Things were pretty much leveled on the road.

true to form at the 16th Annual Kiwanis Football Jamboree here last night as the Lafayette Lions edged the Breaux Bridge Tigers 8-0, Northside High topped Father Teurlings Central 14-0, and Cathedral's Tigers slipped past the Fatima Warriors 14-0.

Dennis Wright, a 180-pound halfback, took a ten-yard pass from Lion quarterback David Luquette for the only Lafayette tally, as Luquette went three — for six in the air for a total gain of 28 yards.

The Lions mounted another 100 yards on the ground while holding Breaux Bridge to 48 yards rushing.

Foreman Pleased

Lions coach Frank Foreman said he was pleased with both the offensive and defensive efforts of his club, saying the defense allowed the bulk of the Breaux Bridge yardage in the latter parts of the ball game while playing a loose preventive defense.

His offensive unit, he said, looked better than he thought it would for this stage of the season.

The Lions now go back to the scrimmage field to prepare for the regular season opener at home next weekend against St. Aloysius of New Orleans. Breaux Bridge next meets Ab-

Tigers Finally Win

The Cathedral Tigers were finally able to beat Coach Phil Stoma's Warriors, the two teams playing to a tie for the last two jamboree dates.

Stoma's team took the opening kickoff and gained most of their rushing yardage for the night on the first two plays from scrimmage, running a draw play against a pass-oriented Cathedral defense and coming back with a screen pass.

After that, however, it was all over for the Warriors as Robert Avery set up the first Tiger score with an interception with less than two minutes left in the first half, returning the ball to the five yard line. Halfback John Chappuis carried the ball in from one yard out with time running out.

Mielke Intercepted

End Chuck Mielke intercepted another wayward Warrior aerial in the mid-portion of the second half, returning it 26 yards for the second Tiger score, with Steve Denny booting the extra point.

Denny then hauled in a pass on the Warrior five yard line and scampered into paydirt to close out the Tiger scoring. Denny kicked the two Tiger extra points. Tom Logan was

the Cathedral leading rusher with 46 yards.

Kenneth Leger and Mike Morvant stepped into paydirt for the Northside Vikings as they completely dominated Father Teurlings Central in the third event of the evening in McNaspy Stadium.

Leger scored on a 6-yard charge through the Teurlings line with only 18 seconds remaining in the first half and Morvant took the ball across the goal with four minutes remaining in the contest for 15 yards out.

Morvant led the Vikings of-

66 yards rushing for the night. The Northside defenses held Teurlings to a 9 yard total offense, with 12 yards on the ground and -3 in the air. Joey Babineaux was probably the standout performer for Teurlings, recovering a fumble and performing well on offense.

Arceneaux Sparks Scott 11 To 27-0 Trouncing Of Rebs

Speedy sophomore Steve Arceneaux picked the Teurlings Rebel defense to bits as he paced the District 5-A Scott Eagles to a 27-0 trouncing of the Lafayette school here last night.

The lightweight halfback scored twice on scampers of 79 and 21 yards and set up a third tally with a dash to the Rebel five yard line.

The Eagles shown equally as bright on defense, recovering several fumbles and blocking a Rebel punt to set up other scoring opportunities.

Only One Drive

Teurlings was able to generate only one sustained offensive drive, this with the opening kickoff, clipping off five first downs enroute to the Eagle 13 yard line. The effort bogged down there, however, and the Johnny Rebs were forced to hand over the ball after a Larry Solis aerial went incomplete on fourth down.

The Eagles then went to the offensive and, after showing little the first two plays, speedster Arceneaux skipped and dodged

through Rebel defenders for 79 yards and the first score of the evening.

Teurlings was unable to move the ball after taking the ensuing kickoff, and Rebel kicker Gus Nelson saw his first punt attempt blocked at the Rebel 43, where it was recovered by the Eagles.

Meche Hits Fox

Scott quarterback David Meche then took to the air route, connecting with wingback Charlie Fox on the 27, coming back the next play to hit him again on the 11. Arceneaux then cracked to the nine, and two plays later Meche hit Fox on the three yard line from where he stepped untouched into the end zone.

Rebel quarterback Larry Solis fumbled away the next Teurlings offensive effort when he was hit while setting up for a pass, with Fox scrambling over the football on the Teurlings 32.

Fullback Kenneth Begnaud slammed to the 27, Arceneaux slipped to the 24 and Meche banged through right tackle for

six more before the Eagles sprang Arceneaux loose, allowing him to turn the left corner and speed to the five yard line, where he was knocked out of bounds.

Throws For Score

Rebel defender Larry Solis trapped Arceneaux in the backfield on the next play, dropping him on the nine. Meche then hit inside to the dive, then dropped back and pitched to end Allen Campbell alone on a criss cross pattern.

A bad snap from center sent punter Gus Nelson chasing the ball back to the 20 after the next series of Teurlings attempts, and after a personal foul penalty, the Eagles took over on the 34.

Scott was unable to move the ball, punted to Teurlings, and the Rebels three plays later booted the ball back.

Scored Final TD

Arceneaux took Nelson's kick on the 47, returned it to the 21, from where, on the next play, he

broke three tackles and slipped through the Rebel defenses for the final Scott tally.

Solis stopped a Scott threat late in the fourth quarter, intercepting a Meche pass in the end zone and returning it to the three, but the Rebels couldn't generate any offense with Solis pitching from his end zone. A short punt by Nelson gave Scott the ball on the 28 with 4:25 left to play.

The Eagle reserves were unable to capitalize on the field position, however, and returned the ball to Teurlings after four offensive plays.

Teurlings Central

Paul Broussard opens his second year at Father Teurlings Central and with 13 returning lettermen — five of them regulars — it appears that things might be looking up for Teurlings' football in 1967 as the Rebels attempt to improve on last season's 3-5-2 standard.

Broussard has plenty of reason to be a little optimistic when he looks over things for this season.

One of the main reasons is quarterback Larry Solis, a 5-10, 165-pound quarterback, who has already picked up three letters and figures to be one of the top field generals in the Lafayette area. Solis is a fine passer and also is a threat to run the football and he will be the key man in the Teurlings offense this season.

Other Lettermen

Other lettermen returning are tackles Gus Nelson (200), Bobby LeJeune (190), and Freddie Indest (235), end Terry Landry (170) and backs Mike Munro (170), Joey Babineaux (175), Paul Guy (165) and Tommy Proctor (155).

LeJeune was a starter at left guard last season as was Nelson at right tackle and Landry at right end. Solis returns at quarterback and Babineaux reclaims his fullback spot to give the Rebels five offensive starters back in action from last season.

Teurlings dropped three straight games, 26-6 to Scott, 16-0 to Hanson of Franklin and

39-6 to Fatima before they got started. The Rebels played Cecilia to a 6-3 deadlock and then played a bang-up offensive game against Central Catholic only to lose 41-25.

Won Three Straight

The Rebels then started on a three-game winning streak as they whipped Jeanerette 25-6, Loreauville 19-18, Mamou 20-13. They played a 7-7 deadlock with Delcambre and then in the final game of the season lost to a strong Mt. Carmel of Abbeville team by a 33-20 count.

The Rebs have home games against Scott on Sept. 8, Fatima on Sept. 22, Jeanerette on Oct. 13, Delcambre on Nov. 2 and Vermilion Central on Nov. 9. They tackle Hanson on Sept. 15, Cecilia on Sept. 29, Central Catholic on Oct. 6, Loreauville on Oct. 19 and Mamou on Oct. 27 on the road.

Teurlings figures to try and balance off its attack more this season as last year the Rebels went to the air a great deal with Solis but did not have the ground attack to keep the defense honest.

One-Man Offense

Solis was a one-man gang for the Rebels in the Central Catholic game as he hit 12 of 17 passes for 158 yards. He connected on a 20-yard pass and a 10-yarder for touchdowns and scored two-one of a three-yard run and another when he went 30 yards with a recovered fumble.

He came back with a good game against Jeanerette the

following week as he hit 11 of 13 through the air for 164 yards. The fewest number of passes that Solis threw during the season was 13 and that was against Delcambre and the Rebel ground attack picked up 124 yards.

Broussard will probably go with James Gautreaux (170) and Landry (170) at the ends, Indest (235) and Nelson (200) at tackles. LeJeune (190) and Rex Angelle (175) at guards and Tom Periou (170) at center.

Solis will handle the quarterbacking with Mike Munro at the tailback spot and the 5-9, 170-pound senior could be one of the better running backs in the area. Babineaux figures to have his finest season and the Rebels will be looking to the powerful 180-pounder for lots of tough yardage. Either Paul Guy or Tom Proctor will be at the other halfback position.

Broussard is assisted by Charles Bonvillian in coaching the Rebels. Broussard sees a wild scramble for the District 5-B title and picks defending champion Fatima as the team to beat with Hanson of Franklin, Vermilion Catholic and Central Catholic of Morgan City all having a good shot along with his Teurlings team.

Things are definitely looking up for Teurlings and the Rebels are almost a cinch to improve on last year's record of 3-5-2 and with a little luck could compete for the district crown.

Hanson Is Heavy Favorite To Capture Crown In 5-B

Hanson of Franklin missed the championship of District 5-B by only one game in 1966 and the league's coaches feel that the Tigers will make up for that this season and walk away with the league title.

Although the Franklin team pulled down only three of the eight first place votes they still had a wide margin over Central Catholic of Morgan City which wound up in second place and Vermilion Catholic of Abbeville and defending champion Fatima of Lafayette which deadlocked for third.

Hanson racked up a total of 56 points, Central Catholic pulled 40 and Fatima and Vermilion Catholic tied for third with 36 points each. Vermilion Catholic drew two first place votes and Central Catholic and Fatima each garnered one.

Rebs Strong Fifth

Teurlings finished a strong fifth in the voting with 30 points. Delcambre was sixth with 10. Loreauville seventh with 2 and Jeanerette did not draw a vote under the system where you award points of a 10-8-6-4-2 basis.

Hanson has but six lettermen back but have all-district guard Lynn Landen, Angelo Tamrortolo, Chuck Saichuck, Harry Thibodeaux and Keith Landen to form a good nucleus. Defense should be the strong point for the Tigers.

Central Catholic counts five of its six starting linemen back and quarterback Greg Aucoin which means trouble for most Eagle foes. Coach Andrew Robichaux also counts seven lettermen to fill out what should

be a top-notch Catholic eleven.

Vermilion Catholic on paper looks to be the strongest team in the loop with six regulars back — led by quarterback Anthony Fontana and tackles Frank Degrauw and Ricky Melebeck. Coach Vince Listi has six lettermen to round out the team and he figures to be two deep at every spot.

Fatima was hit hard by gra-

duation as the Warriors lost the likes of Steve Sere, Bill Cobb, Phil Daly, Bobby Lavin and Steve Gardes and don't figure to replace them. But Phil Stoma can count seven players who started either offensively or defensively to mold with and also has four additional lettermen so the Warriors don't figure to be push-overs for anyone.

Ville Platte's Sacred Heart Has Another Strong Football Squad

The name of the game is knock — and that's exactly what's happening as Sacred Heart of Ville Platte busily prepares for its regular season opener on September 8 with A.I.C. in Opelousas.

With 17 seniors returning from last year's Championship squad, the word on the 1967 Trojans is size, depth and experience. The 45 member ballclub is the largest in the school's history with a line averaging 195 lbs. on defense and 187 lbs. on offense, and Trojan supporters are optimistic, to say the least. However, the game of football is played on the football field and not by the fans.

Therefore whether the defending champs will pose as a real threat to pick up their 3rd consecutive District 4-B title will depend on the squad's ability to combine attitude, desire and teamwork

with their physical potentials. Coach Bob Soileau recently said: "In some years past our teams consisted of a lot of big hearts in small bodies. We compete in a very strong district but we could be tough again this year if our boys still have those big hearts — because now we have the big bodies to go with them. The one thing we cannot afford, however, is big heads."

Pro-Type Offense

This year Sacred Heart will attack with a pro-type offense. Among the bright offensive prospects is quarterback Gary Inhern, a 6'0", 175 lb. senior. Inhern displayed a great deal of promise in guiding the Trojans to a 10-2-0 season last year, and should be a real threat this season. Seniors Bruce Soileau and Tony Ortego will be Inhern's main targets at the terminal positions.

Also in league contests, Central Catholic of Morgan City will meet Loreauville and Catholic of Abbeville will invade Jeanerette.

The Class A Scott Eagles were able to capitalize on Teurlings miscues last outing, while Larry Solis, Joey Babiniaux and crew had trouble mounting an offensive effort after the opening stages of the ball game.

Teurlings took the opening kickoff and showed their potential, marching to the Eagle 13 before running out of downs, but a blocked punt, an interception and a couple of lost fumbles stalled the Rebel

offense after that.

Coach Broussard has been working with the Rebel defenses and polishing the potentially explosive Rebel offense and looks for a better performance against League competition.

Hanson, rated the cream of the District 5-B crop in preseason polls, had tough sledding against Delcambre last week, but managed to pull out an 8-0 victory, despite falling far short on the statistical yardstick.

Had Statistics Edge

Delcambre had a wide edge in all of the statistics, but couldn't crack the Hanson goal-line defenses.

Central Catholic of Morgan City, 6-0 victors over St. Joseph of Chauvin, showed more potential than the scoreboard indicates and should have easy going with Loreauville in another district game.

Loreauville will take it on the chin for the second week

in a row, bowing to Cecilia 20-0 last week.

Should Have Romp

Vermilion Catholic, nobody's pushover, should be able to score at will over an undermanned Jeanerette eleven and

should find an opportunity to play plenty of reserves.

Catholic was busy running roughshod over Erath 38-6 last week while Jeanerette traveled to Lafayette to take a 38-0 blistering at the hands of Fatima.

Rebels Stage Comeback, Stun Top-Rated Hanson

FRANKLIN — A determined band of Teurlings Rebels put 13 points on the scoreboard in the last quarter to come from behind and knock off the highly-regarded Hanson Memorial Tigers 20-19 in a District 5-B prep football contest here Friday night.

Hanson, the preseason choice to take District 5-B honors, trailed 7-6 at the halftime intermission, but scored twice within two minutes in the third period to take a 19-7 advantage into the final stanza.

The Rebels of Coach Paul Broussard came roaring back in the fourth quarter, however, scoring on a "very lone-some end" play and a six-yard plunge by fullback Joey Babineaux to take the victory.

Rebs Score First
Teurlings scored first, with Larry Solis slipping over from one yard out with 3:06 left in the initial quarter. The Rebels

found themselves in good field position after a Gus Nelson punt was downed by Solis on the Tiger one-yard line and Hanson punted after only one attempt at running the ball.

The Rebels took possession on their own 30, moved to the 15 via a Hanson penalty. Babineaux bucked inside to the five, and from there Solis moved it across in two quarterback keeper plays through

Hanson took over at that point and moved to the Teurlings 16 yard line, but there the Rebel defenses stiffened to

the middle. Babineaux rammed across for the extra point to make the score 7-0.

Hanson's Rene Rodriguez, after Solis fumbled a booming Harry Thibodeaux punt, scooped up the loose ball and raced into the end zone after the next series of plays, but the officials ruled the ball dead at the Teurlings 25 yard line.

regain the ball on downs. Hanson again regained the ball in the second quarter, intercepting a Solis aerial, but was unable to take advantage of the opportunity.

Their score came with 4:15 left in the first half on a four yard pass from quarterback Sep Musso to left end Harry Thibodeaux. The Tigers had gained possession of the ball when linebacker Chuck Satchuck intercepted the second wayward Solis toss of the night at the Teurlings 30 yard stripe. The Tigers pushed the ball across the goal in four plays from that point. An attempted end sweep by Musso for the PAT proved unsuccessful to leave the Rebels on top 7-6.

After the intermission, Hanson took the opening kickoff and marched 44 yards for their second goal of the night, with fullback Lorrie Olivier carrying the mail across from one yard out. A Musso pass for the extra point went incomplete, but the Bengals moved to a 12-7 advantage.

Lead Now 19-7
Less than two minutes lat-

er, they upped the advantage to 19-7 after Wynn Breaux intercepted another Solis pass, returning it to the 44 Rebel yard line. Three plays later Musso threw a 33-yard scoring bomb to end Rodriguez for the final Hanson tally. Halfback Kent Lassare squirmed across for the PAT.

Shortly after the beginning of the fourth quarter, end Ken Menard, remained on the Teurlings sideline, away from the Rebel huddle, and managed to sneak downfield undetected. Solis dropped the ball into his unguarded arms and he trotted 23 yards into the end zone to bring the Lafayette team back to within striking distance.

The Teurlings defenses stiffened to hold Hanson on the next series of downs, regaining possession of the ball 35 yards from paydirt with 6:27 left in the ball game.

Rebs Gain First
Babineaux slammed through the Tiger wall for a first down at the Teurlings 45. Tommy Guidry slipped off tackle for three more, and Solis sneaked to the 29 and a first down with 5:10 remaining.

Again Babineaux picked up valuable yardage to the 25. Solis rolled around end for a five yard gain, before Hanson defenders threw him back for no gain on a third-and-one situation.

Solis then, on fourth down, rolled to the left side, was sprung loose by a beautiful block by split end Terry Landry, and rambled to the Tiger 11-yard-line with slightly less than four minutes to play.

Near Goal Line
Babineaux dug for three yards, and Solis came back to gain a first-and-goal on the Hanson one.

A five yard penalty put Teurlings back to the six, but Babineaux bulldozed his way across from that distance to knot the score at 19-all. Babineaux again got the choice for the PAT, slammed across tackle, and the Rebels had their slender margin of victory.

A desperation aerial attack by Hanson came to a screeching halt with 1:43 left in the game when Landry intercepted a Musso pass on his own 35-yard line, and from that point the Rebels watched the clock go 'round.

Teurlings, Fatima To Clash In Important 5-B Encounter

Teurlings-Central will host arch-rival Fatima Friday night in a game that will decide which team remains in the running for the District 5-B championship.

Game time is set for 7:30 in Clark Field.

Teurlings, the team picked to be the darkhorse in the 5-B chase, is suddenly thrust into one of the favorites' roles after beating Hanson of Franklin on the Tigers' home field 20-19 last week.

Rebels Too Much

Hanson had been picked to win the district by the league's coaches but the Teurlings combination of quarterback Larry Solis and fullback Joey Babineaux proved to be too much for the Tigers.

Solis hit 7 of 18 passes for 108 yards and one touchdown and Babineaux scored the clinching touchdown from the two-yard line in the fourth period. Babineaux also sparked the Rebel offense that ground out 180 yards and racked up a total of 18 first downs.

Fatima, the defending district champions, finds itself in a role it hasn't experienced in several years as the Warriors have to be regarded as underdogs to the Teurlings eleven. Fatima whipped Jeanerette

38-0 and was ranked second in the state in the Class B ratings last week but the Warriors weren't too impressive in their 7-0 shutout of Delcambre last week.

Teurlings will go with Steve Brazda and Terry Landry at ends, Bob LeJeune and Gus Nelson at tackles, Mike Boudreaux and Rex Angelle at guards and Tom Periou at center. Solis will handle the quarterbacking duties with Babineaux at fullback, Tom Guidry at tailback and Ken Menard at wingback.

Fatima coach Phil Stoma got definite word this week that he will be without the services of tailback James Neiser for the season and although the Warriors have managed to win two games Stoma was counting on Neiser for the important district games.

Offensive Lineup

The Fatima Warriors and Teurlings Rebels have their work cut out for them this week as both play big District 5-B contests Thursday.

Coach Phil Stoma's Fatima Warriors, the defending district champs, face the roughest task as they must tangle with the Vermilion Catholic Eagles of Abbeville, currently the No. 1 Class B team in the state in a 7:30 tilt at Clark Field.

Teurlings, the only other team in District 5-B without a loss besides Vermilion, has to hit the road against a dangerous Central Catholic of Morgan City that would love to ruin the title hopes of the Rebels.

Tight Contests

No one has to remind area football fans about the Fatima-Vermilion battles. Last year

the two battled to a 7-7 stand-off in Abbeville, in 1965 it was 6-0 Fatima's favor and in 1964 it was 7-6 with Mt. Carmel on top.

Normally you can toss out the record book when the two teams play but this year it figures that Vermilion may have too much football power for desire on Fatima's part to make up the difference.

Stoma calls Vermilion the best team in the district in many years and says he feels that the Eagles have the material to win the state title in B. The Fatima coach says the Eagles are even better than his district championship team of last season which advanced to the quarterfinals of the Class B playoffs.

Eagles Impressive

To say Vermilion has been

impressive this season is almost an understatement as the Eagles have pounded Erath 38-6, Jeanerette 60-7 and shut out Hanson 20-0 and Loreauville 21-0. This means the Eagles have scored 139 points and given up only 13 in four games.

The Eagles have given up an average of only 36 yards total offense to their opponents. Last week against Loreauville the Eagles allowed the Tigers only 28 yards the entire game.

Vermilion's attack is awesome with Anthony Fontana at quarterback, James Meaux at fullback and James Bourgeois and Jesse Vollmer at the halfbacks. Fontana is a fine passer and runner and the sophomore Meaux has been sensational to date.

Has Veteran Line

The veteran line has Eddie Young and Roger LeBlanc at the ends, Frank DeGrauw and Ricky Melebeck at tackles, Jimmy Richard and John DeGrauw at guards and Jerry Brasseaux at center.

Stoma will be trying to get the Fatima offense cranked up enough to play ball control and try and keep the ball away from the powerful Vermilion offense. The Warriors had 192 yards total offense last week against Hanson and was inside the Ti-

gers' 10-yard line three times but didn't score. The week before against Teurlings the Warriors outgained the Rebels 349-223 but came out on the short end of a 20-12 score.

It figures that the Warriors will do a lot of throwing as they will be outmanned in the line. Quarterback Bobby Bernard will handle the serial duties and his main targets will probably be Howard and Clay Judice and Douglas Dutt.

MORGAN CITY — The Father Teurlings Rebels fumbled themselves to a short-lived 6-0 lead late in the third quarter, but the Central Catholic Eagles came right back and fumbled themselves to a vital extra point, to take a 7-6 District 5-B win here last night.

The scoring came after Central Catholic dominated the first half of play and then took the opening kickoff of the second half and marched 65 yards to the Rebel three before Coach Paul Broussard's Grey Raiders held for four downs inside the five.

Teurlings took over the ball on their own three midway in

the third quarter, gave to Mike Munro for 24 yards in three attempts, then sprang quarterback Larry Solis loose for 50 yards when he could not find any pass receivers.

Rebels On Move

end for the first tally of the night. The flow of action was through the middle and Solis had only to shake off one man to move into paydirt standing up.

Only 15 seconds remained in the third quarter as Mike Munro was thrown back in his attempt to run for the PAT.

Central Marches In

Central Catholic took the ensuing kickoff on their own 37, gave to Merlie Fusilier for 3, and then, aided by a 15-yard personal foul penalty, marched into the end zone in 12 plays.

Quarterback Greg Aucoin,

running from a tailback slot, slammed through the Rebel line from the one-foot line for the score. Fullback Bernard Levy made the attempt at running the PAT, fumbled the ball across the goal line, and Catholic center Joe Streva pounced on it for the winning point.

The touchdown drive was kept alive by a fourth-and-seven pass from reserve quarterback Mike Baker to left end Larry Barker, which moved the ball from the Teurlings 40 to the 17.

Aucoin Missed

Aucoin took two plays to give the Eagles a first-and-goal on the seven, and then took three more attempts to get it across into paydirt.

Teurlings had two more chances with the ball after the Eagle score, but could not capitalize on either of them.

Final Drive Misses

They regained possession on their own 31 with :50 seconds left on the clock, and moved to the Central 15-yard line but Solis was hit in the backfield trying to pass by Central's Dalton Gautreaux and time ran out before the Rebels could get off another play.

The defeat was a costly one for Teurlings as it left Vermilion on top in the district standings with a 4-0 mark. Teurlings dropped into a tie with Loreauville with a 2-1 mark.

On the next play Solis tossed a long bomb good for fifty-five yards to Terry Landry who moved an additional forty-five yards for another score. This time the Solis to Menard combination worked and the score stood 13-0.

On the fourth play after the kick-off Sonnier dropped a fumble and Earl Tanner covered it for the Rebels. On the second down play Solis tossed another pass good for fifteen yards to Steve Brazda who stepped over for the score. This time Solis handed off to Joey Babineaux who couldn't score the extra point and the score stood 19-0.

About four plays later the quarter ended with the Tigers booting another punt to Teurlings. After two plays the Rebels lost the ball on a pass interception but the Tigers held it

for only four plays and a Sonnier fumble was picked up by Gus Nelson who ran thirty yards for the touchdown. Solis handed the ball to John Pierret who clattered over for the extra point and the score was 26-0.

For the rest of the quarter the game settled down a bit and the Tigers almost got a see-saw battle going back and forth for possession of the ball, but late in the period the Rebels did it again.

Another Score

With the second string team in the game for Teurlings, David Duhon was at the quarterback slot and flipped a 20 yard pass to Tommy Proctor who made a beautiful mid - air catch and then marked off the few remaining yards for the score. The extra point attempt came as a kick this time but was blocked and the half-time score was 32-0.

Third Quarter

The Rebels piled up an additional six points in the third period as they continued to needle the Tiger defense and halting their offense almost completely. Jeanerette had possession of the ball to start

the second half but when they finally had to give it up the Rebels ran five plays before Solis handed - off to Babineaux who streaked up the middle for about five yards and the score. The PAT was blocked and the score stood 38-0.

Fourth Quarter

In the fourth period the Rebels put twelve more points on the boards with as much ease as they had collected all the others. The first touchdown came after only a few plays into the quarter when Solis piled around his left end and ran the fifteen yards for the score. The PAT was so good and Gus Nelson kicked-off to the Tigers.

Again the Tigers found a solid wall of flesh in their way and couldn't move the ball. They moved into Rebel territory only twice during the game but never made a serious threat.

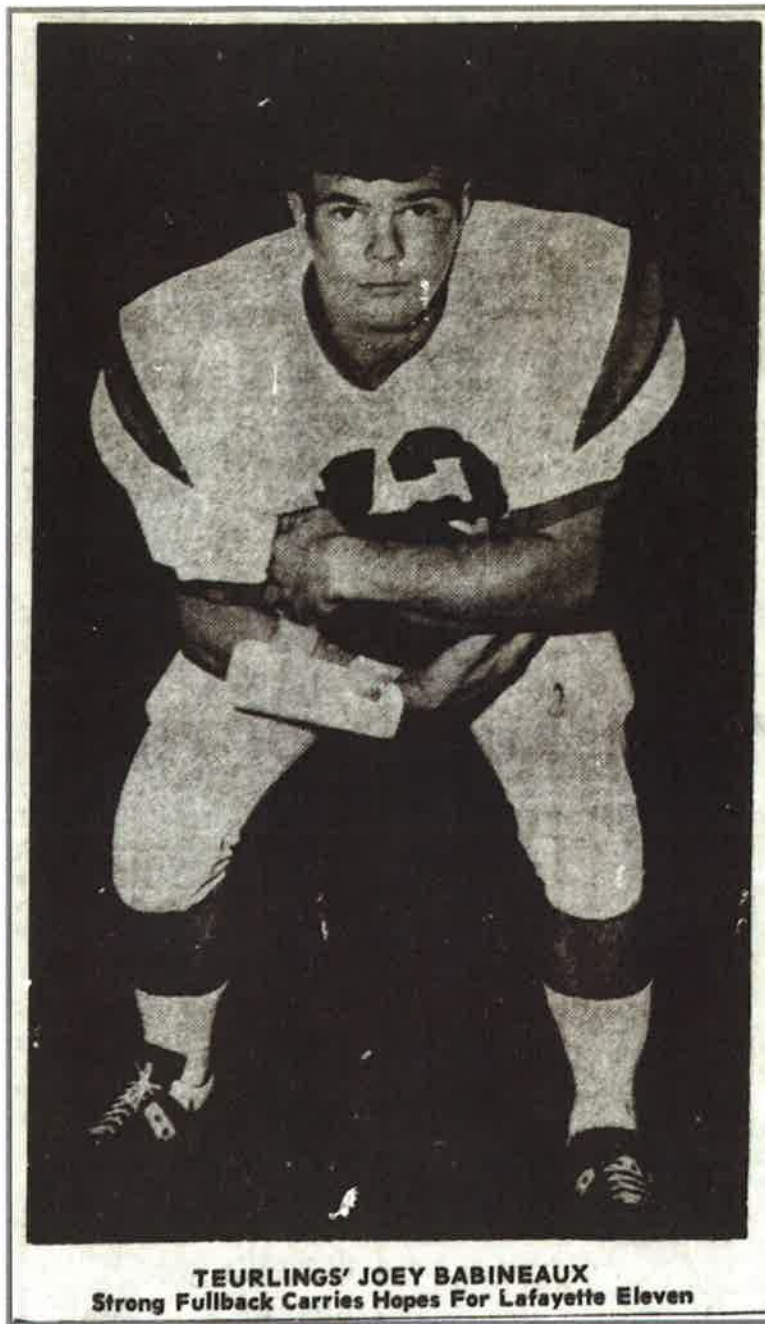

Bourgeois, Landen Lead 5-B All-District Selections

District 5-B champion Vermilion Catholic of Abbeville landed three players on both the first and second teams to dominate the team selected by the coaches for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

Vermilion's brilliant junior halfback James Bourgeois was selected as the outstanding back and Hanson's Lynn Landen repeated as the outstanding lineman in the district.

Delcambre's Don Dunbar edged out Vermilion's Vince Listi in the balloting for the best coaching job despite the fact that Listi's team captured the district championship.

Got No Line Spots

One of the big surprises was that Vermilion did not place a single lineman on the first eleven but dominated the backfield by landing three of the four spots. But on the second team the Eagles claimed three line spots.

Bourgeois wasn't the leading rusher for the Eagles but he always seemed to come up with the big play when things were going rough for the Vermilion eleven. The closest man to Bourgeois in the voting was teammate Anthony Fontana who was named the quarterback of the dream team.

Bourgeois carried 75 times and gained 447 yards and scored 11 touchdowns. He was the leading pass receiver on the

championship team with 23 catches for 400 yards and five scores.

Fontana Top Man

Fontana was the key performer for the Eagles as he was the leading scorer with 25 points, hit 46 of 82 passes for 891 yards and 12 touchdowns and rushed for an additional 114 yards and scored four touchdowns. He was also the punter for the Eagles and he kicked for a 41-yard average.

But Fontana had a rough time beating out Fatima's Bobby Bernard in the race for the quarterback spot. It took four ballots to decide the first team berth and when you look at Bernard's statistics it's not hard to figure. The Fatima ace completed 165 of 234 passes for 1,854 yards and 18 touchdowns, scored 37 points and averaged 37-yards per kick. Bernard just missed rolling up 2,000 yards total offense but he is a junior and will have another shot next year.

Sophomore James Meaux, one of the brightest sophomore prospects in many years, round out the three-man contingent from Vermilion. He led the Eagles in rushing with 109 carries for 742 yards and 12 touchdowns and he was the man who the Eagles went to for the tough yardage.

Solis Made Halfback

Teurlings' Larry Solis rounded out the backfield as a halfback although he played quarterback most of the season. Solis completed 63 of 150 passes

for 741 yards and six touchdowns and he rushed 117 times for an additional 337 yards and scored nine touchdowns.

Fontana is the only member of the all-district backfield who will not return next season as Meaux is a sophomore and Bourgeois and Solis are both juniors. Bernard is also a junior so barring injuries it looks like the 1968 5-B backfield is almost set.

Landen, a bruising 5-11, 180-

pound senior, was a repeat all-district performer at his guard spot and was regarded as the best lineman in the league last season. The Hanson standout was a fine blocker and was outstanding defensively from his linebacking spot.

Needed Little Luck

Dunbar coached the Delcambre team to a 3-4-1 season mark and a 2-4-1 district mark which doesn't sound impressive but his Panthers had plenty of

rough luck with injuries and could have well been one of the playoff representatives with a little luck.

Delcambre fell to Fatima 7-0 and Hanson 2-0 after pushing both of them all over the field and then saw Central Catholic gain a 20-20 tie with them in the closing minutes. The Panthers then whipped Loreauville and Jeanerette but lost a heart-breaker to Vermilion in the final minute 13-7 and then fell to Teurlings by the same margin when injuries stripped the Panthers.

Fatima's Clay Judice and Dennis Viator of Delcambre are the first team ends. Judice caught 27 passes for 846 yards and eight touchdowns and was also a fine running threat for the Warriors as he alternated in the backfield. Viator was a standout blocker and defensive player.

Other Line Spots

Joey Streva of Central Catholic repeated as first team center and his teammate Ronnie Baker joined Landen at one of the guard positions. Teurlings' outstanding junior lineman Gus Nelson and Hanson's Angelo Tamparello were named the tackles on the first unit.

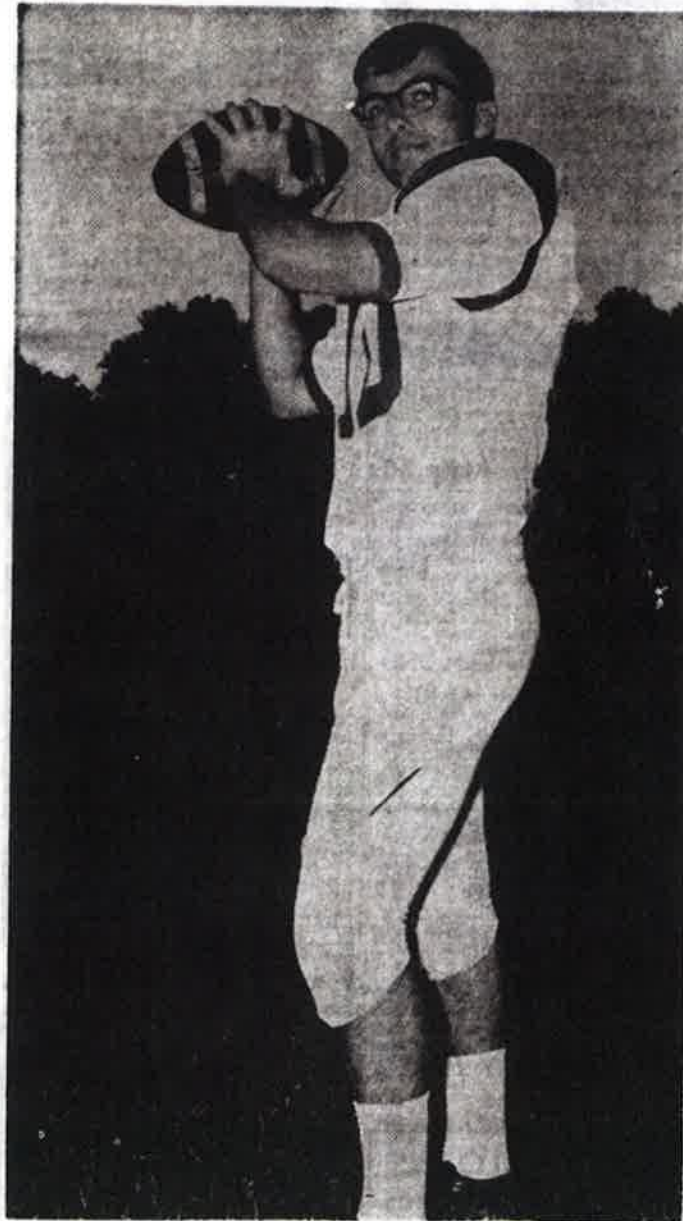
