Pioneers hold off Teurlings

crowley—With Notre Dame seemingly in control up 28-14 on Teurlings with 8:23 to go, Pioneers quarterback Brad Stoma fumbled, giving the Rebels the ball at their own 18-yard line.

On the next play, Rebels quarterback Brye Latiolais hit Grant LaGrange for an 82-yard touchdown. The quick strike put Teurlings within one touchdown. Pios coach Lewis Cook said he was in search of something to get momentum back on Notre Dame's side.

"I told my son after that happened that we needed a big play," Cook said. "'J-Mike' busted it for a big gain down the sideline. My son said, 'Like that?"

"J-Mike," or John Michael Besse, picked up 13 yards on a huge third down play to keep the final drive going. Notre Dame closed out a seven-minute drive with a Stoma one-yard touchdown, his fourth of the night. Beese finished with 159 yards rushing and the Pios beat Teurlings 35-21.

"It is kind of what I expected when you go against Teurlings," Cook said. "We have to play the whole games. Offensively, the turnovers really hurt. It made it a tighter football game than it should have been."

Notre Dame's miscuses were the only thing keeping Teurlings in the game. a knack for making those plays when you gotta have it."

With the game 14-7 in the second quarter, Notre Dame snapped the ball over the punter's head and gave Teurlings the ball at the 16. The next play, Latiolais throws an ill-advised pass into the end zone that was picked off by Rankin Bihm.

"When it was 14-7, we had the ball down there and we turn it right back over," Charpentier said. "We got a break. You can't turn it over like that."

"We were fortunate to get out at the half with no points," Cook said. "Their offense is good enough without us helping them. They always give you so many formations and they are always so c That pick in the end zone was huge."

The Pios have two more nondistrict games before they get ready for a tough district schedule. Cook said the district looks to be well-balanced.

"Kaplan is looking pretty impressive so far," Cook said, "and that is our Week 10 matchup. We always see everybody's best game. We can't afford any letdowns. If we do, we are going to find ourselves in some trouble."

sion, Cook watched the snap sail over the head of punter Dustin Reiners and hand Teurtings a gift at the Pios 16 yard line. Rebels quarterback Brye Latiolais went for the score on first down with a fade route into the end zone, but Pios cornerback Rankin Bihm leaped high and with one hand intercepted the pass.

"That interception after we had turned it overwas probably the play of the game for us. They could have tied it there and things could have been a lot different, but Rankin made a big play for us."

John Michal Besse got the offense rolling with runs of 5 and 8 yards. Brad Stoma kept around the edge for 21 yards and Lance Bertrand powered for 13 and 7 yards. From the Teurlings 12, Stoma connected with Besse on a pass in the flats and the junior sidestepped one defender and ran over another at the goal line to make it 21-7.

The Rebels pieced together a half ending drive penalties on three straight plays Tackles Conner Kirsch and Curt Pettitjean teamed for a QB sack to put the Rebels in a long vardage situation: Kirsch had nine tackles including three sacks in the game, Nate Link added a sack on the possession and finished the night with tackles and 2 sacks with 2 QB hurries. Gavin Bourgeois slapped away a fourth and one pass to preserve the halftime lead.

"That was a gutsy stand by our defense," said Coach Cook, "They were getting the ball to start the second half and would have had a chance to tie it to start the third quarter."

Instead, Rebels coach Sonny Charpeutier elected to fake punt at the Teurlings 37. The Pios were not fooled and Sam Veillon dropped the ball carrier for a 12 yard loss.

After runs by Besse and Jeff Daigle neted a first a goal, Brad Stoma optioned right and went in untouched from 10 yards for his third TD of the night. Dustin Reiners added another of his live extra points for a 28-7 lead.

"Brad is doing a great job of managing the game," added Cook, "He is not selfish. He takes it when he has to and he gives it off when it's there. He made some nice throws when we asked him to and

The Pios appeared on the verge of a clinching score, driving 67 yards with four minutes left in the third quarter. Stoma scrambled 17 yards inside the Teurlings twenty and had the ball stripped.

"Brad was trying to get that extra yard," explained Cook, "He's trying to go one way and the defense is pulling another direction. You have to learn to just go down. The same thing happened with Besse. He was stretching for that extra yard and they put a helmet on the ball to knock it out,"

Teurlings responded by putting a touchdown on the board. QB Latiolais caught the Plos in man coverage with the safeties up and connected with Grant Lagrange for an 81 yard TD pass on a post pattern into an open secondary for a 28-21 Pios lead

With 8:23 to play, the Pios went to work from the 20 following a kick-off touchback, John Michael Besse started things off by breaking loose for 34 yards down the Notre Dame sideline,

"I told Coach Lew we needed a big play after the kickoff," laughed coach Cook, "Besse popped it out of there with a nice run and on the headset I hear Lew say like that, and I said yea, just like that."

fourth down and four, Stoma gained nine yards, Four plays after that, Stoma kept for just enough on fourth and three for a first down at the Teurlings ten.

"Early in the game we were optioning, but toward the end it was designed for me to keep and run the ball," explained Stoma, "We ran a lot of play action and our backs did a great job of acting like they had the ball and fooling the defense, I can't say enough about our offensive line. They controlled the front all night."

When he did hand off,

Stoma mixed it up with Besse, Bertrand and Shea Zaunbracher. Those four had the only hands to touch the ball on a third 80 yard drive that lasted over seven minutes with 15 snaps, Stoma capped the scoring with a one yard sneak on fourth down.

"I'm real proud of the way our kids handled that last drive," added Cook. "They get within a score and we don't panic. We just come right back down the field."

The Pios defense sealed the deal with 24 seconds remaining. Hunter Stelly, who led the defense with 10 tackles, forced a fumble after a Teurlings completion into Pios territory.

"That was pretty heads up on his part and a heck of a play," Cook added. "He went for the interception and the pass went over him. He never gave up on it, came back around and punched it out of the receiver to force the tumover. I like the direction we are headed."

The Pios head to Lake Charles next week to take on St. Louis. The game will be played at the La-Grange High Stadium.

Penalties costly in **BB** loss to Teurlings

Holding calls void 2 Tiger TDs

Lafayette - Breaux Bridge has already suffered two narrow defeats this season and last Friday's 21-14 loss to District 5-4A rival Teurlings Catholic was another tough one to swallow.

With the score knotted at 14-all early in the fourth quarter the Tigers had not one, but two touchdowns nullified by holding penalties and five minutes later the Rebels scored the go-ahead TD to clinch the victory.

With the loss, Breaux Bridge slipped to 2-3 overall and 1-1 in district play while Teurlings improved to 3-2 and 2-0.

The Rebels drew first blood, going 58 yards in just three plays to score. Quarterback Brye Latiolais connected with Zach Lafleur for a 55yard pickup to the BB 2 and Lafleur took it in for the TD just 41/2 minutes into the game.

Teurlings stretched its lead to 14-0 two plays into the second quarter when Latiolais capped a 75-vard drive with a 17yard TD strike to Grant LaGrange. Latiolais sparked the possession with a 28-yard completion to Sage LeBlanc on a 3rd-and-12 situation.

But Breaux Bridge finally got its offense cranking and put together a 72-yard drive that drained almost 7 minutes off the clock. Marquis Demonter, who led the Tigers with 59 yards on 16 carries, punched it in from 1 yard out with 2:46 left in the half.



runs, trap runs.

"They really test you everywhere on defense. They have a lot of quickness. They don't have a whole lot of size, but they are really quick. They are tough kids and gives you a lot to have to prepare for."


Like in most games, both the Cougars and the Rebels agree the winner of this game will be determined by who wins the turnover battle.

Cougars prevail

STM claims crucial road win over Teurlings

Rivalry games often come down to one play, or one player, to determine a winner.

Friday's St. Thomas More-Teurlings Catholic battle had both, and thanks to STM's Kendall Johnson, the Cougars remained unbeaten on the season and took a major step toward the District 5-4A title. Johnson scored the game's first and last touchdowns, the second one on a stunning gamebreaker with 4:55 left, as the Cougars posted a 21-7 victory over the host Rebels for their fourth straight win in the series between the squads.

The Cougars (7-0, 3-0) held a tenuous 14-7 lead with just over five minutes and had dodged a major bullet less than 10 minutes earlier when the Rebels

lost a fumble at the STM goal line. The Cougars were also facing a long-yardage situation after a first-down penalty.

That's when Johnson took a bubble screen pass from William Bellamy just past the line of scrimmage, and raced up the middle 82 untouched yards to give STM all the breathing room it needed.

"We'd been trying to break a big play, and the offensive line blocked it perfectly," said Johnson of the biggest of his four catches for 181 yards. "Tiger Bech had a great block on the outside linebacker, and all I had to do was catch the ball and run. It just opened up."

Johnson had scored on a 30yard reverse on the Cougars' third play from scrimmage, and in between those scores the game had the look of most of the previous meetings between the clubs.

"They're really good offensively," said STM coach Jim Hightower of the Rebels. "Their backs run hard, they spread you out and run at you, and they do a good job of mak-

short SM punt, Teurlings went 52 yards in 9 plays for the game's third TD, a 3-yard keeper by QB Brye Latiolais midway through the period.

The Tigers finally got on the board a couple of minutes later when Mitchell found an open Jamail Ledet for a 47yard TD strike.

But it took the Rebels less than a minute to answer, after a short kickoff put Teurlings in business at its 43. Three plays later Cole Kelley hit Jake Gremillion with a 17-yard TD pass to stretch the Rebel lead to 28-7 at the 3:14 mark.

The Tigers roared back with 18-yard runs by Malik Anthony and Ledet followed by a 16-yard ramble by Mitchell for a first down at the Rebel 9. But on 4thand-goal from the 2 and no time on the clock Jordan Papillion was stopped at the 1 by the stout Rebel

St. Martinville had first possession in the second half and opened with a 16-yard gain by Ledet. But then Mitchell's deflected pass was intercepted by Batiste for a Rebel touchdown that made the score 35-7.

The Tigers wouldn't quit, however, and put together a 9-play, 80-yard drive highlighted by a 34yard Mitchell-to-Devante Simon pass. Mitchell finished it off with a 2-yard keeper with 8:29 to play in the 3rd period.

The Rebels were able to run out the remaining 2 minutes and preserve their 35-28 homecoming victory.

With Anthony slowed by a sore ankle, Ledet shouldered more of the load and finished with 116 yards on 24 carries along with three pass receptions for 64 yards and a touch-
