When the 30th Annual Kiwanis Jamboree is held this weekend, all the coaches will get down to serious business.

But, all had fun Tuesday as the Kiwanis Club hosted the eight coaches and their staffs for the annual "crying towel" luncheon.

This year's winner of the famed towel was new Teurlings Head Coach Bobby Green.

Green pointed out to the contingent that as a new head coach he expects to make mistakes.

"Since I am a rookie head coach," choked Green, "I will make plenty of mistakes and I think the first was accepting this job."

The Rebels were 9-1 in 1980 and clinched the District 8-AA title, but Green is not sure how his troops will do this season.

"We have some good athletes," he praised, "but no Rhodes Scholars. If you add all their IQ's together, you couldn't get room temperature.

"For example, we are the only school in the state that has to hire a psychologist to take care of the player's problems.

"If you think that's bad, it took our quarterback an hour and a half to watch 60 minutes on TV last week.

"Not only are our runningbacks slow, but they are 's-l-o-w'. We have to keep everything simple. Their numbers (3 & 4) match their IQ's."



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# Kiwanis Gives Teurlings Coach 'Crying Towel'

The Kiwanis Club of Lafayette held its "Crying Towel" yesterday, preceding its 30th Annual High School Football Jamboree, slated for tomorrow and Friday.

President Johnny Chapman first crowned Jamboree Queen Shirley Heaton, an 18-year-old cheerleader at LaRosen School.

Next, he commended Glenn Armentor on a job well done as jamboree chairman, and thanked all committee chairmen and members who worked on the event.

This was followed by a brief report on the progress of USL's Circle K Club, a Kiwanis-sponsored college organization.

The "crying towel," a program intended for the eight high school head football coaches to poke fun at themselves by claiming how bad their teams are, rather than bragging about them, opened with Acadiana's Bill Dodson.

Next, the group heard the

comical laments of Wylie Fraze of New Iberia High School, Bobby Green of Teurlings High, Jake Byler of Cathedral Carmel, Bobby Banna from Comeaux, Doug Duhon, Northside, Pat Kee, Carencro, and Jay Stelly, Lafayette High.

"I'm gonna make a lot of mistakes as head coach," said Green, who was later presented with the crying towel award, "and I feel like the first one I've made already, was accepting this job."

He continued, "We're so slow! In fact, let me give you an example of just how slow we are. The other day, it took our quarterback, Clint Campbell, an hour and a half to watch '60 Minutes' on TV."

"For disciplinary action," Green concluded, "instead of taking our players out of the game, we *makethem* play!"

Byler spoke next, saying, "I brought our whole coaching staff here with me today — not because they're good, just because they wanted a free

meal."

He told the Kiwanians he had a player who thought his IQ was 20/20.

"We have three things going for us this year," Byler said. "One, we're a small group (only 44 of us). Second, because of this, there's enough room for all of us on only one bus. And, third, we're exceptionally smart," he wrapped up.

Carencro's Coach Kee admitted with mock humility, "We're both slow and little."

Tomorrow night's action will take place at Acadiana High. Teurlings will play against Cathedral, and Comeaux will battle Acadiana. Friday night Lafayette High will host the games, with Northside against New Iberia, and Carencro vs. Lafayette.

The jamboree, the club's one, major annual fund-raising project, will provide the necessary monies for all charitable works throughout the year to come.

# Rams, Tigers Score Victories

The opener was in doubt until the final minutes, and the nightcap was all but complete within minutes, as the Cathedral Tigers and Acadiana Wreckin' Rams took opening night wins Thursday night in the 20th Annual Kiwanis Club Football Jambooree.

Cathedral held on for a 16-10 triumph over arch-rival Teurlings in the evening's initial contest, while the host Rams blistered Comeaux, with first-teamers going most of the way 30-7.

Those hits set the stage for tonight's second night of play at Lafayette High, with Northside battling New Iberia at 7 p.m. and Lafayette High meeting Carencro in the second game approximately 15 minutes after third light.

Tonight's four teams are challenged to come up with as many big plays as were turned in on the first night, as 45 and 33-yard touchdowns were scored in the Teurlings-Cathedral game and breakaways of 34 and 65 yards were recorded in the Acadiana-Comeaux encounter.

Caldwell Huckabay garnered Outstanding Player laurels for Cathedral with a 33-yard touchdown jaunt on a pitchout from Richard Brauns that rang up the Tigers' only touchdown and set the stage for the game.

The score was set up by a Brauns interception of a Clint Campbell pass at the Rebel 49 that the two-way Tiger returned to the 32. One play later, Huckabay was zipping through a gaping hole on the right side of the TCHS defense and into paydirt with 10:16 still left in the 15 minute half.

Huckabay then added his own extra point and it was 7-0.

Another pickoff of Campbell, this time by defensive end Paul Zehnder in the flat, set up the second Tiger score of the half, a 23-yard Tommy Favaloro field goal at 7:35 that made it 10-0.

But the Rebels had some turnover tricks up their sleeves, as well, as John Roy's recovery of a Rick Bozeman fumble at the CCHS 45 offered opportunity 3:34 before halftime.

Campbell got the score himself on the next play, rolling left behind Jay Hebert's blocking and weaving downfield until he reached paydirt at 3:22. The extra point run try failed, ending the half 10-6, Tigers.

Favaloro appeared to have sealed the game for Cathedral with a 35-yard field goal with 2:30 to play, but Campbell was not ready to pack it in.

Scrambling away from heavy pressure, the Rebel QB fired a 41-yard pass to Gary Gerami that reached the Cathedral 24. A fourth-down gamble succeeded at 1:02 when Campbell rolled to the 12 on a fourth and inches.

But game captain David Dauterive roared in to trap Campbell for an 11 yard loss on the next play, and the Tigers held on from there.

The game pitted new coaches Jacob Byler of Cathedral and Bobby Green of Teurlings in their first matchup in what is expected to continue to be a heated rivalry.

While Huckabay won Outstanding Player honors for Cathedral, Rebel linebacker Ross Judice won the award for his club.

Huckabay's 46 yards on two carries led his team's 143 yard total offense night, while the 41 yards of Jay Hebert (10 carries) and 36 more for Campbell (on eight) keyed the Rebs' 130-yard output.

If, as predicted, the Wreckin' Rams are to contend for the District 5 AAAA title again this year, they served notice of that with their easy win over Comeaux.

It was 22-0 at halftime, and a high snap loss led to 30-0 before the Spartans avoided a shutout with a late TD.

Carlos Kibodeaux scored the first two Ram TD's on a three-yard run and a six yard pass from quarterback Mark Cavalier. Cavalier set up both scores, passing 65 yards to halfback Steve Sifton to the seven and optioning 54 yards to the 11 to set up the second tally.

Outstanding Player Jerry Lee of Comeaux made the stops from across the field on both long gainers, and it was Lee who later set up the only Comeaux score with receptions of 19 and 13 yards from quarterback Joel McFarland.

Mike Campbell got that Spartan score on a six-yard run 1:42 before game's end. The extra point made it 30-7, Rams, and only then did Acadiana Coach Bill Dotson insert his substitutes on offense.

The Rams benefited from a high snap over McFarland's head in punt formation, trapping the luckless QB on the Comeaux six at 8:34 of the second half. Sifton scored on an eight-yard pitchout, and then tacked on the two-point conversion on a swinging gate maneuver.

It was Sifton who tallied the third Acadiana TD as well, banging over from three yards out 3:34 before the end of the first half. Cavalier hit John Jeffcoat for the two-pointer on that occasion.

Cavalier (four carries) and Sifton (10) tied for rushing honors on the Rams with 54 yards each, and Kibodeaux had 28 as Acadiana had 159 yards overland and 108 through the air. Cavalier shared top player honors on the Rams with senior linebacker Mike Breaux, who had two interceptions for 42 yards and had a 78-yard TD return shortened by a chop-block penalty.

Campbell's 42 yards paced the Comeaux attack, which totalled 55 rushing and 52 aerially.

# Tigers Take 'Highway 94' Win

Everyone in the Acadiana area is aware of USL and McNeese's annual "Battle of Interstate 10."

Well, Teurlings Catholic and Breaux Bridge High staged their own version of such an event Thursday evening at Clark Field, as the two schools kicked off the 1981 season with their own battle for the braggin' rights of all the territory along La. Highway 94.

And now we know why it's called the "Breaux Bridge Highway."

The final score was 19-13. Asked to assess the victory, his first as head coach of the BBHS Tigers, rookie mentor Mickey Autrey explained, "The biggest thing is — and I'm always telling my kids this — is that we may be small in number, but we're big in heart."

"We just won't die!" And if you don't believe Autrey, just ask some Teurlings people.

For the last five minutes of the contest, a persistent bunch of young TCH Rebels clawed their way back into a ballgame that they were supposedly "out of" right after the fourth quarter began, at which time Breaux Bridge scored on a 26-yard Dale Narcisse touchdown pass to Karl Roberts to put themselves on top 19-6.

But largely due to the efforts of Jay Hebert and Jonathon Patin, the homestanding, shaved-headed Rebels were able to answer with a touchdown of their own minutes later. Patin

doing the honors on a 33-yard Clint Campbell pass.

The score was now set at 19-13.

And then when the Tigers took over, TCH defensive back John Roy intercepted a Narcisse pass to give the Rebs possession. But Teurlings could not capitalize on the turnover as three plays later Vira LeBlanc infiltrated a Campbell pass to give the ball back to the Tigs.

Suddenly Patin — who was the hero of the evening for Teurlings — came right back with yet another interception. Once again the Rebels were beginning to roll, and even was able to drive 34 yards, and get inside the Breaux Bridge twenty yardline before you guessed it, still another interception, this one courtesy of Chris H. Hebert, ended the game.

As Autrey, who is entering his sixth year of coaching and his fifth year at Breaux Bridge, concluded, "It was a good team effort. We beat a good ballclub."

The game began with Breaux Bridge taking the opening kick and converting the ensuing drive into a fruitful one with a 53-yard bomb from Narcisse to Aubrey.

The Rebels struck back as soon as the second quarter began, capping a 66-yard

drive when, on third and five from the fourteen, quarterback Campbell hid the pigskin behind his left thigh and bootlegged all the way around the left end to tie things up at 6-6.

Breaux Bridge then decided to take a 12-6 advantage into the lockerroom as they ran the ol' halfback option — a play that had already worked miracles for the Tigers in the St. Martinville Jamboree, not to mention once before on the night — and converted it into a 78-yard touchdown pass from Troy Hypolite to Roberts.

# VICTORY A REALITY

## Long Wait Over For Carencro Bears

It's been a long time coming — longer than any Carencro High School football fan would like to think about. But this morning the Golden Bears awoke secure in the knowledge that their long losing streak is at an end.

The Bears, under the revitalized leadership of new head coach Pat Kee, put together both offense and defense Friday night for a 26-0 pasting of Teurlings for the first win at Carencro since the 1978 season when the Bears defeated Comeaux, 30-12 on November 3rd of that year.

Since that time, a pair of 0-10 seasons and despair had been the program's byword.

But Kee, whose troops played tough against Lafayette High while losing 7-4 in the final moments of the Kiwanis Jamboree before tumbling out of the starting gate last week at Cecilia, has the Bears on the upswing in 1981.

The victory Friday night was one equally shared by the

Bears' passing and running games as Marc Roger twice hit flanker Pat Constantine for scores and two scores were gained overland in the shutout win.

Constantine snared first-half scoring bombs of 41 and 35 yards from Roger as the home club marched to a 13-0 halftime lead.

The ground attack took over in the second half as Harvell Barry sped 69 yards to a TD on the first play of the third quarter, and Dwayne Narcisse finished up the scoring with a four yard scoring jaunt.

Barry, Kee's most consistent fullback, had been hurt in preseason and early season work, and has only recently returned to the full speed status that allowed him once again to be an integral part of the Golden Bear offense Friday night.

In all, Carencro rolled to a whopping 361 yards on the ground and 130 more in the air to total 491 yards in total offense while limiting the

tears of Coach Bobby Green to a mere 174 yards and five first downs.

The Rebels, now 0-2 on the season, suffered a severe loss when Jay Hebert, one half of the potent twin tandem of Jay and Jed Hebert that stars at both running back and defensive end, went down with an injury and had to be carried from the stadium.

The long wait is over for the Carencro Golden Bears. Kee said his Bears would be improved, and has already 100 percent improved over the last two seasons.

ABBEVILLE — Teurlings rookie head coach Bobby Green took his first victory as a head coach Friday night as the Rebels defeated Vermilion Catholic, which is headed by his ex partner and new foe Tad Tatman.

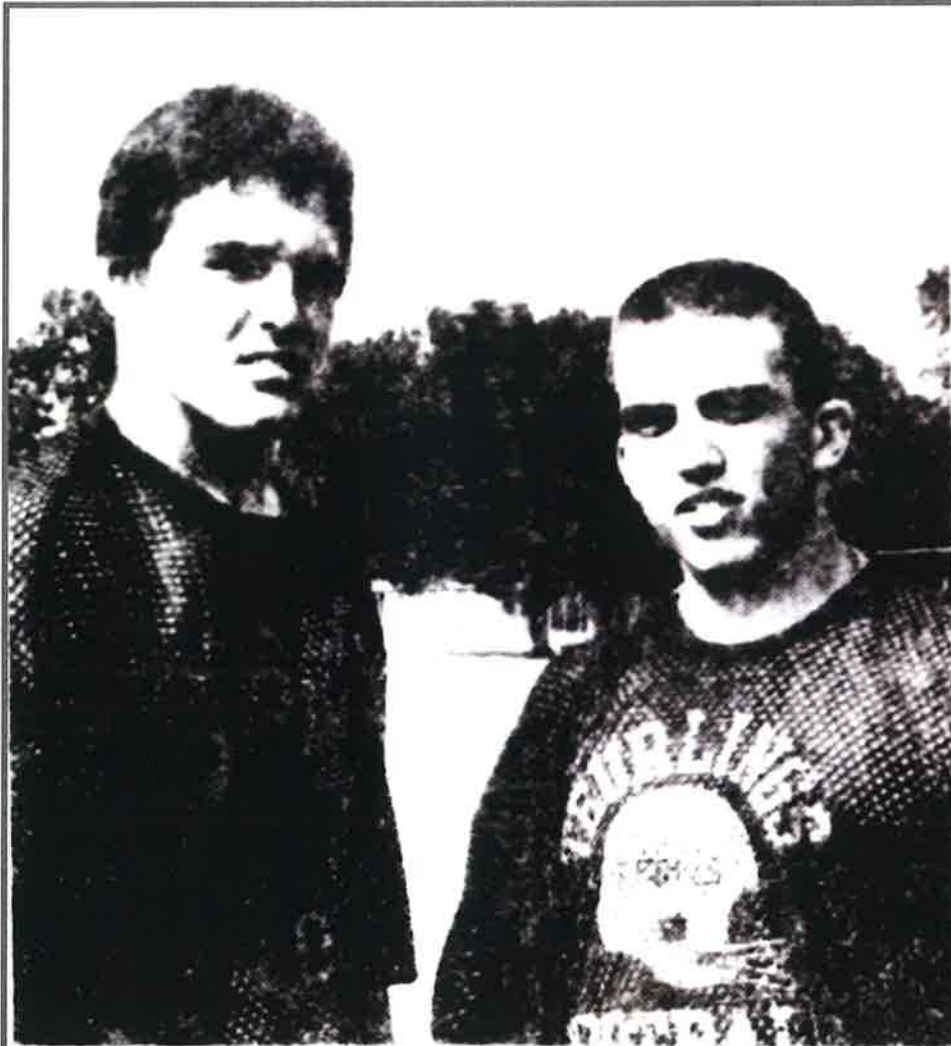

The junior split end, defensive back's heroics could have been very costly as he was injured early in the fourth quarter returning a punt and had to be taken to the hospital, although Coach Green says it didn't appear to be serious.

Turlings came out smoking in the early going putting 34 points on the board and allowing the Tigers seven in the first two quarters of play.

But Loreauville came back strong in the second half, after a pep talk by Head Mentor Kirk Crochet, to outscore the Rebels 12-0.

"We just came out flat in the second half," explained

Green on his team's complete turnaround. "Anytime a team goes into halftime leading by 25, they will usually come back out cold."

"Another reason for that was we played plenty of subs in the third quarter, which allowed our first team players to get cold on the sideline and it took them a whole quarter before they could warm up again."

Although his troops did let the Tigers score two more TD's in the second half, Green was still pleased with his team's performance.

"It was a good team effort," he praised. "The guys didn't give up and they played as a team. We took advantage of their mistakes and we didn't hang our heads when we made the mistakes."

Jed Hebert gave the Rebels a quick lead when he took a pitch from quarterback Clint Campbell at the TCH 47 and went all the way for a 53 yard run with 9:45 showing on the clock.

The Rebels received a gift moments later when the Tiger punter fumbled the snap from the center and he was tackled by Boudreaux at the Loreauville 28.

From there, it took the Rebels only four plays, with Campbell finding Rob Sonnier all alone in the left corner of the endzone for a 16-yard toss with 6:25 left in the opening quarter.

Ross Judee then split the uprights on the first of two successful PAT attempts in the first half to increase the Rebel lead to 13-0.

Loreauville came charging back and hit the scoring column with 1:22 left in the first period when held general Woodrow Broussard combined with tight end John Comer for an 18-yard TD strike.

Pat Vital then came on to boot one extra point through the crossbars to cut the deficit to 13-7.

After Gerami's dash ended the first quarter of play, Campbell hit the scoring column with 4:59 left before intermission, rolling around left end from 23 yards out to increase the TCH margin to 25-7 before the PAT was missed.

Gerami then pulled his

magic trick with 2:13 left before intermission and Judee's PAT was true to put the Rebels on top 32-7 at halftime.

Loreauville put six points on the scoreboard with 50 left in the third quarter, with Paul Broussard bullying in from the four on a slant over left tackle.

The Tigers went for two, but the pass was off its mark to leave the Rebels on top 32-13.

Coach Crochet's troops tallied their final touchdown of the evening with 10:34 left in the contest when Broussard again hit paydirt, this time from five yards out, but the two-point conversion was stopped short of the mark to end the scoring on the night for both clubs.

# Passing Attack Leads Pios Past Teurlings, 27-0

LAFAYETTE — "We really wanted to shut them out. It was a goal we set this week since those people had averaged over 30 points per game against us over the last three years."

These post game comments of Notre Dame defensive put the Pioneers

27-0 win over the Rebels in perspective. The Acadia Parish school played inspired football while upping their overall record to 6-0 and their district slate to 3-0. Teurlings dropped to 2-3 and 2-1, respectively. Only Notre Dame and Cathedral Carmel remain undefeated in district play.

The Pioneer defense was

magnificent allowing only 115 total yards. Teurlings' deepest penetration was down to the ND 27. The Rebels did not manage a first down until the second stanza. Moore felt it was a well-coordinated team effort. "Our defensive ends (Paul LaCroux and Donald Millet) did a super job of containing the run and

putting pressure on their quarterback. Nonguard, Chet Oliver plus tackles David Leonard and Kevin Carl did an effective job on our power runner Jed Hebert. Our linebackers (Craig Zaunbrecher and Doug Valdetoro) were very active and our secondary was around the ball all night."

Moore pointed out that Allen Cassidy, Darryl Thibodeaux, Peter and Stephen Boulet were in on numerous stops. Cassidy contributed an interception, four pass deflections, plus eight tackles. Stephen Boulet and Vernon Joubert came up with fumble recoveries.

While the Pioneer prevent unit was shutting down the Rebels, the Notre Dame offensive machine was operating on all-cylinders. The machine ground out 440 total yards, its largest output this season. Quarterback Stephen Moody fueled the offense with 177 yards passing and five TDs. Moody connected on seven of 18 aerials. Peter Boulet had five big catches for 148 strips, including TD's of 22 and eight yards. Quintin Marks had a TD reception of 13 yards and John Gossen added a 16 yard grab. David Thibodeaux continued his march toward a 1,000 yard season when he rambled for 148 yards on 28 carries and the other Pio TD. Mark Prevost added 78 stripes on 12 toles.

The vaunted Teurlings passing game really didn't get off the ground as Clint

Campbell hit on only seven of 21 tries for 35 yards. The completions were of the short variety with the longest being for 11 yards. Leading ground-gainer Jed Hebert was held to 33 yards on eight attempts. Freshman Tony Lablane who played most of the second half, ended up as the Rebels' main threat with 37 stripes in five carries. Hebert and Ross Jude played well defensively for the home, both contributing fumble recoveries. Jon Pain and Derrin Murry recorded interceptions.

Teurlings was the beneficiary of a huge break early in the opening quarter. On ND's first possession, Hebert captured a fumble in the air and returned it to the Pioneer 27. However, four plays yielded exactly one yard as a fourth down pass play was deflected by Millet.

The Pioneers promptly responded with a 74-yard scoring assault in nine plays. Thibodeaux reeled off two big first downs sandwiched by a Moody-to-Gossen pass for 16 yards. On a third-and-10 play, Moody hit his favorite target, Peter Boulet on a slant-in pattern. Boulet eluded two defenders at the five and scampered into the endzone to complete the 22-yard scoring play. Boulet also took the extra-point to give ND a 7-0 lead with 7:18 to play in the first period.

Stephen Boulet's fumble recovery midway in the second stanza set up ND's next score. Taking over on

the Rebel 25 the Pio stayed on the ground for seven plays. Moody carried once for eight yards and Thibodeaux did the rest. "Rock" scored from the one behind a John Whiting block at the 7:04 mark. Boulet made it 14-0 with a perfect placement.

Ashton Cassidy's offensive machine really put the game away with another score on their very next possession. Taking over on their 35, the machine cruised the 65 stripes in but three plays. On a first down surprise package, Moody lofted a bomb to Boulet, good for 51 yards. After Thibodeaux rushed for one, Moody came off a play-action fake and hit tight-end Quintin Marks, who plowed into the endzone to complete the 12-yard scoring play. Boulet's kick at the 4:32 mark gave ND a 21-0 halftime lead.

At intermission, the state vividly illustrated the Pioneer domination. ND had an 11-3 lead in first downs and a 270-40 lead in total offense. The 133 rushing 137 passing stat was a perfect example of a balanced attack.

The Pioneers took their first possession of the second half 78 yards in 11 plays. Thibodeaux and Prevost shared the work load as they hammered away at the Rebel defense. On the 11th play, Moody and Boulet teamed up on an eight-yard TD strike. Boulet's PAT was blocked at the 4:59 mark but ND had a comfortable 27-0 lead.

A questionable fum-

ble recovery call (one of many on the night) gave Teurlings their last scoring opportunity. Back-to-back 15-yard penalties gave Teurlings possession on the ND 34. However, four plays later the Rebels had stalled on the Pioneer 27. Late in the game turnovers and sacks became commonplace. Scott Hironson and Chad Marks sacked Campbell to monkey-wrench the Rebels' last two possessions, penning the shutout.

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# Hebert, Campbell Guide Rebels To 27-0 Shutout

Over the last six or seven years, Teurlings Catholic has traditionally been a "big play" team.

Ninety yard touchdown bombs, 80-yard break-away scampers ... that has been the trademark of the Rollickin' Rebels from TCH.

Then Bobby Green introduced the work ethic.

In a picture-book perfect display of ball control — engineered by Clint Campbell and carried out in a large part by Jed Hebert — the Rebs turned two seemingly hopeless situations into long, sustained drives in the first half of their key District 8-AA game with Catholic of New Iberia and went on from there to blank the visiting Panthers 27-0 in the Rebel's Homecoming Game at Clark Field Friday evening.

"It's fantastic!" a quietly pleased Green explained. "We've been working for a shutout all year. Our defense really came off the ball. They were very aggressive."

"We dedicated this game to our five seniors (Dane Moss, Ross Judice, Marty LeBlanc, Rob Sonnier and Joe Delhomme) and the young guys wanted to show the seniors how much they cared for them."

The whole game was epitomized by the second of those two, well-structured first half drives, when Catholic High Coach Mike Delcambre realized his team was going nowhere against the fired-up Rebel defense

and pulled an old trick out of his hat, calling for a quick kick on third down.

With this quite possibly being the first quick kick any of these young Teurlings players had ever seen, the punt (which travelled some 67 yards) caught them off guard and buried them in a hole at their own four yard-line.

But then Campbell went to work. He handed off to Hebert for twelve yards here, hit Charlie 'Tuna' Cunningham for a 19-yard pass (the only pass of the low-key march) there, and even personally scrambled

for a 24-yard gain, eventually driving the Rebels to within five yards of paydirt with less than 30 seconds 'til halftime.

The call went to Hebert, who capped the 11-play, 96-yard drive by bursting through the Panther line Larry Czonka-style to put TCH on top 13-0 at the half.

Hebert, by the way, finished with 118 yards on 18 carries ... 102 of those coming in that first half.

Defensively, the Rebels were led by Joe Ashy with 12 tackles, Chris Feucht with 9 and Kevin Boudreaux with eight. Jonathon Patin, Gary Gerami and Sonnier added interceptions while Darrin Murry and Steven Lotief recovered fumbles.

That other first half drive — an 83-yard, 13-play affair — was culminated by six-yard Campbell bootleg into the endzone.

Teurlings' "Bald Brigade" picked up right where they left off in the second half by taking the opening kickoff and driving from their own 31 to the endzone. The big play of the campaign was again a Campbell-Hebert combination, as the quarterback hit the fullback with a quick little screen pass that Hebert turned into a 47-yard gainer, while Campbell eventually tallied the TD from nine feet away with 7:23 to go in the third.

Campbell did it again in the fourth period by topping off a 11-play, 63-yard effort on a one yard plunge with 3:02 to go in the game. Judice, a team captain, added his third PAT conversion on three tries to set the final count at 27-0.

With the loss, Catholic High of New Iberia fell to 2-6 overall, and 1-4 in league

play. On the other hand, Teurlings Catholic remained alive in the District 8-AA playoff picture as the Rollickin' Rebels of Coaches Green, Tommy Badon, Steve Huter, Jack Delhomme and Larry Aucolin now stand at 5-3 and 4-1 going into next week's game at Kaplan (4-4, 2-3).

**A SIMILAR SITUATION** has arisen in District 5-AAA, where Cecilia, St. Martinville and Morgan City are all still very much alive in the Triple-A playoff picture.

**THE BATTLIN' BULLDOGS** (8-1, 2-1) would have to defeat Morgan City by more than four points to enter the playoffs, though if they won by more than 12 points they would become district champions — with Morgan City (8-1, 3-0) as runnersup — while if they win by somewhere between 4 and 12 points they would come in second behind St. Martinville (8-1, 3-1).

Incredibly, should Cecilia win, but by only three points or less, they could miss out on postseason play altogether even though they would finish with a fantastic 9-1 record. A loss, of course, would also eliminate them.

**DISTRICT 5-AAA'S SISTER** league, District 4-AAA, also still has its title crown on the line going into the final week of the season as the Crowley Gents (5-4, 3-0) meet the Eunice (5-4, 3-0) in Bobcat Stadium Friday night.

Meanwhile, a quick look at the final two league's in the Advertiser's coverage area finds that:

A suprising bunch of Opelousas (6-3, 5-1) Tigers laid claim to the 5-AAAA championship, while the fully-rebuilt Lafayette High Mighty Lions (6-3, 4-1), under the direction of Jay Stelly, will take home second place honors; conspicuously leaving long-time 5-Quad-A kingpins New Iberia and Acadiana out of the postseason figurings.

**ON THE CONTRARY**, in District 7-A, Hanson and Delcambre finished up exactly as they did last year with the peerless Richard McClosky earning yet another league title for the Hanson Memorial Tigers (7-2, 5-0) while Delcambre will again be the runnersup at 6-3 and 5-1.



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But, if the Rebels can beat Cathedral by seven or more points, they would enter the state playoffs as the second place finishers, since the Pioneers defeated Teurlings 27-0 four weeks ago.

In other league encounters, besides the key matchup at Clark Field between Cathedral (7-2) and Teurlings (6-3), Notre Dame (8-1) will entertain Erath (0-9), Kaplan (4-5) will travel to Loreauville (3-6) and Jeanerette (4-5) treks to Catholic High (2-7).

Last week's results had Cathedral defeating Catholic High 31-0, Teurlings dumping Kaplan 21-6, Loreauville topping Erath 52-12 and Notre Dame besting Jeanerette 34-9.

## CATHEDRAL at TEURLINGS

No doubt about it.

There will be plenty of fireworks in this game, since it's a known fact that there isn't much love between these two cross-town rivals.

The shoe was on the other foot last season, with the Rebels coming into the game with an undefeated 9-0 mark, number three ranking in the state and the Tigers needing to win by 15 points.

Cathedral did manage to kill the Rebels' hopes of an undefeated season, dumping Teurlings 20-6, but the Rebels still claimed the district title and entered post-season

action, while the Tigers stayed home.

Things are different this time around though, as Cathedral is in the driver's seat and if they can either defeat the Rebels or prevent them from winning by the necessary seven, then the Tigers would capture the league crown outright and enter the state playoffs.

The two schools are pretty evenly matched both offensively and defensively, with the Tigers getting the edge in the kicking game.

Coach Byler has two standout place-kickers and he isn't afraid to call on either when a point-after-touchdown or a field goal try arises.

Ross Judice does the PAT kicking for the Rebels, but he hasn't had that much experience via the three-point tries.

Senior quarterback Richard Brauns has been burning up the field of late for the Tigers, but so has Rebel junior field general Clint Campbell.

Cathedral has the slight edge in the running game, with senior fullback Rickey Bozeman and sophomore tailback having more experience than the Rebels tandem of Jed Hebert (fullback) and John Roy (tailback), both juniors in their first year in the backfield.

Up front, the two teams have top personnel, with Teurlings running behind

guard Marty Leblanc and tackle Chris Feucht, with the Tigers relying on the blocking of tackle Jimbo Castille, center Damon Hanks and guard Dean Dugas.

Manning the flanks for the Tigers are Roger Morse, Caldwell Huckabay and Brett Bouillion, with Jonathan Patin, Rob Sonnier and Charles Cunningham doing the brunt of the pass-catching for the Rebels.

Two of the top linebackers in Southwest Louisiana will meet in the game, with David Dauterive heading the Tiger fortunes and Judice leading the Rebels charge.

But, it takes more than just two players to be successful defensively, and the two teams are loaded for the kill.

End Linden Bercegeay, tackle Bill Vidrine and safety Richard Gossen lend a helping hand to the outstanding play of Dauterive.

Tackle Dane Moss, noseguard Kevin Boudreaux and linebacker Joe Ashy back up the leadership of Judice.

## ERATH at NOTRE DAME

About the only reason for playing this game is that it will give the Pioneers a final tune-up before entering the state playoffs.

# Cathedral Is Crowned 8-AA Champ

If 'D' stands for defense, than 'DD' must stand for double defense.

He might not be walking around with those two letters pinned on his chest or flying around fighting crime, but Cathedral linebacker David Dauterive makes his presence known on the football field.

And possibly his presence could not have been felt more than Friday night at Clark Field when the Cathedral Tigers held off a determined Teurlings fourth quarter rally to claim a hardfought 20-18 victory, giving the Tigers the District 8-AA championship.

The talented Tiger defender, who had five unassisted tackles and nine assists on the night, has been on big plays all throughout his career in Tigerland, but the one that came in the closing minutes of the game had to be the biggest that he's ever had.

Trailing 20-18, the Rebels went for the two-point conversion after scoring a touchdown, handing the ball off to bruising fullback Jed Hebert in the middle of the line. But Dauterive, defensive tackle Jimbo Castille and linebacker Ricky Bozeman stopped the ball carrier an eyelash from the goal line, ending the Rebels' hopes of an upset.

Asked if he was expecting Teurlings to run the play Dauterive answered, "Yes. We had a super scouting report. They told us to watch for it."

"We played real good as a team," praised Dauterive, who didn't want to take all the credit for the win. "The whole team contributed. Everybody did a super job."

One person that was as equally proud of his troops was first year head coach Jacob Byler, who led the Tigers to their first district championship since 1979.

"It feels super," confessed Byler. "I couldn't be prouder of a bunch of young men."

"But, I want to compliment Coach Bobby Green and his staff and players for giving us such a tough game. They never gave up. I knew it was going to be that way all along."

The Tigers put it together, both of-

fensively and defensively in the contest, a fact that Byler was pleased with.

"I was real satisfied with the offense and defense," assessed Byler. "They did the job when they had to."

"Offensively, the backs ran hard and the receivers did a good job of catching the ball."

"We knew we would have to contain (Rebel quarterback Clint) Campbell to beat them and our defense did a good job of stopping him. They made the big play when they had to."

If it weren't for those 'big plays' the defense turned in Cathedral could have been in serious trouble, as the Rebels picked up 336 total offensive yards, while Cathedral was accumulating 267.

Bozeman not only shone on defense, but the touchdown he scored in the third quarter had to be one of the biggest of his career as well.

That TD (covering 12 yards) with 3:04 left in the period proved to be the game clincher, giving the Tigers the league title.

The Tigers started the drive on their own 26 yard line and marched the length of the field in seven plays, where Bozeman pulled his trick.

Trailing 20-6 heading into the final stanza, the Rebels came to life, pushing across two touchdowns, but the rally fell short of the mark when Hebert was stopped.

Teurlings' first TD came on the initial play of the quarter when Jed Hebert caught a Campbell pass over the middle and bulled his way over from the 30 with 11:51 left in the contest.

Coach Green elected to go for the two-point conversion, but the pass was deflected to leave the Rebels down by eight (20-12).

The drive had originally started at the end of the third quarter, (2:48) when the Rebels took over on their own 45 and scored six plays later on Hebert's heroics.

After an exchange of punts, Teurlings started its final drive of the evening with 3:28 to go in the game on the Tiger 39 and went in to score in only two plays.

First, Campbell hit Gary Gerami over the middle for 32 down to the seven, then connected with Rob Sonnier on a slant in for the six, setting up the final-ditch two-point conversion that will long be talked about.

The adrenalin was flowing from the opening gun and the two teams battled for the first 24 minutes of play.

Cathedral did manage to score a touchdown in each period, with the Rebels tallying in the second stanza, but in between there was plenty of head knocking going on.

Pre-game billing was centered around the two team's quarterbacks and both lived up to their expectations.

Tiger signal caller Richard Brauns, who completed nine of 15 pass attempts in the game for 154 yards, passed for two

touchdowns, and Campbell, who was 10 of 20 for 165 yards, sprinted in for the Rebels first half TD.

Cathedral's first tally came with 1:17 left in the opening period when Caldwell Huckabay hauled in a 37 yard strike from Brauns.

The pass receiver then turned place kicker and booted through the extra point to give the Tigers a 7-0 margin.

Coach Byler's troops had taken over on their own 49 yard line and marched the length of the field in only three plays for the lead.

After holding the Rebels on downs with the ensuing kickoff, the Tigers took over on their own 37 and went all the way in nine tries for the score.

Tight end Roger Morse was the 'man-of-the-hour' this time as he gathered in a bullet from Brauns and outraced everyone to paydirt from 13 yards out.

Huckabay's PAT was again true to put the Tigers on top 14-0 with 9:38 left before intermission.

Teurlings came to life from there, starting at its own 25 and going all the way in only four plays.

Campbell's number was called in all four cracks and on the last, he faked a handoff into the line, pulled the ball out and outraced everyone down the sideline to touchdownland for a 57 yard jaunt with 7:33 left.

The point after was wide left, but the Rebels had cut the deficit to eight (14-6), ending the first half scoring and setting up the final 24 minutes of explosive action.

Cathedral, 8-2 on the season and 7-0 in league encounters, will now enter the state playoffs, but the Tigers have received a first round bye and will not play until the following week, meeting the winner between Shady Grove and the District 7-AA champion.

For the Rebels of first-year head mentor Bobby Green, they finished the season with a respectable 6-4 mark and 5-2 league slate. But, with only five seniors on the team, the future looks bright.

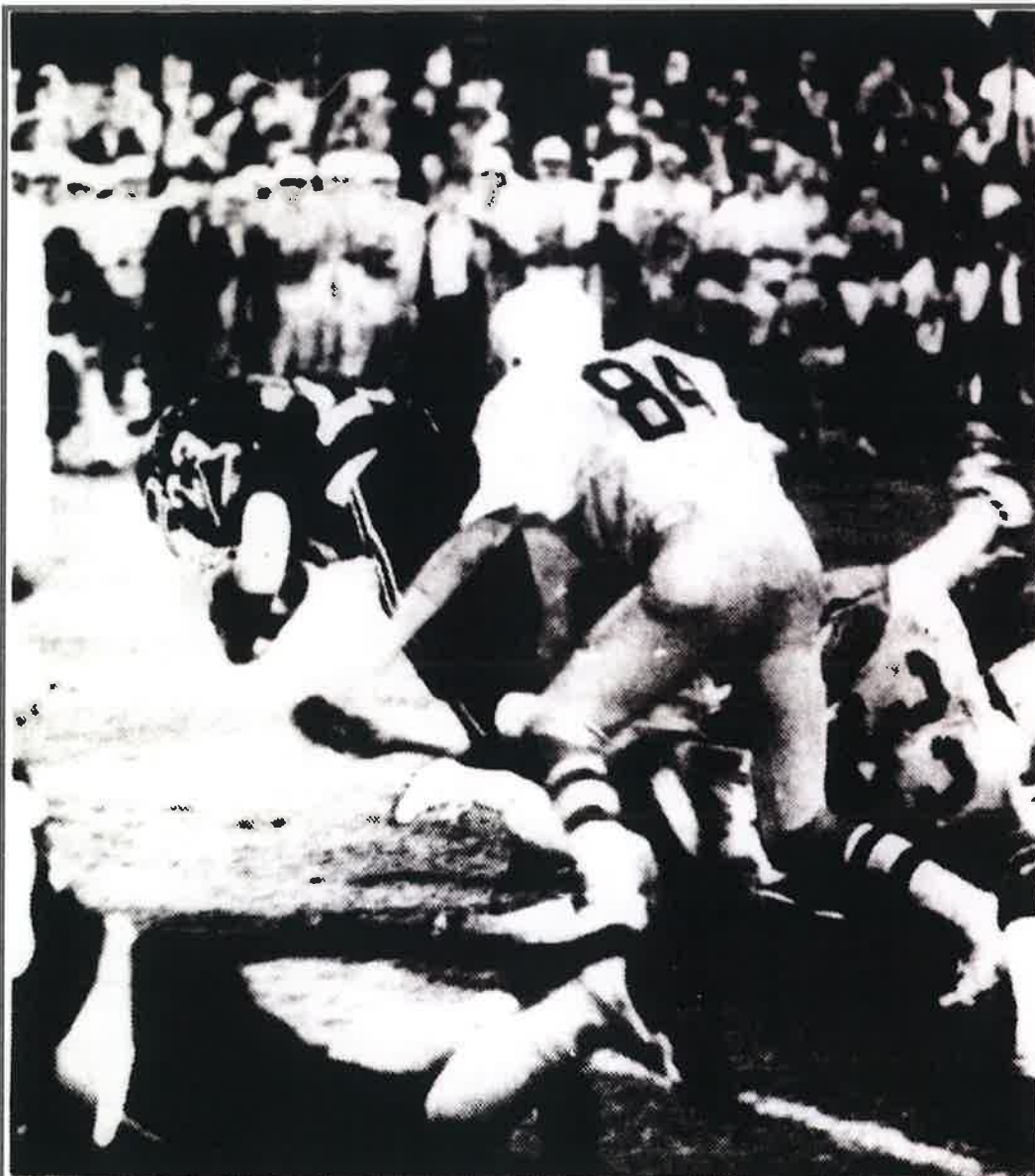

**GRABBING ON** — Roger Morse (84) Cathedral defensive end, grabs on to Teurlings running back Troy Leblanc during first half action at Clark Field

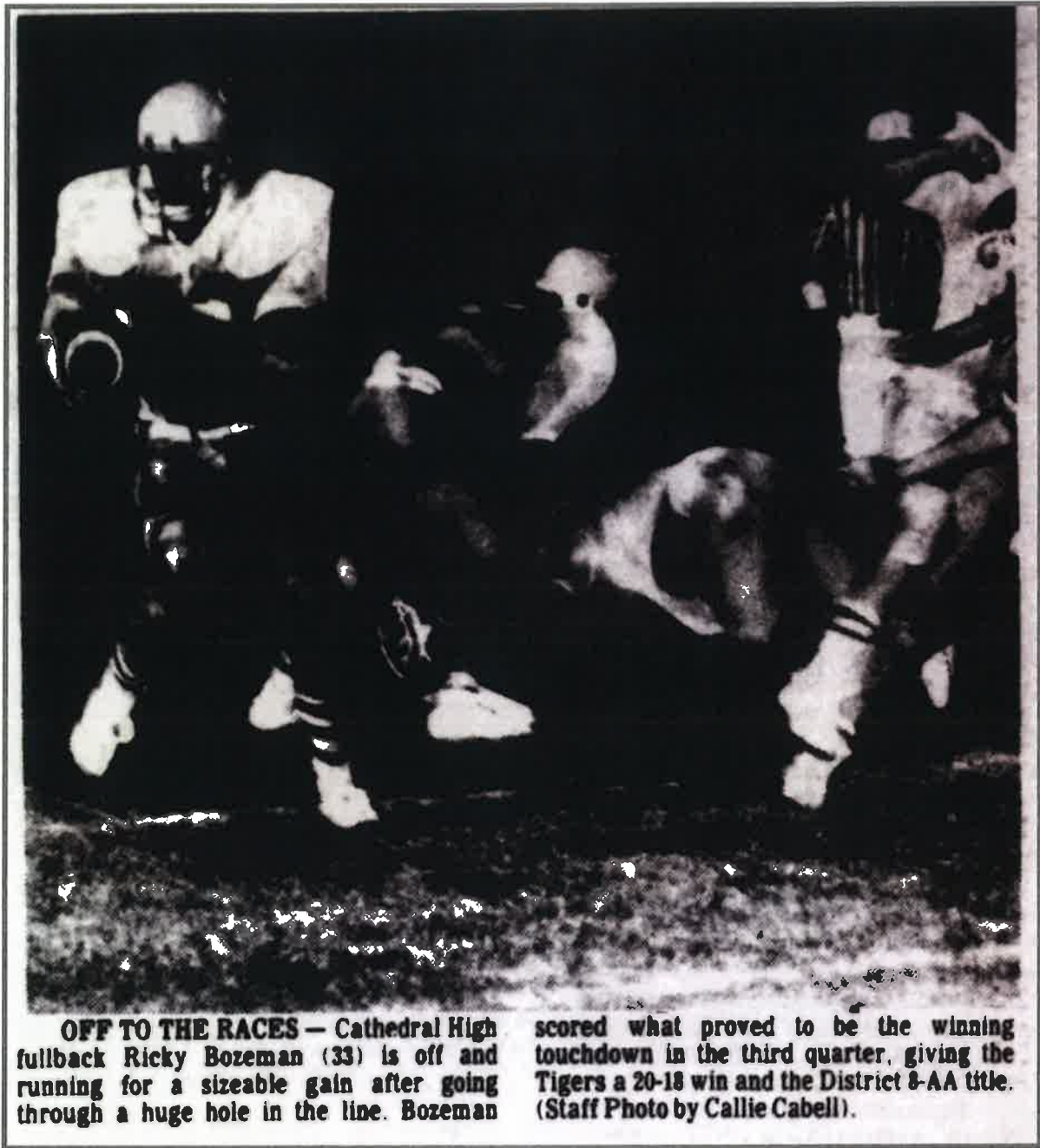

# Byler, Dauterive, Thibodeaux Top 8-AA

It was fitting that the most valuable players on the 8-AA All-District team were representatives from Cathedral-Carmel and Notre Dame, two of the winningest teams in the highly competitive district.

District coaches believed Notre Dame's David Thibodeaux, the team's leading rusher, and Cathedral-Carmel's David Dauterive, the team's leading tackler, were the outstanding offensive and defensive players in 8-AA when they chose the team for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

The first team offense boasts six juniors who'll be back for another season. But it was a senior on the team who stood head and shoulders above the rest, according to the district's coaches: Thibodeaux, one of two 1,000-yard rushers on the

team, was a major reason the Pioneers roared to a runnerup finish in 8-AA.

Notre Dame was 9-1 overall and 6-1 in 8-AA.

When the Pioneers, an explosive offensive team, needed the yards on the ground they called on Thibodeaux. The 6-foot-1, 180-pounder responded with 1,338 yards on 207 carries. He also scored 14 touchdowns to pace the Pioneers, who scored 191 points in district and 273 overall in the regular season.

Cathedral-Carmel's defense was one of the stingiest units in the league when it came to protecting the end zone. A big reason opponents found it hard to crack the goal line against the district champion Tigers was linebacker David Dauterive.

What the 5-foot-7, 145-pound senior lacked in size he balanced out with hustle and aggressiveness, which

was reflected in his defensive stats. Dauterive made 60 unassisted tackles and 77 assists, two fumble recoveries, 16 quarterback sacks and an interception.

Dauterive spearheaded a defense that surrendered just 78 points in district and 91 points overall.

Cathedral-Carmel, 8-2 overall, also harbored the district's coach of the year in Jacob Byler. The first-year head coach took over the Tigers and guided them to a perfect record in district action, 7-0.

Tailback Matt Broussard of New Iberia's Catholic High School was a marked man in the Panthers' backfield. But, nevertheless,

the hard-running junior still managed to gain 1,018 yards on 194 carries to join Thibodeaux on the first team.

The versatile Panther, 5-foot-10, 170 pounds, also scored eight touchdowns. Broussard was a double threat as a passer; he completed nine passes for 64 yards.

Rounding out the first-team offensive backfield were two of the six juniors, quarterback Clint Campbell of Teurlings, a sharp-shooting junior, and run-

ningback Paul Broussard of Loreauville, a reliable ground gainer.

Campbell, a 6-foot-1, 170-pound signal caller, accounted for more than 1,600 yards in offense while guiding the Rebels. He struck for 1,035 yards in the air by completing 75 of 152 passes. His aerials accounted for 11 touchdowns.

Campbell, who was intercepted 14 times, also scored 11 touchdowns while rushing for 622 yards on 136 carries.

Broussard, a 5-foot-10, 180-pound junior, just missed breaking the 1,000 yard plateau with 961 yards on 145 carries.

The rest of the offensive unit includes tight ends John Comer of Loreauville and Caldwell Huckaby of Cathedral-Carmel, who tied in voting by the coaches.

split end Peter Boulet of Notre Dame, tackles Ross Judice of Teurlings, a 6-foot-1, 190 senior, and James Castille of Cathedral-Carmel, a 5-foot-10, 185-pound senior. Guards Albert Bacile of Notre Dame, a 5-foot-9, 165-pound junior, and J. Paul Bernard of Notre Dame, a 5-foot-7, 175-pound junior, and center Gary

Joubert of Notre Dame, a 5-foot-11, 175-pound junior.

Comer was chosen the LSWA's first-team choice at tight end. The 6-foot-3, 185-pound senior, and invaluable blocker, also caught 11 passes for 432 yards and three touchdowns for the Tigers.

Huckaby, a 5-foot-10, 165-pound senior, caught 26 passes for 421 yards and two touchdowns for the district champions.

Boulet was on the receiving end of 42 passes that covered 750 yards. The 5-foot-9, 150-pound senior had 10 touchdown catches.

The rest of the first-team defense chose by the coaches includes noseguard Chet Oliver of Notre Dame, a 5-foot-10, 185-pound senior, tackles Alex Nelson of Jeanerette, a 5-foot-10, 190-pound senior, and Bill Vidrine of Cathedral-Carmel, a 6-foot-1, 225-pound senior, ends Paul LaCroix of Notre Dame, a 5-foot-10, 180 senior, and Jed Hebert of Teurlings, a 6-foot-1, 210-pound junior. Linebackers Arnold Turner of Kaplan, a 6-foot-1, 210-pound junior, and Craig Zaunbrecher of Notre Dame, a 6-foot-1, 170-pound junior, and defensive backs Woodrow Broussard of

Loreauville, a 6-foot-1, 175-pound senior, Arthur Alexander of Jeanerette, a 5-foot-9, 155-pound junior, Allen Cassidy of Notre Dame, a 5-foot-10, 140-pound sophomore, and Brett Boulton of Cathedral-Carmel, a 5-foot-8, 150-pound junior.

Cassidy and Boulton tied in the voting by the coaches. Cassidy, who had eight interceptions to go along with 20 solo stops and 21 assists, was the LSWA's choice as a first-team defensive backs.

The all-district team's placekickers were Peter Boulet of Notre Dame and Caldwell Huckaby of Cathedral-Carmel. Boulet was 26-29 on PATs while Huckaby was 20-20 on PATs.

The all-district squad's punters were Lance Leger of Cathedral-Carmel and Allen Kenner of Catholic High School. Leger had a 35.0 average per kick while Kenner had a 34.0 average per kick.
