

# Kiwanis Football Officially Be

Lafayette teams kick off the 1966 football season Friday night in Southwestern's McNaspy Stadium when the five local schools and Breaux Bridge tangle in the 15th renewal of the Kiwanis Football Jamboree. The kick-off is scheduled for 7:30.

The first game should generate plenty of fireworks with Class AA Cathedral scheduled to take on Fatima, a Class B school. The second encounter will pit Northside and Father Teurlings, two rivals from the north side of town and the final game will match the Lafayette Lions against Breaux Bridge.

The games will consist of two ten-minute halves.

The first game should be interesting although the larger Cathedral Tigers will be heavy favorites to bump off Fatima. The Tigers have shown well in

pre-season drills and could be one of the surprise teams in District 5-AA.

Fatima will have some stand-out individuals but the Warriors are very thin in some key positions. Fatima is competing in District 5-B this season and the Warriors are figured to come out fourth in the pre-season ratings.

Cathedral's offensive punch will be built around junior quarterback Paul Jumonville while the Warriors depend on their senior field general Steve Sere. Jumonville is a three-year starter and is expected to be a threat running and passing for Cathedral.

Great things have been predicted for Sere as he was named all-district last season and showed that he could be one of the best athletes in Southwest

Louisiana.

Other starters in the backfield for Fatima will probably be Bobby Lavin and Tim LeJeune at halfback and Bill Cobb at fullback. Cathedral will have Danny Domingue at slot back, Jim Maloney at tailback and either Richard Sturese or Bob Denny at fullback.

Northside, in the midst of a rebuilding program, won't be much more than a slight favor to knock off Teurlings. The Vikings don't have the strength or the personnel to back up their Class AAA rating and the Rebels could surprise the Vikings.

Teurlings suffered a big loss when their big fullback E. J. Arceneaux broke a bone in his leg and will not be able to start for six weeks. Junior Joey Babineaux will fill for the injured Arceneaux.

Other backfield starters for the Rebels will be Larry Solis at quarterback, Erny Gremillion and either Jerry Johnson or Mike Muro at halfbacks.

Northside will probably call on the passing of quarterback Ken Lacy. For running punch the Vikings will count on halfbacks Terry Rogers, Whitney Romero, Roger Cook and Mike Morvant and fullback Don Taylor.

Northside and Teurlings battled to a 0-0 deadlock in the first half, but the Vikings struck for a quick six pointer at the start of the second half, after capitalizing on a Rebel fumble at the 19 yard line and moving across the double-stripe six plays later. Terry Rogers scored the TD on a two-yard pudge.

#### **Solis Engineers Drive**

Teurling took over and Solis engineered a 70-yard scoring drive, to give the Rebels a 7-7 tie with less than four minutes remaining.

Solis actually scored on a 66-yard run after the first five plays, but it was called back because of a personal foul penalty. He made up for it, however, with a 45-yard pass to Rick McDowell, putting the ball on the 18. Another Viking personal foul put the ball on the 11, and three plays later Solis scored on a keeper from the two-yard line. He then passed to McDowell for the PAT and give the Rebels the 7-7 tie.

Northside rushed for 78 in 17 carries, and picked up 14 yards passing on a 2-9 performance by Ken Lacy. Teurlings had only 51 yards on the ground, but amassed 45 in the air to out gain Northside 96-92 in total yardage.

# Rebels Tangle With Eagles In Tough Ro

Father Teurlings has high hopes for a successful season this year and the Rebels get a chance to start the season off with a big bang Friday night against Scott.

The Rebels travel to Scott with a team that is riding high after tying Northside, 7-7, in the Kiwanis Jamboree. Coach Paul Broussard was very pleased with his teams effort against the Vikings, but stated that "The secondary is a little weak and will need a few more games under their belts."

Scott was tabbed as a District 5-A contender in pre-season polls, but suffered the loss of four key players in beating Hanson, 12-0, in the Franklin Jamboree. The Eagles had sported an excellent starting unit, but coach Dave Cavalier stated before the season began that the team lacked sufficient depth.

### Top Rated Pilot

The Rebels' offensive drive is engineered by junior quarterback Larry Solis. Solis (155) is reported a respectable passer, but his biggest asset to the team is his leadership. With him in the backfield are halfbacks Jerry Johnson (165), who is also a fine receiver and

handles the Rebels' punting chores at an average of 32 yards per boot, and Ernie Gre-million (155). The Rebels' full-back is Joey Babineaux, a strong running 175 pound junior.

On the left side of the offensive line the Rebels have Rick McDowell (165) at end, Phil Peltier (185) at tackle, and Jimmy Womack (145) at guard. The right side is a little stronger with Terry Landry (160) at end, Gus Nelson (190) at tackle, and Dale Thibodeaux (165) at guard. Holding down the center position is Bobby Lejune, a 180-pound junior. The Rebels' top defensive specialist is Rocky Romero (175) who strongholds the middle guard position.

### Injuries Hurt

The Eagles can match the Rebels in size and speed, but the loss of four first string starters could spell the difference between victory and defeat. Danny Begnaud, their 235 pound tackle, is out for the season with a bad knee injury that was sustained in the jamboree. Another big loss is quarterback Greg Benoit, who suffered a bad cut after being spiked in the jamboree.

# Teurlings Rebels Team In Newly

Father Teurlings of Lafayette appears to have its best chance since the '63 season of compiling a respectable won-lost record, as they have nine starters and 13 lettermen returning for the '66 campaign.

Last year the Rebels split the won-lost column right down the middle and finished with a 4-4-2 record, although they managed to win only two district tilts.

In their first encounter the Rebels squeaked past Scott, 6-0, in what was termed a defensive battle. Mt. Carmel soundly whipped them 20-6 the following week, but the Rebels bounced back in their next game and pounded Loreauville 24-0.

## Tied St. Joseph

They managed to tie a tough St. Joseph team 14-14, but took it on the chin the next week from a weak Cecilia eleven 13-0. Erath fell victim to the Rebels 13-7, but then Fatima slashed their defense for a 26-0 victory. Their last victory came over St. Bernard 31-0, as they suffered a loss and tie in their final two tilts. Delcambre hit them 26-6 and St. Edmunds of Eunice held them to a 6-6 deadlock.

Although Teurlings' team appears to be the best in quite a while, they have already been hit with the injury plague. The Rebels' big 175-pound fullback, E.J. Arceneaux, suffered a broken leg in practice and will be lost for the first three games.

Coach Paul Broussard has replaced him temporarily with Joey Babineaux, a 165-pound junior. Babineaux may find the going a little rough at first however, because the only action he saw last season was at the guard position.

## Starters Look Good

Other than Arceneaux, Broussard's starting eleven appears to be able to hold their own against any opposition.

Larry Solis, a stocky 155-pound junior, is back again at the quarterback position. He has a year of varsity competition under his belt now and should be ready to pilot the club successfully.

The halfbacks this season will be Erny Gremillion (155), and Jerry Johnson (160). Both are seniors and should aid the Rebels greatly in the running department. Johnson is also capable of replacing Solis if injuries should occur.

## Line Changes Made

Because of Arceneaux's injury a few shifts have been made in the line also. Center Jimmy Womack (145), has been moved to guard along with returnee Dale Thibodeaux, a 165-pound senior. Gus Nelson (185), who played at the guard position last season, has been moved to tackle and will team with Phil Peltier, a 175-pound senior. The ends will be Terry Landry, a 155-pound junior, and Rick McDowell (160), who saw action as a fullback last year. The new center this year will be Robert LeJeune, a 175-pound junior with some playing experience.

# s Should Be Top Notch y-Formed 5-B District

The line averages out 165 pounds per man, while the backfield will be a hefty 160. Coach Broussard considers his team a small one, but says the extra speed in both the line and the backfield should benefit them greatly.

The punters this season will be Johnson and Nelson, with probably Nelson booting the extra points. Defense will be a factor as always, and much will be dependent on the toes of this twosome.

## Two Good Reserves

Coach Broussard has a couple of top notch reserves, who are capable of backing up any injured players in Fred Indest, a 210 pound tackle, and Mike Munro, a 160-pound halfback. Both will undoubtedly see plenty of action this year on both offensive and defense.

The Rebels open their '66 slate against an improved Scott eleven on the road on September 9. They then face newcomer Hanson in an important home tilt on the 15. All the Rebel games will again be played under the lights of Clark Field at 7:30. On the 23, cross-town rival Fatima will bring their tough squad against the Rebels in another game scheduled for Clark Field, with the Warriors going as the home team.

A home test against Cecilia on the 30 completes the Rebels' schedule for September and Central Catholic opens up the month of October on the 7, also at home. They then travel to Jeanerette to battle the Bulldogs on the 14, and come back home for

a two-game stay the following week. Loreauville is their opponent on the 21, and Mamou will offer the opposition on the 27.

Their final two tilts are on the road against Delcambre on November 3, and against Mt. Carmel in Abbeville on the 10.

Allen Credeur and Randy Boudreaux led the Scott attack that rolled up 384 yards total offense against the game but outmanned Rebels. Credeur carried the ball seven times for 97 yards and Boudreaux picked up 17 yards in seven carries.

Scott drove 63 yards for its first touchdown of the game and Credeur did the honors on a dazzling 37-yard run. The PAT attempt by the Eagles failed.

Teurlings came storming back and it appeared that the Rebels might make a game of it. Rebel quarterback Larry Solis connected with end Rick McDowell on a beautiful 41-

yard scoring play and the PAT failed to make the score 6-6 at the end of the first period.

But Scott hit paydirt twice in the second period to put the game out of reach. Greg Benoit did the honors on the first score with a 39-yard run and Benoit then passed to Allan Campbell for the PAT to make the count 13-6. Boudreaux scored the second tally for the Eagles in the second period on a one-yard run and Benoit ran the PAT to make the count 20-6 at halftime.

Scott scored the final points of the game in the third quarter when David Mesh went over from one-yard out.

The Eagles piled up 364

yards rushing and 20 passing on one completion in two attempts. Scott got 19 first downs in racking up the 384 yards total offense.

Teurlings picked up seven first downs but got only six yards rushing. The Rebels hit for 130 yards through the air on 8 completions in 35 attempts. The Rebs kicked eight times for a 27-yard average and Scott four times for a 30-yard mark. Scott lost the ball on fumbles four times and the Rebs once.

Scott was hit with a staggering total of 105 yards in penalties and Teurlings had 60 yards marched off against them.

# Rebels Battle Hanson Eleven

The Father Teurlings Rebels will make their first home appearance of the season and get a rugged District 5-B test Thursday night when they host Hanson of Franklin in a 7:30 contest at Clark Field.

There are two other area games involving Lafayette area teams. Catholic of New Iberua, the second-ranked Class AA team in the state, journeys to Lake Charles to take on Landry Memorial of Lake Charles, the No. 1 rated Class A team.

Central Catholic of Morgan City journeys to Loreauville for a District 5-B battle in the other Thursday night clash.

## Did Creditable Job

Coach Paul Broussard's Rebels took it on the chin from a powerful Scott eleven last week, 16-6, but Broussard said that his team did a creditable job against a much more experienced and deep Scott team.

The Rebels have to iron out some offensive problems as they managed only seven first downs and a total offense of 136 yards. But the major pro-

blem was the rushing game that produced a total of only six yards the entire night.

But Teurlings has been working hard this week and with Erny Gremillion and Jerry Johnson at the halfbacks and Joey Babineaux at fullback the Rebels should be able to generate more ground punch.

## Threw 35 Times

Quarterback Larry Solis took to the air 35 times against Scott and hit eight for 130 yards and one touchdown. He hit end Rick McDowell with a 54-yard scoring aerial for the Rebs' only touchdown.

The Rebels will have McDowell and Terry Landry at ends, Phil Peltier and Gus Nelson at tackles, Jimmy Womack and Dale Thibodeaux at guards and Robert LeJeune at center.

On defense the Rebels will have Nelson and Harson at ends, Guillory and Indest at tackles and Romero at middle guard. Thibodeaux and Lejeune are the cornerbacks, Peltier and Babineaux the linebackers and Johnson and Landry at the safety spots.

## Hanson Impressive

Hanson was impressive in its 19-0 victory over Delcambre last week as Keith LeBlanc scored three times on runs of 17, 37 and 25 yards. The Tigers rolled up 387 yards on the ground and generally dominated the game. Hanson was rated as one of the stronger teams in the district in pre-sea-

son polls so if Teurlings is to pull any surprises they will have to start Thursday.

Catholic showed plenty of punch by pounding an inexperienced Plaquemine eleven. The Panthers ground out a 19-0 win and rolled up 287 yards rushing and hit four of 11 passes for an additional 26 yards. Jim Hunter and Dick Haik are the major offensive threats for the Panthers.

Landry is the defending state champs in Class A and the Tigers are supposed to have enough punch to be a threat to repeat. It should be one of the hardest-hitting games of the season as both teams are well known for their hard-nosed tactics.

Central Catholic opened what Eagle fans hope will be a great year by pounding St. Joseph of Chauvin 25-0 last week. The Eagles had a well-balanced attack with a total of 264 yards rushing and 194 passing. Quarterback Greg Aucoin hit eight of 10 passes and hit for three touchdowns.

Loreauville surprised Cecilia 19-14 as halfback Glenn LeBlanc scored three times of runs of 24, 10 and 10 yards. The Tigers had 242 yards rushing but did not connect on a pass in three tries.

Both Central Catholic and Loreauville were members of District 8-B last year and the Eagles won the championship and Loreauville finished last.

# Hanson Rips Teurlings, 16-0, LeBlanc Rushes For 158 Yds.

Hanson used a powerful ground game in the first half to push across two touchdowns and hand Teurlings of Lafayette their second consecutive loss, 16-0, at Clark Field last night.

Teurlings managed to stop Hanson's first two drives, but on the third try the Tigers' big halfback Keith LeBlanc blasted up the middle on the first play from scrimmage and rambled all the way to paydirt from Hanson's 33 yard line. Quarterback Ken Aycock ran

for the point after and the Tigers led 7-0 with 4:45 left in the first quarter.

With less than a minute to play in the first period, Teurlings took over on their own 27, but two plays later lost possession when Joey Babineaux fumbled at the 38. Hanson look over again and drove to the 20 on good gains by John Schexnayder and Aycock. The Rebels' defense stiffened, however, and Teurlings regained possession on the 24.

## Trouble Starts

Everything went wrong after that as quarterback Larry Solis

was dropped three straight times for a total of 13 yards. Jerry Johnson tried to punt the Rebels out of danger, but a high pass from center Rusty Zaunbrecher struck the goal post and Hanson was awarded a safety to make the score 9-0.

After the Rebels' kickoff Hanson took over on their own 40, where Aycock engineered another successful scoring drive.

Aycock and Schexnayder moved the football to the 36 and after an exchange of penalties with Teurlings, the Tigers had possession on the Rebels' 30 yard line. Hanson then pulled off a sneaky double hand-off from Aycock to LeBlanc to Glenn Cullotta who ran across the double stripe for the six pointer. This time LeBlanc ran for the PAT and the Tigers had a comfortable 16-0 lead with six minutes left in the half.

## Start 2nd Drive

Later in the period the Tigers started another drive from their own 30, but lost their chance for another TD when Cullotta fumbled at the Rebels' 28 yard line with only 12 seconds showing on the clock.

Hanson completely outplayed the Rebels in the first half as they gained 188 yards on the ground to a meager 16 for Teurlings. The second half was a different story, however, as the charged-up Rebels held their larger foes at bay and almost pushed across a score.

After an exchange of punts the Rebels look over on their own 40 and started moving steadily down field.

## Solis Moves Rebs

An offside penalty brought Teurlings to the 45 and Solis moved them across midfield with a seven yard run. Babineaux blasted to the 43 and Solis completed a six yard pass to Terry Landry at the 37 to give the Rebs another first down. However, after a three yard loss and incomplete pass by Solis, the Rebels were forced to punt and another had snap from center allowed the Tigers to block Johnson's punt and give them possession on the 29 yard line.

The Tigers' machine started rolling again, but broke down at the 15 when a scoring pass from Seppo Musso, who replaced the injured Aycock at half time, to John Cestia was called back by an offside penalty against Hanson.

## Couldn't Get Started

Neither team could muster any type of scoring drive after that and Hanson went home with its second straight district win.

LeBlanc emerged as the game's leading ground leader with 138 yards in 19 carries, while Babineaux was Teurlings' top rusher with 59 yards.

Hanson outgained the Rebels in total offense, 229-133. The Tigers failed to connect on four aerial attempts, while Solis threw 21 times and completed six for 54 yards. His fine job of quarterbacking was marred by the 33 yards he lost on the ground.

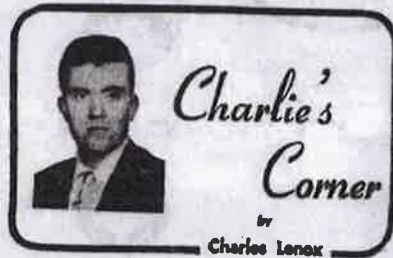

Trophies will be awarded the three best drivers in each class. Each driver will be given three opportunities



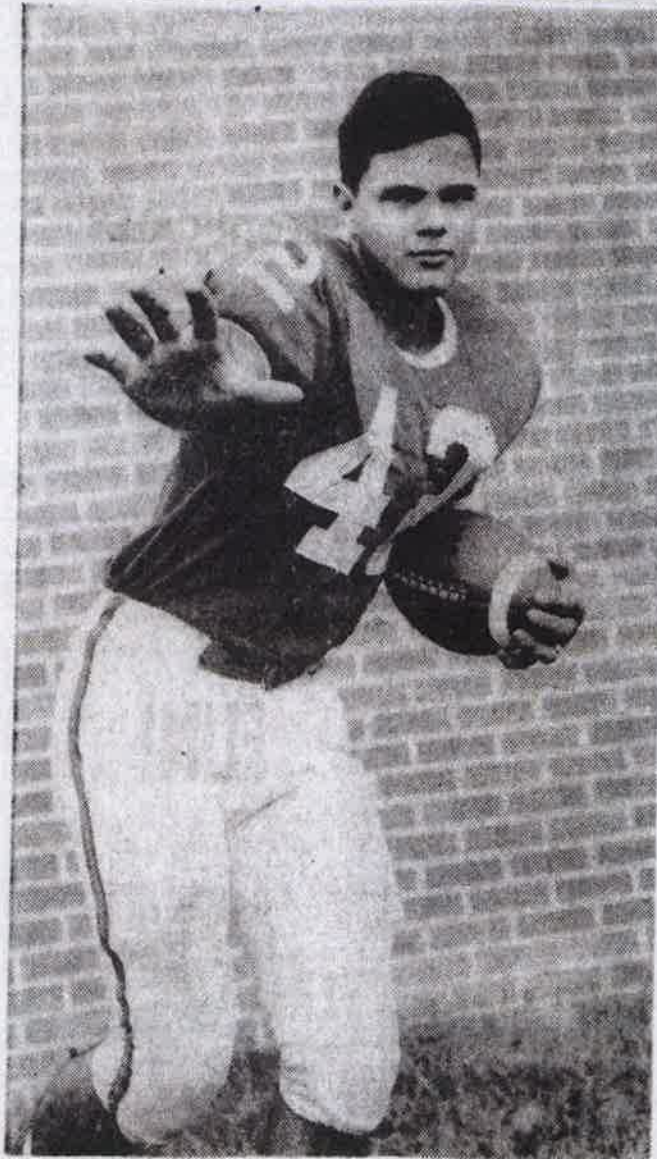

# Fatima, Teurlings Via In 5-B District Test

Fatima and Father Teurlings, two bitter cross-town rivals, tangle in Clark Field Friday night at 7:30 and the loser will all but be out of the chase for the District 5-B title.

Teurlings has played only one district game and that was last week against Hanson of Franklin which the Rebels lost 16-0, but Hanson may be the team to beat in the title chase. The Rebels dropped a 26-6 decision to Scott in the season opener.

Fatima has rolled over two weaker foes in Jeanerette and Delcambre by scores of 13-0 and 26-6 but the Warriors are figured to have one of the toughest teams in 5-B.

## Need To Win

Neither team can afford to lose Friday night's game if they hope to remain in the 5-B chase. Teurlings has the one loss but the Rebels could make it hot for the other teams if they upset the Warriors.

Fatima remains the favorite in the game but in a rivalry such as Teurlings and the Warriors have, there can never be a clear-cut favorite.

The Warriors have been impressive offensively as they rolled up 201 yards rushing and 109 passing on Jeanerette for a total offense mark of 310 yards and then come back last week against Delcambre and piled up 237 yards rushing and 218 passing for a total offense mark of 455 yards.

## Two Standouts

Fatima has two standout performers in the backfield in quarter-back Steve Sere and fullback Bill Cobb. Sere hit 3 of 8 passes for 109 yards in the opener and rolled up 71 yards rushing and last week connected on 17 of 28 passes for 218 yards. Cobb gained 125 yards rushing against Jeanerette and 94 against Delcambre.

The Warrior defense has been going good as they allowed Jeanerette only 113 yards total offense and Delcambre 149.

But Fatima coach Phil Stoma is worried about injuries as he says that halfbacks Clay Judice and Roy Billeaud, guard Tom-

my Fitzgerald and tackle Phil Daly probably won't see action against the Rebels.

## Starting Line

Stoma will call on Glen Ashy and Steve Gardes at ends, Ted Guidry and Bobby Gardes at tackles, Randy Judice and Mike Patout at guards and Richard Fournet at center. In the backfield Sere will be at quarterback with Bobby Lavin and Tim LeJeune at halfback and Cobb at fullback.

Teurlings also has some key performers who will not see

action against the Warriors. Guard and linebacker Dale Thibodeaux and fullback Joey Babineaux will probably not start. They join starting fullback E. J. Arceneaux on the injured list.

Coach Paul Broussard will have Rick McDowell and Terry Landry at ends, Fred Indest and Gus Nelson at tackles, Jim Womack and Cliff Guillory at guards and Bob LeJeune at center. Larry Solis will direct the Rebel attack with Mike Monroe and Ernie Gremillion at

halfbacks and Phil Peltier at fullback.

# Fatima Cruises To 39-6 Victory Over Teurlings

Fatima's Warriors vaulted into contention for the District 5-B title and set up a Thursday night showdown with Hanson of Franklin by crushing cross-town rival Father Teurlings by a 39-6 margin Friday night.

# Teurlings Looks For First Victory Over 5-A Cecilia

The Teurlings Rebels take the field at Clark Field tomorrow night in hopes of snapping their three-game losing streak with a victory over Class A Cecilia.

Cecilia has also suffered three straight losses, all come at the hands of non-district foes, while two of Teurlings' defeats have been against District 5-B opponents.

The Rebels have managed a meager 182 yards rushing against three foes, but with Solis at the helm they have accounted for a respectable 267 via the air on 21 of 75 attempts. If Solis can start connecting with his favorite target Rick McDowell the Rebels could make things mighty hot for the bigger Bulldogs.

Defensively Cecilia has been tougher than Teurlings. The Bulldogs have allowed 686 yards total offense and 74 points, while the Rebels have been hit for 1,081 yards and 81 points.

## Cecilia Tough Opponent

Coach Paul Broussard rates Cecilia as a better team than they show. In commenting on last week's play against Fatima he stated, "Our boys didn't hit and weren't aggressive. The only bright spot was the pass offense, which did pretty good considering the caliber of a player like Steve Sere."

In the line Broussard will start McDowell and Terry Landry at end, Fred Indest and Gus Nelson at tackle, Jim Womack and Phil Peltier at guard and Robert LeJeune at

center. In the backfield with Solis and Babineaux are halfbacks Mike Munroe and Erny Gremilion. The Rebels' line will average about 160 and the backfield about 155, while Cecilia will average about 175 on the line and 160 in the backfield.

Cecilia will probably start Dudley Duplichien and Allen Calais at end, Howard Taylor and Ricky Bijoux at tackle, Mike Broussard and James Guidry at guard, and Carroll Bergeron at center. # Central Catholic Rips Rebels; Solis Sparkles

The passing of quarterback Larry Solis wasn't quite enough to keep up with the power-packed backfield of Morgan City's Central Catholic Eagles, as the Father Teurlings Rebels suffered their fourth defeat of the season by a score of 41-25.

Solis connected on 12 of 17 tosses, for 188 yards and two touchdowns and ran for two more tallies to pace the home-standing Rebels, but Catholic's Robert Breaux, a 165-pound senior speedster ran at will through the leaky Teurlings' defense to oust Solis as the night's offensive standout.

Breaux carried the ball 7 times for 186 yards, scoring four touchdowns and two extra points, before leaving the ball game after being shaken up midway in the third quarter.

## Scored Four Times

The Catholic High speedster scored on jaunts of 54, 30, 8 and 4 yards, and ran for two extra points as the Rebel defenders found no one to keep up with him.

Breaux opened the scoring for Central Catholic with barely three minutes gone on the clock as the Eagles took the

opening kickoff and marched 56 yards in seven plays to strike paydirt. Breaux carried the ball six of the seven times, climaxing the drive by sweeping right end and racing from the Rebel 30 yard line into the end zone without a hand being laid on him. He then bucked over right tackle for the extra point, to give Catholic a 7-0 lead.

Teurlings didn't let the speedster scare them, however, taking the ensuing kickoff and grinding out 74 hard yards to the end zone to pull within a point of the visitors, 7-6. The attempted run for the PAT failed, however, and Teurlings was never to come as close again.

## Pass Interference

A 15-yard penalty for pass interference set up the second Catholic score as Breaux and fullback Louis Arnette moved

the ball downfield after the Teurlings kick. With the ball on the Teurlings 48 yard line, Central quarterback Greg Aucoin threw deep to end Richard Romaire, who was engaged in a bumping match with two Teurlings defenders. The pass was incomplete, but the officials ruled pass interference, and gave the Eagles a first and ten on the Rebel 32.

From there Breaux carried the ball to the 14, where his fumble was recovered by teammate Paul Michel, and two plays later the shifty halfback slipped off right tackle from 8 yards out for the second Catholic score. Breaux ran his second extra point of the evening, and the score became 14-6, as the first quarter drew to a close.

Catholic wasted no time in getting the second quarter off to a start, however. Teurlings

could not move the ball after the second Catholic kick-off of the evening, and was forced to punt. Jerry Johnson's punt from his own 27 carried to the Eagle 46 yard line, and from there, on the first play from scrimmage, Breaux slipped through the Rebel line and outraced the secondary 54 yards to the goal line. ## Recovered Fumble

A plunge through the line by Arnette failed to get the extra point, however, and the scoreboard showed the visitors lead by 27-6.

After an exchange of punts, Teurlings got its offense into gear again, marching 67 yards for their second score of the evening. The Rebels moved from their own 40-yard line, with the aid of a Solis-to-Rick McDowell pass for 26 yards, to get back into the ball game. # Teurlings Takes 19-18 Win From Loreauville

Sparked by the spectacular performance of sophomore quarterback Larry Solis, Teurlings successfully celebrated its homecoming with a beautiful come-from-behind 19-18 victory over Loreauville at Clark Field Friday night.

Three times Loreauville stormed to a six-point lead and three times Teurlings fought back to knot the score, with the winning margin being an extra point boot by David Thibodeaux in the third quarter.

Solis, playing the best game of his young career, put on a fabulous aerial circus that accounted for 161 yards on 12 of 20 pass completions. He also kept Loreauville off balance with perfect roll outs bootlegs and accounted for 54 of his teams 178 yards rushing, plus scoring the game winning touchdown.

## Many Standouts

Fullback Joey Babineaux, and halfbacks Jerry Johnson and Ernest Gremillion also aided the Rebel cause, with Babineaux and Johnson each scoring a touchdown and Gremillion picking up valuable third down yardage.

Teurlings found itself facing a quick six-point deficit with barely three minutes gone in

the first quarter, when Loreauville halfback Baron Bayard blasted through a gaping hole in the Rebels' secondary and rambled 52-yards to pay dirt. The drive had started on the Tigers' 35 yard line and covered only five plays.

The game was strictly an offensive effort on both team's part, as each sustained numerous drives and accounted for almost identical rushing yardage. Loreauville had a slight edge of 198 to 154, but lost considerable ground in the passing department as quarterback Glen LeBlanc managed only 1 of 4 attempts for 12 yards as compared to Solis' 161.

## Rebels Stymied

The Rebels took the kickoff from Bayard and marched slowly towards an apparent touchdown, but found themselves bogged down on the Tigers' 22 yard line after picking up three straight first downs. Solis missed on two straight passes and Loreauville regained possession.

This time, however, Teurlings managed to hold the Tigers and took over again at the 44 when Bayard's punt, the only one of the night, traveled only 21 yards. This time they drove all the way to the 10 yard line with Solis connecting on passes of nine and seven yards to end Rick McDowell and Babineaux picking up huge chunks of

real estate down the middle. A three-yard loss by Babineaux and two incomplete Solis aeri- als killed the drive, however, and Loreauville again took possession.

Loreauville began moving steadily down field once again, but fell victim to the only mistake of the game, when LeBlanc fumbled at the 48 yard line. Teurlings recovered and took advantage of the situation by scoring 13 plays later on a two-yard blast by Johnson.

The big play of the drive was a third down completion by Solis to McDowell that went for 34 yards at the 21 yard line. The Rebels kept to the ground after that and knotted the score six plays later with 3:39 remaining in the half.

## Tigers Score Again

Loreauville fought right back, however, and took Johnson's kickoff at their 41 and marched to another six-pointer in 12 plays. Bayard and fullback Kerry Neville moved the Tigers to the 19 yard line and two plays later LeBlanc found Brad St. Marie open in the end zone and connected for the go ahead touchdown, with only 25 seconds remaining in the half.

Teurlings tried desperately to knot the score once again when Solis completed another aerial to McDowell who hauled it in at the 28 yard line. With no

time showing on the clock. Solis tried a last ditch pass but found his receivers all covered the field and scampered all the way to the 10 yard line before being stopped.

The Rebels were really fired up after that and took the second half kickoff 67 yards to paydirt, with Solis hitting 8 of 11 passes and Babineaux picking up the short yardage up the middle. Rebels picked up five straight first downs enroute to the TD, and the big one came on a five-yard keeper play by Solis that put the Rebels at the five yard line. Two plays later Babineaux rambled over from the three and David Thibodeaux added the PAT to give Teurlings a 13-12 lead with about four minutes left in the quarter.

## Use Ground Power

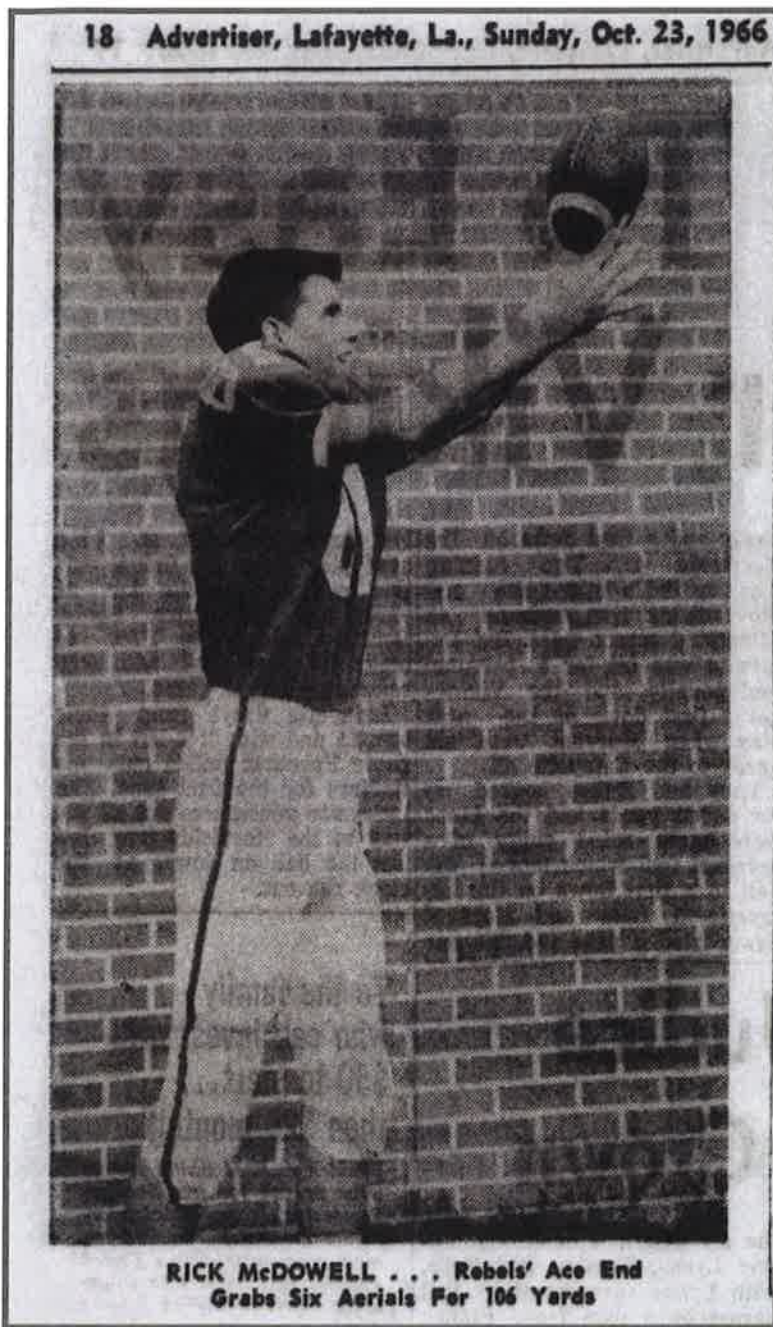

## Philippine Boxing Official Says WBA Was Too Hasty

MANILA (AP) — A Philippine boxing official implied today the World Boxing Council was hasty in declaring Carlos Ortiz' lightweight title vacant.

Justiniano Montano Jr., chairman of the Games and Amusements Board, expressed doubt the WBC could have in so short a time consulted, much less polled, other directors before announcing the decision in Mexico City, headquarters of the WBC.

"Such an important decision should be taken only after all concerned have submitted their opinions and votes," Montano told The Associated Press.

Montano, a former vice chairman of the Council, said, "I believe I still am a member of the Council," but until now he has not received word from Mexico City on the controversial fight between Ortiz and Uliminio (Sugar) Ramos Saturday night and the subsequent vacating of the championship.

He said there should be a

thorough investigation of the circumstances surrounding the fight and appealed to the WBC to "slow down" in making decisions.

Meanwhile, would lightweight champion Gabriel (Flash) Elorde ignored the controversy and started light workouts for a scheduled 15-round fight with Ortiz for the latter's now-questioned crown at Madison Square Garden in New York Nov. 28.

Elorde successfully defended his own title here against Vicente Derado of Argentina only last Saturday. But the bout with Ortiz was arranged even before this match and that of Ortiz against Ramos.

Lope Sarreal, Elorde's father-in-law and adviser, said Elorde has signed and mailed the contract to the Garden.

"I talked to Ted Brenner by overseas telephone last Tuesday night and I am leaving the matter up to him," Sarreal said. Brenner is the Garden's boxing promoter.

## Solis, McDowell Shine

Once again the fabulous passing arm of quarterback Larry Solis and the pass-catching an-

tics of end Rick McDowell sparked the Rebels' offense.

Teurlings jumped to a quick six-point lead in the first quarter when Solis hit McDowell across the double-stripe from 15-yards out. Mt. Carmel quickly knotted the score, however, when Eddie Magerson scored the first of his three touchdowns from the one-yard line.

The Rebels jumped back in front on the ensuing kickoff when Ernest Gremillion hauled in the boot at the 30-yard line and rambled all the way to pay dirt on a 70-yard jaunt. Dale Thibodeaux then booted the PAT to give the Rebels a 13-6 advantage.

## Increase Margin

In the second quarter the Rebels increased their lead to 20-6 on another Solis pass, this time to Jerry Johnson that went for 25 yards. Thibodeaux again booted the point after.

Solis, who appears slanted for All-District honors along with his able aerial partner McDowell, kept the Eagles off balance all night with a barrage of bombs and finished with 18 of 36 for 170 yards. McDowell was again the big receiver, hauling in 12 for 60 yards and touchdown.

Teurlings appeared headed for sure victory going into the second half, but ran into a rash of bad luck and Mt. Carmel capitalized on two key mistakes to take home the victory.

## Snarcs Solis Pass

The Eagles picked off a Solis aerial early in the period and a few plays later Antony Fontana pushed over from the one to give Mt. Carmel a 20-20 deadlock with Teurlings. Quarterback Johnny Donahue had closed the gap to seven points just before the end of the first half on a two-yard run.

After the kickoff the Rebels once again charged down field in pursuit of still another touchdown and the lead once again. However, fate was against them and Mt. Carmel snared another stray Solis pass and took the lead when Magerson blasted over from the three.

Their margin was increased to 33-20 late in the period when Magerson scored for the third time on a five-yard run up the middle.

# Fatima Lands Cobb, Daly, Gardes On 5-B All-Star Unit

Fatima of Lafayette and Hanson of Franklin, the two teams that dominated District 5-B during the season, each landed three spots on the all-district team released by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association today.

Hanson walked off with two of the big honors as tackle Mike Bordelon was named the outstanding lineman and halfback Keith LeBlanc was selected as the outstanding back.

District champion Fatima took the other honor when its coach Phil Stoma was tabbed for doing the best coaching job in the district.

There was little doubt about the outstanding back balloting as LeBlanc drew 35 of a possible 40 points and seemed to stand head and shoulders above the field. LeBlanc rolled up over 1,300 yards this season and is one of the most sought-after running backs in the state by college coaches.

The voting for the lineman was a real battle with Bordelon winning out over teammate Keith Landen and Mt. Carmel's James Landry. Bordelon polled 33 points which was the highest number of points any lineman rolled up.

Stoma has had fantastic success at Fatima as the Warriors' head man has won 35, lost only 11 and tied 3. The worst record that a Fatima team has ever had under Stoma was a 5-3 mark when the Warriors first ventured into varsity competition.

Stoma's team won the title despite crippling injuries to quarterback Steve Sere and end Steve Gardes which ruined Fatima's chances in the Class B state playoffs.

The most hotly-contested position on the team was quarterback. Fatima's Sere missed the last four games of the season after his ankle was fractured in the Judice game and he lost out in the balloting to Mt. Carmel's John Donahue.

Donahue hit 108 of 196 passes for 1,123 yards and seven touchdowns and had a total offense of 1,619 yards. Sere completed 60 of 101 passes for 803 yards and 11 touchdowns in six games and probably would have repeated if he had been able to complete the season.

Fatima's Bill Cobb who rushed for 900 yards and was a standout performer at linebacker for the Warriors was selected as fullback and Central Catholic's Robert Breaux who rushed for 1,338 yards and scored 73 points despite missing two games was picked the other halfback.

Landry and Fatima's Steve Gardes were named the ends of the star team. Gardes caught

23 passes for 334 yards in five games before being injured against Mt. Carmel and seeing only spot duty after that. Landry was a vicious defensive player and even doubled in the backfield when the Eagles were hurt by injuries.

Fatima's big tackle Phil Daly, Teurlings' fine guard Dale Thibodeaux and Central Catholic's excellent center Joey Streve round out the first unit.

Daly was the big man for

the Warriors as Cobb gained most of his yardage over Daly's side of the line and the big tackle was one of the strong points in the rock-ribbed Fatima defense.

Thibodeaux played at only half-speed for Teurlings most of the year but he did such an outstanding job when he was in the lineup that there was no way the hard-nosed youth could have been omitted from the team.

The second team had Rick McDowell of Teurlings and Malcolm Dugas of Loreauville ends, Frank DeGrauw of Mt. Carmel and Gus Nelson of Teurlings at tackles, Ronnie Abshire of Mt. Carmel at guards and Don Trahan of Mt. Carmel at center.
