Opelousas believes they're ready for Teurlings' offense

Through four weeks this football season, the game plan for the Opelousas Tigers has been the same, use their offense as defense.

In other words, the Tigers want to grind out lengthy dri-ves in an attempt to keep opposing teams offense on the sidelines.

They'll likely attempt the same strategy again at 7 p.m. today when they play host to the Teurlings Catholic Rebels in District 5-4A action at Donald Gardner Stadium.

Ball control isn't a bad strategy for the Tigers (2-2, 0-0), since the Rebels, who are coming off a 51 point outing against Abbeville, possess one

of the most potent offenses in the state averaging slightly more than 36 points a

"There are a lot of keys to us winning this Guillory game," Lanclos said. First of all we have to acore points, We realize that it's going to be hard to stop an offense that is that potent. We're going to have to score points in order to keep our heads up and

our morale up.

TCHS (3-1, 1-0) are led offensively by running backs Elliott Hebert and Andrew Hebert (49-289, 0 TDs). Elliott Hebert has rushed for 415 yards and 10 touchdowns on 59 carries, while also hauling in 12 passes for 199 yards and two touchdowns.

"Teurlings rushing attack is a concern of mine," Lanclos said. Their offensive line is real good, so if we don't stay in our lanes or we're not discipline up front it's possible they can pile up a lot of rushing yards that will open up their

passing game."
When the Rebels aren't running, they are relying on the arm of quarterback Taylor Dugas, who has completed 43 of 73 passes for 540 yards, six touchdowns and one intercep-

"Teurlings is a team that's mistake-free," Guillory said. They are bigger, but not faster.


down as the game progressed largely because they spent so much time on the field as a result of the offense's inability to sustain drives or hang on to the football, turning it over five times in the game

"Our offense and defense played well," Waguespack said. "We just didn't get many





Oddsmakers give The Ville little chance of snapping its losing streak this Friday when they host the red-hot Teurlings Rebels, who have averaged more than 35 points per game in rolling up a 6-1, 4-0 records. Their only loss was a 20-18 squeaker to Notre Dame in the season open-

"Their quarterback (Taylor Dugas) really does a good job of controlling the game and they've got two excellent running backs in the Hebert kids. observes Broussard. They really spread things out when they have the ball and they use an unconventional 3-3 defense and keep their linebackers on the move so it really creates problems for your offensive blocking schemes. They're as explosive as any team we've faced and it's gonna be tough to slow them down."

But the first year coach doesn' feel that his Tigers are as bad as their 0-7 record looks, although he is concerned about warmer weather returning this week. "We've got several kids who have to go both ways and even with last Friday's cool temperatures we got tired towards the end of the game. But we're gonna keep trying."

Rebels explode past SM

Aerial blitz keys 51-26 victory

St. Martinville - The Teurlings Catholic Reb-els scored at will against a reeling St. Martinville defense, putting up 51 points against the Tigers in 2½ quarters of last Friday's District 5-4A game, the first meeting of the two teams.

The Rebels scored on five of their six posseslead 37-7 at intermission and then struck for two long touchdown passes in the third period on their way to the 51-26 victory It was the most points allowed by a St. Martinville team in at least 40 years. St. Martinville went back to a double-wing offense, moving quarterback Gordy Bourque to a slot position and installing ju-nior Jules Tripeaux under center. Bourque rushed for 67 yards on 12 carries while junior Bryson Mallery contributed 44 stripes on 10 totes.

The loss dropped St. Martinville to 0-8 for the season and 0-5 against 5-4A opponents. Teurlings moved into sole posses-sion of first place, improving to 7-1 and 5-0.

The Rebeis took the opening kickoff and needed only seven plays to light up the scoreboard with a one-yard Andrew Hebert TD run.

Elliot Hebert then returned SM's first punt 45 yards to the Tiger 18. After a personal foul penalty against SM Hebert rushed for the nine-yard TD.

"One, they were just glad to be in the playoffs. They actually were hoping to play a team from outside our district and travel a little bit, but now they're looking forward to playing Teurlings again."


