LAFAYETTE - Sonny Charpentier knows his early season

Road games against St. Louis, Rayne and Marksville and a home game against Class 3A power Breaux Bridge don't bode well for any Tearlings Catholic dreams of an undefeated season

will be starting a sophomore at tailback, wide receiver and tight end on offense not to mention defensive end and linebacker.


Adam Fisher (5-8, 160) is that tailback, Dustin Arnaud (5-10, 165) brings some special speed on the outside, and Kory Hebert (6-4, 200) begins his run at tight end.

"He's (Fisher) got great balance and better than average speed." Charpentier said. "He's not real big, but he's strong. We're going to go through some growing pains. We're just going to have to be patient. Dustin could be a big weapon for us this year. He's young, but he's got real speed. He

Rounding out the skill positions will be senior Brad Robin (5-8, 175) at fullback, junior Justin Guy (5-9, 150) at quarter-back and senior Brian Gibson (6 2, 175) at wide receiver.

"Last year, we gave him (Guy) the job, but it wasn't really his team." Charpentier said. "He's looking really good right now. You can just see him blossoming. He's very smart. We're going to let him run it a little more this year. He's an excellent runner. In fact, if we had somebody else close to as good as Justin at quarterback, he'd be our starting tailback."

The offensive line will be

anchored by two returning starters in junior left tackle Mike Judice (6-1, 250) and senior center Zack Ezell (5-10, 205). The newcomers include junior Justin Herpin (6-2, 210) at left guard, senior Jan Hurley (6-0, 195) at right guard and senior Jason Herbert (6-3, 347) at right tackle.

"He (Herbert) is just one of those great stories." Charpentier "When he came here as freshman, he wasn't in shape. We really didn't think he'd last very long. But the kid has worked hard and hasn't missed a day. He's turned into a pretty good football player. He's got some explosive-

The biggest worry for Charp-entier at this point is the defen-sive line, which returns no starters, Judice and Hurley will be playing both ways, and will be joined by sophomore Nick Webre (6-0, 195) and senior Jules Jolivette (6-0, 210) at ends.
The linebacking corps has two

familiar names in senior Boo Arceneaux (6-0, 195), who will also see time at fullback, and senior Jon Comeaux (6-2, 250), who returns to Teurlings after a season at Carencro High The

season at Carenero High The newcomer is sophomore Brooks Stuart (6-0, 200). "Jon had to earn his way back," Charpentier said, "I don't think we're going to have any problems. I've learned that kids are a lot more forgiving than reaches a Historitath he had coaches are. His attitude has been great, and we're expecting a big year out of him.

The secondary features seniors Brandon Migues (6-0, 200) returning at strong safety and senior Ken Hanes (5-9, 170) at corner back. Arnaud and Guy will both see time at free safety, while Chris Rood (5-10, 180, Jr) is the other cornerback.
"I really think this is going to

be the best secondary we've had," Charpentier said. "I like the athletic ability back there. They're capable of running with receivers, which allows the defense to gamble more

And perhaps convincing any on the fence not to count out the Rebels.

Arceneaux not about to settle for repeat

LAFAYETTE - Success is a matter of perspective.

Some teams can only dream of going 8-4 and reaching the second round of the state playoffs.

Teurlings Catholic senior linebacker Boo Arceneaux isn't buying such talk. In fact, he only has one word to describe the Rebels' campaign a year ago disappointing.

And although several key seniors have departed the scene, Arceneaux is determined to do whatever it takes to ensure that a higher level is achieved in 1998.

"I was really disappointed at the end of the year," Arceneaux said. "The upcoming seniors got together after last season, and decided that we weren't going to let that happen again. I think that part of the problem is that some of the teams we played last year were new to us. This year. we should be ready for them."

In Arceneaux's case, preventing another 7-3 regular season may involve pulling double duty as a fullback. Doing so, however, is more of a relief than a burden for Arceneaux.

"I've been waiting to play fullback," he said. "I've been practicing it since my freshman year and never got a chance to really play it. I'm looking forward to it.

To further illustrate that point, both Mahfouz and Dotson were called into Superintendent Harold Gauthe's office Monday morning following that game in an attempt to somehow calm down the bitter rivalry.

A few years later, Dotson said another alarm clock went off in his head when Lafayette High head coach Jay Stelly described the showdown with the Rams on a television interview as "a game based on hate."

"In my mind, it all kind of culminated when I heard Jay make that statement," Dotson said. "That's not what high school football is supposed to be about. The funny thing about it is all of that is in the past now. Jay and I are real good friends, and so are Bob and I."

For the record, Dotson owned a 16-9 record against the Lions (counting a forfeit win in 1990), which Willard Hanks made 17 of 25 with another win a year ago.

Interestingly, Mahfouz's memory of the rivalry isn't quite as controversial.

"That rivalry definitely ranks right up there at the top," he said. "It was a real flerce rivalry that usually decided either the district championship or a playoff spot. They had an outstanding program in those years and so did we. It was always a good challenge coaching against Bill (Dotson).

"The two schools were in close proximity and the kids knew each other, and that had a lot to do with it. In my mind, it never got to the point of hatred. Both programs and both coaching staffs respected each other It was just a flerce competition for bragging rights in the entire city of Lafayette."

The other Hub City rivalry

Well, almost the entire city. During many of those same years, there was another intense rivalry taking place in week 10 each season. It involved another crosstown Hub City rivalry Only this one was of the Catholic variety between the old the Catholic variety between the old the Catholic Rebels.

The incredible thing about this

rivalry is that Teurlings never won a game, but that fact still doesn't diminish the passion which characterized these annual showdowns.

"Basically, we were a larger school, and we had a little bit more depth," said CC head coach Linden Bercegeay. "We always had a tough, disciplined approach that allowed us to wear them down in the fourth quarter. But Tad (Tatman) was a good coach and Teurlings had some real good teams.

"On the surface, it may have seemed like we didn't like those guys, but I always had a lot of respect for Tad and his staff. There's just nothing I enjoyed more in those days than beating Tad."

Bercegeay remembers illustrating that point to his players in many different ways.

"I remember one year (1976) when we were down 14-0 early," he said. "I just walked in (at halftime) and said, 'Guys, you're going to have to live with these fellows for the rest of your lives, I'm not.' And I just walked out. We came back and won (22-20)."

Like they always did.

"When you never beat somebody I guess it adds more pressure." Tatman said. "Our kids wanted to beat them so bad, and maybe Cathedral was just a little bit better than we were. The frustrating thing is that we could beat Notre Dame, and then we would lose to Cathedral."

The frustration for Teurlings began in 1978. The upstart Rebels entered the Cathedral game that season fresh off a 28-19 upset of No. 4-ranked Notre Dame, only to suffer a 46-30 defeat to the Tigers.

Despite losing again, the Rebels enjoyed a little bit of consolation in 1990 when Cathedral beat the Rebels 20-6, but needed a 15-point win to make the state playoffs. A missed Tiger field goal was later followed by a missed extra point to keep it at 14 points and give the Rebels the district title.

"That was the last game I ever

"That was the last game I ever coached," Bercegeay said. "I got the trophy and the football, but we were the odd team out. I had already decided to give it up after that season so Jacob (Byler) would get the job."

"We put that (kicking) tee in our

trophy case," Tatman said. "It was all just part of the fun of that rivalry. We had a lot of fun with those games, and made a lot of money. There were a lot of good kids on both sides of the ball."

And Byler's first year as head coach was one to remember also. This time, the Tigers won the district title when Rebel fullback Jed Hebert was stuffed on a two-point conversion attempt by Tiger line-backer David Dauterive to preserve a 20-18 win for Cathedral.

"It was always a knockdown, drag-out game where the loser goes home and cries," Tatman said.

Running through the wall

One of the great things about rivairtes is the stories that seem to last forever. In no parish is that any more evident than in St. Martin Parish, with the St. Martinville Tigers lead the way.

Perhaps the most famous tall tale took place in 1981 as head coach Carroll Delahoussaye's Tigers were preparing for a key showdown a rich-rival Cecilia High. Just prior to the game, Delahoussaye instructed assistant coach John Sopko to see exactly how sturdy the wall was constructed in the tin building the Tigers were gathering in prior to the game.

The report was that the bolts weren't real tight, so the board was removed and the rivets loosened while the players got dressed. The stage was set.

"I told them we weren't going through the door," Delahoussaye said. "I told (player) Troy Faucheaux that we were going through the wall. He was so pumped up and when he hit those two pieces of tin, that part of the wall just came down

"And every football player ran out of that hole. The only thing I didn't know at the time was that we ran right through Cecilia's team warming up. I was embarrassed. I would never have done that on purpose."

In those days, St. Martinville always seemed to get the last laugh against Cecilia. When Jamaican Dartez showed up in the 1990s, however, the Bullfrogs reeled off five straight wins in the series. Still, St.

LAFAYETTE — It was a rather peculiar lucky number, but it sure worked for the Abbeville Wildcats.

The Wildcats put together a pair 10-play, 53-yard scoring drives in the first half and added a 53-yard scoring run in the second half of Thursday's first game to get past Teurlings Catholic 21-14.

Accounting for most Abbeville's 200 yards rushing were Matt Patin with 81 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries and Travin Moore with 79 yards and a score on four attempts. Patin earned the MVP honor, while Jon Comeaux won the Rebels' top award.

Patin finished up the first drive with a one-yard TD run, before Quinn Nolan caught a one-yard TD pass from Ryan Duhon for the 14-0 halftime lead.

The Rebels' Justin Guy, who was 3-for-7 passing for 48 yards in the first half, hit Dustin Arnaud on a 16-yard TD pass at 9:11 of the second half to cut the lead in half.

Unfortunately for the Rebels, they didn't enjoy that slim deficit for very long. Moore punctuated a

LAKE CHARLES ---Sonny Charpentier is ready to be patient.


Going into the season, Teurlings Catholic's head coach knew it was going to take some time. So don't be surprised if he took more good than bad out of last Thursday's 21-14 jamboree loss to the seasoned Abbeville Wildcats.

He's just hoping a similar effort produces different results when the Rebels open the regular season at 7 p.m. today against the St. Louis Saints at Lake Charles-Boston High in Lake Charles.

"I thought it was a positive experience for us," Charpentier said. "We didn't roll over and play dead against a pretty good Abbeville team returning 18 starters from a district championship team. I thought we showed some fire for some inexperienced kids. We just need to be patient right now."

Adding to the Rebels' need for patience is a few injuries. Teurlings was limited to just three yards rushing in the game, but sophomore tailback Adam Fisher didn't play due to a hamstring, which will likely keep him out until at least the third game.

Left guard Justin Herpin (knee) also didn't play and isn't expected to play tonight either. Junior Kyle Hoey will take over

his spot.
"We're not going to rush him (Fisher) back too soon, like we did with Jesse (Cormier) last year," Charpentier said, "I'm not real worried about our running game. We didn't gameplan to run the ball against Abbeville. We knew we weren't going to be able to run against them, because they bring seven most of the time.

Consequently, the Rebels were able to work on their passing attack. Justin Guy connected on

10 of 23 passes for 131 yards. Dustin Arnaud had three receptions for 34 yards, and Chris Rood added four catches for 72 yards.

Brad Robin is expected to move to tailback for tonight's game. lining up behind a fullback by committee.

The Rebels defeated St. Louis 24.6 in last year's opener, but Charpentier is expecting a tougher challenge this time around. The Saints beat Sam Houston 9-0 in their jamboree.

"Their quarterback's a pretty good athlete." Charpentier said. They run the option with him: We're going to have to play good assignment football. They have a big fullback who runs hard, and they don't play as many people both ways. They're going to try to wear us down in the fourth quarter.

Rebels eager to get back on the field

LAFAYETTE — Teurlings head football coach Sonny Charpentier was formerly a head basketball coach before taking to the gridiron.

And there are times — not only during sweltering two-a-days — where Charpentier finds himself longing for the hardwood.

"The tough thing about football is that you have to wait a whole week to play again," Charpentier said. "Our kids know full well that they didn't play like they could last week. We've had a good week of practice, so we're eager to see what happens Friday night."

Teurings was edged 147 last Thursday in its opener at Lake Charles against St. Louis, and the Rebels are eager to get back on the

But the 2A Rebels figure to have their hands full with 1-0 Breaux Bridge, the No. 4-ranked team in 3A, when they host the Tigers at 7 p.m. tomorrow at Clark Field.

"Breaux Bridge has an outstanding football team," Charpentier said. "We like the challenge. We think you can get better by playing better people."

one of those better people might be Breaux Bridge running back/free safety Domanick Davis, an early commitment to LSU who torched North Iberville in the opener (a 37-14 Tigers win) to the tune of 241 yards and four touchdowns on just 11 carries. That sterling performance from a player most college scouts see ending up on the defensive side of the ball

earned Davis the Daily Advertiser's Offensive Player of the Week honors.

Davis, however, is no one-man show, particularly on offense. Fullback Doug Johnson and quarterback Jason Berard are also three-year starters, and a veteran offensive line led by returning starters John Wiltz (6-0, 250) at left tackle, junior Marshall Romero (6-4, 305) at left guard and senior center Luke Boudreaux makes the Tigers tough to stop.

For Breaux Bridge head coach Mike Mowad, the early concern has been a green defensive line featuring five newcomers.

"I've been really pleased with the offensive line and the backs," Mowad said. "Those are three-year starters in the backfield every one of them. You expect them to play well, and they are. I just hope the defense can catch up to the offense."

Charpentier hopes that he can delay that process by at least another week. After rushing the ball for just 76 yards against St. Louis, the Rebels will look to concentrate on the rushing game.

The projected starting tailback,

sophomore Adam Fisher, is still nursing a hamstring injury, so the running duties will be shared by a committee including senior Brad Robin, sophomore Dustin Padgett and sophomore Dominique Floyd.

"We need to be able to run the football to be successful in our district." Charpentier said. "We're going to make a concerted effort to do that. This week, our best defense might be our offense. We need to try to keep their defense on the fleld."

When the Tigers do go on offense, the best matchup might be between Davis and Breaux Bridge's other backs and the tough Teurlings linebacking crew of seniors Boo Arceneaux and Jon Comeaux and sophomore Brooks Stuart.

"They have three exceptional linebackers," Mowad said. "They're real active and put a lot of pressure on you. Their defense is designed real well in that the four defensive linemen funnel everything to the linebackers."

With Davis and company on hand, though, that's an awful lot to funnel.





Win over OC puts Teurlings at 3-3

OPELOUSAS — After Teurlings Catholic got out to an uncharacteristic 0-3 start this fall, Rebels fans might have wondered what was wrong

After Thursday night's 279 victory over Opelousas Catholic in the district opener for both squads, though, this much seemed clear - it wasn't any thing that three straight victories couldn't cure.

"We just got finished telling the team that we dug the hole, so we had to put the dirt back in," said Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier. "Now we're back to ground level. With three wins in a row, we've got a little bit of momentum."

Against the Vikings - at 4-1 enter ing the game one of the early season's surprises - an opportunistic Rebel defense and special teams helped keep the Rebels rolling. Five OC turnovers led to 24 of the 27 Teurlings points.

That pattern started from the very beginning, as Opelousas Catholic mishandled an option pitch in the back-field on the second play of the night and the Rebels recovered on the 1-yard

Fullback Brad Robin plowed over for the first of his three 1-yard scores on the night and the Rebels led 70 just

28 seconds into the game
"That first play of the game really
set the tone," said OC head coach Larry Dauterive, "You put any team right on the 1, and they're almost certainly going to score. You can't do that against a good club like Teurlings."

Still, the Vikings quickly served notice that this isn't the same porous bunch that finished 1-9 a season ago. When OC got its own turnover opportunity by recovering a Teurlings fum-ble at the Rebels 19 later in the first quarter, the Vikes took just two plays to find the end zone. Scott Thibodeaux ran 8 yards on the

first play and then covered the next 11 on a shovel pass from Minyard

After a clipping penalty backed

Teurlings up to its own 4 on the ensu-ing kickoff, the OC defensive front swarmed in and caught Robin in the end zone for a safety and a 9-7 lead with 2 10 to play in the first.

But that would be it for the Vikes on the scoreboard, in large part because TC wouldn't turn the ball over again

while OC made four more miscues. After a 32-yard field goal from Casey Hebert made it 10-9 Tourlings early in the second quarter, Rebels defensive back Dustin Stroderd made his first of two interceptions of Minyard (12 of 26 for 118 yards, TD)

That set the Rebels up on the OC 44, and after TC quarterback Justin Guy rambled 22 yards down to the 5 on a second and 18 play Robin went in for the score three plays later that helped make it 17-9 at the half.

Stroderd's second interception — this time he returned to the OC 29 in the third quarter - led to a remarkably similar scenario as Guy boot-legged 27 yards around right end to set up another 1 yard Robin plunge

Another interception, this time by TC linebacker Brooks Stuart off OC backup Jared Haynes (after Minyard left with a potentially broken ankle), set up a 37-yard field goal by Hebert that closed the scoring

All the turnovers helped make the final score much more one sided than the stats indicated - OC actually had five more first downs, 15 to 10 - but Charpentier wasn't much concerned.


Til take it and go home," Charpen tier said with a smile.





LAFAYETTE —If there's anything good about a few early season losses, it can help to prepare you for a disappointing setback later in the season.

So after watching his Teurlings Catholic Rebels bounce back from three early losses in style, head coach Sonny Charpentier is expecting the same response from his Rebels after last week's heartbreaking 20-16 loss to No. 6-ranked Patterson.

Of course, Charpentier learned years ago that predicting football games is an iffy proposition.





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

Henderson Keys did some damage of his own with 43 rushing yards and one score.






