Rebels hoping more big plays will produce more victories

SCOUTING REPORT

Strengths

Before getting to actual personnel matters, the transition season of Dane Charpentier taking over as head coach for his father Sonny is now behind them, so the new Rebels head coach and his staff can work more routinely this fall.

There are certainly several areas of strength for Charpentier to build upon in his second season at the helm. For starters, there's the offensive line. Few things help an offensive play-caller like a steady and potentially dominant offensive line. Led by LSU commitment Thomas Perry, this year's offensive line will miss the ruthlessness of Justin Mathews at tackle, but he's being replaced by a talented performer in Ethan Balfa.

There's also a deep group of capable running backs for that line to block. Landon Trosclair paces that group, but it also includes a versatile reserve in Ethan Trahan, who is expected to help Teurlings as a runner, receiver, special teamer and even potentially a cover guy as the season rolls on.

Defensively, the line will be an-chored by two standout seniors in Ka-

meron Caillier and heavyweight wres-tling champion Myles Santiago.

Question Marks

Like any teams, though, the Rebels have their fair share of questions. For many teams, that list typically starts with a first-year quarterback. Junior Sammy LeBlanc is a 6-foot, 170-pound, baby-faced quarterback that Charpen-tier describes as "extremely competi-tive," Don't expect Teurlings to run its quarterback as much with LeBlanc's skill set, but the staff is counting on more big plays down the field with judging the early chemistry with his receiv-

ing corps.

The offense lost a deep tight end

The Bottom Line group. Dain Turner takes over as a senior starter, while a whole new group of receivers takes over, hoping to make up for a lack of starts with big-play poten-

Defensively, there will be three new linebackers. There's also an interesting new face at safety with State MVP baseball player Peyton LeJeune deciding to play football his senior season.

Analyzing the 2018 Rebels in early August is a complicated process. Teurlings only returns three starters on of-fense and three on defense. The Rebels will have a new quarterback, a new leading receiver and a new leading tackler. They will also play another bru-tal pre-district schedule with Catholic High of Baton Rouge, Rummel and No-tre Dame after opening with Breaux

And yet, there are reasons to believe the offense will be more explosive and the defense improved, especially if that unit can somehow be healthier than it was last fall.

It's 2018, but being best in the trenches is a great place to start.

Teurlings cripples Tigers' offense for win

Year two of the Dane Charpentier era is off to a flying start at Teurlings, as the Rebels downed the Breaux Bridge Tigers in Friday's season opener, cruising to a 30-7 home victory.

Still, when the Rebels look back at

Still, when the Rebels look back at the film, they will see missed opportunities that could have, and should have, resulted in more points.

Teurlings took an early 3-0 lead thanks to a 25-yard field goal from junior kicker Ian Judice with 8:20 to play in the first frame.

Only points of the night

Breaux Bridge immediately answered with what ended up being the Tigers' only points of the night. Breaux Bridge's talented wide receiver Dartravien Girod took an end-around hand-off and scampered around the right side for a 26-yard score set up by a 57-yard Keegan Cormier reception.

But after that, the Breaux Bridge offense simply was not able to get any rhythm for the remainder of the night. The Tigers inability to generate much movement on the offensive side of the ball meant the Breaux Bridge defense spent much of the humid August evening on the field, ultimately proving to be the difference in the contest. Teurlings outscored Breaux Bridge 27-0 for the remainder of the contest.

Here are few takeaway's from Friday's season opener.

Special teams weapon

Ian Judice — remember the name. The Teurlings kicker is a weapon the Rebels will rely on in 2018. Judice was 3-for-3 on field goals Friday evening, knocking home placements from 25, 36 and 33 yards.

"I think he's a Division I kicker," coach Charpentier said. "He was a big difference in the game, because offensively we were unable to finish way too many drives and he finished them for

In addition to his field goal duty, five of Juice's six kickoff's went for touchbacks, keeping the ball out of dangerous Tiger return man Dartravien Girod's hands.

More clock, please

The Teurlings offense did a masterful job of staying on the field and driving the football forward. The Rebels used a combination of short to intermediate passes and balanced runs to keep the Tiger defense off balance for much of the night.

The Rebels put five drives of eight or more plays together, including a 72-yard, 14-play drive and a 12-play, 44-yard drive.

Find a way to finish

Credit the Breaux Bridge defense for turning offense away when the Tigers were backed up against a wall, but if Teurlings is going to have a successful season the Rebel offense must finish its drives Of the 14-play and 12-play drives mentioned, TCHS came away with only three points.

Teurlings will not be able to trade field goals for touchdowns with the likes of Notre Dame, Rummel, Catholic High-BR and STM, all of whom the Rebels will see at some point in the 2018 season.

Who can step up?

Just about every team Breaux Bridge will face is going to make it a point to try and take Girod out of the game. Girod constantly faced double coverage from the Rebel defense on Friday.

Although the Tigers did a good job of getting Girod touches early, the Breaux Bridge offense found it harder and harder to get the ball in his hands as the game progressed.

For Breaux Bridge to have a successful 2018, the Tigers will need help from others on offense.

Running back Kavion Martin had a nice showing, but it will take more than just one other offensive weapon for teams to stop focusing on Girod.

The plan was for his Teurlings Catholic offense to feature more big plays this season

So far, so good ... sort of.

In the 30-7 rout of Breaux Bridge, coach Dane Charpentier's first-year starting quarterback Sammy LeBlanc enjoyed a nice regular-season debut with 256 years passing.

And first-year starting wide receiver Christian Mouton provided the boost Charpentier was hoping for with seven receptions for 148 yards.

The only hiccup is Mouton suffered a leg injury late in the win and his return is questionable.

"He (Mouton) looked great," Charpentier said. "He looked like the fastest guy on the field. Everything we thought he could do, he did."

So did LeBlanc, who hit on 20 of 30 passes.

"Once Sammy got into the flow of the game, he played well," Charpentier said. "He made a couple of difficult throws and completed them. Sammy looked a lot more comfortable, a lot more poised.

"He just got into a good rhythm and he didn't miss. He did have 10 incompletions, but a couple of them were drops and a couple were throwaways."

If the injury news doesn't go well, Caleb Whittington and Charlie Spence could get more targets and the Rebels have several options at tight end as well as they prepare for a road trip at La-Grange on Friday.

Teurlings pounds LaGrange, now 2-0

LAKE CHARLES — Teurlings Catholic head coach Dane Charpentier said he wanted more big plays from his offense this year.

Last week, Christian Mouton gave them plenty on his way to more than 150 receiving yards.

But an injury is limiting him in the next couple games.

So, with no Mouton, the Rebels took a bit of an un-Charpentier approach in Friday night's 29-12 win over the La-Grange Gators.

The Rebels went ground-and-pound and defense. Three yards and a cloud of dust. Limit the big plays.

The Teurlings defense stepped up for the second week in a row. It limited a potentially explosive LaGrange to only seven first downs and made big stops when it mattered.

After LaGrange completed a 59-yard pass in the first quarter to get into the Teurlings red-zone, the Rebels responded in this way: 15-yard sack, six-yard loss, incomplete pass, forced punt.

"That was a big swing, to get out of that situation and get a stop," Charpentier said.

Teurlings put a big emphasis on cor-

ralling LaGrange sophomore quarter-back Quintorous Jones.

Mission accomplished. Jones had 109 yards passing but a whopping minus-43 on the ground thanks to a pair of big losses on sacks.

"He likes to get loose, even on pass plays," Charpentier said. "We did a good job staying in pass coverage for the most part. They got some big plays, but against athletes like this it's sometimes unavoidable."

Still, you gotta score points, and Teurlings did so in an out-of-the-ordinary manner.

The longest pass completed was only 21 yards, and the Rebels passed a miniscule-by-their-standards 18 times, completing 10 for 115 yards Friday night. Comparing that to their 54 rushing attempts and 240 rushing yards, the approach was simple enough.

"We still have that speed on the outside to get those big plays," Charpentier said. "We just have to execute better and get those assignments done."

Still, at the moment it looks like Teurlings, at least temporarily, is turning over a new leaf.

A 3-to-1 run-pass ratio isn't classic Charpentier by any means. But maybe playing ahead isn't such a bad place to be at the moment with a trip to Notre Dame coming up this week.

stride it out. He's not a typical 330-pound high school kid, for sure." Increasingly, however, college pro-grams are looking for edge linemen

that possess Perry's frame and agility to match the athleticism of the pass

to match the athleticism of the pass rushers they have to block.
"For (pass blocking), I'm pretty god," Perry said. "Like even the fastest guys, I'm able to do my steps and still stay with them and get in front of them. Even though they 're trying to speed rush outside, I'm still able to use my feet and stay with him and still be able to not let them get to the quarterback."

But there was a time when Perry, the son of former LSU offensive guard Adam Perry, planned on playing de-fensive line on the varsity level. In fact, he went to an LSU camp as a defensive end his eighth-grade year, where he was coached by now LSU head coach Ed Orgeron

As a youngster, he played on both sides of the line. His dad, now an orthopedic surgeon and Teurlings' team doctor, was even his offensive line coach in middle school. But when he showed up at Teurlings as an eighth-

grader, the only other position he played, aside from defensive end, was tight end.

"Eighth-grade year I played tight end just because I was taller and I was pretty athletic for my size and I was able to catch," Perry said. "So they would just put me out on a route and I would just catch over someone.

"Actually, I came to Teurlings to play defensive line, but then mid-year, they wanted me to switch over because we didn't really have anybody on the offensive line. I went to camps for offensive line, and then I just started playing there more."

Does he miss catching passes?

"I mean, yeah," Perry joked. "I sort of wish coach would put in some plays like that. But I mean, it's all right."

Perry didn't need to learn another position once he found a home at offensive tackle, the position he was seemingly meant to play. His technique is so good that, at previous LSU camps, he's been asked to demonstrate how to perform a drill for the other campers.

He's started at Teurlings since he was a sophomore and earned All-Acadiana and All-State honors last year.

"From looking at the tape, he took the biggest jump between his sophomore and junior year," Charpentier said. "He started to get a little mean streak about him. It takes those big guys a little while to realize how big they are. He's starting to really mature. From the first time I met him as a rising junior until now, I think he's gotten better the whole time.

"I think the scary part is that he still can get a lot better. Athletically, how gifted he is and how big he is, really, the sky's the limit for him in football. He's got all the tools, and I think he can still get a lot better."

Even Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook, who will lead his team into a matchup

against Perry and the Rebels on Friday at Teurlings, is impressed by Perry's development.

Pios provide vintage game-sealing drive

Lewis Cook has been coaching high school football for 33 years, 21 of which at Notre Dame, and it seems like he remembers everything in his career in such clear detail.

Maybe that's part of the reason why he's Louisiana Sports Hall of Famer.

So when the Notre Dame radio crew referenced something from the past during the fourth quarter of the Pioneers' 28-14 victory against Teurlings Catholic, their fourth straight victory against the rival Rebels, I knew I needed to ask Cook.

He would remember. He always remembers.

You see, Notre Dame had just burned seven minutes and 18 seconds off the clock to go up by two scores. The Pios covered 66 yards in 13 plays, all runs. The last of which was a two-yard touchdown run by Noah Bourgeois, his second score of the night.

Only one run in the 13-play series, a 19yard gain by Bourgeois to the Teurlings 20, went for more than 10 yards.

It all felt so vintage Notre Dame. This is what Cook's teams do. They methodically wear down opponents with ruthless efficiency, especially with the game on the line.

"It was a big relief," Bourgeois said of the seven-minute drive. "We wore them out. They gave up at the end. It felt good to wear them out."

The drive Friday night reminded the

Pios' radio color commentator of a gamesealing drive in one of Notre Dame's state championship victories under Cook, the 2009 title against Parkview Baptist. I haven't been covering high school sports in the Acadiana area long enough to know the difference, so I mistakenly thought he was referring to the Pios' 2015 championship against Riverside.

"It was in '09 actually," Cook corrected me. "(Former LSU Tiger) Brad Wing was (Parkview's) punter. He ticked the pylon. We got it on the 20, and there was 6:15 to go in the game. And we knelt on the ball and won 14-7. We ate up the six minutes. ... A lot of 4-yard runs."

Sure, it is one of his four state championship wins, three of which at Notre Dame, so maybe he remembers details of those games better. But trust me, the man's memory is remarkable.

But backbreaking drives like the one against Parkview almost a decade ago and the one Friday against Teurlings are part Cook's recipe for success, the secret sauce that's led to almost 350 wins (347 after Friday's victory).

It's those kind of drives that have helped the Pios win 37 straight regular games, which is the same number of contests Cook has lost in the 21 years he's been at Notre Dame.

"That's us," Cook said of those methodical drives late in games. "Sometimes it happens, sometimes it doesn't. But I had just told 'Lew' (Lewis Cook III), 'Boy, if we could take one of those long drives right now and knock some of that clock out, whether we score or not.' ... It

was a beautiful drive. That's what we wanted to try to do, and the kids did a good job executing that."

And perhaps the most amazing thing about it is that it was a reminder of who the Pios are even when, at least offensively, they didn't look like themselves at times.

Notre Dame's defense help up its end of the bargain, intercepting a pair of passes, one of which led to a touchdown.

"We had to stop the run first with their big o-line," said senior Jacob Dore. "Once they became one-dimensional, we felt like we had an advantage."

But the offense committed four turnovers and had uncharacteristic penalties in the red zone. Teurlings often played with five defensive linemen and seemingly dared Notre Dame to throw it. With a mobile quarterback like Ben Broussard and stable of talented tailbacks, including Bourgeois and CJ Thibodeaux, the ground game is the Pios' clear strength.

"It was a major grind," Cook said. "They were moving around a lot defensively, giving a lot of different look, flying to the football. I thought they did a great job.

"We finally started finding some things that got them in some positions where we felt we knew where they might be for a change. Then we were able to design a few things and make a few calls that would give us a chance."

"The last drive was just will. I told the kids all week it was going to be a battle of wills. Our kids just kept reaching down and kept finding a way to get it done."

Buller, Rebs defense show promise

Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier isn't inclined to sugarcoat a loss. In fact, his defense's impressive performance in a 28-14 loss to Notre Dame last week makes coming up short even more dissatisfying to him.

"I just wish we could enjoy how well they're playing being 3-0 instead 2-1," Charpentier said. "But (we've) got to move forward."

The Rebels forced four turnovers against Notre Dame, including a pair of interceptions by Tate Buller, and held the Pios to a 4-of-10 clip on third down. Notre Dame also benefited from strong field position on two of its four scoring drives, needing to go only 38 on its first touchdowns and 27 yards on its third. On top of that, the Pios possessed the ball 12 minutes longer than Teurlings did, thanks to a seven-minute, game-sealing drive in the fourth quarter.

"(Notre Dame) Coach (Lewis) Cook is always really good at adding some wrinkles into the offense," Charpentier said. "But they're going to run what they've been running, and it's really good every year. So they're going to stick to it.

"I just thought our guys did a really good job of preparing to try to stop their base plays. Then after they did the mental work, I thought they just went out and played extremely hard and competed extremely hard. Unfortunately, we weren't able to get the W, but I did tell the defense how proud I was of how they played and things like that."

Missed opportunities derail Teurlings

Teurlings held a 7-6 lead at halftime against Catholic High of Baton Rouge.

It's a score that surprised most people paying attention to high school football Friday night. The eventual 34-14 Catholic win wasn't as surprising, but being up at halftime had Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier feeling optimistic.

"I felt pretty good at halftime," he said, "but for some reason in these games, we have that feeling on our sideline like we are waiting for it to go wrong instead of going out there and making it go right. When you have that attitude, it is usually self-fulfilling.

The prophecy fulfilled began with a long 51-yard interception return from Catholic's Elijah Reames down to the Teurlings five-yard line, which led to a score. The Rebels had a plethora of key dropped passes, including two that looked like sure-fire touchdowns.

The dagger came on another Bears interception — a 44-yard pick 6 that was tipped in the air and returned by Catholic's Tywon McDowell. Charpentier

credited the Rebels for making a lot of good plays, but not enough when it mat-

'We went up and down the field all night," Charpentier said, "but we only had seven points to show for it. You aren't going to beat a team of that caliber with the amount of missed opportunities we had tonight.
"No one kid is to blame. It's a total

team effort. Defense played well enough

for us to win this football game, but when you can't answer scores, it is going to snowball on you pretty quick against a good team.'

Teurlings had its chances — a muffed Catholic punt setting them up with great field position and a great interception from Peyton LeJeune. The Rebels could never put enough pressure on the Bears in the second half to have a chance to win.

"I thought we played as well as we could defensively," Charpentier said. "We just weren't able to put any game pressure on them offensively. You've got to keep scoring and answering when they do. We had a lot of missed opportunities on offense.

"It sounds like a broken record every week. At some point, playmakers have to emerge. Tonight, we never were able to make plays when they counted. The kids played with a lot of effort like they always do, we just have to get better. We have to be a more confident team and be able to make plays in critical situations."

Teurlings now turns its focus to the district schedule, with Rayne on the schedule next and St. Thomas More looming in two weeks. Charpentier said the tough out-of-district schedule should have the Rebels ready for district.

"We try to break the season down into three seasons: regular season, district and postseason," he said.

We have to switch modes into district ball and hopefully our regular season schedule has served us well and prepared us to go and compete in a tough district. We just have to make plays. We have to make plays at critical times in a ballgame in order to be victorious."

Teurlings not satisfied after rout of Rayne

With Teurlings heading into a clash with St. Thomas More next Friday, a 40-14 blowout of Rayne was probably just what Rebels coach Dane Charpentier was looking for.

However, in typical Charpentier fashion, he wasn't overly pleased with his team's performance in the 26-point victory Friday night. Penalties and mistakes — including three first-half interceptions — left Charpentier yearning to get back to practice and fix the issues.

Seeking better efficiency

"We have a lot to clean up if we are going to get where we want to go," he said. "It's a combination of play calling and mistakes, but we just have to clean it up. If we are going to have this result against teams in the playoffs or if we want to be district champs, we have to have better efficiency on offense."

To the point of efficiency, Teurlings quarterback Sammy LeBlanc was as efficient as he has been all season. LeBlanc was 16-of-21 for 291 yards and three touchdowns. His three interceptions, however, cannot be overlooked. Charpentier took most of the blame for the mishaps.

"I think our quarterback may not have been comfortable with some of the plays I called and that is completely on me, not him," Charpentier said. "I have to get it fixed it at the end of the day. He and I have to do a better job of working together and since I'm the adult and he's the kid, it's a lot more on me."

'Keep chopping wood'

"I figured the way the lined up in the secondary, they would give us some easy ones," Charpentier said. "We just had to take them. We got a little a greedy on the interceptions and maybe did some things out of character.

"At some point, we have to make some plays down the field. Not everything can be underneath. A lot of teams we play are going to take that away from us. We have to keep chopping wood and getting better."

Teurlings gave up just seven points with the varsity squad in the game and Charpentier credited the defense for adjusting to a tough Rayne offense that ran the ball for more than 200 yards. Charpentier said he hopes the momentum of opening up district play with a win can carry over to next week's rivalry game with STM.

An exceptional group

"The only thing that matters is a W," Charpentier said. "It wasn't the prettiest, but I am proud of the way they played. STM has a super talented group and they have a great group every year. This group is probably a little more exceptional than what they have had the last couple years."

If you peel back a few layers, there are probably quite a few differences between St. Thomas More running back William Cryer and Teurlings Catholic workhorse Landon Trosclair.

At first glance, however, their lists of credentials are almost identical.

Both backs are the primary ball carriers for their respective clubs.

Both are good receiving backs.

Both also happen to be the best blocking backs when opposing defenses blitz.

Both handle return duties in the kicking game at a high level

They both even play right field in the spring for state tournament-caliber baseball teams.

And naturally both figure to play huge roles when Cryer's Cougars (5-1, 1-0) await Trosclair's Rebels (3-3, 1-0) in Friday's 7 p.m. District 4-4A showdown at Cougar Stadium.

"He's just a bull," Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier said of Cryer. "He looks like he's put on some weight since last year.

"He's a very fundamentally sound player. You can tell he's been very coached-up on ball security. He doesn't give you any opportunities to get the ball out.

"He's good at breaking tackles. That 80-yard run he had

against Westgate, two guys had a shot at him behind the line."

Both are backs capable of picking up valuable yardage without huge holes.

"He's a guy whenever everything's not perfect, he can still make a big play," Charpentier continued on Cryer. "To me, that's the big thing in high school football is to try to have guys like that."

Because of STM's dynamic passing attack, Trosclair is actually more of a workhorse back with 113 carries compared to 76 for Cryer.

"I think, though, that's served him (Cryer) well because they force you to defend in a way that really gives him a favorable advantage in the run game," Charpentier said. "So when he does get the ball, it's usually a big play and a lot of that is because of what they force defenses to do schematically.

"But he also has the ability to get to the second and third level and make big

So far this season, Trosclair has rushed for 561 yards and six touchdowns, while catching 21 passes for 216 yards and another score.

"He's a good runner," STM defensive coordinator Terry Tidwell said of Trosclair. "He picks his holes well when he's running inside and he's got good speed outside. And he's a good receiver. If you can do all of that, you're a pretty darn good back."

Ironically, when Trosclair transferred to Teurlings Catholic from Westminster in the spring of his sophomore season, Charpentier and his coaching staff had no real idea where to play this former Crusader, nor how good of a performer they actually had on their hands.

If he had to guess back then, Charpentier would likely have chosen safety or cornerback.

"We didn't know what he was," Charpentier said. "He played defensive back, receiver ... he was all over. In the summer, you can't tell who's a running

"Everything you've got to know about running backs has got to happen in pads. When we put the pads on in August, we were doing perimeter drills and Oklahoma drills, and we said, "This cat's a running back." Still, when his junior season began, Trosclair was "fourth or fifth" on the Rebels' running back depth chart,

The injury bug ravaged that position and suddenly Trosclair was starting.

"By end of Week 3, he was a starter," Charpentier said. "He wasn't the best guy we had his junior year going in, but he was the best guy we had left at that point. Really quickly, from Week 3 until about Week 8 or 9, he went from the best guy we had left to the best guy we had, period.

"He'd just gotten better at such a fast

And unlike some breakaway rushers, there's really no reason to ever take either one of these backs off the field, other than to afford them a rest.

"He (Trosclair) just knows what's going on around him at any given time," Charpentier said. "He's a great blocker. The biggest reason he's on the field so much for us. It allows me to call plays with no hesitation at all, because he's always in a position to be successful. There's really nothing he hasn't shown the ability to do well."

STM coach Jim Hightower said the 5-7, 175-pound Cryer is in the same

"Well, he's an important part of both (running, passing games)," Hightower said. "But probably the thing that goes the most unnoticed that might actually be his most valuable asset is what a good pass blocker he is. He just does everything with a lot of pride. His preparation is non-stop. He always knows what to do."

For Cryer, that extends to the kicking game because "he doesn't have to stop to make a cut."

In the 5-foot-11, 175-pound Trosclair's case, it's more of that old-style special teams approach

special teams approach.


"He just has a fearlessness," Charpentier said. "He's not afraid to run in between people. He's not always looking for the edge. He's looking for a crack.

"Punt return-wise, he's really good at fielding the ball,"

Cryer has collected 787 yards and 10 touchdowns thus far rushing in addition to four receptions for 28 yards and a score.

"He's really coming into his own this year," Tidwell said of Cryer, who also played first base for the Cougars. "He's just so powerful. He works all the time and he's got athletic ability."

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STM defense: 'I don't feel like anyone is as tough as us'

The job given to St. Thomas More defensive coordinator Terry Tidwell's unit this fall wasn't as enviable as some might think.

For starters, the Cougars' defense only returned one starter in senior linebacker Gregory Mahtook. Then while powerful offenses keep their defenses on the sidelines, St. Thomas More's offense is too powerful to avoid scoring an awful lot of points in a very short period of time.

At times this season, STM's defense wasn't able to keep up. In Friday's 56-7 win over archrival Teurlings Catholic at Cougar Stadium, though, the Cougars' defense met every task thrown their

"We did play well," Tidwell said.

"The kids learned the gameplan early and watched a good bit of film, so they knew what was going on ahead of time.

"And they just played hard. That's the best they've played this year."

In fact, Tidwell's group was challenged right away when the offense lost a fumble on the game's first play from scrimmage to allow the Rebels to set up shop at the STM 28. Instead of yielding the early momentum to the visiting Rebels, though, Mahtook and Co. forced Teurlings to turn it over on downs for the first of three times in the game.

"The defense did a great job," STM coach Jim Hightower said.

"We had three or four four-and-outs. That's big.

"When you can stop a drive on fourth down, that's really big."

To illustrate the pride in STM's defense, Mahtook was actually pleased with that initial fumble.

"Actually when we fumbled, I wasn't mad or anything," Mahtook said. "I was actually happy.

"Now, we've got to show them that we're here to play. Our defense's backs are already against the wall, so we've got to get out there and show them that we're not backing down.

"I think that was actually pretty good for our defense.

"Every time we started to get our backs against the wall, we started kicking and saying, 'OK, we've got to get it going right now. Don't let them score."

STM's defense didn't allow any points for the Rebels' first five possession, limiting Teurlings to 209 yards passing and 99 rushing.

"We got pressure, though, we didn't sack him, maybe just once or twice," Tidwell said. "We did hurry him a lot. It was the coverage down field. We had his initial read covered and he had to go to his second read.

"The coverage is a lot better. (Assistant coach Ricky Smith's) been doing a great job with our secondary. We made some changes, some personnel swaps that really gave us some advantages."

Yes, finally STM's defense is starting to feel like it's ahead of the game for a change.

Sure, it's nice being colleagues with one of the state's most powerful offenses in some ways.

But it's also tough to make progress

for a young unit when you're constantly running back onto the field.

"It's been 'get a stop, go sit down," Mahtook explained, "and when Coach Tidwell comes talk to us, you hear the crowd cheering and you're like, 'Well, let's get back on the field.' It's like we have no break, but it's awesome because we know our offense is killing their defense.

"We might be tired, but we also know their offense is tired. Our whole summer workouts were about us being mentally tough, so I feel like it's an advantage when we come back on the field, because I don't feel like anyone is as tough as us."

And yes, once again STM's offense was stellar again. Caleb Holstein hit on 33 of 41 passes for 424 yards and four touchdowns.

Receivers Deion Senegal and Grant Arceneaux each had 10 receptions for 201 combined yards, while tight end Luke Howard had four receptions for 107 yards,

But this was the night for the Cougars' defense to grab the spotlight.

"We've made a lot of progress," Mahtook said.

"We've had to make a bunch of changes and it's all really falling into place now.

"Everyone is feeling comfortable learning their position and learn their job. We're really coming around and putting a good defense together."

Let's just say Tidwell falls just shy of being satisfied with his unit's progress.

"We're closer," he said. "We're not there yet, but we're closer. We're getting the physical part down.

"It's a matter of staying focused and disciplined throughout the whole game and not letting your brain fly off somewhere."

Standing strong, Westgate defense sparks historic victory

NEW IBERIA - At times, the Westgate Tigers must not have looked very familiar to the team the Teurlings Catholic Rebels prepared for all week.

Surely, the defense the Rebels scout-

ed on film didn't resemble the one they saw very often during Friday's 42-28 road loss to Westgate.

The Tigers played many of their offense standouts on defense when needed.

Instead of seeing the rush defense that had been gashed for most of the season, it took a total of one play for the Rebels to notice something had changed.

On star running back Landon Trosclair's first carry, he got two yards. Then it was another two yards, before a pair of one-yard gains. The Tigers were gang-tackling.

'Just run and hit'

"We put together a game plan to just

run and hit," Westgate coach Ryan Antoine said. "The last couple of games, I don't think we did a great job of tackling. We tried to change our game plan up on practice and worked on our tackling, but also keep our guys fresh. I think we've been a little tired.

"We just told our guys, everybody get to the ball. We've been kind of waiting for one guy to do it. All our guys just kind of flew around to the ball.

To Trosclair's credit, though, he kept plugging along. He remained patient and eventually reeled off runs of 45, 28, 12 and 14 to help him finish with 196 yards and three touchdowns.

But still, it was a huge upgrade for Westgate's defense.

"We did a good job of making tackles in the secondary," Antoine said. "We were giving up too many big plays early in the season.

On the flip side. Westgate RB Tyreese Jackson also ran like he hadn't for most of the season, collecting 101 yards and three scores on 16 carries.

Tyreese Jackson that's what we've been waiting for all year," Antoine said. "He controlled the clock and made the plays he needed to make when he had

Before Jackson finished off the Re-

bels' chances with two late TD runs, however, it was Westgate's defense that stood strong,

With Teurlings leading 28-20 in the third quarter, the Rebels began two drives near drives and produced no first downs.

"We rotated guys on offense and defense on both sides, so we were able to get those guys fresh into the fourth quarter," Antoine said. "So when those big downs came, those guys were fresh. We subbed a lot of guys.

Also playing a big role in that critical sequence was punter Connor Scott turning a fumbled punt in the end zone into a 47-yard punt, instead of giving Teurlings possession near the goal line.

"I think it was a big turning point in the game," Antoine said. "It allowed us to flip the field."

After Jackson's touchdown and Mar'Keyvrick Eddie's two-point run tied it at 28-all with 9:53 left to play, it appeared the Rebels were regaining the momentum. But Kenery Touriac stuffed Trosclair in the backfield on second-and-five from the Tigers' 31 to

Cartez Joseph scooped it up and rambled 64 yards for a score to give Westgate the lead for good.

"I was filling my gaps based on my reads and I saw my home boy (Touriac) make the tackle, so I scooped and scored," Joseph said.

"It felt like I'm going to have a victory for my team. It's going to change the mood for my team. That made us better and allowed us to progress more.'

Indeed, through the early losses Westgate (now 4-4, 1-2) stayed together as a team.

"We never pointed fingers when we were down and now things turn, we celebrate with each other," Joseph said. 'We do the positive things. We don't do the negative things.

And on Friday, Westgate turned that attitude into the program's first-ever win over Teurlings.

"It's something about this area where we look at names," Antoine said. "We don't just play football. We look at the schedule sometimes and be like 'Aww, we can't beat them, we can't beat them. They'll hear a lot of negativity around them."

"But our kids and our coaches did a good job of zoning everything out and ust playing football. I told them, 'Guys, just play and let it happen. Just be the best version of you.' Our guys did a great job of doing that tonight."



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Breaux, Bears capture thriller over Rebels

It probably shouldn't have surprised anyone.

Carencro senior quarterback Austen Breaux certainly wasn't shocked in the

Both teams had endured a brutal schedule with hopes of a break-even regular season at stake.

Only a barnburner was suitable to settle this neighborhood showdown.

"We knew it was going to be a dogfight," Breaux said.

It was that and much more

Breaux's 1-yard scoring plunge on fourth-and-goal in overtime proved to be the difference in a thrilling 41-34 OT win over the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

"This is my best high school game, hands down, and on senior night," Breaux said. "It was just amazing."

Rebels' workhorse back Landon Trosclair ended a five-play, 26-yard touchdown drive that he began with a 22-yard reception with a 1-yard TD run of his own for a 34-26 Teurlings lead with 3:25 left in regulation.

Perhaps no one enjoyed a better fate than this heartbreaking loss more than Trosclair, who had 137 yards rushing on an incredible 41 carries, in addition to five receptions for 70 yards.

Tight end Noah Fontenot was also robbed of a hero's role by Carencro's comeback win after five catches for 90 clutch yards and a touchdown.

"The kids believed in themselves and believed in the schemes and just kept fighting through it," Carencro coach Tony Courville said.

Teurlings then enjoyed a touchback on the ensuing kickoff to start the Bears' do-or-die drive at their own 20.

Still, Breaux didn't waver. "I'm confident in my guys," he said. "I know what it means to play Carencro football —1-0 every snap. The scoreboard doesn't matter to us. It's 0-0 every play. So we just had to do it."

Two plays later, though, Breaux connected with Desmond Johnnie on a 54-

yarder to reach the Teurlings 16.
"The line blocked great," Breaux explained. "I saw the safety take the No. 2 receiver and Desmond is the No. 3 receiver. He had the little seam route. He

caught it and made a big play for us."

Two plays later, Breaux scampered in from the 8 for the touchdown and encored that with a two-point pass to Blake Lacombe to tie it at 34-34 with 2:07 left to play. "Blake is a great block-and-catch tight end," Breaux said. "We just have to find him. It just depends on the defense we play. The last two weeks, it was a matchup we liked."

That was the second big play of the night for Lacombe, who began the fourth quarter with a 30-yard touch-down catch to give the Bears a 26-21 lead at the time. "He's just a ball player," Courville said of Lacombe. "He takes every rep in practice. He gives us everything he's got. He just a heck of a high school football player. I'm glad things are working out for him."

The Rebels reached the CHS 32, but then Keith Richard forced overtime with an interception with 2.8 seconds left in regulation.

In the overtime period, Kendrell Williams got three yards to the 1. Carencro elected to go for it and Breaux got in from the 1 up the middle.

"We knew when they went in goal line that they had two double-A gap players, so we knew we had a seam up the middle," Breaux said. "We knew we needed to get a push. No. 7 (Williams), he actually picked me up and I just knew to reach (ball across goaline)."

Frankly, the story line would have been similar if either team had won. Both weary from a rugged schedule and battling injuries all season long, a Week 10 triumph would have been a fitting ointment for either squad.

"Anytime we have a win like this, it's a great feeling," Courville said. "I'm proud of this team. We've been through a lot of adversity. It's paying off that we kept meeting the challenges and fighting, sticking with it and showing grit.

"It was a great win for this program. It lets the seniors go out winners and go into the playoffs the right way."

For Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier, on the other hand, it was agony.

On the first drive of the second half leading 21-20, Charpentier elected to go for it from his own 43 on fourth-andtwo.

Carencro's defense appeared to be drawn offsides, but there was no flag. Trosclair was dropped for a two-yard loss and Charpentier was flagged 15 yards once and then twice to draw an ejection. "I went out too far on the field and got a 15-yard penalty," Charpentier said. "I had to make a point. There's one guy not calling the game like it's supposed to be called."

Should coaches be conservative in playoffs?

It's playoff time.

The end is in plain view. All the coaches know their postseason road. The stakes are higher than ever.

Does that mean it's time to stay closer to the vest and be more conservative than ever?

Or does that generally mean it's time for coaches to go for it and be more aggressive with so much to gain?

"Most of them stay the same," Acadiana coach Matt McCullough said. "You're trying to do a lot of the same stuff that you do in the regular season in the playoffs. Sometimes, some guys might get a little less conservative.

"It's one of those situations where it depends on who you're playing and what you think you need to do to win that game."

Being more or less conservative can come in various forms. For many coaches, it's as simple as going for the two-point conversion or not.

Certain teams, like McCullough's Wreckin' Rams and coach Stephen Lotief's Kaplan Pirates went for two on a regular basis this season.

In my mind, if you have a plus-offense and if you're not facing a topnotch defense, going for the two points makes the most sense. Perhaps if you have an excellent kicker and you want to keep him sharp, I can see the extrapoint route, but far too often, you're simply leaving points on the field.

For instance, earlier this season, Acadiana got to 24 points in a hurry, and no, the Rams didn't execute a field goal, just three two-point conversions.

That can be a huge benefit in a close game.

"You don't want to get too conservative," Charpentier said. "There's no tomorrow."

Another such scenario is whether to go for it on fourth down, especially in the first half.

"It all depends on the matchup," Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier said. "For me, if I feel like we are the better team, I might play a little more conservative, just because I feel like we should be able to control the game.

"But if I feel like we're outmatched a little bit physically or whatever, we're going to go with the kitchen-sink approach and we're not going to leave anything on the playsheet."

The common denominator in all of these situations is coaches are going to do what they feel is needed win games.

It's not so much about experimenting for the future to test a certain aspect of the team, like you might try in a Week 2 contest.

"You do what you have to do to win

the game," Charpentier said. "It wasn't a playoff game, but it's kind of like when we played Indest's Catholic High teams with (Jason) Pellerin when I was at Opelousas Catholic. We were a little outmatched, so we ran every trick play known to mankind and we were able to keep some of those games close because of that approach."

On the defensive side, such decisions are less subtle to the common fan. It might be decisions on whether or not to blitz more than you typically would.

"I think most coaches stay the same," McCullough said. "You're trying to do a lot of the same stuff that you do in the regular season in the playoffs. Sometimes, some guys might get a little less conservative."

Most fans always want their coach to take the overly-aggressive approach. It's just more fun to root for in the stands.

Either way, Charpentier's best advice to fellow coaches — learned the hard way, apparently — is beware of changing too many things in the post-season.

"One big thing you have to stay away from — that I know for sure, because I've fallen into that trap before — you can't reinvent yourself (in) Week II," he said. "The kids have all gotten comfortable doing certain things throughout the year scheme-wise and assignmentwise, and you've to stick with what got you there.

"You can put a couple different wrinkles, but offensively and even defensively, if you try to reinvent yourself scheme-wise going into the playoffs, you're not going to play well."

That's perhaps not as thrilling as some excited fans want to hear at this time of the year, but winning boring is still better than losing with flair.

Especially in the playoffs.


