Optimistic Rebels eye more wins

Despite a definite disadvantage in the numbers category, the Teurlings Rebels will be looking for bigger and better things in

With only 28 players out for football, Coach Earl Heintz and the rest of his staff will once again be hurt by the lack of players needed to compete in AA football, in particular District 7-AA.

"We have only 28 out, but 1 think we can be competitive," said Heintz. "Going into last year we had 25 players but only 13 or 14 that could really play. This year it looks like we have 20-23 who can play."

"We are going to have to have a lot of people that will go both ways. With so few there's really nothing we can do about it. But even with only 28 out, I still think we've got some young kids that will be able to give some of the starters a little breather in the game."

Of the 22 positions 15 will be filled by returning starters and that is the biggest reason that Heintz is looking for better production from this year's squad

We've gotten bigger and stronger, he added, our offseason went real well. We have a

real good nucleus."
Offensively, the Rebels ground game was to be led by senior running back Ed Stevens, but he went down with a knee injury in the Rebels first scrimmage and is a question mark.



Rebels, Patriots eye first victories

KAPLAN — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels and the North Vermilion Patriots hope to erase memories of a week ago when they tangle here tonight at Pirate Stadium beginning at 7 p.m.

The Rebels got off to a rough start against the Vermilion Catholic Eagles in Abbeville, falling behind 21-0 in the first quarter and eventually losing 54-30.

The Patriots also began the season in disappointing style failing.

The Patriots also began the season in disappointing style, failing to score in a 32-0 loss to the Basile Bearcats.

Teurlings head coach Earl Heintz felt his defense was the team's strong point during pre-season drills, but after watching last week's performance, he says it

needs more work.

"Coming into the season we thought we would have a pretty good defense," said Heintz. "But in the VC game and our last scrimmage, it has been our rough spot We've had good workouts this week though. The kids are working hard, so the problem is not a lack of effort."

Ed Stevens was Teurlings' top rusher a year ago as well as being one of their top defensive players at the linebacker position. A preseason knee injury to Stevens has certainly been felt on both sides of the ball.

"More and more I watch our defense, it's obvious how much we miss Ed," said Heintz. "He's a good running back, but we actually miss him more on defense because he is a heck of a middle linebacker."

Teurlings' problem has been mainly the inability to stop the run, as VC ran up 453 yards rushing a week ago.

week ago.

"We are having problems against the run," said Heintz. "We didn't do a good job in our last scrimmage and we didn't do a good job against Delcambre in the jamboree. VC just ran right at us and the problem against them just continued where it left off against Delcambre."

Stevens underwent

arthroscopic knee surgery on Wednesday morning and may be back for district play. However, Heintz says the team must regroup and play better against the Patri-

ots.

"We'll have to see what kind of character we're made of," said Heintz. "We still have a lot to work on offensively and defensively, and North Vermilion is a capable ball club. On paper we appear even because they gave up 21 points to VC in a half and we gave up 21 in a quarter, so it will be a tough game."

In the 24-point loss to Vermilion Catholic, the Rebels did have a bright spot with the offense scoring 30 points and Heintz feels they should continue to move the ball.

"Realistically we can find some bright spots," he said. "We moved the ball against Delcambre and against VC last week we had about 350 yards total offense, so I was happy with that. Considering we got behind by 21 points so quick and had to throw our offensive game plan out of the window, we did a good job of executing. We were in a situation where we had to score a lot of points in a hurry."





The Teurlings Catholic Rebels and Notre Dame Pioneers may be entering tonight's battle with a combined record of 1-5, but one wouldn't know it by listening to the opposing head coaches.

Even though both teams carry sub-500 marks into Clark Field for the 7:30 kickoff, Teurlings' Earl Heintz and Notre Dame's Donnie Gaspard certainly have shown a mutual respect for each other's squad.

Heintz' crew stands at 1-2 on the season, having lost to Vermilion Catholic (54-30) in the opener, beaten North Vermilion (33-18) in week two and losing to Hanson (21-14) last Friday night.

Gaspard and the Pioneers are coming off a much more disappointing defeat after being shutout (49-0) by the Cecilia Bulldogs. They were also beaten by the Eunice Bobcats in week two and the St. Louis Saints in the opener.

"It's like I told the kids at the end of practice today (Tuesday)," Heintz began. "When you stop and think, we people talk about high school football in southwest Louisiana, the first one you think about has to be Notre Dame. Over the last 20 years they haven't missed the playoffs much, plus they have two state championships and have been to the state finals two other times.

"Now they're coming in here 0-3," Heintz added. "It's like our defensive coordinator (Gary Perkins) said, they'll be coming in here with blood in their eyes and I'm sure that we're one of the easiest teams he's faced, so they'll be wanting that first win real bad."

Heintz also says his Rebels will know what the Pios' game-plan will be, but the biggest problem will be finding ways to counter them.

"I know (Gaspard) and I know

what he's going to do against us,"
he said. "He's going to go to basic
football. I know darn good and well
that they will run right at us and
not try anything fancy. They're

"That one broke our backs and

"That one broke our backs and the game just got progressively worse," he said. "We didn't overlook them because Cecilia has a good ball club, so I was really disappointed losing the way we did."

The Rebels have had problems defensively this season, but their offense has put up impressive numbers. They had over 400 yards in total offense in their win over North Vermilion, had over 300 against VC, and had nearly 300 again (283) last week against Hanson.

Team totals offensively have the Rebels ranked seventh in the Acadiana area. They have tallied 1,053 yards in total offense with 627 yards rushing and 426 passing. Their defense has been the weak link, having given up 1,228 yards (932 rushing, 296 passing). Fullback Troy Lambert had an

Fullback Troy Lambert had an exceptional game in the sevenpoint defeat against the Tigers, gaining 115 yards on 11 carries.

Burt Fontenot leads Teurlings on the ground with 226 yards on 30 carries, while Delhomme has completed 26-of-58 for 445 yards and eight scores, and has also added three rushing touchdowns. Wideout Kelly Balfour has caught five passes for 85 yards and two touchdowns, and James Stutes also caught an 18-yard TD pass from Delhomme last week.

Notre Dame has struggled offensively with 616 total yards (352 rushing, 264 passing), but their defense has been fairly solid, giving up 722 yards (588 rushing, 134 passing)



Morrow, despite missing the Cecilia game, is still the Pios' top rusher with 135 yards and two touchdowns on 21 carries.









Teurlings, who had just four offen-sive possessions in the first half, broke the scoreless tie on its first drive of the second quarter.

Sophomore quarterback Jake Delhomme, who finished the game 13 of 30 for 229 yards, hit Burt Fontenot for 15 yards and Kelly Balfour for 23 yards to get the drive going, but a dropped touchdown pass stalled the drive at the Pioneer six.

That forced the Rebels to settle for a 23-yard field goal by Fontenot with 8:46 left until intermission.

Notre Dame then answered with a score of its own. After a clip got the drive started at the Pioneer 24, the running of Poydras and a 23-yard pass from Michael Odom to Seilhan to the Pios to the Rebel 28

Six plays later, Odom found Eric Lambousy from seven yards out on a fourth-and-three for a touchdown. Cy Link added the extra point, and Notre Dame led 7-3 with 2:26 remaining in the first half

The Rebels fumbled the ball back to the Pios three plays after the ensu-ing kickoff. Notre Dame couldn't capitalize, however, as pass defenses by James Stutes and Delhomme turned the Pios away on the half's final two plays.

A Ryan Link interception put a

quick end to Teurlings' first possession of the second half, and set up Notre Dame's second scoring drive.

And again it came on a fourthdown conversion when Odom hit Seilhan for 28 yards and a touchdown on a fourth-and-six. Link added the extra point, and the Pios led 14-3 with 8:54 remaining in the third period.

The Rebels, after two interceptions and two failed fourth-down conversions stopped them inside the Pioneer 15 three times early in the second half, finally pushed it in on its second drive of the fourth period. A 34-yard completion to Kelly Balfour set up a 23-yard touchdown completion to Fontenot. The two-point conversion failed, though, and Notre Dame still led 14-9 with 7:17 left in the

The Rebels would get just one last drive, and got down to the Pioneer 21. But they fumbled two plays later, and would never regain possession. A first-down run of 12 yards by Poydras with 2:24 left all but put the nail in the coffin. It was Notre Dame's first first down of the second half, but it was enough to secure a Pioneer victory

"It's a loss, but I'm very proud of the way we played," said Rebel Head Coach Earl Heintz. "I told them all I asked for was 110 percent. They gave me 120 percent tonight.

"We're still very, very young and inexperienced. We only have four seniors playing. We're getting better every week. Sooner or later good things are going to happen for us.

"We can't win football games with that many offensive plays in one half," said Heintz. "We moved the ball fairly well in the second half. They never consistenly stopped us, but we just didn't have the ball enough."

Teurlings' final scoring drive, which ended when Fontenot caught the touchdown pass, was set up by passes of 16 yards from Delhomme to Kelly Balfour and 13 yards from Delhomme to Fontenot.

"We're just not playing a complete football game," added Heintz.
"The mental mistakes are hurting us. We were in position to put points on the board in the first half after that long run and then on the next play we fumble. For us to win more games, we'll have to avoid the mental mistakes

The long run Heintz spoke of was a 62-yard run by Troy Lambert which put the ball on the Lake Arthur 12. Chris Ozene fumbled on the next play and the rally was thwarted.




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

Cecilia dominates 7-AA All-District

It was supposed to be a rebuilding year for the Cecilia Bulldogs.

A quick look at the 1990 7-AA All-District team, and it's quite obvious Head Coach James Waguespack's troops accomplished much more than many thought possible.

Versatile junior running back Leonard Etienne was voted as the Offensive Player of the Year, senior defensive lineman Richard Journet was named Defensive Player of the Year and Waguespack earned Coach of the Year honors.

The result of those stellar individual performances was a 9-3 record, a district championship and a Class AA state regional finish

Etienne, a 5-8, 160-pound junior, didn't have outstanding statistics, but was the primary weapon in the Bulldogs' diversified attack. He rushed for 455 yards and eight touchdowns on 66 carries, and also caught 14 passes for 110 yards and two more touchdowns.

Journet, a 6-0, 170-pound senior, surpassed all expectations, tallying 72 solo tackles, 55 assists and 15 quarterback sacks. He also excelled as a special teams performer, blocking eight punts, five extra points and a field goal.

A year ago, Cecilia went just 4-6 and returned only three starters on offense and three on defense. Nevertheless, Waguespack (now 21-21 at Cecilia), along with defensive coordinator Lowell Guidry, molded a dominant defensive unit and a capable offense en route to an 8-2, 6-0 regular season and a 14-0 bi-district victory over Independence before falling 16-0 to Iota in state regional action.

Joining Etienne in the offensive backfield are Buddy Henry of Church Point, Bevan Perron of Port Barre and Tyler Daigle of Sunset.

Henry rushed for 618 yards and eight touchdowns on 137 attempts, Perron scored 14 touchdowns and rushed for 843 yards on 147 carries and Daigle contributed 688 yards and seven touchdowns on 170 rushes.

Port Barre's Scott Ardoin was voted the league's top quarterback after rushing for 365 yards and five touchdowns on 80 carries, and completing 60 of 107 passes for 904 yards and nine touchdowns.

Cecilia's Matt Tauzin (14-156, 3 TDs), Opelousas Catholic's Kennon Lavergne (31-482, 2 TD) and Port Barre's Willy Godchaux (8-150, 2 TDs) make the district's wide receiving corps. Port Barre's Ryan Reed caught 18 passes for 341 yards and four scores to nail down the tight end spot.

The offensive line consists of Keifer Wyble of Cecilia and Jeff Dupre of Opelousas Catholic at tackles, Brandon Langlinais of Church Point and Jimmy Guilbeau of Cecilia at guards and Damien Daigle of Opelousas Catholic and Andrew Bonvillian of Sunset as the two centers.

The placekicker was Raymond Papillion, who hit on 13 of 16 extra points and one field goal of 30 yards.

Journet was joined on the defensive front by Papillion, Brandon Latiolais of Church Point, Matthew Peck of OCHS and Jared Fontenot of Port Barre.

Papillion had 40 solo tackles, 25 assists and four quarterback sacks, Latiolais had 30 solos and 15 assists, Peck had 15 solos, 30 assists and five sacks, while Fontenot contributed 36 solos and 47 assists.

The linebacking crew include Cecilia's Keith Filer and Darrin Landry, Church Point's Brad Gibson and Dusty Latiolais and Port Barre's Reed. Filer had 40 solos, 20 assists, three sacks and four fumble recoveries, and Landry had 60 solos, 35 assists, three interceptions and four fumble recoveries.

Gibson had 40 solos, 14 assists and two interceptions, while Latiolais added 70 solos, 20 assists, five interceptions and four fumble recoveries. Reed totaled 51 solos, 24 assists, three interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

The defensive backfield consists of Cecilia's Kevin Wiltz, Church Point's Bradley Boutte, Ardoin of Port Barre and Lavergne of OCHS.

Wiltz, a returning first-team All-District pick, had 25 solos, 12 assists and five interceptions. Boutte had 24 solos, 10 assists and six interceptions. Ardoin had three interceptions, along with 13 solos and 13 assists, while Lavergne contributed 20 solos, 19 assists and five interceptions.
