The 1972 high school football season is getting closer and just how close is revealed by a full slate of jamborees coming up this week.

Tops among the action will be the usual Kiwanis Jamboree here in Lafayette in which six of the parish schools will participate at USL's Camo Field.

Opening ceremonies of that jamboree will be at 7 p.m. with the first game starting at 7:30 p.m. pitting the Fatima Warriors of District 7-A against the

Northside Vikings of District 3-AAAA. The second game will see the Lafayette Lions of District 3-AAAA meeting the Teurlings Rebels of District 7-A. The final game of the evening will pit the Acadiana Wrecking Rams against the hosting Cathedral - Carmel Tigers.

Action actually will begin in the Acadiana area Thursday night in Abbeville and in Crowley.

The Abbeville Wildcats will host a jamboree at their own

stadium with four teams involved. In the first game at 7 p.m. District 5-AA Kaplan takes on District 7-AA Vermilion Catholic while in the second game Kato of 7-A also meets 5-AAA Abbeville.

At Crowley also at 7:30 p.m. Notre Dame tackles Eunice in the first of two games with the hosting Gents meeting Church Point in the nightcap.

Other area jamborees slated for Friday night are in Opelousas, New Iberia, Franklin and Eunice.

The Kiwanis Jamboree in Opelousas will see the 3-AAA Opelousas Catholics Wildcats

take on the 3-AAA Breau Bridge Tigers in the opener while the Opelousas Tigers of District 3-AAAA meet the 3-AAA Rayne Wolves in the last game.

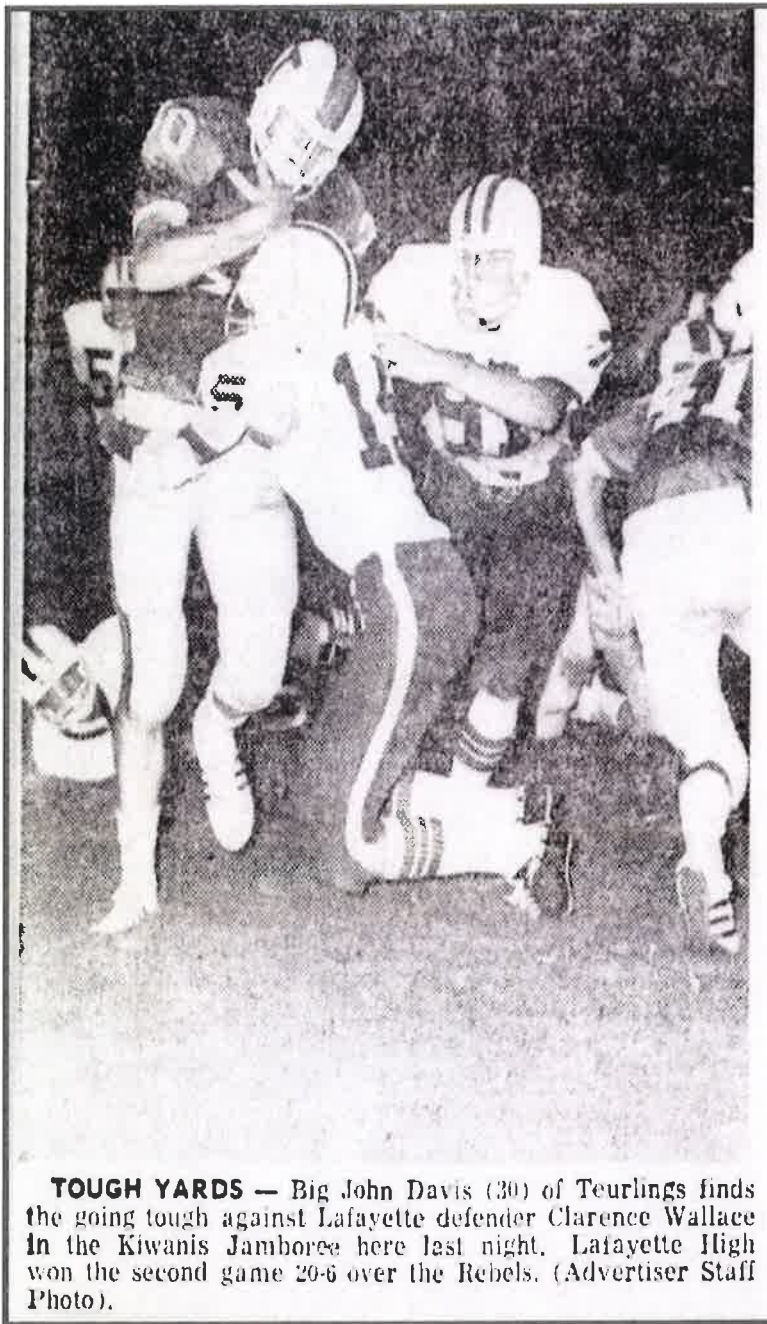

Lafayette High scored the first two times it had the ball and went on to dump an out-classed Teurlings ball club.

The Mighty Lions drove to their own 49-yard line but ran out of steam and punted. The Teurlings' receivers could not hold on to the ball and Ricky Dupuis and Robert Durkee both grabbed it for the Lions at the Rebel 22.

From there the Lions took six plays to get in for the TD. Art Ley covered the final three yards plunging through the line for the six-pointer. The kick by Ley was off to the left, and the Lions led 6-0 with 5:05 left in the first half.

The next time they got their hands on the ball they scored again. Lafayette partially blocked a Teurlings punt and got possession at the Rebel 37. Four plays later quarterback Gary Meyers hit prime target Billy Ryckman on a 12-yard pass for the touchdown. Val Aucoin squirted and squirmed his way into the endzone for the two-point conversion and the Lions led 14-0 at the half.

Then it was Teurlings' turn for some action. Meyers stepped back to pass on a third and 25 situation in the opening series of the second half and was promptly intercepted. Kenneth Fuselier of the Rebels grabbed off the errant Meyers aerial and raced untouched 10 yards into the endzone for the only Rebel score of the game. The kick failed and with 8:37 left in the game the Lion still led 14-6.

Thursday and Friday night mark the opening of gridiron action for the area teams in District 5 - AA and 7 - A as they will clash with non-district foes.

One of the top contests will take place Thursday night when the Cathedral - Carmel Tigers will host the cross town rival, Fatima Warriors at Clark Field. The Lafayette Lions junior varsity squad will also open its schedule Thursday night as they will travel to Delcambre to meet the Panthers.

In Friday night's action the Teuring Rebels will take on the Holy Rosary Eagles at Clark Field.

In other action in the area we find the Vermilion Catholic Eagles traveling to Jeanerette; Berwick taking on St. Francisville; Notre Dame at Jennings; Elton hosts Erath; Central Catholic at Morgan City travels to Franklin to meet the Hanson Tigers.

St. Edmunds will trek to Ville Platte to meet Sacred Heart and Basile will be at Plaisance while Patterson plays host to Morgan City.

Thursday night's contest between the Cathedral Tigers and the Fatima Warriors will be a real grudge battle, as both teams will come from opposite sides of town and meet at Clark Field to decide who is the better of the two.

Cathedral will come into the contest with a small squad, not only is size but in number. The

Tigers have 22 members on the squad and lack the needed depth.

Coach Linden Berecegey stated, "The Tigers will be small and inexperienced. Our overall speed is our greatest factor as we have a quick and dedicated group of boys. Only our team speed and a dedicated effort will allow us to stay on the same field as our opponents."

The Tigers are coming off an 8 - 1 league record of last year and will be trying to best that mark with only five starters returning from last year's squad.

Cathedral seems to be on the right track as they dumped a big and heavy Acadiana Ram squad last Friday night in the Kwanza Jamboree, 7 - 0.

The Fatima Warriors will be under the guidance of head

coach Jim Edney, who is in his second year at Fatima.

Coach Edney and his squad tied a much larger Northside Viking team in the jamboree, 7 - 7, and will have a few surprises awaiting the Tigers.

The Warriors lost the opening contest last year to Cathedral, 30 - 6, and have been waiting all year for another shot at the Tigers.

Fatima finished 3 - 7 last year and are looking for a winning season this year. Coach Edney feels that his main problem will be to replace six of the seven linemen lost from last year's squad, through graduation.

Edney will start David Fournet at quarterback and will have Danny Bourque and Mike Hebert in the backfield.

Berecegey will start David Oregeron at the signal calling spot. Oregeron will have Rick

D'Annis and Charles Jumonville with him in the backfield.

The Teuring Rebels will be under new head coach Roy Pendergraft. Pendergraft comes to Teurlings upon graduation from USL where he was a four year letterman in football and named to the All-GSC decade team from 1969 to 1969.

The Rebels are coming off a 20 - 6 beating by the Lafayette Lions in the jamboree and should be better prepared Friday night when they meet the Holy Rosary Eagles.

Pendergraft stated, "I don't know that much about Holy Rosary but I do know that they will have a much more improved club over last year."

Barry Johnson will be at quarterback and will have Daniel Duhon and John Davis in the backfield with him.

There has been just one major injury on the Rebel squad when Johnny Jordan bruised his kidney's. Jordan was the starting fullback but was replaced by Davis.

The Lafayette JV will be on the road Thursday night as they will travel to Delcambre to meet the Delcambre Panthers.

The Panthers usually open their schedule with the Lions as it turns up to an evenly matched contest.

Delcambre defeated the younger Lions last year but says and the going tough as the Lions will bring a determined bunch to the contest.

Top man for the Panthers will be quarterback Mark Landry. Landry is the returning signal caller from last year and will be the most experienced man in the backfield for the Panthers.

The Teurlings Rebels will start off the new 1972 season in District 7 - A with a new head coach. He is Roy Pendergraft, the kicking specialist of the University of Southwestern Louisiana of a season ago.

Pendergraft brings two Southwestern former players, Harold Tridico and Ed Doyle with him as assistants at Teurlings.

The Rebels will be trying to rebound from a dismal season last year as they went 2 - 8 overall and 1 - 7 in District 7 - A competition.

Pendergraft feels like his team does have overall improvement as he has six three - year lettermen returning to the squad.

Four are returning to familiar backfield spots on offense and defense. Barry Johnson, a 6 - 6, 165 - pound quarterback; John Davis, a 6 - 1, 125 - pound fullback; Daniel Dubon, a 5 - 10, 163 - pound halfback and Ray Patout, a 5 - 8, 150 - pound linebacker all are back.

On the line end Ken Fusellier, a 5 - 11, 160 - pounder and tackle Randy Boudreaux, a 6 - 1, 210 - pounder are ready for action.

Also back are lettermen David Dugas at end, Bill Covillion at center and Tim Dugas at halfback.

Johnson will run the club from his quarterback spot from a Pro offense, and Jeff Breaux is a backup quarterback. Johnson also does all of the kicking for the Rebels.

Pendergraft lists Sacred Heart, Loreauville and Vermilion Catholic as the teams to defeat in the district with Fatima ranked as his next toughest foe.

With Johnson at quarterback and Dubon and Davis along side of him the backfield is full of good runners. Thus, the Rebel offense may be a ground - control type of attack.

The Rebels also have a fine defense as Pendergraft notes, "We have a good defensive line and our secondary is all lettermen."

So look for the Rebels to be improved over last year's second - to - last place finish.

Teurlings opens its new season September 8 at Clark Field in a game against intracity rival Holy Rosary. Then the Rebels turn immediately to district competition as they meet Dulcambre on the road, Sacred Heart in a home game at Northside Stadium, Vermilion Catholic in Abbeville, and Hanton at home in Clark Field.

They will next tackle non - district foe Basile and then finish with four 7 - A league games in the form of Loreauville on the road, Fatima at Clark Field, Erath away and Patsance at home in Clark Field.

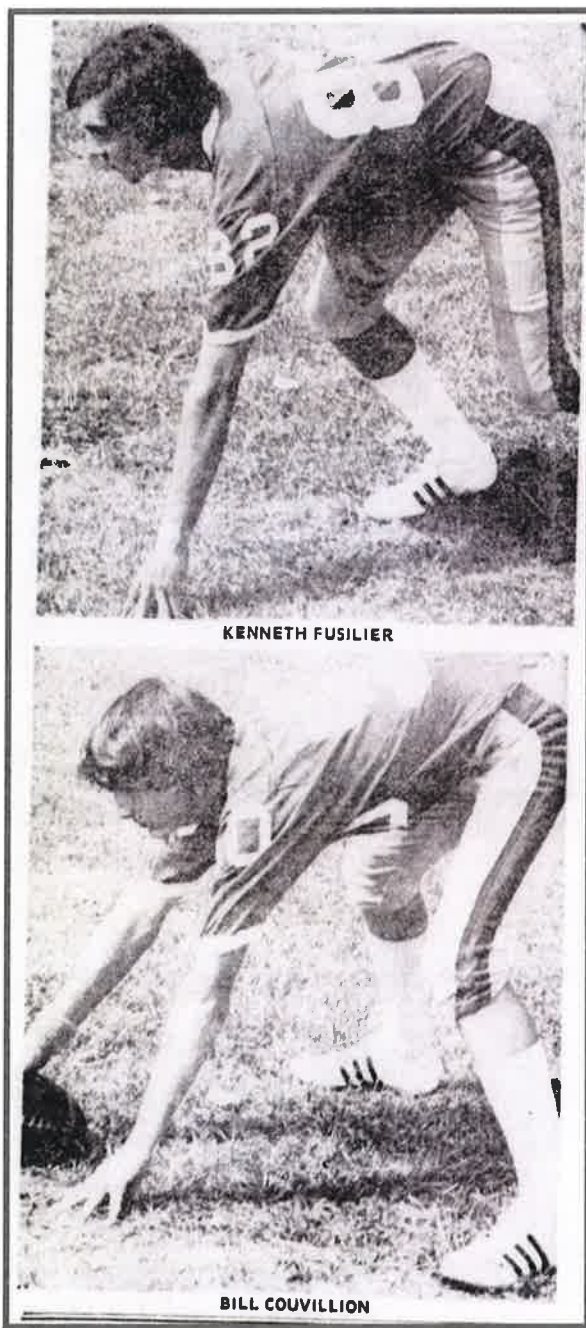

Teurlings Takes Win

The District 7-A Teurlings Rebels raced up and down the field on their District 5-AA opponent Holy Rosary Eagles and gave new Head Coach Roy Pendergraft a fine debut as they whipped the Eagles 20-0 in a non-district intracity struggle here last night at Clark Field.

The Rebels who have been out of contention in the Class A title in their district for some time, showed signs of new life under their new head coach as they whipped the physically bigger Eagles.

Quarterback Barry Johnson, a 6-6, 163-pound senior rambled two yards on a keeper for the first Rebel score of the night in the first quarter if action in the game. The kick for the extra point failed, but the Rebels had a 6-0 lead after 12 minutes of action. That score stood at the half.

Then in the third quarter, the Rebels struck paydirt again. This time it was big 6-1, 195-pound senior fullback John Davis who took the pigskin in on a three-yard off tackle slant. The run for the two-point conversion failed, but the Rebels had established a 12-0 lead in the game.

Later in the third period of action big 6-1, 210-pound senior tackle Randy Boudreaux of the Rebels along with team-

mate Mark Foley tackled the Holy Rosary quarterback in the end zone for a safety added two points to the Teurlings tally and the Rebs then led 14-0 at the third period break.

The Rebels came back to add insult to injury in the fourth frame when their fine wide receiver 5-11, 160-pound senior Kenneth Fuseller snatched a 24-yard pass from quarterback Johnson and stepped into the end zone for the final Rebel score. The run for two points failed again as the Teurlings squad found the PATs hard to come by. But they had upped their winning margin to 20-0 and gained momentum for their District 7-A opener next week against the Delcambre Panthers in Delcambre.

Holy Rosary meets 5-AA favorite Notre Dame in the league opener for those two clubs next week also.

Fuseller picked up four passes from Johnson during the night for 121 yards of the Rebels' 176-yard passing total in the game.

Fullback Davis carried the ball 13 times for 56 yards to lead all rushers in the game. The Rebels amassed 127 yards on the ground for a total offensive attack of 305 yards in the game.

Johnson hit on 10 of 20 passes and the Rebels minimized mistakes losing their only fumble of the night.

Fatima, Teurlings, Slated For Big Friday Contests

District 7 - A once again will have its squads put to the test as a district competition goes into its second week of play.

Heading the district after one week of play is Sacred Heart of Ville Platte, Teurlings of Lafayette, Loreauville and Erath.

Last week Sacred Heart defeated Hanson, 27 - 0; Erath edged by Fatima, 13 - 7; Teurlings came from behind to topple Delcambre, 16 - 13, while Loreauville gave Plaisance a whipping, 46 - 0.

In this week's games we find Teurlings at home to meet Sacred Heart at Northside, Fatima travels to Plaisance, Loreauville will host Delcambre and Vermillion Catholic is at Hanson.

Erath will have a night off from district play as they will be at home to take on the Gueydan Bears in an inter-district encounter.

The Fatima Warriors will be looking for their first win of the season this week when they load the bus to travel to Plaisance.

The Warriors are coming off a narrow defeat last week when they fell to the Erath Bobcats. Plaisance also found it tough going against a high spirited Loreauville squad.

Coach Jim Edney of Fatima is not taking the Plaisance bunch lightly. Edney said, "They have a bunch of good individual athletes, they are real quick and can score at anytime."

"They have fast backs which can be called game breakers along with a real fine throwing quarterback" stated Edney.

"Overall they're an improved football team from last year. They have fair size in both their offense and defensive lineups," commented Edney.

Edney will start Mike Judice (120) and Ben Thibeaux (135) at the end positions. At the tackles will be Jerry Smith (170) along with Paul Landrum (175). In the guard spots are Vance Lanier (140) and Robert Monju (160). The center position will be anchored down by Jerry Truxillo (140).

In the backfield the Warriors will start David Fournet at

quarterback. Fournet will be accompanied by Fritz Williford and Danny Bourque in the backfield. Rounding out the backfield is Mike Hebert, who will be back at his wingback position.

In the Warriors loss last week, Bourque and Williford both did outstanding jobs in the rushing department. Bourque was the leading rusher with 100 yards including a run of 53 yards which set up the only Warrior touchdown.

Williford also did a yeoman job for Fatima as he rushed for a total of 52 yards on the night.

The Teurling Rebels will have their work cut out for them this week as they will host a tough Sacred Heart ball club.

Sacred Heart was rated the number one team in the state last week by the Louisiana Sports Writer Association. The Trojans kept that rating this week as they shutout a tough Hanson Tiger team in their first district outing.

Teurlings was also victorious in their first district game as they came from

behind to defeat the Delcambre Panthers.

The Rebels will bring their small, scrappy ball club, who has that never - say - die attitude, into the game in hopes of an upset, which is possible.

The Rebels were led last week by quarterback, Barry Johnson. Johnson scored both Rebel touchdowns in the fourth frame to defeat the Panthers. Johnson will be called on again this week to lead the Rebels.

Top-Rated Sacred Heart Decisions Teurlings Rebs

The Sacred Heart of Ville Platte Trojans used the powerful running of halfbacks Mike Fontenot and Biff David and a strong defense that limited the Teurlings Rebels to a minus yards rushing for a 44-8 triumph over their District 7 - A rivals Friday night at Northside Stadium.

The Trojans, ranked No. 1 in Class A football circles, looked every bit as powerful as they are built up to be. Teurlings, coached by Roy Pendergraft, could not get their offense together against a very tough front line for the Trojans.

The Rebels scored their only tally in the third quarter after Sacred Heart had built up a 26-0 lead. This was the first score of the season off the Trojan defense that had previously shut out St. Edmund's of Eunice 28-0 and Hanson of Franklin 29-0.

Sacred Heart scored once in the first quarter and twice in each of the remaining three quarters to account for their 44 points.

The Trojan offense has scored 101 points in three games for a 33.7 per game average. Greg Jones, Cowboy Lemoine, and David each scored twice for the Trojans.

Tim Dugas of Teurlings caught a 21 yard scoring strike from quarterback Barry Johnson for the lone Rebel tally.

Johnson had a rough night against the Trojans as he was

able to complete only 6 of 20 passes for 74 yards. He was intercepted twice, David picking off both errant aerials.

Johnson was plagued by the hard rushing front line of the Trojans, led by tackle James Brou and guard Bobby Jones. The Rebel quarterback was thrown for losses totaling 53 yards attempting to pass.

Johnson handled the punting chores for Teurlings and had a busy night getting off eight kicks for a respectable 27.8 average.

Tim Vidrine, sophomore signal caller for the Trojans, had considerable success for his top-ranked team. Vidrine hit on five of nine passes for 94 yards and two touchdown strikes, both going to Greg Jones, a fine receiver who showed fine hands and good speed while snagging three passes for 72 yards.

Fontenot, a pint-size 140-pound halfback, and David, a 160 pound running back, led the Trojan ground attack that rolled up 261 yards.

Fontenot ran 16 times for 89 yards, averaging 5.6 yards a tote. David carried for 81 yards, also in 16 attempts for an average right at five yards a try.

Charlie Dugas of the Rebels managed 17 yards in two attempts for the lone bright spot in the Teurling ground attack.

Sacred Heart scored its first touchdown late in the first quarter following a Rebel punt. Vidrine fired a scoring strike to Jones from 20 yards out completing a six-play, 50 yard

march. In this drive, David made a fine run around left end picking up 13 yards and putting his team in scoring position.

The Trojans added two TDs in the second stanza, the first coming on a three yard burst up the middle by David and the second by Lemoine also on a three yard scamper.

Lemoine scored again in the third quarter on the Trojans' longest sustained drive of the contest. Following the Rebels' touchdowns, the Trojans took the kickoff at their own 26 yard line and consumed 3:10 on the clock as they ground out 74 yards in six plays.

David and Fontenot made long runs on the march, David going around left end for 25 yards and Fontenot taking his chances around the Rebel right end for 30

yard. Both runners made good moves to the outside and both were run out of bounds by John Davis, Teurling linebacker.

Davis was a bright spot in the Teurling defense as the 180 pound senior was the mainstay of the Rebel defensive corps. Davis, well-known for his galling ability, made the Trojans wish he was hitting his three wood instead of Trojan runners.

Lemoine scored his two touchdowns on good efforts with hard inside running. He, David, and Fontenot provide the surging Trojans with a powerful ground attack comparable to any team in the Acadiana area.

Sacred Heart rounded out its 44 point effort with two tallies in the fourth quarter. Jones scored again on a 30 yard strike from Vidrine while David crashed in from the one with only seconds left in the game.

Milwaukee Files Suit Against Atlanta Hawks

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Milwaukee Bucks said Friday they have filed suit against the Atlanta Hawks in Atlanta Federal Court, seeking \$3 million in punitive damages and an injunction to prevent the Hawks from playing brilliant forward Julius Erving.

Bucks President William Alveron said the Hawks, as a member of the National Basketball Association, violated the league constitution and bylaws by attempting to play Erving.

Erving signed a \$1 million contract with Atlanta last spring after jumping the American Basketball Association's Virginia Squires. The Hawks signed Erving before announcing it and before the Bucks chose him in the NBA draft.

Atlanta twice used Erving in preseason play, and each time was fined \$35,000 by NBA Commissioner Walter Kennedy. The Hawks then filed a \$2 million antitrust suit against the NBA and its member clubs, seeking an injunction to prevent the league from imposing fines and forfeitures of games for playing Erving.

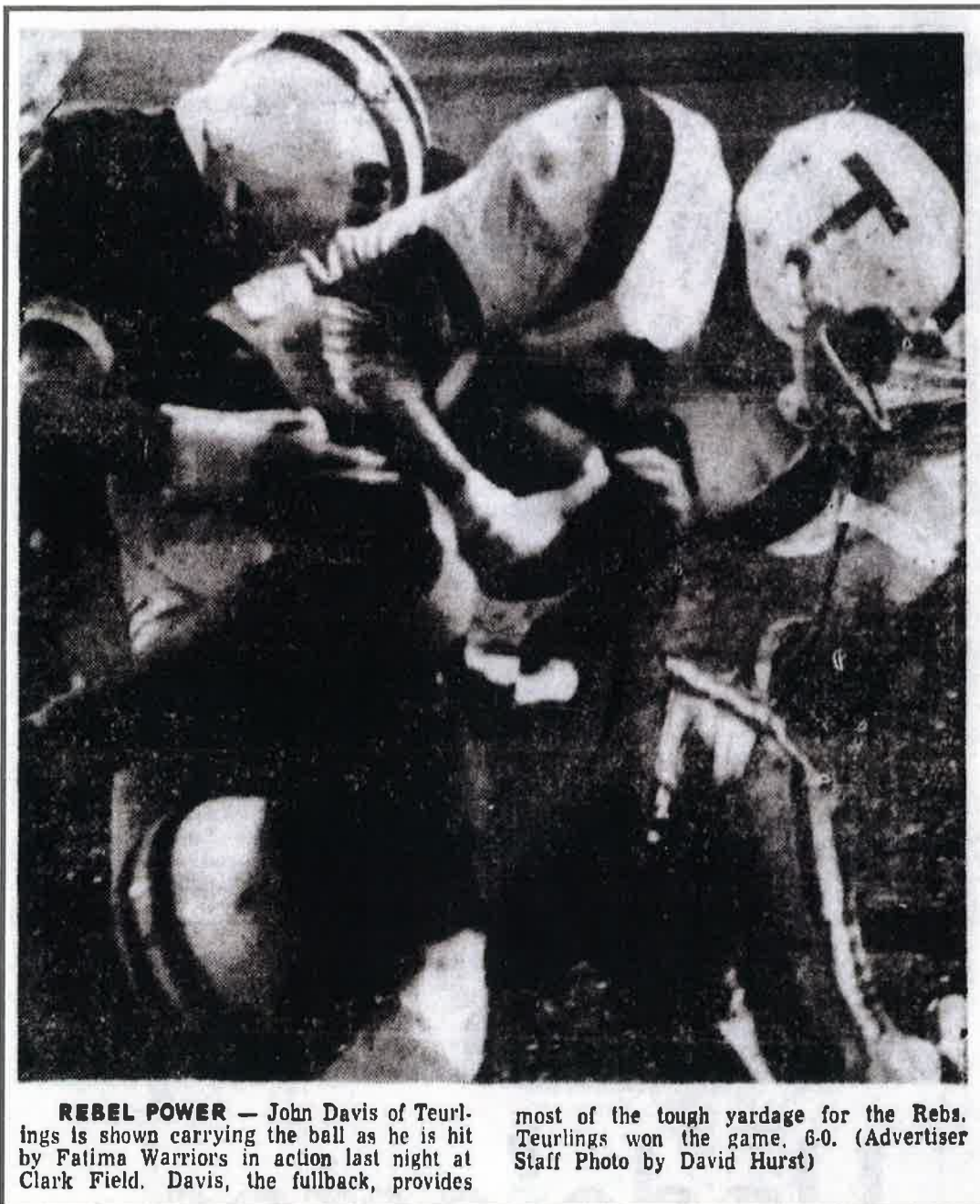

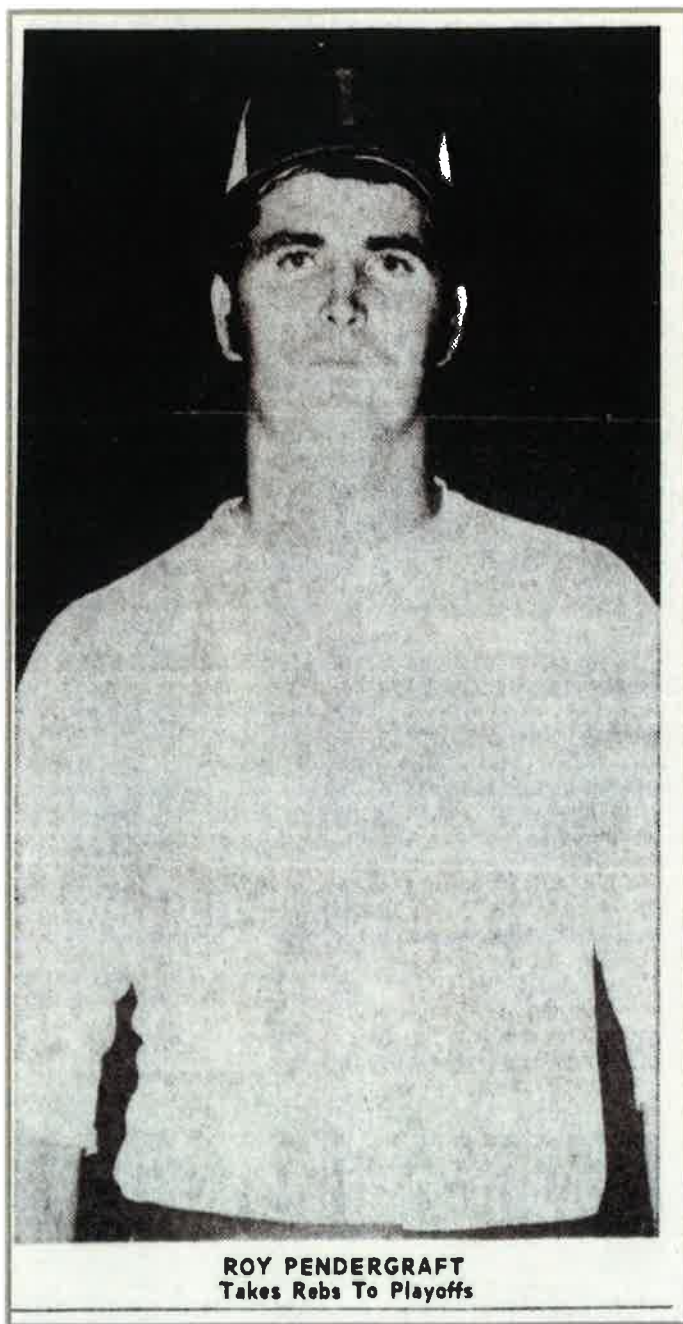

Trojans Top Star Squad

Sacred Heart of Ville Platte, District 7-A champion, dominated the all-district football selection for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association as 62 170-pound senior was well the Trojans landed four players rewarded for his outstanding on the offensive unit and added another four on the defensive team.

The Trojans also walked away with two of the three top honors in the league as Sacred Heart provided the Outstanding Defensive Player in the district and the Coach of the year.

Teurlings of Lafayette, runner-up in the district, grabbed the Outstanding Offensive Player of the district honor and placed four players on the All-District squad, two on offense, and two on defense.

Barry Johnson was selected as the Offensive Player of the Year for his fine efforts during the regular season. Coach Bobby Soileau was named Coach of the Year as Johnson, a quarterback, had a total offense of 1,570 yards.

Johnson completed 61 of 114 passes (54 per cent) this season for a total of 1,097 yards. In the rushing department, Johnson rushed for 479 yards. He scored a total of 62 points during the regular season. The Sports Writers Association as 62 170-pound senior was well the Trojans landed four players rewarded for his outstanding performance.

Bill Guillory, a 6-0, 195-pound senior, from his middle linebacker position was the leader of a defense which allowed only four touchdowns, 26 points and shutout seven teams. Guillory was credited with 70 individual tackles, six fumble recoveries (one which he ran back for a touchdown), one pass interception and six blocked passes. Guillory was also credited with tackling opposing quarterbacks for 86 yards in losses on pass attempts during the season, and his action caused five fumbles. For this performance he was named as Defensive Player of the Year. Coach Bobby Soileau was named Coach of the Year as he brought his team back from

an early season loss to win the district crown. In regular season Soileau coached his team to a 9-1 record.

Named with Johnson in the offensive backfield are the three running backs. In Bill David of Sacred Heart, John Davis of Teurlings and Danny Hidalgo of Hanson.

David was Sacred Heart's leading offensive running back. The 5-10, 165-pound junior carried the ball 135 times during the season for a total of 978 yards, an average of 7.2 yards per try. He scored 12 touchdowns and added six two-point conversions for his 90 points. He also attempted three passes and completed three for 54 yards, one for a touchdown. He was on the receiving end of six passes for 31 yards.

Teurlings' John Davis rushed for a total of 577 yards in 135 carries, an average of 4.3 yards per carry. He also caught 17 passes for 301 yards. Hidalgo paced Hanson running attack as he carried the ball 156 times for 780 yards. He scored seven touchdowns.

Earning the tight end position on offense was Delcambre's Clement George while Vermillion Catholic's Terry Leger was named the split end. George caught seven passes this season for 235 yards and three touchdowns. Leger had 19 receptions for 147 yards and he scored 17 points on pass conversions and place kicking. Sacred Heart's Rick Ortega and Loreauville's Donald Miller were the selections at the tackle positions. Hanson's Ben Lave and Sacred Heart's Paul Carrel were the guards while Ed Lalour of Sacred Heart was named as the center.

With Guillory on defense as the linebackers were Teurlings' Ray Patout and Loreauville's Mike Ryan. Patout was credited with a total of 79 tackles this season, 41 individual tackles and 38 assists. Ryan was the leading tackler in the district with 83 individual tackles and 59 assists. He also had one pass interception.

The three deep backs on defense were Johnson of Teurlings, Paul Bourgeois of Vermillion Catholic and Bob Jones of Sacred Heart.

On the defensive line the ends were Sacred Heart's Larry Fontenot and Loreauville's Dennis Tripeaux. Miller and George were named as the tackles, while Ortega filled in the middle guard position.

Lafayette, Comeaux Top First All-Parish Picks

If you were a high school coach, how would you like a backfield of four prep graders that could account for 4,061 yards in one season?

That is just the case as the Sports Department of the Lafayette Daily Advertiser today announces a first, the 1972 Lafayette All-Parish team.

Eight of the nine parish schools are represented on the all-star team with the District 3-AAAA runnerup Lafayette Lions edging the District 5-AAA champs Comeaux Spartans by one in the total number of players on the squad.

The Lions who dominated the offensive statistics among 3-AAAA clubs, a record in dominating the All-Parish ofensive team grabbing four of the 11 places while putting three in defense.

Comeaux, the top 5-AAA ofensive and defensive team, claimed three spots on the

mythical offensive star team and two on defense. Comeaux nabbed two of the special awards and Lafayette one.

Top Offense

The Spartans had their top offensiveman, 5-8, 155-pound senior tailback Harris Eugene, named the Outstanding Offensive Player for the team. Eugene, topped all of the all-star running backs with 1,532 yards on the season on 222 carries for a 6.9 per carry average.

The Spartans also had their first-year coach, Mike Simmons, named the Coach of the Year. In citing Simmons, the Advertiser notes that Simmons not only led his squad to a perfect regular season and district record (10-0 and 5-0), but also that the ability as head coach to recognize the talent and abilities of his assistants, which he continually brought to the fore during the year.

The Lions of Lafayette, who led the 3-AAAA teams in defense, until the game against

Salpêtre in which they were beaten 21-7, grabbed the Outstanding Defensive Player award with safety Forrest Wright.

Enemy Aerials

Wright, a 5-6, 172-pound senior, picked off seven enemy aerials, recovered four fumbles, and according to his coach, Bob Maffour, "saved four games with his defensive play." The Lion safety was also named to the 3-AAAA All-District first team, and Eugene was also on the 5-AAA All-District top squad. Simmons, too, drew the Coach of the Year award from his 3-AAAA peers.

Among the best Lion offensive men on the all-star club were Val Aubrey, a 5-9, 150-pound senior running back and Donnie Perry, a 6-2, 180-pound quarter-

back. Aubrey, part of the four who tallied 4,061 yards, nabbed 65 on 124 carries for six touchdowns and a 5.1 average. He also caught six passes for 29 yards and a TD for a 72.5-yard total.

Was Phenomenal

Perry was phenomenal at quarterback against the tough competition of 3-AAAA. He carried 121 times on the ground for 492 yards and six TDs, giving the Lions a third running back. His total is also taking into consideration the yardage he lost trying to pass when his receivers were covered.

He threw the ball 144 times and completed 65 for 1,053 yards and nine touchdowns for a 44.8 completion percentage. Perry threw nine interceptions. The stellar Lions also caught nine screen passes and rambled 30 yards for a TD on the play.

The other running back named to the All-Parish team is Acadiana's Emmanuel Guidry, a 6-1, 179-pound senior fullback. Guidry only played a little over half the season at fullback for the Rams, but still rolled up 312 yards on 67 carries for a 4.7 average. He also caught 26 passes for 283 yards for a 72.5-yard total. That's

quite an accomplishment for only about five games played.

Other Lions on the first and second wide receiver Bill Rivkin, the phenomenal class-flopper wonder of the Lions; and offensive tackle Robert Vannoy.

Best Blocker

Vannoy, a 6-1, 265-pound senior, was decorated by Maffour as the best blocker on the first team, and part of the line that made the way for three running backs to run over 1,000 yards for the Lafayette club.

Eckman, a 5-11, 160-pound senior, had 12 receptions on the year for 624 yards and six touchdowns. But his stats did not earn his berth on the all-star team. It was his consistent drive to get to the football, displayed time after time on beautiful diving catches that kept him drives from stalling all year long.

Comeaux's offense, even that, made the all-star team besides Eugene were wide receiver Ronnie Lewis, a 6-1, 194-pound senior and Guy St. Marie, a 5-9, 200-pound junior guard.

St. Marie was the only senior on the offensive team and one of two local graders to make the squad both ways. He also made the team as a defensive lineman. Acadiana's Emmanuel Guidry was the other grader

to make it both ways, as, in addition to his running back spot, he claimed his specialty—a deep back spot.

Lewis Nabbed

Comeaux's Lewis nabbed 14 passes on the year for 414 yards and six touchdowns to lead the 3-AAA receivers.

The other offensive members on the all-star team were Northside's Mike Langdon, a 6-2, 170-pound senior tackle; Carver's Lee Billeaud, a 6-0, 219-pound senior tackle and Calhoun's John Lopez, a 5-11, 172-pound senior that was the Lions' top lineman.

The three Lafayette Lions on the defensive team were 5-11, 209-pound tackle Billy Stott, 6-2, 180-pound junior cover Robert Durkee and Wright. Stott and Durkee were the two leading tacklers on the tough defense of the Lions.

In Addition

In addition to St. Marie on the defensive line, Comeaux also played linebacker Steve Newsum, a 5-10, 163-pound senior, on the team.

Acadiana's All-District nose guard Patrick Francis, a 5-11, 180-pound devastating defense-

man, led the defensive line which also saw 5-10, 229-pound senior Larry Holloway of Carver and 5-10, 155-pound junior Fritz Willford of Fatima join the squad.

In addition to Durkee and Newsum, Teurlings' Ray Patout, a 5-9, 145-pound senior, joined the linebackers. Teurlings' also placed Barry Johnson, a 6-2, 176-pound senior at deep back along with Wright and Guidry.

Johnson had some fine performances at quarterback also for the Rebels in leading them to the runnerup spot in District 5-A, but was named to the first team defense in lieu of the fine performance of Perry at quarterback.

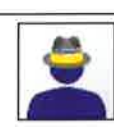
