Dueitt ready to lead Teurlings

PREP FOOTBALL

LAFAYETTE — Jett Dueitt was across the line of scrimmage from Roch Charpentier during practice last season, so he got a first-hand look at how well the Teurlings Catholic quarterback played.

Charpentier threw for 1,696 yards and 19 touchdowns to lead the Rebels to the co-championship of District 6-3A in 2003, and TCHS advanced to the quarterfinals before losing to Notre Dame in the state playoffs.

Dueitt was another key to that successful season as a standout safety.

Now, Dueitt moves to offense and will quarterback the Rebels of coach Sonny Charpentier.

"Roch did a good job last year," Dueitt said. "Any quarterback in this system is going to do good. We just have to keep doing what we're doing, and try to score some points."

That matter-of-fact approach will serve Dueitt well on an offense that returns just three starters after scoring 30 points per game a year ago.

"Last year," Dueitt said, "I was concentrating on safety. This summer, I've been looking at a lot of film. Coach has been working with me on breaking down coverages."

"I'm working on getting the timing right with the running

backs and the wide receivers. We have good receivers. I have to get them the ball in space and let them make plays. As long as I can do that, we'll be all right."

Luke Aubrey, a 6-foot-4 senior, leads the Rebels' revamped receiving corps, while Dueitt and tailback Jordan Hebert are also seniors in a program known for success.

"We don't always have the biggest or the best players," Dueitt said, "but coach pushes us to be the best every day in practice. I guess that's why we win more games than we should."

The Rebels may need the six returning defensive starters to hold things in check while the offense finds its rhythm.

"We're trying to find out who we are right now," Dueitt said. "We're trying to get comfortable with each other as a team. Execution and timing will come later. Then the rest just falls into place."

The Rebels can't take too long to get settled. Four of the five teams in 6-3A had winning records in 2003, with a combined 28-11 mark between them, and another competitive season lies ahead.

"The district is tough," Dueitt said. "There are a lot of good coaches. They all prepare their teams well."

"We started out 0-2 last year and were able to go 7-3 and make the state quarterfinals. That was a big turnaround. We need to get off to a better start this year, so we won't have to dig out of a hole again."

Rebels counting on team speed

Offense undergoes changes

LAFAYETTE — Sonny Charpentier is closing in on 100 victories as head coach of the Teurlings Rebels.

Charpentier brings an 85-27 mark into his 10th season running the program, and last year's team finished 9-4 as a Class 3A state quarterfinalist with Charpentier's son Koch as the quarterback.

Now Teurlings will try to duplicate that success while replacing eight starters on offense and half of its defense.

Adding spice to the Rebels' challenge is being a member of District 6-3A, which sent four of five teams to the state playoffs in 2003.

"As a team, we feel like we have more good football players than we've had in a while, with better than average team speed," Charpentier said.

"This year will be very much like the previous three or four years. We have only three starters back on offense, and coupled with how tough our schedule will be early, we will have to rely on our defense and special teams to give us a chance until the offense can get going."

Dueitt was a starting free

safety a year ago, and still may see some action in deep support, but his main job now is to run the attack.

"We have six starters back on defense, if you count Jett, but we're not sure how much time he will get (while) being the starting quarterback," Charpentier said.

The Rebels should be strong in their defensive front, with three of four starters back. Two of them are seniors — end Jared Conques and tackle Jacob Tabor — while the largest is 240-pound junior tackle Benji Hebert.

"We feel our defense has a chance to end up being very good," said Charpentier, whose team was second in 6-3A in points allowed last season.

"Along with the defensive line, we have some good football players who have been waiting their turn. We expect big things out of Benji."

Dueitt will doubtless try to quickly establish rapport with 6-foot-4 senior wide receiver Luke Aubrey, the one proven weapon back on offense.

"We're expecting a big year from Luke," Charpentier said. "We will have more depth in the backfield with guys like Jordan Hebert, Colin Duhon, Logan Guilbeau and Beau Robin."

"The play of the quarterback will be key to our success, but we always believe that in order for us to have success we have to be able to run the ball and stop the run. That all

starts up front."

An ace up the Rebels' sleeve is kicker Kyle Boudreaux, who is back to handle both place kicking and punting. Boudreaux was successful on 9-of-13 field goal attempts a year ago and gives TCHS a chance to score with even modest drives.

Teurlings opens league play at home against Catholic-New Iberia on Oct. 8, a high-profile start to district action between teams that each had 3-1 records in 6-3A in 2003.

If Dueitt is settled in at quarterback by then, and the Rebels are running the ball and stopping the run, Charpentier will be in high gear toward that 100-win plateau.

St. Martinville pops Teurlings

CARENCRO — So far, so good for Gregg Hudson.

The first-year St. Martinville coach made his debut a good one Thursday night, as his Tigers completely dominated in a 30-10 win over the Teurlings Catholic Rebels in the third game of the 53rd annual Kiwanis Jamboree.

Hudson and his new-look Tigers unveiled a new offense and a new defense and made it look easy.

Trince Thibodeaux rushed for 110 yards and two touchdowns, Kennedy Tyler added 69 yards and a score on the ground and quarterback Beau Lasseigne was 4-for-10 passing with 89 yards and a touchdown.

But it was linebacker Jeremy Fontenette who grabbed MVP honors for the Tigers after wreaking havoc on defense.

Teurlings wasn't without their offensive fireworks, as Jordan Hebert ran for 117 yards on six carries for the Rebels.

It didn't take long for the Tigers to get on the scoreboard. In fact, it took only 43 seconds.

Working out of the wing-T, the Tigers needed only two plays to take the quick lead as Trince Thibodeaux took the handoff from Beau Lasseigne and found a seam en route to a 57-yard touchdown run.

Teurlings responded to the Tigers' score, as they drove into St. Martinville territory on their first possession.

The drive bogged down at the St. Martinville 13 and Kyle Boudreaux came out to nail a 30-yard field goal to make it 7-3.

Jordan Hebert covered most of the 72-yard drive in one play

as he broke loose up the middle for a 64-yard gain.

The Tigers extended their lead to 14-3 late in the first half, as they drove 55 yards in four plays after Jeremy Fontenette picked off a Jett Dueitt pass to set up shop with 1:41 left.

Lasseigne was responsible for 53 of those yards as he completed two passes on the drive.

The second completion came after Lasseigne appeared to be sacked in the backfield, only to escape and find Mace Hebert for a 37-yard strike down to the 2.

Teurlings downs Pios 19-6 in season opener

LAFAYETTE- Notre Dame opened their 2004 campaign on a sour note here Friday evening dropping a 19-6 decision to the Teurlings Rebels here at Clark Field.

The Pioneers came out of the gates sluggish and remained that way until the waning minutes of the game when they actually threatened to pull out the win.

"We got outplayed tonight," Notre Dame's Louie Cook said. "We never could consistently get anything going. We still need a lot of work, but I am confident we will improve."

The game was actually a battle in the pits with both teams not surrendering much yardage.

Going into the game Cook and his staff knew that the Rebels had a big play receiver in Luke Aubrey and the senior was the difference, scoring two touchdowns in the win.

"He is a player. He got the

ball a couple of times and he came up with the big plays."

After stopping the Rebels first drive, Notre Dame took possession at their own 40 and clicked off two first downs to move inside the Teurlings 40 on a Rick Zaunbrecher run. That drive stalled and the Pioneers were then forced to punt.

As the first quarter ended the Pioneers over the ball from their own 15 across midfield and down to the Teurlings 29 on runs by Zaunbrecher and Ryan Hebert. A fourth down play from the 29 had Andre Robichaux finding Joe Voittier for a first down at the 17, but a series of penalties finished off the drive with Pioneers surrendering the ball at the Reb 19.

"We had some trouble with their defense since they were moving around a lot. They took some chances and were successful," Cook said.

On their next series Teurlings moved the ball down the field and on a third down Aubrey made a catch over the

middle then spun around and raced into the endzone from 52 yards out for the first score of the game. The PAT was blocked by Greg Harmon to give the Rebels a 6-0 lead with 3:42 left in the half.

The second half started out much like the first with defenses dominating play.

Notre Dame had their second possession cut short with a fumble at their own 43.

Moving into the final period the Rebels put together a drive from their own 46 to paydirt. The final blow was a 22-yard scamper by Logan Guilbeau into the endzone. Phillip Brown blocked the PAT and Teurlings had a 12-0 lead.

Notre Dame finally managed some offensive output on the next series. Zaunbrecher broke off the right side for a nice 32-yard run then Robichaux hit Gabe Casanova for another 12 yards to move the ball inside the Rebel 30. Robichaux then zeroed in on Joe Voittier for a pass play that

carried the ball inside the Teurlings three. Two plays later Zaunbrecher was able to cross the double stripe and the Pioneers were down 12-6. Mark Alleman's PAT try was blocked with 1:11 left in the game.

Cook's special teams then pulled off a successful onside kick with Gabe Casanova recovering to take possession again at the Rebel 46, but the tide quickly turned.

On the very first play Aubrey again made his presence felt by stepping in front

of Robichaux's pass and returning it 66 yards for the third and final Rebel score of the night.

"We fought hard and actually got back into the game before giving up another big play," Cook said. "It was like a reversal of last year," Cook concluded.

This week the Pioneers will begin a three week homestand by hosting the Catholic Panthers in a 7 p.m. contest Friday.

2nd half BB Tigers topple Teurlings

Breaux Bridge scores late in 20-10 win

Lafayette — After spotting Teurlings Catholic 10 first half points, the Breaux Bridge Tigers tallied three unanswered touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters to pull out a 20-10 win over the Rebels.

Coach Mike Mowad's Tigers used a bruising ground attack, ignited primarily by senior J.T. Auguillard, to pound out 229 yards and all three scores in a game that was marred by a combined total of 22 penalties against the two teams.

Auguillard finished with 148 yards on 21 carries with one short touchdown run, bringing his early season rushing total to 385 yards.

TC 28 just as the second period got underway.

On second down Kendrick Alexander broke loose for 25 yards and a TD, but the score was wiped out by a holding penalty and on the very next play Rebel Colin Duhon picked off a Matt Broussard pass to kill the threat.

BB's next possession started at the Tiger eight but disaster struck when Alexander was tackled in the end zone for a two-point safety, putting the Rebels into a 10-0 lead midway through the quarter and that held up until intermission, as penalties continued to stymie both teams.

Teurlings opened the

Auguillard reached the end zone. The PAT kick failed but Breaux Bridge was finally in the lead, 13-10.

The Tigers added an insurance touchdown late in the game when Picard capped a 54-yard drive with a touchdown from the one.

But the Rebels fought to the final whistle, with a 43-yard Dueltt-to-Jordan Hebert pass moving them to the BB 12. But back-to-back penalties stymied the Rebels, and a 37-yard field goal attempt missed with just 36 seconds left in the game.

Along with his two touchdowns, Picard contributed 34 yards on 10 carries to the BB offense. The Tigers relied almost exclusively on their run-

to 300 yards.

Teurlings surprised Breaux Bridge with an onside kick to open the game and got the ball at midfield. Mixing passes with running plays the Rebels moved quickly to the BB seven. A holding penalty set them back, but the Tigers were whistled for pass interference on a third down attempt, setting Teurlings up with a first down at the nine. Two plays later Logan Guilbeau powered in for the score and Kyle Boudreaux added the two-point conversion, putting eight points on the board.

Breaux Bridge managed only one first down before being forced to punt and a booming kick by Matt Broussard drove the Rebels back to their seven.

Teurlings seemed to be working itself out of the hole when Boudreaux coughed up the ball at the

Teurlings opened the second half by moving quickly into BB territory on Matt Dueitt passes of 38 and 14 yards to Nick Domingue and Luke Aubrey. But the Tiger defense stiffened and halted the drive at the 36.

The ensuing TC punt went out of bounds at the BB two, putting the Tigers in a precarious situation. But three successive carries by Auguillard for 37 yards solved that problem and ignited Breaux Bridge's first scoring drive. The Tigers burned eight minutes off the clock in going 98 yards, with Josh Picard bulling in from the one just as the period ended. Broussard's PAT closed the margin to 10-7.

It didn't take nearly as long for Breaux Bridge's next score, with the Tigers striking paydirt in just five plays after forcing a Teurlings punt. Alexander followed up a 29-yard run by Auguillard with a 28-yard gain to the TC three and two plays later

exclusively on their running game, with Broussard attempting only four passes. He completed one for eight yards and suffered one interception.

The Rebel offense was just the opposite, with 168 of Teurlings' 253 yards coming through the air. Dueitt finished 10-for-27 with Aubrey his favorite target with six catches for 62 yards.

The victory gives the 2-0 Tigers a 13-3 edge over the Rebels in a rivalry that began in 1981.

Breaux Bridge travels again this Friday, with the Tigers facing parish rival Cecilia for local bragging rights.

Aubrey powers Teurlings to 28-6 win over Iota

The 3A Teurlings Rebels improved to 2-1 on the season and the 2A Iota Bulldogs fell to 1-2 Friday night at Bulldog Stadium, as the Rebels outmanned the Bulldogs 28-6.

The Bulldogs won the toss and elected to receive the football.

Shon Kennedy had a nice 23 yard return giving the Dogs the ball first and 10 at their own 31.

The Bulldogs did what they do best, keeping the ball on the ground between the tackles and picked up four first downs which moved the ball inside the Rebel five yard line, before being forced to attempt a 27 yard field goal. Korey Richey's field goal attempt was tipped at the line of scrimmage and Luke Aubrey picked it up and rambled 40 yards setting the Rebels up at the Iota 49 yard line.

From there, it took the Rebels 11 plays to score the first points of the night, as on second and goal Jordan Hebert used his speed to outrun the Dogs to the flag. After Kyle Boudreaux added the PAT the Rebels led 7-0 with :32 left in the first quarter.

It took the Rebels four plays on their next drive to increase the lead to 14-0, as on fourth down quarterback Dueitt found Aubrey for a 32-yard touchdown. After the PAT the Rebels led 14-0.

Again Iota could not move the ball and punted back to the Rebels.

On this series, Dueitt again found Aubrey on the sixth play of the drive, this time for 50 yards and the score making it 21-0, after the PAT with 5:04 left till half.

The Bulldogs could get nothing going and had to give the ball back to the Rebels, who were driving for another score when Sophomore Ryan Comeaux recovered a fumble and the Bulldogs ran out the clock and went to the locker room trailing 21-0.

The Rebels started the second half from their 20 and wasted little time, as they got the ball the their best athlete on a reverse and 80 yards later Aubrey was standing in Iota's endzone, making the score 28-0 after Boudreaux's PAT.

The Bulldogs offense again can't move and after a 22 yard punt the Rebels are in business at Iota's 46. This time Iota's defense held the Rebels on a 4th and 2.

The Bulldogs finally got on the board on their next drive. Iota, now 1-2 on the season, will hit the road for a contest with the third ranked 1A Haynesville Golden Tornadoes. Game time is set for 7pm in Haynesville.

Cecilia — After playing the Teurlings Rebels to a 21-21 tie in regulation action, the Cecilia Bulldogs came up one point short in overtime, falling 28-27 to their visitors here last Friday.

The two teams had to contend with weather delays and a power outage that disabled the scoreboard and PA system as thunderstorms rolled through the Acadiana area.

After spotting the Rebels a 14-0 halftime lead, the Bulldogs stormed back for three touchdowns in the second half to go up 21-14. But Teurlings managed a late TD to knot the score and force the game into overtime.

The game leaves the Bulldogs still looking for their first win while Teurlings improved to 3-1.

Rebels Strike First

The Rebels took the opening kickoff and drove 60 yards in 10 plays for the game's first score. QB Jett Dueitt got Teurlings moving with a 15-yard pass to Luke Aubrey and running back Jordan Hebert slashed for 13 to continue the momentum. Another key play came with the Rebels facing a 4th-

and-two at the five. Logan Guilbeau was able to get the first down at the two and then punched in for the score on his next carry.

Lee Johnson brought Cecilia fans to their feet when he returned the ensuing kickoff 55 yards to the TC 45. But the Bulldogs went three and out and the game settled into a defensive battle.

The weather worsened just as the second period began and officials sent the teams off the field for 30 minutes until the lightning abated.

Moving from their 20 when play resumed, the Rebels reeled off three quick first downs in driving to the Cecilia 43. But then Bulldog Jonathan Reed recovered a Rebel fumble to kill the threat.

But Cecilia moved backwards on a holding penalty and then Trent Hebert lost

the ball with Teurlings recovering at the 21. It seemed the Bulldog defense would rise to the challenge, but on 4th-and-four Dueitt found Aubrey open for the 17-yard touchdown. Kyle Boudreaux's PAT put the Rebels into a 14-0 lead going into the halftime break.

Cecilia managed one first down before punting on their initial possession of the third quarter but got the ball right back when Kendall Journet picked off a Dueitt pass at the TC 25. A penalty against the Rebels helped the Bulldogs to a first down at the 13, and back-to-back carries by Shawn Alexander produced another first down at the two. Donovan Journet punched it in from that point and Cody Guidry booted the PAT to make the score 14-7.

The Cecilia defense came up with yet another Teurlings fumble minutes

punt.

Cecilia got the ball back at its own 20 following a Teurlings punt just as the third period ended. Hebert got the 'Dogs moving with a 24-yard strike to Brandon Williams and two plays later Alexander broke loose for a 36-yard touchdown. The PAT kick failed and Cecilia trailed 14-13.

Penalties hurt the Rebels on their next possession, forcing a punt.

Taking over at the Cecilia 31, Hebert threw to Johnson for a 17-yard gain. Alexander then picked up 15 to overcome a holding penalty and move the pigskin into Rebel territory. Then a major penalty against Teurlings helped Cecilia to a first down at the 26, setting up an Hebert-to-Courtney Borel TD pass. Hebert kept the ball for the two-point conversion and Cecilia went out in front 21-14.

with his third PAT.

With time running short in regulation play, Hebert connected with Borel for 10 yards. But two plays later the sophomore quarterback was intercepted and Teurlings had the ball at the CHS 22. Trying desperately to break the deadlock, Dueitt tossed three incomplections. With under a minute remaining Boudreaux attempted a 36-yard field goal but it missed the mark and the game ended with the score still at 21-21, forcing the overtime scenario.

Shawn Alexander had his best game of the season, rushing for 136 yards and two touchdowns on 23 carries. Donovan Journet added 22 yards and a TD on seven totes while Hebert finished with five completions on 18 attempts for 95 yards and a score.

"He's really turning out to be a great fullback for us. He's got the talent, he's got the heart, he's everything you want in a fullback."

So far, Desormieux has helped pave the way for Zachary, who leads the team with 316 yards and 11 touchdowns. Desormieux adds 156 yards and five touchdowns.

The forecast of improved weather has the Panther power attack smiling.

"I think we found out against West St. Mary that we like to play in those conditions," Comstock said. "After that West St. Mary game I think our kids really felt comfortable out there in the mud. I hope it translates to another win tomorrow night."

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels don't take too kindly to losing and they don't care much for sharing.

And the Catholic High Panthers were responsible for both scenarios last year.

Teurlings holds off Catholic High

LAFAYETTE — Earlier this year, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels struggled when leading at halftime.

Friday night, the Rebels got it out of the way early.

The Rebels surrendered a 14-0 first quarter lead, but scored the only points of the second half to take a 20-14 win over the Catholic High Panthers.

Panther fumbles in the first quarter led to a 14-0 first quarter lead for the Rebels.

But the Panthers got two scores of their own in the second quarter to go into the half tied at 14-14.

A huge special teams miscue ultimately did the Panthers in, however, as Teurlings converted a fumbled snap on a punt to drive 28 yards for the game-winning touchdown. Logan Guilbeau did the honors for Teurlings, scoring on a one-yard plunge.

The extra point attempt was wide right, but it wouldn't matter, as the Rebels held Catholic High to only 70 yards total offense the rest of the way. Of

that total, 48 of those yards came on two plays.

"Special teams always plays a part, but in conditions like these, it's magnified," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We got a big break when the ball just went through the punter's hands. We didn't have a block on, but our two rush guys did a great job of putting pressure on the punter."

The Rebels looked like they had a touchdown on the second play after the turnover as Jett Dueitt threw a perfect pass to Jordan Hebert, who was wide open in the end zone. But Hebert couldn't come down with the wet ball.

On the next play, though, Teurlings got a little redemption as Dueitt's pass was deflected by two Panther defenders straight into the hands of Colin Duhon.

Duhon raced 32 yards down to the 1-yard line to set up Guilbeau's plunge.

The Panthers had three opportunities to tie the game, but all three drives stalled. Catholic High's first possession after the touchdown stalled at the Teurlings 49-yard line on three consecutive incomplete

passes.

The second drive was a four-and-out after a short gain and three incomplete passes. The Catholic High fans and coaches thought they had gotten a break when a flag was thrown on their third down incompleteness, but the official correctly ruled that the pass attempt took place behind the line of scrimmage, waving off the pass interference.

Catholic High had one last gasp, after Teurlings ran some time off the clock. The Panthers got a pass interference to take them out of the shadow of their own end zone, but Josh Boudreaux's desperation pass attempt to midfield was incomplete as the horn sounded.

"We buried ourselves in a hole early, then dug out of it," Catholic coach David Comeaux said.

"Defensively, I thought we played our hearts out, left it all out there. We just put the ball on the ground too many times tonight. Give (Teurlings) credit, they capitalized on some early turnovers and put us in a hole."

The hole actually could have been deeper.

After the Rebels got a 1-yard

touchdown by Guilbeau and a 21 yard touchdown pass from Dueitt to Luke Aubrey to make it 14-0, they appeared to go up 21-0 when Colin Duhon returned a punt 81 yards for a score.

But the play was called back for a holding penalty. The Rebels couldn't get anything going offensively the rest of the half, as Catholic High rallied to make it 14-14.

The Panthers scored on a 3-yard run by Nelson Boutte and a 19-yard pass from Boudreaux to Cody Raymond with 12 seconds left in the half to tie the game.

"I thought we kind of got deflated after the punt was called back," Charpentier said. "This was the most excited we were in pregame in nine or 10 years and that scared me. I think we showed that early, but eventually you come down. I think we thought it was going to be easy after the punt return."

"They hurt us with the dive to the tight end side in the second quarter and we made some adjustments. I also think we stepped up the intensity a little in the second half. We were pretty flat going into the locker room at the half."

LAFAYETTE — Taborous Montgomery didn't have time to think. He also didn't have a moment to lose.

It was the biggest of several big plays turned in by the Rebels, who improved to 7-1 overall and 3-0 in league play.

"I won't say that play broke their backs, but it did make it more comfortable for us," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said.

"We talked about it at half, and Coach said to just pick it up and go," Montgomery said. "We knew North Vermilion was a running team, and we didn't do that good a job against them in the first half. But we turned it up in the third quarter and were able to get some turnovers."

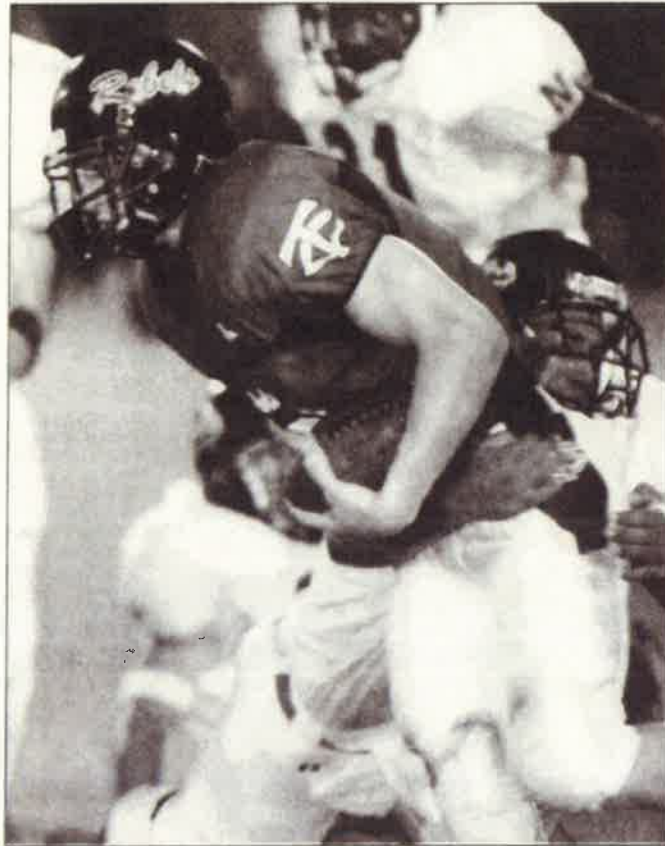
"Any time the defense makes big plays like that, it gives us a lift on offense," quarterback Jett Dueitt said. "Taborous's play was the biggest one of the night."

On the first snap, Dueitt fired deep for Colin Duhon for a 42-yard touchdown and an 18-7 lead.

Daniel Montet's perfectly delivered, 34-yard pass to Trahan then put North Vermilion on the Rebels' 5-yard line and set up a Broussard touchdown plunge.

Field goals of 42 and 25 yards by Kyle Boudreaux followed by Teurlings, the second set up by Cole Blanchard's fumble recovery at the NVHS 27.

North Vermilion (6-2, 1-1) was driving to narrow the gap again when Montgomery struck.

Boudreaux's 41-yard fake punt pass to Jordan Hebert set up the Rebels' first score, a 2-yard Guilbeau run, which was answered by a 52-yard scoring dash by the Patriots' J.J. Broussard.

A 33-yard throwback pass from Ben

Romero to Duhon then set up Guilbeau's 1-yard score and the 12-7 lead at the break. The game's final TD, set up by another fumble, was a 6-yard Dueitt pass to Jeff Faber.

"Our offensive line has really stepped up," Dueitt said. "I've only been sacked two times all year. Our receivers are running good routes, and everything's clicking."

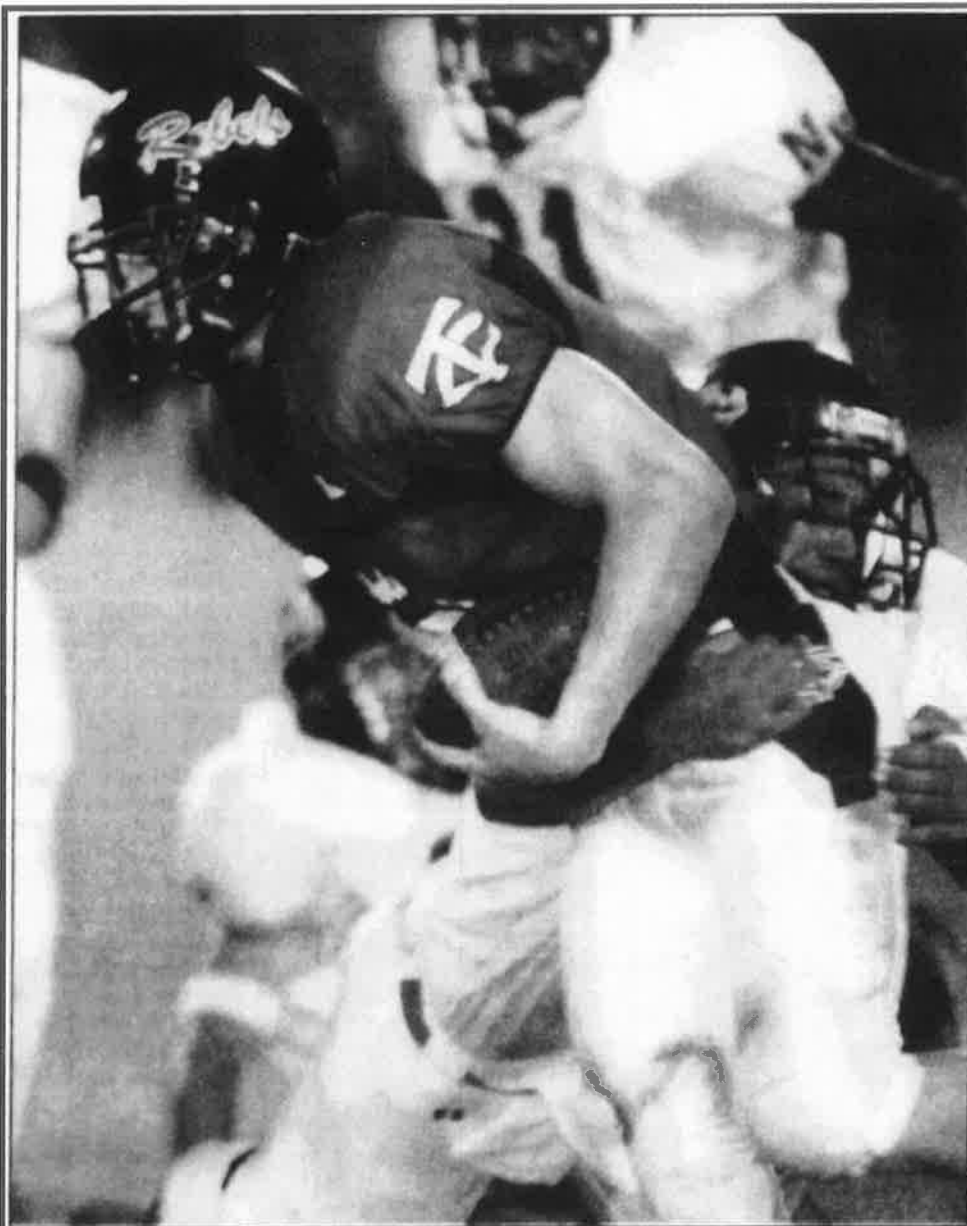
"We had to play homecoming sometime," Charpentier said. "It was no disrespect to North Vermilion. That's just the way it fell. We were able to make enough big plays to win."

Teurlings, Erath square off

ERATH — For Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier, this is the type of game in which he's grown accustomed to coaching.

The Rebels (7-1, 3-0) have won three straight District 6-3A championships. Entering this year, they were faced with a lot of changes to their football team, the main one being a new quarterback playing the position for the first time.

But since an early-season loss in week two, the Rebels have been able to weather the storm quite nicely.

On Friday night, they find themselves in the position of winning a fourth straight district title if they can defeat the Erath Bobcats (7-1, 1-3) in a key game.

"We feel good about where we are right now. At this point in time, it's not so much the physical when it comes to practicing, but the mental and emotional approach to the full game," Charpentier said. "When you're talking about the ninth week of the season,

if you don't know how to block and tackle by now then we would just as soon not load up the bus. But I think we'll be ready to play. If we're not then shame on us."

Quarterback Jett Dueitt paces the Rebel offensive attack along with his favorite target, senior wideout Luke Aubrey.

"They've got an outstanding quarterback and receiver and they're real good on defense," said Erath coach Jacob Byler. "They really fly to the ball and they really run well. They've got a lot of tradition and they take a lot of pride in that program. They're good year in and year out."

The Bobcats are coming off their first loss of the season last week at the hands of the Catholic High Panthers, a thrilling overtime game that ended 42-35.

"We always worry about the game after your first loss. We've been a little down in practice and our spirits are a little low, but I've seen some improvements each day," Byler said. "You don't know how it's going to affect them. We're pretty concerned but hopefully we'll show up to play but until Friday night we really won't know."

Until the setback last week, Erath had steamrolled through their schedule led by quarterback Derrick Fourrion.

"The guy taking the snaps is the leader, obviously. But with that said, I'm a big believer that you're only as good as the people around you," Charpentier said. Also, good quarterbacks make the people around them better.

"He's an outstanding high school quarterback and it all starts and stops with him."

With Erath coming off its first loss of the season, this is a point that concerns Charpentier as well.

"They are playing for their district championship trophy, they can help themselves and actually control their own destiny with a win," said Charpentier. "I expect Erath to come out ready to play. I don't think there will be any ill effects from last week. I think it may be a better situation for them. Last week they were down and played well to come back and even though they lost the game, they may have a bit of momentum going into this week."

Bobcats drop second straight

Teurlings clinches 6-3A title

The Teurlings Rebels upended the Bobcats 20-6 Friday night in a tense bout for district 6-3A supremacy.

Following a Fourroux sneak and first down conversion, Fourroux found Tyler Arceneaux in the flat who scampered for 25 more yards. The Bobcats were in busi-

ness, first and goal on the eight yard line. Sophomore Jared Harrington pounded the ball twice for six yards and brought the Bobcats to the two yard line for third and goal.

Fourroux's pitch to Harrington on third down went astray and was recovered by the Bobcats on the eighteen yard line. Allen Theall's 35-yard field goal attempt on fourth down was blocked. Teurlings took over with just over a minute left in the first quarter.

The first quarter came to

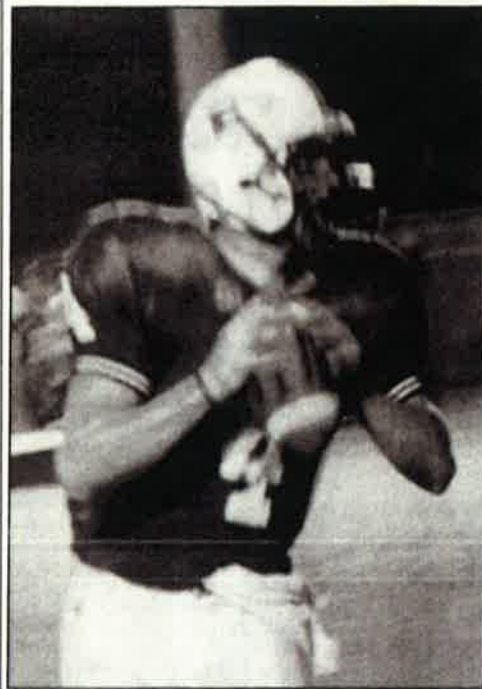

an end as the Rebels crossed over into Bobcat territory. Teurlings capped off the drive on first and goal from the three yard line. With 10 minutes remaining in the half, the Rebels were up 7-0.

Erath responded well on its next drive, but failed to score once again. Arceneaux and Harrington combined on six rushes for 64 yards. On fourth and one chain link down on the Bobcat three yard line, Fourroux kept the ball over the left side and

converted the first down. On first and goal the Bobcats were backed up via a delay of game penalty. Erath failed to convert on second and third down. "But he stepped up defensively. He blocked a field goal, he had an interception and had a hand in a few other plays. He also had a couple of big hits, which is just as good as anything else you can do back there."

While Aubrey was dominating defensively, Lafayette receiver Scotty Dauterive was making it happen on offense.

Dauterive, facing his former teammates at Acadiana, caught 11 passes for 124 yards and two touchdowns in the Lions' 34-33 win over Acadiana.

The senior set the tone early,

forcing a fumble on Acadiana's first kickoff return. He then put the Lions ahead 14-0 on a 42-yard touchdown strike from Michael McIver.

Dauterive's other touchdown came from four yards out and tied the game at 27-27 in the closing seconds of the fourth quarter.

Other top performances from week nine of the prep season:

■ Cecilia tailback Sharen Alexander ran for 185 yards and four touchdowns on 10 carries as the Bulldogs rolled past Crowley. Alexander has scored nine touchdowns in the last two games.

■ Cerencro quarterback Lucas Taylor ran for 152 yards and a touchdown and also added a 68-yard punt return for a touchdown in the Bears' 35-7 win over Sulphur.

■ Iota tailback Shon Kennedy rushed for 141 yards and three touchdowns in the Bulldogs' 21-6 win over Sacred Heart.

■ Notre Dame tailback Rick Zantbrecher ran for 163 yards and three touchdowns in the Pioneers' 35-6 win over Church Point.

■ New Iberia tailback Dwayne Jones rushed for 196 yards and two touchdowns as the Yellow Jackets held off Comeaux 28-21.

■ Central Catholic duo of quarterback David Burch and receiver Jamarr Garrett continued to dominate in 8-1A Friday night. Burch threw for 346 yards and two touchdowns while Garrett caught 14 passes for 221 yards. Both of Burch's touchdowns went to Garrett.

■ Hanson tailback Blaise St. Blanc carried the ball six times for 109 yards and three touchdowns, had a kickoff return for 49 yards and was 6-of-7 on extra points for the Tigers.

■ Westminster tailback Matt Prudhomme ran the ball 14 times for 150 yards and one touchdown in the Crusaders' win over Livonia Friday night.

Can't fight the feeling

**Teurlings Catholic's
Duhon knows all
about district titles.**

LAFAYETTE — Ever since power ratings took the Louisiana prep football scene by storm since 1997, programs have slowly downplayed winning district championships.

But Teurlings Catholic has never been one of those programs. Their attitude is, if we're playing for a trophy, we want to win it.

And last Friday, the Rebels captured their fourth straight district trophy after beating the Erath Bobcats to finish unbeaten in 6-3A.

Senior defensive back Colin Duhon has been a part of all four of those titles and says it hasn't gotten old.

"It feels awesome," Duhon said. "There's a lot of prestige in winning four in a row. Not many people can say they've won a district championship every year of high school."

"To think about where the program was when coach (Sonny) Charpentier took over and where it is now, it's something to be proud of. To know that it's gotten to the point where we know every year we have the ability to win district shows all the work that we've done over the years."

Duhon is one of the leaders on a Rebel defense that has paved the way for their fourth consecutive crown and their No. 4 state ranking in 3A.

"Last year, we had to share the title and we've had that bad taste in our mouth all season," Duhon said. "It was important to us to work hard and win this one hands down. Because no matter how much people try to say it's not important anymore, it's still a championship and we still want to say that we are champions."

The Rebels wrapped up district play last week and will travel to Lake Charles for a non-district affair with Sam Houston. The 4A Broncos are bigger than the Rebels, but Duhon says most teams are.

"There's not many teams we play that aren't bigger than us," Duhon said. "We're a bunch of

little guys, but we work together and we work hard. We know that we can't do it one-on-one, that we're going to need four or five people around the ball. That's our mentality on defense, for everybody to get to the ball."

So far, it's been working, as the Rebels have won eight of nine games. Their lone loss was a week two setback to 4A power Breaux Bridge. In a game the Rebels led at halftime.

Despite their stellar play the Rebels rarely hear their names mentioned when people talk about teams to beat in Class 3A. Notre Dame, Parkview, Benton, Amite, they all come up. But Teurlings Catholic never comes up.

"I think it's because there are a lot of good teams out there and we're just under the radar," Duhon said. "We've had a good year, but we haven't done anything great yet. We're hoping that we can remain under the radar and make some noise in the playoffs."

"Sometimes, it's good to be the underdog. It's good motivation and we always play better when we're motivated."

Some people thought Teurlings would struggle somewhat this year, with a new quarterback under center. Duhon says the seniors were always pretty confident they'd come around.

"You could see it during the first week of practice," Duhon said. "The team loves to play football. Everybody has fun out there. Nobody is afraid to work hard."

"We all stick together. We know it takes 11 players to win the game. It's not just one person people are playing against when the play us."

The four district championships are nice, but Duhon and the Rebels have one more goal they'd like to attain.

"I'm saving room on my letterman's jacket for a state championship patch," Duhon said. "We've been to the quarterfinals three years in a row. Most fans would be happy with going to the quarterfinals every year. But it gets to a point where you can't be satisfied with just getting to the quarters."

"We set our goals higher than that because we know that if we work harder, we can attain them. We'd like to get a step further this year, and hopefully win it all."

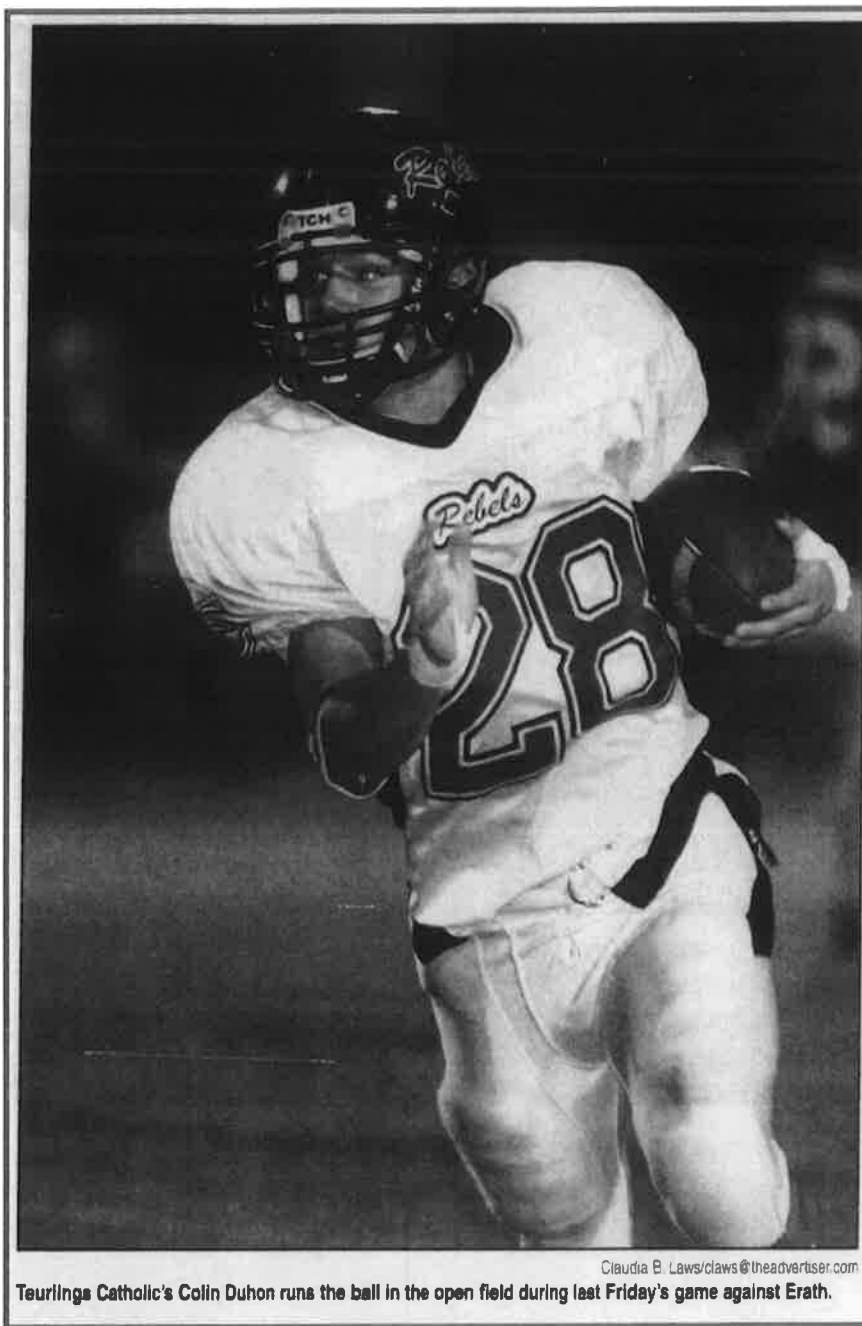

Teurlings opens playoff run in 3A

LAFAYETTE — The third-seeded Teurlings Catholic Rebels will be looking to push their win streak to nine games tonight when coach Sonny Charpentier's squad hosts 30th-seeded St. Bernard in a Class 3A bi-district playoff matchup.

"We're extremely proud of the effort the kids have given us this year," said Charpentier. "They have really worked hard to have the type of season they have had."

After dropping a 20-10 decision to Breaux Bridge in the second week of the season, Teurlings (9-1) has reeled off eight straight wins including a 49-36 victory over 4A Sam Houston in the season finale last week.

Teurlings marched through

District 6-3A competition this year, going 4-0.

Senior quarterback Jett Dueitt (114-198, 1,728 yards, 20 TDs) leads a dangerous Rebel offense.

"We're going to dance with what brought us," Charpentier said of his playoff philosophy. "We're going to throw it around, get it to people that make plays, and hopefully we'll do it better every week."

If Teurlings throws the ball any better than it did last week, then St. Bernard may have a huge problem.

All the Rebels did was pass for 346 yards against Sam Houston. Dueitt connected for five touchdowns in that game, four of them to wide-out Luke Aubrey. Aubrey (49-903, 12 TD) had 10 receptions totaling 182 yards in that game.

"North Vermillion did a good job of taking Luke away,

and he just didn't get the ball thrown his way against Erath," said Charpentier. "He did a good job of staying patient, we did a good job of not trying to force it to him, and he came up big last week."

As happy as Charpentier is with his offense, he has some concerns about the other side of the ball.

"We really haven't played well defensively as a unit since the beginning of the season," he said. "We need to tackle better and get 11 helmets on the football if we expect to go deep into the playoffs."

Teurlings will be squaring off against a St. Bernard team that went 5-5 overall this year, including a 2-4 record in District 11-3A play.

The Eagles, coached by former Lafayette High great Cedric Figaro, won four of five games to start the year, including wins

over 5A teams McMinn (26-21) and Douglass (40-6) and 4A Ben Franklin (16-4). But they stumbled to the finish line, losing four of their last five including their last three.

The player to watch for St. Bernard is running back Shane Williams, who rushed for 110 yards and two touchdowns and returned a kickoff for a score in the Eagles' season finale last week against Belle Chasse.

"They are a dangerous football team," said Charpentier. "They have beaten some quality teams this year, and we'll have to play well to win the game."

The Rebels, who were eliminated in the quarterfinal round last year, are looking to advance further this year, but Charpentier won't have any of that talk.

"The main thing is to stay focused, which this group has done an outstanding job of doing," Charpentier said.

LAFAYETTE — The third-seeded Teurlings Rebels coasted to an easy opening round playoff win Friday night, defeating the 30th-seeded St. Bernard Eagles, 48-0, in a 3A bi-district game.

"We really didn't know what to expect from St. Bernard," said Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier. "We did a good job of jumping on them early, making a few plays, and then staying focused."

Teurlings was able to score first, and they did it quickly, as Jett Dueitt hit Luke Aubrey with a 53-yard pass, then followed with a 14-yard touchdown pass to Jeff Roy, giving the Rebels an early 6-0 lead, only two plays into the contest.

Dueitt was back at it again on the Rebels next drive, hitting Aubrey with a nine-yard score, to give Teurlings a 12-0 lead at the 3:25 mark of the opening quarter.

Teurlings then made it 19-0

at the 8:15 mark of the third quarter, as Dueitt hit Jordan Hebert with a 23-yard strike, capping off an 8-play, 63-yard drive that took 5:29 off of the clock.

IOTA — Welsh's Greyhounds followed Joe Broussard's ground effort to a 21-0 halftime lead, and held off Iota's comeback effort in the second half on the way to a 29-22 win over the host Bulldogs in the Class 2A playoff opening round Friday.

Broussard rushed for 197 yards and had first-half scoring runs of nine and 46 yards, and Marlen Lyons added an 11-yard run as 19th-seeded Welsh (7-4) took the three-touchdown lead.

Iota (5-6) rallied on touchdown runs from Shon Kennedy and Jake Bourque in the third quarter, but Lyons had a clinching six-yard run in the fourth quarter.

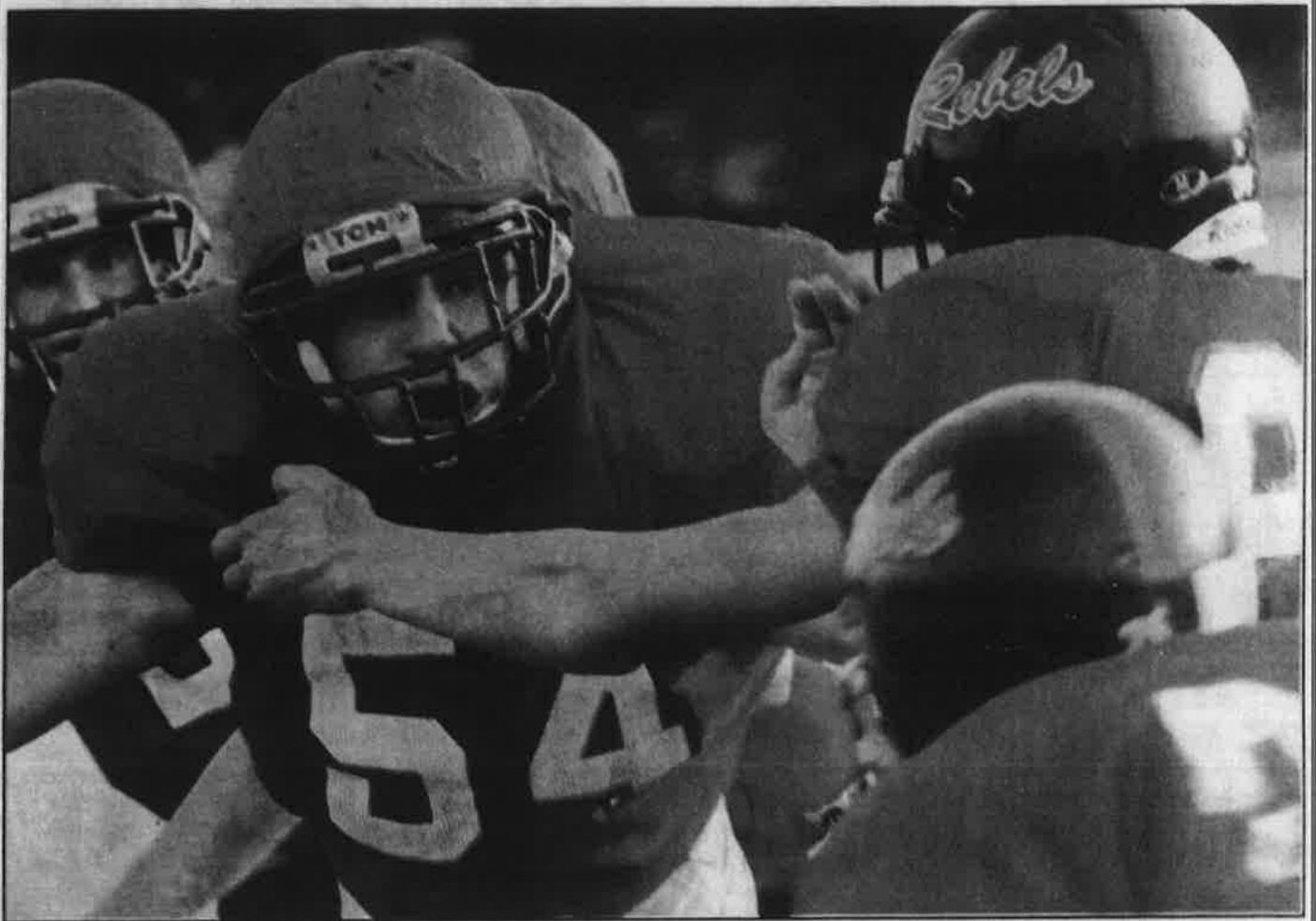

LAFAYETTE — There may not be a playoff game in the state Friday night that matches two hotter quarterbacks.

All Teurlings Catholic's Jett Dueitt has done over the last two weeks is throw for 10 touchdowns and 610 yards for the 10-1 and third-seeded Rebels.

Seven days ago, Erath's Derrick Fourroux accounted for six touchdowns, three of them throwing and three of them running, in a 363-yard individual total offense game.

It makes for a stellar matchup — and a potential shootout — tonight when the District 6-3A rivals lock up in the second round of the 3A playoffs at Clark Field.

District champ Teurlings has scored 48 or more points four times in its last seven games including a 48-0 crushing of St. Bernard in last week's playoff opener. Erath (8-3), despite going 1-3 in league play, is averaging 28 points per game and rolled past Belle Chasse 40-28 in its first playoff game.

The question: How did these teams play a 20-6 game three weeks ago, with the Rebels taking a road win?

"It was more what we didn't do than what they did," said Erath coach Jacob Byler. "We moved the ball against them pretty good, but we got to the one twice and inside the 20 and didn't score. When you put the ball on the ground, they're going to take advantage of that."

"Sometimes we'll bend a lot," said Rebel coach Sonny Charpentier of his defensive unit. "but we haven't broken, even against good physical football teams. Our guys have stepped up and made plays. We played pretty good defense early in the year, and we had to since we only had a couple of starters back on offense."

Dueitt was among the new offensive starters, moving from a slot in the secondary, and has thrown for 1,992 yards and 25 scores in 11 games while completing over 38 percent of his throws.

"Jett's understanding of the game is so much better than it was at the start of the season," Charpentier said. "He brought what he learned in the secondary. He understands coverages, and he's put in a lot of hard work, film study, and a lot of time in the summer with us."

"He really didn't want to come over (on offense). He wanted to stay back there and play football, but it was the best thing for our team. Besides, it isn't a democracy."

Dueitt threw for six scores, hitting 22 of 30 passes, and 346 yards in the season-ending 49-36 win over Sam Houston. He added four more touchdowns and 261 aerial yards last Friday.

Dueitt dazzles defenses through the air. Fourroux, meanwhile, keeps them guessing. He's thrown for 1,661 yards and 17 scores this year, but has also rushed for 832 yards, averaging 7.3 yards per carry, and has 15 ground touchdowns. That's 32 scores accounted for during his fourth year at the position.

"A lot of that is on scrambles," Byler said. "The only designed play we have for him is the option, but he can see so many things. With his experience, he can do things that he wouldn't do two years ago. It's more second nature for

him now, and he's done a great job."

"He's a heck of a quarterback," Charpentier said of Fourroux. "If you like the ball being thrown around and guys making plays, you'll like our game. We did a great job containing him in our first game... we never sacked him, but we did get some pressure. That's what you have to do against a playmaker."

Teurlings hasn't lost since a second-week 20-10 loss to Breau Bridge, and is averaging 39 points per game since October began. The Bobcats aren't scoring as many points, but they are collecting over 360 yards per game despite a three-game loss streak to end the season.

"We were kind of flat after those games," Byler said, "but we told them that the playoffs aren't going to be any tougher than what we've seen in district. Playing in this district helps us, and that showed Friday night."

The positive point in the teams' second meeting of the year is that one 6-3A team is assured of a quarterfinal berth.

"I know both of us would rather play someone else," Byler said, "but you've got to play everybody sooner or later."

"Preparation-wise, it's good for both of us," said Charpentier. "You don't have to make a lot of calls or watch as much tape. At this point, you're not going to make a lot of drastic changes. There'll be some new wrinkles and some subtle changes. We won the first one, but Erath played really well last week."

Bobcats fall short in high-powered game

Teurlings weathered a furious fourth quarter rally by Erath with a late touchdown of its own to take a 42-35 win at Clark Field in Lafayette Friday and eliminate the Bobcats from the state playoffs.

"I can't ask for much more from our kids," said Erath Coach Jacob Byler. "This is what football is all about. We hurt ourselves at times but our whole bunch played super."

In a game dominated by offense, the two teams generated almost 900 yards in total offense with the Rebels registering 507 total yards and the Bobcats 389.

Teurlings set the tone for the rest of the evening early on when the Rebels claimed an Erath fumble on the game's first possession and scored five plays later on a 26 yard touchdown pass from Jeff Dueitt to Luke Aubrey. Kyle Boudreaux tacked on the extra point and Teurlings had a 7-0 lead with 9:17 to go in the opening quarter.

Erath answered when the Bobcats' Ross Bernard picked the pocket of a Teurlings receiver to claim an interception he returned 12 yards for a touchdown. Alan Theall added

the conversion kick to tie the game 7-7 with 5:08 still to play in the first quarter.

Teurlings claimed another Erath fumble at the Bobcat 35 early in the second quarter to set up its next touchdown drive.

Dueitt scored on a keeper five plays later and the Rebels had a 14-7 lead following the extra point.

Erath's Aaron Smith returned the following kickoff to mid-field to set up the Bobcats' next scoring drive.

Facing a third and nine eight plays later from the 12 yard line, Erath quarterback Derrick Fourroux found Bernard with a touchdown pass in the left flat to tie the game 14-14 with Theall's extra point.

The Rebels' Boudreaux kicked a 32 yard field goal later in the quarter to put Teurlings back on top 17-14.

Erath answered with a 10 yard scoring drive keyed by a 21 yard Fourroux gain on fake punt that gave the Bobcats a first down at the Teurlings 36 yard line.

Five plays later Fourroux spotted Ryan Landry in the end zone and the Bobcat senior made a diving catch for a 17 yard touchdown to give Erath its first lead of the evening. Theall added the PAT and Erath took a 21

17 lead into the half.

Teurlings regained the lead in the third quarter courtesy of a 70 yard touch-down pass from Dueitt to Aubrey and a 37 yard Boudreaux field goal that gave the Rebels a 27-21 lead going into the final quarter.

When Teurlings' Jordan Hebert scored on a six yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter and Boudreaux added a two point conversion run off a fake PAT to extend the lead to 35-21, it appeared the Bobcats were

done for the evening. They weren't.

Teurlings recovered an on-sides kick on the following kickoff and then pinned the Bobcats at their own five yard line with a punt.

The Bobcats then mounted a 14 play drive that hit pay dirt when Fourroux found Matt Domingue in traffic in the end zone for a six yard touchdown pass with 5:45 still to play. Theall's extra point pulled Erath within 35-28.

A fired up Bobcat defense,

keyed by an excellent third down break up by Fourroux of a Dueitt pass intended to Aubrey, forced a Teurlings punt on the Rebels' next possession.

Erath had the ball at the Teurlings' 47 yard line following the Rebel punt with just over four minutes to play.

Nine plays later, facing a fourth and four from the Teurlings 15, Fourroux took a short drop, looked left, then broke right and outraced the Rebel defense untouched for the touchdown. Theall's extra point tied the game at 35 all with 2:11 left to play.

Teurlings wouldn't be denied, however, and moved the ball downfield with large chunks of yardage against an exhausted Erath defense.

The Rebels' Colin Duhon smashed over left tackle with 17 seconds left to play and Boudreaux added the extra point to account for the final score of 42-35.

Erath was unable to pull off a miracle comeback in the waning seconds and the Rebels survived to advance to a third round playoff match-up next week with Notre Dame of Crowley.

"We were that close," said Byler. "Our senior class showed great leadership and the whole team had great effort. The sun will still come up tomorrow and our kids will be better young men because of this."

LAFAYETTE — For many programs, reaching the state quarterfinals is a once-in-a-decade experience.

For the Teurlings Catholic Rebels and the Notre Dame Pioneers, it's becoming an annual post-season ritual.

Sonny Charpentier's Rebels have now reached the third round four straight seasons, while Lew Cook's Pioneers have reached this level six consecutive years.

The difference is that Teurlings hasn't gotten to the semifinals since 1999 and Notre Dame has each of the last four seasons.

including two trips to the finals and one state title.

It's that part of the trend the No. 3-seeded Rebels (11-1) hope to reverse when they entertain the No. 6-seeded Pioneers (10-2) in a 7 p.m. Class 3A quarterfinal today at Clark Field.

"Sure we talk about it," Charpentier said. "We talk about it all the time, but I don't believe that it's a mental block. We're proud of that fact that we've made it to the quarterfinals that many years in a row. I think it's more of a motivation for our kids to get past this level than it is a mental block for us. Plus, kids don't think about those kinds of things as much as you think. They just go out and play."

There's another trend at play in this contest. Last year, Notre Dame defeated Teurlings in the regular season in Crowley and then in the quarterfinals in Crowley. Teurlings beat Notre Dame 19-6 in the opener this year in Lafayette and now hopes to complete the sweep in Lafayette.

"I think most people are looking at us as the underdogs in this game," Cook said. "They beat us earlier this year and (Teurlings quarterback) Jett (Dueitt) has been lights out the last couple of weeks. Because of the makeup of our team, we often get overlooked by some when we play good teams, but I think our kids are confident."

Few are expecting this rematch to be as low scoring as the first encounter. Notre Dame actually scored late to narrow the gap to 12-6 in that game and recovered an onside kick, before Rebel star Luke Aubrey picked off a pass and returned it for a touchdown to sew up the win.

"I think both teams and both offenses have improved since that game," Cook said. "We've played two passing teams in the first two rounds, but I think Teurlings' passing game is a little better. Their execution is a better, and the Aubrey kid is really a weapon."

"And they do just a good enough job of running the ball to keep you honest. If you double Aubrey, it'll open some running lanes."

Dueitt (144-249-8, 2,316 yards, 27 TDs) has certainly emerged as one of the state's top passers in his first year as a starting QB, while getting plenty of help from Aubrey (61-1,210, 14 TDs) and Jordan Hebert (32-427, 3 TDs), who is also the team's second-leading rusher with 394 yards and 4 TDs on the ground.

Logan Guilbeau (140-652, 10 TDs) is the Rebels' leading rusher.

Notre Dame's defense yielded 257 passing yards to L.B. Landry two weeks ago and 211 to Iowa last week, and 1,320 for the season.

"The fact that they've been playing passing teams certainly helps in our preparation," Charpentier said. "It allows us to be aware of what they do. They do such a great job of disguising their coverages."

The task is a different one for the Rebels' defense. Notre Dame has two potent rushers in Rick Zaunbrecher (246-1,326, 21 TDs) and Scotty Francis (100-738, 11 TDs), and Teurlings has yielded 2,081 yards on the ground this season. Included in that number are 326 yards to North Vermilion and 285 vs. Sam Houston, two power rushing teams like the Pioneers.

"They've given up some yards, but Erath (42-25 TC win last week) has a very good offense," Cook said. "It could turn into a shootout, but you never know about that

kind of thing."

With this being the seventh meeting (Pios leading 4-2) between the two programs since 1999, familiarity is up and predictability down in this matchup.

And importance is paramount with the winner meeting the St. Charles-Luther winner in the state semifinals — a round the Rebels are overdue in reaching.

we came out and executed, that's the bottom line," Zaunbrecher said. "All of the backs ran well tonight, and our offensive line did a great job of opening holes."

Zaunbrecher entered Friday night's quarterfinal with 1,326 yards and 21 touchdowns on 246 carries. He added 183 yards to his season total on 28 touches in the win over the Rebels.

"Rick is a special kid," Cook said. "He is such a tough, gutty competitor. Rick never stops, and he never quits. The beauty about Rick is that he is as fine a person as he is a football player."

Notre Dame trio tops LSWA Class AAA All-State team

Notre Dame's Lewis Cook edged out Amite's Donald Currier and St. James' Rick Gaille for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association Class AAA Coach of the Year honors on the Class AAA All-State team released Sunday.

Cook earned the honor after guiding his Pios to their second straight championship appearance and finishing the year with a mark of 12-3.

It was Cook's sixth overall Louisiana Superdome appearance and his third as head coach of the Pios.

Joining Cook on the squad are Notre Dame's Rick Zaunbrecher and Matt Baronet.

Zaunbrecher, a 5-10, 180-pound running back, rushed 1,689 yards and 27 touchdowns this year. He was also named to the District 5-AAA squad where he was tabbed as the

MVP.

Zaunbrecher's counterparts in the backfield include Amite's Kendrick Perry and Tyrell Fentoy of St. Charles. Perry was also named the AAA Offensive Most Valuable Player after finishing the year with 1,187 yards and 21 touchdowns on 165 carries.

Baronet is the only other Pio to earn first-team honors. The 6-2, 240-pound senior made the list as an offensive tackle. Baronet is joined on the offensive line by Benton tackle Shandrick Tashy, Parkview guard Matt Rawls, Chalmette guard Tim Barrow and Paterson center Coby Minton.

The two receiver spots are held down by faces familiar to the Pios. Iowa's Immanuel Fiddle and Teurlings' Luke Aubrey both made the first team. Notre Dame knocked off

Fiddle's Yellow Jackets in the quarterfinals before rolling past Aubrey's Rebels in the semifinals.

Erath notched two first teamers on the offensive side of the ball in tight end Matt Domingue and quarterback Derrick Fouroux. Teurlings' Kyle Boudreaux was listed as the place-kicker and Grant's Brandon Newsome made the team as the athlete.

The squad's defensive line includes Franklin's Ronald Demby, Litcher's Juan C. Johnson, Richwood's Boo Robinson and Parkview's Lyle Hitt.

Parkview's Darry Beckwith heads up a linebackers corp that includes Marksville's Isaiah Greenhouse, Landry's Robert Russell and Amite's Brandon Brumfield.

Beckwith's 135 tackles (29

of which were for a loss), five sacks, four forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries earned him the Defensive Most Valuable Player Award.

The defensive backfield features Jennings' Gary Riggs, North Vermillion's Nick Trahan, Franklin's Dominique Sykes, Litcher's Carlos Brown and Carroll's Greg James.

St. Louis' Ross Thevinot made the squad as the punter while Amite's James Burns is listed as the return specialist.

Notre Dame's Todd Gonzales, Stephen Hundley, Lance Meche, Greg Harmon and David Hensgens were all tabbed as honorable mentions as well as Church Point's Cory Williams. District 5AAA also had Cecilia's Shawn Alexander and Northwest's Jasper Edwards named to the honorable mention list.
