Schools await athletic evacuees

As the Lafayette Parish School Board continues to process the nearly 3,000 displaced students into its system, prep coaches around the parish continue to wait for the influx of students wishing to participate in athletics.

The students are not expected to start attending the schools until next Monday, Sept. 12.

The parish's two private schools — St. Thomas More and Teurlings — began pro-

cessing students Tuesday. St. Thomas More welcomed 92 new students and are expecting an additional 60 students to be processed tomorrow.

Teurlings accepted 65 students into classes Tuesday.

St. Thomas More held an orientation Tuesday for the new students, welcoming them to their new school.

"Each administrator got up and went over their area," St. Thomas More athletic director Kim Broussard said. "I just basically welcomed them

and read them the amendment that the LHSAA had passed, letting them know that they were going to be welcomed and immediately eligible if they chose to participate in sports.

"After that, I directed them to whatever sport in which they would be interested. Right now, we are in the process of filling out the forms for the LHSAA and getting a list of all the student-athletes."

Broussard says, despite rumors floating around

the streets, St. Thomas More didn't necessarily load up on athletes.

"The only real high profile kid I've heard about is a swimmer," Broussard said. "He's from Holy Cross and our swimming coach was saying he's got some very good times according to our standards."

"Football-wise, we have two or three new kids. I haven't really seen them practice, but I don't think they're blue-chippers."

But that's always the assumption, I think particularly with us. The

minute the evacuation started, everyone around here said STM will get all the athletes. We may get 15 total and that's all sports."

The public schools are learning more as the week goes on, but as of right now, Lafayette High is set to accept 200 students, Acadiana to accept 111 students, Carencro to accept approximately 50, Northside to accept approximately 100 and Comeaux to accept 180.

All numbers are approximate because

school board officials continue to get new registrants every day.

"I don't know how we are going to handle it," Lafayette football coach Mark Barousse said. "It's something that we started thinking about a little bit. We didn't find out we were getting 200 until today. I don't know where they are going to put them at Lafayette High. We're busting at the seams right now."

Besides the logistical nightmare of fitting all the students,

Barousse says the coaching staffs will be faced with tough decisions regarding playing time.

"It's kind of a catch-22," Barousse said. "You want to see the kids get an opportunity to play but then on the other hand you know that most of them are leaving in January. And you have to think long-term as far as the kids you have right now."

"We are going to try to be as fair as we can to the kids. Our hearts go out to them, it's a great tragedy, especially if they are seniors."

Teurlings Catholic's students also began school on Tuesday, but the athletes had already started practicing on

Monday

"I think we have six kids out," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We mostly got Brother Martin, Rummel and Jesuit kids. The only public school kid we got is a kicker from Fontainebleau."

"We're excited about some of the kids we have out there. They look like they will be a big asset to our team. It's almost like the NFL, getting players off the waiver wire. We have a defensive tackle that is looking good, and a receiver from Brother Martin that looks good. We'll see how they fit into our program and go from there."

Charpentier said the most impressive thing has been the

warm welcome the new students have received, not only in the classroom but the football field.

"It's just tremendous," Charpentier said. "Our kids have done a great job of welcoming them. They've come in with a great attitude, a lot better attitude than I think I would have come in with."

"It's been heart-warming for lack of a better term. Our kids at school and on the football team have taken them in and shown them the way. Even the guys that could possibly cost some kids some playing time, they are helping them out, showing them what needs to be done."

Wary Pios travel to Teurlings

Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook has seen this scenario played out before, and he didn't like the outcome that time.

The Pioneers are coming off a deep playoff run, in which they knocked Teurlings Catholic out of the playoffs. They opened the 2005 season with a huge jamboree win over Carencro.

And now they travel to take on the Teurlings Catholic Rebels at Clark Field tonight for a 7 p.m. contest. The contest is scheduled to be televised live on KLAQ cable channel 17.

It happened the exact same way last year. And the Pioneers left Clark Field as the victim of a 19-6 setback.

"Seems like we went through this same scenario last year," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said. "We did well in the jamboree last year and got spanked the next week. Teurlings shut us down, they

outplayed us.

The same thing could happen this year. Now is where the maturity has to set in. The Carencro game is behind us. Last year is behind us. Now we just have to step it up and move forward. Teurlings is going to play as well as they can play; they always play us well."

Sonris Charpentier and the Rebels are coming off a 22-0 loss to the Acadiana Wreckin' Rams in the jamboree.

"The jamboree is just that, it's a jamboree," Charpentier said. "We don't put a lot of stock in it when we win and we don't put a lot of stock in it when we lose. I thought we played well against Acadiana, considering the matchup."

"We think that it's only going to get tougher this week and that's not a knock on Acadiana. Personally, I think this is Lewis' best football team. I don't see a weakness on tape."

The LSWSA agrees, naming Notre Dame their preseason number one team in Class 3A.

"I haven't heard one mention about the rankings or anything," Cook said. "I haven't heard it at school yet, so for our guys, I think they are well aware that it's Teurlings and those cats are going to get after us. We are going to be in the same shape we were in last year."

But as Charpentier is quick to point out, last year was last year and this year, well, the Rebels are in a little bit of a rebuilding mode. Teurlings returns only four starters from last year's state quarterfinal team.

"It's a different year," Charpentier said. "Obviously, that's something we've talked about on this end. We had this same situation last year, but every year is different."

"We are in a mode right now that we are trying to put people in the right place. We did some juggling this week that will help us make a good football team down the road. But we're still young and we're going to

have to grow a little each week."

The Pios are led by tailback Scotty Francis, who rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns in the 30-7 jamboree win over Carencro.

Teurlings is led by sophomore quarterback Taylor Dugas and sophomore Elliot Hebert.

Dugas went 6 for 9 with 53 yards passing in his jamboree debut while Hebert ran for 15 yards on seven carries against the vaunted Acadiana defense.

"I like (Taylor's) progress," Charpentier said. "He's a lot like what I thought he'd be when we decided to go with him. I think he's only going to get better. The fun part about having young kids is you see them progress. Right now, it's kind of leaps and bounds."

"He's really improving each day and getting a better grasp for what we're doing. He just needs experience. He has a lot of poise, he's played a lot on the baseball field in a lot of pressure situations. He's got a lot of poise for a sophomore."

Teurlings prepares for aggressive BBHS

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels don't get any chance to catch their breath.

After falling to Class 4A's top-ranked Notre Dame in the season opener last week, the Rebels get a treat this week as they travel to take on Class 4A's third-ranked Breaux Bridge Tigers.

Kickoff for the contest at Breaux Bridge is set for 7 p.m.

"It sounds puny, but we like that," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Our kids believe in what we are trying to do. It's about getting better and being ready to play when it really counts at the end."

"You have the short-term effects of an early loss, but I think people get more excited about how you finish the year."

Despite the 40-3 loss to the Pioneers on Friday, the Rebels showed up to practice Monday with a renewed spirit. The fact that the team added six evacuees from New Orleans helped rekindle the excitement.

"It was nice to see," Charpentier said. "The new kids were just so happy to be out on a football field, doing something besides sitting around watching TV. And I think it excited our guys. But we have a spirited bunch. They're resilient; they bounced back well."

Charpentier said the Rebels began preparing for Breaux Bridge on Monday but just can't simulate the Tigers' speed or size.

"We can't do it," Charpentier said. "We can't simulate their speed, size or athleticism, especially when it comes to (John Williams). He made a couple of moves

against Lafayette High that you don't see that every day."

The Tigers are coming off a 27-20 win over the Lafayette Lions, a game in which junior athlete John Williams scored on a 28-yard punt return and an 84-yard touchdown run.

"We just have to try to be aware of where he's at," Charpentier said. "The thing that's so smart is that they put him in a position that he's going to touch the ball every play. That will scare you to death as a defensive coordinator."

"The way you gameplan is you make sure you are going to have to get a lot of guys there to help you. He does things that you just don't teach. He made some moves like a Michael Vick. He doesn't lose a whole lot of speed when he changes direction."

The Rebel offense experienced some growing pains in the opener, as sophomore quarterback Taylor Dugas continued to get a grip on the offense.

"Overall, I wasn't that upset," Charpentier said.

There was a lot of positives that we were able to find. Contrast to two years ago when we went to Notre Dame, we couldn't bring anything positive out of that bad game. The other night, there were some positives that came out of it.

"We're young on offense and when you have a sophomore quarterback, you're going to struggle at times. It's just that these two games are not opponents you can afford to do that against."

Breaux Bridge tops Teurlings, 21-7

Team effort seals 2nd victory

Breaux Bridge — The Tiger defense picked off four Teurlings Catholic passes and limited the visiting Rebels to 135 yards net offense on the way to a 21-7 victory here last Friday.

And Breaux Bridge rolled up 357 yards against the Rebels, using four different running backs, two quarterbacks and a quartet of receivers.

Junior quarterback/defensive back John Williams again carried a big load for the Tigers, rushing for 84 yards and a touchdown, completing 3-of-10 passes for 59 yards, and halting a Teurlings drive with an interception at the BB goal line in the third quarter.

Junior Ryan Broussard shared signal calling duties with Williams, completing 2-of-5 tosses for 26 yards and a TD while booting all three BB extra points.

The win leaves Breaux Bridge perfect in two starts while the Rebels dropped to 0-2.

The Tigers scored on their first possession, using up 7½ minutes on an 81-yard drive. A Williams-to-Draper Demouchet pass that covered 23 yards was the big play while Williams

followed it up with a 22-yard TD run.

Breaux Bridge's first interception came early in the second period with the Rebels threatening at the Tiger 25. Frederick Zenon got the pick and returned it 39 yards to the TC 31. The Tigers appeared headed for another score but Demouchet lost the ball at the eight and Rebel Jordan Miller scooped it up and raced 92 yards for what would prove to be his team's only score.

With the game tied at 7-all, defensive back Treyvian Alexander intercepted a Taylor Dugas pass and the BB offense went to work from its 30.

Todd Paul opened the drive with a 13-yard run, but it took the Tigers seven more plays, including a 4th-and-2 conversion, to move to the Rebel 17. With Broussard at QB, the Tigers went to the air and Logan Guidry grabbed the TD reception. Broussard's kick put BB up 14-7 just a minute before intermission.

The Tiger defense held the Rebels, forcing a punt, but disaster threatened when Demouchet mishandled the kick and Teurlings recovered at the BB 33 with

21 seconds remaining. But three Rebel passes fell incomplete, and the fourth attempt was picked off by Darrell Solomon to end the half.

Teurlings got a drive

going on its first possession of the third period, advancing to the BB 23 before turning the ball over on downs.

Late in the quarter the Rebels went on the attack from their 37 and a 40-yard Dugas-to-Mitchell Pearce pass moved them to the Tiger 25. But two plays later Williams got his interception at the one to kill the drive.

The Breaux Bridge offense then went to work, using just over five minutes and 12 plays to move the

length of the field for the game's final score. Jeremy Calais capped the drive with a five-yard TD midway through the fourth quarter.

The Tigers killed any hopes Teurlings may have had of a late rally, burning more than seven minutes off the clock with a 12-play drive that advanced to the TC three as the game ended.

Calais, a sophomore, led all rushers with 86 yards and a TD on 16 carries, while senior Todd Paul was close behind with 14 totes

for 76 yards.

The Rebels were limited to 41 net yards on the ground while QB Taylor Dugas threw for 95 yards, completing 7-of-24 while giving up the four interceptions.

Breaux Bridge also had a big edge in time of possession, reeling of 65 plays while Teurlings finished with 41.

The Tigers renew their heated rivalry with Cecilia this Friday, traveling to test the 1-1 Bulldogs.

Teurlings Catholic defense leads team past Iota

Although it was humid and rainy and the football field was slippery and muddy, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels were not going to be denied their first victory of the season.

Led by a defense that forced five turnovers, a special teams unit that blocked two punts — returning one of them for a touchdown — and an offense which scored more points than it did in the two previous games

combined, the Rebels walked away with a 21-6 victory over the Iota Bulldogs Friday.

"We needed a win badly," said Rebels quarterback Taylor Dugas. "It finally came together for us tonight."

The Rebels defense held the Bulldogs to 161 yards of total offense, recovered four fumbles and intercepted a pass.

"What more can you ask for from a defense?" Rebels primary

Madison Frederick said. "They came out and did their job tonight."

Fredericks and Dugas did their part offensively as they hooked up twice on the night for touchdowns, a 13-yarder in the first quarter and a 49-yarder on the first play of the fourth quarter.

The first touchdown pass was a middle screen, Dugas said. "We were able to get the defense where so it was the perfect pass. The second touchdown was just a simple fade and Mad-

ison made a good move and took it to the house."

Fredericks, who came to Teurlings from Brother Martin because of the damage caused by Hurricane Katrina, made his debut last week against Notre Dame, but on Friday night made his presence felt, hauling in two passes for 62 yards and two scores.

Last week I only played about four plays," Frederick said. "But tonight was my first start since I've come here and I can't ask for anything better. It

was a blessing to be able to come out and show what I can do and help this team win."

With the victory, Teurlings extended its winning streak against the Bulldogs to five.

Trailing 6-0 in the first quarter, the Rebels defense blocked the first of two punts by the Bulldogs and it was scooped up by Jordan Miller at the BIS 14 and returned for a touchdown to give TCHS an early 7-6 lead. It appeared that Miller was pushed out of bounds at the five yard line, but the referees

apparently didn't see it.

"We knew that he was out of bounds," Bulldog coach Jeremy Wall said.

After the first of many fumbles recovered by the Rebels, they marched 46 yards on 10 plays capped by Madison's first touchdown for a 14-6 advantage going into the second quarter.

"Those two blocked punts were very big," Wall said. "That's my fault for not correcting it, because in the first two games we came close to having punts blocked."

Opposites attract, and that will be the case tonight at Clark Field when the Teurlings Catholic Rebels play host to the Cecilia Bulldogs.

Both teams enter tonight's 7 p.m. contest at 1-2, but that's where the similarities end.

The two teams are headed in opposite directions, as Cecilia opened the season with a win before dropping two straight, and Teurlings did the reverse, going 0-2 before last week's win.

"I think they started the season with a tremendous win against St. Martinville," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "And then they had a bit of a letdown in week two against OC and then lost the tough one to Breaux Bridge Friday night. In those two games, they were outscored 17-13."

"They could easily be 3-0 right now if not for a couple of breaks."

The Rebels shook off consecutive losses to 3A's top-ranked Notre Dame and 4A's second-ranked Breaux Bridge with a 21-6 win over Iota.

"You're always happy with a win, but we didn't see a great deal of improvement," Charpentier said. "I thought we played well defensively but we've played well defensively all year. We're just not finishing off drives, still making too many mistakes."

The Rebels rolled up 266 yards of total offense against Iota but hurt themselves with eight fumbles in the contest.

Sophomore quarterback Taylor Dugas has steadily improved, Charpentier said. Dugas has completed 18 of 46 passes for 247

Sometimes, the football bounces your way and other times it doesn't.

There are many words that could be used to describe how the Cecilia Bulldogs' football felt after their 43-42 triple overtime defeat to the Teurlings Catholic Rebels on Monday night.

But heartbreak may be the most suitable.

"I just did what I was taught and that is to scoop and score," Pearce said after the game.

Cecilia needed a John Batazar interception to force overtime.

"I really felt like we were playing well defensively," Girod said. "I think we just made some dumb mistakes at the wrong times."

On the first play of the second overtime, Dugas and Roy gave the Rebels a 34-20 lead when the duo connected for a 16-yard touchdown pass.

But on the extra point attempt, a host of Bulldogs got into the backfield and deflected the football, sending the kick

wide.

But the officials apparently didn't see or hear the ball get tipped, because they went on to call running into the kicker, giving the Rebels a second chance, which they converted to claim a 35-20 lead.

"I didn't see the ball get tipped," Rebels' head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "And none of the kids told me that the ball had been tipped."

The Bulldogs responded with a 65-yard touchdown run by Journeal to tie the game at 35-35, sending the game into a third overtime.

"I was thinking that we would go for two if we scored," Charpentier said. "We didn't have any gas left."

Bulldogs lose triple OT heartbreaker by 43-42

Lafayette — For the third week in a row the hard luck Cecilia Bulldogs lost a game by less than three points as Teurlings Catholic rallied to a heart-stopping 43-42 victory in triple overtime.

Monday night's game at Clark Field, originally scheduled for last Friday, had been postponed due to Hurricane Rita.
