Optimistic Rebels eye more wins

Despite a definite disadvantage in the numbers category, the Teurlings Rebels will be looking for bigger and better things in 1990.

With only 28 players out for football, Coach Earl Heintz and the rest of his staff will once again be hurt by the lack of players needed to compete in AA football, in particular District 7-AA.

"We have only 28 out, but I think we can be competitive," said Heintz. "Going into last year we had 25 players but only 13 or 14 that could really play. This year it looks like we have 20-23 who can play."

"We are going to have to have a lot of people that will go both ways. With so few there's really nothing we can do about it. But even with only 28 out, I still think

we've got some young kids that will be able to give some of the starters a little breather in the game."

Of the 22 positions 15 will be filled by returning starters and that is the biggest reason that Heintz is looking for better production from this year's squad.

"We've gotten bigger and stronger," he added. "our off-season went real well. We have a real good nucleus."

Offensively, the Rebels ground game was to be led by senior running back Ed Stevens, but he went down with a knee injury in the Rebels first scrimmage and is a question mark.

Stevens (5-10, 195) ran for 755 yards last season and is looking for more production in 1990.

"It was just one of those freak accidents," said Heintz. "Ed went

to make a move, planted his foot and was in the process of making his cut when the knee just gave way."

"We moved the ball on the ground in the scrimmage and in the jamboree," said Heintz.

"There is no doubt we are better with Ed in the game, but we just have to get our linemen to explode off the line and hold their blocks a little longer."

Burt Fontenot will replace Stevens at the tailback slot and was the Rebels leading ground gainer in the Jamboree.

The preliminary indication is that Stevens will be out for three to four weeks, but it may be longer than that.

The offensive line Heintz referred to is anchored by Brian Leger (5-8, 172) at center, Troy Ledet (6-9, 197) at left guard, Paul Brunet (6-9, 265) at left tackle and Ike Stevens (5-10, 210) at right tackle. Lee Barnes (6-1, 190) is expected to fill the vacated spot at right guard.

Sophomore Jake Delhomme (6-9, 155) started four games for the Rebels late last season and is ready for his first full season at the helm of the Teurlings attack.

"Jake's size and strength is finally catching up with him," said Heintz. "He is throwing the ball real well and he is a lot more mature. He stepped up to the challenge last year and I think that will definitely help him out."

Delhomme's main targets will be returning starter Joe Heintz (5-8, 145) at flanker, Kelly Balfour (5-6, 165) at tight end and James Stutes (5-5, 130) at split end. The tight end spot may also be occupied by Mitch Conville or Luke Lumpkin, while Monte Richard will battle Stutes for the split end job.

Troy Lambert (5-9, 165) is set to take over at fullback for departing senior Jerrod Lemaire.

Defensively, the Rebels return eight starters on defense, but only two of the 11 spots will be filled by players not playing offense and that may hurt the Rebels late in the game.

"I feel defense can be a stronger point this year," said Heintz. "The kids are getting comfortable with our defense and

offensive unit Fontenot (40), homme (11), Ed Stevens (10), Kelly Balfour (80) and John Raymond (12).

these guys played a lot last year. We only lost one linebacker and two defensive backs."

The defensive line will be made up of the starting offensive line as Ledet and Brunet hold down the end positions. Barnes and Stevens fill the tackle slots and Leger anchors the line at noseguard.

Stevens and Lambert hold down two of the linebacking slots while Balfour moves into Lemaire's slot as the third linebacker. Lemaire led the Rebels with 104 solo tackles last season.

Heintz, Burt Fontenot (5-8, 155), and Johnny Raymond (5-8, 155) make up the secondary.

"I feel our first 11 can hold their own with everyone in the district except Opelousas Catholic, but the lack of numbers will eventually catch up with us," said Heintz. "I feel we can compete with our pre-district schedule (Vermilion Catholic, Hanson, North Vermilion, Notre Dame, and Lake Arthur) and if we can win a few early, we will get some confidence going into district play."

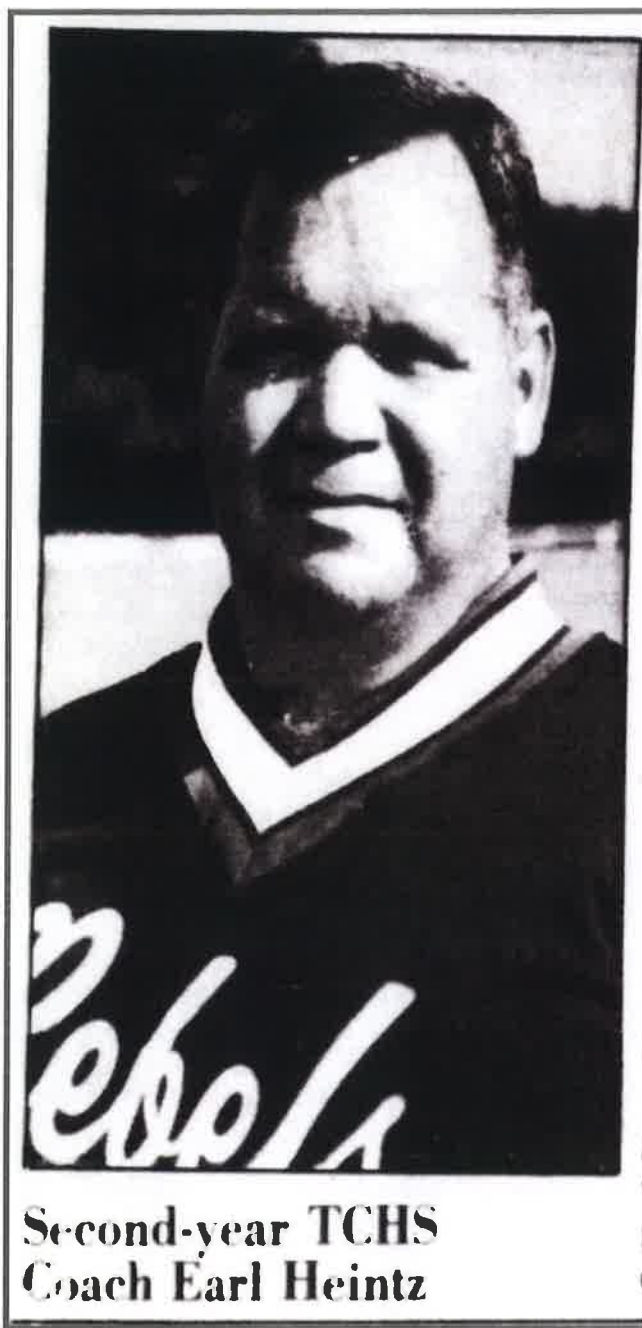

Bears' Barousse begins career

The Mac Barousse Era at Carencro High begins tonight.

And he'll be the first one to tell you that he could have picked a better situation to open his head coaching career, as his Golden Bears travel to meet the Leesville Wampus Cats, beginning at 7 p.m.

"I'm not nervous," said Barousse. "But I'm worried about the young kids when we get up there. They (Leesville) remind me a lot of Franklin and Opelousas as far as team speed goes. A lot of people are expecting big things from us, but we've got five guys starting who have never seen a varsity regular season game, and they're going to be in some unfamiliar territory tomorrow night."

"They've got Jack (Andre) back over there. He had been there before and had some success. He's brought some excitement back to Leesville football. High school football is big stuff in Leesville. It's going to be almost like a playoff atmosphere. It'll be interesting to see how we handle it."

One thing Barousse is happy Leesville is not bring back is running back Erwin Brown, who rushed for 200 yards on 21 attempts in carrying the Cats 34-17 past the Bears last season.

The Bears, on the other hand, have a few decent backs returning in senior fullback Dexter Porter and sophomore tailback Dexter Porter.

"Dexter had a great jamboree," said Barousse. "He graded out at 100 percent, and that's the first running back we've had do that since I've been here. It's not going to be easy, though. They play with a lot of different

defensive fronts. Rip (Eveland) has been working hard with the line all week long."

In other games involving city schools tonight, the Lafayette High Mighty Lions travel to meet the Capitol Lions in Baton Rouge, the Acadiana Wreckin' Rams are also on the road in their traditional season opener against the LaGrange Gators in Lake Charles and the Teurlings Catholic Rebels make the short trip to Abbeville to battle the Vermilion Catholic Screamin' Eagles.

"They (Capitol) are big and talented," said Mighty Lion Head Coach Bobby Green. "They lost their quarterback from last year, but this one is very talented. You can tell he's inexperienced, but he's a threat. The thing that concerns me the most about them is that they can break the big one

against you on any play."

"We're going to have to put pressure on the quarterback, because they're going to throw the play every other play, if not more than that. Our secondary is going to get a good early test. They're not as good as last year, but we certainly can't take them lightly."

Capitol opened its season at Lafayette High a year ago and squeaked out a slim 28-27 victory. The Lions, however, are much bigger, stronger and more experienced than in 1989.

"Our offensive line has really improved," said Green. "They've worked real hard together and have really been playing well as a group the last two weeks."

A foot injury will sideline starting tailback Harold Francis for tonight's game. He will be replaced by sophomore Mike Lee, who played some on special teams as a freshman last season.

Teurlings Head Coach Earl Heintz knows all about injury to running backs, as he lost Ed Stevens to a knee injury in the scrimmage two weeks ago. Meanwhile, the Rebel defense will be facing a running back not injured in Vermilion Catholic's Brandon LeBlanc tonight.

LeBlanc rushed for 1,107 yards and eight touchdowns on 209 carries as a junior last season.

And while those coaches have lost running backs, Ram Head Coach Bill Dotson will be trying to find some tonight against LaGrange. The most promising prospect is Perry George, who had 61 yards on 11 carries against Northside. Acadiana lost to the Vikings 13-7 in the jamboree last Friday.

Rebels, Patriots eye first victories

KAPLAN — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels and the North Vermilion Patriots hope to erase memories of a week ago when they tangle here tonight at Pirate Stadium beginning at 7 p.m.

The Rebels got off to a rough start against the Vermilion Catholic Eagles in Abbeville, falling behind 21-0 in the first quarter and eventually losing 54-30.

The Patriots also began the season in disappointing style, failing to score in a 32-0 loss to the Basile Bearcats.

Teurlings head coach Earl Heintz felt his defense was the team's strong point during pre-season drills, but after watching last week's performance, he says it needs more work.

"Coming into the season we thought we would have a pretty good defense," said Heintz. "But in the VC game and our last scrimmage, it has been our rough spot. We've had good workouts this week though. The kids are working hard, so the problem is not a lack of effort."

Ed Stevens was Teurlings' top rusher a year ago as well as being one of their top defensive players at the linebacker position. A pre-season knee injury to Stevens has certainly been felt on both sides of the ball.

"More and more I watch our defense, it's obvious how much we miss Ed," said Heintz. "He's a good running back, but we actually miss him more on defense because he is a heck of a middle linebacker."

Teurlings' problem has been mainly the inability to stop the run, as VC ran up 453 yards rushing a week ago.

"We are having problems against the run," said Heintz. "We didn't do a good job in our last scrimmage and we didn't do a good job against Delcambre in the jamboree. VC just ran right at us and the problem against them just continued where it left off against Delcambre."

Stevens underwent

arthroscopic knee surgery on Wednesday morning and may be back for district play. However, Heintz says the team must regroup and play better against the Patriots.

"We'll have to see what kind of character we're made of," said Heintz. "We still have a lot to work on offensively and defensively, and North Vermilion is a capable ball club. On paper we appear even because they gave up 21 points to VC in a half and we gave up 21 in a quarter, so it will be a tough game."

In the 24-point loss to Vermilion Catholic, the Rebels did have a bright spot with the offense scoring 30 points and Heintz feels they should continue to move the ball.

"Realistically we can find some bright spots," he said. "We moved the ball against Delcambre and against VC last week we had about 350 yards total offense, so I was happy with that. Considering we got behind by 21 points so quick and had to throw our offensive game plan out of the window, we did a good job of executing. We were in a situation where we had to score a lot of points in a hurry."

Judge upholds Vincent's authority

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal judge upheld the authority of Fay Vincent for the second time in 2½ weeks on Wednesday, forcing a top New York Yankees official to appear at a disciplinary hearing Thursday before the baseball commissioner.

Following a two-hour hearing in Manhattan federal court, U.S. District Judge Leonard B. Sand rejected a request from Yankees executive vice president Leonard L. Kleinman for a temporary restraining order.

Kleinman wanted to stop Vincent's hearing on his relationship with gambler Howard Spira and his role in a \$40,000 payment made by the Yankees and George Steinbrenner to Spira last January.

Rebels find themselves in time for 33-18 win

KAPLAN — Sometimes players just need a little motivation to get them to reach their potential.

The Teurlings Rebels got that from Head Coach Earl Heintz midway through the second quarter of their game against the North Vermilion Patriots Thursday night at Pirate Stadium, and it carried them to a 33-18 victory.

With North Vermilion leading 6-0, Patriot quarterback Stephen LeJeune faced 11 yards on a third- and 12 play to set up a fourth and one situation. The Pats called time out to decide whether or not to go for it, while Heintz used the opportunity to

"Let's just say we just had a little discussion," said Heintz, "and I did all the discussing. I just felt that we had several players in position to make the tackle on that third down run and didn't. After that point, we just seemed to wake up and play a little bit of football."

To say that the Rebels got off to a slow start would be a bit of an understatement. After a clipping penalty forced Teurlings to punt on its first drive, a miscommunication on the punt resulted in a 21-yard loss to give North Vermilion possession at the Rebel 34 with 9:22 remaining in the first.

The Patriots graciously accepted

the gift and cashed it in for an early touchdown. After an 11-yard run and 14-yard reception by Todd Hebert, he got in from the one to give North Vermilion a 6-0 lead with 5:28 left in the first period.

Then, one possession later, the Rebels got it down to the Patriot 15 before Brian Baumgardner recovered a Rebel fumble to thwart that drive. Teurlings would fumble five times, losing one, in the first half.

"Truthfully, I felt all day long that we were going to come out here tonight and nothing was going to go wrong," said Heintz. "So what happens? We come out here and didn't do a single thing right the entire first quarter. Once we regrouped, though, I thought a lot of things opened up for us. I think we showed that we have the ability to have a wide open offense."

The second quarter was a much different story for Heintz's Rebels, however. After a clipping penalty, a 12-yard Burt Fontenot run, a 15-yard Kelly Balfour completion and a 27-yard Balfour TD that was called back, the Rebels finally got on the board when Jake Delhomme hooked up with Joe Heintz for a 37-yard touchdown to tie the game at 6-6.

The Patriots answered with the makings of a possible scoring drive of their own, but fumbled the ball to set up a six play, 76-yard Rebel scoring drive that ended in a 21-yard TD pass from Delhomme to James Stutes for a 12-6 Teurlings lead with 1:10 left until half.

It looked as though that would be the halftime score, but three incomplete passes by the Patriots and punt gave Teurlings possession at its 36 with 25 seconds left. Those are tall odds, but they were quickly reduced with a 28-yard completion to Balfour to the 36 and then a 36-yard touchdown pass to Stutes with just three seconds left.

Delhomme then hit Balfour for the two-point conversion and a 20-6 Rebel advantage at the half.

Delhomme would complete his last nine pass attempts of the game to put him at 10 of 15 for 263 yards and four touchdowns on the night.

The Rebels followed that up by

scoring on their first two possessions of the second half to put the game away at 33-6. First came a seven-play, 79-yard scoring drive that was completed by a four-yard touchdown pass from Delhomme to Balfour.

Delhomme later put the finishing touches on the Rebels' final scoring drive of the game with a three-yard TD run with 30 seconds left in the third quarter.

The Patriots didn't pack up just yet, however, putting together two fourth-quarter scoring drives. The first was a methodical 10-play, 50-

yard drive punctuated by a two-yard LeJeune TD run, and the second came much quicker when LeJeune ended a two-play, 66-yard drive with a 59-yard TD pass to Brady Trahan.

"I hope we learned something tonight," said Heintz. "We fumbled a few snaps and got down on ourselves. When those things happen, we've got to buckle down and deal with it. After a while we did that, but we made too many mistakes tonight along the way."

ceiver makes him a very big threat."

However, it wasn't Amos, who hurt the Screaming Eagles a year ago. Rather, it was senior tailback Jonathan Toups, who rushed 29 times for 168 yards.

To be honest they (Erath) hurt us more last year with the loss sweep than with the pass," said Keiser. "With both Toups and Amos back, we're going to have our hands full."

Both athletes looked exceptionally sharp in last week's season opener against Delcambre, especially Amos. The senior finished the game completing 11 of 25 for 124 yards in Erath's 30-0 season opener against Delcambre. Four of those receptions good for 50 yards went to Toups, who also had 62 yards rushing on 12 carries.

"It was the best game he's played since I had him," said Byler. "He threw two bad passes out of 25, but he had seven of them dropped that were right in the receivers' numbers."

"If he can play tonight the way he did against Delcambre," he continued, "and if we can get the ball into Jonathan's hands a little more, we're going to be very tough to beat."

Of course, the Bobcats will not only have to have a good game from Amos and Toups, but they'll also have to figure a way of slowing down the VCHS offensive attack, which appears much improved from last year.

"LeBlanc may be their horse and I'm sure they're going to run him about 25 times," he said. "But they've got a

couple more guys (Craig Sagrera and Joe Scalisi) back there, who showed they can run with the football as well."

In the 54-30 blowout of Teurlings Catholic, LeBlanc in very limited duty rushed for 106 yards on just four carries while Scalisi finished with 119 yards and three touchdowns and Sagrera, who also saw limited action, scored the game's first touchdown.

"Right now it looks like a toss-up," said Byler. "He (VCHS) has the advantage in size along the line. We've got a couple of nice size kids, but overall he's much bigger."

"Our main advantage is going to be how well Amos and Toups play," Byler said, "and our ability at stopping their three backs from busting any big plays."

Eventhough, Keiser does feature major college prospect and two-way starter Jean Paul Ferrodin (6'0, 230 pounds) in the line, the Eagles' head man thinks Erath is very capable of holding its own against his club.

"We argued about the size difference Wednesday night at our JV game," said Keiser. "He's got some nice looking kids himself. And they're a solid football team."

"Erath is always a tough opponent because Jackie gives you so much stuff to prepare for during the week," he said. "It's going to be tough, but I'm hoping that the trend — of the home team always losing — stays the same — at least for one more year."

Big numbers are nice, but sometimes they aren't necessarily a true indication of the value of an effort.

St. Thomas More's Jamie Holmes may not have rushed for over 200 yards and may not have scored four touchdowns, but he certainly had no regrets when he walked off the field after his Cougars' 14-13 upset of the defending Class AAA state champion Crowley Gents.

Holmes rushed for 151 yards on 18 carries and scored both of St. Thomas More's touchdowns in the big win.

While it was Holmes' raw desire to succeed that made his effort an attractive one, Port Barre Red Devil defensive end Kenny Marks made his mark with versatility.

Of course, the recognition going to Holmes didn't at all diminish the now-weekly great performance of Iota's Troy Smith. Smith rushed for 261 yards and four touchdowns on just 10 carries in the Bulldogs' 40-0 waxing of Iota.

Catholic High of New Iberia's Johnny Viator, who rushed for over 200 yards again with 221 yards and a touchdown on 34 carries.

Other fine offensive performances were turned in by Breaux Bridge's Kareem Menard (19-121, 1 TD) and Jonathan McGlory (20-111), Eunice's Malcolm Mitchell (21-35, 272 yards, 2 TDs), Loreauville's Kevin Anthony (19-127, 2 TDs), Erath's Jonathan Toups (14-125, 2 TDs), Kaplan's Fabian Vallery (19-153, 1 TD), Teurlings Catholic's Troy Lambert (11-115) and Acadiana's Jimmy Hensell (8 catches, 134 yards, 1 TDs).

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels and Notre Dame Pioneers may be entering tonight's battle with a combined record of 1-5, but one wouldn't know it by listening to the opposing head coaches.

Even though both teams carry sub-500 marks into Clark Field for the 7:30 kickoff, Teurlings' Earl Heintz and Notre Dame's Donnie Gaspard certainly have shown a mutual respect for each other's squad.

Heintz' crew stands at 1-2 on the season, having lost to Vermilion Catholic (54-30) in the opener, beaten North Vermilion (33-18) in week two and losing to Hanson (21-14) last Friday night.

Gaspard and the Pioneers are coming off a much more disappointing defeat after being shutout (49-0) by the Cecilia Bulldogs. They were also beaten by the Eunice Bobcats in week two and the St. Louis Saints in the opener.

"It's like I told the kids at the end of practice today (Tuesday)," Heintz began. "When you stop and think, we people talk about high school football in southwest Louisiana, the first one you think about has to be Notre Dame. Over the last 20 years they haven't missed the playoffs much, plus they have two state championships and have been to the state finals two other times."

"Now they're coming in here 0-3," Heintz added. "It's like our defensive coordinator (Gary Perkins) said, they'll be coming in here with blood in their eyes and I'm sure that we're one of the easiest teams he's faced, so they'll be wanting that first win real bad."

Heintz also says his Rebels will know what the Pios' game-plan will be, but the biggest problem will be finding ways to counter them.

"I know (Gaspard) and I know

what he's going to do against us," he said. "He's going to go to basic football. I know darn good and well that they will run right at us and not try anything fancy. They're defense is the straight, vanilla "50" and there's not a lot of motion or stunting. And after their loss last week, we'd better be ready for a hungry football team."

The Pioneers' loss to the Bulldogs was indeed ugly considering the final score, but the game actually could have been slightly different had it not been for some key Notre Dame turnovers.

"We drove down well on our first drive and then fumbled," Gaspard explained. "In the second quarter we were down only 7-0 and had the ball deep in their territory, but we turned it over again. Their kid (Leonard Etienne) had a 66-yard run for a touchdown right after that and then right before the half, we tipped a pass and it went right into another player's (Dwayne Hebert) hands."

"That one broke our backs and the game just got progressively worse," he said. "We didn't overlook them because Cecilia has a good ball club, so I was really disappointed losing the way we did."

The Rebels have had problems defensively this season, but their offense has put up impressive numbers. They had over 400 yards in total offense in their win over North Vermilion, had over 300 against VC, and had nearly 300 again (283) last week against Hanson.

Team totals offensively have the Rebels ranked seventh in the Acadiana area. They have tallied 1,053 yards in total offense with 627 yards rushing and 426 passing. Their defense has been the weak link, having given up 1,228 yards (932 rushing, 296 passing).

Fullback Troy Lambert had an exceptional game in the seven-point defeat against the Tigers, gaining 115 yards on 11 carries.

Burt Fontenot leads Teurlings on the ground with 226 yards on 30 carries, while Delhomme has completed 26-of-58 for 445 yards and eight scores, and has also added three rushing touchdowns. Wideout Kelly Balfour has caught five passes for 85 yards and two touchdowns, and James Stutes also caught an 18-yard TD pass from Delhomme last week.

Notre Dame has struggled offensively with 616 total yards (352 rushing, 264 passing), but their defense has been fairly solid, giving up 722 yards (588 rushing, 134 passing).

The Pioneers will once again be without the services of ace running back Chad Morrow, who suffered from leg hemorrhages two weeks ago and just got off crutches two days ago. He will be replaced once again by Paul Poydras, who started the Cecilia and Eunice games. Poydras has one touchdown on the season.

Morrow, despite missing the Cecilia game, is still the Pios' top rusher with 135 yards and two touchdowns on 21 carries.

Pioneers hold off Teurlings Catholic

Fourth-down conversions quite often mean a lot in determining the outcome of a football game.

On Thursday night at Clark Field, they meant everything.

The Notre Dame Pioneers score both of their touchdowns on fourth-down conversions, while the Teurlings Catholic Rebels failed on two in the third quarter inside the Pioneer 15.

The result was a 14-9 victory for Head Coach Donnie Gaspard's Pioneers, leaving both clubs at 1-3 on the season.

"This win means just about everything to us right now," said Gaspard. "It was a gut check game for us to prove that we wanted to play and wanted to win. I'm very proud of our kids. The defense did a great job of keeping them out of the end zone. We weren't able to get in our goalline defense, because of their spread offense, but we still got the job done."

The Pioneers rode the back of junior tailback Paul Poydras all

night long. Poydras carried the ball 32 times for 132 yards. Also starring for the Pios was sophomore receiver Kerry Seilhan, who had six catches for 98 yards and a touchdown.

"I'm very proud of Paul," said Gaspard. "We put the game on his back, and he carried us."

The first quarter was little more than a battle for field position, and the Pioneers got the best of that, but couldn't take advantage of it on the scoreboard.

Teurlings, who had just four offensive possessions in the first half, broke the scoreless tie on its first drive of the second quarter.

Sophomore quarterback Jake Delhomme, who finished the game 13 of 30 for 229 yards, hit Burt Fontenot for 15 yards and Kelly Balfour for 23 yards to get the drive going, but a dropped touchdown pass stalled the drive at the Pioneer six.

That forced the Rebels to settle for a 23-yard field goal by Fontenot with 8:46 left until intermission.

Notre Dame then answered with a score of its own. After a clip got the

drive started at the Pioneer 24, the running of Poydras and a 23-yard pass from Michael Odom to Seilhan to the Pios to the Rebel 28.

Six plays later, Odom found Eric Lambousy from seven yards out on a fourth-and-three for a touchdown. Cy Link added the extra point, and Notre Dame led 7-3 with 2:26 remaining in the first half.

The Rebels fumbled the ball back to the Pios three plays after the ensuing kickoff. Notre Dame couldn't capitalize, however, as pass defenses by James Stutes and Delhomme turned the Pios away on the half's final two plays.

A Ryan Link interception put a quick end to Teurlings' first possession of the second half, and set up Notre Dame's second scoring drive.

And again it came on a fourth-down conversion when Odom hit Seilhan for 28 yards and a touchdown on a fourth-and-six. Link added the extra point, and the Pios led 14-3 with 8:54 remaining in the third period.

The Rebels, after two interceptions and two failed fourth-down con-

versions stopped them inside the Pioneer 15 three times early in the second half, finally pushed it in on its second drive of the fourth period. A 34-yard completion to Kelly Balfour set up a 23-yard touchdown completion to Fontenot. The two-point conversion failed, though, and Notre Dame still led 14-9 with 7:17 left in the game.

The Rebels would get just one last drive, and got down to the Pioneer 21. But they fumbled two plays later, and would never regain possession. A first-down run of 12 yards by Poydras with 2:24 left all but put the nail in the coffin. It was Notre Dame's first first down of the second half, but it was enough to secure a Pioneer victory.

"It's a loss, but I'm very proud of the way we played," said Rebel Head Coach Earl Heintz. "I told them all I asked for was 110 percent. They gave me 120 percent tonight."

"We're still very, very young and inexperienced. We only have four seniors playing. We're getting better every week. Sooner or later good things are going to happen for us."

Co-players of the week come from Breaux Bridge-Kaplan game

The two teams combined for some 296 yards of offense, and three running backs had at least 148 yards rushing.

Picking between the three, as well as the several other outstanding performances last Friday night, was no simple chore. Emerging from the pack as the recognized top two efforts, however, were Breaux Bridge's Kareem Menard and Kaplan's Fabian Vallery, who share this week's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Offensive Player of the Week honors.

There were more than likely some defensive Player of the Week performances around the area Friday night, but not one

coach felt the need to call in a single nomination. As a result, there is no Defensive Player of the Week honoree this week.

Vallery's effort may have been a losing cause, but that certainly didn't tarnish his individual accomplishment against the highly-ranked AAA Breaux Bridge Tigers as a Class AA running back.

The speedy Pirate was unstoppable, rushing for 237 yards and two touchdowns on 19 carries in keeping the Kaplan Pirates close before a 21-point Breaux Bridge surge in the fourth period vaulted the Ti-

gers to a 48-20 triumph.

Menard's numbers might not have been quite as impressive, but his effort was. Menard rushed for 148 yards and scored three touchdowns, including scoring runs of 24 and 76 yards, on just 13 carries in helping the Tigers to their fourth victory of the season.

The runners-up for the week's top offensive spot made up a long and impressive list. The third offensive standout in the Breaux Bridge-Kaplan contest was among the also-rans for the weekly honor. Jonathan McGlory rushed for 161 yards and two touchdowns on 11 attempts in the big Tiger win.

There was talk that Carencro sophomore sensation running back Derrick Beavers was not even going to play in the Golden Bears' 5-A AAA district opener

against the Franklin Hornets. He did much more than just play. Beavers rushed for 185 yards and two touchdowns, including a 77-yarder to clinch the victory in the fourth quarter, as the Bears downed Franklin 23-12.

The weekly aerial show in Eunice produced two more top prospects in quarterback Malcolm Mitchell and receiver Ron Thomas. Mitchell completed 22 of 46 passes for 371 yards, while Thomas had 10 receptions for 245 yards.

The Abbeville Wildcats are much improved in 1990, and it was the running of Harold Cormier that helped the Wildcats gain their second win of the year Friday night when he rushed for 170 yards and three touchdowns on 24 carries.

Speaking of a workhorse, Port Barre's Bevan Perron fit that role perfectly Friday

night when he carried the ball 38 times for 163 yards and scored four touchdowns in the Red Devils' 46-28 win over DeQuincy.

And no week would be complete without Troy Smith's weekly update. Iota's Smith entered Friday night's action as the state's leading rusher and he did nothing to hurt that status, rushing for 216 yards and three touchdowns on 39 carries in the Bulldogs' impressive 30-7 trouncing of Opelousas Catholic.

Other fine outings were turned in by Comeaux's Harold Thompson (12-107, 1 TD), Carencro's Dexter Porter (18-97, 1 TD), St. Thomas More's Danny Lasseigne (3 catches, 103 yards, 1 TD), Cecilia's Scott Picard (12 of 18, 152 yard, 1 TD), Vermilion Catholic's Brandon LeBlanc (20-122, 1 TD) and Teurlings Catholic's Jake Delhomme (11 of 27, 229 yards).

Lake Arthur holds off TCHS

The Lake Arthur Tigers remained unbeaten on Friday night at Clark Field, holding off the Teurlings Catholic Rebels 18-12.

The game was tied at 6-6 entering the fourth quarter, but Lake Arthur, who is now 5-0, came up with two touchdowns from running back Marcus Daniels and held off a late Teurlings rally with under a minute to play.

Daniels was the Tiger workhorse last night, carrying 29 times for 132 yards, 73 of which came in the second half. His first touchdown came with 8:17 remaining in the game and the second one was scored with 3:47 to go.

The Rebels, who are now 1-4, came back with a nine-play, 67-yard drive to cut the lead to 18-12. Delhomme hit Burt Fontenot on a 20-yard touchdown pass on a second-and-10 play, but their onside kick was recovered by the visitors and they ran out the clock.

"The effort was there, but it's like I said to the kids, I'm getting tired of

saying, 'we played good' and still come away with a loss," said Teurlings head coach Earl Heintz. "That means we have to work that much harder next week in practice."

With the score tied at 6-6, Lake Arthur took the lead on a 13-play, 56-yard drive. The Tigers would throw no passes on this drive and the longest gain was a 10-yarder by Tyrus McZeal. Daniels converted on a key fourth-and-one play from the Teurlings 10-yard line and three plays later, he scored his first touchdown.

After a Rebel punt, the Tigers drove 80 yards in six plays to make it 18-6. The key play came on a 50-yard run by McZeal, which set up Daniels' second score, this one from 15 yards out.

Teurlings' first scoring drive came on the first possession of the second half. Down 6-0, they mounted a nine-play, 68-yard drive which culminated in a nine-yard TD pass from Delhomme to Joe Heintz.

The key play on the drive came on the first play of the half when Delhomme hit Burt Fontenot for 36 yards.

That pass was the first of the

game for the Rebels, who did not throw a pass in the first half. In fact, they only had eight offensive plays in the entire half.

"We can't win football games with that many offensive plays in one half," said Heintz. "We moved the ball fairly well in the second half. They never consistently stopped us, but we just didn't have the ball enough."

Teurlings' final scoring drive, which ended when Fontenot caught the touchdown pass, was set up by passes of 16 yards from Delhomme to Kelly Balfour and 13 yards from Delhomme to Fontenot.

"We're just not playing a complete football game," added Heintz. "The mental mistakes are hurting us. We were in position to put points on the board in the first half after that long run and then on the next play we fumble. For us to win more games, we'll have to avoid the mental mistakes."

The long run Heintz spoke of was a 62-yard run by Troy Lambert which put the ball on the Lake Arthur 12. Chris Ozone fumbled on the next play and the rally was thwarted.

Cecilia dominates 7-AA All-District

It was supposed to be a rebuilding year for the Cecilia Bulldogs.

A quick look at the 1990 7-AA All-District team, and it's quite obvious Head Coach James Waguespack's troops accomplished much more than many thought possible.

Versatile junior running back Leonard Etienne was voted as the Offensive Player of the Year, senior defensive lineman Richard Journet was named Defensive Player of the Year and Waguespack earned Coach of the Year honors.

The result of those stellar individual performances was a 9-3 record, a district championship and a Class AA state regional finish.

Etienne, a 5-8, 160-pound junior, didn't have outstanding statistics, but was the primary weapon in the Bulldogs' diversified attack. He rushed for 455 yards and eight touchdowns on 66 carries, and also caught 14 passes for 110 yards and two more touchdowns.

Journet, a 6-0, 170-pound senior, surpassed all expectations, tallying 72 solo tackles, 55 assists and 15 quarterback sacks. He also excelled as a special teams performer, blocking eight punts, five extra points and a field goal.

A year ago, Cecilia went just 4-6 and returned only three starters on offense and three on defense. Nevertheless, Waguespack (now 21-21 at Cecilia), along with defensive coordinator Lowell Guidry, molded a dominant

defensive unit and a capable offense en route to an 8-2, 6-0 regular season and a 14-0 bi-district victory over Independence before falling 16-0 to Iota in state regional action.

Joining Etienne in the offensive backfield are Buddy Henry of Church Point, Bevan Perron of Port Barre and Tyler Daigle of Sunset.

Henry rushed for 618 yards and eight touchdowns on 137 attempts, Perron scored 14 touchdowns and rushed for 843 yards on 147 carries and Daigle contributed 688 yards and seven touchdowns on 170 rushes.

Port Barre's Scott Ardoin was voted the league's top quarterback after rushing for 365 yards and five touchdowns on 80 carries, and completing 60 of 107 passes for 904 yards and nine touchdowns.

Cecilia's Matt Tauzin (14-156, 3 TDs), Opelousas Catholic's Kennon Lavergne (31-482, 2 TD) and Port Barre's Willy Godchaux (8-150, 2 TDs) make the district's wide receiving corps. Port Barre's Ryan Reed caught 18 passes for 341 yards and four scores to nail down the tight end spot.

The offensive line consists of Keifer Wyble of Cecilia and Jeff Dupre of Opelousas Catholic at tackles, Brandon Langlinais of Church Point and Jimmy Guilbeau of Cecilia at guards and Damien Daigle of Opelousas Catholic and Andrew Bonvillian of Sunset as the two centers.

The placekicker was Raymond Papillion, who hit on 13 of 16 extra points and one field

goal of 30 yards.

Journet was joined on the defensive front by Papillion, Brandon Latiolais of Church Point, Matthew Peck of OCHS and Jared Fontenot of Port Barre.

Papillion had 40 solo tackles, 25 assists and four quarterback sacks, Latiolais had 30 solos and 15 assists, Peck had 15 solos, 30 assists and five sacks, while Fontenot contributed 36 solos and 47 assists.

The linebacking crew include Cecilia's Keith Filer and Darrin Landry, Church Point's Brad Gibson and Dusty Latiolais and Port Barre's Reed. Filer had 40 solos, 20 assists, three sacks and four fumble recoveries, and Landry had 60 solos, 35 assists, three interceptions and four fumble recoveries.

Gibson had 40 solos, 14 assists and two interceptions, while Latiolais added 70 solos, 20 assists, five interceptions and four fumble recoveries. Reed totaled 51 solos, 24 assists, three interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

The defensive backfield consists of Cecilia's Kevin Wiltz, Church Point's Bradley Boutte, Ardoin of Port Barre and Lavergne of OCHS.

Wiltz, a returning first-team All-District pick, had 25 solos, 12 assists and five interceptions. Boutte had 24 solos, 10 assists and six interceptions. Ardoin had three interceptions, along with 13 solos and 13 assists, while Lavergne contributed 20 solos, 19 assists and five interceptions.
