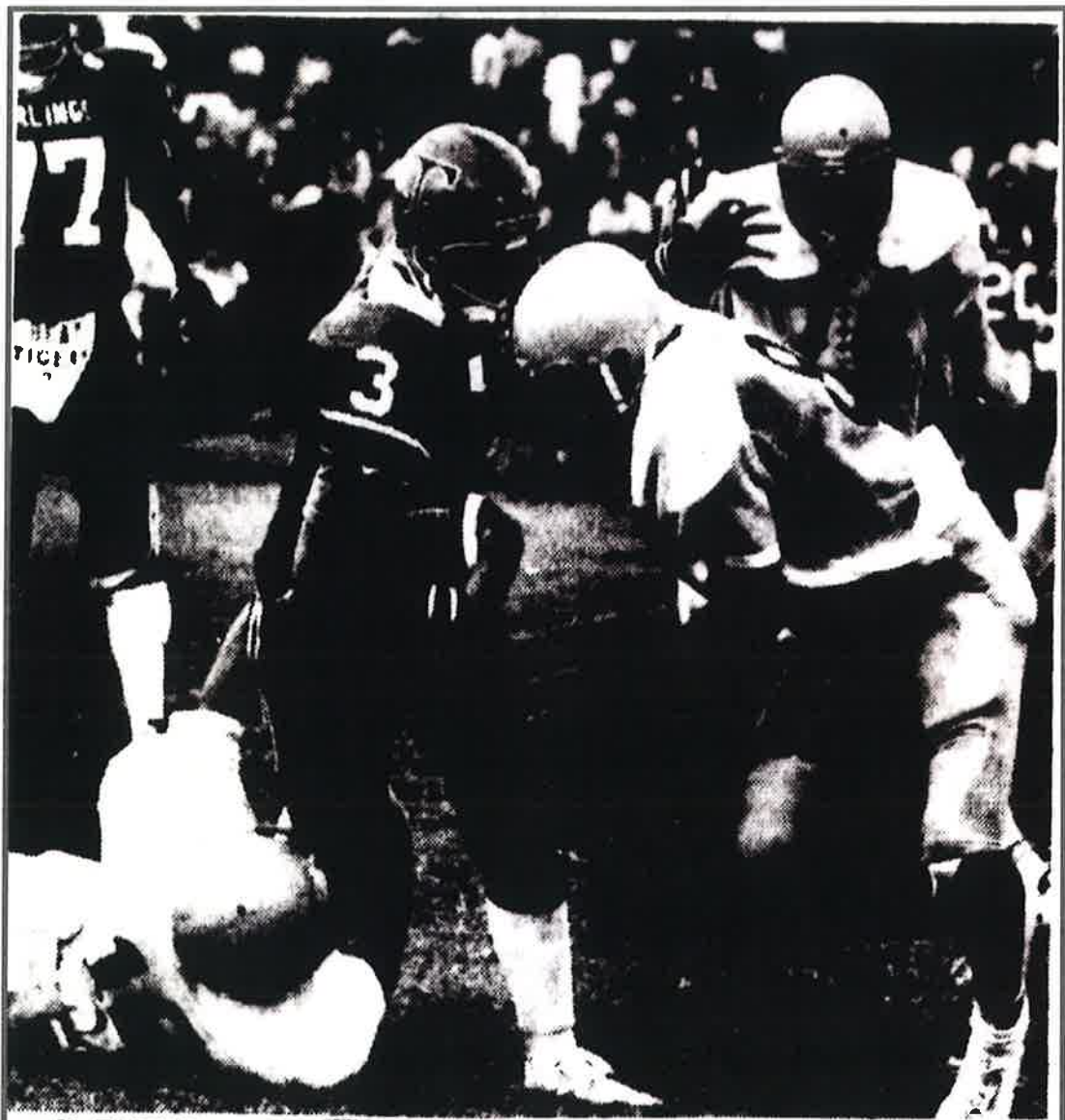
Tim Duhon, a T.C.H. back, was named Most Valuable Defensive Player in the game.

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Tigers-Rebs Open Kiwanis Jamboree

The first half of the 29th Annual Lafayette Kiwanis Jamboree will be played tonight at Lafayette High Stadium.

Two games are on tap, with a like number scheduled for Acadiana High Friday night. Cross-town rivals Teurlings and Cathedral will square off in tonight's lidlifter game at 7:30, with Lafayette High meeting Carencro in the second contest.

Friday night's action will have New Iberia and Northside going after each other at 7:00 and Acadiana battling Comeaux immediately after the first game.

Coach Linden Bercegeay's Cathedral Tigers will be shooting for their third consecutive District B-AA title this season.

The Tigers were 8-2 overall a year ago and a perfect 7-0 in league battles and with an abundance of lettermen back in Tiger Land, they could be knocking at the door once again this season.

Tabbed to call the signals for the Tigers in the early going is 5-9, 160 pound junior Richard Brauns, but 6-0, 200 pound senior Wendell Guidry is expected to see plenty of action.

Ashton Langlinals, who was injured in the first game of the season in 1979, is back to inherit his running back slot and he will team with Caldwell Huckabay to form a good backfield corp.

On the flanks for the Tigers will be a pair of returning starters in 6-3, 200 pound split end Steve Morse and 6-1, 200 pound senior George Pavalaro.

Bart Davis will anchor the Cathedral line from his center slot, with Bobby Jones and David Begnaud being the guards.

Mitch McCarroll and Bill Franques will man the tackles.

On the defensive side of the ledger, Coach Bercegeay's son Linden will be at one end, while Paul Zehnder will be the other.

The inside action will be stopped by tacklers Dwayne Dalley and Charles Leblanc and noseguard James Castille.

Guidry will team with David Dautervie to form an outstanding linebacking duo.

Cornerback Paul Cole and safety Jack Boudreaux return to inherit their spots, along with Langlinals at the corner and Huckabay at safety.

Coach Tad Taitman's Rebels were 6-4 overall and 4-3 in district tilts in '79, but things are looking better this year.

The All-State pitch-catch combination of quarterback Kent Vincent and tight end Kevin Guidry, plus 15 other starters, return at the Catholic school.

Vincent passed for over 1900 yards last fall and Guidry hauled in 43 passes, with eight going for touchdowns.

Joining Vincent in the backfield will be sophomore sensation Jay Hebert and senior Tim Duhon, who rushed

for over 500 yards a year ago.

The Rebels regular center Chuck Camel is out for at least three weeks with a broken hand and he will be replaced in the lineup by Linake Romero, a 5-10, 145 pound senior.

Kevin Boudreaux will move in Romero's spot at guard, teaming with Ross Judice, with Tracy Pool and Jed Hebert manning the tackles. David Janise and Ty Kling will be on the flanks with Guidry.

Heading the Rebel defense will be linebackers Romero and Duhon.

The ends will be Jay Hebert and Ross Judice, while freshman Chris Feucht and Jed Hebert will be the tacklers and Boudreaux the noseguard.

Teurlings' deep secondary will be Guidry and Charles Cunningham at cornerback and Janise and Kling at safety.

Lafayette High Coach Jay Steily's had a hard time keeping players healthy last year and the results were a very disappointing 2-4 overall mark and 1-1 league record.

Back to lead the Lions hopes this season will be 5-9, 180 pound senior Reggie Bergeron, who passed for 550 yards last fall before being sidelined with an injury.

Also back at fullback will be George Sobiesk, who rushed for over 600 yards in 1979, and he will team with speedster Hal Harris to form an adequate inside-outside attack.

Keith Guidry, an honorable mention All-District performer in '79, will be the Lions hiker and he will be flanked by guards Phillip Ritter and Scott Sibille.

Craig Andrus (245) and Wayne Hoover (230) will be the tacklers.

Inexperience at the wide outs will be a problem for Steily, but he has capable pass grabbers in tight end Dana Herrick, split end Corey Listi and flanker Todd Thomas.

Lafayette High's success this fall will ride on the shoulders of the defense where seven starters return.

The entire front four, comprised of ends Danny Morgan (200) and Todd Broussard (185) and tacklers Guidry (210) and Sibille (225) return in fact.

Two of the three linebackers from last year are also back, including 6-3, 235 pounder Todd Durkee and 6-0, 185 pounder John Clayton.

Both starters will play on the outside, with Sobiesk playing the middle.

Patrick JeanLouis will be back at his customary cornerback slot and he will team with Mark Tammaritello, while Andy Ferguson and Sam Caillouett will be the weak and strong safeties, respectively.

After going 0-10 in '79, Carencro coach Johnny Richard is looking for his charges to start going up the ladder this fall.

The Bears will be bigger than in the past, but still lack the experience to contend for the tough District 5-AAAA title.

Calling the signals for

Running the pass routes for the Bears will be seniors Todd Weber, Edmond Leger and Kenny Harrison.

Snapping the pignin to Roger will be Tommy Neel and he will be aided by guards Damon Lanerie and Dewey Brown and tacklers Todd Fontenot and Danny Welch.

Carston will head the defensive line from his noseguard slot, with Neel and Bo Stuart, a 6-0, 170 pound senior, and Mike Shelvin and Todd Hargrave being the down linemen.

Backing up the first four will be linebackers Darnell Carmouche and Lanerie.

Carencro's deep backs will be Weber and Dexter Prejean at the corners and Scott Taber



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contend for their respective league crowns this fall.

Coach Bercegeay has an abundance of lettermen returning in Tiger Land this season, while the Gents will have speed to burn in the offensive backfield.

"They (Crowley) are a good team, with outstanding running backs," assessed Cathedral Defensive Coordinator Jacob Byler.

"We will have to contain their speed. If we can do that, I think it should be a good ball game."

Junior Richard Brauns will be the starting field general for the Tigers and he will team with Ashton Langlinais and Caldwell Huckabay in the backfield.

Heading the Tigers front wall will be center Merlin Guilbeau, guards David Begnaud and Bobby Jones and tackles Mitch McCarroll and Bill Franques.

Bart Davis will start at flanker for the Tigers, with Steve Morse and George Favaloro being the tight ends.

Spearheading the tough Tiger defensive unit will be linebacker Wendell Guidry, noseguard James Castille, tackle Dwayne Dailey and deep back Jack Boudreaux.

The Gents of Coach Willard Hanks will feature quarterback James Savoy and running backs Fredrick Harmon and Lloyd Jones.

ST MARY'S— TEURLINGS

Both teams have most of their personnel back from last year, which could produce an explosive contest.

Coach Tatman has 13 starters returning from last fall and reports are that St. Mary's, perennial Class A power, is a top threat to capture the state title this fall.

"St. Mary's is the winningest team in Class A football the past five years," stated Tatman, "and they are expected to be even better this season."

"They run the option to perfection and throw the ball well."

"I think we will have to be more aggressive, our offensive line will have to do a better job of blocking and we will have to take the game to them if we are to win."

The Reb snapper will be Linake Romero, with Kevin Boudreaux and Ross Judice being the guards and Tracy Poole and Jed Hebert handling the tackle slots.

Heading the defensive side of the ledger will be weak safety David Janese and cornerback Charles Cunningham.

NOTRE DAME— ST LOUIS

Coach Cassidy has practically everybody back from '79, while the Saints will feature one of the top ball carriers in Southwest Louisiana.

Barking the signals in the Notre Dame Power-1 offense will be senior Gerald Greenman and he will hand the ball off to tailback David Thibodeaux, fullback Steven Voltier and split back Darryl Thibodeaux.

St. Louis was rated number one in the State Class AA polls last year and with All-District tailback Paul Debatatz returning, they could be just as potent this fall.

The 5-9, 170 pound senior rushed for 1,109 yards in '79, tallied 14 touchdowns in being selected the outstanding offensive player in District 5-AA.

OPELOUSAS CATHOLIC— CATHOLIC HIGH

The Panthers will be in a major rebuilding program this year, while the Vikings are loaded for the kill.

Coach Delcambre has only three starters returning from last season, while the Vikes are a solid choice to claim the District 7-AA title.

Mike Halphen will call the signals for the Panthers and he will team in the backfield with Matt Broussard, Thomas Leblanc and David Fleming.

CHURCH POINT— JEANERETTE

This game will feature a pair of teams that are rated dark horses in their respective districts.



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Rebels Scalp Indians

Teurlings Rebel Coach Tad Tatman sounded a bit like Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant Friday night, after his Chargers scalped the Plaisance Indians 36-10.

"When you block and tackle well, you're going to win games," the colorful Rebel coach said. His words were an understatement of how well his front lines controlled the game. His defensive unit held the Indians to a mere 43 yards of offense, and on the other side of the coin, the offensive line blasted holes and held back rushers to the tune of 463 yards of offense for the Reds.

Teurlings offensive attack was over-whelming. The Rebels, behind the strong-arm throwing and surgeon-like play calling of quarterback Kent Vincent, rolled up 191 yards on the ground and 272 stripes through the airways.

The Red QB connected on nine of 13 pass attempts in the first half for 151 yards and one touchdown. The rifle-arm signal caller finished the game with 12 completions on 22 tries for 240 yards and two touchdowns. Vincent also clocked on one point after pass for two points.

Coach Tatman also got outstanding performances from his running backs and receivers. Tim Dubon and Jay Hebert rushed for a total of 168 yards, while receivers Ty Kling, Kevin Guidry, and David Janise hauled in passes totaling 94 yards.

Dubon, who repeatedly gained extra yardage by his bullfinch style of running, finished the game with 95 yards on 20 carries. He scored the final touchdown of the third period when he put his head down and banged in from one yard out. He also ran in one point after attempt.

His backfield running mate had his share of stripes, too. Hebert, who punished the opposition's defensive unit every time he carried the ball, ploughed up 73 yards on 14 carries, crossing the goal line on three occasions.

The Rebels did not attempt a punt in the first half, mainly because they were doing such an effective job of moving the ball. But on their first scoring drive, the Reds went for a first on fourth-and-five from the Indian 50-yard line.

What resulted was a 27-yard pass completion to Kling. On the next play, Hebert logged his first TD of the night. Kling led the receiving corps with five receptions for 97 yards. On several occasions Kling made catches which put Teurlings in scoring position. The Red wide receiver pulled in one PAT pass from Vincent.

Guidry followed with 48 yards on six receptions. He teamed with Vincent in the second quarter for a 15-yard TD strike. Janise also had a fine night, spearing three aerials for 39 yards.

"We feel we can play pitch and catch with anyone," Coach Tatman said, as his team rejoiced after its resounding win. "We set some goals this week. But, we didn't expect to set a school total point record."

The Reds' 36 points against the Indians is the most any Teurlings football team has ever put on the scoreboard. Their 36 point total at the half was also a new school standard.

The Rebel defensive unit completely shut down the Plaisance offense in the opening half, holding the Indians to minus three yards on the ground and six through the air.

Jed Hebert and Kevin Boudreaux sparked the Rebel defense. Boudreaux turned a blocked punt into a 45-yard score for the "Black Hearts," while Hebert was a pillar of strength on the defensive line.

"To coin an old Indian saying," beamed Coach Tatman following his team's crushing win, "I waited 12 moons for this one." The Rebels finished the 1979 season with a 6-4 workweek. One of the losses was a 27-22 setback at the hands of the Indians in Plaisance.

Pioneers Slip Past Wildcats

ABBEVILLE — A 13-yard touchdown run gave the Notre Dame Pioneers a hardfought 6-3 overtime victory over the home-standing Abbeville Wildcats in grid action Friday night.

Greenman's TD gave the Pioneers the win in the extra period, after Kerrel Guidry had put the Cats on top 3-0 on a 22-yard field goal.

Notre Dame completely dominated the game, with 204 yards total offense to the Wildcats 127.

Coach Ashton Cassedy's charges rushed for 111 stripes and passed for 53 more, while Abbeville had 55 rushing yards and 42 via the passing lanes.

Outstanding Goal Line Stand Sparks Rebels

An outstanding goal line stand and three touchdown passes by Kent Vincent powered the Teurlings Rebels to a 27-19 comeback victory over the Jeanerette Tigers in District 3-AA action played at Clark Field Thursday night.

Down by eight points with a little more than three minutes to play in the game, the Tigers drove the ball to the Rebel one yard line, but a tough defensive unit, led by noseguard Kevin Boudreaux and linebackers Tim Duhon and Linake Romero, stopped Jeanerette cold on two cracks up the middle.

"It was a great comeback victory for us," stated Rebel Head Coach Tad Tatman. "The kids showed a lot of class making that goal line defense."

"I'm extremely proud of the seniors for the leadership they showed throughout the game in keeping the team together when they went ahead."

"These kids love each other. I'm awful proud of them and my coaching staff."

Trailing 27-19 at halftime, the Rebels came alive after a serious pep talk by Coach Tatman at the break to score 12 third quarter points and walk away with the eight point victory.

Teurlings took the lead with 5:58 left in the third stanza when Ty Kling beat the Tiger cornerback on a out and up route and Vincent connected with a 49 TD strike.

The Rebels elected to go for the two-point conversion, but the pass was batted to the ground, leaving Teurlings on top 21-19.

On the very next series, Duhon intercepted a tipped pass at the Tiger 45 and returned it 11 yards up the field, giving the Rebels a first and 10 at the Jeanerette 34.

From there, it took Teurlings only six plays to put the ball in the end zone with what proved to be the fatal blow.

Duhon was the hero of the drive, bullying his way over from the eight on sheer determination with :31 showing on clock.

Teurlings again went for the two-point conversion, but the Tigers sacked Vincent before he could get the ball away.

The Rebels led through most of the first half, but two costly mistakes in the final four minutes of the first half gave the Tigers a chance to score twice and assume a 19-15 lead at intermission.

Coach Jerry Martin's Tigers got their first big break of the first half when the Rebels were penalized twice inside their own five and Ty Kling's fourth down punt traveled 33 yards, where Ernest Howard returned it back to the 25.

On the very next play, Wallace hit Troy Ned in the left flat, where the running back broke two tackles on his way to a 24 yard TD gallop with 3:58 left before the break.

Jeanerette went for the two-point conversion, but a host of Rebels stopped the Tiger runner short of paydirt.

Behind 15-12, Wallace kicked off to Tim Duhon and the Rebel return man slipped on his one yard line.

On the very next play, the Rebels fumbled and Lionel Armstead recovered the ball in the end zone for a Tiger TD.

Rebels Upset ND Pioneer

CROWLEY — "Building Tradition" is the team slogan for the 1980 Teurlings Rebel football team. And after Thursday night's stunning, 24-7, upset over the No. 3 ranked Notre Dame Pioneer, the Rebs may just have completed the foundation for a winning tradition at Teurlings.

The Rebels, ranked No. 10 in the state AA poll, were awesome in their convincing win over the perennial 8-AA power from the Rice Capital. The Teurlings' offense, under the cool direction of quarterback Kent Vincent rolled up 368 yards of offense against what had been one of the stingiest defenses in the state.

"Bobby (Green) and Larry (Aucoin) deserve alot of the credit for the win tonight," beamed Reb Head Coach Tad T. Tatman, following his team's thrilling upset.

"They called an excellent game offensively and defensively. And were on top of every play from the initial kickoff," Coach Tatman pointed out.

The Teurlings assistants picked the Pioneer defense apart with a game plan that mixed the rushing and passing games to perfection.

"The key to the win was that we took advantage of their extremely quick pursuit on defense," Coach Green said. "We wanted to establish the running game early, so that when they would be thinking run we could throw the ball more effectively."

The Teurlings victory was a "team" effort, but the Rebs got an outstanding performance from Vincent, a returning First Team All-Stater from last season.

The Rebel QB connected on 14 of 18 pass attempts for 218 yards and one TD.

The main reason for Vincent's success was the performance of his offensive line, which did a superlative job of holding off the extremely strong Pioneer defensive rush.

"Our down linemen, both on offense and defense, were the keys to our victory tonight," noted Coach Aucoin. Jed Hebert (OT), Tracy Pool (OT), Ross Judice (OG), Linake Romero (OG), and Chuck Camel (OC) all did outstanding jobs in the offensive trenches. Subs Marty LeBlanc (OG), Kevin Boudreau (OG), and Dane Moss (OT) didn't let up an inch when subbing for the starters.

Teurlings opened the scoring in the second period when Vincent found wide receiver Ty Kling streaking down the sideline for a 45-yard scoring strike. Kling missed the PAT

attempt to make the score, 6-0. The TD was the first points scored against the Pioneer this season.

Notre Dame didn't waste any time putting fighting back, as they took the ensuing kickoff and marched 30 yards for the score. The point after kick was good and ND took a 7-6 lead.

However, the Rebs weren't through putting points on the scoreboard. Following the ND score, Teurlings mounted a drive which was sparked by a couple of clutch receptions by Kevin Guidry, moving the Rebs down to the ND one yard line.

On the next play running back Jay Hebert netted the first of two one yard scores to put Teurlings up 12-6. In the middle of the second period, Vincent ran wide to log the two-point conversion, giving the Rebs a 14-7 edge.

Later in the period, the Rebs intercepted a Pioneer pass deep in ND territory and cashed it in for three points when Kling split the uprights on a 40 yard field goal, giving Teurlings a 17-7 lead at the half.

In the second half, the Rebs took the opening kickoff and put together a sustained drive which ended in the ND endzone when Hebert crashed in for his second score of the night from one yard out.

Once again, the TD was set up by the pinpoint passing of Vincent who repeatedly found receiving open. The Rebel receiving corps was led by Guidry, who pulled down seven passes for 85 yards. Kling speared four aerials for 47 yards and a TD, with Hebert catching one pass for seven yards, and Tim Duhon grabbing two passes for 19 strikers.

On the rushing end of the stick, Duhon lugged the pigskin 21 times for 92 bruising yards and Hebert ran 14 times for 48 yards and a pair of TDs.

But, it wasn't just the Teurlings' offense which shined.

"Our defense played one of its best games ever. They stopped Notre Dame's rushing

game when they needed to and came up with the big plays at just the right times," noted Coach Aucoin, the Reb defensive coordinator.

"The Hebert twins (Jed DT and Jay DE), Ross Judice (DE), Linake Romero (LB), Kevin Boudreau (NO), David Janier (DS), Chris Feucht (DT), Tim Duhon (LB), Lonnie Naquin (CB), Ty Kling (DS), and Kevin Guidry (CB) anchored our defensive unit, but everyone who played defense tonight played their hearts out," Coach Tatman said on his way to the locker room after the game.

Once in the locker room the Teurlings mentor stood on a table as his two assistants proceeded to shave the locks on his head, as the Reb coach had promised to shave his head if his troops came through with the win.

"This is the price you have to pay to win," Coach Tatman beamed following the scalp. "Now let's go home."

Reb Turnaround, A Sign Of Unity

In 1976 the Teurlings Rebel football team got a new football coach, Tad T. Tatman. Coach Tatman wasn't destine to turn the failing Rebel football program, which had gone 2-8 the previous year, around in one short year.

But, it wasn't long before the colorful mentor would start heads turning and change the nametag of losers to winners for his Rebs.

"When I first came to Teurlings the kids didn't know how to win. It wasn't that they were losers, it was more that they were quitters," recalls Coach Tatman.

From the first day Coach Tatman assumed his position he began to change the complexion of the entire football program at Teurlings.

"I remember the first season I came here. We began preaching to the kids that if they were going to become winners they would have to be willing to work to improve. That year we practiced seven days a week and after the season was over, we began working with weights five days a week," Tatman said.

What Coach Tatman was beginning to do, was take a football program labelled as losers, and rebuild from the ground up. He began to instill a since of pride in the Teurlings football program which has steamrolled to the point where his 1980 team goes into the sixth week of the season ranked No. 10 in the state, sporting a perfect 5-0 record.

Over the past two seasons, Tatman's troops have chalked up 20 wins, while dropping only five contests. In 1978 the Rebs won their first nine games

of the season, tying perienal 8-AA powers Cathedral and Notre Dame for the district title.

Coach Tatman attributes a good portion of the Reb turnaround to his young coaching staff, with the remainder of the aboutface coming on determination of his teams over the years to improve.

The Rebel mentor came to Teurlings, after serving as defensive coordinator at Sacred Heart of Ville Platte. Joining him at THS was another SHVP coach, Bobby Badeaux.

"Bobby (Badeaux) coached with me at Sacred Heart. He was instrumental in getting me the position at Teurlings and gave us three great years," Tatman notes.

But Coach Tatman's current assistants, Bobby Green (offense) and Larry Aucoin (defense), are

credited with really sparking the Rebel transformation.

"Bobby (Green) has been with me since my first season at Teurlings," Tatman points out. "And I'd have to say that most of the success of the program in the past three years has to be attributed to Bobby."

"He's the type of guy every head coach prays to have for an assistant. His dedication and loyalty is unbelievable."

Coach Tatman also had words of praise for his defensive coordinator. "Larry (Aucoin) is a Teurlings graduate. His strong points are his loyalty and ability to communicate with the players. He works extremely hard and takes pride in his work," Coach Tatman applauds.

"Jack Delhomme (Head

Basketball Coach) joined the Teurlings' football staff this season and has been doing an outstanding job handling all phases of our kicking game, as well as, scouting for us. He has really been a help to us," Coach Tatman said.

The Rebel mentor is the first to point out that the success his teams have enjoyed the past four seasons have to be attributed to the hard work, dedication, and self-imposed discipline his kids have molded into the Teurlings program.

"The 1977 team will always fill a special place in my heart," Tatman says. "The largest player on the team weighed 170 pounds. Everybody predicted we wouldn't win a game that year, but those kids work their butts off and we finished the season with a 5-5 record."

"The next season we had 17 of these kids back as

starters and we went 9-1, shared the district title, and earned a playoff spot," the Rebel mentor recalls.

In 1979 the Rebs went 6-4, after losing several key starters to graduation and went into the '80 season as one of the three teams likely to win the district crown.

"This is the first year we are expected to win," Coach Tatman states. "This is something new at Teurlings. But, don't get me wrong, we're enjoying this new challenge."

"Before the reward came by winning when we weren't expected to win," the Reb coach notes. "But, it has been just as rewarding to be expected to win and then come through."

And come through is just what Tatman's troops have been doing this season. His '80 squad has shown poise and character in rolling up their 5-0, 2-0 district worksheet this season,

heading into tonight's showdown with the tough Notre Dame Pioneers.

In the last two outings the Rebels have fought back from halftime deficits to pull out victories and Coach Tatman believes this is a sign of the program's turnaround from losers to winners.

"The way our kids haven't given up when they were down is a true sign of a great ballclub. These kids really love each other, they love their coaches, and just as importantly they love playing football for Teurlings," Coach Tatman beamed.

Teurlings Captures 28-0 Win Over Erath

If we can look bad and still win 28-0, I'm happy.

That was Teurlings Head Coach Tad Tatman's comments after the Rebels captured a lachrymose 28-0 victory over the Erath Bobcats in a District 8-AA contest played at Clark Field Friday night.

Both teams had problems moving the ball all night, with the Rebel defense coming through with two big plays in the first half for a 13-0 lead at intermission.

After a serious pep talk by Coach Tatman at the break, the offense came to life and cashed in on two occasions for the final point production of the night.

"We did what was necessary to win," stated Coach Tatman. "Nothing more. Nothing less."

"We were flat, but I can attribute that to coming off a big win last week."

After playing poorly for the first 24 minutes of play, the Rebels came out fired up in the third quarter and abandoned their patented passing attack in favor of the running game.

The Rebels tallied their first TD of the second half on their second possession of the third period when quarterback Kent Vincent rambled up the middle from seven yards out with 1:25 showing on the clock.

Tim Duhon then hauled in a two-point conversion pass

from Vincent to widen the Teurlings lead to 21-0 after 36 minutes of play.

Vincent's tally ended a 10-play, 68 yard drive which started with 5:19 left in the third quarter.

Defense was the name of the game for the next 12 minutes of the game, until Vincent scored again went up the middle to score his second touchdown of the night with 2:28 left in the contest.

Teurlings' second touchdown actually came with no time left on the clock when Kling intercepted a Segura pass at the 50 and returned it all the way to the end zone.

The Rebs went for two, but the pass was batted down to end the first half scoring.

With the win, the Rebels remain undefeated in seven contests and 4-0 in district battles, while the Bobcats drop to 2-5 and 0-4, respectively.

Teurlings is now 5-0 in district and will host Kaplan next week at Clark Field for the homecoming. Catholic is 1-4 in league play this season.



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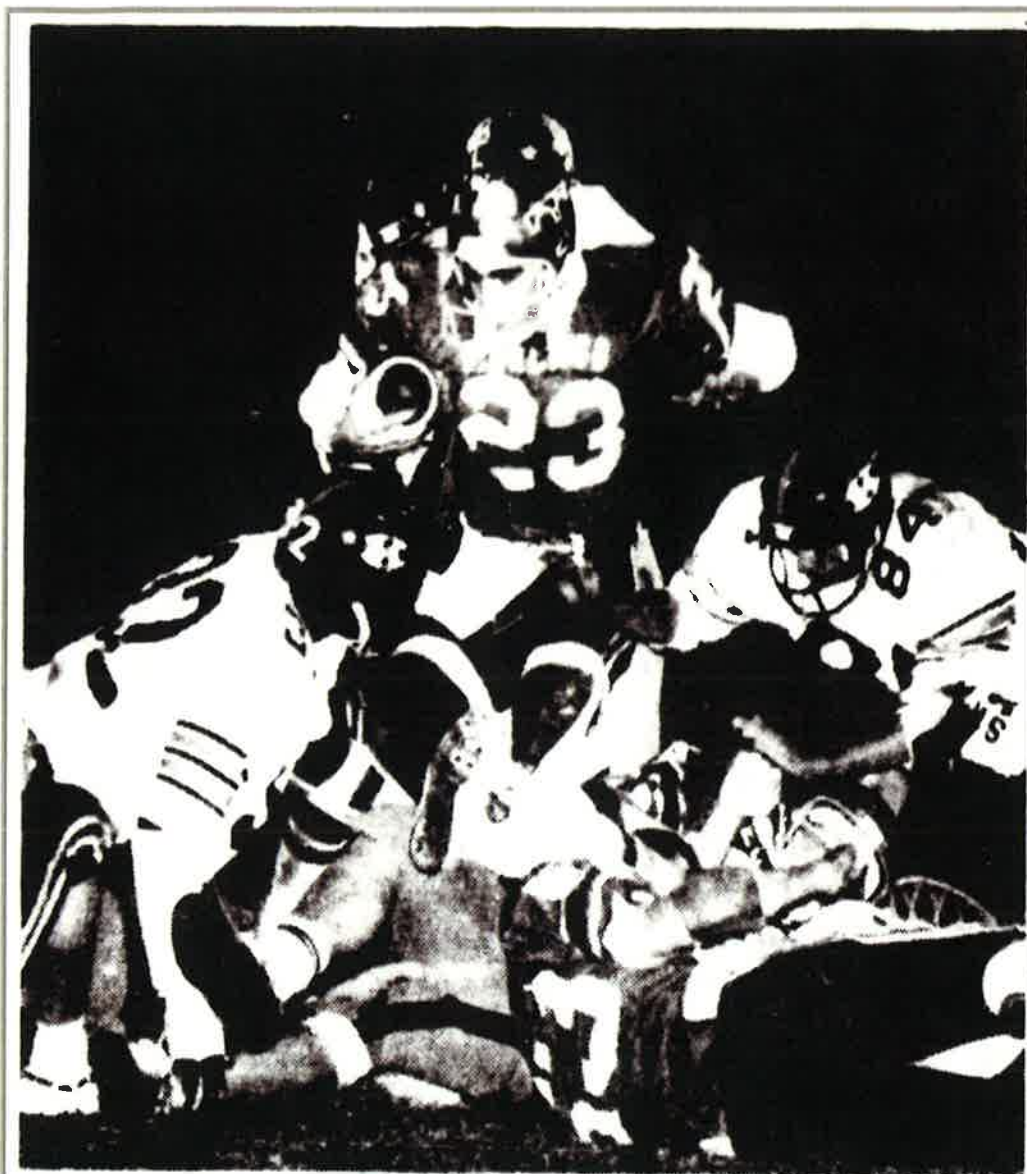

Teurlings Slips Past Bulldogs

Sophomore quarterback Clint Campbell came off the bench to spark the Teurlings Rebels to an 18-14 victory over the White Castle Bulldogs in a State Class AA Bi-District contest played at Clark Field Friday night.

The young rifleman came on in relief of injured starter Kent Vincent in the opening quarter and threw two long bombs in the second half to lead the Rebels to the big win.

"Clint played a super game," praised Teurlings Head Mentor Tad Tatman. "He replaced an All-State quarterback in the first quarter and threw a 91 yard touchdown pass and a 49 yard touchdown pass. He did a great job under pressure."

Teurlings fell behind three times in the ball game, but fought back each time to advance to the regional round against Opelousas Catholic on the Vikings home field

next Friday night.

The win was especially sweet to Coach Tatman, because the Rebels made the state playoffs in 1978, only to drop a 14-6 heartbreaker to White Castle in the Bulldogs back yard.

"I'm awfully proud of the kids and my coaching staff," stated Coach Tatman. "They could have folded under adversity, but they stuck together and fought all the way."

"It was a great team effort from everybody concerned. It was also a big win for Teurlings High School."

The pre-game billed up featured the ground attack of the Bulldogs against the passing prowess of the Rebels.

As evident by the final statistics, all indications were right as White Castle rushed for 216 yards to the Rebels 44, while Teurlings filled the air lane for 218 stripes, compared to the Bulldogs 79.

Fumbles played a key part in the ball game, as the Rebels

lost all three of their dropsies, with the Bulldogs losing two of three.

Trailing 7-3 at halftime, the Rebels converted in the middle of the third period on an unbelievable 91 yard pass from Campbell to a flying Ty Kling down the sideline.

The Rebels lined up for the extra point kick, but center Chuck Camel snapped the ball to Kling, who was suppose to be the PATT kicker, and he threw a strike to Tim Duhon in the end zone for the two-point conversion and an 11-7 lead.

White Castle had taken the second half kickoff and marched down to the Rebel 37 yard line, where the drive stalled and Lynn Rodrigue punted the ball to Tim Duhon, who returned it the 21.

Teurlings was called for clipping on the play, setting the ball back on the Rebel nine, where Campbell's first two pass attempts were incomplete, but the third was on target to put the Rebels ahead with 6:31 left in the period.

The Bulldogs recaptured the lead at the end of the fourth period when LeRoy Molden took a pitchout from quarterback Josh Allen and outraced everyone to the corner of the end zone from 21 yards out.

Vincent Forte then came on to split the uprights and put the Bulldogs ahead 14-11 with 4:40 left in the ball game.

Having that 'never-say-die' attitude, the Rebels took the ensuing kickoff 10 seconds later and went the length of the field in four plays for the winning touchdown.

On third and six Campbell found Kling wide open down the sideline and connected with a 49 yard strike. Kling's PAT went through the middle of the uprights to put the Rebels up by the final 18-14 count.

Teurlings received a big break during the drive, when Campbell was sacked for an apparent 12 yard loss from the Bulldog 49 to his own 39, but White Castle was flagged 15 yards for grabbing the face

mask.

The Bulldogs did get one last chance at picking up the win moving down to the Rebel 24 yard line, but a big sack on Allen on fourth down by linebacker Linake Romero preserved the victory.

Each team owned a quarter of play in the first half, with the Rebels having great field position in the opening period, only to lose it to the Bulldogs in the second quarter.

Both teams had numerous opportunities to score in the first 24 minutes of play, but sloppy playing on the part of each team regulated the Bulldogs to a single touchdown and an extra point and a field goal by Teurlings.

Coach Tatman's charges received a gift in the initial period when the Bulldog center snapped the ball over the punter's head and the Rebels swarmed the runner to nail him at the Bulldog 37.

From there, it took the Rebels 12 plays to move down to the four, where the drive stalled and Kling booted the pigskin through the uprights for the 3-0 lead with 2:10 left on the clock.

The Bulldogs kept coming back and finally took the lead with 2:49 left before intermission on a 14 yard TD pass from Allen to tight end David Albarado.

Forte then came on to kick the PAT and White Castle enjoyed a 7-3 lead at halftime.

Albarado's grab ended a six-play, 37 yard drive which started at the 5:27 mark of the second quarter.

Big plays in the drive were a 22 yard scramble up the middle by Allen and a 17 yard screen pass from Bulldog field general to Molden.

With the win, the Rebels improved their overall record to 10-1 on the season, after finishing 6-1 in District 8-AA battles, while White Castle ended the season at 3-8, after capturing the runner-up spot in 10-AA with a 3-2 mark.

Vikings Oust Teurlings Rebs

OPELOUSAS — After reaching a new plateau in playoff action, Lafayette's own Teurlings Rebels finally succumbed to injuries late in the season. After a long, hard battle against 7-AA champion Opelousas Catholic, the Rebels went down to defeat by the score of 14-6.

The first break of the game went to the Rebels, as they won the toss and elected to receive. That, however, was the extent of the Rebels' luck, as the powerful ground and aerial attack launched by the Vikings proved to be too much for the injury-riddled Rebels.

Quarterback David Elter engineered the first scoring drive for OC, which began with :16 remaining in the first quarter, and ended with 9:47 left in the second quarter. The climax to the 48-yard drive was a 39-yard touchdown pass from Elter to Fred Dejean, who gathered in the pigskin at the Rebel 12-yard line, and avoided two Rebel defenders enroute to the end zone.

Tim Mills latched on the extra point, and the hometown Vikings were out to a 7-0 second quarter lead.

As the second quarter drew to a close, the Vikings were driving for more, after Elter directed his troops down the field from their own seven-yard line.

That drive was not without problems for OC, as Lonnie Naquin and Jed Hebert made touchdown saving tackles, and Jonathan Palin teamed up with teammate Kevin Guidry to nearly intercept a wayward pass in the end zone.

Ignoring the repeated warnings, Elter tempted fate once too often, as he dropped back on first-and-10 from the Rebel 18, and sent for broke. Big Ty Kling was coiled and ready to strike, and the alert safety intercepted the pass in the end zone.

After a crushing blow by Tim Duhon, quarterback David Elter lost control of the ball, and Chris Feucht nearly recovered for the Rebels. However, as was the case most of the evening, nearly was not good enough. Because, on the very next play from scrimmage Elter once again dropped back to pass.

The Vikings had too many men on the field, as it were, and the Teurlings defender, Ty Kling, was blocked out by the official, leaving Duncan Anderson home free. The result was a 61-yard TD bomb, and the following PAT by Mills put the Vikings well in control at 14-0 at the 10:06 point in the third quarter.

Tim Duhon, who enjoyed a fine evening, took the ensuing kickoff at his six-yard line and nearly broke it, being caught as he reached the Viking 17-yard line. A penalty for a personal foul against the Vikings put the ball at the nine.

The Rebels had six chances to score, but the Viking defense was awesome, and the Rebels were held Adam Prince trapped Campbell on the nine with a fourth-and-goal to add to the Rebel problems.

As the third quarter was winding down OC had the ball on the Rebel three-yard line, first-and-goal. A missed handoff from Elter to Vance Robicheaux fell to the ground, and all 210-pounds of sophomore Jed Hebert engulfed the orphan, once again avoiding another deadly blow.

The Rebel TD came at the 5:54 mark in the final quarter, and with the failure of the second onside kick, the Rebel dream had ended. The loss of Kent Vincent and star running back, Jay Hebert had taken its toll.

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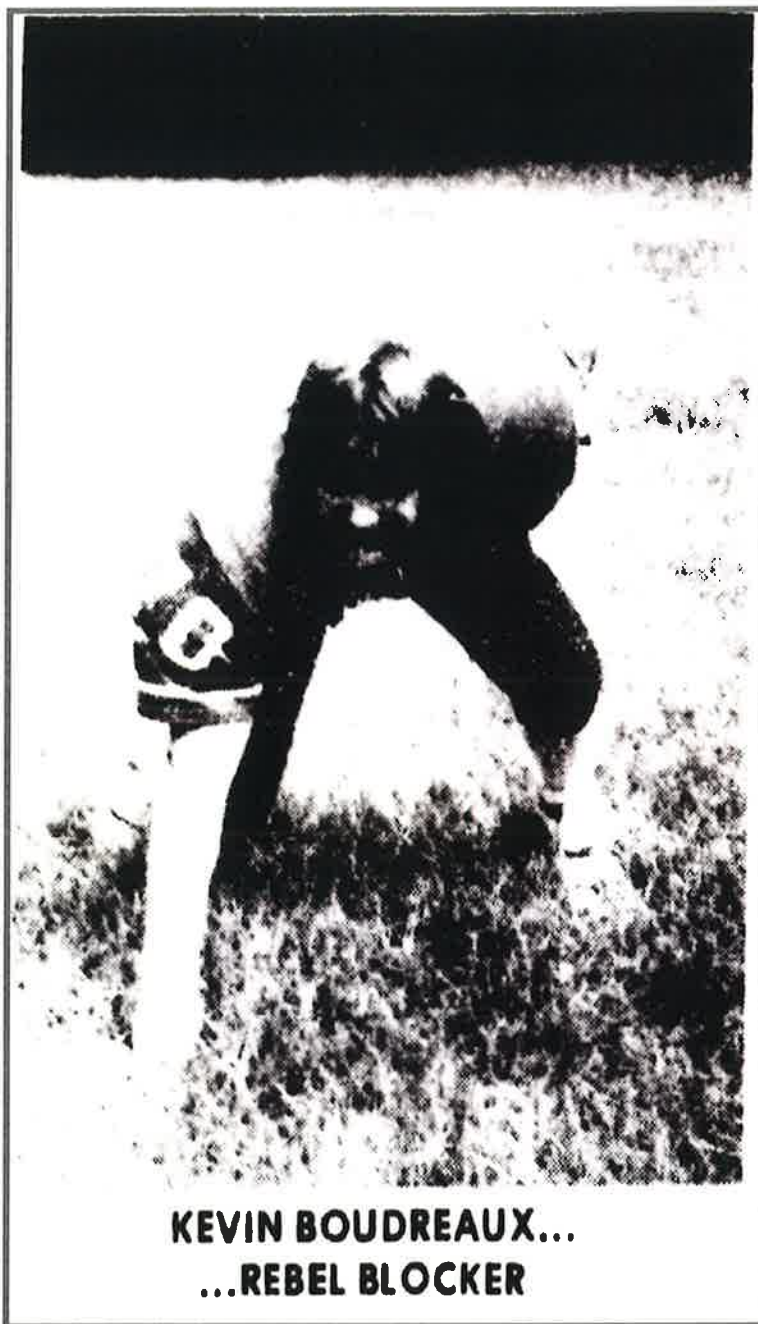

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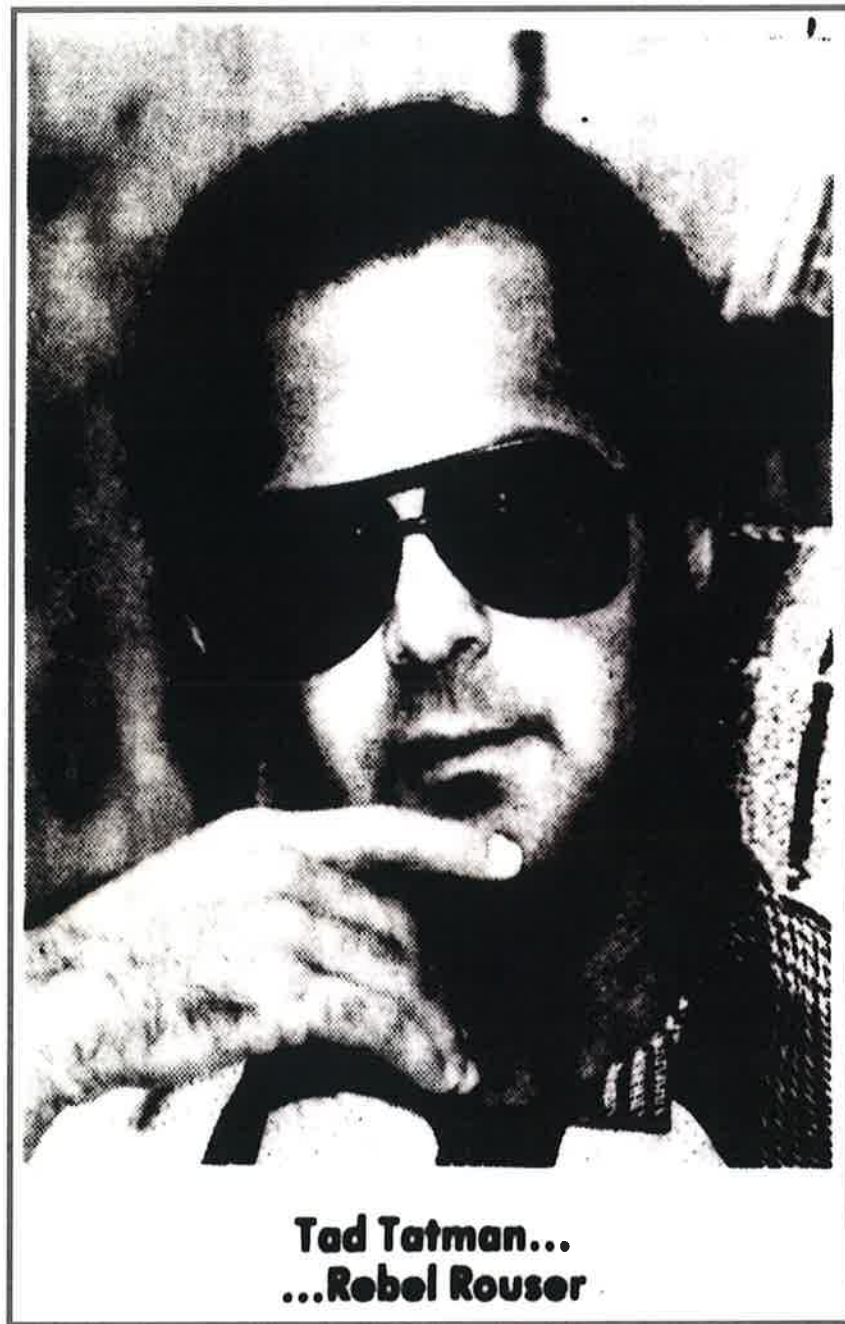

Cathedral Beats Teurlings

The Cathedral Tigers won the game, but the Teurlings Rebels are the District 8-AA champs.

Needing 15 points to force a three-way tie for the league crown, the Tigers defeated the Rebels 20-6 in a key contest at Clark Field Friday night, falling short by a meazely one point.

The district championship represented the first in the school's history for the Rebels who claimed it from Cathedral, who had won it the last two years.

"I hate to back into the district championship," unhappy Teurlings Head Coach Tad Tatman said, "but our kids could've folded and we could've not make the playoffs at all."

On his team's performance in the game, Coach Tatman stated, "We weren't mentally prepared to play football and I did a lousy job of motivating our kids."

"Our team execution was pathetic. I hope we can regroup and get ready for the state playoffs."

Cathedral dominated the contest from the start, picking up two touchdowns and a safety for its point production and holding the offensive-minded Rebels to one tally on the night.

In the statistics department, the Tigers rolled up 179 yards total offense, with 150 coming on the ground and another 29 through the air on four of 15 pass attempts.

The Rebels had trouble moving the ball against the vaunted Tiger defense and accumulated only 124 total offensive yards — 30 on the ground and 94 via the pass on 11 of 18 attempts.

Cathedral's inability to convert to extra point cost the

Tigers a chance at the state playoffs and a possible district title.

Coach Lindent Bercegeay's troops had a chance to reach the 15 point plateau, but the all important extra point kick in the closing minutes of the game was blocked to kill the Cathedral hopes of post-season action.

After spotting the Rebels a third quarter touchdown, the Tigers took over nine yard line when Mark Huval intercepted his second pass of the night on the last play of the period.

The Tigers took the ball and started a 15-play, 81-yard drive which ended at the 5:35 mark when Wendell Guidry bulldozed his way up the middle for the touchdown.

Guidry then attempted the key extra point of the contest, but the Rebel linemen rushed in quick enough to get a hand on it and deflect it away.

Cathedral had another opportunity to score in the closing minutes of the game when it drove down to the Rebel 36, before a last ditch pass fell short of the mark to end the rally.

Teurlings then took over and quarterback Kent Vincent fell on the ball on all three downs to kill the clock and hand the Rebels the district championship.

Leading 8-0 at halftime, the Tigers received a gift at the start of the third period when Rebel quarterback Kent Vincent fumbled and Guidry scooped up the loose pigskin and outraced everyone to the end zone for the TD with 10:31 showing on the clock.

The Tigers went for one after the tally, but the kick was short to leave the Tigers on top 14-0.

After playing poorly for 2½, the Rebels came alive at the end of the third period to score their only touchdown of the ball game, with :58 seconds left.

Teurlings took over on its own 20 yard line and marched the length of the field in nine plays, with Vincent hitting David Janese in the end zone for six.

Ty Kling's extra point kick was wide right to end the scoring on the night for the Rebels.

Costly mistakes and turnovers by the Rebels and an inspired defensive effort gave Cathedral its 8-0 halftime lead.

The Tigers recorded their first big break of the contest in the opening quarter when Vincent fumbled at his own 21 and Jimbo Castille pounced on the loose ball.

From there, it took Cathedral only six plays to take the football to pay dirt, with Guidry going over from the one.

Cathedral went for the two-point conversion, but the pass failed to put the Tigers up 6-0 with 5:32 left in the opening period.

Another mistake by the Rebels in the second quarter allowed the Tigers to score a safety and increased their lead to 8-0.

Tiger punter Paul Cole kicked the ball to the Kling standing at his own two, where he elected to field the punt instead of letting it roll into the end zone and the swarming Tigers brought him down immediately.

On the very next play, Tiger defensive tackle Dwayne Dailey sacked Rebel running back Lonnie Naquin in the end zone for the safety and the eight point lead with 3:51 left

before intermission.

After Greg Saloom took King's ensuing punt at the Tiger 39 and returned it to the Rebel 49, Cathedral had another golden opportunity to score.

The Tigers marched all the way to the Teurlings 15 yard line, where the drive stalled and Guidry's field goal attempt was wide left to end the threat.

"We won't be as strong next year, but we'll win some games," he explains. "We'll be young at some skill spots, but I know we'll surprise some people. We have some good kids coming back next year, and I'm looking forward to next year."

All-Parish Selections Made

Chris Boudreaux was hurt for a couple of games, and you could tell the difference in our defense when he went out.

The speaker was Northside High Head Football Coach Lancy Littlefield, and he was reflecting on his two brightest stars in a senior studied 1980 team.

Long, a 6-3, 160-pound quarterback signed of the U.S. Navy, was responsible for 27 touchdowns this season. He hit 70 of 104 passes for 1,330 yards and 14 touchdowns, and ran 10 times for 467 yards and 13 more TDs.

"The players listen to Duke, and they perform for him," said Littlefield. "You can't coach leadership."

As for Boudreaux, who is as yet unengaged by a college program but is reportedly heavily recruiting LSU and LSU, he led the Vikings in tackles despite playing in only eight of their games.

Also, he recovered two fumbles, made nine quarterback sacks, and in general wreaked havoc with opposing offenses.

Three two standouts highlight the 1980 Daily Advertiser All Parish Football Team, chosen from the seven Lafayette Parish schools which play football. Long is the Most Valuable Offensive Player, while Boudreaux is the MVP on defense.

The 1980 Parish Coach of the Year is Teurlings, Catholic Head Coach Ted Talmann, who guided his Rebels to a three-way tie for the District 7-A championship with Teurlings, emerging the winner in the bracket with a record of 10-1.

Talmann, whose club ranked eighth in the final regular season AA poll, saw his troops win one more game in the state playoffs than any previous Rebel contingent had done.

The perennial head mentor, whose 1-12 mark in his first year at the Teurlings helm in 1978 represented his only losing season at the school, has compiled a 29-10 record in five years.

He followed his first year with a 1-3 mark in 1979 that earned him the All-Catholic Coach of the Year nod, went 9-1 in 1979, losing only in the loss to District 7-A Champion Cathedral, to make the playoffs as 7-A runnerup and reach the quarterfinals, and went 5-3 in 1979 before this year's resurgence.

That first year some sparkling talent on the 1980 All-Parish Team.

Boudreaux is a two-way selection, going both ways at tackle. As such he joins older brother Gerald (1977) in earning such distinction for Northside. The 6-2, 250-pounder is joined at offensive tackle by another two-way hoosier, Todd Durkee of Lafayette High. Durkee is a 6-2, 225-pound senior certain for collegiate offers.

Teaming at offensive guard are Acadiana High's Kevin Dischler and Northside's Jimmy Hebert. Dischler was the only returning starter from the 1979 team line, and it was around his talents that his team rebuilt the front wall Hebert benches 200 pounds and was one of the keys to Long's success.

At center is Comeaux Archbishop Charles O'Connell, who complements an all-senior front line with his considerable talents.

The receiving corps for Long is robust. At tight end is

yet another two-way All Parish choice, Northside's Earl Curtis, who doubled as a Viking defensive end, caught 17 passes for 256 yards and four scores.

Lafayette High's Corey Lint carried on the school's solid tradition of standout wide receivers with his 1980 senior year, snaring 16 passes for 489 yards and a touchdown.

At the other wide receiver post is Teurlings' Ty Kling, a U.S. signer who grabbed 13 passes for 145 yards and four scores. Kling is also on the team as a defensive back.

Running talent is there, as well. Acadiana's Steve Sifton, whose absence with injury hurt the team offense, had over 1,000 yards in seven games and finished with 1,202 in nine games, scoring 18 TDs.

Joining him are diminutive Northside senior Billy Hargroder and Lafayette High's Hal Harris. Hargroder, only 5-1, played bigger, rushing 76 times for 343 yards and catching 22 passes for 301 more yards and six scores. Harris, with Sifton the only other junior on the first team, had 141 yards and averaged 10.8 yards per carry.

Boudreaux and Curtis are one half of the All-Parish defensive line, at tackle and end, respectively. The other half is provided by Acadiana, with end Kevin Griffin and tackle Ed Brown.

Inside at noseguard is Northside senior Lester Thomas, following in the Viking footsteps of older brother Dale in excellence.

Junior Mike Beaux of Acadiana leads the linebacking trio, a player who already has prompted Head Coach Bill Duncan to say "he is the best linebacker we've ever had. He's our best defender."

Tatman, Wallace Top 8-AA

NEW ORLEANS — Teurlings and Notre Dame, the two teams that led the way in District 8-AA during the 1980 season, grabbed the lion's share of the berths in the Louisiana Sports Writers Association's All-District team released today.

Notre Dame, which was beaten only once in the regular season — by Teurlings — and which advanced to the state quarterfinals before being knocked off by perennial powerhouse John Curtis, led the way with eight players selected to the team. Teurlings, which also went 9-1 in the regular season before advancing to the regional round of the state playoffs, had four choices, including co-defensive player of the year Ty Kling.

Cathedral, which tied with Notre Dame and Teurlings for the league championship — all had 9-1 records — also had four selections, as did Jeanerette. Kaplan and Larvauville rounded out the LSWA's 22-man squad with one selection each.

Notre Dame's choices were headed by center Johnny Furman, linebacker Shane Spillano and running back David Thibodeaux, who gained 846 yards on 151 carries and scored 11 touchdowns in seven league games. Other Notre Dame players selected to the squad included guard Phillip Husula, defensive end Wayne Hornsby, defensive tackle Mike Hundley, noseguard Uel Oliver and safety Johnny Casanova, younger brother of former LSU players Timmy and Jackie Casanova.

Kling, selected to the squad both as a wide receiver and defensive back, heads up Teurlings' team selections. A U.S.L. signer, Kling, voted the league's co-defensive player of the year along with Cathedral linebacker Wendell Guidry, had 31 individual tackles, 27 assists, four fumble recoveries, four sacks and four interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown.

Other Teurlings players selected include tight end Kevin Guidry, a returning all-star, and running back Tim Dubon, who gained 646 yards and scored 11 touchdowns on 140 rushes. Guidry, a 6-10, 175-pound senior, had 31 receptions for 485 yards and one score.

Teurlings also capped Coach of the Year honors, those going to fifth-year head coach Tim Tatman, who led the 1980 team to the first season in the school's history. Tatman, who took his team to the regional of the state playoffs in 1980, owns a 38-18-1 record at Teurlings.

Guidry, a 6-foot, 180-pound senior linebacker for Cathedral's twice-beaten Tigers, averaged seven solo tackles and seven assists per contest. He also was credited with seven sacks, four fumble recoveries and two interceptions — credits which pushed him into a tie with Kling for the team's defensive MVP honors.

Joining Guidry on the team are Cathedral teammates Bill Fraquese, an offensive tackle, George Favale, a defensive end, and Jack Boudreaux, a defensive back. Favale, a 6-foot, 200-pounder, averaged 17 tackles per game and recovered two fumbles. Boudreaux, a 5-7, 135-pounder, was credited with 50 solo tackles and 100 assists. He had three interceptions.

Jeanerette, the fourth place finisher in the league, placed two on the offensive unit and two others on the defensive team.

On the offense, Don Wallace, a 6-1, 180-pound wizard, and Mike Freeman, a 5-8, 190-pound guard, were the Tigers' honorees, while defensively, tackle Myles Clavette and linebacker Lonnie Randall made the team.

Wallace, a U.S.L. signer, was named the league's quarterback over all-star Kent Gilchrist. The two tied for the quarterback's spot on the District 8-AA coaches' team, yet Wallace beat the Teurlings star when it came time for the team's offensive MVP award — an award he won outright on the LSWA team, also.

During a season when the Tigers went 5-5, including an all-Bowl victory, Wallace hit on 50 of 148 passes for 1,263 yards and nine touchdowns. He also rushed for 300 yards. Vincent, meanwhile, hit on 59 of 171 attempts for 1,184 yards and eight touchdowns. The Teurlings star threw for eight scores and ran for five others.
