Teurlings head mentor Tad Tatman has 16 starters returning from last year's 5-5 overall squad.

Back to spark the Rebels is 6-0 senior quarterback Mark Breaux, who handles the Teurlings veer offense to perfection.

The Rebels will start seniors Scott Hollier and Scott Blakely in the backfield, but sophomore Tim Duhon has been shining in practice and he should also see plenty of action.

Teurlings will have an experienced line coming back with Kevin Begnaud holding down the center spot.

The guards will be Tommy Fisher and Brennan O'Neil with Ron Judice and Matt Foley holding down the tackle slots.

The Spartans will have senior Dale Thibodeaux at the controls with Danny Flugence, Bobby Barras and Ward Vannoy carrying the mail.

Eddie Flugence and Philip Flugence, a pair of fleet footed ends, will be pulling in most of Thibodeaux' aerials.

On defense, Griffin moves over to the noseguard slot and he will get ample help from Morris (tackle) and Mark Briley at defensive end.

Craig Badon and Pitre are back to take over at linebacker with Eddie Flugence roaming the secondary from his free safety position.

The Rebels Are Coming

If Teurlings Head Coach Tad Tatman was Paul Revere three years ago when he accepted the head job in Rebel Land he could have been quoted as saying, "the Rebels are coming."

With 16 starters returning from last season's 5-5 club the Rebel head mentor is probably roaming the streets shouting, "the Rebels are here."

"We are really looking forward to the season," stated Tatman. "Our kids are small, but they are gutsy and they are winners."

"We have 16 starters returning and their desire to win and our quickness should be our strong points," commented the Rebel leader.

"Our weak points should be our depth at running back," he said, "and our size in the backfield. Besides that we should be alright elsewhere."

Of the 16 starters coming back, nine will be on the defensive side of the line, with seven returning on offense.

Back to operate the Rebel veer offensive attack is All-District candidate quarterback Mark Breaux.

The senior, 5-11, 165 pounder is a two year letterman and Coach Tatman sees a bright future for his leader.

"I expect Mark to have a great year," said Tatman. "With last year's experience under his belt, he could have an outstanding year this season."

Breaux will have some big targets to throw to this year with 6-1, 200 pound senior Tommy Myers and 6-1, 200 pound junior Jon Hebert anchoring the end slots. Also expected to pull in some aeriels is 5-8, 160 pound senior Glenn Gerami.

The Rebels will have strength returning in the backfield with seniors Scott Hollier, a 5-7, 160 pounder, and Scott Blakey, a 5-10, 165 pounder, doing most of the mail carrying.

Four starters are coming back to man their line positions with pivotman Kevin Begnaud, a senior who stands 5-9 and weighs 155 pounds, being the smallest.

The tackle spots will have adequate weight as senior 6-3, 210 pounder Ron Judice and senior Matt Foley, a 6-1, 190 pounder, will handle those spots.

Senior Tommy Fisher, a 5-10, 170 pounder returns to man one of the guard slots and he will be teamed with 5-9, 160 pound senior Brennan O'Neil to form a good blocking duo.

Probably the strongest part of the Teurlings defense could be its linebacking corps with Tommy Fisher, Paul Olivier, a 5-10, 165 pound senior and O'Neil returning to back up the line.

The defensive line is also set with Hebert and Randy Reed, a 5-11, 190 pound senior, manning the end slots and Judice and Foley holding down the fort at the tackle slots.

Pass defense will be a strong forte for the Rebels with Hollier and Blakely holding down the corners and Gerami and sophomore Kevin Guidry taking care of the deep passes from their safety positions. Craig Caillier, a 5-7, 165 pound senior is also expected to see plenty of action at safety.

Teurlings will open the season with a home date against Ascension Catholic and the Rebels will be looking to avenge a 19-0 loss last season.

The following week, the Rebels trek over to Ville Platte to battle AA power Sacred Heart and then visit the Vermilion Catholic Screaming Eagles September 22.

The Comeaux Spartans and Acadiana Wrecking Rams took victories Thursday at Acadiana's Wrecking Ram Stadium in the first of two nights in the 27th Annual Kiwanis Football Jamboree.

Comeaux kicked off the evening well, surviving a late Teurlings surge to down the Rebels 15-12. The Rams District 5-AAAA's runnerup in 1977, took off where they left off by posting a 14-0 triumph over Northside's Vikings.

Action continues in the Jamboree tonight at Lafayette High, as New Iberia and Carencro meet in a 7 p.m. tilt and Lafayette and Cathedral-Carmel battle in the next contest.

COMEAX-TEURLINGS

Coach Mike Simmons' Spartans scored on their opening march and led throughout, but it was no piece of cake for the winners as the Rebels fought to the wire in the exciting game.

Quarterback Dale Thibodeaux and fullback Bobby Barras keyed the first Comeaux possession, a 70-yard drive in nine plays. Thibodeaux scrambled for one key first down at the Teurlings 24, and three plays later his club had scored.

The payoff came when Thibodeaux tossed his only pass of the night, an 18-yard slant-in to tight end Philip Flugence for the touchdown. John Vardeman looped through the extra point and it was 7-0.

A Thibodeaux punt was later downed at the Teurlings 48 with the half approaching. Rebel quarterback Mark Breaux went quickly to work, using shifty Scott Hollier for two yards to the 50 on first down.

Breaux missed over the middle for a wide open Jon Hebert, but did not lose track of his receiver. On the next play, Hebert escaped toward the sidelines and Breaux looped the ball over two Spartan defenders.

Hebert juggled, then caught, the pass and dashed down to the two-yard line on a dazzling 48-yard aerial play. Breaux sneaked over on the next play for the score that made it 7-6. It stayed that way when a run for two points failed.

The second play of the second half hurt Teurlings, as a Scott Blakely fumble was pounced upon by Kyle Pitre at the Rebel 31. Quarterback John McFarland got one first down at the 17, and Barras reached the five for another, before McFarland scored

from the one. He then tossed to Vincent Andrus for a two-point conversion.

But Breaux and Hebert went back to work. The Rebs drove 70 yards with a 22-yard Breaux-to-Hebert pass to the Comeaux 27 being a key third down conversion. A five-yard penalty pushed the Rebs back to the 32, but Hollier gained 18 on two totes for a first at the 14.

After being out of bounds on a possible third down TD catch from the 11, Hebert lost his defender and hauled in an 11-yard score from Breaux at the 3:44 mark to make it 15-12. Breaux' pass for Glenn Gerami was no good.

Teurlings made one more concerted drive as time ran low, with a pass interference call to the Spartan 32 helping when Hebert was open for a score but held up. But Teurlings, which suffered 65 yards in penalties, pushed itself out of range with miscues like holding and clipping. Still, a 35-yard bomb to Hebert in a crowd carried to the 23 on a first down before running plays and a pass failed to get to the 22.

Hebert, who nabbed five passes for 120 yards, was the Offensive MVP of the game, while Comeaux safety Charles Ricord was the Defensive MVP.

ACADIANA-NORTHSIDE

Some 10 players carried the ball for Coach Bill Dolson's Rams, as the Acadiana veer racked up 151 yards on 33 carries to control the tempo of the contest. Corey Cavalier led that effort with eight totes for 40 yards, followed by quarterback Steve Selcer (five for 32) and halfback Junus Dural (five for 10).

It was Selcer, the game's Offensive MVP, who triggered the volatile Ram offense to paydirt, hitting two of three passes for 41 yards and one score to go with his rushing.

He guided his club on a 90-yard, 14-play march in the first half. Cavalier got one first down at the 23. Then, with a third and two at their own 31, the Rams passed. Selcer's toss was picked off by Viking Mike St. Julien, but Northside held on the play and Acadiana had new life at its 46.

A 15-yard scamper by Cavalier to the Vike 39 was complemented by a 23-yard Selcer dash to the 14. Then with a third and 12 at the 14, Selcer found Neal Lege at the goal and the junior flanker twisted in for the score.

Todd Migl's extra point made it 7-9 at the half.

The Rams wasted little time getting to work in the second

All six teams in 7-AA will be in action, with last season's champ Notre Dame being on the road against the Eunice Bobcats.

Also on tap is league runner-up Cathedral trekking to Rayne. Teurlings hosting Ascension Catholic, Catholic High entertaining Opelousas Catholic, Erath busing over to Vermilion Catholic and Kaplan rolling out the red carpet for Abbeville.

ASCENSION CATHOLIC-TEURLINGS

Rebel Head Mentor Tad Tatman has 16 starters returning from last season's 5-5 overall team and all should be primed to take advantage of last season's 19-0 loss at the hands of the Bulldogs.

One person that is "fired up" about the game is quarterback Mark Breaux who passed for 120 yards on seven of 12 pass completions in the Kiwanis Jamboree Friday night.

Complementing him in the backfield will be running backs Scott Blakely and Scott Hollier.

Jon Hebert, who hauled in seven passes in the jam tilt, will be at one end, along with Glenn Gerami.

Anchoring the offensive and defensive line will be tackles Ron Judice and Matt Foley, with Kevin Begnaud starting at the center slot.

Linebackers Tommy Fisher, Paul Olivier and Brennan O'Neal key the defensive side of the line.

Teurlings has a good chance of winning the game Friday night, according to Coach Tatman, but his charges will have to change their attitude.

"We have been having bad practice sessions all week," stated Tatman. We need to get more senior leadership and show more of a desire to win.

"What it boils down to is that we are not playing to our full potential."

Ascension Catholic was 5-5 overall last season and hopes

of an improvement this season lie on the shoulders of sophomore quarterback Vincent Amadee.

Tailback Billy Guillot returns to inherit his position and he will team with Butch Daigle (fullback) to form the Bulldog rushing attack.

Tackles Mike Savoie and Anthony Waguespack are key players in the offensive line.

CATHEDRAL-RAYNE

The Tigers of Coach Linden Bercegeay will be young this season and they will be looking to duplicate last season's 10-2 overall mark.

Some 28 lettermen return to help bolster the attack, along with bulldozing fullback Mike Mahtook, and split end Albert Jumonville.

Mahtook will team with tailback Bruce Montesano and quarterback Todd Duke to form a good running attack.

The Wolves will not forget the likes of Jumonville who scored on two long punt returns last season to lead the Tigers to victory.

Cathedral should be tough against the pass with its three top backs returning in Jumonville, David Lowry and Wade Key.

Coach Lewis Cook has 14 lettermen in Wolves Land in hopes of improving on his charges' 2-8 overall mark of a year ago.

ERATH-VERMILION CATHOLIC

Coach James Mosley is starting his second year at Erath and he has 12 lettermen returning.

Top returnees on offense are running back Mark Stoute and ends John Boudreaux and Gary Richard.

Leading the Bobcat defensive attack will be tackles Earnest Pilette and end Darrell Landry.

Coach Curtis Candies is in his first year at VC and he will be inheriting a young team.

Six of the Eagle offensive starters will be juniors, with sophomore quarterback Phil Nugent running the Eagle attack.

ABBEVILLE-KAPLAN

Pirate Head Coach Sammy Hinckley has seven offensive starters returning, but the big problem is finding replacements for the defense.

Saab, a 5-9, 165-pound senior LHS tailback, slithered through the taller Braves for 139 yards on 25 carries on the night. He scored the Lions' only touchdown on a seven-yard run as Lafayette escaped from Houma with a 7-6 win last Thursday night.

For his performance, Saab is the first honoree as Advertiser Offensive Player of the Week in high school football in Acadiana. He shares laurels with Brennan O'Neal of Teurlings, the Defensive Player of the Week.

Workhorse Back

The shifty Saab, running behind traps and power sweeps, was the workhorse for Coach Bob Mahfouz. By halftime, he had amassed 93 yards on 16 totes, and his hard-driving efforts helped the Lions play ball control against a club that was District 8-

AAAA runnerup to eventual '77 state champ South Lafourche.

O'Neal played inspired defensive football for the Rebels, pouncing on two fumbles, making 10 unassisted tackles, and getting in on 12 more as Teurlings popped visiting Ascension Catholic 26-6 Friday night.

There were other notable offensive performances in the opening week. Teurlings quarterback Mark Breaux threw for three touchdowns in the Rebel win. Cathedral's Albert Jumonville caught two scores in a 23-8 win at Rayne. And St. Martinville's Johnny Fontenette raced for 220 yards and four TD's overall in a 40-12 Tiger rout of Loreauville.

Defensively, Lafayette High defensive tackle Bill Stringfield camped in the Bourgeois backfield most of the night, getting in on 11 unassisted tackles and generally disrupting an H.L.B. passing attack that netted minus one yard. Also, Cathedral punter Mike Mahtook averaged 37 yards on four punts to keep Rayne bottled up.

Action Friday night has Teurlings traveling to Sacred Heart, Cathedral hosting Loreauville Erath busing to Hanson, Catholic High visiting St. Martinville, Kaplan hosting Vermilion Catholic, and Notre Dame going to Abbeville.

TEURLINGS-SACRED HEART

The leather will be popping this week when these two Class AA rivals tangle in the second annual "Bragger's Bowl."

Teurlings took a hardfought 12-6 win at Clark Field last season and the perennially tough Trojans haven't forgotten that defeat.

"This year's team is the hungriest they've (Sacred Heart) had in the past three years," said Teurlings head coach Tad Tatman, who is a former graduate of Sacred Heart. "They are primed to prove to everybody that they can rebound from their 3-7 record of a year ago."

The Rebels were led to their easy victory by the passing of field general Mark Breaux, who passed for three touchdowns and scored once himself.

Brennan O'Neal, the Advertiser's Defensive Player of the

Week, keyed a fired up Rebel defense by recovering two fumbles and figuring in on 22 tackles (10 solos, 12 helpers).

"It's a must game for us," said Tatman, when asked what the game meant to his charges, "so we can keep our momentum going."

"We will have to control the line of scrimmage both offensively and defensively if we are going to win."

Pacing the Trojan offensive attack is quarterback Jay Pucheu who threw three touchdowns in last week's victory over highly regarded St. Edmund of Eunice.

LOREAUVILLE-CATHEDRAL

This battle will feature teams that played at opposite ends of the scoreboard last week.

Cathedral showed some tough offensive spark to defeat the Wolves, while Loreauville couldn't generate any offense and they were completely outplayed in their tilt.

A stout Bobcat defensive unit allowed the Eagles a 12 yards rushing and only 29 through the air in capturing their first win of the season.

Hanson met the tough Berwick Panthers and absorbed an 8-0 defeat.

CATHOLIC HIGH-ST MARTINVILLE

The Panthers had problems of getting their offensive attack going, while the Tigers were in full gear for their first contest.

Rebels Capture Bragger's Bowl

VILLE PLATTE — The Teurlings Rebels traveled to the home of the eighth ranked Sacred Heart Trojans and returned 16-0 winners in a game played here Friday night.

Coach Tad Tatman's 'Baeld Brigade' opened the scoring by marching to the Sacred Heart 30, where Mark Breaux hit Jon Hebert on a touchdown pass with 5:27 left in the first quarter.

Scott Blakely scored the second TD for Teurlings as he ran through the Trojan defense for a 32 yard touchdown gallop with 2:37 left on the clock in the third quarter. Blakely then threw a pass to Hebert for the two point conversion.

The Rebels ended the scoring in the second annual 'Bragger's Bowl' with two more points coming when Ted Colligan, Sacred Heart punter, fumbled the snap in his own end zone, which went out of bounds for a safety.

Teurlings gained 163 yards on the ground as Scott Hollier, Blakely, and Breaux did most of the running. Hebert caught two passes from Breaux, covering a total of 48 yards.

Hebert also had an outstanding night punting the ball as he averaged 43 markers on five kicks.

Jay Pucheu led the Trojan offense by passing 17 times and completing seven for 87

yards. The Trojan signal caller had three of his passes picked off, with two being grabbed by Glenn Gerami and one being snared by Hollier.

The Rebel defense, led by the likes of Randall Babineaux, Tommy Fisher, Paul Olivier and Brennan O'Neil, held Coach Larry Vidrine's troops to 172 yards total offense.

Teurlings is now 2-0 on the young season, and the Rebels will be on the road Friday night when they tangle with the Vermillion Catholic Screaming Eagles.



The third week of action begins for 7-AA teams and two outstanding battles are on tap.

Undefeated Cathedral will journey to Cecilia to meet the tough Bulldogs — also 2-0 — while the Notre Dame Pioneers (1-1) will host the Opelousas Catholic Vikings (2-0).

In other action, the surprise team of the district, the Teurlings Rebels (2-0) will be at Vermilion Catholic (0-2). Kaplan will go to Jennings (1-1), Catholic High (0-2) travels to Loreauville (0-2) and Erath (1-1) buses to Delcambre (0-2).

Last week Cathedral defeated Loreauville 28-0; Teurlings popped Sacred Heart 16-0; Erath lost to Hanson 6-0; Kaplan dumped VC 22-7; Notre Dame was shut out by Abbeville 15-0; and Catholic High lost a 14-12 decision to St. Martinville.

CATHEDRAL-CECILIA

Plenty of hitting is expected in this contest as both teams are undefeated and each possesses good personnel on offense and defense.

The Tigers are led by quarterback Todd Duke, fullback Mike Mahtook, and split end Albert Jumonville and a good offensive line, consisting of Dicky Williams and Stan Leece.

On defense, linebacker Neil Bourgeois keys the action, along with nose guard Brit Huckabay and deep backs David Lowry and Wade Kee.

Cecilia has an outstanding running attack, centered around all-purpose player Ramsey Dar Dar, Randall Collette and quarterback John Guilbeau.

TEURLINGS-VERMILION CATHOLIC

The Rebels are proving they are for real this year by completely dominating their two opponents, while the Screaming Eagles are having problems getting their offense untracked.

Quarterback Mark Breaux has been the main spark behind the Teurlings offensive surge that has scored 42 points this season, with his pinpoint

passing to deep threats John Hebert and Glenn Gerami.

Defensive tackles Ron Judice and Matt Foley are two of the main reasons the Rebels have allowed only six points in their first two tilts, along with linebacker Tommy Fisher and deep backs Kevin Guidry and Craig Caillier.

"We are expecting a close game," stated Teurlings' head coach Tad Tatman when asked what his observation of the contest would be. "Our game with VC is developing into a rivalry and I know they will be 'up' for the game Friday night."

The young Eagles haven't gotten their offense rolling yet, but the defense, led by Vincent Hebert has been doing an adequate job.

OPELOUSAS CATHOLIC-NOTRE DAME

There is always plenty of hitting going on when these two high school powers meet in their traditional "battle of the year."

For the first time in a while, it seems that inexperience has caught up with the Pioneers, but with the likes of running backs Paul Onebane and John Sanders around, they can score from any place on the field.

The Vikings are currently ranked second in the state among AA schools and they are led by All-State returnee Tim Fields who holds down the split end slot.

KAPLAN-JENNINGS

Both teams captured wins last week after opening night defeats and each will be looking to keep the streak alive.







The Teurlings Rebels cranked up their winning machine a bit early this week, and found everything in order as they blitzed 7-AA foe Central Catholic of New Iberla 28-0 Thursday night at Clark Field. The Rebs kept their work sheet clean for the season by upping their mark to 7-0, while the CC Panthers fell to 1-6. In district battles it's Teurlings riding atop the standings with a 2-0 record. Reb Firepower

It took the Teurlings Rebs until the third quarter to really get untracked Thursday night, but when the horn sounded ending the game the results were still impressive.

Blakely. Of the Rebels' 207 yards on the ground Blakely contributed 52 on 10 totes.

Wide Open

Teurlings then began its first drive of the final half, and with the help of a fourth down penalty against CC which gave the Rebs a first down, TCH put together a 10-play drive which ended with Breaux firing a six yard TD pass to Hebert to make the score 12-0.

Later in the third period Breaux again went to the air for a tally, this time to Glenn Gerami. The score came on the first play following a Rebel fumble recovery and covered 68 yards.

The Rebs' final score was also a result of the TCH defense causing a turnover. With just over two minutes remaining in the game Gerami stepped in front of a Panther receiver for an interception scampering 73 yards before being hauled down on the CC six. Teurlings Aerial Show Has Produced Winner

In 1913, quarterback Gus Dorais of Notre Dame University passed several times to his end, Knute Rockne, leading the Fighting Irish to a 35-13 victory over a highly favored Army team; but more importantly, establishing the forward pass as a fundamental, productive and exciting part of the game of football.

Since that fateful autumn afternoon, many professional, college, and high school teams have gone on to use the forward pass effectively and victoriously. The Teurlings Catholic High School Rebels are one of these.

Most people did not expect to see much from Tad Tatman's gridiron squad this season. Yet, with the help of coaches Bobby Green, Bob Badeaux, and Rick Landry, Tatman has turned his squad into a top caliber contender. The Rebels now display a perfect 7-0 slate, with a 2-0 district record. They have been state ranked for five consecutive weeks and are looking forward to their final three games and possible post season action.

The Rebel victories have come mostly through the airways.

Big Passer

Led by the outstanding senior signal caller,

"Hollywood" Mark Breaux, the Rebels have gained 974 yards in the air. Breaux has thrown 11 touchdown passes and has only been intercepted four times.

The Teurlings field general has usually had a sufficient amount of time to throw as the coaching staff has instituted a new pass blocking scheme for the offensive line, anchored by Brennon O'Niel, Randall Babineaux, Ron Judice and Kevin Begnaud.

Coach Green (Teurlings' offensive coordinator) credits much of their aerial effectiveness to the front wall's work and to the use of many play action passes.

Breaux's favorite targets are seniors Glenn Gerami, Tom Myers; juniors Jon Hebert, Jerry Colley; and sophomore Kevin Guidry.

Glenn "Sea Biscuit" Gerami, the fastest Rebel on the field, has caught 12 passes for 481 yards and five touchdowns. Gerami is nearly unstoppable in the open field, as he is a 50 flat 440 runner during track season and also plays defense. He has also snared five interceptions this year and has returned one for 73 yards.

Tom Myers, who also handles Teurlings punting chores, has four receptions on the season for 99 yards and

one score. "Hands" also contributes with fantastic blocks on Rebel sweeps.

Hot Dog Can Score

Versatile Jon "Hot Dog" Hebert is possibly Breaux's best scoring threat as he has taken six of his nine catches to paydirt, covering 189 stripes. Hebert also handles kickoffs, extra point kicks, some punts and has passed for two touchdowns and many two-point conversions. He also runs track and plays basketball for Teurlings during the year.

Tatman, in his third year as

head football coach and Athletic Director at Teurlings, needs only one more victory to match the best record in the Rebels' history. The 1972 team finished the year with an 8-2 record and a bi-district playoff berth.

The Coach and his squad are now preparing for Friday night's Homecoming game versus the Bobcats of Erath and will follow with contests against the always powerful Cathedral-Carmel Tigers, and defending district 7-AA champion, Notre Dame.

"I think every team needs a Paul Olivier," said Tatman, "to be a winner."



Unknown, Unranked Rebs Shock Fourth-Rated ND

"I wonder if we are going to be ranked in the top 10 this week?"

That was the question asked by Teurlings Head Coach Tad Tatman after his Rebels pulled off the biggest shocker of the year, a 28-19 7-AA victory over the fourth ranked Notre Dame Pioneers in a game played Friday night at Clark Field.

The win keeps the Rebels undefeated on the year as they are now 9-0 on the season and 4-0 in district play, while the Pioneers drop to 7-2 and 3-1 in league battles.

Rebs Dominate

Teurlings dominated the majority of the contest, as they gained 160 yards on the ground behind the dashes of Scott Hollier and Scott Blakeley, and quarterback Mark Breaux completed 12 of 21 passes for 209 stripes and two touchdowns.

Breaux has now pssed for 1163 yards and has slinged 14 touchdowns for the undefeated and unranked Rebels.

It was the second time this season that the 'unknown'

Rebels have defeated a Class AA ranked team as they took a 16-0 win over the ninth ranked Trojans earlier in the year.

Biggest Thrill

"The win has to be the biggest thrill of my life," stated an overjoyed Tatman after the game. "These boys have worked for everything they've gotten and every week we have to prove ourselves."

"It was a great team effort in the second half. This team has plenty of character and they never quit and it showed in the second half."

Trailing 19-8 at halftime, the Rebels came to life in the second half and completely dominated the last two periods by scoring 20 points and the famous 'Toga' defense held the Pioneers scoreless to cap the victory.

Hollier Rambles

Scatback Scott Hollier got things rolling at the start of the third period as he scampered in from 10 yards out on a quick trap up the middle with 6:54 left. The Rebs went for two and Jon Hebert hauled in a pass from Mark Breaux to cut the deficit to 19-16.

The fired up Rebels kicked

off to the Pioneers and three minutes later, they received a punt and went in all the way in what proved to be the winning touchdown.

Teurlings started the drive on its own 19 yard line and marched the length of the field in 16 plays with Hollier bullying his way over from the one in a drive which carried into the final period and 9:19 showing on the clock. The pass for the PAT failed, but the Rebels led by three (22-19).

Pioneers Moved

After an exchange of punts, the Pioneers received the ball on their own 25 with 6:13 left in the contest and started ed moving the ball down the field. After John Sanders gained eight over left tackle, quarterback Mitchell Leger connected with Jimmy Webb on plays covering 10 and 20 yards, down to the Rebel 30.

From that point, a stout defensive effort, led by linebackers Paul Olivier, Brennan O'Neil, and Maff Foley, knocked down three straight passes to hold off the Pioneers and take over on downs at their own 20 yard line.

The Pioneers held the Rebels on the next three plays and forced their opponents to punt, but the punter was roughed up and gave the Rebels new life at the 43.

Gerami Hauls

Glenn Gerami got things started when he gained 28 yards on an end around and Breaux connected with Tommy Myers for three yards, down to the 26.

From there, the Rebels scored with just 3:33 showing on the stadium clock when Hebert beat the Pioneer secondary to haul in a 26 yard bomb from Breaux. The pass failed, but the Rebels had clinched the victory.

Notre Dame had taken a 7-0 first quarter lead when John Sanders bulled his way over from the one with 7:43 left and Jeff Meche split the uprights to end the initial period scoring.

Rebels Rally

The Rebels came back at the start of the second stanza and Gerami hauled in a 41 yard pass from Breaux with 7:16 left before the ball to cut the deficit to one. Tommy Myers pulled in a pass from Breaux as the Rebels went for the two point conversion and they were successful to take an unbelievable 8-7 lead.

But, that lead was short lived as Jimmy Webb took the ensuing kickoffs at his own 10 yard line and outraced the

Rebels down the sidelines for a 90 yard kickoff return. The pass for a two failed, but the Pioneers led 13-8.

Notre Dame recorded a big break with 3:12 left in the first half when it blocked a Rebel punt and took over on the Teurlings 19 yard line.

Pioneers Score

From that point, it took the Pioneers only two plays with Paul Onebane diving over from the one with 1:50 left before the break and the two point conversion pass failed to end the first half scoring.

Teurlings will end the season in a 7-AA encounter against cross-town rival Cathedral, with the Poineers traveling to New Iberia to meet the Catholic High Panthers.


