A new coaching staff and 20 returning lettermen should make for a very interesting season at Teurlings High School this year.

Coach Charles Tatman, defensive co-ordinator at perennial AA power Sacred Heart of Ville Platte for the last six years, is beginning his first year as boss in Rebel land.

Assisting Tatman will be Bobby Badeaux, who will double as basketball coach, Gary Maddox, track coach, and Bobby Green.

The Rebels started off with a bang last season, as they blanked Northside 14-0 in the Kiwanis Jamboree then opened the season with a 12-0 whitewashing of Carencro.

Defense Strong

Teurlings held the next two opponents scoreless, as well, but the Rebel offense stalled from there and couldn't cross the enemy goal line the next two games and ran their record to 1-0-2 after three contests. At that point injuries started to take their toll, which caused the shorthanded Rebels to lose their last six contests.

Catholic High came to town and gave the Rebels a 20-0 thrashing but powerful St. John's of Plaquemine had to hold off a late Teurlings charge to take a 17-13 win a week later.

After the Rebels took a 3-0 lead over District runner-up Cathedral on a Tommy Badon field goal a week later, mistakes took over and the Tigers walked away with a 27-3 decision.

A bad snap over the punter's head in the closing minutes of the game allowed 6-AA champ Notre Dame to squeak by with a 12-7 win in the third to last encounter. Next opponent was Erath and the Bobcats shutout the Rebels 16-0 while Loreauville put the dampers on with a 14-9 win in the season finale.

Tatman Optimistic

Coach Tatman is very optimistic for in his first year as Rebel leader and is looking for a good season from his troops.

"I am looking forward to the coming season," said Tatman. "I think we have the nucleus of a good team returning from last season and we should be very competitive when we get on the field."

Tatman will have a bevy of seniors back from last year's team, which includes running back Blaine Hollier and quarterback Jamie Camel. Both are three-year lettermen, with the 5-9, 165-pound Camel set to generate more offense, and the 5-6, 175 pound Hollier coming off an impressive showing at the Louisiana Tech football camp.

Joining Hollier in the backfield will be Michael Camel, also a three-year monogram winner. The 5-7, 160-pound halfback poses a double threat because he is a good pass receiver when coming out of the backfield.

Three-Year Lettermen

Stellar end Jimbo Hebert and guard Tommy Badon are the others with three-letters. Possessing great hands, the 6-1, 165 pound Hebert catches

most passes thrown his way. He also doubles as the team's punter and averaged over 40 yards per kick last season.

Badon, a 5-10, 205 pound guard will be looking for his third straight all-district honor this season. He handles the placekicking duties for the Rebels and is very dangerous from anywhere inside the 50-yard line.

Greg Gerami will team with Hebert at the end, while Michael Begnaud will anchor the other side of the line at the guard position. Terry Leblanc and Sean McDowell will team to handle the tackle spots. Leblanc is a returning starter from last year and is 6-0, 195 pounds. McDowell is a 6-4, 220-pound letterman.

Spearheading the defense will be five seniors who labor both ways for Teurlings. Hebert and Camel will handle the safety positions, Badon at the tackle, Begnaud playing nose guard, and Leblanc crashing over the quarterbacks from his end position.

Teurlings-Carencro

Teurlings has a new coach in Tad Tatman and 20 returning lettermen in hopes of improving on its one win of a year ago.

Tatman, defensive coordinator for AA-power Sacred Heart of Ville Platte for the past six years, has a bevy of seniors returning in Blaine Hollier, Jamie Camel, James Hebert and Tommy Badon.

Camel, a 5-9, 165 senior will handle the signal calling for the Rebels this season, a slot he's held since his freshmen year. Hollier, a 5-6, 175-pounder, returns to bolster the running attack after being one of the leading ground gainers on the team last season.

Also expected to log playing time in the backfield will be Michael Camel, also a three-year letterman. The 5-7, 180-pound senior also poses a double threat as he is extremely tough coming out of the backfield for the pass.

Both Hebert and Badon are after their fourth letters performing for the Rebels on the gridiron. Possessing great hands, the 6-1, 165-pound senior has the knack of catching anything thrown toward his area. He also doubles as the team's punter and has been booming the football over 40 yards a try.

Badon, a 5-10, 205-guard, will be after his third district selection. The stellar guard also handles the placekicking duties for the Rebs and is extremely dangerous from anywhere inside the 50 yard line.

Returning to bolster the line is 6-0, 195-pound senior tackle Terry Leblanc. He will be flanked by Sean McDowell, a 6-4, 220-pound senior who has one monogram under his belt.

Varied Schedule Awaits 5-AAA In First Week

The teams of District 5-AAA kick off their seasons tonight when Kaplan travels to Eunice. Loreauville takes on St. Martinville, Cecilia invades Sunset, Teurlings tackles Carencro, Abbeville goes against tough Lafayette, Jeanerette tussles with Berwick, and Breaux Bridge plays Port Allen.

Kaplan-Eunice

The Kaplan Pirates, fresh from their jamboree romp of Erath, take on a tough Eunice team that Eunice Coach Lee Roy Taylor says, "Might surprise somebody this year, the attitude and desire we've had this fall has been tremendous."

The Pirates are led by junior quarterback Craig Duhon, who piloted his team's win over Erath. With Duhon in the backfield will be workhorse back Richard O'Brien, who netted 116 yards rushing in the jamboree,

overcome some gaps on defense that were caused by graduation. The offense seems to be in pretty good shape with an experienced line and quarterback. Lonnie Guidry returns for his second year as commander of the wishbone offense his team employs. Also expected to help Guidry carry the offensive load will be 5-8, 160-pound running back Dale Benoit and receiver Pat Davis.

Last year, Benoit scored 20 points and rushed for 526 yards. Davis had 15 receptions for 400 yards and scored 38 points. If all goes as expected and the young players come around, it could be an interesting season for the Bulldogs.

For Sunset, quarterback ace Armand Brinkhaus heads the returners for the green and gold. Brinkhaus, in addition to completing 43 passes for 628 yards and eight touchdowns, also rushed for an additional 250 yards and scored two touch-

downs last year. Tailback Blaine Miller and wingback Gene Barry, both with over 200 yards rushing and three or more TD's, also are back.

Speed, quickness and experience are the assets Sunset will build upon. Lack of overall depth and size could be problems.

Carencro-Teurlings

Carencro will have an all-senior offensive unit, led by quarterback Rusty Smith. Others in the backfield include Scotty Comeaux, who rushed for 450 yards in 90 carries last year. Rounding out the backfield will be 6-0 180-pound Etne Constantine.

The Golden Bears will employ the veer offense in hopes that it will turn their season into a winning one. Coach Jerry Griffith's team has, in his words, "fair size and great spirit," but Griffith feels his most important asset is his abundance of seniors (29).

For the Rebels, this will mark

the first season for new coach 'Tad' Tetman. Tetman was the former defensive co-ordinator for AA power Sacred Heart of Villa Platte before coming to Teurlings.

Abbeville-Lafayette

The Abbeville Wildcats try to defend their district 5-AAA title which they won last year. The Wildcats took the playoffs, eventually losing to state champ Litcher.

Gone from the Abbeville backfield is all-state running back Barry Herbert. Senior quarterback Tony Frederick returns to run the Wildcats explosive "Slot T" offense. He will be joined in the backfield by Albert Eady and swift Rodney Davis. Spearheading the defense will be Martin Scalisia, member of the 1975 defense that gave up but 74 points.

The Lafayette High Mighty Lions hope to do better than their 5-4-1 record of 1975. Robbie Mahfouz returns as quarterback after having broken his

Golden Bears Claw Rebels By 14-7 Count

A lot of motivation and a smart second half game plan helped the Carencro Golden Bears vault past the Turlings Rebels 14-7 in the opening game of the 1976 season at Carencro field last night.

With Turlings ahead 7-2 going into the second half, the Golden Bears came out of the dressing room with fire in their eyes. This great motivation, Carencro Coach Jerry Griffith explained by saying, "the people in our school who criticized us for our play against Comeaux in the jamboree, helped motivate our players. I did not have much to do with it. They (the players) wanted the game very badly, especially for Coach Mike Landry (offensive coordinator) and Coach Tony Palermo (defense coordinator)".

Bombs Work

In truth and in fact it was the eagle eye of the Carencro coaching staff that meant the

difference in the game. A weakness was discovered in the Rebel defense that allowed the Bears to strike for TD's on the same play twice in the second half. The play, a fly pattern down the sideline yielded two touchdowns, both coming on a pass from Bear quarterback Rusty Smith to fleet receiver Dean Butler. The first one went for 50 yards down the left sideline and the second for 68 yards along the right sideline.

Coach Griffith explained the situation, "Our coaches saw that the Turlings' defensive backs were coming up to cover against the run a little faster than they should have. So what we did was hammer into the line on a number of successive plays and then hit them with the pass."

The Rebels outplayed the Bears in the first half, moving the ball almost at will as they totalled eight offensive series to only five for Carencro.

First half play was marred

by fumbles, interceptions and a bevy of penalties. One fumble by the Turlings Rebels worked to their benefit, when on their first possession, running back Mike Camel slammed into the line, fumbled the ball which was picked up by teammate Sport Perrodin, who raced 60 yards for the touchdown.

Strong Defense

Carencro got on the scoreboard by virtue of its strong defense that swarmed all over Turlings' runners in the second half. After a tremendous 68-yard punt by Carencro's Wayne Doucet that put the Rebels in a hole on the two-yard line, the Bear defense went to work and, two plays later, they cornered Rebel back Mike Camel in the end zone for a two point safety.

Right after the safety the Rebels punted to the Bears who did not wish to handle the ball, which is considered "live." Turlings jumped on the ball with good field position at the

45. On the very next play Rebel runner Mike Camel bulled through the middle of the line breaking two or three tackles and racing 55 yards for the TD. Unfortunately an illegal procedure penalty cost the Rebels the touchdown.

From then on the pumped up Carencro defense held the Rebels in check. With a minute left in the game Turlings tried one last time to mount a touchdown drive, only to have the ball stolen away on an interception by Stafford Stuart.

Final-Second Penalty Costs Teurlings Victory

An illegal procedure call in the last few seconds of the game cost the Teurlings Rebels a field goal and ended the contest at 6-6 with the Vermilion Catholic Screaming Eagles Friday night at Clark Field.

The Rebels' Tommy Badon kicked a 40 yard field goal with :04 seconds left but a Teurlings player lined up offsidess which nullified the score and brought the ball five yards further where he tried again but the ball fell short to end the contest.

"We just beat ourselves again tonight," said an unhappy Teurlings head coach Tad Tatman. "We made too many mistakes and turnovers. When a team has a first and goal and can't score they will not win."

A pass interception led to the Rebel touchdown. With 3:36 left in the initial period, the Rebels Mike Camel intercepted a Charles Matt

pass attempt at the Rebel 38 and returned it 27 yards back to the VC 35.

From there, the Rebels went in for the score in five plays as David Davis ran up the middle for a 15 yard gain as time ran out in the first quarter. The PAT was wide to the right but the Rebels led 6-0.

The Rebels stayed on the ground in the drive and ran the ball up the middle of the VC line the whole way. Blaine Hollier got things started with a four yard gain with Camel getting five and Hollier coming back for five more. Camel busted up the gut for five then Davis scrambled in from there.

After each team had a change of possession at the start of the second period, the Eagles took the ball on the Teurlings 45 where they recovered a fumble and pushed the ball across in seven plays.

With 5:36 left in the quarter, Matt hit John Fontana on a six yard TD pass to tie the contest at 6-6. The pass for the two

point conversion was dropped to end the scoring for the night.

The big play in the drive was a 16 yard run up the middle by Marc Villien which gave the Eagles a first and goal at the Rebels' 10 yard line.

Teurlings had a golden opportunity to score at the start of the second half when they recovered a fumbled pitch by the Eagles which Sport Perrodin recovered at the Eagles' 17 yard line.

On a first and 10 at that point, Camel gained seven up the middle and Hollier rushing for four more. From that point the VC defense stiffened and, with took the ball to the 10 by 4:46 left in the quarter, a Badon field goal attempt was wide to the left to end the threat.

Vermilion Catholic had a chance to score at the start of the final period but another fumble cost the Screaming Eagles another score with 6:14 left. The Eagles had two big plays

in the drive with Villien busting up the middle for 18, while Jim Greco came back for 11 to put the ball on the Rebels' 22 yard line. Villien went off right tackle for nine and Greco rushed for three more to put the ball on the 10 where they fumbled and Perrodin recovered to end the threat.

The Eagles had 10 first downs to the Rebels' nine but Teurlings had a total offensive output of 241 yards compared to VC's 190.

Vermilion Catholic, 9-A representatives, are now 1-0-1 for the young season while the 6-AA Rebels are 0-1-1.

It doesn't seem to matter what Calvin James tries in athletics — he just naturally seems to excel.

The Comeaux senior, who plundered District 5-AAAA defenses as a tight end in football and a center-forward in basketball a year ago, was shifted to tailback this season by Spartan Head Coach Mike Simmons. The results thus far have been little short of spectacular.

Last Friday night was a case in point. Operating in only his second regular season game at his new position, James rambled, jammed, twisted, and stomped for 200 yards in 28 carries against former 5-AAA rival Abbeville.

Leads Win

That production, in addition to his first half touchdown runs of two, 19, and 13 yards, paced the Spartans to a 20-6 first half lead and an eventual 20-14 victory. His showing thus enabled Comeaux to even

For his performance, James has been named Offensive Player of the Week in area high school football.

This week's defensive honoree is Mike Camel of Teurlings.

Makes Tie Possible

In a contest dominated by stout defensive play, which ended in a 6-6 tie between Teurlings and Vermilion, it was Camel who made the Rebel points possible.

With 3:36 to play in the first period at Clark Field Friday night, Camel picked off a VC pass attempt by Charles Matt at the Teurlings 38 and rambled 27 yards with the theft to the Screaming Eagles' 35.

His pickoff generated the only scoring drive of the night for the Rebels, which ended with a 15-yard TD run by David Davis.

Camel thus joins James as an honoree by being named Defensive Player of the Week.

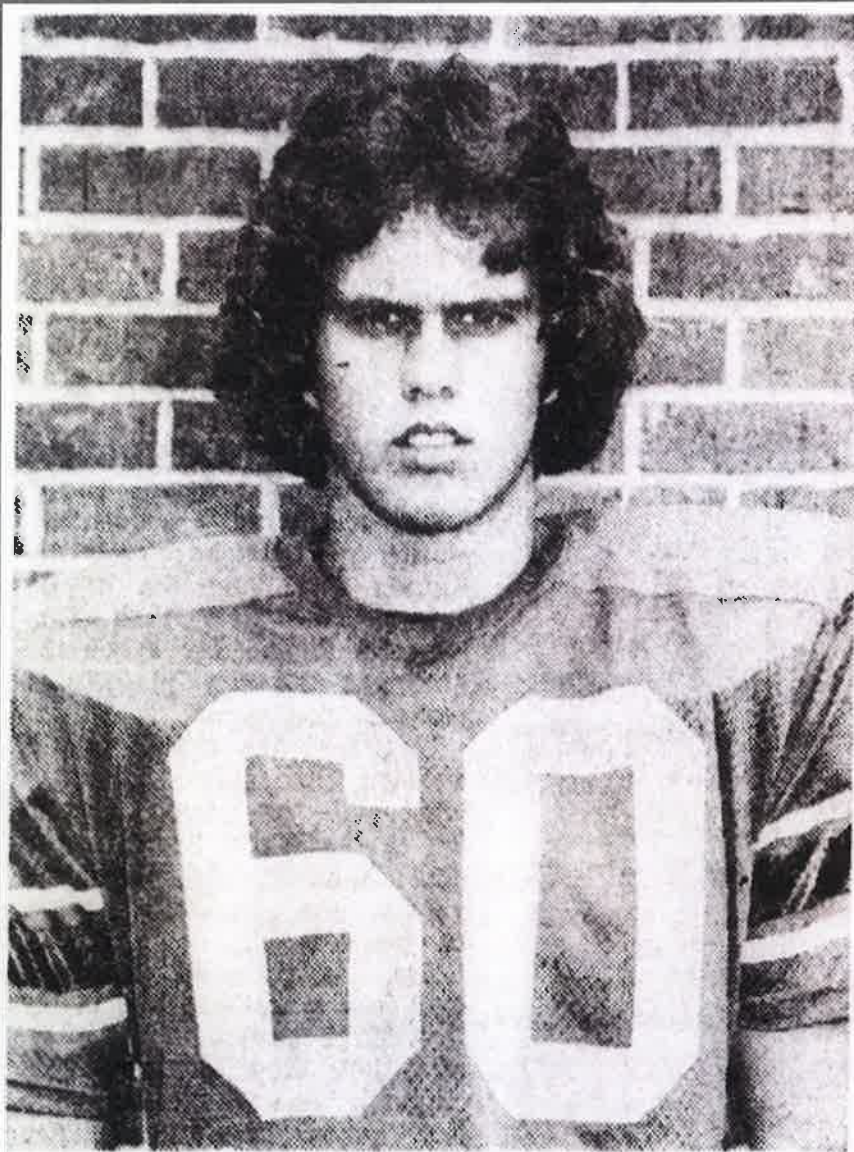

Williams, Revere Lead Tigers To Comeback Win

Danny Williams and Roy Revere led the Cathedral Tigers to a 22-20 come-from-behind victory over the fired-up Teurlings Rebels in a key 6-AA district contest played Friday night at Clark Field.

Williams scored two touchdowns and rushed for 96 yards on 23 carries, while Revere tallied once and ran in two extra point conversions. The big junior running back also toted the ball 23 times for 196 stripes.

The Tigers had 21 first downs to the Rebels' nine and had a total offense of 363 yards, while limiting Teurlings to 203. Cathedral rushed for 321 yards on the ground and added 42 through the air while the Rebels gained 118 stripes via the rush and went to the pass for 85 more.

The fired up Rebels scored two quick touchdowns before the Tigers knew what hit them.

Teurlings took the opening kickoff at its own 45 yard line and promptly marched the length of the field with Mike Camel going over from the one yard line with 6:31 left in the period. Tommy Badon split the uprights and the Rebels led 7-0.

The TD drive took 14 plays with Blaine Hollier carrying

four times for 15 yards. Teurlings got a big break in the drive when Cathedral was penalized 15 yards, down to the 12, for pass interference.

From that point, Hollier carried for three up the middle and Camel went for two off left tackle to the one, where Camel rambled in for the score.

Cathedral took the ensuing kickoff and marched to its own 85 yard line where the Rebels' Craig Broussard intercepted a Mike Morgan pass and returned it all the way to the Tigers' six yard line.

From there, Kevin Bernard rushed for two and, after a two yard loss and a Tiger penalty, Jamie Camel kept around left end and went in for the score with 4:17 left in the opening period. Badon's PAT kick was again true and the Rebels led 14-0.

After a stout Cathedral defense forced the Rebels to punt at the start of the second quarter, the Tigers went to the ground game and finally dented the scoreboard when Revere went off left tackle with 8:19 left. Revere also scored the two point conversion but the Rebels still led 14-8.

Revere was the big rusher in the drive as he toted the ball four times and picked up 43

yards. Morgan also went to the pass and combined with Andre Toce for a 19 yard toss.

The Tigers took the kickoff after intermission at their own 27 and marched the length of the field in 14 plays where Williams took it in from three yards out with 5:06 left. The extra point kick failed and the contest was tied at 14-14.

Revere and Williams ran up the middle of the Rebels' line for 62 yards on the drive with Revere rushing six times for 33 stripes and Williams rushing for 29 yards on seven attempts.

Williams scored what proved to be the game clincher with 1:42 left in the third period when he went off left tackle from one yard out. Revere ran around left end to add the two point conversion to give the Tigers a 22-14 lead.

The score came after the Tigers had scored and recovered the ensuing kickoff on the Teurlings' 32 yard line. The Tigers stuck to their game plan, (running up the middle), as Revere and Williams kept rushing the ball and Morgan added three yards on a keeper around end.

Cathedral held the Rebels at bay after the kickoff and forced them to punt. The Tigers took over at their own 10 and started

rushing up the field where Williams coughed up the ball at the Teurlings' 35.

The Rebels came to life and went in for the score when Blaine Hollier took a pitch around right end and rambled down the right sideline for a 44-yard run with 4:40 left in the game. The pass for two failed and the Tigers were ahead 22-20, which ended the scoring for the night.

Big plays in the drive were a 20-yard pass from quarterback Jamie Camel to Sport Perrodin and a six yard grab by Hollier from Camel.

The Tigers improved their record to 4-2 on the season and 2-1 in district play while the Rebels dropped to 1-4-1 and 0-2 in district tilts.

Prevost Leads Pioneers To Win

The Teurings Rebels could do nothing right and the Mike Prevost-led Notre Dame Pioneers could do nothing wrong, a situation that usually makes a football game something less than interesting.

Friday night at Clark Field was no different as the visiting Crowley natives outclassed the younger Rebels by a 26-0 count.

The Rebels took over the ball at their own 40 yard line after Leo Clements' opening kickoff rolled out of bounds. On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Jamie Camel kept for five yards and the Rebels showed their usual first quarter spirit. On the next play, Camel found James Hebert open for a first down at the 49 yard line of the Pioneers. From that point the Pioneers came up with three straight quarterback sacks that pushed the Rebels all the way back to their own 24 yard line. After a booming 50-yard punt by James Hebert, the Pioneers took over for the first time from their own 20 yard line.

From that point the Pioneers engineered an 80 yard drive in just 13 plays with Prevost doing most of the work. This initial drive was an excellent indicator of the entire game as Prevost picked up 72 of the 80 yards on the drive and scored the touchdown from four yards out with 3:35 left in the initial stanza. Clements added the extra point to make the score 7-0.

Rebels Frustrated

Offensively the Rebels were a totally frustrated ball team as the bigger Pioneer defense made short work of the Rebel offensive line. It was rare for the Rebels to keep the ball longer than five plays in a row as they punted a total of six times.

On the next possession the Notre Dame crew rammed the ball straight down the field again, going 58 yards in eight plays with Prevost scoring again, this time from the one. Clements again added the extra point to up the Notre Dame lead to 14-0.

Late in the third quarter, the Pioneers put together their third touchdown drive, this one going for 86 yards in just 11 plays with Prevost, who's name began getting monotonous, going in from six yards out.

Notre Dame's final score of the big offensive night came with 23 remaining in the final period. It was Prevost again doing the honors from five yards out to establish the final 26-0 Pioneer margin of victory.

It was definitely Prevost's night to shine as he carried the ball 38 times for 213 yards and all four of the Notre Dame touchdowns. In the last two contests for the Pioneers, Prevost has picked up 516 yards and is well over the 1,000 yard mark for the season, and is a definite all-state candidate along with the much heralded anchor of the Notre Dame defense, Benji Thibodeaux.

There were some bright spots for the Rebels as punter-

receiver James Hebert had an excellent night punting the ball. He booted the pigskin six times for a more than respectable high school average of 37 yards.

Tommy Radon also turned in an excellent performance for the Rebels, making most of the big plays turned in by the Teurings defense. Radon's magic foot got a rest last night however, as his offensive teammates failed to get him in field goal range at any point in the contest.

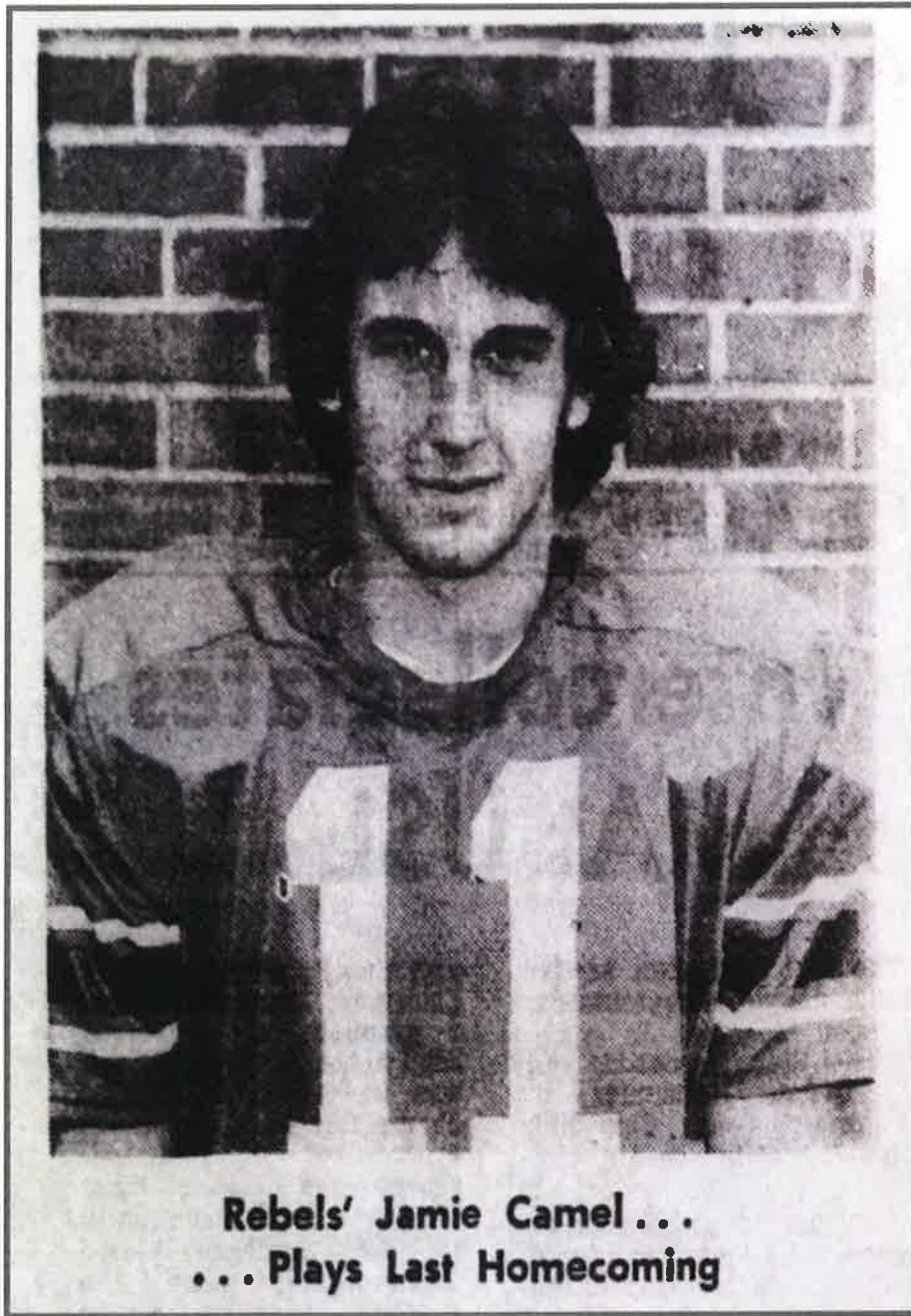

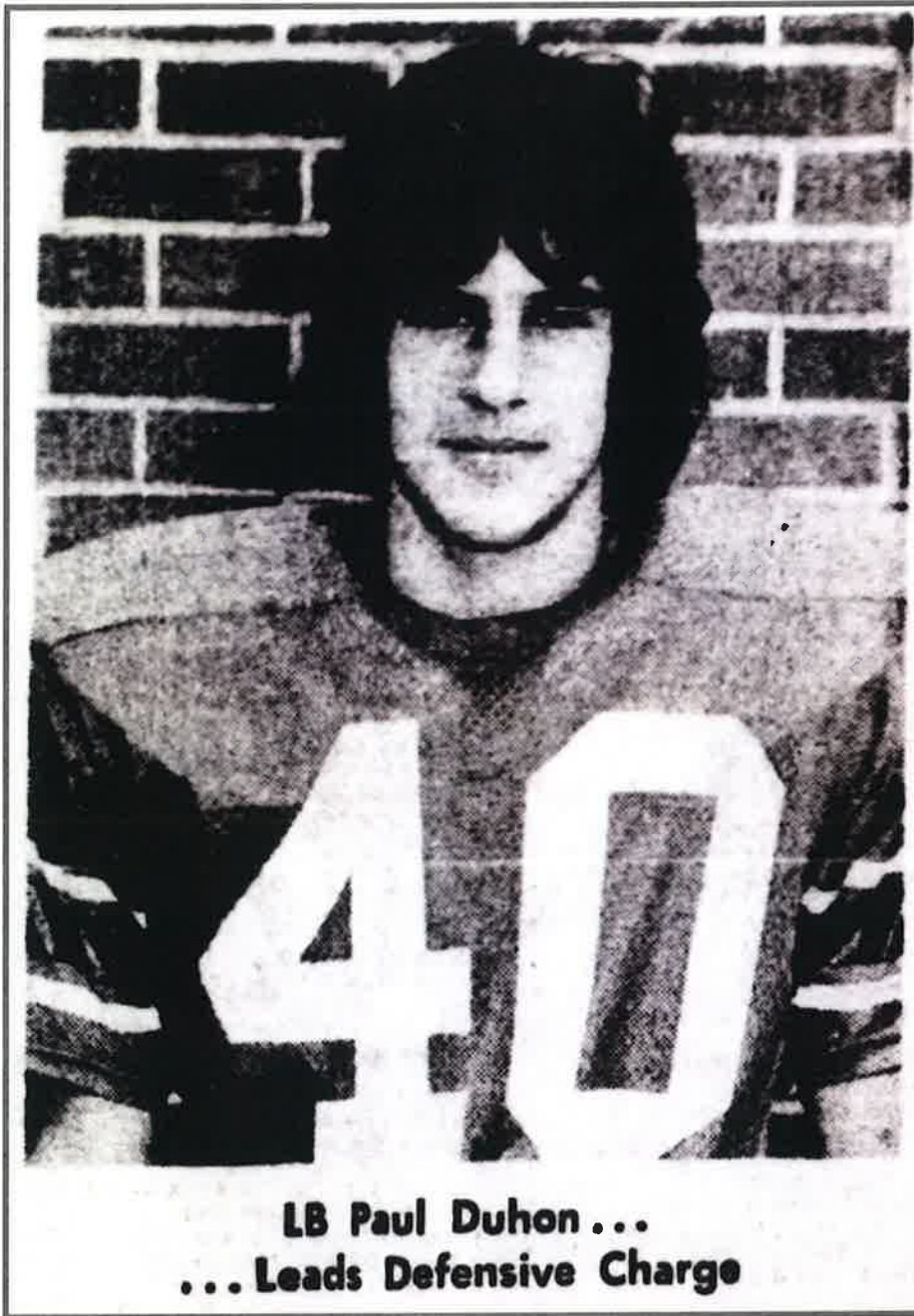

Prevost, Thibodeaux Top 6-AA All District Picks

Mike Prevost and Benji Thibodeaux of district champs, Notre Dame, captured the top honors on the 1976 6-AA All-District squad that is being released today by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

Prevost was awarded the outstanding offensive player award while Thibodeaux took the laurels as the defensive player of the year.

Being a run oriented team, the Pioneers handed the ball off to Prevost most of the time and the stellar running back proceeded to rush for 1,424 yards on 254 attempts. The 5-10, 160 pound senior also averaged 5.6 yards per carry and tallied 18 touchdowns.

Thibodeaux, one of the top defensive players in the area, was credited with 75 tackles from his noseguard position. The tough lineman also had 14 sacks behind the line of scrimmage and had 38 assists.

Outstanding Coach

Honored as the outstanding coach in the league is the Pioneers' head mentor Ashton Cassidy. He led his charges to a perfect 10-0 overall record and a 5-0 slate against district foes. In all, the Pioneers landed nine spots on the mythical team with tight end Jimbo Hundley, center David Walker, guard Jimmy Fontenot, Prevost and Thibodeaux all landing berths on the offensive unit.

The Pioneers had five players make the defensive team with end John Fruge, Thibodeaux, Fontenot and halfback Jimmy Landry all landing berths.

Others making the first "11" on offense were split end Andre Toce of Cathedral; guard Ricky Barras of Catholic High; tackle Tommy Badon of Teurlings; quarterback Seb Patout, Catholic High; and the running backs were Danny Williams of Cathedral and Keith Simon of Loreauville.

Defensive Unit

Rounding out the defensive unit are tackle Monte Hoag, Catholic High, defensive end James Hebert, Teurlings; linebacker Anthony Adams, Loreauville; Roy Revere, linebacker, Cathedral; Terry Willis, cornerback, Loreauville and cornerback Sport Perrodin, Teurlings.

Hundley was the top receiver for the run oriented Pioneers this season with six grabs. The 6-4 senior was used mostly to open holes for the vaunted Pioneer ground attack but caught most of the aeriels thrown his way and rambled 134 yards and scored one touchdown.

Toce led the Tigers in passes caught this year with 15 grabs which resulted in 330 yards and two tallies. The first year player also made six two-point conversions in the nine games that the Tigers played this season.

Barras manned the strong side guard position for the Panthers this season and was instrumental in opening holes for the Catholic High Panthers to go through. The 5-7, 165 pound senior, is considered to have good speed and is a good blocker.

Fontenot, a 5-11, 175 pound junior, was one of the main cogs in the Notre Dame running attack. He is a very good blocker and the Pios ran plenty of traps to his side of the line.

Ran Ball

The Teurlings Rebels ran the ball over the tackle spot most of the time this season

he was credited with 31 stops and 12 sacks. He was also in on 12 assists.

Hebert was a top threat for the Rebels this season from his end spot. The 6-1, 175 pound senior was credited with 47 unassisted tackles and 41 assists. He also recovered one fumble during the year.

Thibodeaux teamed with Hundley from his noseguard position to give the Pioneers one of the toughest lines in his state to run against. The stellar athlete is considered to be the best player that Coach Cassidy has had in his 18 years of coaching.

Defensive Tackle

The other tackle on the defensive front wall is Hoag, a 6-0, 190 pound junior considered to be a strong blocker who has good pursuit from sideline-to-sideline.

Heading the linebacker corps is Adams of Loreauville. The 5-10, 175 pound senior was credited with 100 tackles and was one of the main reasons why the Tigers were in the

district race until the final night of the season.

Cathedral's Revere, a 6-0, 180 pound junior, was the top Tiger linebacker with 70 unassisted tackles, 65 assists and had two interceptions.

Fontenot, a 5-11, 175 pound senior, was in on 39 stops last season and recorded five sacks behind the line of scrimmage. He also had 21 solos to his credit.

Tough Cornerback

One of the toughest cornerbacks in the area, Terry Willis is described as a real hitter. The 5-11, 180 pound senior had 150 tackles on the season as most teams ran away from his side of the field.

Perrodin had 50 tackles to his credit this season. The 5-10, 165 pound senior also recorded seven fumble recoveries and intercepted three passes.

Landry, a 5-9, 150 pound junior was in on 20 tackles this season had eight unassisted tackles to his credit. He also intercepted three passes in 10 games.
