Late drive lifts Pioneers over TCHS Rebels

CROWLEY — Better late than never, if you're the Notre Dame Pioneers.

Junior running back Joe Dave Petitjean sliced into the end zone standing up with two minutes to play to give the Pioneers a 14-7 victory over Teurlings Catholic on Thursday at Gardiner Memorial Stadium.

The play, which capped a five-play, 51-yard drive, mirrored the end of the first half when the Pioneers drove 80 yards in 20 plays to draw within 7-6 of the visitors at halftime.

"We got run right before the half, so I was saying if we could get another one at the end of the game, maybe we could pull this thing out," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said.

It fell short of the shootout expected, given the offensive talent on both sides, but the close finish wasn't a surprise.

"There were a lot of things taken away on both sides," Cook said, reflecting on numerous penalties and untimely turnovers suffered by the

two rivals. "They would get some nice plays, and get them wiped out, then we would have a nice one wiped out.

"I don't think either team could get into a flow."

"We didn't play well," said a disappointed Sonny Charpentier of TCHS, who lost wide receiver Mitchell Pearce to an apparent broken leg in the first half.

"Our defense kept us in the game, but we didn't take advantage of it. I'm

never surprised anymore. It was a bad game on our part. We didn't execute properly."

Seth Pierret intercepted Notre Dame's Lane Anzalone and returned the theft 23 yards to the Pios' 48-yard line to set up the Rebels' lone score of the night in the first period.

Runs of 10 yards by Taylor Dugas and 13 by Marshall Collins sparked the drive, and Greg McZeal escaped with a catch for 12 yards to the 12. On

third down, Dugas hit Elliott Hebert for a 13-yard touchdown.

Anzalone bounced back to direct the TD drive before half, and scored himself from the three with just 17 seconds to go. A bad snap ruined the extra point try, leaving the Pios behind by one.

Gradually, a revamped Notre Dame defense began to control the game as Derek Melancon and Chris Foreman each halted drives with interceptions in the second half.

"It was a little bit frustrating," linebacker Michael Casanova said. "They kept getting the ball back. But we started to pick it up a notch and

started to get some pressure on the quarterback. We were able to make some plays."

"We have some young guys, and we started playing together," defensive back Phillip Brown said. "They have a lot of speed, so we tried to contain them and not let them get the big plays."

"They made some adjustments at halftime," Cook said of his defense. "They changed a couple of things and got more pressure. If you don't get after him, Taylor can sit back there and make some nice throws."

Petitjean finished with 191 yards rushing on 28 attempts, 133 of those coming in the sec-

ond half as the Pioneers wore down the visitors.

"Joe Dave is tough," Cook said. "It helps a lot that he has the guy he has in front of him (fullback Carson Watson) and that offensive line. Lane had some problems early, but he kept standing in there."

Neither team has much time to breathe. The Pioneers travel to face Redemptorist next week in a rematch of last year's Class 3A title game, while TCHS is on the road at recently-declared 4A champion Breaux Bridge.

"You've just got to practice hard and stay focused," Casanova said. "Go full speed all the time. Don't stop."

Teurlings looks to snap 0-9 skid vs. BBHS

It's getting so old that it almost doesn't bother him any more.

He knows, he knows.

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels are 0-9 against Breaux Bridge during Sonny Charpentier's highly successful tenure.

Now Charpentier is seeing arguably the best Breaux Bridge team ever on film and several of his starters are ailing.

That makes for a tough assignment when 0-1 Teurlings entertains 1-0, No. 2-ranked

Breaux Bridge at 7 p.m. today at Clark Field.

"This is as good a team as I've seen them have," Charpentier said. "They have big-play ability and a lot of experience."

"We kind of joke about it now (0-9 vs. BBHS). To me, it's not really a rivalry, because we never beat them."

Don't take that for a lack of trying or confidence, however, according to senior fullback

Marshall Collins, a Brother Martin transfer.

"We know that if we play our best that we can beat them," Collins said.

"We just need to execute. We didn't as well as we could last week (14-7 loss at Notre Dame)."

The Rebels' cause was made tougher with receiver Mitchell Pearce breaking his leg in last week's loss and fellow starter Ashton LeBlanc fighting a hamstring pull.

"You can't play depressed," Collins said. "We don't look at it that way. We're a family. When one of us go down, the rest of us have to step it up."

The visiting Tigers are coming off a 34-0 thumping of Lafayette High, showing that the distractions of Bastrop being forced to forfeit its state title to Breaux Bridge hasn't derailed the Tigers' focus.

"We haven't let it affect us," BBHS senior tackle Daniel Montet said. "All we're focused on is playing like state champions this year and being state champions this year like we

thought we should have been last year."

As for Teurlings, the long win streak means little to Montet.

"We know about it, but we're not going to be big-headed about it," Montet said. "Teurlings looks stronger and they have more speed."

BBHS coach Mike Mowad knows the Rebels are dangerous.

"They scored first on STM in the jamboree and first on Notre Dame," he said. "They had some penalties and mistakes that hurt them, but they're very capable. And that spread offense has hurt us in the past."

Tigers subdue Rebels

BBHS overcomes early deficit to handle Teurlings.

Senior Ryan Broussard hasn't had much time in the spotlight lining up with some great offensive teammates during his career at Breaux Bridge.

Broussard picked a great time to step out of the shadows igniting the Tiger offense with his passing and running to a come-from-behind 39-24 win over a gritty Teurlings Rebels squad who many had predicted were badly overmatched.

Rebel junior quarterback Taylor Dugas had his moments, as well completing eight of his first 12 passes for 126 yards, including scoring tosses to tailback Elliot Hebert and tight end Andrew Hebert.

The touchdown passes both of 13 yards — sandwiched around a 19-yard Spencer Ortego field goal — had given the Rebels a surprising 17-7 advantage after Tiger senior John Williams had raced 58 yards on the Tigers' first play from scrimmage. Aptly nicknamed "Superman," Williams provided his highlight reel efforts that Breaux Bridge faithful have taken for granted.

"Ryan had a phenomenal game," commented a relieved Tiger boss Mike Mowad. "He threw the ball well and he ran well, plus he gave us a lot of leadership on the field. I am really proud of the way he played. We've been trying to tell John that he doesn't have to rest on defense to play offense. I think he might see it now after Ryan's performance tonight."

The Rebels, who had special team breakdowns in the punting game, gave Breaux Bridge a short field after a 1-yard punt midway through the second period.

Broussard orchestrated a quick 44-yard drive, completing key passes to Williams for 10 yards on a second and 11 to Draper Demouchet for 16 yards to the eight on second and nine.

Trailing 17-33, Broussard just missed completing a miracle late second quarter drive that

would've given the Tigers an improbable halftime advantage.

After Williams intercepted a rare first half misfire by Dugas and returned it to the Tiger 28 yard line with only 1:17 remaining in the half, Broussard ran for 17 yards on a third and 15 and then scampered for 30 more after a 12-yard completion to Williams. The Tigers ran out of time as Broussard's first try into the end zone was overthrown and a swing pass to Demouchet netted only eight yards to the five.

Perhaps the biggest play of the game was the first of the second half when junior tailback Jeremy Calais raced 76 yards to give the Tigers the lead for good.

"Sure that was the turning point," said Rebel boss Sonny

Charpentier. "But it is hard to come up with an excuse for lining up only 16 guys on defense on the first play of the second half. It's hard enough to play a team like Breaux Bridge when you've got all 11 out there. It's impossible with only 16."

That play and the break down on the punt when he snapped the ball to an unprepared punter pretty much took us out of it," Mowad said of the key Calais run.

"We were just lucky. We just happened to have the play called to run right where their missing defensive end was supposed to be."

After the mishandled punt, Broussard connected on a 38-yard scoring strike, again to Williams, and then watched from the sideline as one of the best in the state literally ran over two players, including one of his own blockers during a 65-yard touchdown on a punt return.

"You have to give Teurlings credit," Mowad added. "We've been telling our kids all week not to take them lightly and to get ready to play football. The coaches shouldn't have to preach mental and physical preparedness to a team with 30 seniors."

The win is the 12th consecutive for the Tigers over the Rebels, with Teurlings last win coming in 1996.

Taylor's return helps bolster defense for Teurlings

When the Teurlings Catholic Rebels football team takes the field Friday night in Iota, they'll do so with more experience on the defensive side of the ball with the return of senior safety Brad Taylor.

The 6-0, 180-pound Taylor has missed the Rebels' first two games of the season due to a mild shoulder separation he

suffered against St. Thomas More in the Kiwanis Jamboree.

"Brad got hurt on the second play of the game in the jamboree," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "He probably could have played last week, but we felt we'd give him a little more time."

After participating in practice over the last two weeks, Taylor said he feels fine.

"I'm pumped and ready to go," Taylor said. "The shoulder

feels good. I've gone full contact all week in practice and I feel great."

Although Taylor isn't a starter, he plays a great deal at free and strong safety as well as the Rebels' backup position.

"Brad backs up at all three positions," Charpentier said.

"He doesn't start, but he'll play a lot of snaps."

Besides the return of an experienced body to their secondary, the Rebels also get a pure student of the game.

"Brad is probably our best film study," Charpentier said. "He pays great attention to detail. He is a student of the game. If he wanted to coach, he could be a good one."

According to Taylor, film watching is all apart of the

game.

"I love the game and I love being around it," Taylor said.

"I consider myself to be a student of the game. I like watching film, because I like to know my opponent."

Besides his enjoyment to study film, Charpentier said there is a lot more to love about Taylor.

"He always has a great attitude," Charpentier said. "He has a great work ethic and we

preach those things. He is all eyes and ears when you tell him something. He gives you what I call the wide-eyed look."

With his shoulder problems behind him, Taylor is looking forward to game action.

"I have had only a few reps in practice over the last two weeks," Taylor said. "I need to get into game shape, so I can get up to game speed. Game speed is a lot faster than practice."

Bears, Rebels roll to easy road wins

OCEAN SPRINGS, MS. — One week after enduring a heartbreaking 18-17 loss at West Monroe, the Carencro Bears bounced back in style with a 42-20 victory on the road against Ocean Springs of Mississippi.

The Bears (2-1) used a dominating running attack to route Ocean Springs, gaining 261 yards as a team on 41 carries.

Quarterback Kylell Andrus turned in another stellar performance, completing 11-of-12 passes for 176 yards and three touchdowns, while rushing for 63 yards and another score on eight carries.

Former Lafayette High running back Joby Hills enjoyed his best game as a member of the Bears, carrying the football 14 times for 95 yards, while junior running back Alonzo Landry carried the football seven times for 56 yards including a 17-yard touchdown run.

Receiver/quarterback Ricky Johnson caught four passes for 86 yards and a touchdown, while scoring on a 29-yard run. Jordan Rideau also contributed with 61 yards and one touchdown on five receptions, while Landry also got into the receiving act, hauling in two passes for 29 yards including a 17 yard touchdown.

Tourlings 42, Iota 14

IOTA — When you are 0-2, things don't have to be perfect

when you finally get that first victory.

And for the Tourlings Catholic Rebels they weren't as their defense allowed 318 yards rushing during their 42-14 victory over the Iota Bulldogs.

"Our goal coming in was to get a win and we did," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We didn't play well defensively. We gave up way too many yards on the ground and I didn't see that intensity that I like to see. But the bottom line is when you are 0-2, you just want to go in and get a win and we got it."

Offensively, the Rebels did a good job throwing the football as quarterback Taylor Dugas completed 7-of-13 passes for 149 yards and three touchdowns. Andrew Hebert was on the receiving end of four passes from Dugas for 65 yards and two touchdowns, while Ashton LeBlanc hauled in three passes for 84 yards and a touchdown.

"We did a good job of getting the big plays offensively," Charpentier said. "We had some long runs in the running game and some long throws in the passing game."

In the running game, Elliott Hebert enjoyed a solid game breaking loose for a 70-yard touchdown on route to a 93 yard rushing day on four carries. Greg McZeal contributed with 73 yards on five carries.

"When I was running the football, I just waited for something to open up," Elliott Hebert said. "Our offensive line did a good job. They really stepped up and opened up some good holes for the backs. We did a good job of executing."

Teurlings, Cecilia seek momentum

Comparative scores can drive you to distraction.

Two weeks ago, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels streaked to a 17-7 lead against visiting Breaux Bridge, before the Class 4A power rallied for a 39-24 victory.

Last Friday, the Cecilia Bulldogs went face-to-face with BBHS and came home on the short end of a valiant 14-7 defeat.

What does that mean for Friday's TCHS Cecilia matchup in Cecilia? Nothing, except that both Class 3A programs deserve acclaim despite sharing 1-2 records.

Both reached the LHSAA state playoffs a year ago, and both suffered early exits, so Friday's contest offers the chance to rebuild momentum for another postseason surge.

Coach Terry Martin's Bulldogs refused to quit last Friday, getting a late touchdown run by Michael Broussard to creep within 14-7 of the Tigers, but they could get no closer. Cecilia was limited to 128 total yards by

the spirited Breaux Bridge defense.

"We played well enough

on defense to give our-

selves a chance,"

Martin said. "But,

for three

weeks now, we've killed

ourselves when we have the

ball. We'll make a big play,

then we'll get called for a

penalty. And they've been

legitimate calls.

"I attribute that to

inexperience. It's frustrat-

ing when you play that

well on defense."

Martin praised staff

newcomer Ed Ortego for

building a defense that

keeps foes off balance.

"He's done a lot of dif-

ferent things that, at the

beginning, I didn't think

we could do," Martin said.

"I was skeptical, but he's

been able to teach all that

stuff. And with Joseph

Richard at middle line-

backer, we have someone

who really is like a coach

on the field."

It will take that to tame

Teurlings after coach Son-

ny Charpentier's Rebels

produced numerous big

plays in a 42-14 runaway

Touchdowns covered 64 yards (a Taylor Dugas pass to Ashton LeBlanc), 80 yards (Jacob Olivier's return of a blocked field goal), 70 yards (a run by Elliott Hebert) and 63 yards (Greg McZeal run) and Dugas threw for three scores.

Charpentier said it's tough to tell that his Rebels just got their first victory.

"It's pretty much business as usual," Charpentier said. "We were 0-1, 0-2 against pretty tough competition. We've been pretty even-keel, whether it was Week 1, Week 2 or Week 3. Obviously, it feels a little better when you win."

"They're a typical Teurlings

team," Martin said. "They throw everything at you on offense. The thing that stands out to me this year is that they've really got athletes on offense.

"On defense, they bring everybody and it's hard to get a handle on what they're going to do. They disguise it really well. They take chances, but they're very sound in what they do."

"Cecilia has a good team," Charpentier said. "Any time you hold a team like Breaux Bridge to 14 points, you've done a good job. They have a lot of overall speed, on offense and defense. They give you a lot of different looks on defense, and they're not afraid to use a lot of personnel."

The Rebels, like the Bulldogs, are looking to improve before district play begins.

"We're just trying to get better each game," Charpentier said.

CECILIA — Yes, Teurlings Catholic can run the football, too.

The Rebels, whose offensive success in the first three weeks was confined to the air, turned loose its ground attack on Cecilia's Bulldogs here Friday. TCHS rushed for 221 yards, almost twice its season average, and followed that attack to a 35-23 win over the host Bulldogs.

"They did a good job of running it," said Cecilia coach Terry Martin. "They hadn't been doing that, but you've got to take your hat off to them."

A lot of hat tips went to tailback Marshall Collins, who carried for 135 yards on 15 carries and provided a pair of first-half touchdowns in helping Teurlings (2-2) bolt out to a 21-0 first-half lead.

just over five minutes, an effort that put the Rebels in business at the Bulldog 2. Jacob Olivier scored one play later to turn a five-point lead into the final two-touchdown advantage.

"That felt good," Collins said. "Our offensive line did a great job, and all we had to do was follow their blocks. We came ready to play, and we took what the defense gave us."

Teurlings had success with the zone option all night, and that success opened up the airways for quarterback Taylor Dugas' two touchdown passes to Ashton LeBlanc and Elliott Hebert.

"We just kept chopping wood," said Teurlings coach

Sonny Charpentier. "We had been throwing it well and we figured that teams would start preparing for the pas. When the offensive line plays that well, it makes it easy for the backs and they found a lot of creases on the zone play."

Collins had tallies of one and four yards in the first half sandwiched around Dugas' 32-yard pass to LeBlanc, but Cecilia (1-3) battled back to drive 80 yards in 11 plays and Trent Hebert hit Brooks Babineaux for a 12-yard touchdown four seconds before halftime to cut it to 21-7.

That became an even bigger score when Cecilia won a third-quarter field position battle with a kickoff return and a short Rebel punt, and Kendall Journey capped a 41-yard drive with a cutback 17-yard run that made it 21-14. The 'Dogs then forced a three-and-out, but a fumble one play later set up Dugas' 40-yard strike to Hebert.

Cecilia cut the margin to 28-16 when Collins was tackled in the end zone on a rush attempt from his own one with 10:55 left, and Michael Broussard returned the following free kick 77 yards to set up Journey's second score on a one-yard burst. However, TCHS responded with an 87-yard march that featured Collins' 50-yard dash.

"They made the plays when they had to," Martin said. "We've been having chances every week, and we got a very big score right before the half. I'm proud of the way our kids fought back."

Teurlings has now scored 77 points in its last two outings, but Friday's was its most balanced effort to date.

"Our negative plays were very few," Charpentier said, "and we needed it to be that way. It's always close between these two teams (overtimes in each of the last two years), and I wasn't expecting anything less."

This picture has been a people's choice for years. That has always been the case with the Teurlings Catholic High School Principal, Michael Doney, pointing to an artist's rendering of the master plan for the school's multi-million-dollar renovation project.

The drawing depicts an almost unrecognizable school, complete with new classrooms and a state-of-the-art gymnasium, and its first track and field stadium.

A competitive bid for the more than \$2.4 million project is scheduled for the school's board of trustees next week.

The Teurlings Catholic High School, a member of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Lafayette, is one of the oldest schools in the area. 
A glance at last week leaves the impression that they're positively primed. The Rebels ripped Franklin 52-6 on the road, while the Panthers were 61-0 winners over Vermilion Catholic at home. That's a combined 113-6 over unlucky warmup foes.



Rebels break away

Teurlings holds onto lead after wild first half

NEW IBERIA — Elliot Hebert couldn't remember the last time he scored three touchdowns.

"Never," he said. "Maybe middle school."

But in Friday night's much-anticipated District 6-3A opener at Catholic High, Hebert scored three times in the first half alone to help ignite the Teurlings Catholic Rebels to a 30-20 victory.

The Rebels scored touchdowns on five straight first-half possessions — three on Hebert runs — and outlasted the Panthers to erase bitter memories of last year's 30-10 home loss to CHNI.

"They spanked us last year," quarterback Taylor Dugas said. "But we came back. We just stuck with our normal stuff. The offensive line did a hell of a job blocking for Elliot."

"I couldn't believe some of those holes," Hebert said. "You could drive a truck through them."

The game was everything expected, as the Panthers refused to quit despite a 21-0 deficit and rallied to within 33-20 less than two minutes into the second half.

But the Rebels stuffed the next CHNI march at their 20-yard line and scored the clinching TD on a 3-yard Marshall Collins plunge with 5:49 remaining. They then picked off a pair of Scott Ball

passes to preserve the victory.

"We knew we had to try and score," Dugas said. "That was icing on the cake."

Dugas hit Andrew Hebert for 40 yards to the CHNI 8-yard line to set up Elliot Hebert's first score, and he broke free from a pile of tacklers to make it 14-0 on a 21-

yard burst.

But the touchdown that really stunned the Panthers was a 60-yard breakaway that ran the count to 21-0 with 8:43 left in the half.

Remarkably, the two teams were just getting started.

Teurlings to 4A, STM expected to move to 5A

It appears as though District 5-4A will trade one Catholic school for another in January when the Louisiana High

School Athletic Association holds its reclassification and redistricting meetings.

Based on enrollment figures turned into the LHSAA office, the St. Thomas More Cougars will move up to Class 5A and Teurlings Catholic will replace the Cougars in Class 4A.

Those are the two biggest shakeups involving Acadiana area schools.

"Unless something changes, we'll be 4A and St. Thomas More will move up to 5A,"

Teurlings Catholic principal Mike Boyer said. "I assume we'll just replace STM in District 5-4A, but I'm not sure what will happen with that 5A district."

STM moving up to 5A now leaves District 2-5A in a quandary. The Cougars give the district nine teams, which is something LHSAA commissioner Tommy Henry would like to avoid.

The solution could mean splitting up the Lafayette

Parish schools, sending three to the Lake Charles area to compete with Barbe and Sulphur and sending the other two to New Iberia to compete with Westgate and NISH.

"I like to find a divider, like an interstate," LHSAA commissioner Tommy Henry said.

"But I don't know that there is one in Lafayette Parish. I haven't looked at it in detail yet.

"And I may get feedback from the schools saying they want a nine-team district."

Henry is scheduled to have area district meetings beginning in November. At those meetings, he'll unveil his preliminary districts and make any changes based on feedback.

The districts will be finalized at the LHSAA's annual meeting in January.

Rebels survive Patriots

For the first time since the second game of the season, Teurlings Catholic's football squad faced some adversity.

Thanks to the Rebels' quick-striking offense, the adverse conditions didn't last long, and because of that the Teurlings squad has a solid hold on the District 6-3A race.

Quarterback Taylor Dugas threw for four scores and 321 yards and guided the Rebels to a 49-7 offensive night, but more importantly he ignited a fourth-quarter rally that insured a 49-34 victory over North Vermilion at Clark Field.

Trick plays a big treat for fans

It may be in the form of half back passes, flea flickers, reverses and/or the double pass, but when coaches Jacob Byler and Sonny Charpentier match wits on Friday night, the duo will likely give new meaning to the phrase — trick or treat?

Teurlings Catholic routs Erath

Rebels' Dugas was 13-of-17, scored four TDs

CARENCRO — Taylor Dugas knew the evening had gone well, but even he was surprised when told just how well. The Teurlings Catholic Rebels buried visiting Erath 41-13 on Friday at Carencro High School.

The Acadiana area's passing leader completed his first 10 attempts in the triumph, and 13-of-17 overall for four touchdowns as the Rebels improved to 7-2 overall with their seventh-straight victory.

"Really?" Dugas said, his eyes wide. "I didn't know it was fun. We executed the game plan tonight."

Dugas hit Mitchell Pearce for a 28-yard score, found Ashton LeBlanc from four yards away, clicked with Elliot Hebert on a 17-yard TD and completed his barrage with a 50-yard touchdown strike to Andrew Hebert — all in the first half.

"Everybody plays a role in this offense," Dugas said. "That makes my job a lot easier."

Pearce, one of many TCHS weapons and one of the few seniors in the bunch, is enjoying the ride — especially after breaking his ankle in the season opener against Notre Dame.

"The leg's feeling great," Pearce said. "In this offense, everyone helps everybody out. Teams can't just concentrate

on one of us. They have to worry about the whole offense. Everyone's a threat."

Coach Sonny Charpentier's squad improved to 3-0 in District 6-3A action and can wrap up the title next week in the season finale at Kaplan. **Erath fell to 4-5 and 2-2.**

The Rebels had 381 yards and 18 first downs in the first half alone, when Dugas collected all of his scoring

throws. In the second half, Elliot Hebert scored on a 45-yard run and Greg McZeal tallied a scoring run from 49 yards away.

Erath opened the second half with a 60-yard, 11-play drive to score on a Zachary Fourroux 1-yard run. The Bobcats notched a second touchdown with a 16-play, 80-yard march that culminated with Shane Hebert's 9-yard pass to Gavin Broussard.

But, typical of the evening, it took TCHS just two plays to answer the Bobcats' arduous 60-yard march. Hebert (11 for 102 on the ground) faked out the EHS safety at the 30 and raced in for his 45-yard jaunt. The earlier 17-yard hit to Hebert came

on a fourth-and-eight.

The 50-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Hebert was produced when the receiver bounced into the safety and spun away to score easily. That's how things are going for the Rebels these days as they point toward postseason play.

Charpentier can address six penalties for 60 yards after halftime (108 overall) for improvement, but there seemingly is little else to correct.

"Our defense stepped up real big," Dugas said. "They played really well. We played well as a whole team tonight."

"We get in a groove at this time every year," Pearce said. "This is no different."

Dugas grabs honor

At times last Friday night, it looked like Teurlings Catholic quarterback Taylor Dugas could do whatever he wanted against the Erath Bobcats.

Dugas began the crucial District 6-3A contest with 10 straight completions, with his first miss occurring with 7:51 left in the second quarter, and directed scoring drives on the Rebels' first four possessions.

All four touchdowns were passes, going to four different receivers, as TCHS built a commanding 27-0 lead and cruised to a 41-13 victory.

For the game, Dugas completed 13 of 17 passes for 210 yards and rushed five times for 24 yards. It seemed nearly effortless.

That performance earned Dugas the Daily Advertiser Coca-Cola Player of the Week acclaim on offense, joining defensive selection Jeremy Bertrand of Vermilion Catholic as this week's honorees.

"Taylor started for us as a sophomore, and he took some knocks and was put in some tough situations," coach Sonny Charpentier said. "It was the school of hard knocks. There were times when he didn't know what he

was looking at.

"He made tremendous progress last year. As a quarterback, he has to be confident and learn to trust his eyes the first time he sees it. He's making some great decisions with the football, and most of the time he's putting it in the right place."

Dugas entered growing pains last season, yet found a rhythm near season's end. Then this year he lost senior receiver Mitchell Pearce in the season opener yet kept the attack in gear with other personnel until Pearce returned.

"From the beginning," Charpentier said, "Taylor's maturity was way beyond what you'd expect. He's a very heady player. There are times when I'll signal in a play from the sidelines and get it wrong, and he's able to clean it up."

Dugas threw touchdowns to Pearce, Ashton LeBlanc, Elliot Hebert and Andrew Hebert during his first-half barrage. That's all part of the Rebels' plan.

"We try to be as balanced as possible," Charpentier said. "We want him to have the option of going to one, two or three places. A team make take one away, maybe two, but there are other options. He does a good job of spreading the ball around. And when guys get the ball, they get happy."

With Dugas at the helm, the Rebels have scored 310 points in seven straight victories heading into Friday's season finale at Kaplan.

"Offense is a fickle thing when you throw it around as much as we do," Charpentier said. "This stretch reminds me of the 2003 team, when we got hot from midseason

through the end of the year. This may be an even better stretch."

■ Junior middle line-backer Bertrand was a big reason Vermilion Catholic thrashed Delcambre 37-7 in District 4-A action, as he forced the action every time he stepped on the field.

Bertrand had 14 tackles, forced two fumbles, intercepted two Panther passes and blocked a punt that was recovered for a touchdown.

■ Lafayette High cornerback Brady Tabb, who came through with an interception and recovered a fumble in the end zone as the Mighty Lions defeated Westgate, was also considered on defense. The visitors were held to 138 yards and nine first downs.

■ Also, Linebacker Tim Duhon of Teurlings had eight tackles and a sack against Erath.

■ Notre Dame's Lane Anzalone also starred last week as he led the Pioneers to a 39-7 win over Rayne in District 6-3A. Anzalone hit 11 of 14 passes for 151 yards and three touchdowns.

■ Jordan Landry of Crowley ran 23 times for 132 yards and four touchdowns in the Gents' 35-6 win over Northwest, setting up this week's Notre Dame-Crowley battle for first place in the league.

■ Carencro's Alonzo Landry had 187 yards and two touchdowns rushing on 15 carries, and also caught a TD, in the Bears' 35-7 win at Comeaux.

■ And New Iberia's Vetric Sam had a 62-yard touchdown run and a pair of scoring catches in a 31-29 loss to Barbe.
