

Kiwanis tops 9 area prep jamborees

It's late August and once again the time has come for high school football fans around the Acadiana area to get their first peak at their favorite team.

The area will feature nine jamboree events Thursday-Friday, Aug. 25-26 in the unofficial kickoff to the 1994 high school football season.

As usual, the featured attraction is at USL's Cajun Field where 10 teams sharpen their skills over two nights in the Kiwanis Club Jamboree.

Thursday's action gets underway at 7 p.m. with the Northside Vikings taking on the Kaplan Pirates. That will be followed by a little taste of perhaps the most awaited showdown of the season when two old district rivals Carenco and Acadiana square off to end the first night's play.

Friday's tripleheader begins with a 6 p.m. matchup between District 5-AAAA favorite Abbeville and the Lafayette High Mighty Lions.

The rest of the schedule has New Iberia and Jeanerette in the middle game, before St. Thomas More and Comeaux wrap it up in a battle of neighborhood rivals. All the Kiwanis

games will consist of two 15-minute halves.

The rest of the area's jamborees include the Acadia Parish in Rayne, the Vermilion Parish in Erath, the St. Landry Parish in Opelousas, the St. Martin Parish in St. Martinville, the Catholic High of New Iberia Jamboree, the Jennings Jamboree and the Morgan City triangular.

The Acadia Parish Jamboree will be Thursday, Aug. 25 at Rayne High with a tripleheader, beginning at 6 p.m. and consisting of two 12-minute halves.

The Vermilion Parish event in Erath will be Friday, Aug. 25 and will consist of two 15-minute halves. The doubleheader opens at 6:30 p.m. with North Vermilion and Delcambre meeting, followed by Erath and Vermilion Catholic.

The John Ed Bradley Memorial Jamboree at Donald Gardner Memorial Stadium in Opelousas gets underway Thursday at 7 p.m. with Gueydan meeting North Central, followed by Beau Chene and Northwest.

Friday's slate in Opelousas has Port Barre tilting Opelousas Catholic at 7:30 p.m. with Eunice and Opelousas closing it out. The first

three games will consist of two 10-minute halves and the final game two 12-minute halves.

The Sacred Heart of Ville Platte Jamboree Friday will be a doubleheader of two 12-minute halves, beginning at 7 p.m. with Basile and Mamou battling and concluding with Sacred Heart and Ville Platte meeting.

The St. Martin Parish event will begin at 6 o'clock with Cecilia facing Franklin for two halves of 12 minutes. Breaux Bridge and Loreauville follows with St. Martinville taking on Abramson in the finale.

The Catholic High of New Iberia doubleheader will consist of two 10-minute halves Friday, beginning at 7 p.m. with Hanson and Teurlings Catholic and concluding with Catholic High and Central Catholic of Morgan City.

The Jennings Jamboree will feature three games of two 12-minute halves Friday. Lake Arthur and Elton meet at 6 p.m., followed by Welsh and South Beauregard at 7:15 p.m. and Jennings facing DeRidder at 8:30 p.m.


Morgan City, Berwick and Patterson will all play two games Friday with the evening getting underway at 7 p.m.

Teurlings head coach Greg Tidwell knew 'Life After Jake' wouldn't be easy, but the 1993 season was admittedly a little rougher than expected.

Jake Delhomme, who moved on to start as a natural freshman at USL, wasn't easily replaced a year ago evidenced by Teurlings' 3-7 record — a season after making it to the state semifinals.

And while Tidwell feels his Rebels can improve on that mark this season, he knows his squad has a lot of improving to do to compete in a tough district such as 8 AA.

"The district is extremely tough," said Tidwell, entering his third season at Teurlings. "When you look at teams like North Vermilion, Notre Dame and Loreauville, you know they're good and will be near the top of the district. We'll just try to hold our own and if we play like we're capable, hopefully we can compete with them."

After good practices leading up to the 1993 season, Tidwell was optimistic his Rebels were good enough, even without Delhomme, to contend for the district title. Unfortunately, things didn't turn out as expected.

"It was a very disappointing season for us," he said. "I really felt we had enough good players returning, that we could contend for the district title. But things just didn't go our way and we ended up with seven losses. Obviously I knew how important (Delhomme) had been to our

team on the field, but we all found out just how important he was as a leader and that, we couldn't replace.

"Not to say that was an excuse, but there will definitely be no excuses this season," he added. "(Delhomme) is now a sophomore at USL, so I think it's time we move on and

start having some success without him. I think we have a good group of seniors who are very capable of leading the younger guys and we'll definitely need that this season. We also have a great number of

players returning who have variety experience and that is a big plus."

While Teurlings is not favored to win the district or even make the playoffs, they do return 11 overall starters.

The returning starters on offense are receivers Joey Caillier and Joey Moss, tackle Peter Kirsch, center Matt Roberts, guards Ryan Brasseaux and Dexter Leblanc, quarterback Eric Legendre and fullback Wade Greig.

Brasseaux, a two-time All-District performer, is nursing a broken ankle and probably won't return until district play. Legendre would've been the starting quarterback last season, but broke his arm in week one pre-game warm ups.

"Naturally, that was a blow to us," said Tidwell, whose Rebels finished last in 8-AA with an 0-5 mark. "It was just a freak acci-

dent and it came at a bad time. Probably the most frustrating thing about last season was that there were a few games that could've went either way and we'd end up losing.

And even though losing (Legendre) was unlucky for us, it turned out to be blessing in disguise for Kyle (Stutes). He came in as a freshman and played pretty well. He also gained a lot of valuable experience and if we need him I know he'll be very capable."

Teurlings' offense was a bit inconsistent in 1993, and that must improve if they are to be a factor this season.

"I think we can score a few points, but then again I was pretty optimistic at this time last year," said Tidwell. "I think (Legendre) has improved drastically and we have some quality running backs.

Progression will be the key. If we keep improving each week leading up to district, then maybe we stand a chance against the big boys. If

we don't improve each week, then we won't be a factor in district."

There will be question marks that need answering on defense. The graduation loss of Tony Ozene was the biggest blow, but Tidwell does have returning starters in Trent Stelly, Leblanc, Ben Trahan, Mike Gundry, Moses White and Moss at free safety.

"Our secondary will be the strength of the defense," said Tidwell. "(Moss) is really a good free safety and plus Wade Greig. Reggie Trosclair and Scott Roberts are all good athletes. But losing (Ozene) was a blow. He was the heart and soul of our defense for three years and the hardest part will be to replace him."

While there are question marks on offense and defense, special teams should undoubtedly be Teurlings' strong point. In addition to playing offense and defense, Moss will be the placekicker and punter and was the small school All Parish selection last season.

"We're very strong in the kicking game. I'll admit that," said Tidwell. "(Moss) is a very good kicker. Not only does he have a strong leg, but he has the accuracy to go with it. And last year he was averaging about 48 yards a punt

until our long snapper went down and after a couple snaps went over his head, his average took a serious dive. I think it's a big advantage to have a good kicker in high school football and we'll try to use it to our advantage."

Legendre looking forward to finally getting chance

Eric Legendre was looking forward to the 1993 campaign. He was to be the starting quarterback and was in warmup drills prior to the season opener against St. Louis, eagerly awaiting the opening kick-off.

Then disaster struck.

While diving for a ball in passing drills, he fell wrong on his wrist. Instead of a sprain, his worst fears came true. X-rays showed the wrist was broken.

After two years of learning and waiting to play behind Jake Delhomme, Legendre finally had his chance to start and in a split second, it was all gone.

"It was terrible, I really felt bad," said Legendre. "In practice leading up to the season, it was real close between me, Bumper (Journet) and Kyle (Journet) and I felt I could've been playing a lot. Then for that to happen to me in warmup drills before the first game, I couldn't believe it."

Legendre did wind up playing in one game late in the season, but it didn't make up for nine missed games.

"I just made up my mind that I would use it as a positive," he said. "In a way it turned out to be kind of good. I watched (Journet) and (Stutes) and I learned a lot. Now I'm definitely ready. This is my last season and I'm ready to go out and win some games."

Legendre has once again won the starting job at quarterback and says he's looking forward to a successful season.

"I've improved 100 percent over last year. I know I'm a lot stronger, I can throw the ball way further. Also, I think I've improved mentally and that's just as important as improving physically."

Tenlings Head Coach Greg Tidwell agrees with Legendre, saying his signal caller has improved by leaps and bounds.

"He's (Legendre) right when he says he's improved drastically," said Tidwell. "He's a much better quarterback right now than he was one year ago. And that's not to say he wasn't any good a year ago because he was. But he's just a lot stronger. Last year he was limited to mostly sideline passes, but this year he'll be able to throw it deep. And he can run as well, so we'll try to mix it up as much as possible."

Another factor which has

helped Legendre is the work he's had with Delhomme, now the starting quarterback at USL.

"For two years I watched Jake from the sidelines and he's also worked with me the last two years," he said. "He's such a good quarterback, it's real easy to learn from him. He's taught me things like throwing the ball correctly to reading different kinds of defenses. I'm hoping all the things I've learned will pay off for me this season."

After a season where the Rebels' offense was at times inconsistent, Legendre has liked what he's seen in practice. Barring any major injuries, he thinks they'll score a lot more than they did a year ago.

"I think it's all there for us to score a lot of points," he said. "We have a good offensive line, Reggie (Trosclair), Wade (Greig) and Kenny are all good running backs and Joey (Moss) is doing great at split end. If we play like we're capable, I really think we can take some pressure off the defense."

After finishing last in district 3-AA last season with an 0-5 record, the district's coaches are picking the Rebels anywhere from fourth to sixth. That suits Legendre just fine, although he thinks they could surprise.

"I hope the other teams take us lightly. I think we have a pretty good team. We've really been coming along in practice. Our offense and defense are looking good. It's going to be tough though because our district has some good teams. But after finishing last, we want to come back and prove we're better than that. I think we're a lot better than that."

"I'm very concerned about moving the ball against their defense. This is a much better team than last year. They're real solid, especially defensively. Offensively, they can do so many more things."

But the truth is that Tidwell really didn't see any glaring problems upon watching the film that would warrant such a reaction. Either way, Tidwell hopes his Rebels can clean up the mistakes they did make by tonight's 7 p.m. battle with the St. Louis Saints at Lake Charles-Boston High.

"I'm not disappointed, but I'm not totally ecstatic either," Tidwell said. "I was pleased. I'm pretty well satisfied at this point. There was nothing that I was real disappointed in. We didn't recover a fumble at our own three and they got a touchdown and we blew a pass coverage. That's their two touchdowns."

"There wasn't anything glaring as far as weaknesses. The most important thing about this game is that I want the mistakes we make to be fixable."

The Rebels will feature a balanced offensive attack this year with Eric Legendre at quarterback and backs Wade Greig, Stanley Adams and Reggie Trosclair.

"I was pleased with our passing game," Tidwell said. "We had people open. We just didn't get them the ball. The thing that pleased me the most was the blocking. We had 5-6 seconds to throw the ball most of the time."

"It's not going to be an easy game. I'm real impressed with their quarterback and their wide receiver has some wheels."

LAKE CHARLES — Quarterback David Ardoin threw three touchdown passes to lead the St. Louis Saints to a 21-15 win over the Teurlings Catholic Rebels here Friday night in the season opener.

Ardoin had touchdown passes of 25 and 37 yards to Eric Granger and also an 18-yarder to Michael Praub. All the touchdowns came in the first half as the Saints built up a 21-7 halftime lead.

The Rebels' scores came on a four-yard run by Stanley Adams and a one-yard sneak by quarterback Eric Legendre.

Both offenses moved the ball well. Both had 14 first downs, while Teurlings had 254 yards total offense compared to 298 for St. Louis.

Running back Reggie Trosclair led Teurlings with 119 yards on 18 carries and Adams added 46. Legendre threw for 72 yards on four completions. Trosclair added 61 yards receiving to give him 180 yards total offense.

Clement, Cole collect Advertiser opening rewards

In recent years, the season opener between the Notre Dame Pioneers and the Vermilion Catholic Eagles has been a war.

The typical results include such scores as 7-6 and 7-0, indicating defensive struggles supreme.

That all changed last Friday night when the Pioneers shocked many with how easily they plastered Class A No. 4-ranked Vermilion Catholic 40-0.

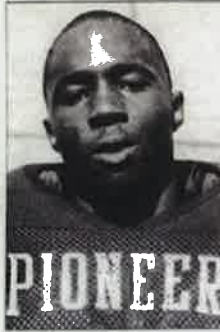
The big reason for the major shift in this formerly tight series is Pioneer senior tailback James Clement.

Clement made sure this year's encounter was a mismatch. The 6-2, 210-pound bruising runner rushed for 244 yards and four touchdowns on 39 carries in the blowout victory.

For his outstanding outing, Clement is this year's first Daily Advertiser/Pepsi-Cola Offensive Player of the Week.

Just as clear on the defensive side of the ball was the sparkling effort turned in by the Breaux Bridge High defense.

The Tigers traveled to meet the No. 4-ranked Jennings Bulldogs

and completely dominated the line of scrimmage.

The Tigers' defense limited Jennings to a minus-five yards rushing and just 54 total yards in a 22-12 victory. Leading the way was 5-11, 190-pound senior linebacker Jeremy Cole with seven solo tackles, a quarterback sack, two stops behind the line and the caused fumble that directly led to a touchdown.



For his part in spearheading the stellar defensive effort, Cole is this week's Daily Advertiser/Pepsi-Cola Defensive Player of the Week.

■ As will be the case all season long, the list of honorable mention Player of the Week candidates is a deserving one.

The most unique nomination of the week, however, was turned in by Acadiana Head Coach Bill Dotson. Senior tackle John Urban led the way in the Rams' 41-0 domination of Hammond by grading out at 85 percent in helping Acadiana rush for 212 yards in the win.

Northside High hadn't defeated the Crowley Gents since 1987. Until last Friday that is when Ethan Rose came up big by rushing for 101 yards and two touchdowns on 11 carries.

Five performances are becoming commonplaces for Loraueville's

Jonathan Polk, who ran for 188 yards and three touchdowns on 27 carries in the 27-14 win over Delcambre.

Eunice's Kurn Semien got off to a fine start with 143 yards and four touchdowns on 23 carries in the 35-6 win over Ville Platte. The Abbeville combination of Lutha Harrison (14-138, 2 TDs) and Shannon Cormier (12-109, 1 TD) vaulted the Wildcats to a 27-6 win over Kaplan.

Trojans make most of chances against Rebels

Sacred Heart squandered enough opportunities in the first half to beat two games.

But, the Trojans, frustrated by wasted chances, took matters into their own hands in the second half before kickoff.

Teurlings made two big plays in a score a pair of touchdowns and accumulated all but eight yards of its total offense, but Sacred Heart controlled the rest of the action by toppling the Rebels 20-12 in a test of physical combat at Clark Field.

Sacred Heart used a long kick off return, a blocked punt and a defensive fumble recovery in the end zone to rally from a first-half deficit and record its second straight victory.

Scott Soileau's touchdown pass to Jeremy Fontenot four minutes into the third quarter finally broke the ice for the Trojans and put the visitors up for good, 7-0, before Sacred Heart's defense did the rest by moving Robert Davenport's signal

back on the runner.

Teurlings took the third time near three minutes.

"It was a little frustrating for me down 6-0 in the half," said Davenport, "because we had several chances to score and came away empty. But, the kids showed a lot of character by not letting their fourth and nine look strong in the second half. Our defense really rose to the occasion in the second half and made sure we put them away."

The defense's first big play occurred at the 6:11 mark of the third quarter, when Dustin Vidrine blocked a Joey Moss punt to set up the Trojans at the Rebels' one-yard line. On the next play, Guy Picard ran in to make it 13-0 Sacred Heart.

Ten minutes later Ben Alexander recovered a Kyle Smith fumble in the end zone to put Sacred Heart ahead 20-0 with a 45:33 in the fourth quarter.

Teurlings struck for a 35-yard touchdown play on Eric Legendre's TD aerial to Moss around

midway following the kickoff, but the Rebels still threatened.

"We have a lot of speed, but with this mud and water we can't take full advantage of it," said Teurlings. "We can't get outside in our offense, like this. The weather and our field conditions have away a lot of things we'd like to do. We've had bad weather all these weeks this season."

The Rebels shocked the Trojans in the first quarter on a lengthy drive that ended in a 56-yarder. After Sacred Heart was stopped at the Teurlings one-yard line, Legendre punts a ball to keep an onside down from the two and outmarched the Trojans' secondary on a 56-yarder to give the team a 6-9 lead with 2:49 remaining.

"That big run didn't destroyed us for a while," Davenport said. "But, we recovered in time. The defense made it happen for us by forcing several turnovers. The blocked punt was big and the fumble recovery, other than the two long touchdown plays, we didn't give up much."

Indeed, Teurlings finished with

189 yards in total offense, with 101 of that coming on Legendre's 221 run and the six hard-running strikes to Moss. The Rebels were limited to four first downs while the Trojans possessed 11.

"I figured to get a win, especially on the road," said Davenport. "They had beaten us last the last two years and the kids were ready to play hard. Offensively, we're coming along each week in learning a new system. Hopefully, we can continue to get better each game."

Soileau completed 16 of 20 passes for 244 yards to pace the Trojans' offense, while Jack Fairhead caught eight passes for 60 yards.

Davenport said his team is making positive strides as well.

"We've come a long way and we don't have a bad term despite the 9-3 record," said the Rebels coach. "Our defense played a lot better than last week and we were able to get some turnovers. And, if we can get some good weather this year our offense will be more productive."

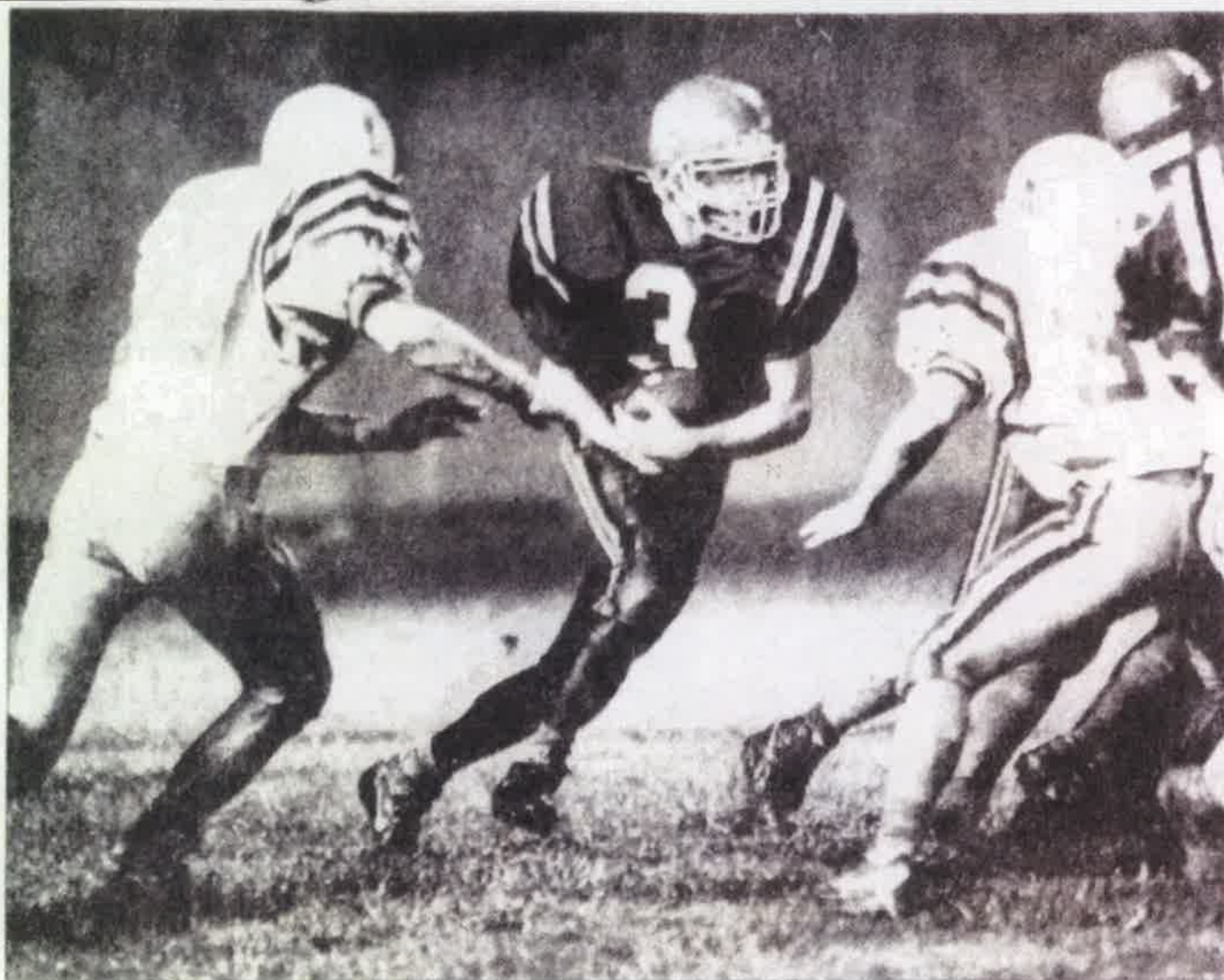

Few, if any, players have shined any brighter than Carencro's Kevin Faulk and Cecilia's Jamaican Dartez.

No players did any more to help their teams win this past Friday than the area's two biggest super stars. Because of their weekly greatness the duo's efforts on Friday night area often overlooked, but there was no overlooking these two outings.

As a result, Faulk and Dartez are this week's *Daily Advertiser/Pepsi-Cola Offensive and Defensive Players of the Week*, respectively.

The circumstances were quite different. Faulk and his No. 3 ranked Carencro Golden Bears were visiting arch-rival Acadiana in a key District 3-AAAAA matchup with revenge on their minds.

And he performed like a superstar is supposed to in a big game. The All American dominated play by rushing for 239 yards and four

touchdowns on 19 carries and also added two kicked returns for 144 yards, including a 90-yard touchdown to open the second half.

With a flair for the dramatic, Faulk's touchdown runs included jaunts of 38, 73, 20 and 64 yards, not to mention the kickoff returns of 90 and 54 yards. All told, Faulk accounted for 403 total yards and five touchdowns against the eighth-ranked teams in the state and the 10th ranked defense in the area.

Dartez's performance may not have been as needed or as dramatic, but that certainly doesn't belittle the effort.

The four-year starter for the No. 2-ranked Cecilia Bulldogs did more than his share in keeping his club undefeated by intercepting three passes, returning one 35 yards for a touchdown, had seven solo tackles and contributed five more assists to earn the week's top

defensive honors.

And as if that wasn't enough, Dartez also happened to rush for 146 yards and two touchdowns on 14 carries, and also caught a 14-yarder.

Teurlings awaits challenge of red-hot Delcambre

Delcambre head coach Mike Delcambre is the first to admit his Panthers are off to a better-than-expected start.

But while he and Panther fans are excited about their club's 3-1 start, Delcambre is wary about this Friday night's game against the Teurlings Rebels at Clark Field. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

After all the Rebels got into the win column last week with an impressive 19-16 road win over the Redemptorist Wolves. That alone quickly got Delcambre's attention, but he also doesn't like playing Teurlings on their homecoming week.

"Oh no, I didn't know that," said Delcambre. "I didn't realize it was their homecoming. That only makes things worse for us. Anytime you play a team on their homecoming you know they'll be fired up and ready to play. I'm real concerned about this game to tell you the truth."

Looking at the two teams on paper however, Delcambre should be favored to win

their fourth game in a row following a season opening loss to Loreauville. They've come back with wins over Livonia, North Vermilion and Catholic High of New Iberia, all of them being Class 2A schools.

Teurlings, also a AA school, stopped the bleeding with its first win last week.

Despite their record and Teurlings' record, Delcambre remains cautiously optimistic about the non-district contest.

"I still think Teurlings has a good ball club, they've looked good on film to me. Going back to when Jake Delhomme played for them, they've always had big play potential on offense and that scares me. They've got some kids who can run and that can give us problems."

Delcambre has played well offensively and defensively. They've put up 347 yards on offense (609 rushing, 338 passing), while they've held their opponents to 661 yards (327 rushing, 124 passing).

"To be honest, we've played better early on than I thought we would," said Delcambre. "Our offensive and defensive lines have played very well and a big plus for us is

that almost all our starters play only offense and defense. It makes a big difference for a single-A school like us."

The Panthers' leading rusher through four games is Jeramie Jones, who has 176 yards. Kal Laviolette and Harry Scott have combined for 217 yards.

But perhaps the biggest surprise has been quarterback Casey Guidry, who has completed 38 of 41 passes for 330 yards and six touchdowns. All six touchdowns have gone to receiver Brian Campbell, who has caught 19 passes for 270 yards.

"I'm real happy with our passing game," said Delcambre. "Guidry has been just superb. He's a first-year starter and he's only about 5-foot-6. When you look at his stats after four games, it's pretty amazing how high his percentage is. And (Campbell) was a defensive back last season. Now he's making things happen for us on offense."

Teurlings' win over Redemptorist can only help their season as they gear up for district battles against the likes of Notre Dame and Loreauville. Running back Joey Moss was the hero last week, scoring two

touchdowns including an 82-yarder. Moss finished the game with 162 yards on 15 carries.

Senior quarterback Eric Legendre has rushed for 67 yards and has completed 13 passes for 294 yards and two touchdowns.

"(Moss) had an outstanding game for us," said Teurlings head coach Greg Tidwell. "It was a situation where we badly needed a win and we needed someone to make a big play and that's what he did. But of course he couldn't have done it without the help of our offensive line. They had their best game of the season, no question about it. It was a big win for us, we played a lot better. We stopped beating ourselves with fumbling problems and mental mistakes."

Tidwell says he's not much surprised at Delcambre's good start and says a win will be very hard to come by.

"Am I surprised by how well they've played?" asked Tidwell. "Maybe slightly, but not much. I think they just have a solid team. Look at what they've done on offense and defense and that pretty much tells the story. To beat a quality team like Delcambre would be a big boost for us."

Rebels, Pats open 8-2A play

KAPLAN — Both North Vermilion and Teurlings have endured its share of disappointments this season. But with the start of district both are hoping for a reversal of fortunes.

Both will get their chance when North Vermilion hosts Teurlings tonight in a key District 8-2A opener. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. at Kaplan High's Ed Douglas Memorial Stadium.

The game will be key because of what lies ahead ... more specifically, No. 3 ranked Notre Dame and an unranked, but good Loreauville squad.

"It's a whole new season for us," said second-year Head Coach Paul Jumonville, whose Patriots come into the game with a 2-3 record. "Things have been disappointing early, but were hoping to turn it around this week. We really haven't played up to our potential and we need a good game this week."

Teurlings Catholic Head Coach Greg Tidwell agrees with Jumonville that the game is pivotal.

"Things haven't been working out for us," said Tidwell, whose Rebels are 1-4. "It's not that we've been playing bad, but we just haven't been able to put a complete game together. We need to start off district with a win because starting 0-1 is not good, especially with Notre Dame and Loreauville still left."

North Vermilion hopes to revitalize its running game that has abandoned the Patriots the last three weeks. The key ingredient of that will be senior running back Donavon Allen.

Allen has rushed for 304 yards on the season and scored three touchdowns, but has not scored in three games and has rushed for only 129 yards since the second week of the season.

As a team, North Vermilion is only averaging 137 yards a game. That is a number that must improve for the Patriots to be successful in league play.

"Teams thus far have done a good job on Donavon," Jumonville continued. "For us to win, we'll need a good game from him on the ground."

Other key players for North Vermilion offensively are Chad Chagois (40-207 yards) and Corey Gardiner (25-117 yards).

Tidwell also believes that a good balance offensively will be a key for the Rebels.

"We need offensive balance," said Tidwell. "I think if we're able to mix things up, we'll be fine. Another key is to utilize our speed. If we are getting beat up front, we'll have to alter our gameplan and we don't want to do that."

Offensively, things have been looking up for the Rebels over the last two games, averaging 261 yards of total offense.

Leading the way for the Rebels' offense will be Joey Moss, who recently switched from wingback to tailback with teammate Reggie Trosclair.

Moss has rushed for 253 yards and two touchdowns and Trosclair has 225 yards on the season.

Last year North Vermilion registered a 34-20 victory over Teurlings, but Jumonville doesn't think it will be that easy this year.

"We're both struggling right now," Jumonville said. "I think they're playing better than us after a big road win over Redemptorist (19-16) and playing Delcambre tough (14-20). They're much improved and they'll be tough to beat." Delcambre also defeated North Vermilion earlier in the season, 21-13.

"They've faced good quality teams," said Tidwell. "They just played a brutal three-game stretch (Delcambre, Vermilion Catholic, and Lake Arthur) and those are not mediocre teams. They'll be ready to play, I hope we are."

Patriots' big plays sink Rebels, 27-0

KAPLAN — After three consecutive losses, and struggling offensively in each, the North Vermilion Patriots needed a boost ... any kind of boost.

And a boost they got in the form of three big plays Thursday night as they beat Teurlings Catholic 27-0 here at Ed Douglas Memorial Stadium in each teams 8-2A district opener.

With the victory the Patriots improves to 3-3, 1-0 and will play at No. 3 Notre Dame next Friday. Teurlings Catholic drops 1-5, 0-1 and will host Loreauville next week.

North Vermilion's big-play arsenal included a halfback pass, interception return, and a long pass play, all of which went for touchdowns. Exactly the type of plays Patriot head coach Paul Jumonville was looking for.

"The kids played real well," said Jumonville. "They really stepped it up a notch and played with a lot of effort. I think the big difference in the game was our big plays. They (big plays) gave us momentum throughout the game."

Teurlings Greg Tidwell agreed with Jumonville.

"The big plays killed us," said Tidwell. "Everytime we'd get something going, we'd either shoot ourselves in the foot, or they'd come up big on their end. This game reminded me of the first game of the season."

Only trailing 7-0 (on a 16-yard Donavon Allen halfback pass to Adam Lege) midway through the second quarter, the most damaging play to Teurlings happened.

Ironically, it was Lege's 80-yard interception touchdown return of a Kyle Stutes pass that was the difference in the game.

However, it probably was not the interception itself, but rather the run after the catch that damaged the confidence of the Rebels.

"The interception took the life out of us," said Tidwell. "We had

momentum after the fake punt and was driving toward a score when the interception occurred. Lege made a great play on the ball, and the run showed some excellent athletic ability."

What made the interception and subsequent run even more amazing was the fact Lege was not at full strength for the game, after suffering a dislocated toe two weeks ago.

"I think the turning point in the game was the interception return by Lege," said Jumonville. "It was a great individual effort on his part, and it turned the game around for us because we had given up the fake punt earlier and they were driving. Also, the long touchdown pass help keep the momentum on our side."

The pass, Jumonville referred to, was the one North Vermilion quarterback Carlo Gautreaux's 22-yard strike to tight end Ike Navarre in the third quarter. Teurlings stunted on the play, leaving the middle of the field wide open for Navarre to score practically untouched.

"I don't remember what defense we were in, but we stunted frequently during the game," said Tidwell. "We may have been in a stunt and they caught us, I don't know. Still, you can't have penalties and turnovers like we had tonight, and expect to win in this league."

Teurlings fumbled five times and lost two and was penalized six times for 58 yards.

"We were our own worst enemy," said Tidwell. "We've dug ourselves a hole and we're going have to step up to get out. It's not going to be easy, but we can do it if the kids want to."

"We've had three tough games before this one," said Jumonville. "And I didn't know how the kids would respond. But they came through and I'm proud of the way they played."

North Vermilion tacked on another score in the fourth quarter on a Chad Chargois one-yard run.

Loreauville focused on task at hand — Teurlings

The Loreauville Tigers were picked by many to finish at or near the top of District 8-2A.

After one week of district play they're at 1-0 along with Notre Dame and North Vermilion, the three teams already showing they're probably the class of the district.

But while Loreauville's Friday night matchup with the Teurlings Catholic Rebels may look to be one of their easier ones on paper, head coach Kirk Crochet's attitude is one of cautious optimism.

"We've played pretty well so far, but this will probably be a tough game for us," he said. "We were lucky to beat them last year and even though they've record isn't good (1-2), they've played a lot better the last few weeks."

If there's one advantage the Rebels have, it's most likely the "looking ahead factor" for Loreauville. The Tigers take on district

favorite Notre Dame next Friday night in what could decide the district championship.

"A lot of people can look at it that way and next week is a very big game, but the kids know if they don't beat Teurlings, next week's game isn't as big," said Crochet. "That's the one thing I've kept telling them in practice. We have to focus on Teurlings only this week. If we play well and beat Teurlings, then we can concentrate on Notre Dame."

The Tigers are off to a solid start. They're 1-2 overall and 1-0 in district after last week's 28-14 win over Catholic of New Iberia. They've also defeated Delcambre, North Central and Ethon, while their two losses have been against Patterson and Vermilion Catholic, the latter coming on the final play of the game.

"The most important thing for a coach is improvement," said Crochet. "You have to keep improving each week to have a chance to win a district title. That's something I think we've

done. But we still have a lot of room for improvement on both sides of the ball."

Loreauville's top offensive threat is Jonathan Polk, who has rushed for 161 yards and eight touchdowns. However, Polk re-injured a hamstring last week and may not play against Teurlings.

"We just have to wait and see," said Crochet. "If he can't play, we'll just have to try and win without him. And it may do us some good. The kids need to learn they can win in case he's out with an injury."

Loreauville quarterback Todd Robinson has completed 21 passes for 324 yards and five touchdowns. His favorite targets have been Marion Alexander (6-119) and Albert Green (6-163).

The Rebels are at 1-5 overall and 0-1 in district play after last week's 27-0 loss to North Vermilion. But Teurlings did play Delcambre tough (28-14 loss) the week before and had defeated Redemptorist on the road two weeks ago.

"That's what concerns me,"

said Crochet. "They've been playing much better the last few weeks. They went to Baton Rouge and won and then they nearly beat Delcambre, who has a good ball club this year. And the score against North Vermilion didn't tell the whole story. That game was closer than it indicated."

Tailback Joey Moss was inserted into the lineup against Redemptorist and he has responded well over the last three games. He has carried the ball 47 times for 288 yards and two touchdowns, including an 80-yard touchdown run against Redemptorist.

"(Moss) has made a big difference for them," said Crochet. "He's a real good looking running back. He's put up some good numbers, so we'll have to concentrate on him and hope he doesn't break any big ones like he already has."

Loreauville's offense and defense have played well through six games. Led by Polk, the Tigers have put up 1,643 yards on offense. Their defense has given up 1,287 (769 rushing, 527 passing).

The topic always arises the week after a top team wins a big game. The No. 2-ranked Pioneers (8-0, 3-0) definitely met that criteria last week with a convincing 38-20 victory over Loreauville to move into the driver's seat in District 8-AA.

Now comes a road game against the Teurlings Catholic Rebels (1-7, 0-3) tonight at Clark Field, beginning at 7 p.m.

As confident as Gaspard understandably is these days, in no way does he feel tonight's contest with the Rebels is going to be a pushover.

"This team is definitely capa-

ble," Gaspard said. "They played an excellent defensive game against Catholic High. Teurlings always plays us tough. Last year, I didn't think they were as good as us, but we struggled with them for four quarters last year and were lucky to win it at the end."

The Rebels are led by Joey Moss (61-332, 2 TDs) and Reggie Trosclair (58-275, 5-126 rec.) on the ground, quarterback Eric Legendre (31-96-9, 451 yds, 3 TDs) and receiver Matt Citron (12-156, 2 TDs).

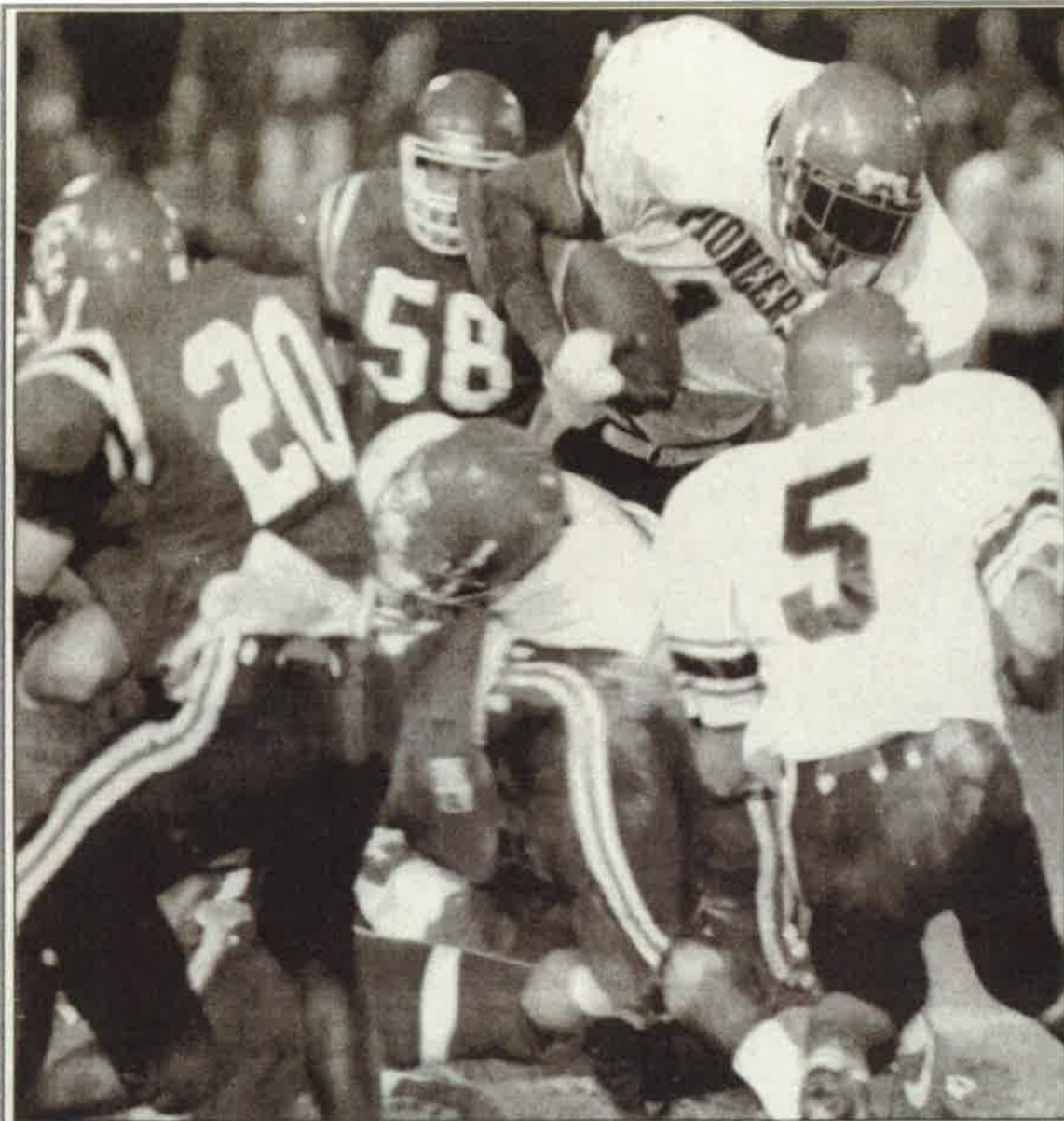
