THE 10TH ANNUAL Kiwanis Football Jamboree will be held next Thursday and Friday night.

Four games will be held, with two scheduled for Acadiana High Stadium the first night and two more to be played at the Lafayette High Field the second evening.

Opening night action will have Teurlings and Comeaux battling in the Jam's 7:00 lidlifter tilt, while Northside and Acadiana meet right after.

NEW IBERIA AND CARENCRO will kick things off Friday night at 7:00, with Lafayette High and Cathedral going after each other in the Jam's finale.

"This year's jamboree could be the best we've ever had," observed one Kiwanis member, "because I feel that the teams will be better balanced overall."

"Some of the best football players in the state will be in action here and a few will be getting college scholarships at the end of the season."

AFTER LEADING HIS high school team to the Nevada State football crown last season, new Head Mentor Lanny Littlefield will be inheriting a very young and inexperienced squad at Northside.

Center Darrell Golbert and guard David Smith are the mainstays of the Viking offensive line, both earning two varsity letters.

Quarterback Duke Long is also back to call the signals for the Vikings and he will be joined in the backfield by Billy Hargroder, Cornell Montgomery and Kirk Malvoaux.

COACH LINDEN BERCEGEAY'S Cathedral

Tigers were 8-2 on the year in 1978, finishing as District 7-AA tri-champs and advancing all the way to the state quarterfinals before bowing out.

Cathedral lost key people via the graduation route last year, but the Tigers should be knocking at the door once the smoke has cleared again this season.

Only five starters return, with tackles Bill Franques, and Greg Smith, end George Favalora and defensive backs Wade Kee and Jack Boudreaux looking for repeat performances.

THE TEURLINGS REBELS were 9-1 overall in '78 and they ended the season with a piece of the 7-AA crown, but with only two starters returning, things aren't looking bright for another replay.

Tightend Jon Hebert and defensive end Randall Babineaux are the only two Rebel returnees, but a host of good young players will decide what kind of season Teurlings will have this season.

After losing All-America Johnny Hector through graduation, most coaches would figure to be weak in the offensive backfield.

BUT, ACCORDING TO first year New Iberia Head Coach Bobby Keasler, the runningback position should be the strength of the offense.

Fullback Steven Crooms and Kenneth Boyance, a pair of breakaway seniors, return, along with another fullback Kenneth Herbert to form a very capable rushing corps.

Bobby Banna will be starting his first campaign at Comeaux and he has seven starters and 12 lettermen to work with.

LEADING THE HANDFULL of returnees is quarterback John McFarland, and scatback Danny Flugence, both earning two monograms in Spartanland.

Keying the defensive side of the line are a pair of 200 pound tackles in Jeff Speer and Charles Ozenne.

The Mighty Lions of Lafayette High advanced all the way to the state semifinals before bowing out in 1978, after compiling a perfect 10-0 overall mark and a number one ranking in the state polls.

JAY STELLY HAS taken over the reins at the school for the now retired Bob Mahfouz and he has only six starters and 11 monogram winners to work with.

ROBBIE MOORE, WHO has been at the controls for most of the past two seasons, is back and he will have a pair of good runners to hand the ball to in John Ray Livings and Hank Hebert.

Linebackers David Baldrige and Bo Stuart key the defense, along with the brother duo of Troy and Todd Weber at cornerbacks.

With 11 starters coming back and a basket of lettermen, most football enthusiasts figure that '79 is the year of the Green and Gold of Acadiana.

QUARTERBACK TIM ANDERSON is back at the controls and he will have outstanding backs to hand the ball off to in Junius Dural and Cory Cavalier.

Dennis Mouton is returning to lead the defensive side of the ledger from his linebacker slot, along with strong safety Jeff Sides and tackle Ed Brown.

Other outstanding jamborees are slated for Rayne, St. Martinville, Franklin, Opelousas, Vermilion Parish (Abbeville) Morgan City and Cecilia.

Dural Triggers Ram Win, Comeaux Ties With Rebels

The 28th Annual Kiwanis Football Jamboree got off to a rousing start Thursday night at Acadiana High's Wrecking Ram Stadium, as Teurlings and Comeaux battled to a taut 0-0 tie, and Acadiana bested a revived Northside squad 20-8.

Two more battles are slated tonight, this time at Lafayette High, as Carencro encounters New Iberia at 7 p.m. and Lafayette High takes on Cathedral immediately

The count mounted to 14-0 just before half, as Dural led his team 60 yards in three plays. He scampered to the seven on second down from his 40, but a penalty pushed it back to the 32 for a "mere" gain of 28. Then on the next play Anderson hit Sides with a 32-yard swing pass for a TD with 43 seconds remaining before the break.

Acadiana apparently was in control of a tough, hard-hitting Viking squad with six minutes to go when the Vikes set up at their 47.

Needless to say, Dural was the game's Outstanding Offensive Player, while Viking tackle Chris Boudreaux nosed out Hargroder as the top defender. Boudreaux was it on virtually every play.

COMEAX-TEURLINGS

Teurlings quarterback Kent Vincent was his team's Outstanding Offensive Player, hitting 5 of 11 passes for 67 yards in the hard-hitting

opener. He was intercepted twice.

Jim Langston of Comeaux was the top defender in the game, with teammate Charles Ozanne and Teurlings' John Couvillion drawing honorable mentions.

A Vincent Andrus interception return of a Vincent aerial to the Rebel 38 set up the Spartans' best chance midway through the final half. Running by Bill Spisak drew the team to the 10 for a first down, but Teurlings stiffened.

On a third and 17 at the 17, Jon Hebert's blitz produced a Jason Landry fumble that was covered by the Rebels' Ross Judice to end the threat. It was the second fumble recovery for Judice on the night.

Teurlings, with Lonnie Naquin leading the way with 35 yards on nine carries, had 58 ground yards and 125 total.

Comeaux, behind Spisak's 36, managed 78 overland, but only eight overhead, for 86 stripes.

Vincent Passing Paces Teurlings

NATCHITOCHES-Kent Vincent threw three touchdown passes to pace the Teurlings Rebels to a convincing 28-14 victory over St. Mary's in prep grid action played here Friday night.

After a scoreless opening period, Vincent combined with Tim Duhon on a 23 yard pass route for the first Rebel TD of the night. The Rebels took an 8-0 lead moments later when Duhon found Jon Hebert open in the end zone for the two-point conversion.

Lonnie Naquin put the Rebels on the scoreboard a few minutes later when he hauled in a stray pass attempt and rambled to paydirt from 25 yards out. Duhon again caught a pass for the two-point conversion, but this time it was from Vincent.

The Vincent-Duhon combination clicked again just

before the first half gun sounded with the back hauling in a four yard aerial. For the first time in the game, the two point try failed, but the Rebels enjoyed a 22-0 lead at the break.

St. Mary's owned the next two touchdowns, with Ted Jones tallying from 31 yards out and Corwyn Aldredge catching a two yard pass from David Abraham.

Teurlings' final TD of the game came in the fourth period when Vincent combined with Kevin Guidry for a 15 yard strike, but the two point conversion failed to end the night's scoring.

The Rebels of Coach Tad Tatman will again be on the road next Friday night when they play the Plaisance Indians.

Duhon, Hebert Pace Reb Win

The Bull and the Barracuda. Tim "Bull" Duhon and Jay "Barracuda" Hebert, who teamed-up for 250 yards rushing, (125 apiece), lead Teurlings Catholic to a 16-6 victory over the visiting Vermillion Catholic Screamin' Eagles in a non-district game contested Thursday night.

Duhon, one of the top-scoring running backs in the state, gained his individual yardage on eight carries. Hebert, a T.C.H. freshman in his first varsity starting role, amassed his 125 markers in sixteen attempts. The freshman ball carrier summed it up for the entire Rebel team, which finished the night with 425 yards total offense—100 on the ground and 265 via the airways—when he said, "It took a lot of hard work!"

Rebel Head Coach Charles "Tad" Tatman was generally pleased with his squad's performance. "It was a great team effort. I'm really pleased with the way the boys bounced back in the second half."

Nevertheless, the fourth year mentor found that the Rebels "didn't quite have the 'killer instinct' needed. We should have scored three more in the second half."

"Of course, that is due to a lack of experience," Tatman concluded.

As the first quarter began, neither team seemed to possess the ability to cross the goaline and reach paydirt, as the entire initial half went scoreless.

Teurlings did threaten when

the Eagles gave up the ball three downs after the opening kick-off. Signal-caller Kent Vincent hit Ty Kling with two passes and connected once each with David Janise and Jon Hebert. Yet on fourth down and six at the V.C. 29, Kevin Guidry's plunge into the middle was inches short.

Regardless of a perfectly executed Vincent to Duhon to Jon Hebert pass to Guidry razzle-dazzle play that gained 38 stripes, a rash of Rebel fumbles prevented T.C.H. from threatening again, and gave their opponents priceless opportunities to go for six themselves.

V.C. recovered one bobble at midfield and another at their own 43 in the second quarter. From the 43 the Eagles began driving, using Remy Jones' and Kelly Rogers' running, as well as a 15-yard personal foul call to advance the pigskin to the Rebel nine. Two referee's flags and a few unsuccessful rushing attempts backed the line of scrimmage to the 15 where Eagle Q.B. Jody Landry faced a fourth and goal. Landry handed off to Jones, who threw to Benson Hebert in the end zone, but his pass was knocked away by a diving defensive back from Teurlings, namely Jerry Colley.

The Rebels inability to capitalize vanished quickly in the game's second half. On their first play from scrimmage, Duhon took the hand-off at his own 29, exploded through the pit, and galloped 71 yards to the endzone. The Rebs made it 6-0 when Vincent hit Duhon for

the two-point conversion.

Teurlings lost another fumble with David Langlinais recovering it for the Eagles. The visitors from Abbeville were once again unable to take it home for a score as the Rebel defense, lead by John Couvillion, Randall Babineaux, Ross Judice, Jed Hebert, and Anthony Lotief, was stifling. Couvillion, the game's leading tackler, was accredited with nine solo-stops and five assists for his night's work.

Starting at their 39, the Rebels began to engineer another successful scoring drive in the third period when Vincent found Guidry 13 yards away in a crowd and threw. The talented end made a tough catch while being hit hard by two Vermillion Catholic defenders.

Then it was "Barracuda" and "Bull" again as Jay Hebert got six yards, Duhon found seven, followed by another Hebert six-yarder and a Duhon seven stripe gainer. The call then rotated back to Hebert, who seemingly car-

ried the entire V.C. defense on his back for 18 yards, finally being brought down at the goal line. Hebert's number was called again, and the freshman answered by reaching the endzone standing after taking to ball through the line's interior.

Duhon then added two more points to his credit on the conversion by hawling in an ariel that was thrown by a hotly pursued Vincent.

Teurlings found themselves in trouble in the final stanza, forcing them to punt for the first time during the coarse of the game. Jon Hebert responded by booting a booming 55 yard kick that was downed by Duhon at the V.C. one.

The Eagles were unable to climb out of that hole and soon had to punt themselves. A few plays later found the Rebs eight yards from their third touchdown when a Langlinais sack of the T.C.H. quarterback on fourth and goal prevented another Rebel score.

Coach Rodney Louque's offense took over from there. A incompleated pass and a 7-yard penalty made the V.C. outlook dismal. Suddenly a 12 yard burst from Rogers and an off-sides call against Teurlings advanced the Eagle's cause. The Rebel defense stood up again as Marty LeBlanc stopped Rogers after one yard and Paul Dupre halted Jones after three.

Yet the Eagles were not to be denied this time. On third and six at their own 26, Rogers grabbed the ball, sprinted right, sidestepped a bunch of lunging Rebels, then cutback towards the middle. He quit running 74 yards later when he reached paydirt. An incompleated Jones pass for two extra points left the final score standing at 16-6.

The Rebels now display a 2-1 worksheet for the young season whereas Vermillion Catholic's record dropped to 0-3. The Eagles will entertain South Cameron next Friday in Abbeville while Teurlings Catholic hosts Loreauville's Tigers at Clark Field.

That's the way Teurlings Head Coach Tad Tatman summarized the game after his troops came back in the waning seconds to capture a thrilling 8-7 victory over the Loreauville Tigers in the opening round of District 8-AA play Friday night.

After three quarters of playing to a 0-0 standoff, the Tigers finally caught fire in the closing minutes to score a TD and take a 7-0 lead, but the Rebels came fighting back to score and tacked on the two-point conversion to claim the mistake-prone contest.

The low scoring ball game was directly due to the number of turnovers that both club endured through the contest.

Teurlings fumbled the pigskin six times during the tilt and lost three, and the Rebels had two passes picked off, while the Tigers were robbed of one pass by Coach Tatman's secondary, that being by Ty Kling.

"It was a great comeback effort," stated Tatman after the contest. "I was real pleased with the defense. Loreauville crossed the 50 yard line only once the whole game."

"I have to give the credit to offensive coordinator Bobby Green for his fine play selection that kept them off guard throughout the game and defensive coordinator Larry Aucoin for getting the team prepared against their various formations."

On his team's final drive, Tatman stated, "Kent (Vincent) showed plenty of poise in the last series, and Jon's (Hebert) a 46 yard grab over the middle, down to the five-

pass reception had to be the big play of the game. Tim (Duhon) also did a great job of throwing the halfback pass to Kling for the touchdown.

The Rebels picked up 13 first downs in the contest and 316 total offensive yards, with 141 coming via the rush and 175 being picked up on 12 of 23 passes.

Loreauville amassed 13 first downs and 228 yards total offense and Tatman cited defensive end Randall Babineaux, cornerback Kevin Guidry and linebackers Duhon and Lonick Romero for doing a super job defensively.

The Tigers took the lead when they took the ball on their own 20 yard line and marched the length of the field in 12 plays to score when quarterback Chris Lissard sneaked over from the one with 3:02 left in the contest. John Germany came on to split the upright: to give the Tigers a 7-0 lead.

Big plays in the drive were an 18 yard pass from Lissard to Wesley JeanLouis and a 15 yard dash over right tackle by tailback Lionel Vital.

Teurlings took the ensuing kickoff at its own 31 and went all the way to paydirt in only five plays, with Duhon's pass to Kling chunking up the six points.

After a brief timeout to chart the strategy, Vincent found Duhon all alone in the right corner of the end zone for the two point conversion and the game clincher with only 1:37 left in the game.

The Rebels had six scoring opportunities muffed by turnovers as they reached inside the 10 yard line three times in the contest and they were inside the 30 on three other occasions.

After holding the Tigers on downs with the opening kickoff, the Rebels took the

ball on their own 34 yard line and moved all the way to the Loreauville eight yard line before the drive stalled.

Teurlings got a big break at the start of the second quarter when punter Germany booted the ball straight up for a minus one yard and the Rebels took over on their own 47.

But the Rebels couldn't capitalize on the break as they took the ball the the Tigers 26 yard line, where Vincent fumbled and Germany recovered.

Kling's interception of a Lissard pass at the Rebel 26 again gave Tatman's troops new found line, but Jay Hebert's fumble at the eight stopped another drive.

The tough Rebel defense held the Tigers, forcing them to punt and they took over on their 40. From there, Teurlings marched down to the 35, where Lissard intercepted a stray Vincent pass at the 19, culminating a chance for a score.

Teurlings took the second half kickoff and went all the way to the Tiger eight yard line in nine plays, but JeanLouis intercepted a Vincent pass at the one foot line to end the drive.

Coach Tatman's crew will trek to Jeanerette next week to meet the Tigers, while Loreauville will go against the Notre Dame Pioneers.

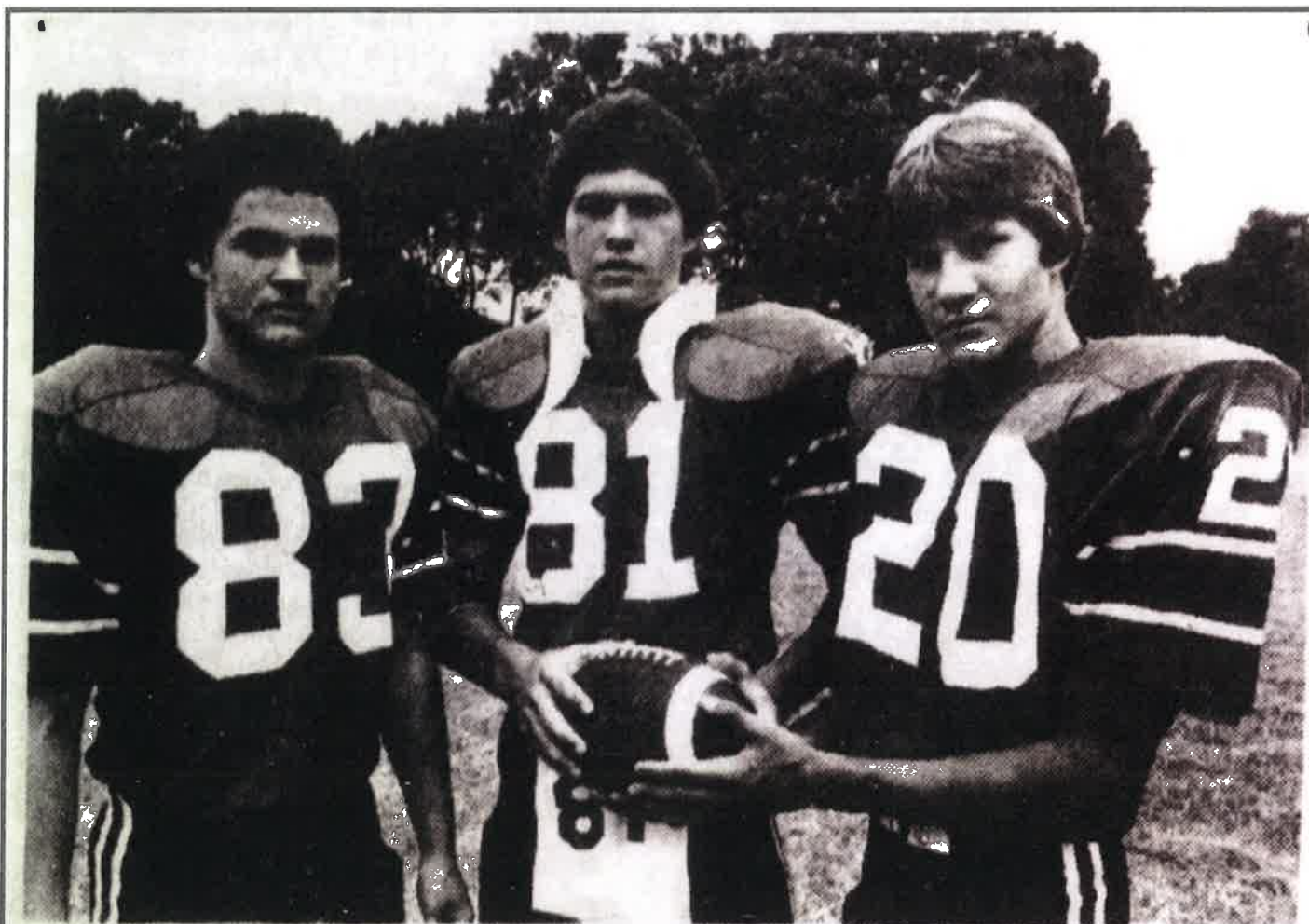

That's the way Notre Dame Head Coach Ashton Cassidy felt after seeing his troops capture a thrilling 22-20 overtime win over the Teurlings Rebels in a District 8-AA contest played at Clark Field Friday night.

After a scoreless first period

From there, Coach Cassidy's troops took the football to paydirt in 13 plays with only 1:12 left in the ball game. John came on to kick the PAT to put the Pioneers on top 14-6.

The never-say-die attitude of the Rebels paid off once more when they took the kickoff on their own 20 yard line and tallied in five plays as Kling caught a 20 yard pass from Vincent with only :25 left in the tilt. Vincent ran the important two point conversion over to knot the contest, sending it in overtime.

Notre Dame improves its record to 4-2 on the year and 3-0 in district battles, while the Rebels drop to 3-3 overall and 1-2 in league warfare.

Baker had the fastest time Thursday with a 164.813 miles per hour clocking in a Chevrolet.

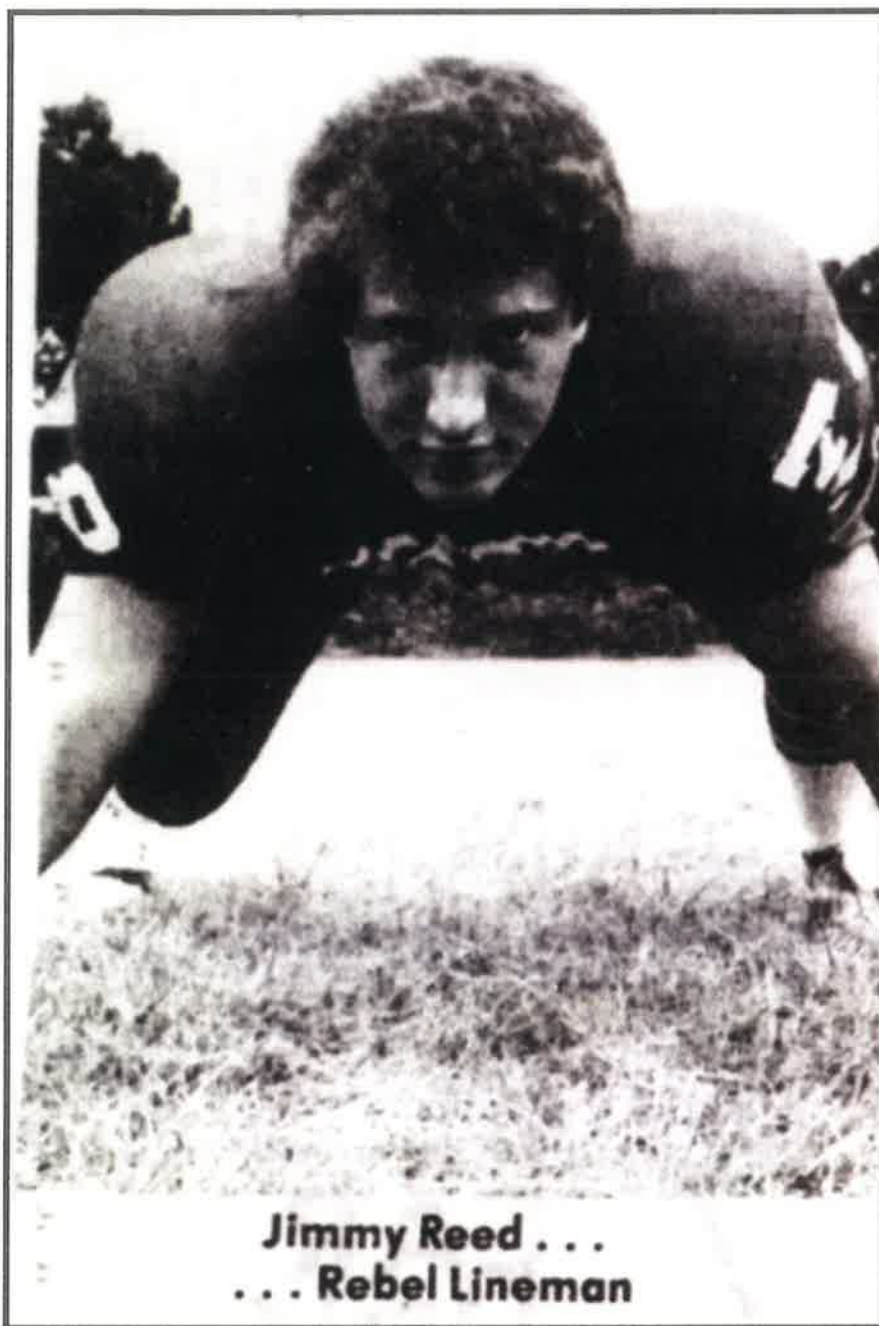

Cathedral had eight fumbles in the contest and lost three, while the Rebels were intercepted four times and they

lost four of six fumbles. Another thing that played an important part in the game was the high number of penalties called in the contest.

The Tigers were called 10 times for 107 yards, while the yellow flag was dropped seven times on the Rebels for 35 stripes.

Statistically wise, the Rebels completely dominated the contest, but the only thing that counts in a football game is which team has the most point at the end.

The Rebels picked up 17 first downs in the contest and 297 yards total offense—75 on the ground and Kent Vincent completed 17 of 34 pass attempts

for another 222 stripes.

Cathedral decided to stay on the ground throughout the contest, picking up seven first downs and 216 yards total offense, with all coming via the rush.

After dropping behind 2-0 in the first quarter of play, Coach Linden Bercegeay's troops scored three points in the second quarter, eight in the third period and seven in the final 13 minutes of play to knock the win.

The Rebels tallied a safety in the early part of the first stanza and didn't score again until the fading moments of the game, scoring eight markers

With both teams turning the ball over via the fumble route, the Tigers took over on their own 13 and moved to the 35 where a Dan Moss from center gave Dane Moss the opportunity to reach the punter and block the ball out of the end zone, giving the Rebels a 2-0 margin.

Cathedral got a big break in the second stanza when Paul Cole stepped in front of a Rebel receiver and picked off a stray Vincent pass at the Tigers 45 yard line.

From there, the Tigers drove all the way down to the Rebel 10 yard line in 11 plays, scoring eight where Wendell Guidry's 20

yard field goal put them up 3-2 at halftime.

Another interception, this time by Wade Kee, at the Cathedral 45 gave the Tigers a chance to score what proved to be the winning touchdown of the game in the third quarter.

The TD took only two tries, with John Gumpert doing the honors, first carrying for seven to the 30 and coming back over left tackle and outracing everyone the end zone from 30 yards out with 1:36 left on the scoreboard clock.

Teurlings took the ensuing kickoff and marched to its own 48 where linebacker Noll Gearheard picked up a Rebel fumble and took it in from 40 yards out with 11:49 left in the final period. The Tigers were offides on the PAT attempt, which caused Guidry to have to kick a 30 yard extra point for an 18-2 lead.

After holding the Tigers on downs, the Rebels took over on the Cathedral 41 and marched the length of the field in seven plays with only 3:29 left in the tilt.

Ty Kling beat everyone to the left corner of the end zone and hauled in a 28 yard TD strike from Vincent. Kevin Guidry then caught a pass from Vincent to tack on the two point conversion to end the scoring on the night.

Big plays in the drive were a 12 yard pass from Vincent to Guidry, which put the ball on the Tiger 34 and an eight yard aerial from Vincent to Kling, which put the pigskin on the 28, where Teurlings went in to score on the next play.

The Rebels had an opportunity to knot the contest in the waning moments of the contest when they took over on their own 20 and moved the ball to the Tiger 42, but David Huval intercepted a stray Vincent pass at the 26 to end the drive with only :04 left in the contest.

Both teams will be in post-season action with the Tigers entering the state playoffs and the Rebels participating in the First Annual Oil Bowl.

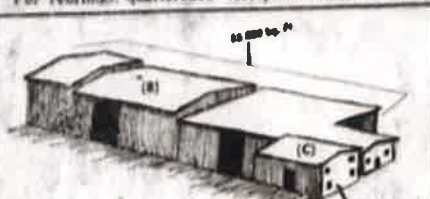
As is customary in any bowl game, MVPs were chosen for all four teams.

Every time Junius Dural stepped on the football field in 1979, he was a marked man.

Despite this, the 170-pound senior devastated the Rams' foes in every game. He finished with 1,762 yards and 17 touchdowns in regular season, going over 200 three times in his final campaign, then gained 133 yards and scored twice in a playoff loss to Broadmoor.

Without a doubt, Dural had to be the Most Valuable Offensive Player on this year's Advertiser All-Parish Football Team.

As such, he is in good company — both parish-wide and from his own Acadiana team.

Three other Rams join Dural on the honored offensive unit, while five more dot the defensive side, for the most representation of any school. College prospect tackle Barry Broussard, guard Larry LeBlanc, and halfback Corey Cavalier are on offense, while Lynn LeBlanc, tackle Greg Moeck, noseguard Ed Brown, linebacker Clay Fasnacht, and safety Jeff Sides are on defense.

In individual honors, Dural is joined by Cathedral Carmel safety man Mitch Daulerive and Northside High Coach Lanny Littlefield.

Daulerive's heads-up play in his senior year paced the Tigers of Coach Linden Bercegoay to the District 7-AA championship and a berth in the state playoffs.

His leadership and ball-hawking abilities qualify Daulerive for Most Valuable Defensive Player honors.

Littlefield, who in his first year at the Viking helm guided the school to its best record ever (7-3), is this year's Parish Coach of the Year.

Cavalier, a hard-blocking 5-6 senior, complemented Dural with six touchdowns and six sacks in addition to his all-around skill as a blocker and defensive back.

The first running back this year is Northside's slick breakaway threat Kirk Matheaux. Matheaux got the tough yards for the Vikings, and still wound up with 201 yards on 123 carries for six TD's.

Quarterbacking the offense is Viking junior Duke Long, a 6-2, 170-pounder who hit 75 of 150 passes for 1,006 yards and 15 scores. He also rushed 67 times for 342 yards.

Long's favorite target Darren Guidry mans one wide receiver post, having nabbed 30 passes for 411 yards and nine touchdowns. He is paired with Lafayette High's Steve Fontenot, who had 32 catches for 573 yards and three TD's.

The tight end is Teurlings junior Kevin Guidry, who caught 41 passes for 741 yards to pace the state's AA receivers.

Joining Acadiana's Broussard and LeBlanc in the front line are Cathedral tackle Phil Trepagnier (4-9, 245, Sr.), Lafayette High guard Bill Stringfield (6-1, 260, Sr.), and Northside center Darrell Gilbert (5-9, 180, Sr.).

On the defensive side, Sides had 34 initial tackles and three interceptions for the Rams to earn a berth with Daulerive. Joining those two is Coreaux junior Cornell Plugence, a speed merchant who returned two of his seven interceptions for touchdowns — one for 56 yards.

The linebackers are Fasnacht, Todd Durkee of Lafayette High, and Robbie Moore of Coreaux. Fasnacht

had 62 tackles and claimed 11 turnovers. Durkee had 77 tackles while playing both ways, and Moore emerged as his team's best athlete with 41 total tackles and 11 takeaways.

Ed Brown's 84 tackles earned him the noseguard position with Moeck's 88 hits also standing out. The other tackle is Chris Bourdeaux, who had 61 total tackles and two fumble recoveries.

At end with LeBlanc (who had 70 tackles and four fumble recoveries) is Northside junior Earl Curtis. The 6-3, 200-pounder had 41 stops as teams ran the other way much of the time.

Some of the highlight athletes on the second team include junior Teurlings quarterback Kent Vincent (6 of 191, 1,432 yards, 13 TD's), Teurlings flanker Ty Kline (37-685-1), Lafayette split end Karl Terrebonne (35-452-2), Cathedral running back Darny Plugence (97-123), and Coreaux back John Ray Living (92-497-4).

A quarterback that had a combined total offense of more than 1,900 yards, a super defensive back, and a coach that guided his team to the district championship paced the 8-AA All-District team selected by the coaches for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

Kent Vincent, a 5-8 150 pound junior, paced the offensive selection being named the all-district quarterback. Vincent led Teurlings to a third place finish in the league and it was his brilliant performance that contributed to most of the Rebel success. Vincent completed 99 of 183 passes, a 54 percent completion, for 1,658 yards for 13 touchdowns. He also rushed for 255 yards and scored two touchdowns. His performance brought him the honor of being named the Most Valuable Offensive Player in District 8-AA.

Defensive back Mitchell Dauterive and Coach Linden Bercegeay of Cathedral

Carmel walked on with the other two top spots in the league. Dauterive spearheaded a defensive unit that stopped opponents in clutch situations on their way to the league title.

One of the biggest stars Dauterive was in on was that the Tiger defensive unit stopped their opponents behind the line of scrimmage 69 times for a loss of 411 yards. For his performance on defense, Dauterive was named the Most Valuable Defensive Player in the district.

Bercegeay guided his Cathedral Carmel Tigers to the District 8-AA title posting a perfect 7-0 mark in loop action. Overall the Tigers won nine games and only lost one. For this, Bercegeay was selected Coach of the Year in District 8-AA.

Joining Vincent in the backfield were Al Fuseher of Catholic High, Joni Gumpert of Cathedral, and Keith Foreman of Notre Dame. Fuseher, a 5-8 175 pound senior, carried the football 160 times this season and gained a total of 904 yards. He scored a total of seven touchdowns.

Gumpert, a 5-6 160 pound

senior, paced his team this season with 587 yards in 102 carries and scored six touchdowns. Foreman, a 5-7 165 pound senior, led Notre Dame with 915 yards in 190 carries, scoring 11 touchdowns.

Teurlings hailed down the wide receiver and tight end position on the all-district team in Ty Kling and Kevin Gundry. Both did an outstanding job catching the football this season.

Kling, a 5-8 160 pound junior, was selected as the wide receiver. This season Kling caught a total of 64 passes for 540 yards and scored five touchdowns. Gundry, a 5-10 170 pound junior, was the Rebel leading receiver. He hauled in 48 receptions for 718 yards and scored three touchdowns. He also had four two-point conversions for a total of 26 points scored this year.

Notre Dame's David Hodges and Philip Bacilla were named to the all-district team also. Hodges was selected as an offensive tackle while Bacilla was chosen as a guard. Cathedral had in middle Philip Tripaniga selected as the other tackle.

Brath and Crenshaw landed on players at the other two offensive positions on the team. Lance Mergel of Brath was selected at a guard position while Foreauville's Aaron Mestayer was named to the center position. Mestayer was selected by acclamation.

On the defensive front, Catholic High's Charlie Rader was named as the middle guard. Rader had a total of 33 interceptions, fumbles and 69 assists and also had three fumble recoveries.

Foreman's Robert Green and Mike Foreman of Teanetche were the tackles selected to the first team. Foreman and Gary Richard of Catholic High's Gumpert, Fark and Rocky Riddick of Cathedral were the defensive ends selected.

Local Grididders Picked

Winnfield's Ricky Chatman, who showed his talent early on, and Patterson's Dalton Hilliard, who's doing the same, head this year's Class AA All-State team as selected by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

Chatman, a starter since his freshman year when Winnfield made the Class AAA finals, made the defensive team as a linebacker and gained honorable mention offensively as a running back. The 6-foot-2, 210-pound senior is the outstanding defensive player.

Hilliard, a 5-9, 175-pound sophomore, was a unanimous choice at running back where he gained 1,342 yards on 134 carries, a 10.0 average and scored 21 touchdowns in just eight regular-season games. Hilliard is the outstanding offensive player.

Coach of the year honors went to Jack Andre of Patterson, who directed the Lumberjacks through an undefeated regular season plus four playoff victories before failing to John Curtis in the championship game.

Curtis, which took its third state title in the last five years, placed four players on the team, as did Winnfield, which lost to Curtis in the semifinals.

Chatman, considered one of the state's top college prospects, did little to tarnish his reputation, making 120 tackles along with five interceptions and two fumble recoveries from his linebacker spot. He gained 1,107 yards and scored 14 touchdowns while playing tailback for the District 3-AA champion Tigers. Chatman was outstanding defensive player in his district for three years and an all-stater last year.

Teurlings provided both the quarterback and tight end — QB Kent Vincent and TE Kevin Guidry. Guidry was the leading receiver in 8-AA with 43 receptions for 718 yards and four touchdowns, while Vincent hit on 99 of 183 passes for 1,658 yards and 13 TDs while also rushing for 225 more yards.

The third running back is Buford Jordan of Iota, who picked up an impressive 1,504 yards and 17 touchdowns including one game where he went over the 300-yard mark. Jordan was the offensive MVP in 5-AA. Carl Ambrose of St. Louis, a 6-5, 195-pounder, had 23 receptions for 544 yards, a 22 yard per catch average,

and six touchdowns.

Filling out the offensive line are tackles Philip Trepagnier of Cathedral - Carmel and Joe LaFargue of Kinder, and center Mark McGinnis of Pearl River.

Trepagnier won outstanding lineman honors in 8-AA, while LaFargue is a 6-5, 270-pound junior who is sure to be one of the state's top prospects for next season. McGinnis was a mainstay on the Pearl River team that had its best-ever season at 7-3.

The defensive ends are Randy Vilo of Patterson and Ricky Billeaud of Cathedral - Carmel. Vilo, a 6-3, 185-pound senior, had 56 individual tackles and 52 assists in leading Patterson to its

outstanding season while Billeaud averaged five individual tackles and four assists, with four blocked punts.

Joining White at tackle is James White of Rayville, a 6-4, 230-pounder who had 187 total tackles, 20 of them for losses, and blocked seven kicks. White was the defensive MVP in 2-AA.

Joining Chatman and Bagley at linebacker is Derrick Battiste of St. Louis. Battiste, a 5-9, 185-pounder had 151 total tackles and two interceptions for the Saints.

Along with Dale in the secondary there's Louis Spencer of Mansfield and Creighton Jones of Lake Arthur. Spencer had 11 interceptions to key the Mansfield defense while Jones gained MVP honors in 6-AA.

The kicking specialist is Tony Fontenot of Ville Platte who had seven field goals, winning two games by that method, and also booted 32 extra punts.
