

Sad Songs Set Stage For Kiwanis Football Jamboree

The sad songs flowed like water in a fountain Tuesday as seven of the eight coaches scheduled for the 31st Annual Kiwanis Football Jamboree this Thursday and Friday nights competed for the coveted "Crying Towel" award.

Going head to head, just as their respective teams will be doing tomorrow and Friday, the mentors jostled to oust defending Crying Towel Champion Bobby Green of Teurlings at the weekly Kiwanis luncheon.

When the dust cleared and the lies were sacked away for another year, Carencro Head Coach Pat Kee emerged victorious. In his assessment of his Golden Bears, Kee said his players were "slow, small, and lazy" and proceeded to prove a point.

"I'll tell you our players' nicknames for their own teammates," he began. "Our fastest running back is called 'Armadillo,' our toughest player is called 'Blossom,' our fattest lineman is called 'Camel,' because the fastest he ever runs is on water break.

"The best, though," he added, "is our linebacker the others call 'Meat House.' When I asked on of the players why, he said the guy ran around on the field like a blind dog in a meat house."

Carencro meets Comeaux Friday night at 7 p.m. at Comeaux on the second night of the Jamboree, and Spartan Coach Bobby Banna painted no brighter a picture for his troops.

"We're young," he began, "we're not very big, and we've got a lot of ugly kids. And we're not very smart. Two of our players were helping each other on a test and the question was 'Old McDonald had a

"One of our players asked the answer, and the other one said 'farm.' Then the first one asked how to spell it, and their second one said, 'Boy, you're stupid. It's e-l-e-l-o.'"

The second night finishes with St. Thomas More against Lafayette High, and Cougar Coach Jacob Byler said, "We've got a lot of problems, being a new school. We've got no uniforms, no busses, no lockerrooms, and no field.

"You coaches can imagine what it's like to play football in a soybean field after a rain. We had a fumble drill, and our players learned real good. We fumbled 10 times in a scrimmage against St. Louis."

Coach Jay Stelly of Lafayette High said of his District 5-AAAA favorites, "I'd like to say all the things you've heard about us are true. The past two years I've gotten up here and told you all how bad we would be.

"But ya'll better get ready this year, because we're good. I'm serious now," he added over the chuckles. "We're big, we're strong, and we're fast. We have nine players who can bench press over 300 pounds, we have six starters back on offense and six on defense.

"We're going to be good."

Opening up the Jamboree Thursday night at 7 p.m. at Northside High are Northside and Teurlings.

"I know I have some players, I just don't know where they are," said Viking Coach Doug Duhon. "We have 45 on our roster. I think we keep some on to help the others feel superior.

"We're going to throw a lot. Pretty soon, I hope we can get closer to catching the ball."

Teurlings Coach Green has a spear-

chucker on Clint Campbell, of whom his coach said. "Clint's real intelligent. I asked him the other day what his birthday was and he said September 30th. I asked him what year and he said, 'Every year, Coach.'

"Clint was kind of nervous the other day. When I asked him what was wrong, he said his sister was going to have a baby and he didn't know if he was going to be an aunt or an uncle."

Acadiana High Coach Bill Dotson, whose Rams face New Iberia in the second game Thursday night, opened the proceedings.

"We have smart players at Acadiana," he said. "We had one defensive back who was having trouble understanding our three-deep defense. Our coach asked him how many men there were on our defense, and he said he didn't know.

"Then our coach asked him how many yards there were from the 10 yard line to the end zone and he said he didn't know. Well, strangely enough, that player graduated from Acadiana and is now a football official in the area.

"Dotson also said he was going to change the team's "Terrible Turks" defense and, in keeping with the team's French heritage "we're going to call ourselves the 'Laissez Faire Defense'."

Also, instead of the old "Veer Machine" offense, the name would be "Near Machine," because if we get near the goal line it will be a miracle."

Of such quips is the Kiwanis Club Crying Towel competition made, and as the high school season nears, all of the coaches on hand urged Kiwanians and others to support their sport.

There is a reason high schools list August jamborees as the first date on their schedule every year: The season gets underway with those jamborees, even though the scores don't count at season's end.

What counts is the opportunity to get untracked before the regular season begins a week hence, a chance to see personnel under game conditions.

A tradition for 31 years in Lafayette has been the Kiwanis Football Jamboree, which begins its 31st annual run tonight at Northside High School.

The homestanding Vikings kick off the 1982 jamboree against the Teurlings Rebels at 7 p.m., to be closely followed by two District 5-AAAA rivals, Acadiana and New Iberia, in the second tilt.

Friday night, the scene shifts to Comeaux High School, with the Spartans opening the action at 7 p.m. against crosstown foe Carencro. They will be followed by St. Thomas More High School in its inaugural appearance, pitted against 1981 5-AAAA co-champ Lafayette High.

Honored both nights will be Kiwanis Jamboree Queen Pam Mouton as the proceeds from the game go towards the Kiwanians' various projects to help youth.

While those projects are being aided, the eight teams battling on the field will be seeking a helpful look at their prospects for the campaign ahead.

NORTHSIDE-TEURLINGS

Rebel Head Coach Bobby Green will look to senior quarterback prospect Clint Campbell to again run his deadly passing attack as they take on their neighbors from the northside.

Two-way tackle Chris Arceneaux (5-10, 200, Sr) and split end-cornerback Troy Lemoine (5-6, 150, Sr) are two Vikings Coach Doug Duhon will need top performances from for an improved record this season.

ACADIANA-NEW IBERIA

Ram Coach Bill Dotson and NISH Coach Wylie Frazee had unique years in '81. Dotson's crew missed the playoffs at 6-4, the first time in three years, while the Yellow Jackets went 8-2 and missed the playoffs in 5-AAAA by losing once each to co-champs Lafayette and Opelousas.

Both have the materials to rebound to form this time around, with Acadiana looking to tight end Keith Dischler, center Chuck Delacerta, cornerback Elton Glaude, linebacker Randy Lee, and running back Jeff Senegal, among others, for key plays.

Frazee must find a replacement for departed running back James Alexis, but is expected to again challenge for the title.

COMEAX-CARENCRO

Spartan Coach Bobby Banna is fortunate in having exceptional running back

Mike Campoen (5-10, 170, Jr) yards in '81) and quarterback Louis Dooley returning this year, after Comeaux turned in its best season ever in quad-A ranks — 6-3-1.

At Carencro, Coach Pat Kee is looking for a way to get the ball to Pat "Blossom" Constantine as often as possible this season. Constantine caught 61 passes for 900 yards and nine scores last year.

LAFAYETTE HIGH-ST. THOMAS MORE

The Mighty Lions, 8-4 last year after a state playoff loss to Lake Charles, are picked to capture 5-AAAA this season. Coach Jay Stelly returns a bevy of talented performers from last year's co-champions, and league coaches figure that means a lot.

The offense will be run by senior quarterback Brent Chism, while names like end Billy Koon and linebacker Cedric Figaro spearhead the defense.

St. Thomas More Coach Jacob Byler has only two defensive starters, and three offensive, from the final Cathedral-Carmel squad of last year, and he promises his newly-formed Cougars (in merger with Fatima) will throw the ball often.

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Eighteen Starters Return At Teurlings

The Teurlings Rebels were a bit of a disappointment last season, but things could be different this year.

First year head coach Bobby Green led his troops to a 6-4 record during the 1981 season, and a 5-2 mark against 8-AA rivals.

But, 18 starters return from last campaign and the Rebels are flying high once again.

"Overall, we should be much improved over last year," assessed Green, "because we have 18 starters back.

"Also, all our skill people are back, which should be a big plus for us.

"Our main weakness will be the lack of depth as we only have 25 players on the

team."

Offensively, nine starters return, with a like number coming back on the defensive side of the line.

All members of the offensive backfield returns intact, led by 6-1, 185-pound senior quarterback Clint Campbell.

Fullback Jed Hebert, a 6-2, 215-pound senior, is also back, along with 5-8, 175-pound senior running back John Roy.

Split end Chad Peltier, a 6-1, 180-pound senior, tight ends Mark Zimmerman (6-1, 170, Jr.) and Jay Hebert (6-1, 170, Sr.) and flankers Gary Gerami (5-8, 150, Sr.) and Jonathin Patin (5-8, 150, Jr.) are the wideouts for the Rebels.

Three of the five down linemen return, with left tackle Kevin Boudreaux, a 5-11, 185-pound senior, converted left guard (from center) Joe Ashy (5-9, 185, Sr.) and right guard Kelvin Thibodeaux (5-11, 180, Sr.) heading the cast.

Chad Habetz, a 6-1, 185-pound junior, will team with Boudreaux at the tackle slot, while Cecil Lotief, a 5-10, 170-pound senior, will be the Reb snapper.

Spearheading the defensive charge are senior linebackers Charles Cunningham, a 5-8, 170-pounder, and Ashy.

All four deep backs return to inherit their positions of a year ago, with Darrin Murry, a 5-7, 155-pound junior, and Roy at the corners and Patin and Gerami at the safeties.

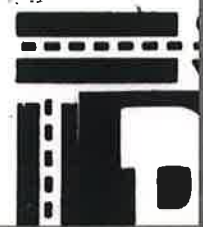

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The T-N-T men are also back, with Hebert, an all-district performer last year, and Brian Racca (6-0, 190, Sr.) manning the tackles, while Boudreaux will be at noseguard.

About the only place the Rebels will be inexperienced will be at defensive end, but Zimmerman and Thibodeaux did see extensive action in 1981 and they are both capable of handling the action.

The Rebels are capable of going a long way this season, but much will depend on how far they want to go.

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Rebels, Jackets Get Opening Victories

If high school football fans don't find themselves eager for the 1982 season after last night, they may need an enthusiasm transplant.

On the opening night of the 1982 Kiwanis Football Jamboree played before a packed house at Northside High School, both games provided big plays and exciting finishes to set the stage for tonight's final two contests.

The Teurlings Rebels outscored Northside 19-6 in the first game Thursday night, and New Iberia got past Acadiana 25-20 in the nightcap, all of which sets up tonight's action at Comeaux High — Comeaux against Carencro at 7 p.m. followed by Lafayette High against St. Thomas More.

Both games last night started off with a bang, as the first three Teurlings-Northside possessions resulted in scores and the first four from NISH and Acadiana did the same.

TEURLINGS 19, NORTHSIDE 6

Coach Bobby Green's Rebels wasted little time in getting the fans' attention, driving 70 yards in four plays for the first score of 1982.

Senior quarterback Clint Campbell, his team's Outstanding Player on the night, hit Mark Zimmerman for 21 yards to the Viking 43, and then Campbell took off around his left end on an option and didn't stop until he hit paydirt.

The extra point was missed, and soon Northside had tied it at 6-6. Moving 65 yards in six plays, Coach Doug Duhon's crew was spurred by a 17-yard Derek Cluse-Troy Lemoine connection to the TCHS 48, and by a 32-yard scamper to the 16 by halfback Lanval Hebert.

Another pass to Lemoine, this one for 13 yards, put Northside on the one, from where Cluse plunged across.

Teurlings came right back, though, answering with a 13-play march culminated by a one-yard John Roy dive. Campbell had 14 yards rushing and 23 passing on the drive, and hit six of 11 tosses for 78 yards to go with his night's nine carries for 68 more stripes.

It stood 13-6 at halftime with the extra point, and the only tally of the second half was a cannon-shot 52-yard run by the Rebels' Troy LeBlanc.

Teurlings totalled 298 yards on the night, 220 on the ground led by LeBlanc's 74. Campbell's 68, 37 from Roy, and 29 from Jed Hebert. The Vikings, behind Cluse's five of 11 passing, had 60 air yards (49 by Lemoine) and 39 on the ground.

Viking center-linebacker Gerald Thomas was named his team's Outstanding Player.

On fourth down from the four, Jeff Senegal bolted across to knot the game, and then Randy Lee tacked on the PAT.

The second Yellow Jacket possession was even quicker, as tailback Kenwood Jones dashed 65 yards on the second down. This time the extra point was good and it was 13-7, New Iberia.

Then, in three plays, Acadina had scored again and the game quickly resembled a track meet. Halsall did the honors, taking an option pitch to his right, getting a solid downfield block at the Jacket 40 by flanker Zeke Duhon, cutting back at the NISH 30, and employing a convoy of Rams the rest of the way for a dazzling 63-yard TD jaunt.

It remained tied at 13 when a high snap foiled the PAT try, and Coach Wylie Frazee's Jackets re-took the lead when Jones picked up a bouncing Keith Dischler punt and high-octaned 71 yards for a score to make it 19-13.

One Ram attempt to re-take the lead — fueled by two clutch catches for 44 yards by Dean Theriot — failed when a Senegal fumble was recovered in the end zone at 4:04, but the next drive succeeded.

Halsall, who was his team's Outstanding Player with 10 carries for 129 yards, picked up 13 to the NISH 47, and a 29-yard pass interference call on Stacy Batiste guarding Brian Mack put the ball on the 18.

Then, on fourth down, Ram QB Brian Poindexter found tight end Dischler slicing across the field for a 14-yard scoring aerial. Lee's PAT made it 20-19, Rams, at half.

In contrast to the first half offensive heroics, the second half featured defensive stars. A staunch Ram goalline stand halted NISH at the two, but Poindexter was hit back to pass in his end zone on the next play and the resultant fumble was recovered by Marcus Warner at 6:54. Kim Dupuis knocked away Thor Bruno's PAT pass try.

Two passes for 38 yards to Dischler, the second a 24-yarder to the New Iberia 10, sparked another Ram drive, but New Iberia sacked Poindexter on fourth down to end the attempt.

The scoreboard clock, which had balked at the 10-minute mark in each of the four halves played Thursday night, showed :58 at the time of that sack. NISH proceeded to run out that remaining time.

But, play-by-play records and the clock-keeper's earlier comment that the clock had skipped two minutes in the half would have indicated that 2:58 remained, instead.

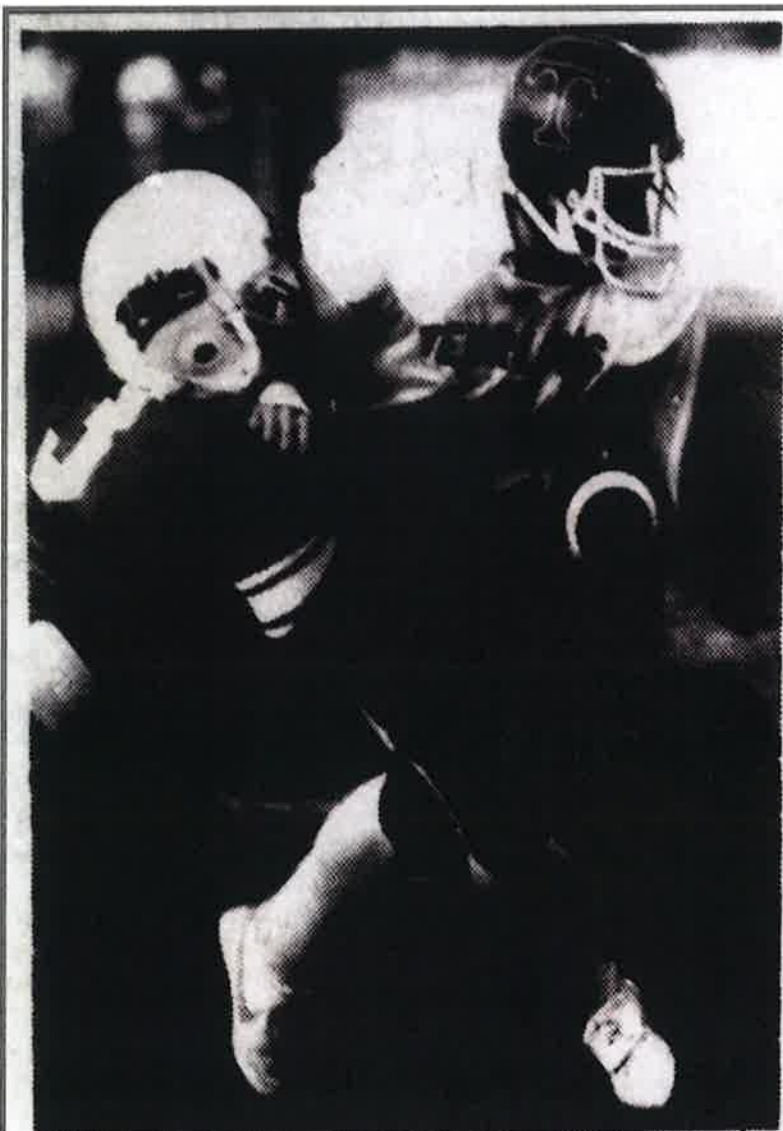

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Polls Smile On Lions, Tigs, Cougars

Sportswriters have tabbed numerous area high schools for lofty positions this season, according to the Preseason High School Football Polls released today by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

Lafayette High School, which tied Opelousas in 1981 for the District 5-AAAA title with a 7-3 record and finished 8-4 on the season, has tied for the No. 5 position in the Quad-A poll with 37 total points.

Ironically, the Mighty Lions of Coach Jay Stelly, who are favored to capture 5-AAAA this campaign, are deadlocked at No. 5 with the team that knocked them out of the state playoffs a year ago, the Lake Charles Wildcats.

Opelousas holds down the 10th spot in today's release with 23 points.

points, trailed by Neville (one, 76), Ruston (53), and Holy Cross (three, 48) ahead of LHS and LCHS.

Uppermost among Class AAA powers are the Defending State Champion St. Martinville Tigers of Coach Carroll Delahoussaye, who garnered five first place votes and 92 total points to lead the pack in their division.

Others receiving triple-A first place votes were second-place Leesville (one), third-place Bogalusa (three), and No. 9 Franklinton (one), while St. Martinville's District 5-AAA rival Morgan City is No. 9 in the early poll with 19 points. District 4-AAA favorite Eunice is No. 6 with 40 points.

Also in the triple-A ranks, 5-AAA's Cecilia got 10 points and 4-AAA's Crowley picked up six.

To no one's surprise, Class AA Champion John Curtis sits atop double-A in the preseason poll, holding nine first-place votes and a commanding 99 points, but a trio of area ball clubs are in the Top Ten.

Newly-formed St. Thomas More is sixth with 31 points, Opelousas Catholic is eighth with 27 points, and Notre Dame of Acadia Parish is ninth with 23. Patterson is 10th with 22.

Also in Class AA, Teurlings Catholic's Rebels earned six points from the pollsters.

The top team in Class A, Port Sulphur (seven, 93) will be invading 5-AAA's Northside this Friday night. Hanson's Tigers stand third in Class A with 57 points behind Kentwood (one, 68), with Hanson's District 7-A foe Delcambre ninth at 22 points and St. Edmund of Eunice 10th with 20.

Elton also picked up two votes in Class A.

Johnson received the bachelor's degree in physical education in 1963 and the master's degree in secondary education from the University of Southwestern Louisiana in 1971.

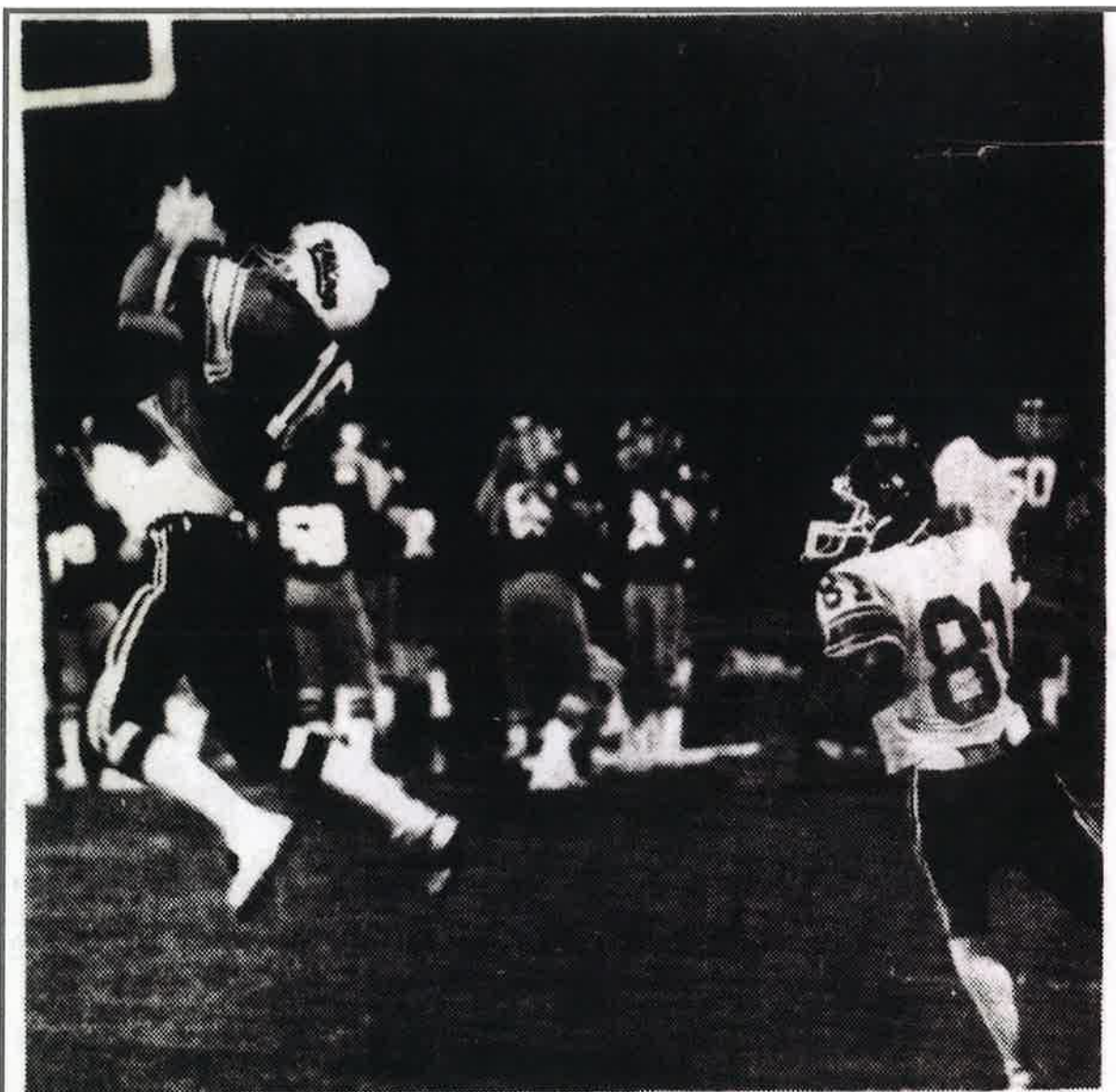
While attending USL, Johnson competed in track and field as a distance runner.

Catholic High welcomes the Belle Chasse Cardinals in a Saturday night contest.

TUERLINGS at BREAU BRIDGE

The Tigers won last year's game and the Rebels will looking to avenge that defeat.

Teurlings head coach Bobby Green has 18 starters returning from the 1981 club, including senior quarterback Clint Campbell.

Campbell will be joined in the backfield by senior running backs Jed Hebert, John Roy and sophomore Troy Leblanc.

Joey Theriot will be calling the signals for the Tigers and he will be handing the ball off to running backs Chris Hebert and Emile Henry.

LOREAUVILLE at ST. MARTINVILLE

Coach Kirk Crochet will field a strong contingent at Loreauville in '82, but his troops could be in for a rough time against the defending Class AAA champs.

The Tigers' hopes for a successful record centers on the shoulders of senior signal caller Clint Simon and 1981 rushing leader Paul Broussard.

Spearheading the Tigers of Coach Carroll Delahoussaye are senior running backs Garland Jean-Batiste and Louis Mitchell.

BELLE CHASSE at CATHOLIC HIGH

The Panthers lost by a touchdown in 1981, but things could be different this go round.

Coach Mike Delcambre's troops are loaded for the kill, led by senior all-purpose tailback Matt Broussard and senior quarterback William Quinlan.

Belle Chasse finished second in District 12-AA behind state champs John Curtis last season.

Rebels Rip Visiting VC

The Rebel Express was detained for a moment, but once it found the right track, it was all over.

After a slow start, the Teurlings Rebels came on strong to capture a 43-0 victory over the Vermillion Catholic Screaming Eagles at Clark Field Thursday night.

Coach Bobby Green's troops were only able to score six points in the first quarter against a tough VC defense, but rolled up 21

markers in the second stanza and 16 after intermission to put the game away.

Teurlings amassed 420 yards total offense in the contest, allowing the Eagles only 107.

"Thank God for the big plays," said Coach Green after the game. "That's what broke the game open. VC came out ready to play and gave us trouble in the first quarter.

"I was pleased with the way we came out the second half and controlled both sides of the line of scrimmage.

"In order for us to do well in district, I feel we will have to be more consistent from game-to-game."

With the Rebels on top 27-0 at the half, Coach Green went to the subs early in the third period, but TCH still managed to put 16 points on the board.

One of the big plays that Green was talking about earlier came with 6:36 showing on the clock when punt returner Chad Peltier returned a Jason Broussard boot back 65-yards to paydirt for a quick six. Noel Henry came on to boot the extra point to

put the Rebels on top by an unsurmountable 34-0 lead.

After a hustling Mark Zimmerman downed a Jonathin Patin punt at the VC three, the Teurlings defense came alive and sacked Eagle quarterback Andy Veazey in the endzone for a safety with 3:48 left.

Teurlings again found paydirt with 55 ticks left in the third period when Patin, who was calling the signals, rolled around right end from the 11 for the TD. Henry's boot was again true to put the Rebs on top 43-0 and end the scoring on the night.

The fired-up VC defense gave the Rebels fits in the early going, but once TCH started rolling the game was never in doubt.

Teurlings' first touchdown came with 1:23 left in the opening quarter when quarterback Clint Campbell combined with flanker Patin on a 49-yard strike. Henry's boot was wide, but the Rebels were on top 6-0.

After VC was unable to move the ball at the start of the second period, the Rebels took over on their own 46 and were in touchdownland five

plays later.

Campbell scored the six, keeping around left end from the five with 10:05 left in the period.

Henry's PAT was through the uprights this time to put TCH up at 13-0.

Broussard booted one down to the TCH two-yard line late in the stanza, where it took the 'big-play' Rebels only two cracks to score.

Zimmerman hauled in a Campbell pass down the left sideline at his own 33 and outraced everyone to paydirt for a 96-yard touchdown run with 3:59 left before intermission. Henry's extra point try was again true to put the Rebs ahead 20-0.

Teurlings put the icing on the cake with :25 left before the break, with Campbell sprinting around right end from the three for the score. Henry came on to split the bars and the Rebs led 27-0 after 24 minutes of play.

With the win, Coach Green's charges improved their overall record to 3-0 on the season and they will open District 8-AA action next Thursday night in Loreauville.

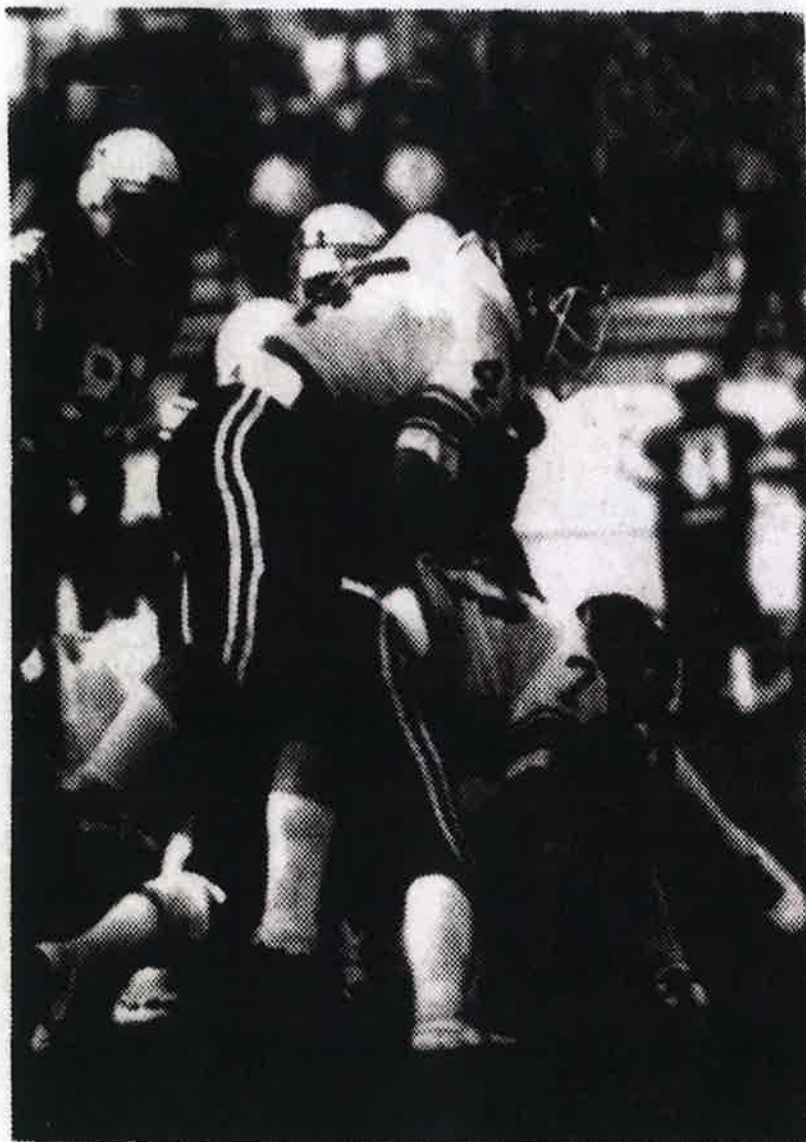

REBELS SLOSH PAST PIONEERS

Still Goose Eggs For Teurlings Foes

CROWLEY — What a game it could've been. If only Mother Nature had stayed away one more week.

But, the Teurlings Rebels overcame terrible weather conditions to capture a hardfought 7-0 decision over the Notre Dame Pioneers in a key District 8-AA contest played here Thursday night.

Because of a continuous downpour all day, which ceased just before kickoff, the game was sloppily played by both teams from the start, with the Rebels losing six of seven fumbles, had one pass intercepted and they were penalized seven times for 80 yards.

Notre Dame coughed up the ball three times and lost two, was intercepted thrice and the Pioneers were flagged for five infractions for 35 stripes.

"We didn't do everything that I thought we were capable of doing under the terrible weather conditions," confessed Teurlings head coach Bobby Green. "Our offense played inconsistent. We made a lot of mental mistakes."

"Our defense played fantastic. They did about everything we could ask of them."

The tough Notre Dame offensive unit had an output of only 110 total yards in the game, a big tribute to the awesome Rebel defensive unit.

"Notre Dame put a lot of pressure on our defense," stated Rebel defensive coordinator Tommy Badon, who saw his charges shut out their sixth straight opponent, "but our kids responded unbelievably well."

"To hold a team as good as Notre Dame inside the 30 after turnovers four times is the greatest defensive effort I've ever seen."

Defensive secondary coach Steve Huter was also pleased with his deep backs, holding highly-touted Pioneer quarterback Stephen Moody, a blue chip athlete, to a sub-par performance.

"The secondary did an exceptional job," praised Huter. "He is suppose to be one of the best quarterbacks in the state, but we held him to only three completions (16 attempts) and we intercepted three passes."

Although the Rebels played poorly offensively throughout the contest, they did manage to accumulate 297 yards total offense, with 207 coming on the ground and an additional 90 via the pass.

Teurlings' only points of the game came when it took the opening kickoff on its 20 and marched the length of the field for the touchdown and the PAT was successful for the only scoring on the night.

Coach Bobby Green's troops had four other opportunities to hit paydirt in the contest, but fumbles cost them everytime they got close to the goal line.

Fullback Jed Hebert tallied the only TD of the night for Teurlings, that coming with 5:30 left in the opening stanza, when he went over right tackle from the two. Noel Henry came on to split the uprights on the PAT to end the scoring on the night.

Hebert's tally ended a 14-play, 74-yard drive, with the big plays in the march being a 40-yard pass from quarterback Clint Campbell to Jonathan Patin and another 17-yard aerial from Campbell to running back Charles Cunningham.

Teurlings had two other opportunities to score late in the second quarter go up in smoke.

Cornerback John Roy intercepted a Moody pass at his own 37, with the Rebels moving the ball down to the Pioneer four, where Cunningham coughed up the ball and ND linebacker Albert Bacilla recovered in

the endzone.

Moments later, Rebel noseguard Kevin Boudreaux recovered a bad plich by Moody on the Notre Dame 14, but Hebert lost control of the pigskin on the three two plays later, with Brian Williams pouncing on the loose ball at the 11.

Notre Dame had a golden opportunity to score with 5:30 left in the game when Cunningham fumbled on his own 11 and Rod Lafosse recovered.

But, the Rebels allowed the Pioneers to move down to the six, where a pass from Moody to Alan Cassidy was wide of the mark on fourth and four to end the threat.

The Rebels, now 6-0 overall, 3-0 in district action and ranked fourth in the State Class AA polls, will entertain the Erath Bobcats next Friday night.

Rebels Climb Higher In Poll

The quest for the Class AA state football championship continues for the Teurlings Rebels, who this week climbed to No.3 in the Louisiana Sportswriters' Association high school football poll.

Coach Bobby Green's Rebels, No.4 for the last two weeks, leap-frogged over E.D. White this week to stand right behind defending champion John Curtis and No.2 Ferriday.

Curtis has six first place votes and 96 total points (maximum is 10 and 100), while Ferriday has two No.1 nods and 85 points. Teurlings, which last week had a first-place vote and 73 points, this week boasts two and 80, respectively.

The Rebels have piled up a remarkable 275-0 point spread in rolling over seven foes.

E.D. White, which was at 77 points a week ago, now has 74 in the No.4 slot.

Notre Dame, the Rebels' District 8-AA foe defeated by Teurlings 7-0 three weeks ago, slipped a notch from No.8 to No.9 in this week's balloting. Tied for the No.10 position with Belle Chasse is Church Point.

In Class AAA, Coach Carroll Delahoussaye's unbeaten defending state champion St. Martinville Tigers continue at No.2 behind Bogalusa. Bogalusa has eight first-place votes and 98 points in a near-unanimous tally, and St. Martinville is right behind with two and 91.

District 3-AAA power Jennings sat tight at No.3 in the state again this week, although with two fewer points (77 to 79) than it accumulated a week ago.

Morgan City, which invades St. Martinville in a big District 5-AAA battle this week, improved from 11th to ninth and stands at 5-2 on the

Nine Down, One Shutout To Go

Teurlings High scored on five of their first six possessions and played excellent defense to defeat the Kaplan Pirates 35-0 at Clark Field Friday night.

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Alabama football coaches warn that Mississippi State's Bulldogs will be dangerous Saturday even though they are battered and bruised after five straight losses.

Alabama assistant coach Bruce Arians said the ninth-ranked Crimson Tide expects another war as "they've lost a lot of real close games. They could be 7-1 or 8-0 just as easily as they are 3-5."

The Tide and State will meet at Mississippi Memorial Stadium, where the Bulldogs pulled a 6-3 upset in 1980 that ranks among the team's greatest victories to Mississippi State partisans.

Alabama won the 1981 game 13-10 when the Tide intercepted a tipped pass inside its 10 in the closing seconds.

Mississippi State has been hit hard by injuries, particularly to the defensive team.

Defensive end Billy Jackson and defensive tackle Earnest Barnes are still sidelined by injuries while a third defensive starter who hasn't played recently, middle linebacker Ermon Green, is now listed as doubtful for the Alabama game.

Alabama, 6-1 overall and 2-1 in the Southeastern Conference, is troubled by injuries. Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant reported that 32 players didn't practice earlier in the week because of injuries.

Bryant said that at the beginning of the season, "State was among the conference favorites, but major injuries have really hurt them. But they still have a very dangerous offense and (John) Bond is a top level quarterback who can run or pass the ball effectively."

Teurlings has completely dominated all nine opponents they've met on the year both offensively and defensively.

COUGARS 10th STRAIGHT SHUTOUT VICTIM

Unbelievable Rebels Remain Perfect

Jed Hebert and Clint Campbell combined to power the Teurling Rebels to a 25-0 victory over the St. Thomas More Cougars in a key District 8-AA contest played at Clark Field Friday night.

The win not only clinched the 8-AA title for the second-ranked Rebels, but they also ended the regular season by shutting out their 10th opponent in a row.

Hebert tallied two touchdowns in the onslaught, while Campbell scored once and passed for another in leading the Rebels to the championship throne.

Besides scoring twice, Hebert rushed for 132 yards on the night on 12 carries, while Campbell added 96 stripes on 13 tries.

"It is just unbelievable," said Teurlings Head Coach Bobby Green after the game. "It is the most fantastic moment of my life."

"We knew we could win it all along if we could stay healthy and the morale factor was there."

"The key to our season was that the kids never looked ahead, but they took the game one at a time."

"The kids played unbelievable all game long. They did everything we asked of them. They made mistakes, but they didn't let that get them down."

Defensive coordinator Tommy Badon was just as happy as Green as he said, "It's the greatest feeling in the world. We've been working since June for this, out I never in a dream thought we could've shut out 10 straight opponents."

"The kids never doubted themselves that we could win. Sometimes we as coaches could learn a lesson from them."

"Just like the other nine games, everytime we needed the big play, they dug down deep and got it. If they can continue to

do this in the playoffs, I think we have a shot."

Teurlings receiver-defensive secondary coach Steve Huter, who is in his first year on the sidelines, also had praised.

"I'm real proud of the kids. They did something that hasn't been done in 50 years (the last time a team shut out 10 opponents was in 1932). It's one heck of an accomplishment."

"It did a tremendous thing for our school. We made a name for ourselves and the people will now know who Teurlings is."

"I would like to thank the fans and student body for doing a good job of displaying sportsmanship of our school. They displayed the same sportsmanship that we taught the players."

Leading by 6-0 at halftime, the Rebels converted some big plays into three second-half touchdowns to gain the championship outright.

St. Thomas More needed to win by eight points to claim the title or win by two to make the state playoffs, but neither was accomplished.

Hebert's first touchdown came on the opening play of the third period as he broke through a huge hole over right tackle and outraced everyone to the end zone from 69 yards out for the six with 11:40 left.

Noel Henry then came on to split the uprights to put the Rebels on top 13-0 and they never looked back.

Teurlings put the game on ice with 2:23 left in the final stanza when Campbell connected with a wide-open Gary Gerami down the left sideline for a 40-yard TD strike. The PAT failed, but the Rebels owned a 19-0 lead.

The Campbell-Gerami hookup ended a nine-play, 81-yard drive, with Campbell carrying four times for 31 stripes. Hebert recorded the other 15 yards in the drive.

Coach Green's troops put the icing on the cake with only :51 ticks on the clock when Hebert bulled his way over from the 11. The kick failed, but Rebels had prevailed 25-0.

As a matter of fact, Hebert started things off when he recovered a fumble on the St. Thomas More 23 and three plays later he took the pigskin home to paydirt.

Defense prevailed in the first half as the Rebels were the only ones to find paydirt.

After a scoreless first quarter, Teurlings found touchdownland on the opening play of

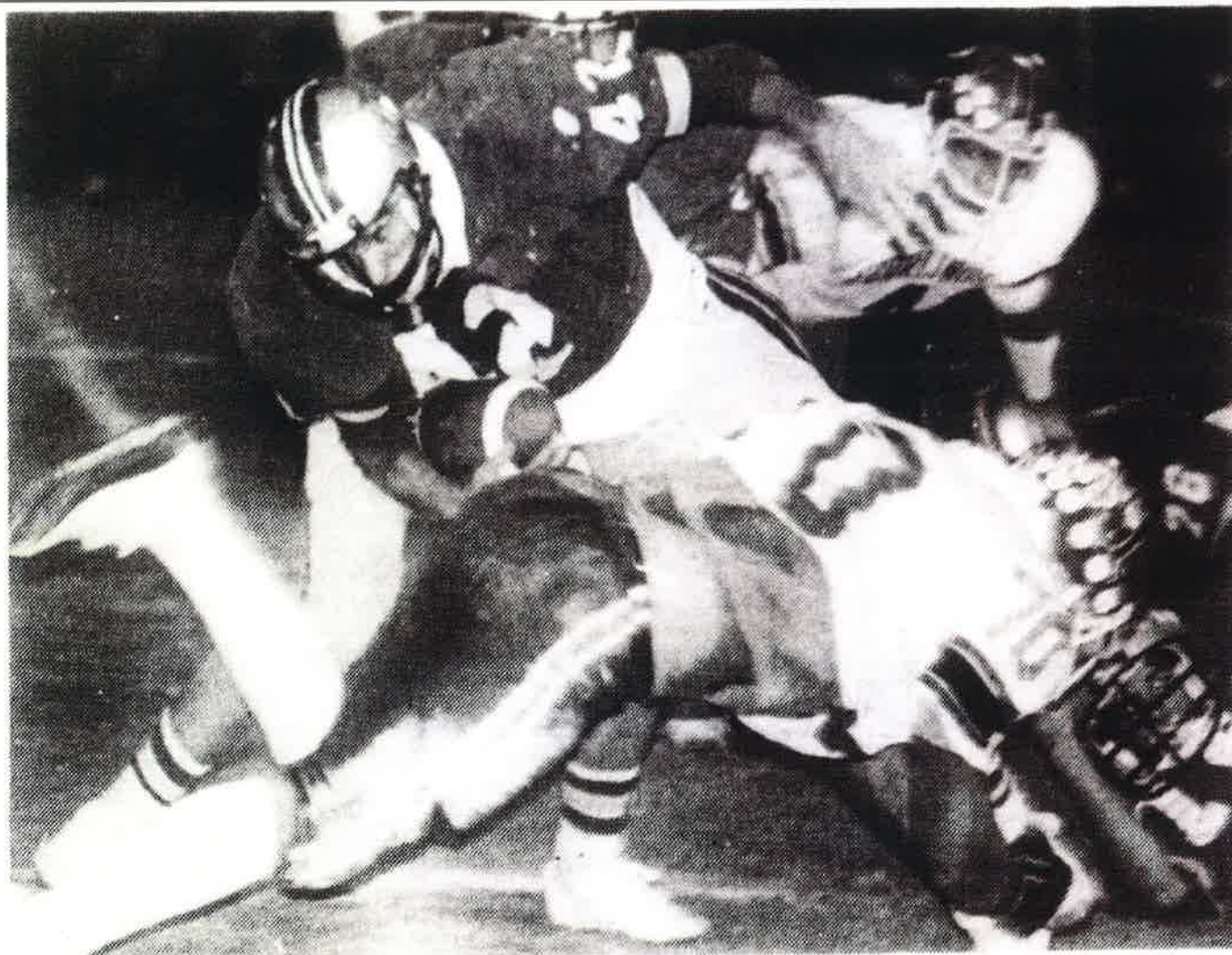

Gibson, Wave 'Hanging In'

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Coach Vince Gibson says the Tulane football team will keep fighting despite its poor season so far.

"We're going to hang in there. We're going to keep fighting," he told the New Orleans Quarterback Club on Monday.

"It has been a nightmare," he said of a dismal season that got even more dismal Saturday with a 45-15 defeat by Mississippi. Tulane fell to 3-6 in a season that was expected to end with a bowl invitation.

"I've been coaching a long time, and sometimes things go good for you, and sometimes they go bad," he said.

He said he decided to speak to the club himself instead of sending an assistant.

"After the way we played Saturday, I didn't have the guts to ask anybody to take my place," he said.

Coming off a victory over Baylor, getting two players back off the injury list for Ole Miss, having a week of good practices, Gibson said he felt good on Saturday morning.

"I felt excited about the game," he said.

"I talked to Steve Sloan (Mississippi coach) before the game, and he looked like death warmed over," he said.

He said things went wrong right from the start. Mississippi fumbled the opening kickoff, Tulane apparently recovered it, but Mississippi kept the ball and marched for a touchdown.

The next five possessions, he said, ended in a fumble, a missed field goal, two interceptions and another fumble.

"Five consecutive times we had the football and nothing happened for us," he said. "It was like a tonic for them."

"They got so sky high, and they have good talent. That same team beat Southern Mississippi and played Arkansas right down to the wire."

"Our coaches have worked harder than they have in the three years I've been here. Our players have worked harder than any time since I've been here," he said.

"I feel so sorry for our senior class. They haven't had a lot of good things happen for them," he said.

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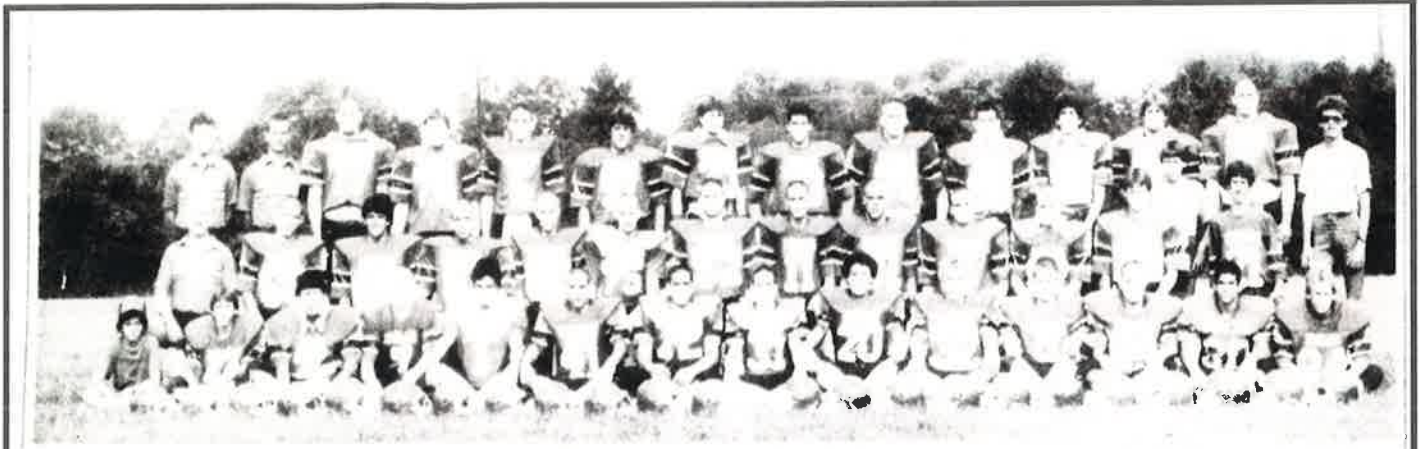

Rebel Defenders Did The Impossible

Editor's Note: The Teurlings Rebels will host the Brusly Panthers in a Class AA state playoff regional contest Friday night at 7:30 at Northside High School and today we look at their defense.

How do you spell Teurlings? The Rebels' opponents spell it W-F-S-A-C-M-E.

How does Northside football coach Herman Teurlings spell it? F-E-N-S-E.

And that's just the Rebels' did on the defensive side of the ledger this season.

The Aschville Teurlings defense snuffed out all opponents on the way to a perfect season, the District AA crown and a number two ranking in the final State Class AA poll.

As a matter of fact, Green's troops claimed no first place votes with perennial power John Curtis of New Orleans finishing only five points behind the Patriots.

We felt like we did something impossible," said Coach Green on their modern day record. "Because of all the yardage involved, it's something that's almost impossible happening."

The Rebels weren't expecting to establish a 10-year record, but Coach Green knew his troops were going to be tough defensively this season.

"I just wanted the record that we could be that good defensively," Coach Green said. "And especially as far as the yardage, that we had plenty of yardage, strong back, average size and height, a lot of defensive interference."

A yardage game had a way of an athletic endeavor, but in the Rebels' case, it was a game of attrition.

"There's a great deal of yardage involved," explained Green. "That's why we have to believe in both tremendous and the constant staff."

They had to have the confidence in what they were doing, but there was no doubt that the team was too right in their beliefs.

Line by a blocking front line, the Rebels' players' opponents only saw a line of yardage in the year's top defense overall.

The line was the most important part of us, said the Rebels' players. They controlled the line of scrimmage and made it easier for our linebackers to defend against the pass.

Leading the pass game line was the Y.N.T. man, tackles Jay and Jed Hepburn, and noseguard Kevin Montgomery.

Kevin was our most versatile defensive player," said Green. "Because in our multiple defensive sets, he played full, noseguard and linebacker."

And what a job he did. The 160-pound senior did 70 tackles for the Rebels in tackles with 10.

The standout defender had 70 stops on the year and 40 assists, one fumble recovery. "I caught behind

the line stops and five quarterback sacks."

Jay and Jed were our main defensive threats," assessed Green. "I've never seen two tackles control the line of scrimmage like they have in any high school game."

Jed had 85 stops on the year—57 individual, 28 helpers, one fumble recovery, nine CBL's and five sacks—while Jay picked up 51 solos and 20 assists, three fumble recoveries, 17 CBL's and eight sacks.

Pierls' credit for the stout defensive effort has also been given to senior linebackers Joe Ashy and Charles Cunningham.

"They did a tremendous job all year long," commented Green. "They were part of the stout force that not only helped against the pass, but stopped our opponent's running attack."

Heading the crew was Ashy, who Green said, was probably one of the smartest players on the team.

He is quick, very aggressive and was a significant force on the team," stated Green.

Ashy accumulated 87 tackles on the season—53 H, had two swipes and pounced on one loose football, with Cunningham getting 49 solos, 16 helpers, 85, five CBL and four quarterback sacks.

Just as tough for the Rebels' opponents to run the ball was the same problem to generate any passing attack.

Against the like of cornerbacks Jonathan Palm and John Hoy and safeties Chad Pelletier and Gary Gierami, opponents were able to average only 49.5 net total yards per game through the air.

Our defensive secondary did a super job of coming up with the big plays all year," assessed Green.

Heading the four man crew were Palm and newcomer Pelletier.

Since Jonathan played weakside cornerback for us, he didn't get much attention," explained Green, "but when they came his way, he did a super job."

He is probably our best defensive back as knowing the game of football."

The 170-pound junior had 34 tackles on the year—24, four interceptions and three fumble recoveries.

On the other side was Roy and he was 37 or 42 stops, had four swipes and recovered a loose pigskin.

Pelletier waited until his senior to play football, but he did an unbelievable job.

"Chad came out from nowhere to be a big part of our team," said Green. "He worked hard and did a tremendous job for us, not only on passing situations, but forcing on the runs consistently as well."

The 6'0, 180-pounder made 61 tackles, picked off three enemy aerrals and had three fumble recoveries.

Free safety Gierami had 43 stops during the season, with one interception and recovered one fumble.

Potent Teurlings Attack Unstoppable

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Teurlings Rebels will begin their quest for the Class AA state crown Friday night, hosting Brusly at Northside High School, beginning at 7:30. Today we look at the Rebels offense.

On offense they were unstoppable. That is the best way to describe the vaunted Teurlings offensive machine this season.

Coach Bobby Green's Rebels fashioned a perfect 10-0 overall record and a 7-0 slate on their way to capturing the District 8-AA championship.

The Rebels tallied 369 points (36.9 per game) on the season and 248 (24.8) against league opponents, earning a runner-up spot in the final Class AA state rankings behind highly-touted John Curtis of New Orleans.

On the season, Coach Green's offense averaged 324.5 yards per game on the ground and 82.9 through the air lanes.

"I might sound cocky," confided Coach Green, "but I knew all along that we were capable of scoring plenty of points this season."

"The reason is that we had so many starters and experience coming back."

Guiding Teurlings' fortunes this season was 6-1, 185-pound senior quarterback Clint Campbell.

A bonafide blue-chip college prospect, Campbell rushed for 1,152 yards on 126 carries and scored 16 touchdowns.

He also connected on 35 of 70 pass attempts for 770 yards and nine TD's.

"Clint did for us what every coach dreams of," assessed Coach Green. "He started off where he left off last year. He ran the ball well, read the defenses well and did a good

The talented signal caller had ample support from bruising running back Jed Hebert and scatback John Roy.

Hebert, a 6-1, 230-pound senior, was called on to block most of the season, but did manage to carry the mail 50 times for 451 yards (9.0), scoring six touchdowns with his longest coming on a 69-yard jaunt.

"Jed runs hard," said Green, "and his speed is very deceptive because of his size."

"He is not a selfish running back in that he accepted his role blocking."

Roy, who came back from knee surgery two years ago to have a good senior campaign, complimented Hebert well in the mail-carrying department.

The 5-7, 165-pound senior, rushed for 304 yards on the season on 54 carries, finding paydirt three times.

"John was our most consistent runner," praised Green. "He is a very discipline and smart runner. He picked up a lot of yardage on his reactions and all-around football sense."

It's often said that a good running or passing attack is as good as it's offensive line, and the Rebels are blessed with outstanding personnel up front.

Possibly the biggest reason for the Rebels success this season was the young men that did the blocking in the front wall.

"The key was that they controlled the line of scrimmage," said Green. "Everytime the ball was snapped, we could see five guys moving people out."

"They didn't let the defensive control the line of scrimmage. That had a lot to do with our success."

Anchoring the Rebels' offensive line was center Cecil Lotief and he was sided by guards Kevin Boudreaux and Joe Ashy and

"We use a lot of blocking calls in our offensive line," explained Green, "and Kevin and Joe made them."

"They are very smart, have a lot of football savvy and they have plenty of experience."

Teurlings didn't rely on the pass this season as much as in the past few years, but Campbell had sure-handed receivers to throw to.

Manning the flanker slot for the Rebels was Gary Gerami and he wound up being the leading receiver with 10 grabs for 195 yards and two tallies.

Jonathin Patin, who doubled both at tight end and split end during the season, grabbed seven passes for 180 yards, scoring three

touchdowns.

Tight end Mark Zimmerman had six receptions for 159 yards and one TD.


"We didn't throw to Mark much this season," commented Green, "but he made clutch catches for us all year."


"We accomplished what we wanted to do this season," insisted Green. "We started out very simple and progressed where we could run more complicated plays as we built confidence."

Accomplishments and confidence go a long way in determining the fate of a season.

Just ask the Rebels' 10 opponents this year.

Rebels, Spartans Dominate

Two spectacular offensive performers and a pair of defensive enforcers share top honors along with two playoff-producing coaches on the 1982 *Daily Advertiser* All-Parish Football Team selected by the *Advertiser* sports staff.

Teurlings Catholic quarterback Clint Campbell quarterbacked his Rebel team to a perfect 10-0 season and 369 points by running 126 times for 1,152 yards and 16 touchdowns, and by hitting 35 of 70 passes for 770 yards and nine more scores.

The Rebel leader is highly recruited, and shares Most Valuable Offensive Player laurels with Comeaux High School running back Mike Campbell, who gained over 2,400 yards in his last two years of high school ball and led the Spartans to the playoffs in 1982.

In 1982, Campbell gained 1,182 yards on 179 carries and scored 15 touchdowns as Comeaux earned co-championship status in District 5-AAAA with Opelousas and finished 8-3.

Defensively, no two players more clearly

spelled doom for their teams' foes than junior linebacker Cedric Figaro of Lafayette High and senior noseguard Kevin Boudreaux of Teurlings.

Figaro, a 6-3, 230-pound specimen with amazing lateral range and pursuit range, had 76 primary tackles, 71 assists, eight caused fumbles, and five knockouts in which foes had to be carried from the field.

Boudreaux, the ring leader of a Rebel defense that finished the season with no points allowed — the first time in 50 years any school had done that in Louisiana — had

69 tackles, 40 assists, 11 drops behind the line, five quarterback sacks, one interception, and one fumble recovery.

Just as the top player honors were shared, so too were Coach of the Year awards split this season between a pair of Bobbys — Green of Teurlings and Banna of Comeaux.

Green's Rebels, who were 6-4 in 1981, set the prep football scene on its ear week after week with their string of shutouts. Opening regional Class AA playoff play against Brusly this Friday night at Northside, Teurlings is aiming for the state championship game December 11th in the New Orleans Superdome.

Banna's Spartans completed a four-year climb from obscurity to earn their 8-2 regular season record. In his four years at the Comeaux helm, Banna has had years of 2-8, 4-6, 6-3-1, and 8-2 in rebuilding a fallen program.

Joining the two Campbells in the offensive backfield are fullback Wilson Landry of Carencro and Jed Hebert of Teurlings, both two-way All-Parish choices (Hebert at defensive tackle and Landry at linebacker).

Landry had 868 yards and six touchdowns on 132 carries (a 6.6-yard average), while Hebert romped for 451 yards on 50 totes (9.0) with six scores.

The receiving corps is in capable hands, manned by acrobatic wide receivers Pat Constantine of Carencro and Kevin Broussard of Lafayette High and tight end Phillip Moody of St. Thomas More.

Constantine, owner of over 120 catches in his final two years with the Bears, had 64 catches for 919 yards and seven scores to pace all parish pass catchers. Broussard nabbed 37 for 680 and five scores as the Mighty Lions' most consistent aerial threat.

Moody had 23 grabs for 315 yards for the Cougars.

Junior Jerry Fontenot of Lafayette High (6-3, 230) and senior Bruce Lambert of Comeaux (6-0, 210) are the offensive tackles, with Eric Harris of Comeaux (5-11, 205, Jr) at one guard and Teurlings' Boudreaux tying Acadiana's Kurt Shoppe for the other guard spot. Acadiana's Chuck Delacerda holds down the center position.

On defense, Boudreaux is flanked by Rebel twins Jay and Jed Hebert at tackles. The two 6-1, 230-pounders each had over 80 tackles and were in double digits on runners caught behind the line in that devastating Teurlings front wall.

The defensive ends are Lafayette High senior Billy Koon (49-44-93 stops) and junior Sean O'Neal of Comeaux (35-27-62, eight sacks).

The awesome Figaro is joined at linebacker by junior Mark McKay of Comeaux and Carencro's Landry. McKay (82-37-119) "put some Major League hits on people," according to Banna, while Landry recorded an astounding 95 first hits in 149

total stops.

Head-hunting free safety Steve Judice (92-48-140, 5 INT's) of Comeaux keys the secondary, along with Kevin Colomb (35-20-55, 4 INT's, 4 blocked punts) of Lafayette High, Brett Boullion of St. Thomas More (17-15-32, 5 INT's), and Jonathin Patin (20-15-35, 4 INT's) of Teurlings.

The specialist this year is Lafayette High senior Brent Chism, who handled both place kicking and punting for the Mighty Lions.

Personnel on the second unit offense include senior wide receiver Troy Lemoine of Northside (15-289-2), tight ends Randall Young (11-162-4) of Comeaux and Keith Dischler (12-177-2) of Acadiana, tackles David Muse of Lafayette and Ralph Liebert of Acadiana, guards Jay Paul Bernard of St. Thomas More and Steve Fox of Lafayette, and center George Martin of Comeaux.

That unit is quarterbacked by senior Louis Dooley (442 yards rushing, 428 pass) of Comeaux, and includes senior Salt and Pepper Acadiana running backs Lance Halsell (135-782-8) and Elton Glaude (600 yards), as well as St. Thomas More's productive junior William Stevenson (190-943-10).

On defense, second-team honorees are ends Mark Zimmerman of Teurlings and Rock Judice of Northside, tackles Lee Carrier of Comeaux and Gordon Duhon of Lafayette, nose guard Paul Courts of Comeaux, linebackers Joe Ashy of Teurlings, Randy Lee of Acadiana, Darren Roy of Comeaux, and Gerald Thomas of Northside, and defensive backs Joel McFarland of Comeaux, Pat Constantine of Carencro, Chad Pelier of Teurlings and David Comeaux of Lafayette.

On offense they moved the ball at will, on defense, what more can be said?

The Teurlings Rebels overpowered the Brusly Panthers 35-0 in a State Class AA regional contest played at Northside High Stadium Friday night, before an overflow crowd.

Coach Bobby Green's Rebels, now 11-0 on the season, kept their shutout record intact, making the Panthers their 11th straight victim.

"We made key mistakes that led to several breakdowns, mostly in the second half," evaluated Coach Green, "but overall we did a good job."

"We succeeded in doing what we wanted to do. We wanted to go out and jump on them early in the game and that's exactly what we did."

Teurlings scored on four of its first five possessions of the first half and built a 28-0 lead on the Panthers before they knew what had hit them.

As a matter of fact, the Rebels' swarming defense was so overpowering in the first 24 minutes of play that the Panthers had an 11 yards total offense.

The Rebels racked up 323 yards total offense on the night, while holding the out-manned Panthers to only 98.

Senior quarterback Clint Campbell scored two touchdowns during the contest, with running backs Troy Leblanc, Jed Hebert and Charles Cunningham getting one each.

Leading by the huge margin at halftime, Coach Green started using second-line players in the final two stanzas, and as a result the Rebels were able to score only once.

That came with 6:50 left in the third stanza, when Cunningham rambled in from the six.

Noel Henry then came on to split the uprights to end-to-most Rebels fans surprise, the scoring on the night.

Campbell's tally ended a three-play, 27-yard drive, as the Rebels received a gift from Brusly punter Patrick Bourgeois, when his knee touched the ground while fielding the deep snap from the center.

On the first play of the drive, Leblanc went over left tackle for 19, then Cunningham carried for two more, down to the six, where Campbell took it in.

The Rebels had great field position in the first half of play and as a result scored

on four of their first five possessions to build the substantial lead at the break.

Coach Green's troops, ranked second in the final Class AA state poll, started four of its five drives in Brusly territory.

Thanks to a stout defensive effort, the Panthers were playing musical chairs as they ran three plays than punted most of the first half as the Rebels held them without a first down.

As a result, the Rebels started four of those TD marches from the Brusly 43, 47, 42 and 41, and the other came from their own 34.

Leblanc tallied the first touchdown for Teurlings, going over left tackle from the one, but the kick failed, leaving the Rebels with a 6-0 lead.

The gifted running back ended a six-play, 43-yard drive with his six-pointer, with the big plays of the drive coming on a 15-yard scamper over right tackle by Cunningham and a 14-yard hookup down to the one from Campbell to Mark Zimmerman.

After holding Brusly on its next possession, Teurlings took over on the Panthers 47 and eight plays later they hit paydirt.

Campbell did the honors this time, keeping around left end from the 11, with 4:08 still showing on the clock.

Coach Green elected to go for two and the Rebels were successful as Campbell passed to John Roy in the right corner of the end zone for a 14-0 lead.

Brusly's next try at moving the ball failed as TCH linebacker Joe Asby intercepted a Berkley Outmaad pass at the 50 and returned it to the 42.

But, the Panthers were able to halt the Teurlings drive on downs at the 25 for their only defensive effort of the first half.

The Rebels held the Panthers to only three plays again and took over on their own 34.

From there, two Campbell-to-Jonathan Patin

hookups netted 39 yards, bringing the ball down to the 19, after Leblanc had carried twice for four yards.

On the next play, Hebert burst through the right side of the line and took it in for the touchdown with 6:41 left in the first half.

Henry's kick was true, increasing the Rebel lead to an already unmountable 21-0 margin.

After the Panthers were forced to punt again on their next series, the Rebels started the drive that netted their final TD of the first half.

Campbell was again the man-of-the-hour, going around right end from the three, with only 06 showing. Henry's kick was again true to up the count to 28-0 at intermission.

The Rebels now advance to quarterfinal play next week, when they travel to New Orleans to face John Curtis, 25-11 winners of Independence Friday night.

It was John Curtis, defending Class AA champions, that nosed out the Rebels for the top ranking in the state polls this season.

The difference between first and second place spot was only five points as the two teams divided 16 first place votes equally.

Now, once-and-for-all, the football forecasters will find out which team is the best.

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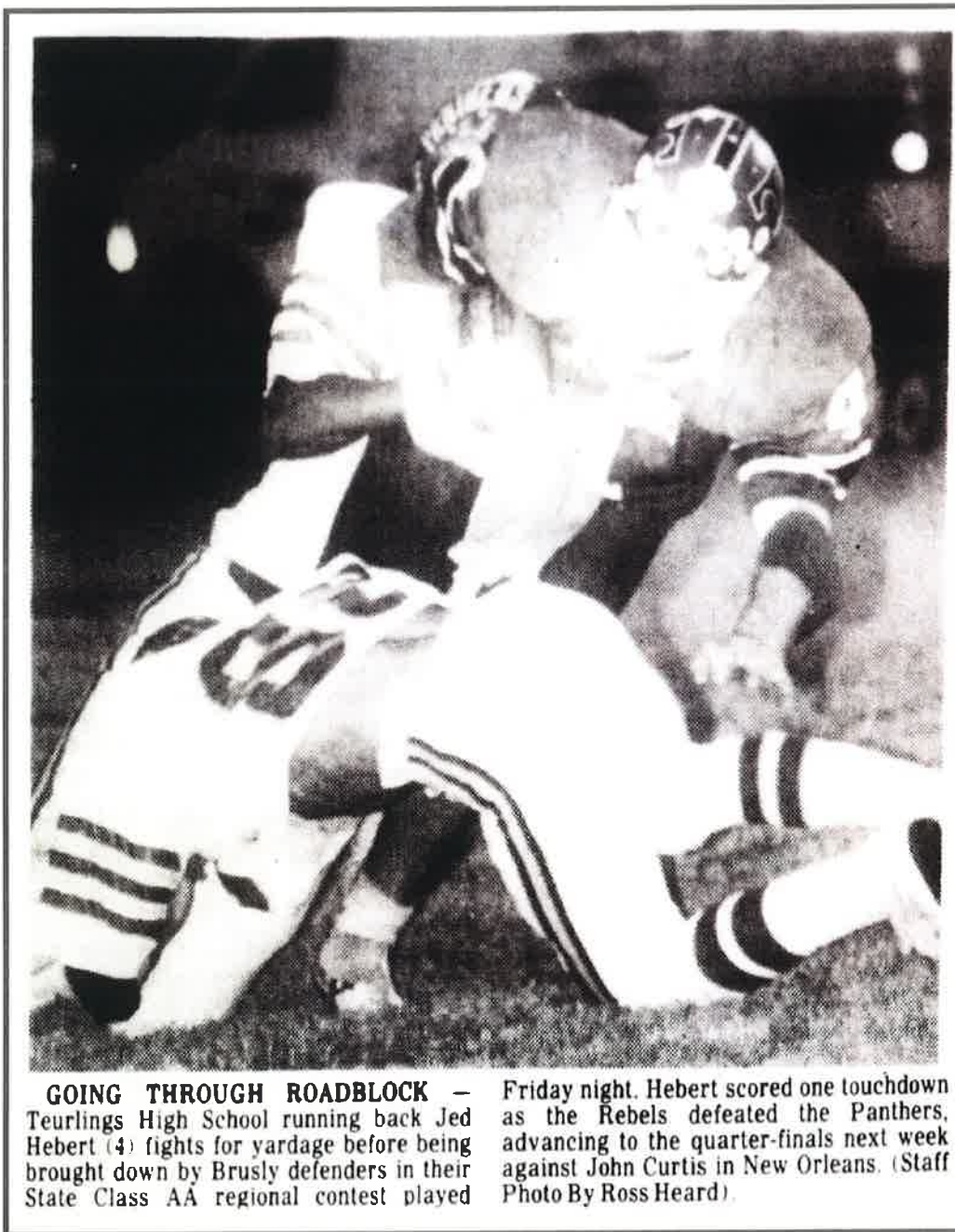

Teurlings has been waiting a long time for this game and the coaches shouldn't have many problems in getting the kids ready to play this week.

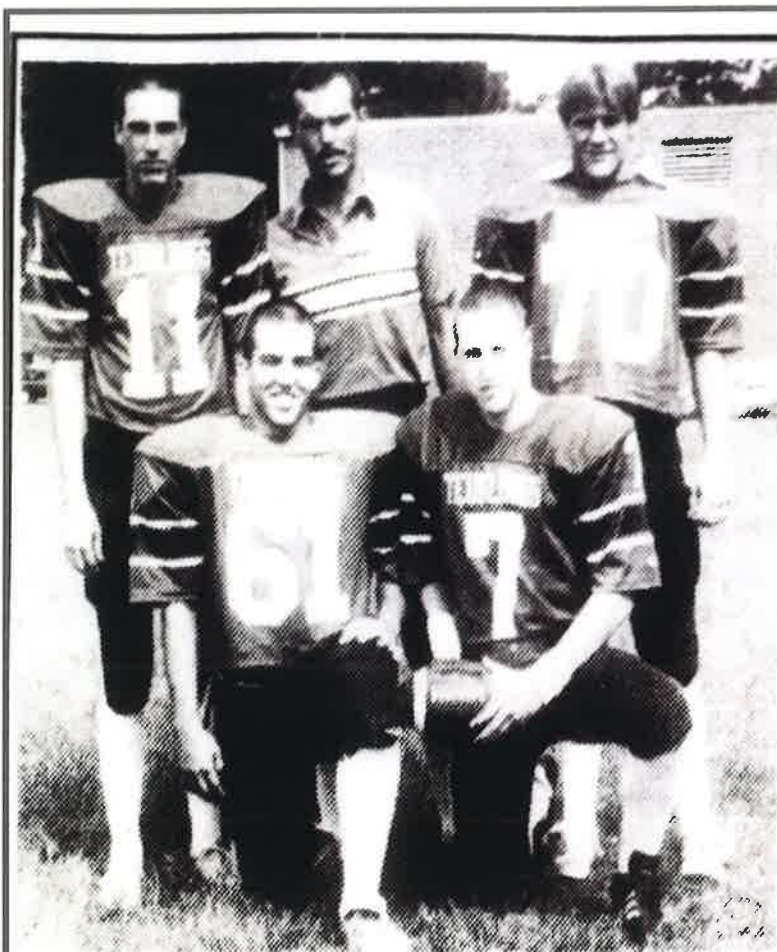

Rebs Road-block For Pats To Repeat

RIVER RIDGE -- If the John Curtis Patriots are to repeat again as the Class AA state champions in football, Head Coach J. T. Curtis knows his team must step over a major hurdle in the Teurlings Rebels this Friday night.

Curtis, whose teams have lost but two games in the last three campaigns, will pit his Patriots against Coach Bobby Green's Rebels at 7:30 at Pan American Stadium in New Orleans' City Park in that quarterfinal showdown.

"To say that they have an outstanding defense would be an understatement," said Curtis of the team that has shut out 11 foes and owns a 404-0 scoring margin in 1982.

"They have the ability to dominate the line of scrimmage from the films we've seen of them. I think the key to the ball game will be our ability to move the ball on them."

The Teurlings offense also drew raves from the veteran Patriot mentor, especially the backfield of quarterback Clint Campbell and running backs Jed Hebert and John Roy.

"Those three do an excellent job coming up with big plays," he said. "Roy has good speed and does a good job blocking, too."

"I think the only way you can bring down the Hebert boy is with a gun, but of course they won't let you bring those into the stadium," he quipped. "We'll just have to get a lot of people around him and hope to bring him down."

Of Campbell, Curtis said, "He has done an awfully good job for them, both running and passing the ball. He, obviously, is the key to the game for their offense against our defense."

Curtis, whose search for a suitable stadium for this week's game was a determined one, also offered a scouting report on his own 10-1 squad.

"We are a young team offensively, and that is our biggest concern going up against a team like Teurlings. We have 10 new starters on offense, and we are inexperienced. We've been run-oriented, but we have had a fully balanced attack."

Randy Bechel (junior quarterback) is a good thrower and runner. Our running backs are sophomores Richard Parker and Bruce Soileau, and junior Danny Micheal.

"Parker has been our leading rusher with about 680 yards, and all three have been averaging over five yards per carry. Soileau has been slowed by an injury."

Out with an injury is starting tight end John Miller, who had caught 19 passes before suffering a broken ankle last week against Independence. "John has done a good job for us," said Curtis, "and replacing him is a problem. We will miss him. The replacement will be any number of people, from 160 pounds to 195."

"The only player back on offense from last year is one of our tackles, Tom Boyer (6-1, 240). Our guards are about 180 pounds each, our center 185, and our other tackle is 220."

The strength for the Patriot defense is speed. "We're not very big, in fact we're the smallest we've been defensively in the last five years. But we do pursue the football."

The Curtis tackles are 180 and 205, the noseguard 170, and the ends are 170 and 175 pounds. But the coach listed his linebacker and defensive backs as the strength of that unit.

"Darren Marlborough (6-1, 217) and Troy Wetzel (6-1, 200) are our linebackers," he said, "and they've done a good job for us all year long. Our strength is in our linebackers and defensive backs."

"Our free safety, John Paul Young (5-11, 180), and cornerback Eddie Terrell (5-11, 120) are our best backs."

Winning state titles is almost old hat to the John Curtis Patriots, so dominant has their position been in Class AA the last few years. But, that fact hasn't stopped their coach from working them every bit as hard this week as they always have - if not harder.

J. T. Curtis didn't get to be a state championship coach by overlooking many details, let alone a major hurdle like the imposing Rebels of Teurlings. Pan American Stadium should be packed for the long-awaited showdown between the two.

Heading the Rebels' prowess this season has been senior quarterback Clint Campbell.

The talented signal caller will be joined in the backfield by Jeff Hebert and sophomore sensation Troy LeBlanc.

Catching most of Campbell's pass this year has been tight end Mark Zimmerman, split end Joe Boudreaux and flanker Gary Geramo.

Forming the heart of the blocking up front are center Fred Latier, guards Joe Ashy and Kevin Boudreaux, and tackles Chad Habeltz and Jay Hebert.

Anchoring the tough Rebel defensive unit are the Hebert twins at the tackle slots, and Boudreaux at noseguard.

Forming the trio up front are Zimmerman and Habeltz at the ends, with Ashy and Charles Cunningham being the linebackers.

The deep backs are John Roy and Patti at the corners, and Geramo and Chad Peltier are the safeties.

Randy Becnel, a 5-10, 165-pound junior, calls the signals for the Patriots, completing 61 of 119 passes on the season, for 990 yards and 11 TD's.

Becnel is joined in the backfield by sophomore Richard Parker, who hit paydirt 11 times during the 1982 campaign, Danny Michael, who had 490 yards and four TD's, and Bruce Soltau, who tallied three touchdowns and rushed for 491 strides.

Heading the aerial attack for the Patriots is flanker Frank Lalliche, who had 21 catches and three tallies on the year, split end Tony Barcelona (14 grabs, 3 TD's) and tight end Troy Wetzel.

Don Bedley snaps the ball for John Curtis and he is aided by guards Barry Eltridge and Brian St. Cyr and 6-2, 220-pound junior left tackle Al Knight and 6-1, 245-pound right tackle Tom Boyer.

Headhunters on the defensive side of the ledger are linebackers Wetzel and Darren Marlborough, the leading tacklers on the team this year.

Leading the line charge are ends Mike Muria and Chris Galliano, tackles Craig Gardner and Jeff Arcement and noseguard Louis Ugalde.

Providing the umbrella coverage are cornerbacks Eddie Tourelle and Terry Sabella and safeties Eric Dubroc and John Paul Young.

E. D. WHITE— NOTRE DAME

This game will feature two teams with plenty of similarity, both offensively and defensively.

The reason is that Cardinal head man Preston Lejeune was at Notre Dame for a number of years, before taking over the reins at the Thibodaux parochial school.

Both teams run from the Power I on offense and line up in a straight 3-4 alignment on the defensive side of the line.

Junior signal caller Bryan Williams has been running the show for the Pioneers the last five games, taking over for the injured Stephen Moody.

Tailback Mark Prevost and fullback Tarrence Martin join with Williams to form a capable offensive threat.

Split end Alan Cassidy, tight end Craig Zaubrecher and flanker John Gassen are the Notre Dame wideouts.

Gary Joubert is the Pioneer center and he is joined in the front wall by guards Chris Baella and Mike Thibodeaux and tackles John Whiting and Craig Venable.

Spearheading the defensive charge for Coach Cassidy's troops are tackle Scott Brunsart, noseguard Chad Marks, linebacker Al Baella and cornerback Steven Boulet.

"Notre Dame has a real good solid football team," evaluated Coach Lejeune. "They are a well-coached team and don't make many mistakes—a typical Notre Dame football team."

"They play solid defense, have a good running attack and a good passing attack when Stephen Moody is healthy."

On his game plan, Coach Lejeune said, "We will just do what we do best, run the ball and hope that we can contain their running attack."

Quarterback Louis Authement, a 5-10, 160-pound senior, completed 26 of 56 pass attempts on the year, for 900 yards and five touchdowns.

Leading the ground-oriented Cardinal attack is left halfback George Robinson, who rushed for 900 yards and eight touchdowns this season.

The talented runner teams with right halfback Craig Gauthier (550-12) and Bruce Lejeune (400) and fullback Will Carrier.

Opening the holes in the offensive line are linker Tim Morvant, guards Mike Richard and Doug Robichaux and tackles Stuart Knight (6-2, 290 Sr.) and Jace Guidry (6-2, 220 Sr.).

Manning the flanks for the Cardinals are Bryan LeBlanc and left end Troy Rodrigue.

Monster back Lejeune was the top tackler on the team with 90, followed by end Owen Canlies with 64.

End Jeff Lantre had 13 stops, while safety Clint Coustant led the deep backs in interceptions with 12.

REBS END OUTSTANDING YEAR

Pats Top Teurlings

NEW ORLEANS — The streak ended, and then the bubble burst here Friday night at Pan American Stadium, as the 1982 football season came to an end for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

Coach Bobby Green's Rebels, who compiled a remarkable record of not allowing a point in 11 contests this year en route to the Class AA high school quarterfinals, finally met their match and fell 26-8 to defending champ John Curtis.

After so much glory, Friday night's loss before a packed house was a bitter pill to swallow for a team outnumbered 60-34 on the roster and 8-3 in the coaching staffs.

In the final analysis, two key factors pelled the difference and allowed six-time champion Curtis to advance to the semifinals against Jonesboro-Hodge next week.

The first factor was platooning. While most of the Rebel players went both ways, only Troy Wetzel (light end and linebacker) had that double duty for the depth-blessed Patriot team.

Secondly, the Patriot defense, relatively unheralded entering the game despite five shutouts of its own, showed itself to be every bit as stingy as the Rebels — especially on the ground where the Rebs could only net but 69 yards in 31 carries.

Factor number one helped factor number two become more and more effective as the night wore on, as the stifling Patriot defense forced the Rebels to the air and into errors down the stretch.

Teurlings' remarkable defense was punctured for the first time this year with 1:59 to play in the first half, as field position jockeying set up the home team for its first score.

But, despite that shock and a 7-0 halftime deficit, the Rebels were within range had they mustered more offense in the third stanza. It was during that period that Curtis mounted a 19-0 advantage — enough to hold back the visitors for the win.

To their credit, the Rebels did not approach folding. Instead they turned in two vital series that threatened the champs' security in the fourth period. First, John Roy pounced on a Richard Parker fumble at the Patriot 34 with 9:44 left in the game.

Clint Campbell then rolled left and spotted tight end Chad Peltier streaking behind the coverage. Campbell's bomb found its target at the 10 and Peltier zoomed in for the score 9:27 from game's end.

When Campbell hit Roy for the two-point conversion, it was suddenly 19-8 and two TD's would win it.

Teurlings held on downs, Darren Mury knocking down a long pass intended for Tony Barcelona on third down, and Peltier scooted 11 yards to his 28 with the ensuing punt return.

But Curtis cornerback Eric Dubroc picked off Campbell's first pass, intended for Joel Hebert, and five plays later the Patriots had driven 29 yards to a clinching touchdown —

quarterback Randy Becnel doing the honors from the one.

It was Becnel who teamed with Wetzel to snap the string of scoreless efforts in 1982 by TCHS foe, Eddie Tourelle had returned a Rebel punt 16 yards to the Reb 30 in the second period two plays before Becnel, running away from containment, spotted Wetzel slicing across the middle and hit him for a 29-yard TD that made it 7-0 at half.

Earlier, Johnathon Palin had picked off one Becnel pass in Rebel territory and Wetzel had let a sure TD aerial slip through his hands in the Teurlings end zone in the first quarter.

A second pickoff of Becnel by Palin gave the Rebs a shot at points as the half ended, but Noel Henry's 46-yard field goal was wide left.

Curtis converted a Campbell fumble at his 23 into quick third quarter points, needing just four plays to get a touchdown with Danny Michael zipping 10 yards behind crisp blocking to make it 13-0.

Parker's 26-yard run to the TCHS 40 sparked the next Curtis possession, one which culminated in a one-yard Becnel plunge to 19-0 with 1:20 left in the third quarter.

After the home team made it 26-8, Campbell was intercepted again, and Patriot Head Coach J.T. Curtis had backup Rick Spooner at the controls as the Pats reached the eight before giving the ball over.

At that point (1:52 to go), Campbell's running (50 yards) and passing (four to Peltier) mounted one last surge before the clock ran out on the brilliant 1982 Rebel season.

Campbell finished with 42 yards on 18 thrusts, and hit nine of 21 passes for 85 yards in a valiant swan song with Teurlings.

Curtis rushed for 241 yards on 45 tries, with Michael (15-96-1), Parker (17-86-0), and Becnel (13-60-2) the main culprits.

In the end, it was too many Patriots and not enough Rebels, as Green's troops finish 11-1 and with that amazing scoring margin of 412-26.

Kevin Boudreaux (nine tackles), Joe Ashy (seven), and Charles Cunningham (six) led Rebel tacklers with Jed and Jay Hebert getting five apiece. For Curtis, Kirk Russell (seven tackles, one interception) led the way to victory.

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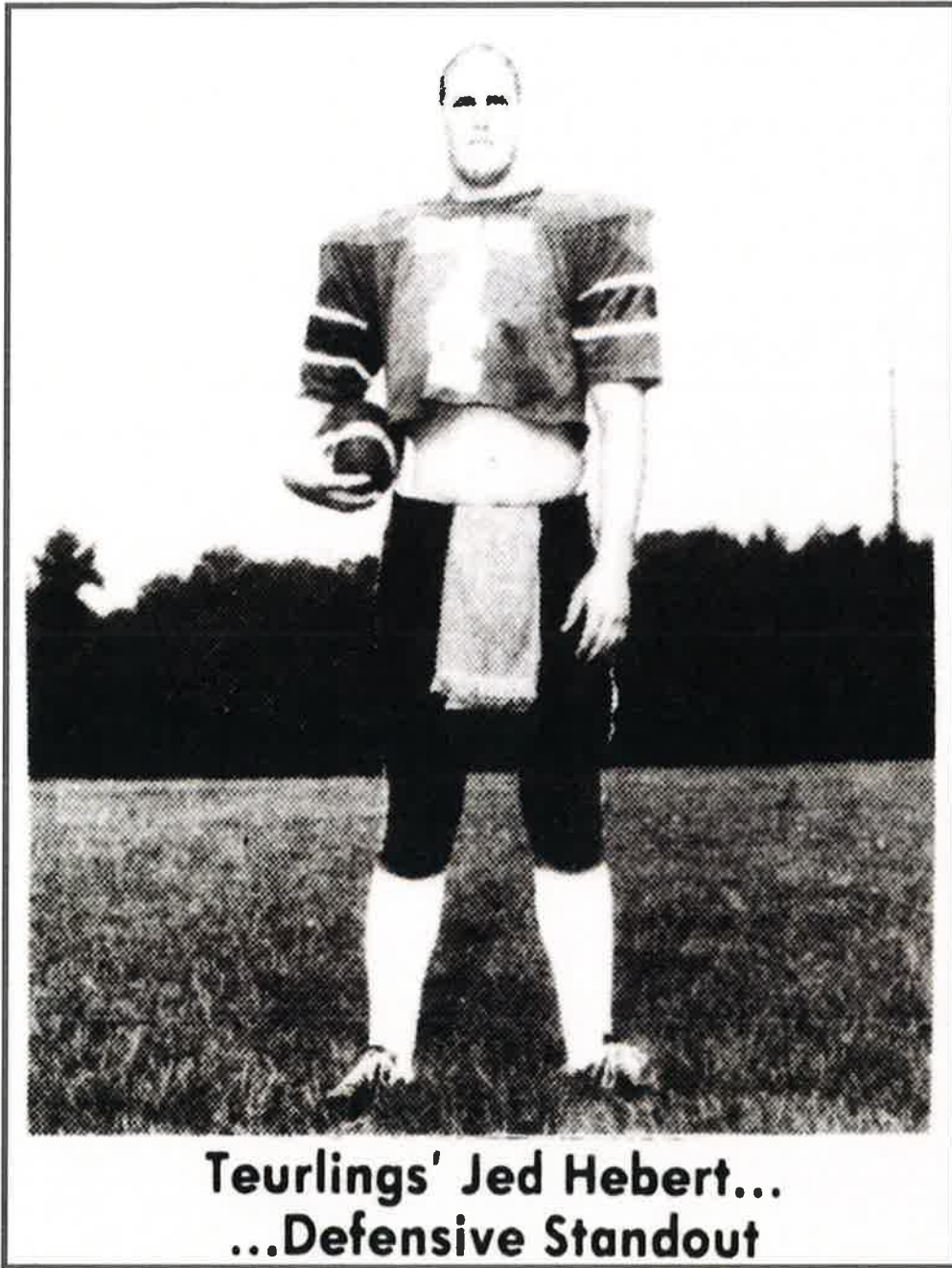

Rebels Dominate AA All-State

Nathaniel Williams and Keith Woodside live only about 10 miles apart in Concordia Parish. If they attended the same high school, defenses would probably surrender before the game began.

Unless, of course, they

were playing Teurlings and the Hebert brothers, Jed and Jay.

Williams of Ferriday set state career rushing, touchdown and scoring records while Woodside of Vidalia broke the single-season rushing mark this year. The Hebert twins headed a Teurlings defense that shut out 11 straight

opponents. Their accomplishments are the highlight of the 1982 Louisiana Sports Writers Association's Class AA All-State Football Team.

Williams, a 5-foot-9, 171-pound senior tailback was selected as the Outstanding Offensive Player for the second straight year while Jed Hebert, a 6-1, 230-pound senior tackle, was named the Defensive MVP.

In 11 games, Williams rushed for 2,145 yards and scored 34 touchdowns plus 26 two-point conversions for 256 points. That below the state record 42 TDs and 300 points he got in 13 games as a junior, but his career total of 90 touchdowns and 660 points places Williams at No. 5 on the all-time National list in both categories. His career rushing total was 5,376 yards. Woodside couldn't match Williams' career stats, but he did better his District 4-AA rival this season, rushing for 2,217 yards in 11 games. Woodside, a 6-0, 190-pound senior, was no slouch as scoring either as he wound up with 32 touchdowns plus a pair of conversions for 136 points.

Jed Hebert led the Rebels with 57 solo tackles and 28 assists. He had 10 quarterback sacks and five other stops behind the line. Brother Jay had 33 solo tackles, 20 assists, 14 CBs and eight sacks. Jed also started at fullback while Jay was an offensive tackle.

Coach-of-the-Year honors went to Bobby Green of Teurlings, whose Rebels outscored their regular-season opposition 369-0 and also blanked Brusly in the first round of the playoffs before losing to finalist John Curtis. The Rebels allowed only 108 yards per game total offense and had 20 pass interceptions.

Green, 28, is in his second year as a head coach. Teurlings went 6-4 under his guidance in 1981.

In addition to the Hebert brothers, Teurlings had three other players named to the team, defensive end Mark Zimmerman, guard Kevin Boudreaux and quarterback Clint Campbell.

John Curtis, whose string of state championships was stopped at three by Winnfield, had three selections, while the state champion Tigers managed only one first-teamer, linebacker Marcel Mills.

Mills missed most of Winnfield's 23-14 championship game victory over Curtis, suffering a broken arm in the second period, but the 5-11, 210-pound senior had a lot to do with his team's getting there, averaging 12 tackles per game out of his middle linebacker spot.

Winnfield did have two honorable mention picks, running back Perry Myles and offensive tackle Glen Nelson.

Curtis' three selections were tackle Tom Boyer, linebacker Troy Wetzel and kicking specialist Darren Malbrough.

Wetzel, a 6-2, 205-pound senior had 91 total tackles, 51 of the solos, three fumble recoveries and four interceptions, two of which he returned for touchdowns as the Patriots went 13-2, falling nine points short of their sixth state title in the last eight years.

Boyer, a 6-0, 245-pound senior, was the top blocker on the Curtis offensive line while Malbrough, 1 6-2, 225-pound senior, kicked four

field goals and 24 extra points while also earning all-district honors as a linebacker alongside Wetzel.

Rounding out the offense are tight end Eddie Cline of McCall, wide receiver Farrington Johnson of Winnboro, tackle Mike McCall of Independence, guard Vince Crain of Jonesboro, center Rayford Fontenot of Welsh and running back David Dietz of Iota.

Other defensive selections were end Brian Riley of Independence, noseguard Walter Johnson of Ferriday, linebacker Craig Zaunbracher of Notre Dame and defensive backs Michael Bell of Vidalia, Chet Constant of E.D. White and Paul Becnel of River Oaks.

McCall's Cline, 1 6-1, 205-pound senior had 33 receptions for 691 yards and eight touchdowns for the District 2-AA champions. Johnson, 1 5-10, 150-pound senior averaged an impressive 28 yards per reception, turning his 27 catches into 931 yards and six TDs.

May, a 5-10, 230-pound senior, was a three-year all-district pick for Independence, which as a perfect 10-0 during the regular season. Boudreaux, a 5-9, 190-pound senior, was rated the quickest lineman at Teurlings while Crain, a 5-10, 185-pound senior, was a two-way all-district choice for playoff quarterfinalist Jonesboro-Hodge.

Fontenot, a 6-0, 178-pound junior, was the top offensive lineman for Welsh, which took the District 6-AA title.

Teulings' Campbell, a 6-2, 185-pound senior, sparked an offense that averaged 36.9 points per game by rushing for 1,152 yards and 16 touchdowns while completing 35 of 70 passes for 770 yards and nine more scores.

Dietz of Iota, a 5-11, 190-pound senior, averaged 8.2

yards per carry and gained 1,603 yards while scoring 32 touchdowns. A 3.9 student, Dietz was also an all-district choice at linebacker.

Ferriday's Johnson is the only returning all-state defensive choice. The 6-0, 198-pound senior noseguard averaged 15 tackles per game to lead a defensive unit that allowed only 53 points in the regular season.

The big play was a specialty of Independence's Riley, a 5-10, 170-pound senior who had 14 fumble recoveries, two of which he picked off in the air and returned for touchdowns. Riley had 88 total tackles. Teurlings' Zimmerman, a 6-1, 185-pound junior, played alongside the Heberts, but managed to get in on 54 total tackies, six behind the line.

LeJeune, one of two picks

from semifinalist E.D. White, is a 5-10, 175-pound senior who had 106 total tackles. His teammate in the secondary, Constant, is a 6-0, 165-pound senior who had 31 tackles and 18 assists in this team's five district games.

Bell of Vidalia, a 5-10, 155-pound senior, was all over the field as a free safety. He was in on 84 total tackles and had eight interceptions. Bell was also his team's quarterback.

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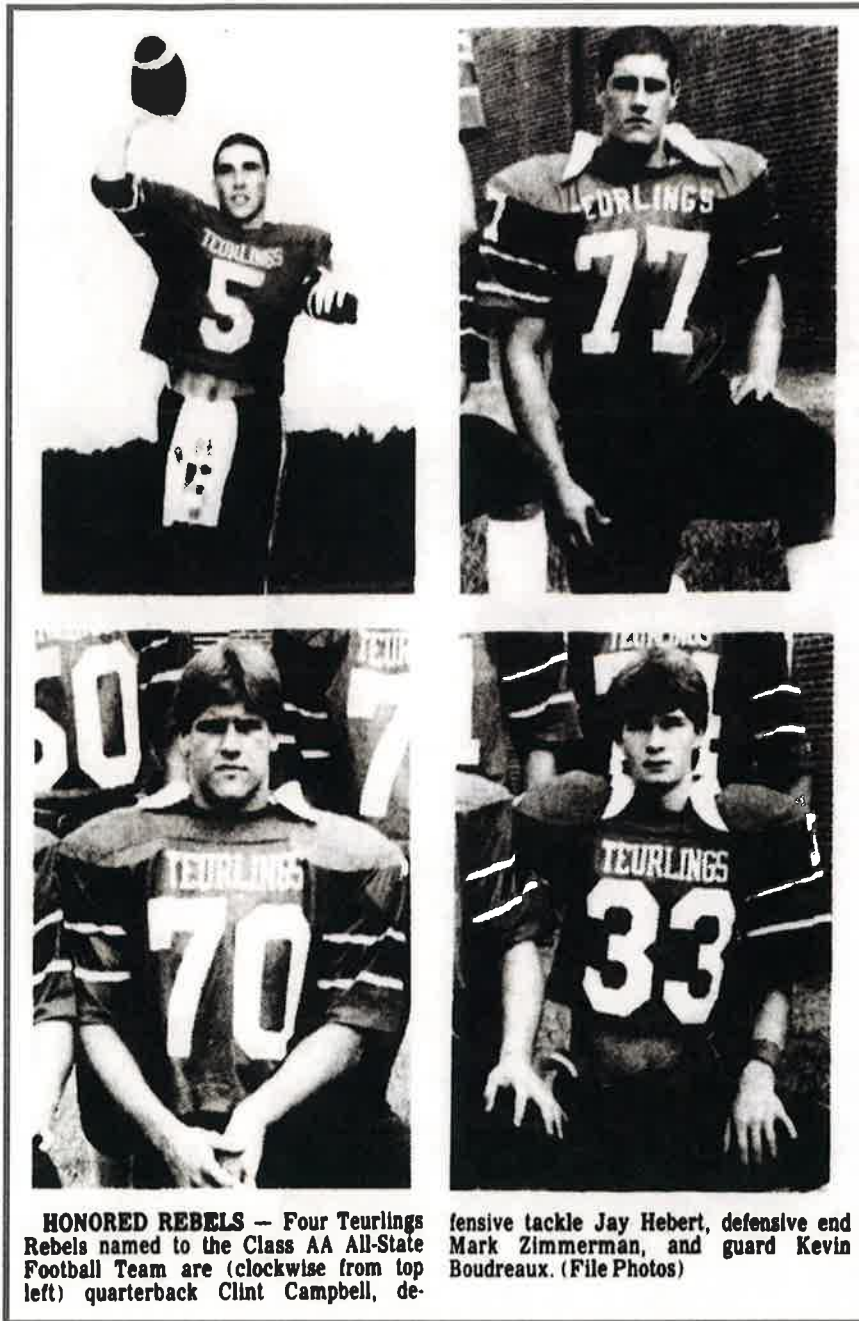
Also nominated for Coach of the Year were Doug Moreau of state champion Winnfield and Preston LeJeune of E.D. White.
