Lafayette's three Class AAAA schools turned in winning performances in the 20th Annual Kiwanis Jamboree here at McNaspy Stadium last night before a home crowd of about 9,000 fans.

Northside High toppled a fired up Teurlings crew by a 7-0 margin, Acadiana raced over Fatima 12-0 and Lafayette High squeezed by Cathedral 6-0.

Vikings-Rebels

Northside used a 22-yard scoring pass from quarterback Rusty Taylor to fullback Rocky Baillargeon to edge past Teurlings in a close contest.

The Vikings, moving up to District 3-AAAA this season and supposedly under a rebuilding program, received a fine performance from quarterback Taylor who fired seven passes and completed six for 91 yards and the lone touchdown in the game.

Taylor also mixed in the fine running of fullback Baillargeon, a power workhorse, and the speed of tailback Warren Phillips to amass a good offensive.

But it was the aerial antics of Taylor, who used four receivers in the match, that was the difference. Teurlings outplayed the Vikings on the ground gaining 34 yards to 25

for Northside. Quarterback John Nelson had as much trouble getting his passing attack to work as Taylor had success.

Made Difference

Nelson completed only six of 14 for 60 yards. But the running of slot back Barry Johnson made up the difference and pulled the Rebs nearly even with the Viks in total offense.

The Viking score came early in the second half of play. Northside bogged down near midfield and punted deep into Teurlings territory where the Rebels fumbled on first down and Northside's lusty quarterback Taylor doubling on defensive duties jumped on the ball at the Reb 22 - yard line.

On first down Taylor rolled left and it looked as if he was in trouble when he spotted Baillargeon down the sideline and pitched to him. The big fullback hauled it in on about the 10 and pulled several Rebels with him into the end zone for the score.

Bobby Green added the extra point via his toe and with 6:04 left in the game the Viks had the lead at 7-0.

Two Drives

Teurlings had two fine drives deep into Viking territory, but ran out of steam both times.

Late in the first half the Rebs

took over on the Viking 46 when Randy Boudreaux jumped on a loose pigskin with two minutes to go.

Halfback Andrew Duhon and Johnson led the running with respective five and 10 yard gainers, but the rest of the plays were from the arm of Nelson. He made good on three passes which brought the Rebels down to the Viking 16 where they ran out of downs and tried a field goal on a fourth and five situation. John Davis' kick was blocked by the Viks and Northside took over on their 20.

Halfway through the second half the Rebels drove to the Viking four yard line but ran out of downs and could not break the Viking goal line stand.

Warriors-Rams

The Wrecking Rams of Acadiana, also moving up to District 3-AAAA this season, topped another District 7-A team in the Fatima Warriors, but this one was not close.

Actually it was a bit of a mismatch, but credit must go to the Warriors for staying as close to the much larger and experienced Rams.

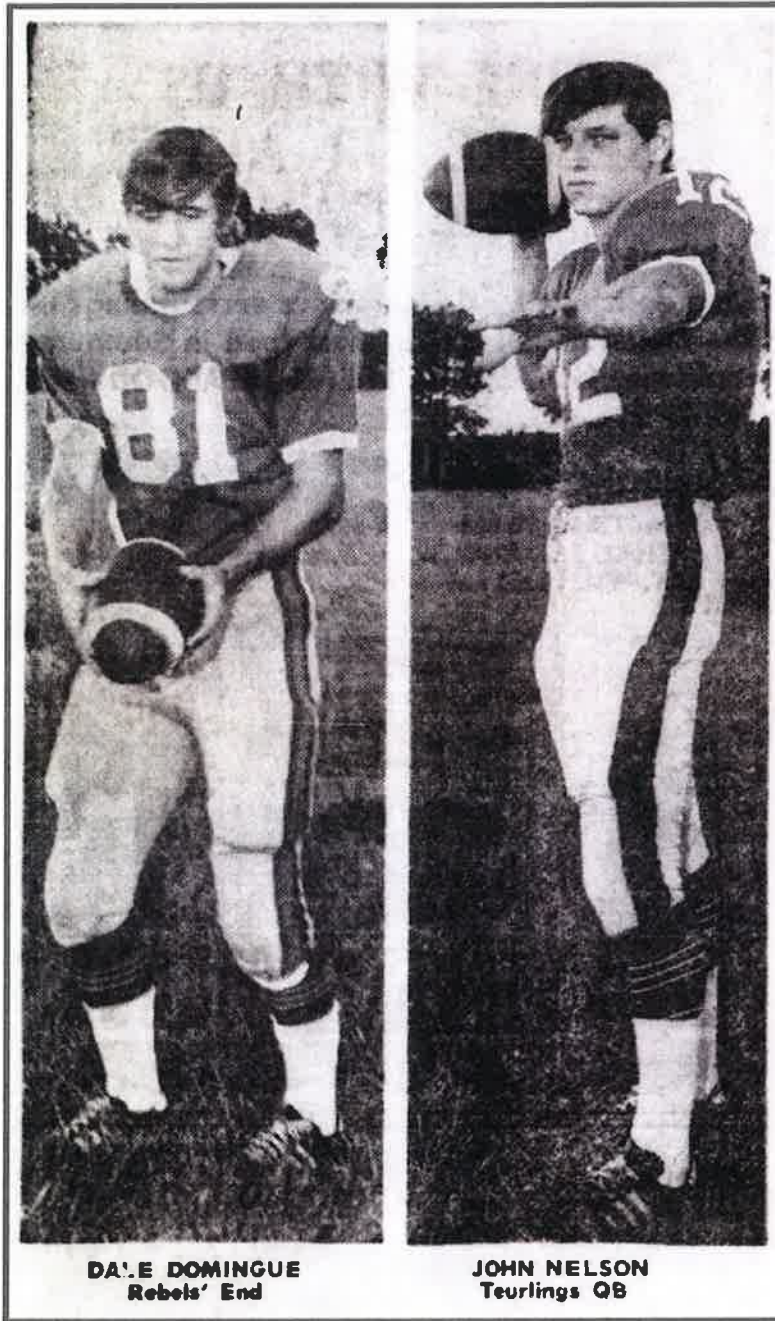
With usual quarterback Jimmy Landry seeing limited action at fullback because of a broken wrist just now healing, Randy Bover took over and led

Rebels' End

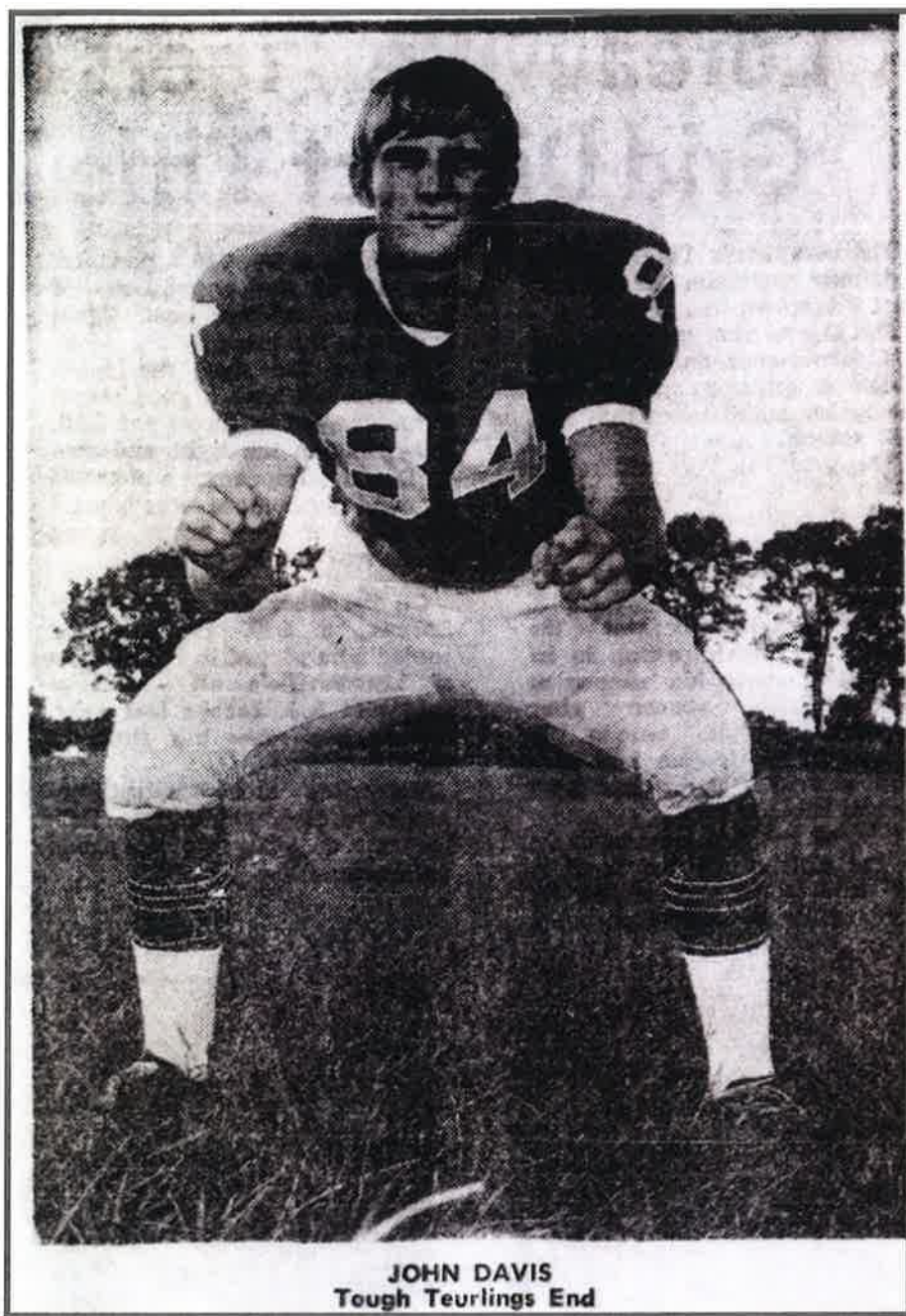

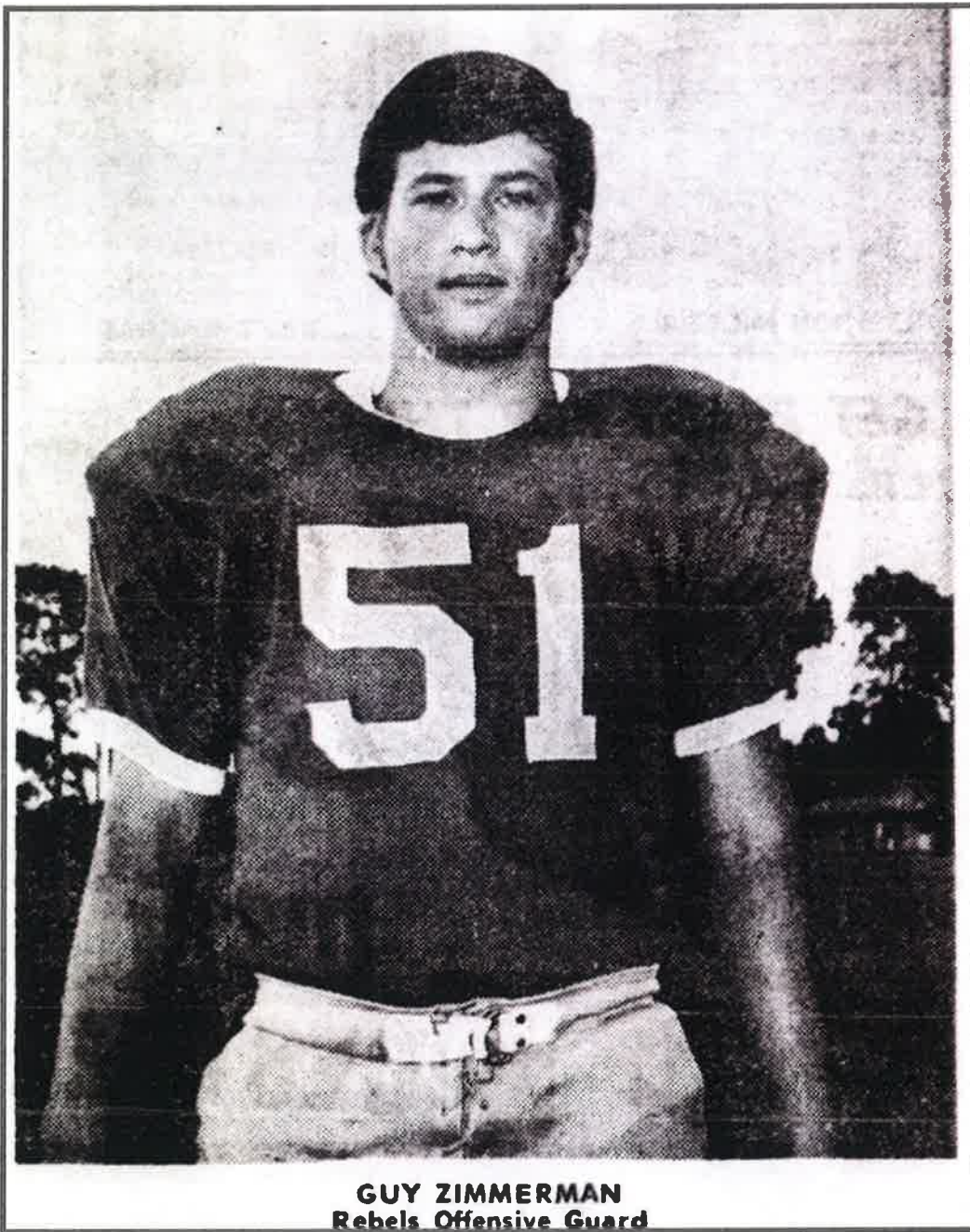

The Turlings Rebels may be the team to beat in the District 7-A which has been changed from 4-A.

The Rebels, coached by Howard Swindler, will be losing just five starters from last year's squad which posted a 6-3 district mark with a 7-3 overall record. The Rebels finished fourth in the district last year and will be out to best that performance this year.

Lack Leadership

Coach Swindler said, "We have experience and quickness but we lack leadership."

Coach Swindler also mentioned the loss of fine athletes from the past year but has some really fine players returning to fill in the vacant spots.

The Rebels will not be as strong on defense but will make up for that in the offense. John Nelson will be back to do the signal calling and to earn his fourth letter.

Repeat Honors

Nelson, who made the All-District selections last year, will be after repeat honors. Nelson threw for over 1,000 yards last season but will have to find receivers to replace Gary Proctor and David Duhon, his main targets.

Coach Swindler feels his backfield will be quick and that he has some good running backs in Barry Johnson, Andrew Duhon and Dale Domingue.

Regulars Returning

Regulars returning for the Rebels will be Kenneth Fusilier, a 145 - pound split end; Guy Zimmerman, a 165 - pound tackle; Raymond Patout, a 165 - pound center; Charles Langlais, a 140 - pound guard; Randy Boudreaux, a 210 - pound tackle and John Davis, a 185 - pound tight end.

Coach Swindler will be running his team from the pro type offense with John Nelson once again doing the signal calling. The pro offense has been successful for the Rebels in previous years and may be even more successful this year as the Rebels have one of its better and more experienced backfields.

The Rebels will be relying on Johnson to do the punting while Domingue will be handling the place kicking.

Offensive Team

On offense the Rebels will probably start Fusilier and Davis at the end positions. Boudreaux and Zimmerman will be at the tackle spots. Patout and Langlinais will hold down the guard positions while David Patout will be at center.

In the backfield Johnson will be back at his left halfback spot with Domingue at the split back position. Andrew Dubon will be filling in the right half spot which is vacant after the loss of Charles Perry due to graduation. Nelson will be at the quarterback position.

Assistant Coach

Assisting coach Swindler will be Greig Joubert. Both Swindler and Joubert feel that Loreauville, Hanson and Sacred Heart will be the teams to lead the district.

The Rebels will open up the season against Holy Rosary at home followed by Delcambre at home. The Rebels will then hit the road to meet Sacred Heart. From there the Rebels meet Vermilion Catholic at home, Hanson away, Basile away, Loreauville at home, Fatima away, Erath at home and will be on the road the final game to meet Plaisance.

John Nelson Paces Rebs To Win Over HR Eagles

The 7-A class Teurlings Rebels dumped the 5-AA class Holy Rosary Eagles at Clark Field last night 19 - 12.

The Rebels were led by senior quarterback John Nelson. Nelson scored two touchdowns while passing for another in leading his team to its first victory in as many outings.

The Rebels were first to score in the second quarter as the first quarter ended scoreless. Nelson took the cue and plunged in from his seven yard line to put six points on the scoreboard. Nelson was true to form as he also kicked the extra point as the Rebels took a seven point lead.

Holy Rosary was not to be put down as Paul Taylor brought the spectators to their feet with a 70 yard broken field touchdown romp. The Eagles try for two points failed and the Rebels led 7-6.

In the third quarter the Rebels moved the ball down field on the Eagles with Nelson carrying over from the one yard line. Nelson's kick failed and the scoreboard read 13 - 6.

The Eagles showed they had more than one swift back as they once again scored on a broken field run. Walter Cahee took the handoff in his own endzone and weaved his way up the field to score on a 88 yard touchdown play.

The kick was no good and the third quarter ended with the score 13 - 12.

The Rebels settled down on defense and held the Eagles scoreless in the final period while the offense rolled up six more points.

Nelson connected on a 20 yard scoring strike to his split end

Kenneth Fuselier, a 150 pound junior, to end the scoring of the ball game. The try for two was no good and the Rebels went off the field victorious with the score 19 - 12.

Andrew Duhon was the leading ball carrier for the Rebels as he carried the pigskin 14 times for 130 yards at an average of 9.2 yards per carry.

Barry Johnson was the second leading rusher for the Rebels as he had 57 yards in 10 totes.

John Nelson had one of his slower nights as he only completed seven passes in 22 attempts for 87 yards and one touchdown.

Holy Rosary was led by the rushing of Paul Taylor. Taylor carried 10 times for 104 yards at an average of 10.4 yards per carry.

Walter Cahee had 89 yards

rushing in nine carries. Cahee was dropped several times behind the line of scrimmage by the tough Rebels.

Next week the Rebels will host the Delcambre Panthers in the district opener for both squads at Clark Field. Holy Rosary will also play host to the Notre Dame Pioneers.

Delcambre Tops Teurlings Rebels

The Delcambre Panthers, who never say die, scored with nine seconds remaining on the scoreboard on a brilliant offensive play by Mark Landry who sprinted 39 yards for the only score of the night to defeat the Teurlings Rebels 6-0 in a game played at Northside last night.

In one of the better games of the season both teams seemed to be evenly matched clubs. Teurlings did gain more first downs as they notched 11 as compared to Delcambre's six.

Rebels Outgain

The Rebels also outgained the Panthers in the total offense as they accumulated 95 yards on the ground with an additional 41 coming by way of the air for 136 yards total.

The Panthers gathered 92 on the ground and could only manage 11 in the air against the tough Rebel secondary.

The first quarter found the Rebels totally dominating the ball game as the Panthers could not get their offense moving.

Johnson Intercepts

The second quarter found neither team threatening as both defenses were playing hard nose football. The only highlight of the second quarter was a pass interception by Barry Johnson for the Rebels. Johnson picked off a Mark Landry aerial.

The third quarter found the Rebels keeping the Panthers deep in their own territory. The Panthers were forced to punt and a bad punt allowed the Rebels to put the ball in play on the Panthers 30 yard line.

Rebels Threaten

Six plays later the Rebels worked their way to the Panther six yard line. On first down the Panthers found themselves with their backs to the wall but

only a key defensive play by Andrew Broussard saved the score. Broussard intercepted a John Nelson pass in the end zone for a touchback. This was the only time the Rebels threatened all night.

Midway through the fourth quarter, quarterback Mark Landry who was doubling his duties on defense intercepted the second pass of the night for the Panthers. From there the Panthers were forced to punt and it was downed on the Rebel two yard line.

Panther Take Over

The Rebels brought the ball back out to the 25 yard line but were forced to give it up on downs. With a little over a minute to go in the game the Panthers took possession of the ball at the Rebel 25 yard line.

A couple of losses and a penalty put the Panthers back to the Rebel 39 yard line. With nine seconds remaining the game the Panthers had the ball with a third down add 16 yards to go for a first.

Landry Scores

Quarterback, Mark Landry, dropped back to pass on the last play of the game. Finding his receivers covered Landry tucked the pigskin under his arm evaded several Rebel tacklers and galloped 39 yards for the score. Landry crossed the goal line as the buzzer sounded. The Panthers marched off the field victorious.

David scored on runs of 37 and 54 yards in the first and fourth quarter, respectively, and teammate Guy Soileau caught a 30-yard pass from quarterback Robert Launey as the Trojans brought their record to 2-0-1 overall.

One Yard

Vermilion Catholic Defeats Rebels, 20-6

A relentless pass rush and the consistent running of junior Terry LeBlanc gave the Vermilion Catholic Screaming Eagles a 20-6 football victory

over the Teurlings Rebels in a District T-A contest at Clark Field Friday night.
The Eagle defense dropped Teurlings passer John Nelson seven times or 70 yards in losses and LeBlanc scored two

touchdowns as Vermilion Catholic pushed its overall record to 2-1 and its district mark to 2-0. Teurlings is 1-3 overall and 0-3 in league competition.

Carried 21 Times
In addition to scoring twice — on runs of seven and 55 yards — LeBlanc carried 21 times for 161 yards.

Except for a 35-yard scamper by LeBlanc for a touchdown in the fourth quarter, the Eagle offense, after a strong first half, stumbled. Teurlings was simply unable to get its offense going, too.

Scoring Started
The scoring started late in the first period. Junior Paul Bourgeois, carrying for the first time, went six yards with 2:21 left ending a 47-yard drive for Vermilion Catholic. The kick failed and the Eagles prevailed, 6-0.

Teurlings Came Back
Teurlings came back immediately. Approximately a minute after the Eagles scored, Rebel passer Nelson threw long to end Kenneth Fusilier. The defender stopped in front of Fusilier, as if he were sure of an interception, but he misjudged the ball and it went over his head into the hands of Fusilier who scored untouched to tie the score, 6-6. The pass play covered 66 yards and the kick for the extra point, although good, was nullified by a penalty.

With 5:42 to go in the second quarter, the Eagles regained the lead as LeBlanc, going seven yards, put his vision in front for good. A 20-yard run by LeBlanc and a major penalty set up the six points. Jim Thompson converted the extra point for a 13-6 margin.

Began To Weaken
Then the Eagle offense began to weaken. Only the running of LeBlanc gave the Eagles anything to cheer about in the second half when he broke

through the line — untouched — and ran beautifully 33 yards — untouched — to assure an Eagle triumph.

Vermilion Catholic proved how to win without a passing attack. The Eagles gained 201 yards rushing and only eight yards passing.

Eagles Led
The Eagles led in first downs (12-9), rushing yardage (291-20) and total offense (299-107).

Paul Fontana, quarterback, carried five times for 43 yards for the Eagles. Paul Bourgeois had 22 yards and Eric Megson 24. For the Rebels, Andrew

Dubon ran for 50 yards and Timmy Dugas for 34.

Opelousas Tigers Blank Franklin

OPELOUSAS — The Opelousas Tigers opened up the scoring in the second half as quarterback Tommy Stelly teamed with Joe Landreneau for two aerial bombs that led the Tigs to a 21-0 District 3-AA victory over Franklin's Hornets.

The Tigers actually started the scoring of the game in the second quarter when Phil Nacoste pulled in a five yard pass from QB Stelly for the first six-point of the game. Stelly then stepped back and hit Nacoste again for the two-point conversion.

The TD had come after seven plays on a 40 yard drive. With 57 seconds left in the half the score stood 8-0, Opelousas.

Third Period
In the third period Stelly again found his mark on the first play from scrimmage after the Tigers had halted a Hornet drive at their 12 yard line. The bomb went for 88 yards as Landreneau hauled the ball in and scampered for the second TD of the night for Opelousas. Brad Ray kicked the extra point and with 5:21 left in the third period, the Tigers had taken a 15-0 lead.

The Tigers came back to sew things up in the fourth period on a 12 yarder from Stelly to Landreneau. The TD was set up on a fumble recovery by Curley Greene at the Hornet 20 yard line. It took the Tigers five plays to get into the end zone and with 4:25 left in the

game the scoring was complete as the final PAT was missed via the kick.

Also Dominated
Opelousas also dominated the game statistically with 16 first downs to eight for Franklin, 126 yards on the ground to 112 for the Hornets and in the largest difference had 165 yards in the air as opposed to 26 for Franklin.

The Tiger passing game was tops as Stelly found receiver after receiver hitting on six of 11 aeriels in the match.

Both teams lost three fumbles and Opelousas was slowed a little by 95 yards in penalties.

The Tigers go on to play Sulobur on the Torn home field next week as Franklin is at home to entertain Northside.

Friday was "The Night They Drove Ole Dixie Down." "They" being the Hanson Tigers with 14. "Dixie" being the Rebels of Father Teurling. High with a great big gooseegg. In this night of sheer ecstasy for the long-suffering fans of HMHS the McCloskeymen brought a screeching halt to the longcat losing streak in modern Hanson history, and brought their season record to 1-4. In District 7-A competi-

tion the Tigera now stand at 1-2.

The Tigera played almost flawless ball, exhibiting few of the errors that have cost them in recent weeks. Hanson fumbled away the ball but once, this in contrast to the three or four the Tigera have been coughing up in the past.

Loreauville Races By Rebs

An unusual juggling act — not quite the circus type — wasn't enough to beat Loreauville Friday night, and the Tigers jiggled happily to a 50-8 conquest of Teurlings in a District 7-A football contest at Clark Field.

Loreauville's offense, the league's best, accounted for 402 total yards as the Tigers scored in every quarter in bringing their league mark to 5-1, good enough for second place behind Sacred Heart. The Bengals are 5-1-1 overall and Teurlings is 1-6 overall and 0-5 in district.

First TD

Teurlings scored the game's first touchdown. Forty - eight yards in penalties gave the Rebels excellent position at the Loreauville eight and, from there, quarterback John Nelson rolled to his right and pitched back to Timmy Dugas, who juggled the ball the entire distance, despite being hit.

But this was far from enough for the Rebels, whose brief lead was soon to be lost — for good.

Six different Tigers managed to cross the goal line, with only Dale Dugas scoring twice.

Dugas, leading rusher in the game with 124 yards on 11 carries, made the Tigers' first touchdown, running two yards late in the first period. Greg Ruiz gave the Tigers the lead for good when he ran for two points and an 8-6 lead. A run of 45 yards by Dugas had set up the score.

Bret Barras caught a 25 - yard pass from quarterback Jim Gonsoulin on the first play of the second quarter and Ruiz again ran for two points. Runs of 21 and 12 yards by Dugas had given the Bengals good position.

Just before the first half ended, Dugas rushed off tackle for the final yard as Loreauville hiked its lead to 22-6.

In the third period, another Dugas — Randy — received a Rebel punt and, finding a hole, began to run as quickly as he can. It seemed as if he simply couldn't outrun a Rebel tackler when suddenly, a block made it easy for him.

To make it 36-6, Ruiz scampered up the middle for 10 yards with 4:28 left in the third quarter. Dale Dugas ran for two points. Randy Dugas had runs of 21 and 12 yards in the drive.

Broke Loose

A few seconds remained in the third period when Patrick Willis, a sub, broke loose and ran 24 yards for a 42-6 Tiger margin. The run, up the middle, followed a 20 - yard run by Gene Nora.

With over two minutes to go in the contest, sub quarterback Joe Sarkies, a miniature 130-pound sophomore, hit Rodney Breaux, a 125 - pound freshman, for 11 yards and the final Tiger touchdown. Sarkies then hit Ken Lissard, a 115 - pound freshman, with a pass for two points and the Bengals had their 50th point.

First Downs

Loreauville had more first downs (19-7), more yards rushing (318-22), more yards passing (84-61) and more total offense yardage (402-83) in completely dominating the offensive portion of the encounter.

It was a night of fumbles. Loreauville fumbled seven times, lost one. Teurlings fumbled five times and lost one, also.

In passing, Loreauville completed only four of 24 passes

and Teurlings, completing seven of 23, didn't do much better.

Were Penalized

The Tigers were penalized 1:8 yards and the Rebels 95.

Teurlings was hardly ever able to move. Besides losing a fumble and having a pass intercepted the Rebels punted 10 times.

Other rushers for Loreauville were Rodney Breaux with 56 yards, Randy Dugas with 41, Patrick Willis with 34 and Ruiz with 33.

Sacred Heart Tops All-Stars

The District 7-A champion Sacred Heart Trojans of Villa Platte and the runner-up Loreauville Tigers took over half of the spoils on the 1971 District 7-A All-District football selections. The head coaches at the league's schools selected the all-district team for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

Sacred Heart garnered two spots on offense and four on defense while Loreauville had just the opposite, four on offense and two on defense. One of the Trojans' selections, fullback Ken Schexnayder, was named the Outstanding Offensive Player in the loop by acclamation of the voters and likewise, one of Loreauville's defensive selections, tackle Donald Miller, was named the league's Outstanding Defensive Player. Schexnayder is a 5-11 senior, while Miller is 6-3, 200-pound junior.

Other Selections

Bob Soltau, coach of the champion Trojans, was named Coach of the Year in the district. Soltau led Sacred Heart to an 8-0 district mark and a 9-0 undefeated overall mark.

Schexnayder, a 200-pounder, was one of the top scorers in the area, ending the season with 92 points. Schexnayder carried the ball 169 times in the season for 1,500 yards and a 6.3 average per carry. He scored 25 Tds.

Miller, of Loreauville, was the top defensive player in the league and was the only gridder to make both the offensive and defensive teams. He is one of two juniors to make the offensive team and one of five juniors on the defensive unit.

Miller made 20 unassisted tackles from his spot in the thick of the line and assisted on 45 more tackles.

Loreauville were quarterback Jim Gossoulin, a 6-3, 180-pound senior; Greg Ruiz, 6-2, 165, senior running back; and Dale Dugas, 5-11, 170, junior running back.

Gossoulin completed 44 of 119 passes for 766 yards and six touchdowns and rushed 46 times for 408 yards and seven touchdowns as he provided much of the Loreauville talent this season. At running back, Dugas was second in the Acadiana area in points scored with 106 for the year. He amassed 1,531 total yards with 184 coming on 11 pass receptions and 1,337 coming on 177 ground carries. Ruiz had 333 yards on the ground and 68 in the air for a 601 total. He averaged 4.3 yards a carry in the ground game for the Tigers, and he scored 53 points during the 10-game season.

Krath's Bobcats put three gridgers on the all-district team. They included senior split end Iverson Primeaux, senior guard Marcus Hebert and junior linebacker Benson Langlois.

Hansen's Tiger, had two members of their squad on the mythical unit in senior tackle Allyn Zaubrecher and junior linebacker Murphy Foster.

The other three places went to Delcambre's Peter Roy, a defensive end; Plaquemine's Dalton Orlesine, a senior widebacker and Plaquemine's Denny Bourque, a defensive backfield performer.
