A 22-yard burst on the outside on the first play of the half brought the ball to the Northside 48, then, eleven executions later, DeSoto scored once again, giving him rights to all the scoring the spectators witnessed.

Fatima coach Larry Dauterive said after the game, "Our boys sure made a good effort. Every one of them gave 100 per cent. We did a good job of stopping Northside's outside running attack. We rushed more than expected."

Lafayette-Cathedral

In this game, the night's most exciting, the Lafayette Lions roared past Cathedral-Carmel, 7-0.

With 38 seconds remaining in the game, Mark Speyrer flung a pass to Mike Doucet and Goldie Breaux booted the extra point to give the Lions a 7-0 margin.

Teurlings Rebs Will Be Young

Probably one of the youngest teams to take to the gridiron this season will be the Teurlings High School Rebels.

The Rebels will have only four of their starting lineup classed as seniors while another four are juniors and the last three are sophomores. And one of those brilliant sophs is the ball handling quarterback John Nelson.

Look Smallish

The Rebels, with all of the underclassmen in the lineup, look small, weak, and inexperienced. But most of the downfall of the Rebs is in the line. In fact, their fearsome foursome weighs in at an average of 155 pounds.

The backfield is a little different story, however. Three of last year's starting backfield members are back to take over old positions. All three of them have earned two monograms and their averaged weight is a little over 160. Head mentor Bob St. Julien of the Rebels states that his backfield should be "adequate."

So the future of the Teurlings 1969 season relies upon the young, small linemen who will have to be pushing around men up to 250 pounds heavier than themselves.

Returning Squadmen

The returning squadmen to the Teurlings starting offensive unit are Gary Proctor, a 6-2 165-pound junior who has earned two letters and will be playing his regular position from last year at left end; Glenn Romero, a 170-pound senior who also has two letters and will be returning to a familiar position at left tackle; Kenneth Menard, a 155-pound senior who has two monograms from the left halfback spot; David Duhon, a 170-pound junior who also has two monograms and is returning to his slot at right half; and Thomas Guidry, a 170-pound senior who has earned two letters worth of playing time at fullback.

The newcomers to the starting offensive alignment are Dale Domingue, a 140-pound sophomore who will be taking on the duties of left guard in his first starting season; Guy Camel, a 145-pound junior who is to be down under at center; David Patout, a 140-pound sophomore who will find a place for himself at right guard; Ricky Guthrie, a 150-pound junior tackle; Mike Thomas, a 145-pound senior who started at defensive end last year and is being moved up to the starting offensive team this year at right end; and John Nelson, a 145-pound sophomore who has but one letters worth of playing time and will be taking on the masterminding duties of quarterbacking.

Runs Wing-T

Nelson will put his team into play from the Wing-T with fairly strong enough backfield men to give him protection for passing and good speed for the long jaunts—if they can get past the line.

The Rebels finished with a 2-5 record last year in the 5-B race in a tie with Loreauville for the fifth spot in a field of eight. If the Teurlings club is to better that mark any this year, those small and inexperienced underclassmen will have to come through with flying colors.

Will Begin Schedule

The Rebs will begin their schedule at home in Clark Field with a game against Cathedral. Then its two more home matches before the Rebs have to move out. Those are with Loreauville and Hanson of the 5-B loop.

Then its hit the road for the Rebels for games with Delcambre and Central Catholic of the league, an out of district game with Co-meneau High of Lafayette, back to the conference with Fatima, and a duo finale at home against Erath and Vermilion Catholic.



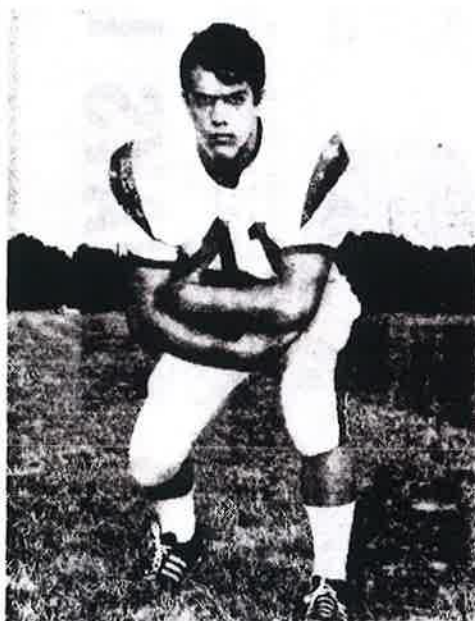

Teurlings Rebs Race By River Oaks, 26-0

Kenneth Menard, a 150-pound senior who has earned two letters in his stay at Teurlings High School, exploded for 133 yards on 22 carries last night at Clark Field to lead his Rebel teammates on to a 26-0 whitewashing of the River Oaks Panthers.

The Rebels built a massive

213 yard offensive around the talent of Menard, who scored all of Teurlings' 20 points in the first half, while they held the Panthers to 10 yards total offense—minus three rushing and 13 via the air route.

Scored Early
With just four minutes gone in the game the Rebels capped a 41 yard drive that started completely on the ground and

was highlighted by a 13 yard carry from quarterback John Nelson on a broken play. The team came with 7:58 showing on the scoreboard clock when Menard plunged off tackle to the score from the one yard line, his first of four scoring plays in the game. Then came his second, a plunge off the opposite tackle for the two point PAT, and the Rebels led 8-0.

On the next series of plays, the Rebels drove 41 yards to the Panther four-yard line where they were pushed back by a determined goal line team from River Oaks to the 15 yard line. Then QB Nelson raced 10 yards back to the Panther five but fumbled and the Panthers snapped on the ball to take over at that spot.

But on the ensuing play, Bruce, the Panther workhorse, fumbled and the Rebels pumped on it far perhaps the biggest break of the game as the first quarter ended. It only took one play, a tight end sweep by Menard and the Rebels were on the scoreboard again. Gary Proctor's kick went astray and the Rebels were ahead 14-0 in the early seconds of the second quarter.

Midway through the second period, the Panthers could not see daylight as the Rebs pushed them back six yards in two plays on the scoreboard once decided to punt on third down. But, even put his toe into the pylon from his own endzone and a rode to the Panther 40 where Menard sat open armed. The first halfback tucked it under, made a good move to the right sideline, and was on his way to paydirt. Proctor's kick missed again and the score stood 20-0 as it did when the buzzer proclaimed the end of the half.

Had Long Drive
The third quarter was all Teurlings again as the Rebs initiated a 60 yard drive on the kickoff that took them once again into the Panther endzone. The drive was highlighted by a 10 yard scramble by Menard around left end that put the Rebels into Panther territory. From then on it was coasting downhill to the Panther two yard line where quarterback Nelson using a little strategy called on Charles Perry, the fleet footed Rebel fullback, who followed his interference perfectly into the endzone. Menard's run was stopped

short and the Rebels had finished their scoring for the night.

The River Oaks High School area in Belle Chasse south of New Orleans was part of the Louisiana area to be devastated by the recent hurricane, thus practice sessions for the Panther club have been few and far between. Along with that is the fact that many students in Delta Heritage High mistakes.

The changes should be interesting to watch.

Then there's Cecilia versus Vermilion Catholic. Last week, Cecilia was beaten, 22 - 0, by St. Martinville, while Vermilion was victorious over Cathedral, 12 - 0.

Cecilia had little to boast about the other night, gaining 63 yards on the ground, four in the air. In addition to offensive miseries, the defense has yet to accomplish even mediocre status.

But, it was no trouncing. Teurlings tallied the game's first six points as Kenneth Menard scored with 8:06 remaining in the first quarter, ending a long, grueling 78-yard march. This made it 6-0. Menard then tried to run for two points but was nailed on a crisp, smack tackle.

Nelson Tossed

In the drive, the Rebels attained five first downs. Quarterback John Nelson tossed seven aerials, completed five for 61 strides.

Cathedral struck back about five minutes later, knotting the score on a short, accurate, rewarding pass to Donald Romero from David Ellis. Ellis, in an attempt to get two points, tossed to Romero but the ball dropped, innocently, and the score was 6-6.

In the second stanza, Cath-

edral struck once again. Pat Berry took the ball in for the final five yards of a 25-yard drive, giving the Tigers the lead, 12-6. Again, the PAT attempt was missed, this time because Van Champagne's kick was wide.

A little later, the Tigers added two points to their score, smothering John Nelson in the end zone for a safety. That made it 18-6 with two minutes left in the half.

It was hard to tell which team was better at this stage. Had it not been for two lost fumbles on Teurlings' part, the

game could have had a different ending.

Berry Plunged

Then, in the third period, with about one minute to go, Pat Berry plunged across the white, magic chalk line to run the score to 21-6, the Tigers in the

lead. This time the PAT was good, Champagne booting it.

Cathedral put the ribbon on the package in the last period, scoring with 30 seconds remaining.

Again, it was Berry who scored, capping a drive that went 35 strides, running the score to

28-6. There was no more scoring.

Although Cathedral won, Teurlings outplayed, outpassed and outperformed the Tigers, not to mention that they had more

first downs. But the breaks weren't on the Rebels' side.

Right behind Bayard is left end A.J. Jacobs who is the runback specialist. Jacobs has raced into paydirt four times for 24 points in his season thus far.

Adding the extra points has been quarterback Darrell Neuville who has run across five two point conversions for 10 points.

The Panthers of Delcambre have not had near as good luck as the Tigers have. They have

been able to get only six points on the scoreboard in three games, that lone TD coming against Comeaux in the Panthers only win of the season, 6-0.

Delcambre Fell

St. Blanc Sends Hanson To Verdict

Billy St. Blanc was the name of the game at Clark Field last night as the Hanson Tigers rallied from a 12-0 first half deficit to overcome the "hard luck" Teurlings Rebels in a District 5-B encounter, 18-12.

The victory pushes the Tigers to an unblemished 2-0 record in district play while they are 3-1 overall. The Rebels fell to 0-2 in the loop and are 1-3 on the season.

The slippery little halfback of the Tigers, St. Blanc, accounted for both of the Hanson touchdowns and then came back to save the day for the Tigers with a last minute interception.

St. Blanc scored the winning touchdown for the Tigers with only 1:15 showing on the stadium clock. The Rebels were enjoying a 12-10 lead and were trying to put the Tigers back into their own territory with a good punt when the tables turned. The Tigers blocked Gary Proctor's attempted punt and took over on the Rebel three-yard line. It only took one end run by St. Blanc and the Tigers surged into a 16-12 lead late in the game. St. Blanc came back to run the two-point conversion in for two more and the Tigers were sitting pretty with an 18-12 lead and only 55 seconds on the clock.

The Rebels tried to come back on the ensuing kickoff and got the ball up to their own 45-yard line when St. Blanc showed his defensive prowess and picked off a John Nelson pass to ice the game for the Blue and Gold.

The Tigers had started the scoring in the first period with only 19 seconds left in the quarter. Kenneth Menard took the

honors and scored all of the 12 points for Teurlings.

Menard's first TD came on a two-yard plunge that capped a 35-yard drive by the Rebs. The field position was set up when the Rebs jumped on a Hanson fumble at the Tiger 35. The run for a two-point conversion failed and the Rebels were away to a 6-0 lead.

Eight minutes later in the second quarter, St. Blanc stepped back to punt and booted the pigskin 40 booming yards into the waiting arms of Menard at his own 35. Menard swayed to the left sideline, broke a couple of tackles and was on his way as he tore loose at the 50 and raced into the end zone with a 65-yard scoring punt return. Nelson's run failed and the Rebels were running away at 12-0 when the intermission caught them.

After the half, the story was completely different. The Tigers got their first good break of the game and made the most of it. Proctor having a hard time punting all during the second half stepped back to his own 20 to boot the pighide and it was promptly centered over his head. The Tigers pounced on it at the Rebel 15.

From there it was two plays and into the end zone with St. Blanc carrying both times. Quarterback Wayne Breaux then hit left end Stacy Boudreaux right in the chest with a bullet for the two extra points and with two minutes left in the third quarter the Tigs were on the move.

Midway through the final 12-minute playing slot the Tigs were driving again but ran out of downs on the Rebel 15 where Teurlings took over. The Rebs could not seem to get the hang of going the right direction and

were thrown back to their own two-yard line. Quarterback Nelson took two steps back into the end zone, lost his footing and fell, giving the Hanson "eleven" two points with out ever touching the ball carrier. The safety brought the Tigers within two points of Teurlings at 12-10.

After the ensuing kickoff by the Rebs back to the Tigers, Hanson found the going tough. They drove down to the Teurlings 33-yard line where Freshman linebacker Barry Johnson picked off a Breaux aerial with 3:42 left in the game. It looked like the Rebs had their first district win in their hind pocket, but the Tigers weren't finished.

When the Rebels could not move the ball Proctor went back to punt and disaster struck leaving the Rebels at an 18-12 disadvantage.

St. Blanc led the way for the Tigs on 20 carries gaining 48 yards. Quarterback Breaux completed four of eleven passes for 46 yards. Boudreaux at right end was his prime target.

Menard led the rush game for the Rebels with 54 yards to top St. Blanc on the same number of carries — 20.

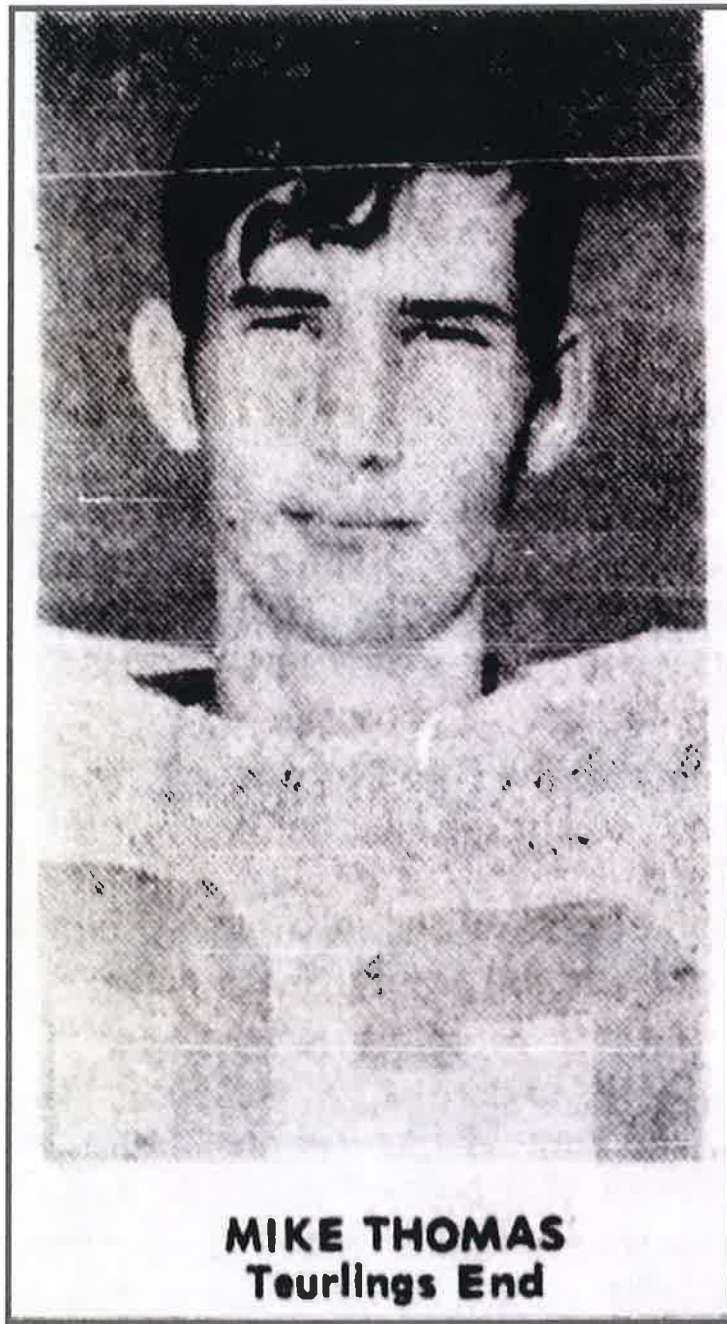

The Fatima High School Warriors used a balanced scoring attack from a tremendous running game and a fine defensive line to race by the Teurlings Rebels 45-0 here in a District 6-B game last night.

The Rebs got it out to the four before they had to kick on fourth down, but the ball was centered over punter Gary Proctor's head. Proctor touched it and it fell out of the end zone for a safety against the Rebels. The Warriors then led 16-0.

Free Kick

DeSoto grabbed the free kick after the safety and returned it to the Rebel 37. He claimed seven yards on first down and on second down Doug Dutt broke through the Rebel line and rambled the final 20 yards for the score. Champagne's kick finally split the uprights and the Warriors brought a 23-0 lead.

Berwick's Mike Ryan was the other back; he was the district's second leading ground gainer.

Huval got to the passer 15 times and most teams chose to run to the opposite side to avert his vicious tackles.

Guards were Cecilia's Anthony Robin and Cathedral's Curtis Prejean.

"Few teams ran up the middle on us," said Coach Lynn Angelle of Cecilia, "and the main reason was Robin's presence." Four times a letterman, Robin is 5-8 and 195 pounds.

The loss left Syracuse with a 5-5 record—the first time since 1962 that the Orange haven't had a winning season. BC finished 5-4.

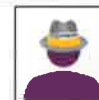
