

Teurlings Tabbed 2nd Patterson Favored In District 7-B Race

District 7-B coaches see a four-way scramble for the top spot in the conference in 1962 with Patterson, Father Teurlings, Delcambre and Erath being the contenders for the flag.

Coach William Hickman's Patterson team led the voting with 66 points. Bill Michot's Father Teurlings eleven is rated the No. 2 team with 62 tallies and Delcambre and Erath tied for the No. 3 spot with 61 points.

Loreauville was tabbed for the No. 5 position with 45 points and Jeanerette next with 30. Following that were Sacred Heart of Morgan City with 24, St. Bernard of Breaux Bridge with 17, Mt. Carmel of Abbeville with 16, St. Joseph of Jeanerette with 14, Youngsville with 5 and Fatima of Lafavette picked for the cellar with four.

Patterson with a wealth of returning monogram winners stacks up as the team to beat despite a few question marks in the backfield forces. Hickman can call on one four-time lettermen, seven three-year lettermen, and five two-time lettermen to round out his forces.

Teurlings rates its No. 2 position due to the presence of some fine backfield knights. The Rebels have all-district fulback Stanley Arceneaux back in harness along with Donald Tauxin from Bunkie and Bob Thomas at the halfbacks. Either Mike Tauxin or Bob Duhon will handle the quarterbacking duties for the team.

Experience in the line could hurt Teurlings. Keith Zimmerman, 210-pound tackle, and Joe Landry and Paul David are the mainstays in the line.

Coach Willie Lutgring hopes to have good overall team speed but figures the lack of depth may keep him from being able to challenge for the top spot. Lutgring hopes the good attitude of the players will make up for the lack of experience.

Delcambre will have a big line, led by Steve Fremin, Lynn LeBlanc and Roland Espouge. The Panthers will have lettermen at every position except center where injuries sidelined regular Dale Bourque.

About the only problem the Panthers could encounter would be trying to replace a regular if injuries struck.

After the top four no one figures to be strong enough to crack the first division. Loreauville and Jeanerette are rated the upper crust of the second division. St. Bernard, Mt. Carmel and St. Joseph are rated fairly equal and Youngsville and Fatima are tabbed to battle for the cellar spot.

Tough Slate Could Hinder Opelousas 11

Storm warnings are up for the Opelousas Tigers. Bengal tamer Mel Didier had his worst season ever with three wins, five losses, and three ties and this year doesn't seem to hold much better.

Opelousas is faced with one of the toughest schedules in AA football, an eleven game slate that runs the gauntlet from Cathedral to Eunice.

The Tigers open with Cathedral in what promises to be another exciting chapter in one of the best series in all La. football. Both clubs have won three games and last year's contest ended in a 6-6 deadlock. And, no more than one touchdown has separated these two clubs during the entire seven games played to date.

Landry of Lake Charles returns to the slate after a year's absence. Then the Tigers swing into neighboring 5AA for their next two contests, the first against Sam Scelfo's always strong Abbeville club and the second with one of the darkhorses for the state flag, Crowley.

Two Lafayette schools tackle the Tigers next. Triple A contender Lafayette visits Opelousas Nov. 2 and the Bengals return the trip the next week with a jump to North.

Younger Players Hold Gridiron Key For Teurlings In 7-B Play

The development of younger players will play a big part in the success of Teurlings. Though nine lettermen return, only five were regulars, leaving more than half a ballclub to be staffed with inexperienced personnel.

Coach Billy Michot said there is a possibility of the Teurlings posting a winning season but one of the toughest schedules in district 7-B faces his squad, the experience factor must be overcome, and

should anyone be injured, the team will be in real bad shape.

At the ends only one letterman comes back. Michot calls Paul David a real tough terminal though he is a little light at 145 pounds. Best prospects to fill the other vacancy seem to be Don Theriot who saw some action last year and Kenny Hebert.

One of the area's finest tackles in any division, Keith Zimmerman, comes back to try for his third let-

ter in as many years. Zimmerman is a 210 pound junior whom Michot calls a good, tough boy with plenty of enthusiasm. Robert Bergeron and Remy Picard are leading candidates for the other tackle slot.

Joe Landry is considered a good, smart, hard-hitting 170 pound guard by the Rebel mentor. Landry has lettered twice. Charles LeBlanc lettered last year also at guard and will be back. Michot rates this position as the strongest spot on the line.

At center, a converted guard, Ronald Piccione is the man to beat for the job. Piccione was a starter as an offensive guard last fall and made the switch to the ball-snapping slot this spring. Dan LeJuene will push Piccione for the job.

It's a wide open battle for the quarterback post. Two non-lettermen with game experience will vie for the slot. Transfer Mike Tausin is considered to be the better runner but Bob Duhon, who has come up in the Teurlings program from the seventh grade, is the better passer and ball handler. The fight for the starter's post should be interesting.

Michot rates his halfbacks and fullback as the strong points on the team. Donald Tausin, Mike's brother, was an All-District choice last year at Class "A" Bunkie and he will be hard to keep out of the starting lineup. Tausin is a good runner and an excellent pass receiver and in addition will handle the Rebels' place kicking chores.

Another halfback to look for is sophomore Bob Thomas, a letterman in his freshman year as a defensive man. He played lots of offense also last year and is expected to move right in and take care of one halfback slot.

Teurlings To Get Tough Test In Friday Action With St. Joe

The Father Teurlings Rebels, pre-season choices to finish second in District 7-B, will get an acid test in the opening contest of the season Friday night at 8:00 in Clark Field when they tangle with the rough and ready St. Joseph of Rayne eleven.

The Rebels boast one of the top backfields in the state but the line

is a big question mark. But when the smoke has cleared Friday night coach Billy Michot should know just how he stands because the St. Joseph line is big and experienced.

Coach Carl Blanchard says his Tigers will be defense-minded this year. Tackles Bubba Lemoine (185) and Wally Link (230) have a

wealth of experience with two and three years of play behind them.

Chuck Molbert and Lou Hopkins will get the calls at quarterback and fullback for the Tigers while Arnold LeBlanc and Charles Habetz will be doing the ball carrying from the halfback positions.

Michot's Tigers are in good shape as far as injuries go with only senior end Paul David looking like a doubtful starter. David is nursing a badly sprained ankle.

All-star prospect Stanley Arceneaux should be the power in the Rebel attack as the 170-pound senior is rated one of the top gridiron players in the area. Transfer Don Tauzin will hold forth at left halfback and Mike Tauzin will be the quarterback. Bob Thomas will fill the other halfback spot.

In the line Butch Leger and Don Theriot will man the terminals and Rene Picard and Keith Zimmerman will be the tackles. Charles LeBlanc and Joe Landry should get the starting roles at the guards and Ronnie Piccione will be the starting center.

Other Rebels to see a lot of action will be defensive end Glenn Webb, tackle Robert Bergeron and quarterback Bob Duhon.

Teurlings Scores Over St. Joseph

Father Teurlings tested its mighty gridiron muscles Friday night and came off with an impressive 14-7 victory over St. Joseph of Rayne in the headline tilt of Class B action in the area.

In other contests Judice took its first regular season outing and lost 12-6 to St. Francis of Iola in a closely placed tilt. Sacred Heart of Ville Platte shocked St. Bernard by a 35-0 margin and Jeanerette had a rough time taking St. Joseph of Jeanerette by a 6-0 score.

St. Joseph took the kickoff from Teurlings and looked like they were going to run the Rebels off the field when they drove 61 yards for the

first score of the game. Al Foreman recovered his fumble in the end zone for the touchdown. Arnold LeBlanc added the PAT with a run.

The Rebels came roaring back on an eight-yard sweep by Bob Thomas and a run by Stanley Arceneaux for the PAT. Don Taurin turned in the best run of the night when he cut over tackle and sprinted 59 yards for the winning touchdown. Arceneaux again added the extra point with a run.

Taurin was the outstanding back as he racked up 111 yards in 11 carries. Arceneaux had 35 yards in 13 carries and was very valuable as a decoy for the Rebels. Thomas had 24 yards in seven tries.

Arceneaux, Joe Landry, Zimmerman and Thomas were the best Rebels on defense.

Jeanerette scored in the second quarter to edge St. Joseph. After recovering a St. Joseph fumble on the 13 yard line, fullback Lloyd Pontiff took three carries to get the ball over the double stripe.

Jeanerette had 11 first downs to only three for St. Joseph and had a total offense of 280 yards. There were nine fumbles in the game.

Sacred Heart used long scoring runs to down St. Bernard. Jerry Ardoin opened with an 80-yard dash and then Larry Ruhlert took off on scampers of 20 and 15 yards before Clyde Ardoin ended the scoring with a 35-yard run.

Hard Work Is Order as Cathedral, Lions Prep for Clash; Vikings Face Abbeville

Hard work was the order of the day for the five local teams in preparation for a big slate Thursday and Friday. Of course the big tilt will be the encounter between Cathedral's Tigers and the mighty Lions of Lafayette Thursday night.

Northside will inaugurate its new stadium Friday against the dangerous Abbeville Wildcats. Father Teurlings travels to Abbeville for a battle with Mt. Carmel of Abbeville and Fatima will test its winning ways against Judice.

Coach Rayford LeBlanc's Lions, smarting from the 9-6 defeat administered by Terrebonne last week, have a lot of work to do according to LeBlanc. "We are going for the kids who will give us 110 per cent. We want to eliminate our blocking mistakes and work on containing wide stuff," LeBlanc said.

LeBlanc said the staff was pleased with the passing offense and defensive efforts against Terrebonne. "A couple of fumbles cost us the ball game and who can say what causes a fumble. But there were times in the game when he had as good individual licks given by our kids as we ever had."

LeBlanc was pleased with the defensive work of guard Bob Cobb who scored a fine 81 per cent for defensive efforts against Terrebonne. Don O'Day also came in for praise from LeBlanc for his defensive efforts in his first varsity game.

Cathedral's Bill Arms found it hard to get them ready. "We

Offensively Wayne Miller and Henry Derise turned in good performances against the Opelousas eleven. The bright note in the Cathedral camp is the return to action of fullback Paul Azar although halfback Ken Hebert, end Pat McCarthy and center Paul Girouard are still on the sidelines due to injuries.

Over at Northside the Vikings are itching to get into competition and coach Allen Meyers is working

are working on jamboree mistakes, polishing our offensive patterns and giving our defense a lot of work.

In looking forward to Abbeville Meyers warned that coach Sam Seelfo can call on 10 seniors while Northside has only six. But Meyers feels the morale of his squad will improve due to the fact that the Vikings are eligible for the 5-AA title for the first time.

Tackle Glenn Webb will be ready for Abbeville reports Meyers and the remainder of the squad is free from injuries.

Teurlings coach Bill Michot was understandably happy over the win his Rebels posted over St. Joseph Friday night. "We didn't know what to expect. We feel we played the game St. Joseph wanted us to play and still came out on the winning side. That speaks rather highly for our kids."

Michot was quick to add that he still didn't think his Rebels should be considered a threat for the District 7-B title. Offensively Don Tauzin, Stanley Arceneaux and Bob Thomas came in for a lot of praise from Michot as did quarterback Mike Tauzin.

On the defensive side Keith Zimmerman, Ronnie Piccione, Glenn Webb, Butch Leger, Don Theriot and Rene Picard all got praise from Michot. No injuries were reported by the Rebels for the Friday night encounter with Mt. Carmel.

Perhaps the happiest coach of all was Fatima's Phil Stoma. He had opened his varsity coaching career with a 38-0 victory but he was giving

all the credit to his boys. "In a tight ball game you can single out good individual performances but in our case it was just a splendid effort by every member of our team."

Stoma wants to stress pass defense and work on offensive blocking assignments this week. Stoma said he wanted to substitute more on offense and defense this week as this first game showed the coaches a couple of kids they didn't know they could depend on for good performances.

St. Joseph, Patterson Win Fatima, Teurlings Notch Wins To Remain Unbeaten in Class B

Fatima and Father Teurlings kept their winning streaks intact Friday night with 27-6 and 26-0 victories over Judice and Mt. Carmel of Abbeville to highlight Class B action locally.

Fatima had to roar from behind to take the measure of Judice while the Rebels of Teurlings scored two in the first period and coasted to the 26-0 triumph over Mt. Carmel.

Other action found St. Joseph of Rayne waiting three scores from halfback Arnold LeBlanc to come from behind and defeat the Midland Rebels by a 20-19 margin. St. Joseph of Jeanerette 20-0, Marksville shut out Port Barre, 20-0. Sacred Heart walked past Youngsville, 32-13. St. Edmund of Eunice tripped Class A Basile, 13-0. Patterson belted Delcambre, 19-6. Berwick routed Jeanerette, 32-0 and AIC scamped over Sunset, 32-0.

Quarterback Steve Schiller threw a 64-yard touchdown pass for Judice in the opening minutes of the game and it fired Fatima to a big comeback effort.

Talented Richard Hebert put Fatima on top in the first quarter when he sprinted 40 yards for the score. In the second quarter fullback Fred Rhymes sprinted through the middle for eight yards and a score and halfback Hampton Bryan got the third Fatima marker on a five yard run. Quarterback Ray Mouton racked up the fourth score on a seven-yard plunge in the fourth period.

Shelton LeBlanc followed the first three Fatima scores with PAT boots.

Hebert was outstanding on offense for Fatima with 197 yards in seven carries. Bob LeJeune with 25 in five carries was next. Mouton also rated an offensive stickout for the Warriors. Mark Judice and Joe Whitehurst opened good offensive holes for the Warriors and Fred Rhymes, Jim Decoux and Shelton LeBlanc were tough on defense.

The Rebels of Bill Michot continued to show offensive power against Mt. Carmel. Teurlings

drove 66 yards in nine plays for the first score with quarterback Mike Taurin hitting halfback Don Taurin with a 37-yard pass for the score. The second score in the first period came on a 70-yard burst by Don Taurin to put the icing on an 89-yard drive that took seven plays.

Bob Thomas got the next Rebel score on a five-yard scamper. This ended a 63-yard scoring thrust that took 11 plays. Thomas had runs of 15 and 6 yards in the drive. The final drive covered 98 yards in seven plays and big Stanley Arceneaux got the score on a 15-yard run. A 47-yard pass from Bob Dubon to Don Taurin helped set up the score.

Mt. Carmel threatened three times during the contest. The Eagles drove to the 11 in the first period, the 12 in the second period and to the two yard line in the fourth period.

Teurlings racked up 363 yards on the ground and 84 in the air for a total offense of 347 yards. Mt. Carmel was held 112 yards total offense.

St. Edmund sounded another warning to 4-B teams with their convincing victory over Basile. Nils Young hit paydirt with a nine-yard scamper for the first Jay score. Fullback Charlie Fontenot wiggled free of the big Basile line and scampered 45 yards down to the Bearcat five. Mike Manuel lugged it down to the one and classy quarterback Jebby Montz sneaked into the end zone on the first play of the second period. Tackle Steve McLain booted the PAT after the first score.

LeBlanc ran for three touchdowns for St. Joseph in its big win. LeBlanc scored on runs of 12, 9 and 7 yards in leading the Bengals to the win. Lon Hopkins ran for one St. Joseph PAT and LeBlanc came up with the big one for the triumph.

Midland scored on a 21-yard pass from Rodney Guldry to end Rodney Schexnider and Roland Thibodeaux ran for the conversion. Schexnider then turned passer and hit Thibodeaux for a seven-yard scoring effort. Schexnider ran seven yards for the third Midland score. Thibodeaux ran for the lone Rebel PAT.

Sammy Grazaffi ran for three scores to help St. Joseph of New Roads over the Jeanerette eleven. He ran for scores on 27, 21 and 60 yards jaunts. Quarterback Ron Lieux scored the first PAT and halfback Robillard got the second.

The Pirates twice marched down to Hornet two-yard line, however, they were repulsed both

times. Again they got to the 10-yard line but couldn't make it.

Roder Russo and fullback Billy Stanley scored two touchdowns each to lead Sacred Heart over Youngsville in a 7-0 encounter. Russo scored on a 31-yard run and a 33-yard pass from quarterback Frank Listl. Stanley scored on a 40-yard punt return and a seven-yard run.

Carl Deize, Youngsville halfback, got the first tally on a three-yard plunge and halfback Tommy McGraw tallied the final score on a 30-yard jaunt.

Halfback Anthony Gagliano ran 15 for the other Sacred Heart score.

Cathedral's Bill Arms wasn't as unhappy over the 20-0 defeat as he might have been. Arms was quick to praise the younger and lighter Tiger linemen for their defensive work against the Lions but admitted that Lafayette outthit the Tigers all the way.

Tackles Douglas Haydel and linebacker Lane Roy drew words of praise from Arms for their fine work as did quarterback Wayne Miller. Cornerbacks Ashton Mouton and Dick Domingue did good jobs during the second half for Cathedral.

Arms was more than a little worried about the New Iberia game this week. "They have played two good ball games away from home and with their home crowd behind

them will be just that much tougher," Arms said. He went on to say that the Jackets are due for a win but he hopes that the Tigers can postpone it a week.

Coach Phil Stoma was so busy counting his injured players he hardly had time to talk. End Steve Champion, tackle Roy Cosse, halfback Bob LeJeune and stellar

halfback Richard Hebert are all on the doubtful list for St. Francis or slated for limited action.

Stoma had words of praise for several of his Warriors. Fred Rhymes did a fine defensive job, Hampton Bryan turned in some real fine running, Ray Mouton handled the quarterbacking duties well, and Mark Judice did some good linebacking.

Stoma said his Warriors looked fairly good offensively but didn't spark too well on defense. Defense will be stressed this week as St. Francis has a big 205-pound fullback and a 185-pound halfback who runs the ends well.

Allen Meyers at Northside was pleased with his team's performance despite a 7-6 loss to Abbeville. Defensively Pat Brouard, Paul Lallande, Randy Eikenbary, Jim McCall, Ray Landry and Gary Caldwell performed well for the Vikings.

The entire starting offensive line did a good job for the Vikings according to the Viking coaching staff. In the backfield John Thibodaux, James Domingue, Caldwell and Franklin Worley were top performers.

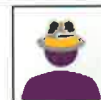
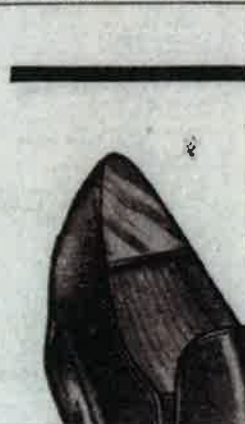

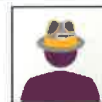

Michot reports no injuries in the Rebel camp but Stoma is moaning over the loss of two of his top defensive backs. Robert LeJeune and Jimmy Decoux are out for the season with injuries and without them the Warriors have defensive problems. Against Teurlings that could mean trouble.

The big question in most people's mind is what new type of razzle-dazzle will Stoma throw at the Rebels and will it work. Everybody will find out Saturday night.

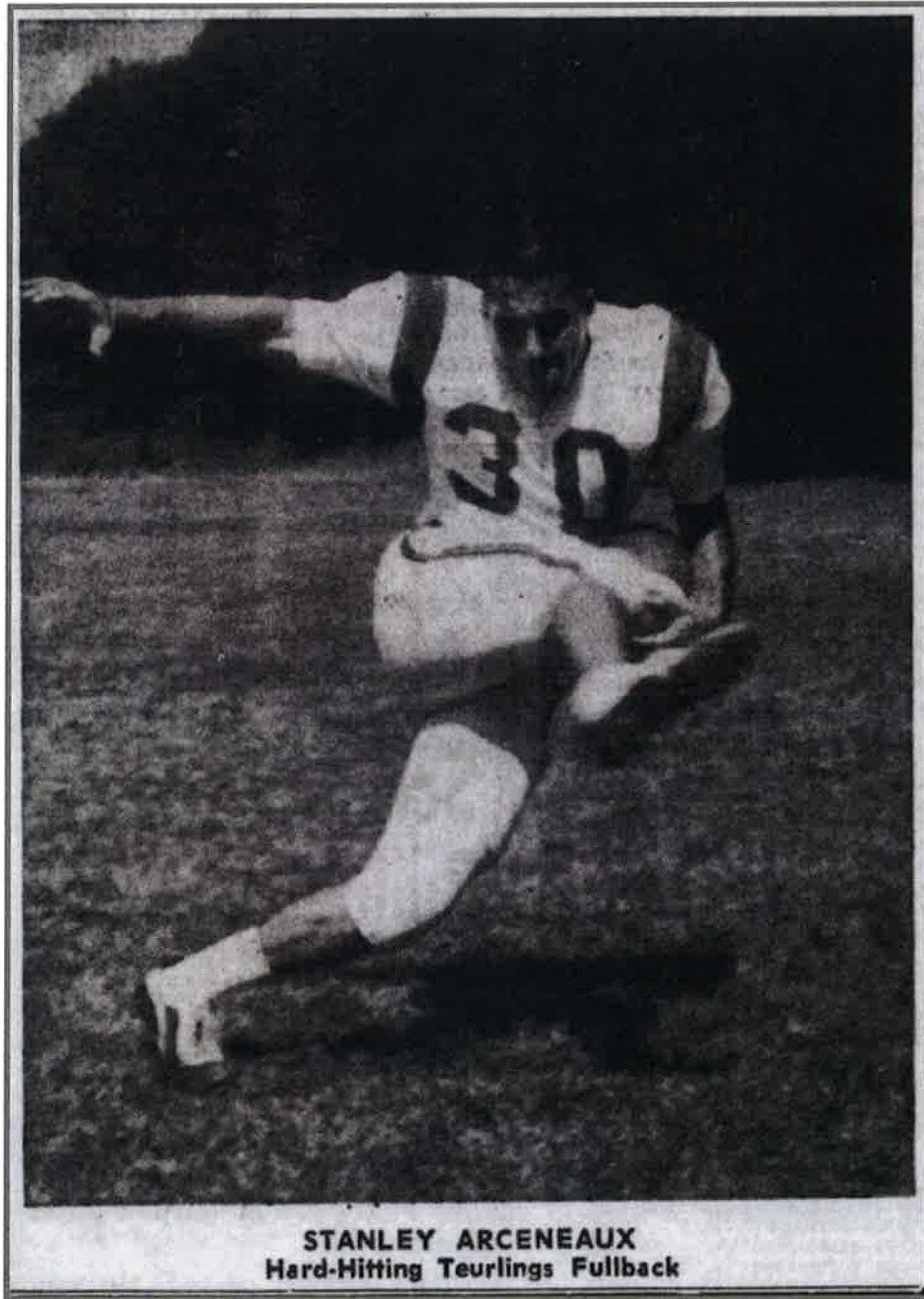

Teurlings, showing no mercy drove hard for the final score of the half with the Rebels taking to the air. Fatima had driven to the 49 of Teurlings but was stopped a little short of a first down. The Rebels moved the ball down to the 29 where quarterback Mike Tausin dropped back and lofted a 25 yard pass to Don Tausin on the four. The Rebels were penalized back to the nine and Tausin again hit Tausin with a pass this time for the touchdown. The kick failed.

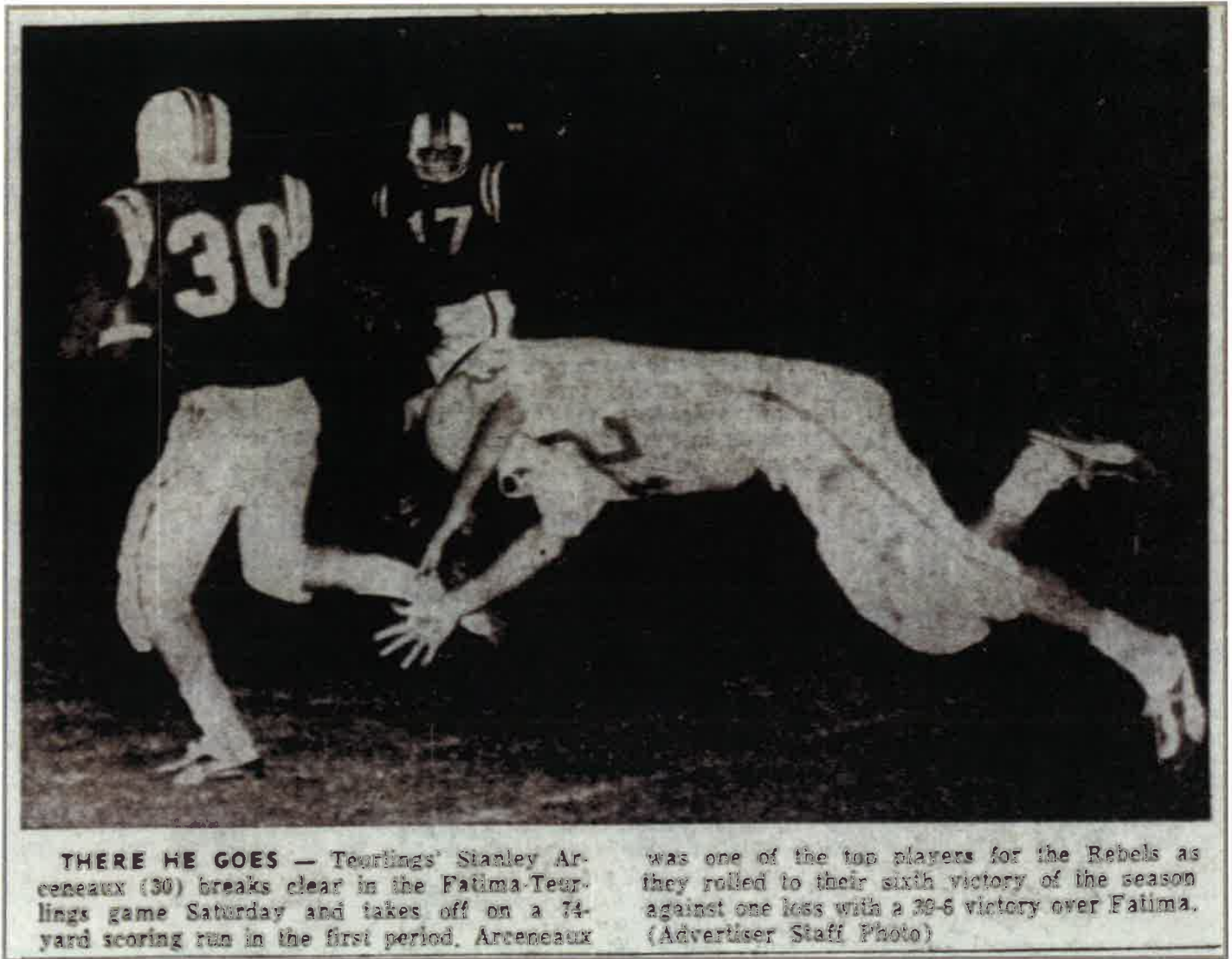

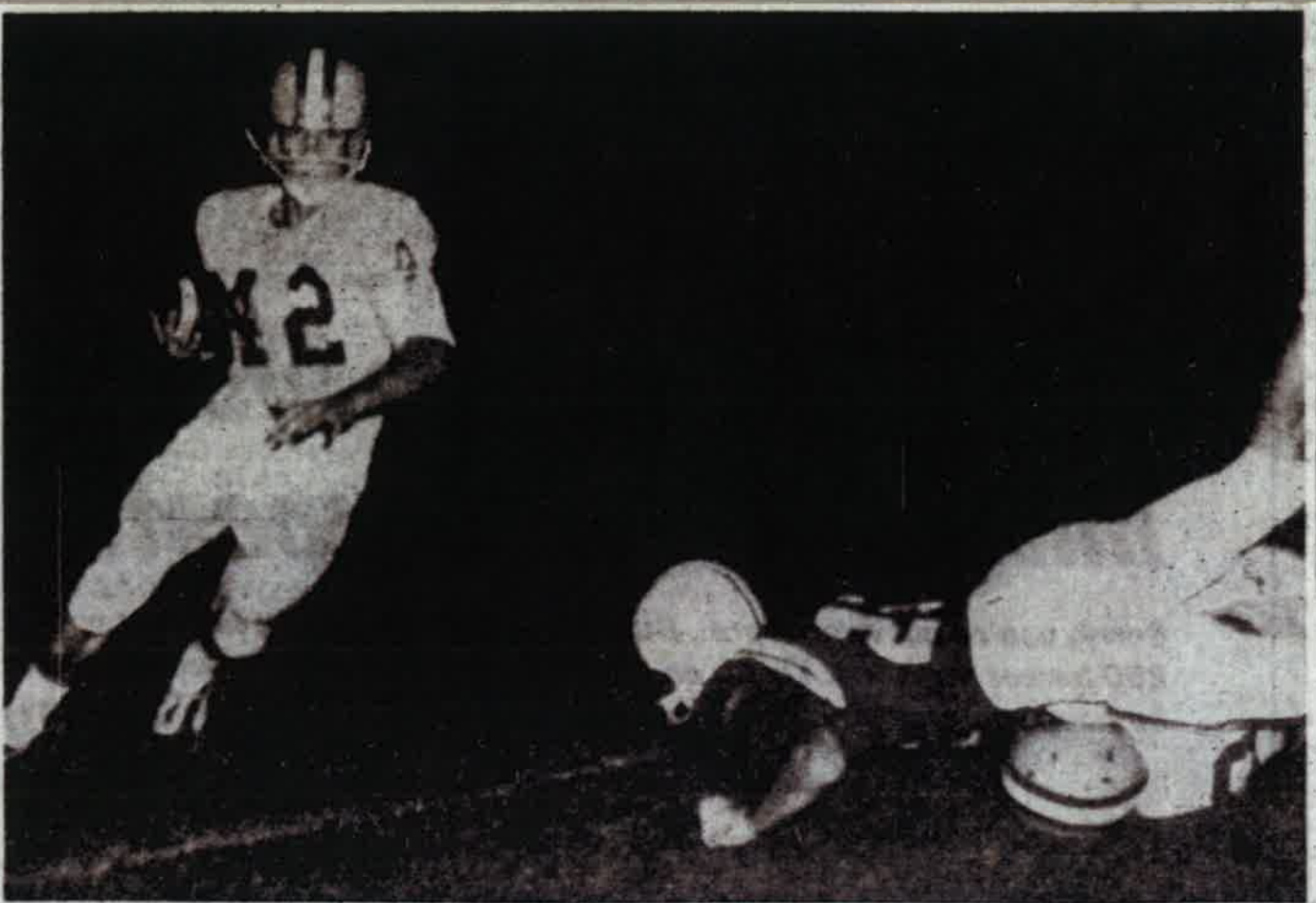

Delcambre has scored 155 points and allowed only 57 while the Rebels have racked up 152 points and allowed 65 in its district contests.



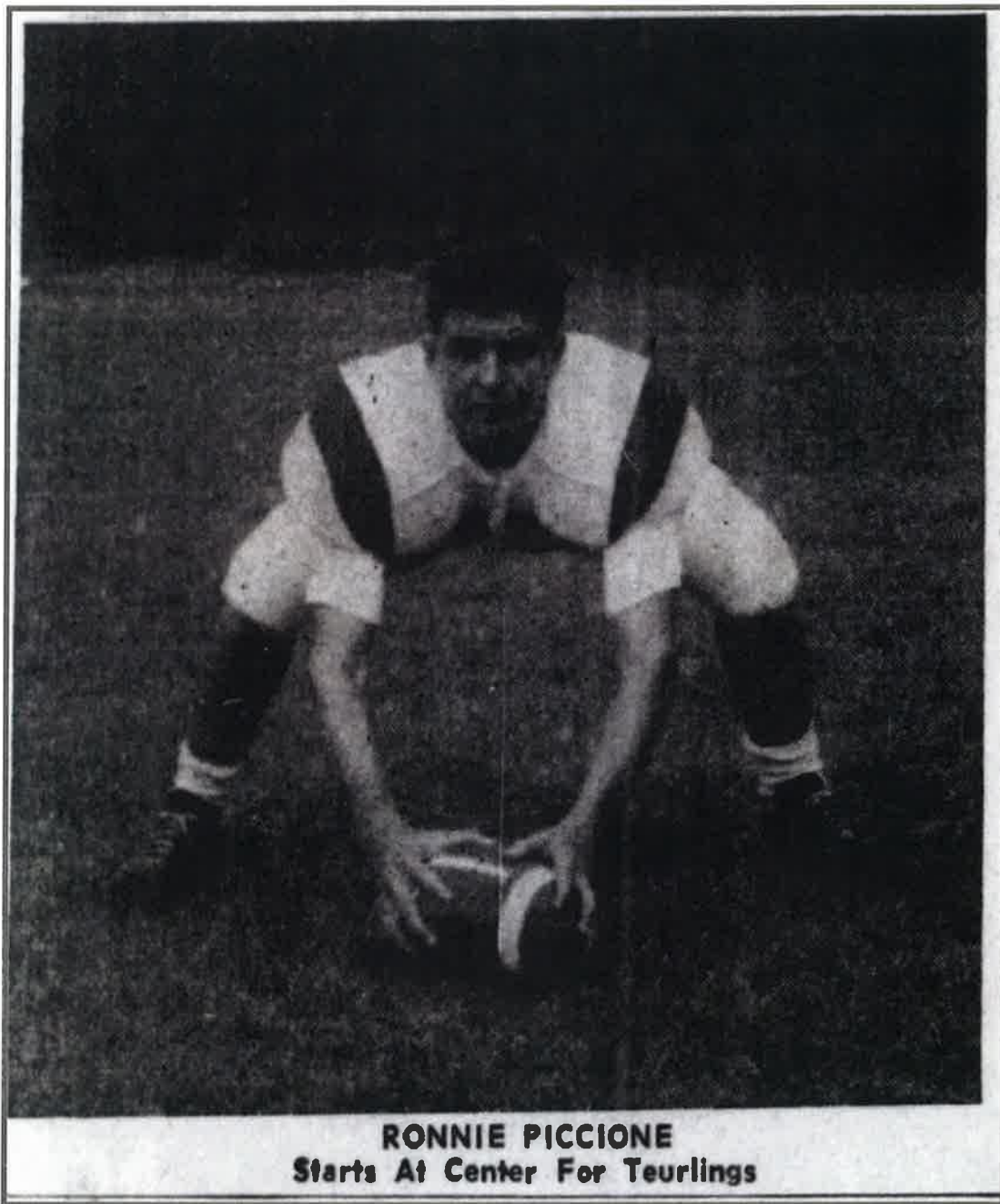

Erath's district championship Rebel team placed three. Delcambre placed three. Loreauville three. Father Turlings of Lafayette captured two places and Mt. Carmel of Abbeville placed one. Twelve players were selected on the first team and 13 selected on the second team. The first team had a tie for center and the second team had ties at center and tackle.

Quarterback Bob Segura Jr. of Loreauville was voted as the outstanding back and guard Lynn LeBlanc of Delcambre was selected as the outstanding lineman. Using the 15 in school point system for first and five for senior on the All-Catholic dream

team, both boys posted 113 points a winning top honors. Bob Segura Jr., a senior, carried the ball for 181 times, picked up 1,144 by rushing and lost 23 for a net yardage of 1,121 or an average of 11.2 per carry. In passing, Segura attempted 42, completed seven, had three intercepted and gained 173 yards and two touchdowns, 13 punting 18 times. Segura had a total of 488 yards for a 5.8 yards per kick. He kicked off 43 times for 1,115 yards or an average of 11.4 per kickoff. He scored eight touchdowns and ran for one PAT in just 48 points on the scoreboard.

In the backfield with Segura are Stanley Arceneaux, a senior, a punter from last year's Father Turlings eleven. Arceneaux carried the ball 113 times gained 800 yards and 13 points after for a 67 total points. He was team captain and of Delcambre was selected as the earned five football letters while outstanding lineman. Using the 15 in school

team of the Lafayette area. Joey Cashen, a senior, hard running team captain from the Delcambre Panthers, who carried the ball 126 times, gained 804 yards, and lost 17 for a net total of 787 yards. He punted the ball 19 times for a total of 630 yards or 33 yards per kick. He caught one pass for 81 yards and scored 11 touchdowns and one PAT for a total of 67 points.

Leon Orsmond, Erath's speedster and the only junior on the first eleven carried the ball 100 times, gained a total of 520 yards and lost 19 for a net total of 500 yards. He received four passes, good for 114 yards and two touchdowns and he intercepted two passes while playing a defensive half-back and returned the two interceptions for 125 yards. In punt returns he returned six for 121 yards and in kickoff returns he had two that was good for 126 yards. He scored 11 touchdowns and five PAT's for 71 points.

Delcambre placed two linebackers in tackle Steve Fremie, senior with four letters, who stands six feet, weighs an even 200 and then outstanding lineman Lynn LeBlanc, who played a guard on offense and a linebacker on defense. LeBlanc is 5-11 and weighs 185 pounds and has earned three letters.

Loreauville placed three seniors in and Joe Judd, a 165 pounder who is 5-11, guard Roy Dageyter, a 5-9, a 160 pound and center Allen Leiby, 5-10, 155 pounder. Leiby tied with Delcambre center Frank Mott of Mt. Carmel of Abbeville, who is a 205 pounder. He stands 5-11.

Headline fullback Stanley Arceneaux, Father Turlings of Lafayette placed tackle Keith Zimmerman, a 5-11, 215 pound terror.
