

Four different Vikings got into the scoring habit Friday night as Northside High drubbed the Teurlings Rebels 26-0 in the 26th Annual Kiwanis Football Jamboree held at Lafayette High Stadium.

In the nightcap, Acadiana moved out to a 14-0 lead, then had to hold off a charging Lafayette team as the Rams trimmed the Lions 14-9. Friday night's action was the culmination of the two-night jam that began on Thursday evening.

New Iberia defeated Carenro 13-0 and Comeaux and Cathedral fought to a scoreless tie in Thursday night's openers.

#### NORTHSIDE-TEURLINGS

Viking tailback Vincent Victor got the ball rolling for the winners when he raced 49 yards for the first score with less than three minutes gone in the first of two 15-minute halves. Victor started left then reversed field to scamper untouched to paydirt.

Northside tallied once again before the half to put a severe damper on the Rebels' hopes of pulling off an upset. After taking a bad snap from center, Mike Arnold took it upon himself to try for a first down. He did that and more as he skirted down the left sideline 59 yards for a touchdown.

The Vikings made it 20-0 with 12:05 remaining in the game when quarterback Mark Veillon dived one yard for the score. The third Northside touchdown was set up when the Vikings recovered a Teurlings fumble at the Rebel 27 yard-line. It took the Vikings just three plays to cash in on the mistake.

Northside put the icing on the cake with 3:03 left in the contest as Jeff Hooks hauled in a six yard pass from Lionel Rodriguez for its final score.

Victor set up the touchdown by intercepting a Rebel pass and returning it to the Teurlings 23.

Northside had a decided advantage in the rushing department as the Vikings rolled for 129 yards in 24 carries. In contrast, Teurlings could manage only 20 yards in 17 totes.

The Rebels' only consolations were their better passing and first down stats. Teurlings hit on five of 14 tosses for 73 yards and had seven first downs, while Northside connected on but one of five passes for six yards and five first downs.

#### ACADIANA-LAFAYETTE

Following Lafayette's longest drive of the night, Acadiana took over and launched its own march for the first score of the game. Ram QB Hardy Nix put the initial six-pointer on the board as he took it over from one yard out. The sneak culminated a drive that took 12 plays to complete. The 80-yard march came to a close with 2:45 left in the first half.

# Rebel-Trojan Tilt Tops 7-AA

The second week of the football season begins Friday night for 7-AA teams and four of the six teams will be looking for their first wins of the young season.

Cathedral, a 25-0 winner over the Rayne Wolves, and Notre Dame, 17-0 conquerors of the Eunice Bobcats, were the only two teams in the district to claim opening night victories.

The Teurlings Rebels lost a 19-0 decision to Ascension Catholic; the Erath Bobcats were shut out by Vermilion Catholic; Catholic High lost a 4-0 defensive struggle to Opelousas Catholic; and Kaplan dropped a 20-0 game to Abbeville.

This week's schedule finds Teurlings hosting the Sacred Heart Trojans at Clark Field; Cathedral travelling to Loreauville; Notre Dame entertaining Abbeville; Kaplan on the road against Vermilion Catholic; Catholic High at home against St. Martinville; and Erath greeting the Hanson Tigers.

## SACRED HEART-TEURLINGS

According to Teurlings Head Coach Tad Taitman, the contest that his team will be playing Friday night against the Trojans will be "the game of the year."

"It means plenty to me and the school," stated the head coach when asked what the game meant to him. "I think that the game will be a real dog fight and the dog that is the hungriest will get the bone."

The Rebels will be blessed with the return of mercury-heeled runningback Kevin Bernard who was out due to injuries in last week's loss to Ascension Catholic.

Teurlings will also have halfback Scotty Hollier, who did a good job of carrying the ball and picked up 32 stripes on six carries Friday night. Scott Blakely, who gained 43 yards on eight totes, should also log plenty of time carrying the pigskin.

Anchoring the defense is Blakely who had nine solo tackles, nine assists and recovered to fumbles in garnering Advertiser defen-

sive player of the week laurels. Also coming up with a fine performance was Ronnie "Mean Green" Judice who came up with five solos and four helpers from his tackle slot.

The Trojans run from multiple sets and from the line of defense and play either a 6-5 man-to-man or 5-3 man-to-man on defense.

Returning to help bolster the Trojan running attack is 6-0, 165 pound senior all-district fullback Stephen Guillory, who is an All-State candidate, according to Taitman.

Handling the signal calling for the perennially tough school is Jay Puchau, a 5-10, 150 pound senior, with guard Paul Corell, a 5-9, 165 pound junior, opening most of the holes in the line for the backs to go through.

## CATHEDRAL-LOREAUVILLE

The Tigers of Cathedral Coach Linden Bercegeay will be looking to gain their second win of the season, but more important they will be trying to avenge a loss that they suffered last year.

Cathedral was completely outplayed in the first half against the Wolves Friday night but still held a 13-0 lead at the break as fleet-footed Albert Jumonville ran back two punts on runs of 65 and 70 yards.

Roy Revere scored the first touchdown of the second half for the Tigers on a 16-yard run up the middle, and Mike Lopez hauled in a 29-yard strike from Todd Duke for the second tally.

Loreauville was shut out by St. Martinville, but did manage to gain 160 yards on the ground and had 10 first downs to eight for the winners.

## ABBEVILLE-NOTRE DAME

Both teams will be gunning for their second straight wins of the season and a real battle is expected between these two gridiron powers.

Notre Dame continued its winning ways, by extending its winning streak to 16 straight, with the win over the Bobcats Friday night.

David Lamboussy scored the first Pioneer TD when he hauled in a nine yard pass from quarterback Pat Trahan.

The Pioneers' signal caller connected again with Todd Gardner for a 31-yard pass in the second quarter, with Leo Clement splitting the uprights on a 28-yard field goal to end ND's scoring for the night.

Abbeville completely outplayed the Pirates in its opening game victory as Ricky Leger scored two touchdowns and Barry Simon caught a 26-yard TD pass from Darren Dubon.

Both teams will be looking to break into the victory column after suffering opening night defeats.

The Bobcats lost a tight defensive battle to Vermilion Catholic but managed to gain more first downs (7-5) than the Eagles.

# Tatman Overjoyed As Rebels Dump V C, 26-6

"After beating Sacred Heart and Vermilion Catholic on two consecutive weeks," commented a happy Teurlings Head Coach Tad "Doc" Tatman, "if I'd die right now Heaven would be a letdown."

Those words were spoken right after the Teurlings head coach got a chance to run up into the stands and flag the writer down after his young but determined Rebels completely dominated the Vermilion Catholic Eagles by a score of 26-6 Friday night at Clark Field.

"I am extremely pleased

with the way the guys came back after they went ahead in the first quarter," said Tatman. "They just kept plugging away. We were very fortunate to win 26-6."

## Leading Rusher

Kevin Bernard was the leading ground game for the Rebels as he poked up 57

strikes on 14 tries, while Scott Holter came up with 42 yards on eight tries.

On the defensive side of the ledger, Ronnie Judice came up with seven solo tackles and five assists, while Randy Reed coming up with six in 15 attempts and four assists.

The Eagles scored the first touchdown of the game in the initial period when quarterback Charles Matt found John Fontana in the flat and hit him for a 20-yard strike with 1:43 left. The kick for the PAT failed.

Teurlings forced from first quarter pat-tries to zero-wins in the last three periods and

stopped everything that the Eagles tried to do.

## Fell Behind

After falling behind quickly the Rebels scored eight points in the second stanza, eight in the third period and tied the contest with 10 points in the final 12 minutes of play.

The first Teurlings' rally came on a one yard run up the middle by quarterback Mark Breau with 4:12 left before intermission. The Rebels elected to go for the two point conversion and Bernard went over right in back for the score to end the first half scoring with the Rebels out front 8-6.

Teurlings took the half at its own 48 yard line and drove in to score in six plays. The big play of the drive was a 37 yard scamper by Bernard which put the ball on the VC 11 yard line.

After the Eagles made a stout defensive effort by holding the Rebs on a fourth and seven at their own five yard line they took over on downs and, after two unsuccessful tries at running the ball, Matt dropped back to pass but his aerial was intercepted by VC linebacker Paul Olivier who ran the ball in for the TD with 3:50 left in the stanza. Bernard again ran the two point conversion over for a 16-8 Rebel lead.

## Kept Plugging

Teurlings kept plugging away with the defense looking like a bunch of wildcats as they would not let the Eagles move the ball in the final 12 minutes of play.

The Rebels scored their final TD of the night with 6:34 left when Bernard ended a 10-play, 35-yard drive by sweeping around end from the two yard stripe. Teurlings again sent for two and Scott Holter made it into the endzone for the PAT for a comfortable 24-6 lead.

Teurlings asked off to the visitors from Abbeville and the Eagles look over on their own 21 yard line. It took the Rebels only two plays to score again as Ronnie Judice went to work and sacked Matt two straight times, the first on a 19 yard drop and the second was for two yards and line safety. In end the night's scoring and send Vermilion Catholic home 24-6.

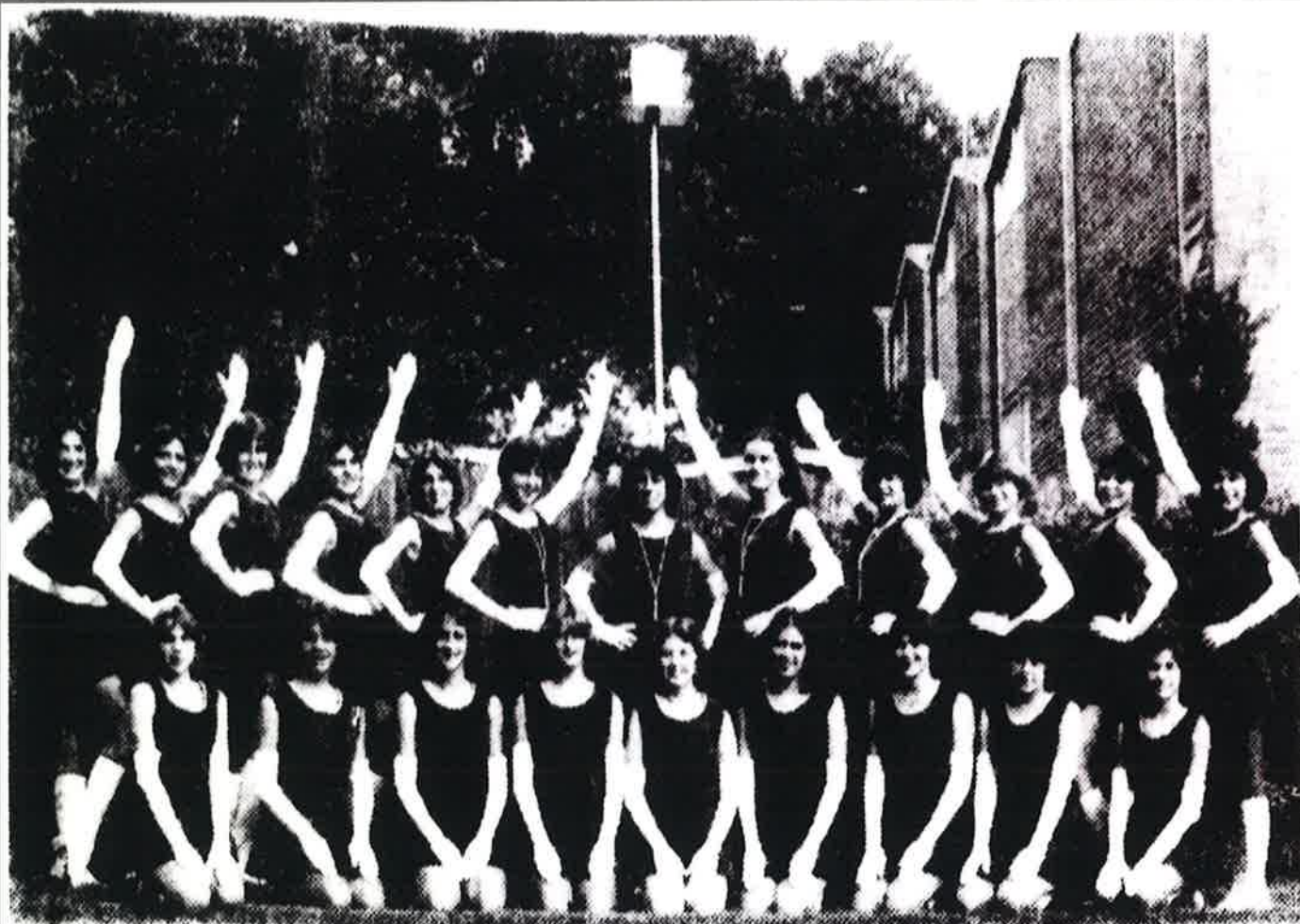

"The defense had to win it for us tonight," stated an overjoyed Rebel head mentor, Tad Tatman, "and when we had to come through with the big play, we did it."

"I'm especially pleased with this win," Tatman went on to say, "since I am from this area, and since this team has not done something like this for several years."

## Three Straight

Tatman was referring to the fact that Teurlings has now won its last three games, a winning streak it has not achieved since 1972.

The head coach was also right in saying that the defense kept the Rebels in the contest, as the first score was set up by a Glen Gerami interception, and the second by a strong rush on the punter, making the kicker rush and boot the ball short.

Terry Tauzin turned in an outstanding performance for the sticky Teurlings defense. Tauzin intercepted all four passes the Rebels got their hands on as he time and again thwarted several Plaisance scoring threats.

Tatman was extremely pleased with his defense's showing against the Indians. "Our defense did a tremendous job out here tonight. We kept them from penetrating our end of the field inside the 34, and when you do that, somebody is doing well."

"The guys just did what was needed to win," Tatman stated. "I couldn't be prouder of this group of kids."

Kevin Bernard swept the right side for five, but a five-yard penalty brought the ball back to the 25 on second down. Bernard got that back plus one on the next play, however, and Scott Blakely bounced for seven and a first at the 12.

Bernard fumbled, but raced to the seven and a penalty

against the Indians gave the Rebels a second and one at the three. Breaux kept for the first at the one on the next attempt, then Hollier capped off the march one play later when he went off right tackle into paydirt for the TD.

Bernard failed to reach the goal line on the two-point conversion try, but with 8:01 remaining in the third quarter, Teurlings had the only points it would need with the 6-0 advantage.

Plaisance never threatened seriously at any time in the contest, moving to the Teurlings' 32-yard line in its most productive drive. The Indians could move across to the Rebels' end of the field only four times, driving to the 34 and 35 on two different occasions in the first half.

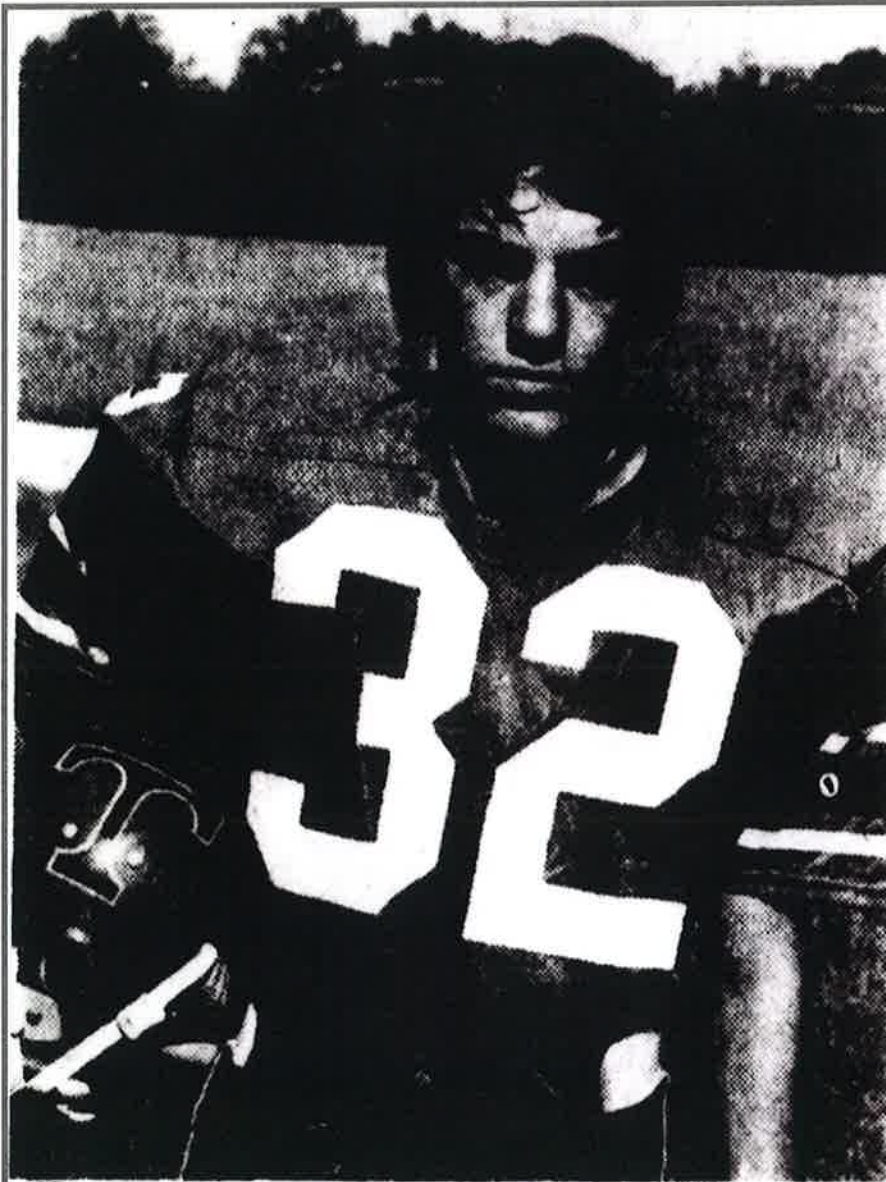

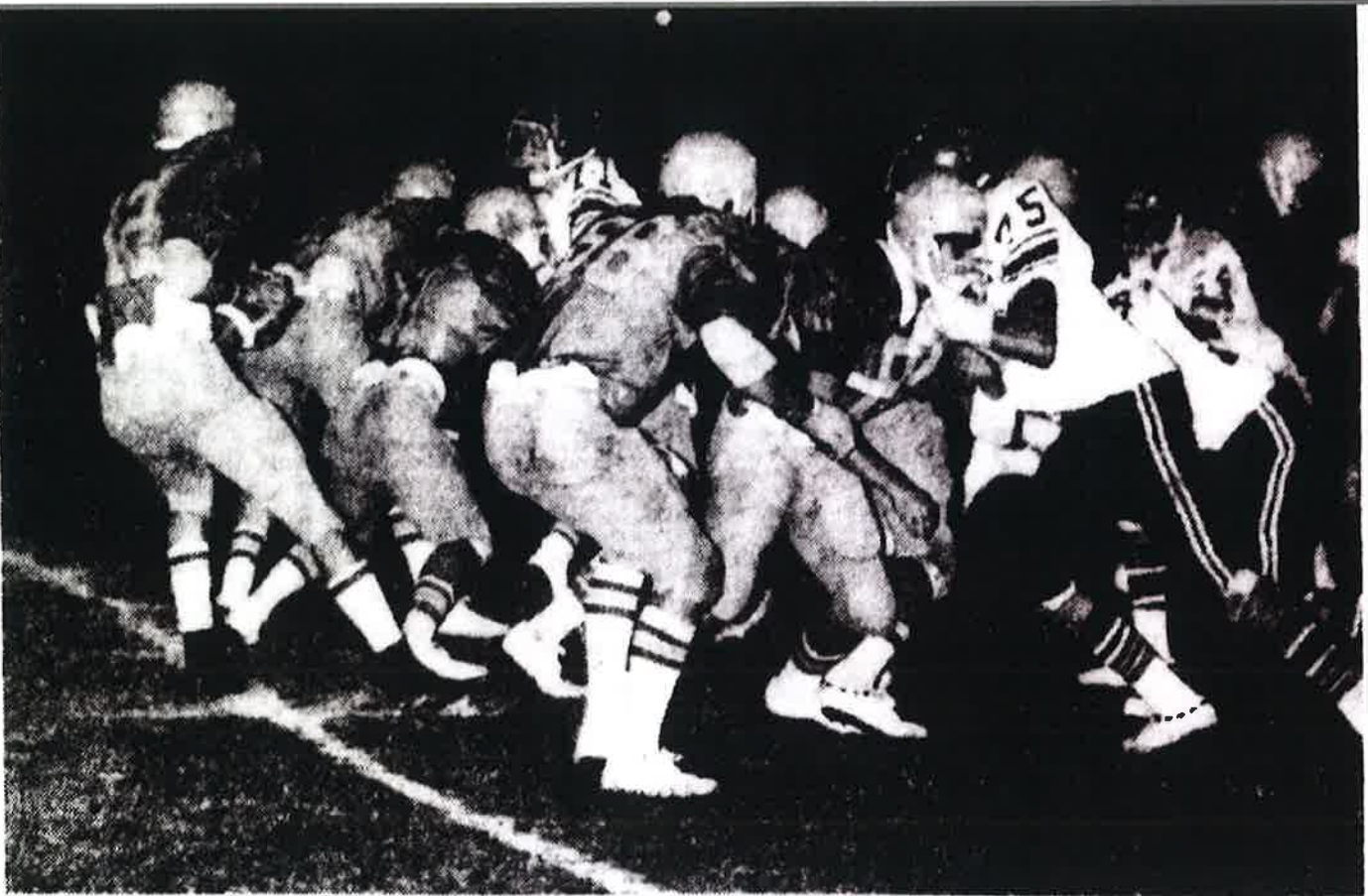
