# Kiwanis Jamboree Features Six Elevens

The 14th annual Lafayette Kiwanis Football Jamboree at McNaspy Stadium Friday might be the best one ever.

An attractive three - game program has been set up and, for no longer than the games will last, scoring should be about equal.

The Fatima Warriors and Cathedral Tigers clash in the first contest and the two teams begin their battle at 7:30. Breaux Bridge and Lafayette High go against each other in the second game and Northside and Father Teurlings play in the nightcap.

Each game is divided up into two 10-minute halves.

All six teams participating in the jamboree have had what

their coaches term good work-outs.

Gordon Coreil, Teurlings coach, said that halfback Ronnie Menard, who injured an ankle over the weekend, will miss the jamboree. Doctors said that the injury required only rest, Coreil reported, and said that Menard should be ready to go in a few days.

Northside's ace fullback Johnny Stelly will also miss the game because of a slight injury, but should also be ready by the time the Vikings start regular season play.

Mike Van Arsdale is the only Lafayette footballer who will not dress out. Regular end Jim Segrest was to have several stitches taken out of his hand and should see action in the Mighty Lions' clash with Breaux Bridge.

Billy Talbot says his Cathedral Tigers have high spirits for their Fatima contest, but said that slot back Jimmy Adams and fullback A.J. Maloney are out. Adams has a cracked rib while Maloney is missing because of a slight leg injury. Other than those two, Talbot said that the team would be at full force.

Coach John Beazley said that except for minor bruises, his Breaux Bridge eleven are in fine shape and the boys are in good spirits.

Fatima scrimmaged a Class AAA school Tuesday and assistant coach Andy Russo said that Warrior coaches were pleased with the results. The Warriors should be at a peak for a good performance against Cathedral.

Breaux Bridge's defensive alignment against Lafayette will be ends Sidney Champagne and Mike Blanchard, tackles Warren Dugas and Robert Blanchard, middle guard A.J. Broussard, right line-backer Kenneth Patin, left line-backer Sidney Broussard, monster man Albert Broussard, right defensive halfback Russell Frederick, left defensive halfback Mike Callier and safetyman Francis Reed.

# Teurlings May Surprise

New Father Teurlings coach Gordon Coreil may not win many football games with his Rebels this fall, but the team may have a say as to who will enter the District 7-B throne room when the season is over.

Gone from the team that had a 4-6 record in 1964 is all-district fullback Bob Thomas, who will be wearing the University of Southwestern Louisiana's colors this year. His loss will hurt Teurlings' chances for an improved record this year, but Coreil says the Rebels will be better balanced despite the absence of Thomas in the lineup.

The Rebels won't be as big this year as they were last, but Coreil said his team would try to make up for its lack of size in quickness.

Back to brighten Teurlings' chances will be shifty halfback Ronnie Menard, who was the deciding factor in the Rebels' 6-0 victory over St. Bernard of Breaux Bridge. He scampered 46 yards in the first period to score the only TD in the game. Crusaders 6-0.

E. J. Arceneaux has been shifted from his position in the line (end) to the fullback post where Coreil hopes he can take up some of the slack caused by Thomas' graduation. Although he weighs only about 160 pounds, Arceneaux is rugged and can take punishment enough for the position. The finesse he lacks at present may come after he has played in some of Father Teurlings' early games.

Another bright spot to brighten the hopes in Big Red territory is the return of big 15-10, 265 Wayne Arceneaux, who has his position at one of the tackle slots nailed down for the third year. Donald Lejeune, a guard, is back to man his position on the left side of the line, about 165 pounds.

Jersey Johnson is the only other starter returning. He is lanky (6-1, 155) but has good speed and will probably be used as a short pass catcher as well as a running back.

Junior Dale Thibodeaux and senior Kenneth Guilbeau are the only other lettermen returning. Thibodeaux earned a letter at a guard spot last year, but if Arceneaux works into the fullback position the former will probably take over at right end.

"I've been very pleased with the boys' attitudes and they've shown in our practices that they want to win," Coreil said.

last week. Before the Rebels reported to their first practice the coach had said that they were young, with not enough experience or manpower.

He revised that statement later.

"I think I'm going to be able to play 16 or 17 boys this year," Coreil offered.

Last season the Rebels suffered if the waterboy stumbled over the bench. That's how

badly they were in back for manpower.

Several freshmen are responsible for Coreil's optimism.

Teurlings' '64 season was top-heavy. The Catholic school won three of its first five games and lost four of its last five, but the opposition, as a whole, was tougher during the latter part of the schedule.

The Rebels defeated Scott (19-0), St. Joseph of Rayne

(17-0), Cecilia (14-7) and St. Bernard of Breaux Bridge (6-0). They were beaten by ML Carmel of Abbeville (16-0), Loreauville (21-0), Erath (12-0), Fatima of Lafayette (21-0), Delcambre (27-0) and St. Edmond (19-6).

The probable starting backfield this season will be Larry Felix at quarterback, Johnson and Menard at the halves and Arceneaux at full. The line starters will probably be Fred Snyder and Guilbeau at ends, Wayne Arceneaux and Phil Feltner at tackles, Lejeune and Thibodeaux at guards and Koby Lejeune at center.

Teurlings plays a 10-a game.

## Mt. Carmel Is 7-B Favorite; Fatima, Panthers In Deadlock

District 7-B coaches agree that the 1965 football season will produce another dogfight for the league crown, with Mt. Carmel of Abbeville a slight favorite to take all the marbles.

The Eagles took 3 of 4 first-place ballots to total 15 points and Fatima and Delcambre are picked as the teams most likely to slip into the throne room should Mt. Carmel falter. Both teams collected 12 points.

Father Teurlings is picked to finish fourth with its seven points and St. Bernard of Breaux Bridge was a unanimous pick for last place with its four points.

Mt. Carmel is probably best equipped of the five teams to retain its district title for the Eagles return 12 lettermen — nine of whom started a year ago — to help the team that had an 8-1-1 standard.

Delcambre can counter with five starters and "about eight lettermen," according to new head coach Don Dunbar. Those five starters should play a vital role in the Panthers' upset hopes, however.

The Panthers have a battle tested backfield returning. Perhaps the best of the three backs returning is shifty Wildie Primeaux, who has collected three letters while wearing the Black and Orange of Delcambre. Another who should provide important yardage up the middle is fullback Harvey Duplantis, a six-foot, 190-pounder. Tackle

Randy Laviolette, a six-footer with 205 pounds stacked on his frame, might be one of the better linemen in the district.

Fatima lost all-district quarterback Ray Mouton last year, as well as all-league wing back Steve Falcon and that's the biggest gap coach Phil Stoma has to fill.

The Warriors return a good nucleus in the line with two guards, a center and an end. Boys most likely to help the Warriors challenge for the district title include fullback Joe Goodson, quarterback Steve Sere, halfbacks Kenneth LeJeune and Bobby Lavin, tackle Bill Cobb and end Steve Gardes.

Teurlings lost its all-district fullback Bob Thomas but new head mentor Gordon Coreil feels that, as a whole, his 65 outfit will be better balanced, because the Rebs won't have Thomas to depend on. The Rebels have several young boys who have shown they want to help the team, Coreil said.

St. Bernard lost all-district halfback Ray Robin and several key men in the line and valuable defensive safety Kenny Breaux and has to be termed a team in the building stages. The Crusaders will have to go with boys much too young to compete with the other four compete with the other four teams in the loop.

# Kiwanis Jamboree Ends With NHS, LHS Victories

Lafayette and Northside, the two Class AAA teams in 14th annual Kiwanis Jamboree, racked up 7-0 decisions but the Fatima Warriors turned in the top overall offensive performance in battling favored Cathedral to a scoreless tie at McNaspy Stadium Friday night.

It was a tossup between the Fatima-Cathedral battle and the Lafayette-Breaux Bridge clash as to which was the better game. Northside showed a good running game against Father Teurlings even though ace fullback John Stelly was on crutches on the sidelines. The Vikings had a little too much power for the game Re-

straight passes intended for Steve Gardes failed to connect.

The Warriors produced the only excitement of the second half when Sere hit Goodson with a screen that went to the Cathedral 34 from the Fatima 30, a gain of 36 yards. This time the Warriors missed the first down on the 25 by two feet.

The Warriors had six first downs to four for the Tigers and held the Tigers to only three yards rushing and 11 passing while they rolled up 56 rushing and 59 through the air. Fatima hit three of eight passes and the Tigers connected on two of nine.

Fatima punted twice for 25.5 yards per kick and didn't fumble and Cathedral kicked twice

for 32 yards per kick and didn't lose a fumble. Fatima drew 53 yards in penalties and Cathedral 65.

Northside's Rodney Griffin recovered E. J. Arceneaux's fumble on the first play of the game on the Teurlings 34 and in two plays quarterback Mitchell Ortego put it in the end zone. Ortego, who was a ball of fire for the Vikings, ripped for 19 the first play and 15 the second. Jack Pennington ran for the PAT to make the score 7-0.

Teurlings got a break when Ken Guilbeau recovered a Pennington fumble on the Northside 21. They moved to a first down on the Vikings' 10 on a five-yard pass from Larry So-

lis to Ronnie Menard and a 45-yard run by Menard.

But on the next play Ortego saved the day by intercepting Solis' pass on the five-yard line and returning it to the 10.

The Vikings took the ball at the start of the second half and started punching out the ardage. They moved from their own 30 to a first down on the Teurlings 28. Ortego picked up four yards to the 24 and on the next play Pennington fumbled and Guilbeau recovered on the 26.

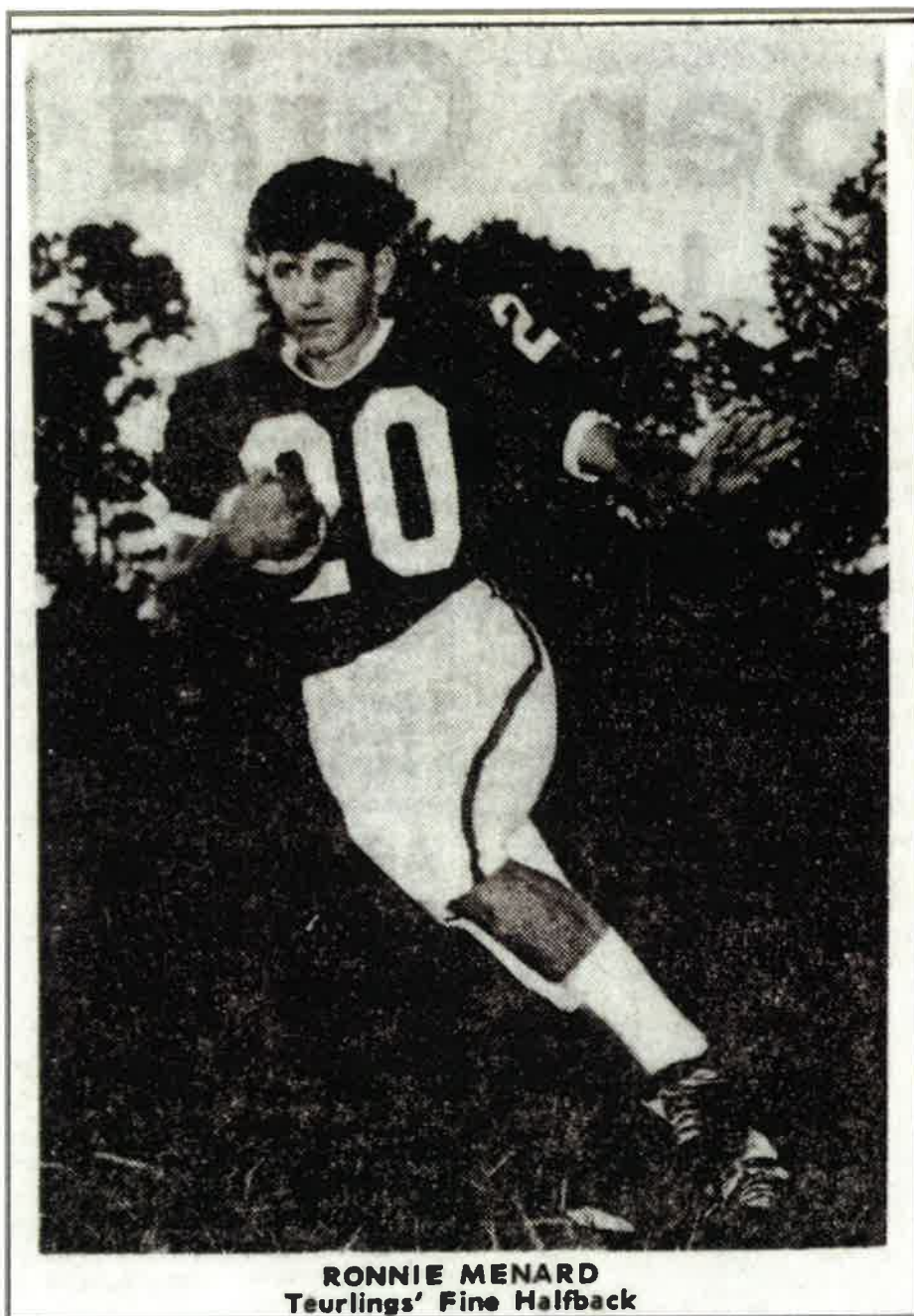

# Teurlings Upends Scott As Arceneaux Scores TD

There are at least two members of District 5-A who will attest to the football prowess of District 7-B—Scott and Judice.

Thursday night the Fatima Warriors pinned a 13-0 defeat on Judice and Sunday afternoon Father Teurlings got their season off on the right foot by subduing the Scott Eagles 6-0 behind a rock-ribbed defense and the power running of fullback E.J. Arceneaux.

Teurlings started its big push late in the first quarter when Kenneth Benaud punted to the Teurlings 47. Arceneaux slammed into the Scott line for nine yards and the Rebels were off on a march that took 13 plays.

The key play came on the Scott 32-yard line with the Rebels faced with a third down and 15 to go for a first down. Quarterback Larry Solis rolled out with the ball and pitched to Jerry Johnson who tight-roped his way down to the 18-yard line and a first down for the Rebels.

The Rebels moved to the Scott nine-yard line where they faced a fourth down and three to go situation. This time Arceneaux came to the rescue as he banged his way all nine yards for the extra point failed and the Rebels owned a 6-0 margin that was to stand up the entire game.

Scott took the second half kickoff and appeared to be on the way to paydirt. Johnson bouted the ball to the 12 and Scott fullback Darrell Comeaux brought it out to the 34.

With Comeaux, quarterback Daniel Arceneaux and halfback Firmin Navarre doing the damage the Eagles moved to three first downs. But with the ball on the 17-yard line and two yards to go for a first down the Eagles went for the first down and came up about two inches short on the 15-yard line.

Scott got another chance late in the game when Benaud kicked to the Rebels' 29 where Arceneaux called for a fair catch, fumbled the ball and Mike Aucoin recovered for the Eagles.

Arceneaux picked up two yards but the Rebels came up with a big defensive play and threw Randy Boudreaux for a loss back to the 29. On the next play Greig Benoit tried to connect but Ronnie Menard came up with a key interception for the Rebels.

After Scott was penalized to the 18 for offside, Arceneaux ripped loose and fought off tacklers for a 62-yard gain to the Scott 20-yard line. Menard picked up four to the 16 and on the last play of the game Solis rolled out around end to the 10 but he fumbled and Benoit came up with the ball for Scott. But the Eagles didn't have time to get

off a play and the Rebels had themselves a gridiron victory.

The statistics were fairly close until Arceneaux made his long run near the end of the game. The Rebels had the edge in first downs 7-6 and in rushing 163-69. But the Eagles hit three of seven passes for 21 yards and the Rebels failed to connect on four tries.

Arceneaux was the big ground-gainer with 111 yards in nine carries.

CASSODAY, Kan. (AP) — Knute Rockne Jr. and his brother, John Rockne, were among those who dedicated a monument Sunday to the legend of the famous Notre Dame football coach.

The bronze and stone marker is at a rest stop on the Kansas Turnpike about three miles from the pasture where an airplane crash on March 31, 1931, killed Rockne and seven other men.

Another marker has stood for many years in the pasture, but it is a mile from the nearest highway.

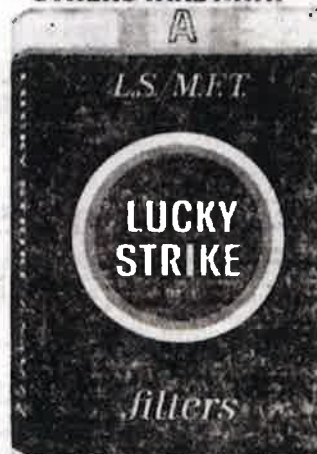

# Rebels, Mt. Carmel Clash In 7-B Football Opener

Father Teurlings' Rebels are only one game deep into their 1965 schedule but Thursday night could be the make-or-break contest for coach Gordon Coreil's Rebs.

The powerhouse from Mt. Carmel of Abbeville will come stalking into town Thursday night and will tangle with the Rebs in a 7:30 clash at Clark Field.

Mt. Carmel has yet to see action this season and should be at near full strength. Coach Carlton Falgout reports that first-string fullback Sanford Suire, a 175-pound senior, will be out for the season. But other than that Falgout has his charges set for battle.

The Screaming Eagles are the pick of the coaches to repeat as District 7-B champions. But the Rebs may be tougher opponents than most people realized.

Most fans had almost written the Rebels off as title contenders but the Teurlings eleven came up with a good first-game effort against Scott and came away with a surprising 6-0 de-

cision.

This was achieved without the services of Wayne Arceneaux who is probably the best lineman on the Teurlings team. Arceneaux is suffering from an injured ankle and may not be at full speed for the Eagles although he is certain to see at least limited action.

Another Arceneaux — fullback E. J. — was the big name for the Rebs against Scott. He bolted for 111 yards in nine carries and scored the only Teurlings touchdown on a three-yard sprint in the second quarter.

Coreil will start with Chuck McDowell at left end, Don LeJeune at left tackle, Gus Nelson at left guard, Bob LeJeune at center, Dale Thibodeaux at right guard, Phil Peltier at right tackle and Ken Guilbeau at right end.

In the backfield will be Larry Solis at quarterback, Arceneaux at fullback, Ronnie Menard at the running back position and Jerry Johnson at the wingback spot.

Mt. Carmel will counter with Rodney Simon at left end, Gerald Sellers at left tackle, Robert Williamson at left guard

and Frank DeGraau at center. Right end will be James Landry, Ronnie Abshire will be the right tackle and Mike Atchette will be the right guard.

Johnny Donahue will handle the field general's duties with James Moty and Ted Harper at the halfbacks and Weston Miller at fullback.

Falgout reports that his team has been working on its kicking game, trying to get the timing down. He reports that he has put in all his offense and defense and should be ready to open defense of his District 7-B title.

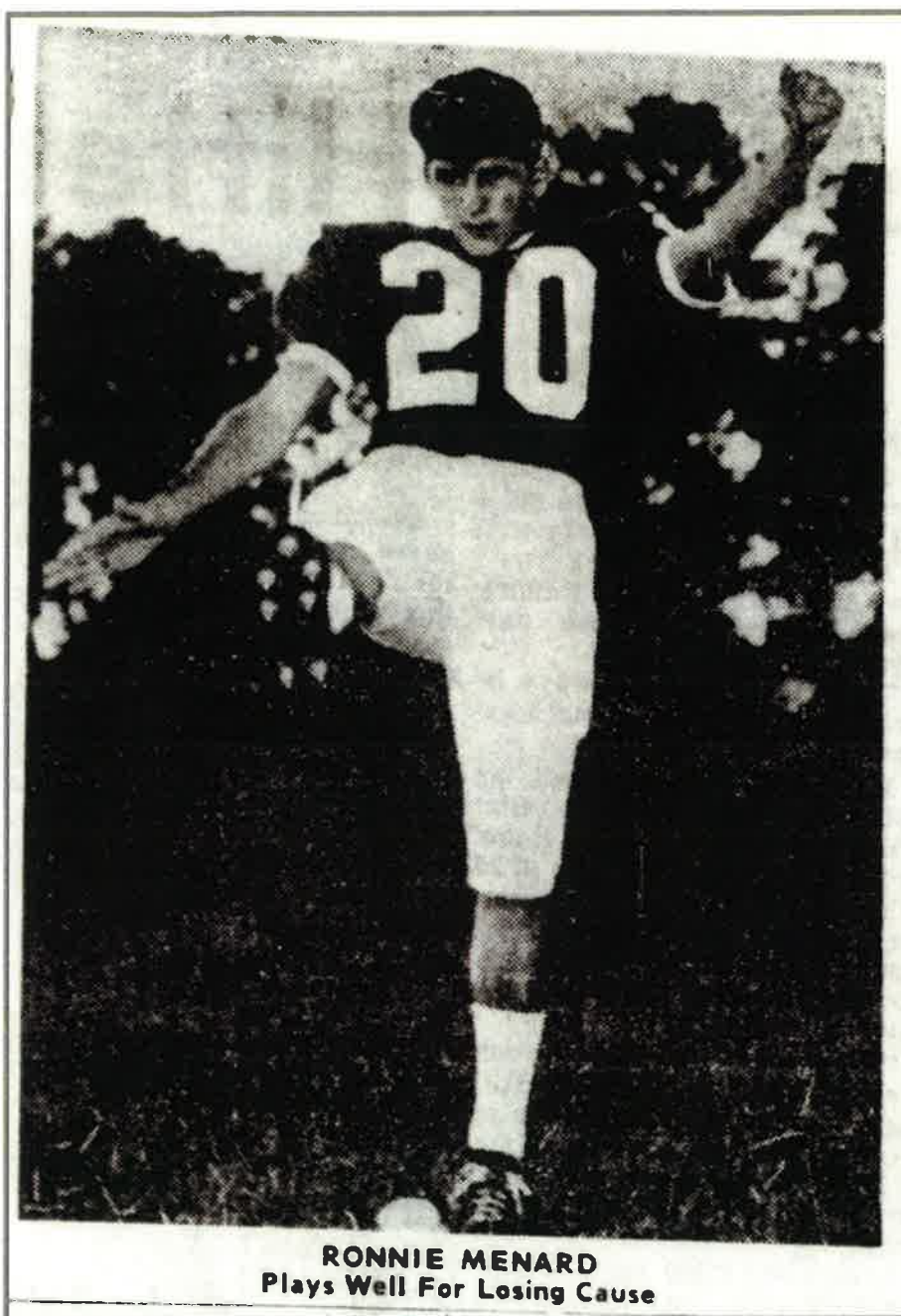

But the final score was the big difference as Mt. Carmel walked off with a 20-6 decision behind the running and pass-catching of shifty little halfback Ted Harper.

Harper caught a touchdown pass from quarterback John Donahue with time running out in the first quarter, then capped the Mt. Carmel scoring in the fourth quarter by dashing 22 yards around his left end.

Teurlings fullback E. J. Arceneaux was virtually unstoppable as he hit the Eagle line time after time for big gains in the first half.

He was injured with the second quarter about three quarters gone but walked off the field under his own power.

While he was in, Arceneaux picked up 72 yards and carried 13 times.

The Rebels marched 40 yards for their touchdown after halfback Ronnie Menard recovered a fumble by Eagle halfback Eddie Megison at the 47. Menard ran it back to the 40 of Mt. Carmel.

Arceneaux ripped off seven yards to the 33 and Menard scrambled for another seven to the 26. The two then combined on four more yards to the 22 before freshman quarterback Larry Solis rolled to his right and pitched out to flanker Jerry Johnson for a play that covered the six yards

needed for a first down.

From that point on it took seven plays to carry the ball across after the Rebels had gotten another first on the Mt. Carmel two-yard stripe. Substitute fullback Joey Babineaux plunged over on a third down situation.

Teurlings threatened earlier in the game when Mt. Carmel was pushed back to its 26 but Arceneaux fumbled to kill the threat and the Eagles recovered at the 26.

Halfback James Motty scored the second touchdown for the Eagles on a 29-yard scamper midway through the third quarter. His run climaxed a drive that carried 79 yards.

The Rebs punted to the Mt. Carmel 21 prior to the drive. Fullback Weston Miller carried three yards to the 24 and Harper got another three to the 27 before Donahue rolled out to the left side and raced 44 yards to the Teurlings 26.

## Sloan To Guide Alabama In Effort To Defend Title

Steve Sloan is on his own this year, and the powerful Alabama quarterback can drive the defending national champions into the Southeastern Conference lead Saturday in the opening round of the 1965 football season.

Alabama's regionally televised battle at Georgia is the only conference scrap of the day, with other league teams testing their mettle against rivals from such football strongholds as the Big Ten, the Big Eight and the Southwest conferences.

Tulane opens Saturday night at Texas, pre-season pick as the nation's No. 2 team. The game was moved from New Orleans—hit by Hurricane Betsy—to Austin.

Two other Southwest Conference clubs also visit the SEC with Baylor playing at Auburn Saturday and Texas A&M venturing into the unfriendly lair of the Tigers of Louisiana State Saturday night.

Florida, primed by the passing of quarterback Steve Spurrier, travels to Northwestern for the Gators' first match against a Big Ten foe, and Kentucky plays at Missouri, one of the blockbusters of the Big Eight.

Army plays at Tennessee in a day game that marks the Cadets' first road opener in 76

years. Saturday night, Mississippi State travels to Houston.

In the conference chase, those teams will fall a notch behind the winner of the Alabama-Georgia duel, which ends a series that started 70 years ago. Georgia hasn't won since 1959, and the finale doesn't look any brighter for the Bulldogs.

Georgia Coach Vince Dooley says he considers Sloan a better quarterback than Joe Namath, the newly rich professional who a year ago guided Alabama to a 31-3 triumph over the Bulldogs.

Sloan served as Nath's understudy last fall and filled in capably when Namath was injured. The burly senior now is regarded as one of the best quarterbacks in collegiate ranks.

Alabama also has another rugged runner in fullback Steve Bowman. He and Sloan are the only seniors in the offensive lineup, but Coach Bear Bryant has a herd of eager young men ready to battle for another conference crown.

While Alabama is trying to take the league lead, Florida will be out to win some prestige for the conference against the Big Ten. Since the SEC was organized its teams have played Big Ten foes only 15 games, and the rivalry now stands at seven victories each, with one tie.

# Fatima, Teurlings On Road Against Non-League Foes

Fatima and Father Teurlings attempt wins against non-district foes Friday night.

The Warriors of Fatima, currently in the lead in District 2-B, take on Jeanerette, a District 8-B eleven in an away clash, while Teurlings' Rebels are at Cecilia to help the District 5-A Bulldogs celebrate Homecoming.

Teurlings will be badly crippled for the Cecilia game. Defensive back Richard McDowell is lost for the season because of a shoulder separation suffered in the St. Joseph of Rayne game last week. Jerry Johnson, two-way starter in the backfield, probably won't dress out for the game and defensive back Mike Munro's status is the same. Both boys have knee injuries.

The Rebels are slowed with a lot of other injuries, according to coach Gordon Corell, but none are serious.

Fatima lost end Glenn Ashy for five weeks after he sustained a bone fracture in his hand in the Mt. Carmel game last week.

The Warriors won that affair 6-0 and is now favored to win the district crown worn by the Abbeville team in 1964.

Both Cecilia and Jeanerette won their games last week. Cecilia defeated league foe Gueydan 7-0 on the strength of an 85-yard kickoff return by halfback Lee Ray Hardy on the first play of the game.

Jeanerette upset district foe Patterson 13-6.

Teurlings was held to a tie by St. Joseph and had to come from a 14-7 deficit on the last play of the game to gain the 14-14 deadlock.

Fatima won its game over Mt. Carmel when fullback Joe Goodson returned a first-quar-

ter punt 78 yards for the only score of the game.

The Warriors have now compiled a 3-0-1 record in their four games, with the only blemish coming in their clash with St. Maria Goretti of Lake Arthur when they were held to a 6-6 tie.

Teurlings has been beaten by Mt. Carmel and holds victories over Scott (6-0) and Loreauville (24-0). The Mt. Carmel team won 20-6.

Cecilia had been beaten by Erath, AIC of Opelousas and St. Martinville before gaining its victory over Gueydan.

Jeanerette has split its four games to date, defeating St. Bernard of Breaux Bridge (41-0) and Patterson and losing to Hanson (33-7) and Mt. Carmel (14-0).

Fatima's lineup against Jeanerette will probably include ends Steve Gardes and Russell Breaux, tackles Bill Cobb and Phil Daly, guards Arthur Chauvin and Guy Doll and center Mary Melancon. Steve Sere will start at quarterback, Joe Goodson will be in at fullback, Bobby Lavin will be the tailback and Kenneth LeJeune the wingback.

Jeanerette will counter with ends Teddy Vernon and Sonny Baudry, tackles Ronald Guillot and N. C. Derise, guards David Kelly and Perry Landry, center Andrew Hebert, quarterback Sidney Gonsoulin or Randall Godley, halfbacks, Harold Broussard and Mike Leatham and fullback Elwood Hebert or Wallace Helms.

Teurlings' starting line against Cecilia will probably include ends Chuck McDowell and Kenneth Guilbeau, tackles Phil Peltier and Wayne Arce-neaux, guards Donald LeJeune and Dale Thibodeaux and cen-

ter Fred Speyrer. Backfield starters include quarterback Larry Solis, running back Ronnie Menard, wingback Ernest Gremillion and fullback Joey Babineaux.

First string fullback E. J. Arce-neaux is still nursing a knee that was injured in the Mt. Carmel contest.

Cecilia will probably go with ends Dudley Duplechein and Ralph Guidroz, tackles Teddy Cormier and Simon Marks, guards Ricky Bijeaux and Harry James Landry, center Johnny P. Dupuis, quarterback Ronald Berard, halfbacks Lee Ray Hardy and Richard Guidry and fullback Clyde Huval, a 200-pounder.

Defensive specialists for Cecilia include backs Pearly Dupuis, Kirby Champagne, Lynn Olivier, middle guards Carroll Bergeron and Leonard Huval.

**ST. JOSEPH AT SUNSET**

In one of only two other district class B games scheduled for this area St. Joseph of Rayne is at Sunset in a District 4-B clash.

The St. Joseph Tigers have shown unexpected strength in their last three games, winning two out of the three and tying the other (Teurlings, 14-14). St. Joseph started out on its current unbeaten string by defeating Mamou (19-7) and Judice (6-0).

# Cecilia Beats Rebs With Late TDs, 13-0

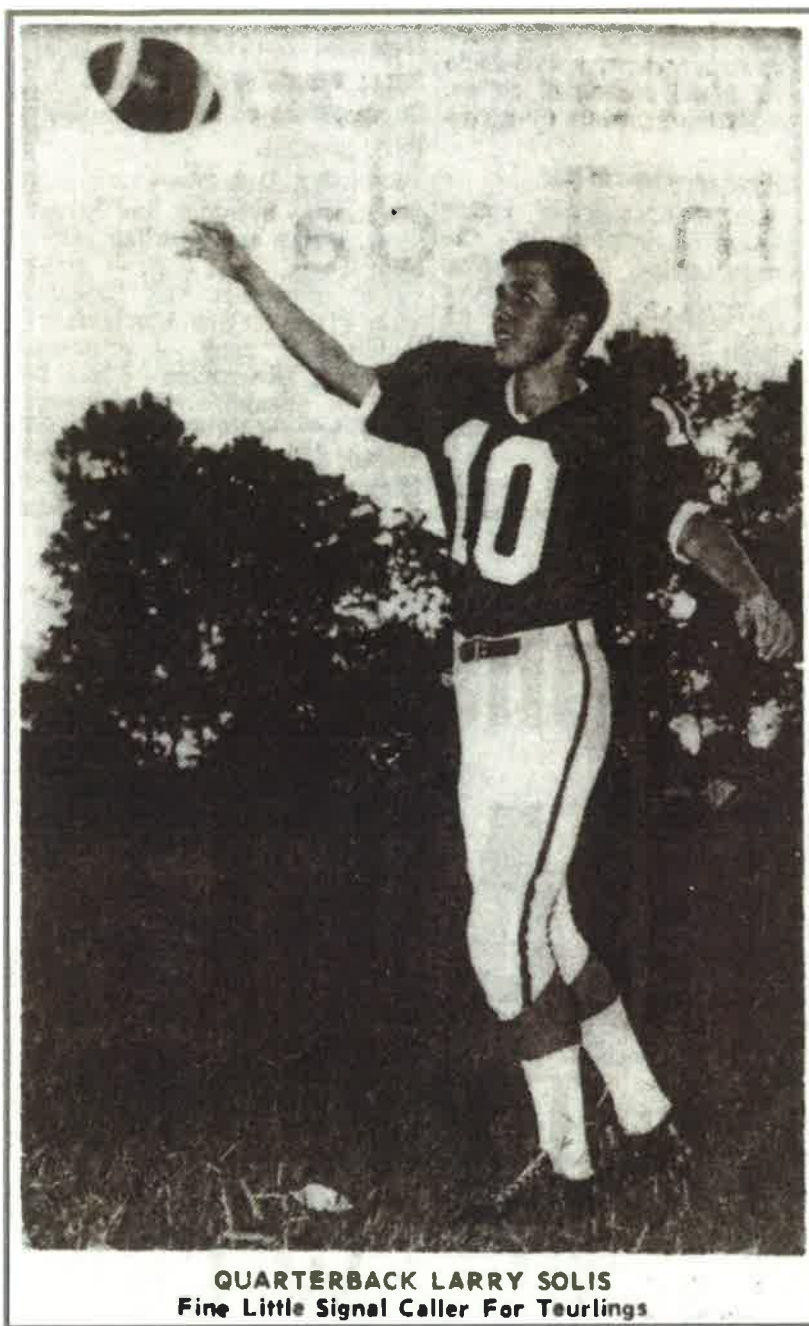

# Teurlings Hosts Bobcats In Thursday Grid Clash

Father Teurlings' Rebels will be gunning for their third grid victory of the season Thursday night when they play host to the Erath Bobcats in a non-district affair in Clark Field at 7:30.

Coach Gordon Coreil's Rebels have been one of the surprise teams in the area with its spirited play and current 2 - 2 - 1 mark. The only losses inflicted on the Rebels have been by Mt. Carmel of Abbeville and Class A Cecilia. The Rebs played St. Joseph of Rayne to a 14 - 14 deadlock.

# Teurlings Upsets Bobcats 13-7 In Non-District Clash

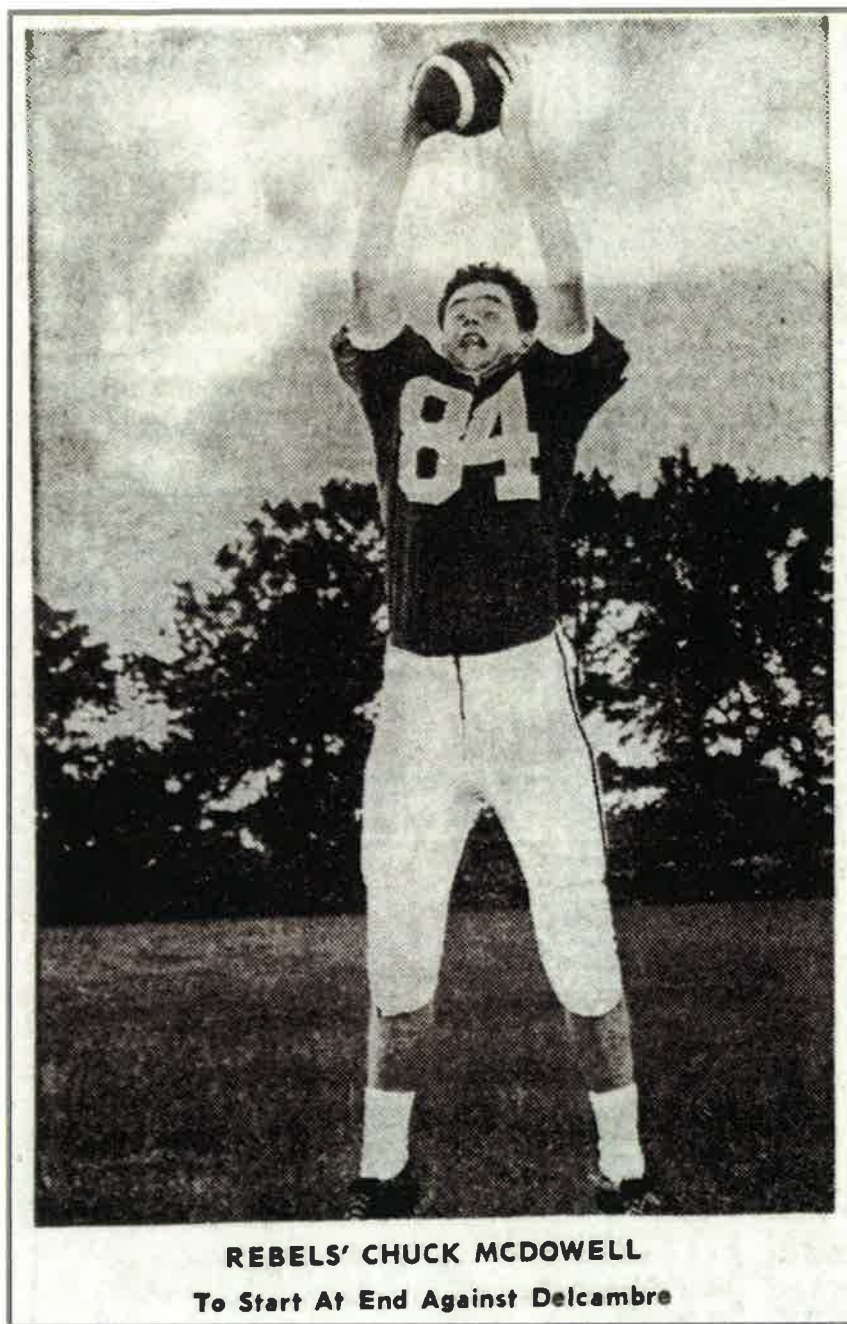

# Cobb, Goodson, Phil Stoma Outstanding In Loop 7-B

Fatima landed five Warriors on the All-District 7-B football team, and received three other all-star honors.

Tackle Bill Cobb was named Most Valuable Lineman, fullback Joe Goodson was picked as the Most Valuable Back and Coach Phil Stoma was selected as Outstanding Coach.

The all-star team has an explosive backfield headed by Goodson, who picked up 1,000 yards in 166 carries in Fatima's 10 games and was instrumental in his team's 7-2-1 record.

Quarterback Steve Sere directs the backfield that accounted for more than 3,000 yards. The Fatima junior threw 85 passes and completed 43 of them for 837 yards and seven touchdowns. He managed to pick up slightly over a yard per carry, but that particular statistic is misleading because he was thrown for losses while trying to pass on several occasions.

Father Teurlings' Ronnie Menard was named to the backfield along with Delcambre's Wildie Primeaux to fill out the halfback positions. Menard, a 180-pound speedster, carried the ball 117 times and picked up 654 yards. In addition, the senior Rebel caught eight passes for 102 yards.

Primeaux is a 170-pounder who hits with the power of a

fullback at the line of scrimmage, but has all the good moves when he hits the defensive secondary. He rushed 115 times and chalked up 582 yards and six touchdowns.

Goodson, Menard, Cobb and Wayne Arceneaux of Teurlings were unanimous selections to the all-district eleven.

The versatile Cobb switched positions several times during the season. He played middle guard and linebacker on defense and was an outstanding blocker from his tackle position on offense.

Arceneaux, a 205-pound defensive stalwart, is one of only three seniors on the first-team line. He was one of the big reasons Teurlings came through with a surprisingly good 4-4-2 record, a mark far better than most people predicted before the start of the season.

The line averages 177 pounds per man with Arceneaux the biggest and senior center Danny Segura of Delcambre the lightest at 165 pounds.

The ends are Fatima's Steve Gardes and James Landry of Mt. Carmel. Gardes caught 18 passes for 461 yards and five touchdowns while Landry snagged 27 passes for 324 yards and three scores.

Guards for the team that has five juniors and six seniors are Guy Doll of Fatima and Dale Thibodeaux of Teurlings and Segura is the center.

Second team members include ends Ronnie Barras of

Delcambre and Chuck McDowell of Teurlings, tackles Gerard Sellers of Mt. Carmel and Drew Broussard of St. Bernard, guards Burt Baudoin of Delcambre and Arthur Chauvin of Fatima, center Marty Melancon of Fatima, quarterback Johnny Donahue and halfback James Motty, both of Mt. Carmel, halfback Kenneth LeJeune of Fatima and fullback Harvey Duplantis of Delcambre.
