Rebs take on the Mount Carmel Eagles of Abbeville at Clark Field in what promises to be a close battle.

Coach Larry Dugas' Eagles go into the District 7-B encounter with an impressive victory over the Midland team already under their belts.

Coach Bill Michot's Rebels looked like a polished ball club when they took a Jamboree win from Jeanerette High School two weeks ago, but now the Rebel coaches are worried about the shine wearing off due to the two - week interlude before their opener.

Mount Carmel has a light but well - coached and scrappy ball club, led by a veteran backfield and all - district end, Mike Veazey. Halfbacks John Megison, Charlie Howell and fullback Webster LeBlanc are returning starters from last year's team which trimmed the Rebels 18-6.

Teurlings—on the other hand—appears to be in much better shape this year, and will be gunning for revenge. The Rebels are in much better physical shape than they ever have been and will field an experienced team from end to end.

Michot calls the 1961 Rebels the hardest - hitting team he has ever had and the only problem is an obvious lack of depth throughout.

At center the Rebs have veteran Donald Abadie, a 155-pound senior, who plays a defensive corner and does a fine job at both positions. Abadie is the defensive signal - caller for the Rebs.

Experience and power at guard is provided by Joe Landry, a 175-pound junior who came out at mid-season last year and developed into one of the best linemen on the Rebel team. Ellis Maturin, a 185-pound senior, and Ronald Piccione, a 180-pound junior, are battling for the other guard spot. Both boys saw limited duty last year and are slated for plenty of action this year.

The left end position is wide open, with Paul David currently leading the pack. David, a light but aggressive junior, has displayed spirit in workouts thus far and was a bright spot in the Jamboree game, giving Teurlings unexpected strength at that position.

The Rebel backfield is built around a fine inside - outside combination in veterans Stanley Arceneaux and Bryant Gilder. Both have been starters for three years and will be going after their fourth letters. Arceneaux, a 160 - pound junior, is a pack of dynamite at fullback. He is acclaimed by many coaches in the area to be the hardest - hitting football player around, both offensively and defensively. He is expected to bear the brunt of the Rebel offense and is a bone-rattling tackler from his defensive linebacker spot.

Attracting considerable attention as an outstanding prospect in the Rebel line is 295 - pound sophomore tackle Keith Zimmerman.

Zimmerman was a starter as a freshman last year, and with added age and experience, will bid for all-district honors.

At right end, the Rebels have what they consider a definite candidate for all - district honors in Arthur Courville. Courville, a six-foot, 165 - pound senior, grabbed five touchdown passes last year and does a fine job on defense.

Kenneth Elliott, a 185 - pound senior, gives the Rebels top-notch play at tackle. Elliot is in his fourth year of football and is seeking his third letter. Plagued by leg injuries last year, he is expected to provide plenty of power in the Rebel line this season.

Patterson Told To Defend Title

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Floyd Patterson must fight a top challenger within six months or lose his heavyweight boxing crown.

This choice was handed Patterson Wednesday in a letter from Paul G. Sullivan of Pittsburgh, chairman of the National Boxing Association's world championship committee.

Patterson was given until March 13, 1962, to defend his title against the No. 1 NBA challenger. That's the anniversary of Patter-

Bryant Gilder, a 165-pound senior, is one of the best punters in the state, compiling a 40-yard average last year. He hit on 12 passes last year, five of them going all the way for touchdowns. He has also been one of the leading scorers in district for the past two years. Gilder is also a defensive leader for Teurlings from his defensive halfback post.

At quarterback, Robert Romero returns from last year's starting duo at that position. He is a senior, with two years of experience and one letter. Romero hit for four touchdowns via the airways last year and is a cool operator under the center.

George Gardiner, a veteran of two years, rounds out the Rebel backfield at the right halfback position. Gardiner is a 155 - pound senior who does a good job both offensively and defensively for the Rebels. He is backed up by freshman halfback Bob Thomas, who alternates at all backfield positions any usually holds down one of the defensive halfback posts while Gardiner moves to the corner position.

In the 1961 team, Teurlings coaches Bill Michot and Dean Daigle feel that they have a high-spirited, aggressive team that could provide plenty of fireworks in district competition. However, the Rebels take on three tough teams in a row in Mt. Carmel, Loreauville and Berwick. Berwick is expected to have the team to beat in district competition, while defending champion Loreauville is strong again.

Teurlings Falls To Eagles, 6-0

Three fumbles and a key injury proved too much of a handicap for the Teurlings Rebels to give up in one night as they lost a hard-fought 6-0 prep football battle to Mt. Carmel of Abbeville at Clark Field Saturday night.

The Rebels, seemingly flat after a two-week layoff since their Jamboree game, drove well in the first half, getting to the Eagle 25 on two occasions only to lose the ball on fumbles.

Midway in the second quarter, the Rebs were on the move when Stanley Arceneaux fumbled and Clyde Prejean recovered for the Eagles on their own 25. Quarterback Fred Dubois reeled if a 40-yard sprint around right end to give the Eagles their first scoring opportunity. But the Rebels buckled down and recovered an Eagle fumble on their own 15.

After getting a first down on the 30, the Rebs fumbled it right back to Mt. Carmel. A couple of line plays contributed little, but on third down, quarterback Ellis Bordelon connected on a pass to halfback Charlie Howell, who fell into the end zone for the only score of the game.

Teurlings' suffered their worst break on the second play of the second half, when fullback Arceneaux twisted his ankle trying to get away from an Eagle tackler and was lost to the Rebels for the remainder of the game. This seemed to give the Eagles added spirit and they kept the Rebs on the defensive for the remainder of the game.

Mt. Carmel mounted another dangerous scoring drive in the final quarter but was stopped on the Rebl 8-yard line.

Bryant Gilder played an exceptionally fine game for the Rebs, carrying the ball 14 times for 54 yards and punting five times for a 40-yard average despite the fact that one of his punts went into the end zone and another went out of bounds after a short flight.

Gilder booted one out on the Eagle 1-yard line in the second half to keep the Rebs in the ball game. Gilder was also forced to

carry the load in the second half as Arceneaux, George Gardiner and Bob Thomas were all hampered by minor leg injuries during the period.

Rebel Coach Bill Michot said afterward, "This was a hard one for us to lose, especially since we have to take on the two toughest customers in the district — Loreauville and Berwick — in our next two games. We feel that the layoff between ball games when we seemed to be ready to play hurt us considerably. Mt. Carmel played a game last week and showed a lot of improvement over that one."

Michot added, "Arceneaux's injury took a lot of pep out of our boys. We felt that we were going to come back, but without him we lost most of our punch and were lucky to be able to stay with them on defense. Freshman Bob Thomas really played a game for us. He made eight individual tackles and took over for Arceneaux in the second half. Gilder played his usual fine game. Keith Zimmerman, Donald Abadie and Joe Landry were other top performers in the game."

Michot said, "We can't take anything away from Mt. Carmel. Coach Larry Dugas' boys knew what they wanted and went after it. They hit hard on every play and had some fine boys in Quarterback Bordelon, halfbacks Howell and John Megison, fullback Webster LeBlanc and end Mike Veazey. Veazey really gave us a time at his defensive end position."

The Rebs journey to Loreauville Thursday night for a district game with the strong Loreauville Tigers.

Boutte attempted to hit Judice with another aerial for the point after try but the pass was incomplete as the two teams returned up field with the Tigers holding a 13-0 lead.

The quarter ended with the Tigers still holding the 13 - 0 edge.

However the Tigers came roaring back with another score after driving 63 yards to pay dirt with Dooley capping the jaunt with a nine yard scoring play.

Boutte then hit David Degeyer with a pass giving the Tigers a 20-0 lead.

The Rebels failed to muster the power to score in the last period of play and the Tigers were moving once again as the final whistle sounded.

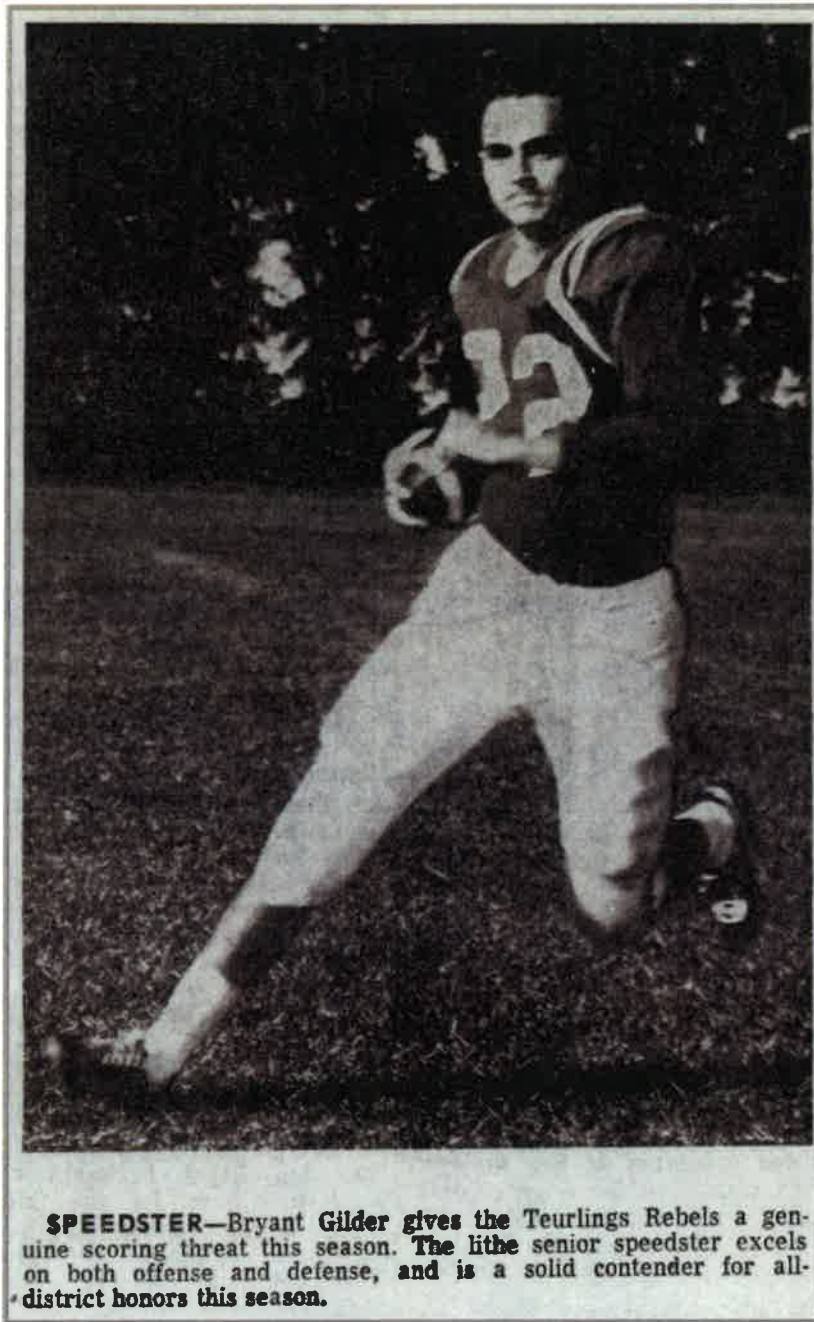

Teurlings Preps For Rugged Contest Friday Night Against Berwick Outfit

Down, but definitely not out, the Rebels of Teurlings High school will take on their third tough customer in a row when they meet the strong Berwick Panthers in a Friday night football game at Clark Field.

The Rebels have suffered a discouraging early season, dropping a close opener to Mt. Carmel of Abbeville by 6-0 and then giving up three touchdowns to Loreauville in the second half after dominating the first half. The Rebs lost that one 20-0.

Summing up the season at this stage, Coach Bill Michot says:

"We thought we had a very promising team before the season got underway, and spirit was very high. We knew we had a couple of weak spots but we also had some really fine ball players to make up for that. We also knew that we could not afford any major injuries, especially to one of our key boys.

"The lay-off after our jamboree game hurt us considerably. We made a few costly mistakes against Mt. Carmel that would have probably been ironed out had we played on the opening date. Along with this, we lost two first-string backs early in the second half. Bob Thomas received a bruised thigh and Stanley Arceneaux injured ligaments in his ankle, which may plague him all season.

"Losing Arceneaux was something that we just could not afford to have happen. The boy had never been injured in three years of first-string football, and we simply tried to keep this possibility out of our minds. Arceneaux is the key to our defense and also makes our offense go.

"In the Loreauville game, with Arceneaux out, there merely hobbling around, we picked up 128 yards to our opponents' 27. The big factor in that game was our failure to score in the first half.

"We had three opportunities and were moving right through the Loreauville defenses for big chunks. While they were watching for Arceneaux—who could not run at all—Bryant Gilder almost broke through for a touchdown and George Gardiner broke twice.

"A pass play from Robert Romero to Arthur Courville almost went all the way. We were on their line one time and on their five another time and failed to get the clincher.

"That would have made a big difference in the outcome, especially since they could not move on

"The second half was a nightmare."

Michot added, "Along with these early-season breaks, we have had to play the three top teams in the district in our first three games. Loreauville is defending champion, Berwick was the runnerup, and Mt. Carmel is this year's favorite.

"With a good Berwick team to face Friday, we won't know how

we stand until just before the ball game. We know that starting guard Ellis Maturin will be out because of an injured knee. We will have to wait and see on Arceneaux, Thomas and Gardiner. Ronald Piccione, an alternate at guard, is also doubtful because of a bruised hand."

The game, a District 7-B contest, will get underway at 8 o'clock Friday night at Clark Field.

'Rather Win' Says Koufax

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—"Sure the record is nice but I'd rather win," said southpaw Sandy Koufax of the Los Angeles Dodgers Wednesday night after he established a new National League strikeout record for a single season but lost 2-1 to Philadelphia.

Koufax broke the record of 267, set by Christy Mathewson of the New York Giants in 1903, in the sixth inning when he struck out Pancho Herrera, who took a third called strike.

"I'm pleased (with the record) but I wish I'd stopped the two runs," said the 25-year-old Koufax later. "I know when he came up to bat I had a chance at the record but I didn't think about it until the third strike was called."

The Teurlings Rebels shook senior halfback Bryant Gilder loose on a series of scoring plays, used veteran fullback Stanley Arceneaux to dominate the middle of the line on both offense and defense and posted a 33-7 victory over Youngsville in a District 7-B football game before about 600 fans last night at Clark Field.

Gilder scored four touchdowns — on runs of 30 and 3 yards and on passes of 31 and 11 yards — to help Coach Bill Michot's Rebels post their first victory of the 1961 season after three straight losses.

Arceneaux, who had been hobbled for two weeks with an ankle injury, was at three-quarter speed last night. But the powerful senior fullback punched across for one touchdown, passed to Gilder for another and played a masterful game at his defensive linebacker post.

Gilder netted 81 yards in 13 trips while Arceneaux gained 84 yards in 15 carries.

The Rebels launched scoring drives of 60, 53, 40, 45 and 30 yards, scoring every time they got the football in the first half. The Youngsville score came in the final period on a 45-yard march that was aided by a pair of 15-yard penalties against the Rebels.

In all, Teurlings piled up 318 yards in total offense — 248 rushing and 64 passing — while holding Youngsville to 84 yards rushing and 16 yards passing.

Teurlings hustled to a 26-0 half-time advantage and was never in trouble during the game.

The first Rebel score came in the first quarter on a 60-yard drive in nine plays, with Gilder getting the touchdown on a 30-yard sprint around right end. Quarterback Robert Romero ran for the extra point.

The Rebels started another drive later in the first period, this time covering 53 yards in 12 plays with Arceneaux unreeling runs of 15 and 13 yards to spark the drive. Arceneaux scored on a 1-yard smash. The attempted extra point failed and the Rebels led 13-0. The touchdown came on the first play of the second quarter.

The Rebels added two more touchdowns in the same quarter. They covered 40 yards for the first, with Arceneaux flipping a 11-yard pass to Gilder for the touchdown. Arceneaux ran for the extra point. The next touchdown came on a 45-yard drive that ended when Gilder burst over from the 3-yard line. The drive took 11 plays, with halfback George Gardiner getting 24 and Gilder picking up 12 in key situations.

The final Rebel touchdown came in the fourth quarter when Romero connected with the swift Gilder on a 30-yard pass play. Gilder ran for the extra point to put Teurlings ahead 33-0.

Later in the fourth period, Youngsville halfback Jim Wood bucked 1 yard for his team's only score. Quarterback Carl Diez ran for the extra point to make the final score 33-7 in favor of Teurlings.

Offensive standouts for the Rebels included ends Arthur Courville and Paul David, tackles Kenneth Elliott and Keith Zimmerman, guards Joe Landry and Ronald Piccione, center Donald Abadie and backs Romero, Gardiner, Gilder and Thomas.

It was in the Garden State a year ago that Carry Back hit the jackpot and started on the road that led to victory in the 1961 Kentucky Derby and the Preakness. He hit the headlines again at the Camden, N.J. track Saturday by winning the \$75,000-added Trenton handicap.

Going into the Trenton, Carry Back had lost three straight races. But he showed his patented come-from-behind form in beating intentionally by half a length. Bill Harack, up on third-place Ambio-

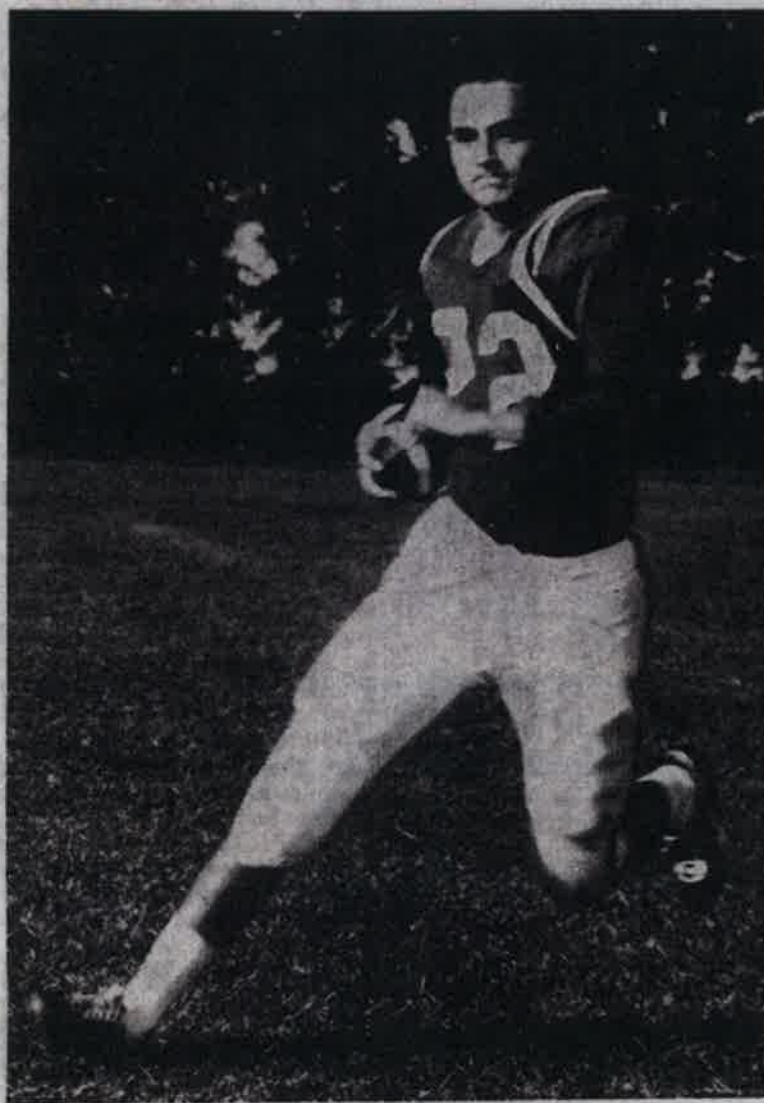
