

Moss' touchdown run lifts Teurlings

FRANKLIN — Joey Moss scored on a three-yard run in the second half to give the Teurlings Catholic Rebels a 6-0 shutout win over the Hanson Tigers in the final game of the All-Catholic Jamboree here at Hanson Memorial.

Moss finished the game with 62 yards rushing on eight carries and Reggie Trosclair added 32 yards on eight attempts.

Quarterback Kyle Stutes had a few passes dropped, and finished with 1-of-8 completions for 16 yards. The pass was also completed to Moss.

Hanson's Clint Martin led his team with 64 yards rushing on 15 attempts.

Catholic High of New Iberia got a strong performance from quarterback Mike Haik and went on to

defeat the Central Catholic Eagles 14-11 in the first game of Friday night's All-Catholic Jamboree.

Haik scored on runs of 10 and 15 yards in the second half as the Panthers erased a 3-0 Central halftime lead.

Haik finished the game with 62 yards rushing on seven carries, while Ryan Minville had 46 yards and Bjhan French added 31.

Central's Brett Bailey led with 56 yards on three attempts and Jeremy Hoffpauir had 11 yards. Hoffpauir also threw the ball well, completing eight passes for 89 yards.

Sonny Charpentier has always been known as a basketball coach, and a pretty good one at that.

He enjoyed much success as Teurlings' head coach the last seven years, advancing to the semifinals in 1994.

But while admittedly enjoyed coaching basketball, he didn't like being away from his family as much as he was. Especially during the Christmas holidays, a time when high school teams play many games.

With that in mind, he didn't hesitate to jump at a chance to coach the Rebels' football team when last year's coach Greg Tabell, transferred to St. Thomas More at mid-term.

"That was a big part in the decision," said Charpentier. "I wanted to be able to spend more time with my family around the holidays, and with basketball season it was tough. Football requires a lot of work as well, but the season's not as long."

It's not like Charpentier will be going down a totally unfamiliar road. He was Teurlings' offensive coordinator in Jake

Delhomme's final two seasons and also coached then-Central Lafourche quarterback Tommy Hodson in the mid-80s. He also began his high school coaching at Hanson Memorial 16 years ago, learning the trade under legendary coach Dick McCloskey.

"I've been very fortunate to work under some pretty good people," said Charpentier. "Learning under (McCloskey) was a real honor, the man really knew the game. And then working with kids like Delhomme and Hodson was also a lot of fun. I tried to help them and hopefully I did, but I also probably learned a thing or two from them as well."

Charpentier inherits a Teurlings squad which went 1-9 last year, that while competing in district 8-2A. They move over to 7-2A this season which is probably a bit easier than 8-2A was last year.

"It may be, but it's still not a bad district," said Charpentier. "I'm kind of looking at Port Barre and Mamou as the teams to beat. I know they were last year. Both of them are almost always good and this year should be no different. We're just

looking to improve each day and hopefully we can be competitive in the district."

Leading the attack for Teurlings will be senior tailback Joey Moss (6-2, 185), who rushed for 414 yards last year which included a 162-yard effort against Redemptorist, which turned out to be their only win.

Another key player back in the offense is junior quarterback Kyle Stutes (6-1, 170).

"Kyle has some ability, he can become a good quarterback," said

Charpentier. "We're very fortunate to have him back as well. We're planning on mixing things up offensively, a good 50-50 run-throw balance would be ideal."

The other returning starter on offense is center Matt Roberts (5-10, 165, Jr.).

Moss will also start at free safety, while the other returnees will be linebacker Robbie Richard (5-11, 216, Sr.), cornerbacks Dennis Skains (5-10, 165, Sr.) and Ryker Melancon (5-10, 155, Sr.) and defensive tackle Jake Benoit (5-9, 155, Sr.).

Rebels' Moss driven to end career in style

Teurlings Catholic's Joey Moss has had to endure his share of losing over his first three years. As far as he's concerned, it's definitely time to change things around.

He would like nothing better than make his senior season one to remember. A winning record would be a nice start.

"That's what I really want, I want to finish my senior year with a winning record," he said. "It's been tough, the last few years. I felt like we could've done better, but we just couldn't seem to get everybody on the same page. I think we'll be able to do that this year."

Moss has a new head coach in Sonny Charpentier, who has moved over from basketball and replaced Greg Tidwell as head coach. Moss thinks the move could pay dividends.

"I'm not saying Coach Tidwell wasn't good because I thought he was, but I thought it might be best for the change," said Moss. "So far practice has gone real well. A lot of people thought it was kind of like a joke when he (Charpentier) was named coach of football, but he really seems to know what he's doing. I can tell he's had a pretty good background in football, probably learned under some good coaches."

Moss finished as Teurlings' leading ground gainer last year

and will be a main figure again this year. That is a responsibility he is more than ready for.

"I'll do whatever they ask of me, I just want to win more games," he said. "I thought I did okay last year, but I also thought I could've done better. This year I know I'll gain more yards, score more touchdowns."

In addition to playing tailback, Moss will double as a starting safety and sees no problem with playing both ways.

"I like it," he said. "I do have to be in pretty good condition because you're out there practically the whole game. But I'm in great shape. We had a good summer workout program and it's definitely made me and the other guys a lot stronger and probably a bit faster. I can't wait to get out there in a game and see how much I'm improved."

Teurlings moves over to district 7-2A this season and will play the likes of Port Barre and Mamou. Those two teams battled for the district title last year with Mamou winning it. While they are both good teams, the district is not overwhelming, meaning the Rebels may be thinking playoffs after all.

"I think we'll surprise some people, I really do," said Moss. "We have some good players and we have a good coaching staff. We know we'll have to playing some good teams, but we'll be improved from last year. If we play like we're capable, I don't see why we

can't make the playoffs.

"I just think our overall attitude is better, we're much more positive," he added. "And I think

that's what we needed. We can't go out there thinking 'maybe we can win.' We have to go out there 'knowing we can'. Even though a

lot of the game is physical, it's also a big mental game. If one team has the other psyched out, there's no way that team will beat them."

Rams, Rebels open with big wins

SCOTT — The big question for the Acadiana Rams entering the game was the quarterback position.

Buckley Davis made the job easier on both Grant Hillman and Tim Barrington by returning the opening kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown.

The rest of the team followed in plastering Brother Martin 35-7 in the season opener at Ram Stadium Friday night.

Brother Martin attempted to make a game out of it when Blair Bauvier answered with a one-yard TD run to tie it at 7-7 at the half, but it wasn't even close after that point.

Davis' big return proved even larger when you consider that Acadiana could come up with just one first down and 14 yards in the first half due to Brother Martin controlling the clock.

The Rams began to get it together offensively in the second half, however. They got back on top by driving 80 yards on 14 plays, culminating in Bomani Henry's two-yard touchdown run to give Acadiana the lead for good.

Casey Arceneaux then recovered a fumble at the Brother Martin 36 and

things were started to look good for the Rams. Barrington ran for 22 yards to set up a Hillman three-yard TD run for a 21-7 lead.

Henry was back at it for the Rams in the third period, breaking off runs of 26 and 36 yards to spark a 70-yard scoring drive that ended up in a Davis 10-yard touchdown run and a 28-7 lead.

Barrington wouldn't score, but once again aided in a scoring drive with a 26-yard touchdown run to set up Hillman's 35-yard touchdown pass to Ryan Driscoll for the 35-7 final.

The Rams, who host Istrouma next Friday, ended up with 359 total yards, while limiting the Crusaders to 209 total yards.

Henry was the big gun for Acadiana, rushing for 134 yards on 15 carries, while Ricky Littled added 30 yards on six tries.

The Sonny Charpentier Era at Teurlings Catholic is rolling along just fine thank you. After the first week anyway.

Charpentier's Rebels jumped out to a 27-0 halftime advantage and simply cruised to a 29-2 triumph over Berwick in the season opener for both clubs Friday night at Clark Field.

As expected, Joey Moss was the big star for Teurlings. He got things started for the Rebels with a four-yard touchdown run for the eventual game-winner in the first, before running in the two-point conversion for an 8-0 lead.

Then after Reggie Trosclair made it 14-0 on a three-yard scoring run, Moss was at it again when he hauled in a 34-yard touchdown pass from Kyle Stutes.

Stutes then began to feel the hot hand, hitting Corey LeBlanc on a 49-yard TD pass just before half for the dominating victory.

Stutes would finish the game by hitting seven of 11 passes for 122 yards and two touchdowns.

Moss finished the contest with 96 yards rushing on nine carries and caught two balls for 51 yards. Trosclair added 23 yards on five tries. Ryan Gravouia also got into the act with three receptions for 25 yards.

Charpentier, Bergeron notch wins

Sonny Charpentier has coached and won football games prior to Friday night's 29-2 season-opening victory over Berwick in his head football coaching debut at Teurlings Catholic.

So he didn't get any extra special personal satisfaction from the win. In no way, though, is he downsizeing the impact an opening win had his club.

"I've coached and won football games before as an offensive coordinator and the satisfaction of winning isn't really that different," Charpentier said. "I was real happy for the kids, though. This group of seniors has been through a lot. They needed a win like this."

"We played well in the first half. The kids were focused and did pretty much what they wanted to do. A win's a win, so I was pleased."

In fact, the Rebels encountered a problem they hadn't had to deal with in quite a while after jumping out to a 27-0 halftime lead.

"We didn't play that well in the second half," Charpentier said. "It got a little sloppy. The kids weren't used to dealing with that. But they knew what was going. They played a poor second half and they didn't run off the field jumping up and down when the game was over."

Charpentier, however, had to admit that being the head coach is different in other ways.

"I have a little more respect for head football coaches," he said. "There's just so many little things you have to concern yourself with that you don't have to worry about as the offensive coordinator."

Joey Moss certainly earned the respect of Berwick, running six times for 96 yards and a touchdown and caught two passes for 51 yards and another score.

"Joey ran the ball hard," Charpentier said. "He had some nice holes to run through. I thought the offensive line did a nice job. Joey also caught a few passes."

Quarterback Kyle Stutes, meanwhile, turned in some big pass plays, hitting Moss on a 34-yard TD pass and Corey LeBlanc on a 49-yarder for a score.

"Kyle played well," Charpentier said. "He throws a nice pass. He's going to be a good quarterback. I think he was seven of nine in the first half, and he only threw one interception. We're going to have to capability of throwing it this year."

Teurlings now hosts Delcambre in week two.

"It's going to be a little tougher next week," Charpentier said. "Delcambre's got a better team."

Ironically, the positive vibes for rookie Head Coach Keith Bergeron actually began last Thursday after his Rayne Wolves were soundly defeated 24-0 by Iota in the jamboree.

"I was a little worried after the game," Bergeron said. "But when we got back to the school, a bunch of the kids stay to do some extra running. They knew we hadn't play well at all. It wasn't a bunch of big things against Iota. We were just so young on defense."

Apparently, it paid off. The Wolves wasted no time rebounding from the disappointing jamboree by smashing Church Point 29-6 in the season opener Friday.

"It was real upbeat for the kids," Bergeron said. "I had a good feeling about our chances going into the game. I knew we had more speed on defense than they had, and I felt like our defense was going to improve."

"The big difference definitely was the defense playing better. I think they were a little embarrassed by what happened in the jamboree."

The defense certainly spearheaded Bergeron's first-ever win, limiting Church Point to 141 total yards, but the offense did its part also.

"Robbie LeBlanc and Zac Zaunbrecher ran the ball real well and the offensive line did a much better job," Bergeron said. "Iota did some things to us that had our linemen thinking a lot and they weren't able to be real aggressive. We were a lot more aggressive this week."

LeBlanc led the Wolves' rushing attack with 83 yards on 11 carries.

"The win felt good," Bergeron said. "The program needed this win. The kids never really got down after the jamboree. They had an excellent week of practice and were real focused for the game."

The individual that turned in the biggest plays, though, was David Freeman, who helped Rayne jump out to a 14-0 halftime lead with interception returns of 51 and 35 yards in the first half, not to mention making three catches for 31 yards.

"It was the first game he started for us at free safety," Bergeron said. "He definitely has the potential to make the big play. He always seems to be in the right

place at the right time."

And for several Rayne Wolves that was running sprints in an empty football stadium after a humbling loss last Thursday evening.

Junior quarterback Kevin Malbrough completed 19 of 39 passes for 375 yards and five touchdowns with no interceptions, while Michael Hayes filled in for the injured Ron Payne with 10 receptions for 203 yards and two touchdowns, including an 81-yard scoring effort on his first catch.

If the name sounds familiar, it should be. Frederick Lewis used to be the speed threat at Jeanerette. Now he's the same scary back at Franklin and through one game, he's off to a great start, rushing for 167 yards on 20 carries with touchdown runs of 58 and 15 yards.

In the all-around category, Teurlings Catholic's Joey Moss ran it nine times for 96 yards and a touchdown and also caught two passes for 51 yards and a 34-yard touchdown grab. Also, Comeaux's Chris Williams had 15 carries for 80 yards and caught four balls for 63 more yards.

Other stellar offensive outings were turned in by: St. Edmund's Brad Fontenot (24-228, 2 TDs; 1-5, 1 TD), Opelousas Catholic's Scott Edwards (26-169), St. Thomas More's Javon Walker (16-153, 2

TDs), Port Barre's Ashley Robin (18-143, 2 TDs), Patterson's Jerome Johnson (7-142, 1 TD), CCMC's Willie Sheppard (24-136, 3 TDs), Notre Dame's Brent LeJeune (15-132, 2 TDs), Acadiana's Bomani Henry (15-134, 1 TD), Erath's Chris Landry (25-132), Kaplan's Quentin Trahan (20-122, 2 TDs), Jeanerette's Kamian Williams (16-121, 1 TD), Cecilia's Corey Jackson (12-118, 1 TD) and Eunice's Andre Allison (11-115, 1 TD).

■ Also shining defensively was Teurlings Catholic's Justin Dugas, who led the Rebels to a season-opening 29-2 victory over Berwick. Dugas' contribution was a big one with four solo tackles, six assists, one tackle behind the line, three hurries on the quarterback and three caused fumbles.

The Rebels will be counting on Joey Moss once again. Moss rushed for 96 yards on nine carries, and caught two passes for 51 yards a touchdown. Kyle Stutes, meanwhile, hit on seven of 11 passes for 122 yards and two scores.

The Panthers were limited to two first downs and 57 total yards.

Teurlings jumps off to a quick 2-0 start

The significance of Teurlings' Ryker Melancon's touchdown-saving tackle of Delcambre's Darik Darby on the opening play of the game seemed to go unnoticed after the Rebels posted a 26-0 victory.

However, both head coaches begged to differ.

"That first play of the game really showed the type of effort we are looking for in this team," said first-year Teurlings Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "He (Darby) could have easily scored, but the kid (Melancon) ran him down. Then we get the penalty and the turnover right after. That definitely was a big play for us."

Delcambre High's Mike Delcambre agreed with Charpentier that the first series of the game was pivotal.

"When we didn't score off that big play to start the game," said Delcambre, "it took something out of us. It was important that we score on that drive because we haven't scored yet this year. We have the ball first-and-goal on the 3-yard line, and go backwards from there with the penalty and the turnover."

Speaking of turnovers, the two teams combine for 10 — seven of which belonged to the Panthers.

"We're real sloppy right now," conceded Delcambre. "We can't get started on offense. That first possession is a good example of how things are going. We get a big play, generate some momentum,

then make two errors back-to-back. That is how our season is going, but we are young and are going to make mistakes. Hopefully, we can grow from this loss and make some strides heading into district."

After the interception, Teurlings returned the favor by fumbling on its own 27-yard line. However, the Panthers' second chance was short-lived, fumbling away another golden opportunity to score.

Yet, this time the Rebels would not offer the same generosity.

Teurlings capitalized off the turnover with a seven-play, 83-yard drive, culminated on a Reggie Troclair three-yard run. However, the key play of the drive was an 81-yard Joey Moss reception from quarterback Kyle Stutes.

For the game, the Rebels scored 21 points off Panther turnovers.

"A team cannot expect to win turning the ball over like we did," said Delcambre. "We cannot take anything away from Teurlings. They have an outstanding team. They took it to us. They're a big play team and they certainly proved that tonight. That was another difference... we're not as elusive and smooth offensively as they are right now."

The Rebels added another score in the second quarter on a Troclair 34-yard reception from Stutes.

Stutes, despite throwing only two passes in the second half and not playing in the fourth period, completed 11-of-14 passes for 179 yards.

"Quarterbacks have to have a short memory, and Kyle does," said Charpentier. "The kid is mentally tough. He made some bad decisions in the first half, but he came back and did some good things that made up for those miscues. The quarterback's job is to make plays

and he does that."

Teurlings added two touchdowns in the third period to put the game away.

The first came on an impressive opening drive that ended with Stute's second scoring strike.

Stutes hit Corey LeBlanc from seven yards out, while R.T. Delhomme scored from three yards to end the scoring.

"All we're looking for in the kids is effort and attitude," said Charpentier. "That is what we've been preaching all year."

Rebels guard against Trojans' aerial attack

VILLE PLATTE — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels have answered several questions already this season. One that hasn't been brought up just yet is defending the pass.

That comes tonight when Head Coach Sonny Charpentier's 2-0 Rebels travel to meet the 0-2 Sacred Heart of Ville Platte Trojans in a 7 p.m. non-district affair.

"We haven't faced a team yet that wanted to pass No. 1 and No. 2 could pass," Charpentier said. "What we've been telling the kids is that the best pass defense is putting pressure on the quarterback. That's what we've been focusing on."

"We're going to try to do some different stunts to pressure them. I think our defensive backs are going to do a good job too. I feel like we have more overall team speed than they do."

The Rebels have shown the ability to run and pass in jumping out to 2-0. Kyle Stutes has thrown two touchdown passes in each of the first two weeks and is 18 of 25 for 301 yards with three touchdowns and three interceptions.

"Delcambre took away our outside running game, so it was a nice thing to be able to throw the football," Charpentier said. "Kyle has done a nice job of throwing the football so far this season and Joey made a great run after the catch Friday."

The other change is playing on the road the first time.

"That's not a big deal at all," Charpentier said. "The kids will probably be excited to finally get to play on some grass for a change."

While Teurlings' offense has been getting a lot of attention, their defense hasn't been swiss cheese either. Coaches are always harping about takeaways and giveaways and the Rebels had their share of takeaways in last week's surprisingly easy win over the Panthers.

"That concerns me," said Sacred Heart Coach Keith Menard. "Their defense has been impressive. Anytime you can get seven turnovers against a good team like Delcambre, you're doing something right. If we have a problem with turnovers this week, they're beat us bad also. So that's what we've been preaching to the kids. We can't win if we turnover the ball this week."

Sacred Heart's offense has struggled in the early going, scoring only seven points in two games (lost to Opelousas Catholic 12-7, 18-0 to North Central). Turnovers has been a problem with five (three interceptions, two fumbles).

"We have to get our offense on track," said Menard. "Over our first two games, we've had the ball inside our opponents 20-yard line nine times and we've scored only one touchdown. So that's our main focus right now. We have to

score more points if we're going to start winning."

While their offense has been a disappointment, their defense has shined at times.

"Our defense has played well, I've haven't had much to complain about there," added Menard.

"Considering how our offense has struggled our defense has had a lot of pressure on them when they've been out there, but for the most part they've handled it well. But we can't keep them out there all game long. That's why our offense has to come around."

Rebels, Jays meet in battle of unbeatens

■ Teurlings' seniors set tone for memorable 1995 season

When Teurlings Catholic's senior class of nine reflects back at this season, Sonny Charpentier hopes there will be a tremendous sense of pride.

For a group maligned for three seasons, this year's 3-0 start is simply a tribute to the perseverance and determination of Jake Benoit, Dennis Skains, Robbie Richard, Joey Moss, Ryker Melancon, Reggie Trosclair, David Domingue, Jared Latiolais and Greg Boudreaux.

It's also an opportunity to provide a better future for Teurlings football.

"They've made it possible," said Charpentier. "They're doing a good job of not letting everyone get the big head. They've come in real hungry and we have a real good chemistry."

It's something Teurlings hopes to build on when the Rebels play host undefeated and No. 8-ranked St. Ed's tonight at Clark Field. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.

"A lot of it has to do with putting people in the right places and the attitude of the kids has been great," Charpentier said of this team's start. "I couldn't have asked for anything more."

"We're right where we want to be," continued Charpentier.

not. We didn't put in all that hard work to be 0-3. We wanted to be 3-0. They've proven they can win and they've seen how the hard work pays off."

The opposition has certainly taken notice. "Everyone I've talked to and watching them on film ... you can tell they're playing with a lot of confidence," said St. Ed's Head Coach Scotty Richard, now 12-3 in his second year.

"They are doing a great job and you have to give Teurlings a lot of credit. I don't care who you've played, not to give up any points is quite an accomplishment. Their starters have not played in the fourth quarter this year. Hopefully we can make them do it."

While Teurlings has made it look rather easy - outscoring its opponents 94-2 - St. Ed's has encountered a pair of hard-fought victories the past two weeks.

The Blue Jays rallied for a 12-7 win over Opelousas Catholic and held on for a 12-6 verdict over Iota in which Andre Feucht scored both touchdowns.

"We're going into district trying to figure out what kind of team we've got," said Richard. "This is the third straight double-A team we've played in three weeks and it's starting to take

its toll. We're kind of banged up, but I'm anxious to see how the kids play."

Brad Fontenot, one of the state's leading rushers, has carried 67 times for 470 yards and four touchdowns while fullback Kevin Darbonne adds 142 yards on 20 attempts.

Quarterback Josh Andrus has completed 23-of-42 passes for 320 yards and three touchdowns.

Timmy Fontenot is his chief target with 12 catches for 225 yards followed by Brad Fontenot (8-47-1) and Feucht (6-60-1). The Blue Jays will be without starting linebacker and offensive guard Wayne Zaunbrecher who suffered a sprained knee against Iota.

Teurlings has averaged 306 yards per game offensively and allowed only a 100 yards on defense. In a word, the Rebels have been dominant with their defense yet to allow a point this season.

Moss has accounted for 365 (201 rushing, 164 receiving) of Teurlings' 918 offensive yards and has totalled four touchdowns.

Trosclair is next with 18 carries for 151 yards and three touchdowns.

The Rebels' passing game has taken shape with junior quarterback Kyle Stutes completing 22-of-30 passes for 426 yards and six touchdowns. Moss (7-164-2), Ryan Gravouia (4-54-1) and Corey LeBlanc (4-139-3) are Stutes' top receivers.

"When we took over from day one, we wanted to build a program for the long haul ... not for the short term," said Charpentier. "We told the seniors they could be part of something that could be the foundation that they could look back on."

"We didn't set limitations ... we set our goals high," added Charpentier. "We expected to be good ... to win every game we play. We feel the start is a good foundation that will hopefully continue."

Teurlings crushes St. Ed's to maintain perfect start

Teurlings Catholic hadn't given up a point in three games.

So, when St. Edmund rolled 75 yards to score on its first possession here Friday night the Rebels could have gone into the tank.

Instead, Teurlings answered the wakeup call with added resolve and remained unbeaten.

Joey Moss scored three touchdowns, by run, reception and punt return, and Reggie Trosclair added two touchdown runs as the Rebels erupted for five unanswered scores to belt the Blue Jays 35-7 at Clark Field.

Moss tallied on a four-yard run early in the second quarter to pull Teurlings even, then turned in a 50-yard catch-and-run TD from Kyle Stutes and an 80-yard punt return for another second half score to help the Rebels pull away from St. Eds, ranked 8th in Class 1A, in the final two quarters.

The victory moves the Rebels to 4-0 on the year while the Blue Jays fall to 3-1. Teurlings will host 2nd-ranked Notre Dame (4-0) next Friday before opening District 7-2A

action the following week at Livonia.

"We knew we'd get scored on," said first-year coach Sonny Charpentier. "We talked about that. But, the kids reacted as we thought they would. Our defense came up with a stop on their (St. Ed's) second series after we turned the ball over, and that was a big turning point. We could have been down 14-0 very early."

"But, after that our offense got going and we were able to do some good things."

Teurlings spread the wealth on the offensive end as five different players caught passes from Stutes, who was razor-sharp in completing eight of 12 passes for 179 yards and one TD. The Rebels finished with 289 yards in all despite emptying the bench in the fourth quarter.

"We did what we wanted to do on our first drive, take the ball and score," said St. Eds coach Scotty Richard. "But, it didn't seem to faze them (Teurlings). They stuffed it down our throat three times in the first half and we weren't able to recover. Our team seemed to fizzle after that. There were two big plays in the first half

that killed us. Our free safety tipped a near interception and they caught it for a big play, then we went for an interception that led to another big one for them. But, I can't fault our defense in those situation since they're playing aggressively."

Brad Fontenot went in from two yards out to cap a 13-play, 75-yard drive to put the Jays in front 7-0 with 5:46 to go in the first quarter. Fontenot, who finished with 91 yards on 20 carries, gained 41 yards on eight attempts to fuel the march.

The Rebels fumbled the ball away three plays later at their own 41, but the defense held back St. Eds at the 23. From there Teurlings' offense took over.

"We have a lot of weapons and it's difficult for an opponent to stop all phases," noted Charpentier. "A defense has to decide who to try and take away. I think St. Eds came in wanting to take away our outside option and the deep seam. But, we took the underneath stuff."

"I thought our offensive line did a great job protecting Kyle. I don't think they (St. Eds) came close to getting to him."

Moss' short run tied the game at 7-all with 11:13 showing in the second quarter to cap a seven-play, 77-yard drive. The Rebels then went 53 yards in nine plays on their next series to grab a 14-7 edge on Trosclair's two-yard run with 5:11 left.

The hosts marched 64 yards in seven plays to put another one on the board with 16 seconds left in the half on Trosclair's one-yard dive.

Moss put the Jays away for good in the second half, sprinting 50 yards with a Stutes pass 52 seconds into the third period, then dashing 80 yards with a St. Eds punt at the 7:47 mark.

"We try to spread it around, but we know we'd like to get the ball in Joey's hands as much as we can," Charpentier said. "He'll make a big play for us sooner or later."

For most teams, that could be cause for a red flag.

Teurlings anxious to see where it stands

All the credit goes to Sonny Charpentier. Not for Teurlings Catholic's perfect 4-0 start. He'd rather deflect the praise to his coaching staff and players.

But when it came to scheduling a fifth playing date ... the week before opening district play ... Charpentier decided Notre Dame would be an appropriate opponent.

That remains to be seen, but Teurlings (4-0) hopes to build on its fast start when the Rebels play host to No. 2-ranked and undefeated Notre Dame (4-0) Friday at 7 p.m. at Clark Field.

"I made the schedule," said Charpentier. "I have no one to blame but myself."

Should Teurlings run the table and conclude a perfect 10-0 season and District 7-2A championship, the Rebels could look back on the Notre Dame as a source of inspiration for reaching their goal.

But in the event that Teurlings falters, but still obtains its objective of winning the District 7-2A title, the Rebels could reflect on the moment they became a better team after playing one of the state's top programs.

thing fancy. They just play their brand of football and say, 'if you're good enough to stop us ... stop us.' Defensively they play that same brand also."

Notre Dame gives Charpentier the perfect example to illustrate to his squad what hard work and dedication can achieve. Thus far, Teurlings has equalled its victory total of the past two years.

"About three years ago Notre Dame was kind of on hard times," said Charpentier. "They've got great tradition at Notre Dame ... they've won a state championship ... and been to the playoffs. Now they've got it back to where they're winning."

"We use that as an example," added Charpentier. "We have some tradition at Teurlings. Notre Dame's been real consistent and doesn't seem to be changing with 15 straight wins in the regular season. That's where we want to be."

Teurlings has rivaled Notre Dame's dominance to date, outscoring its opposition 129-9 and averging over 300 yards offensively. But the Rebels' success has been well-rounded when you look at the contri-

butions from their defense and special teams.

Joey Moss has accounted for 454 offensive yards and six touchdowns. The senior has rushed 32 times for 215 yards and has caught nine passes for 239 yards. Reggie Trosclair has carried 24 times for 168 yards and five touchdowns.

Quarterback Kyle Stutes has displayed uncanny accuracy, completing 30-of-42 passes for 605 yards and seven touchdowns.

"This is a funny group in that they don't show a lot of emotion, but they come ready to play," said Charpentier. "They don't get too high or too low which I like. The kids were hungry for change and they've bought into what we wanted done. We as a staff have led and the kids have followed."

"This is going to be a fun game for us ... there's no pressure on us but the kids think we can win," added Charpentier. "This game will tell us how good we are and what areas we need to work on. That's what this game will bring out."

Just credit Sonny Charpentier for scheduling it in the first place.

Rebels knock off Pioneers

All David Domingue could do was look for consolation.

While all of his jubilant Teurlings Catholic teammates celebrated their 17-14 upset victory over No. 2-ranked Notre Dame, Domingue was simply reduced to tears here Friday at Clark Field.

It was the only emotion the Rebels' two-way senior starter had left after providing the difference in the contest — a 35-yard field goal with 8:11 remaining to be played.

"I've kind of been out of it lately," said Domingue. "I worked a lot this week on confidence. Notre Dame made us a better team. They made us play up to their level. My mind just went blank before the kick. But because we were playing Notre Dame, I made that kick."

And because of Domingue's heroics, Teurlings continued to build on its storybook season — remaining unbeaten at 5-0 and stopping Notre Dame's regular season winning streak at 16 games.

"This was the first game we played all four quarters of a game," said Teurlings senior Joey Moss, who accounted for 136 of the Rebels 221 offensive yards. "Now we know we can play hard for four quarters. We're 5-0 and it can't get much better than this."

"It was an outstanding opportunity for us to be in a close ball game in the fourth quarter and know how to win," said Teurlings' first-year Head Coach Sammy Charpentier. "Later on, we may have that situation come up again, and we'll know to react to it."

"They bent ... they've got some

men over there," added Charpentier. "I've coached a while ... coached some pretty good teams ... but I don't know if I've ever been more proud of a group of young men. Just because these guys believe. That's all we ask of them."

Teurlings' new-found trademark held true ... down to the final play of the game.

The Pioneers' last two possessions in the final eight minutes resulted in a negative 12 yards in six plays — highlighted by sacks from Ryker Melancon and Brandon Briscoe.

The Rebels' opportunistic defense forced a total of five Pioneer turnovers — including Moss' interception with 43 seconds to seal the victory.

"I figured they were that good," Notre Dame Head Coach Donnie Gaspard said. "They did a good job. They were better than us. We got beat by a good ball club."

"They had a good defensive plan and it worked for them," added Gaspard. "Our kids played hard. The credit belongs to Teurlings. They played good."

And extremely resilient.

Teurlings built a 14-7 halftime lead on Kyle Stutes' four-yard run less than two minutes into the game. Stutes later capped a 15-play, 89-yard drive with a six-yard out route to Corey LeBlanc with 2:11 remaining before halftime. On the march, Stutes was 6-of-10 for 54 yards. He finished 19-of-24 for 113 yards.

Notre Dame tied the game at 7-7 on quarterback Dexter Guidry's 1-yard run in the first quarter and later at 14-all when Brent LeJeune burst over the left side from two yards out. Kerry Link added both

extra points.

However, Teurlings limited Notre Dame to 60 total yards in the second half ... suffocating the line of scrimmage with eight and nine players. Guidry was 3-of-8 for 46 yards, but suffered three interceptions.

"We put eight men in the box and moved Moss up about six to seven yards from the line of scrimmage," said Charpentier. "We just dared them to throw the football. They don't want to throw it."

"This ball club did a good job," Gaspard said of Teurlings. "They didn't get rattled. They stayed with it and did some good things. I'm not disappointed in what our kids did. Sometimes you just lose to someone who plays better."

Domingue's field goal took the

sting out of a potential touchdown-scoring threat. Teurlings fumbled on a second-and-goal from Notre Dame's 6-yard line with 1:10 left in the third quarter.

But Teurlings forced a punt, overcame its own interception trying to run out the clock before Moss' climaxed the win.

"I've been waiting for this for four years," said Domingue. "It's a dream to be 5-0 and to beat Notre Dame. They came out and took it to us. They had a 16-game winning streak, but we knew what we had to do. The offense got some points and the defense gave us the ball. It was an all-around team effort."

"A lot of people doubted us, but we were ready," said Moss. "We came out to prove one thing: the Rebels are back."

Teurlings keeping primary focus on OC Vikings

OPELOUSAS — Trying to narrow down the secrets to Teurlings Catholic's success this season would be difficult.

Plenty of factors and variables have gone into the Rebels' perfect 6-0 start — including the state's No. 7 ranking in Class 2A.

But if there's one avenue Teurlings has travelled on its road of success, it's been the Rebels even-keel approach to each week ... something that should remain consistent when they travel here to meet Opelousas Catholic (3-3, 0-1) tonight in a District 7-2A contest here at Donald Gardner Stadium. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 o'clock.

"We're telling them that six games does not make a season ... we scheduled 10

games," said Teurlings first-year Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "With this bunch, it's really been one at a time. They're not listening to any of that, 'two weeks from now stuff' against Port Barre."

"Basically their taking the tank at hand," continued Charpentier. "We've been successful with keeping a level head. They should be excited because they've worked hard. They're real coachable kids. I like our chances."

And for good reason.

Teurlings has been a well rounded team ... relying on a quick-strike offense and solid defense. The Rebels rank third in the Acadiana area in total yards per game (313) and second in points per outing (34). Defensively, they top the area in points allowed (3.8) and yards allowed (136.3).

"Teurlings has a good ball club," said Opelousas Catholic first-year Head Coach

Mike Hendershot. "They have a good passing game, good skill kids and a real good defense. It's going to be a big challenge this week."

For OC, it comes on the heels of a 28-0 loss to Port Barre a week ago. The Vikings, trailed 22-0 at halftime, committed five turnovers in the contest.

"I'm pleased with the way we've been playing," said Hendershot. "We've just had some bad breaks with turnovers and a good team like Port Barre will capitalize on that. We've shot ourselves in the foot."

OC, which has been shutout the past two weeks, is led Scott Edwards — the area's fifth-leading rusher. Edwards has carried 121 times for 734 yards and three touchdowns. He will be joined in the starting backfield by quarterback Jared Fontenot (22-of-58 for 322 yards, 3 TDs) and fullback Jordan Handy.

"We think he's a good back," Charpentier said of Edwards. "He's had some good games for them and we have to keep the quarterback in the pocket because he's a good runner. They like to do a lot of different things."

The same goes for Teurlings which opened 7-2A play with a convincing 56-0 romp over Livonia.

Quarterback Kyle Stutes is closing in on the 1,000-yard plateau, completing 44-of-76 passes for 878 yards and 10 touchdowns. Multi-threat Joey Moss leads Teurlings in rushing (54-334-5) and receiving (15-389-4). Reggie Trosclair (41-291-5) is second to Moss in rushing while Corey LeBlanc (10-191-4) is second in receiving.

"This is a big week ... having to get up for a second big district game," said Hendershot. "It's a challenge for the coaches as well as the kids. Our kids are

going to play hard for four quarters. Teurlings is 6-0 and has beaten Notre Dame, but nobody is unbeatable on any given night. Our kids know that and they believe they can do it. That's how they've prepared themselves."

"We're talking to the kids about seizing the opportunity ... you have to take advantage of things," said Charpentier. "There are different breaking points in the season. There was the Notre Dame game, the last drive of the first half against St. Ed's and the first drive of the second half."

"Now this is a point in the season ... there's a lot of football left," added Charpentier. "We have to make sure we look at what's in front of us ... re-focus on the opportunities. They understand we have four weeks left, but we have to take them one at a time."

That about sums up Teurlings' success.

Teurlings registers another blowout win

OPELOUSAS — Another game. Another blowout win.

Just another day for the Teurlings Rebels.

The Rebels, coming off a 1-9 season and two straight losing seasons, continued their dramatic turnaround and improved to 7-0 here as they shutout the Opelousas Catholic Vikings 42-0 at Donald Gardner Stadium.

Teurlings, under first year head coach Sonny Charpentier, also improved to 2-0 in district play.

"The kids really played well in the second half," said Charpentier. "We started slow in the first quarter, had a few mental lapses which cost us. We faked a punt on our first series and dropped the pass. We could've had a touchdown there. But I have to give the kids credit, they stepped it up and started playing well."

While Teurlings was impressive in non-district play (5-0), they have been doubly-impressive in district play. They started it last week with a 56-0 win at Livonia and coupled with the win last night, have outscored their 7-2A district foes 98-0.

"I know a lot of people are surprised, but to be honest, I'm not," said Charpentier. "Don't get me wrong, I didn't really expect us to be winning the way we have been, but it just amazes me when some-

one says, 'it'll probably take 2-3 years to turn this around.' My motto has always been, 'the future is now.' That's what we told the kids early on and I guess they started to believe us."

After a scoreless first quarter, Teurlings eventually took a 20-0 halftime lead and led 42-0 after the third quarter. Reggie Trosclair scored on runs of four and 75 yards, Kyle Stutes threw a TD pass to Dennis Skains and ran one in and Joey Moss also ran in two touchdowns.

The final stats proved how dominant the Rebels were — 438 yards total offense to only 20 for OC which fell to 3-4 overall and 0-2 in league play.

"Our defense has played well all season long — we've only allowed three touchdowns," said Charpentier. "I have to give credit to my assistants. Fred Menard, Kevin Blanchard and Kim Hebert have all done great jobs with their units. And the kids have worked very hard. Now they're reaping the benefits from all the hard work."

Teurlings once again mixed the run and pass well, rushing for 287 and throwing for 151. Stutes completed 4-of-10 for 151, while Trosclair (136 yards) and Moss (97) provided the bulk of their ground game.

Thomas, Delhomme receive honors

Nobody in Erath had predicted a 10-0 season.

But at 2-4 entering Friday night's road contest with district rival Catholic High of New Iberia, things were beginning to border on disappointing.

Then Sed Thomas took over.

Thomas rushed for 249 yards and four touchdowns on 25 carries to help bring the Bobcats a dominating 32-9 District 6-AAA victory over the Panthers to keep their slim playoff hopes alive.

For raising his level of play with his team's back against the wall, Thomas is this week's *Daily Advertiser/Pepsi-Cola Offensive Player of the Week*.

He began his night with a 59-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, before Catholic's Mike Haik hooked up with Tim Parich on a 17-yard TD pass to tie it. But Thomas would have none of that, scoring from five and three yards out before the half.

After Pierre Hebert's two-yard touchdown pass from Matt Hebert, Thomas finished things off with a 69-yard touchdown run.

Nobody has a more balanced team this so far this season than the Teurlings Catholic Rebels. In running out to a 7-0 record, the Rebels are ranked fourth in the Acadiana area offensively and No. 1 in the area defensively.

Such an effort takes team play. Showing no signs of a letdown after their 17-14 victory over Notre Dame, the Rebels have recorded two straight shutouts of 56-0 over

Livonia and 42-0 over OCHS.

Playing a large role during his limited time on the field in Teurlings' most recent shutout was R.T. Delhomme. Delhomme recorded three solos, four assists and had a tackle for an 18-yard loss.

Representing the top-rated defense in the area, Delhomme is this week's *Daily Advertiser/Pepsi-Cola Defensive Player of the Week*.

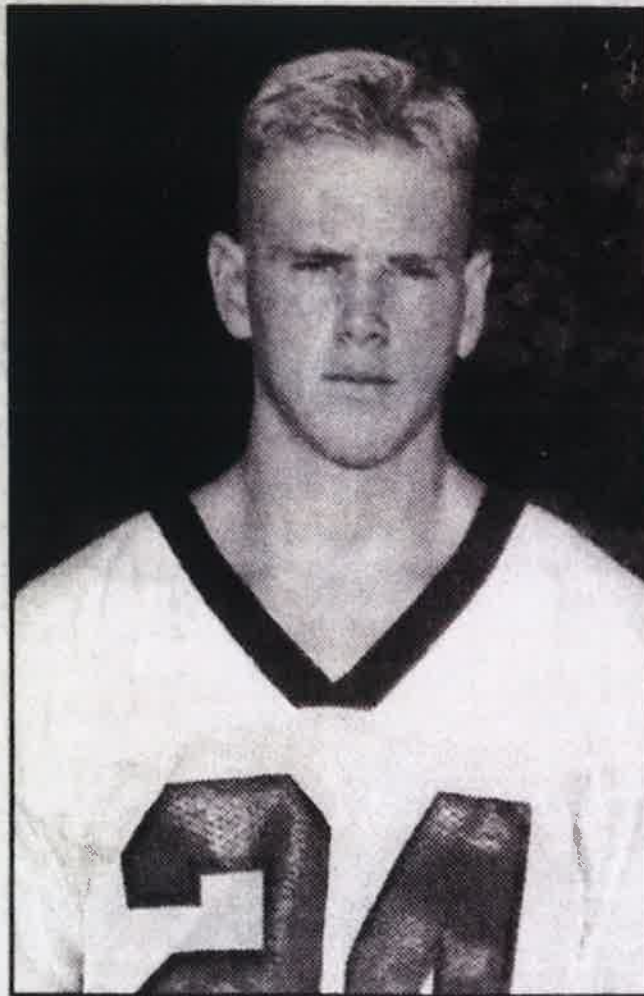

Rebels prepare for Green Demons

The numbers don't seem to add up to a big district contest. Of course, that all depends on what numbers you're looking at.

The No. 6-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels have been statistically the most dominant team in the Acadiana area with 244 points scored to just 23 allowed. Mamou, on the other hand, has scored 110 points and given up 121.

The one similarity is that both stand 2-0 in the District 7-AA play. So to TCHS Head Coach Sonny Charpentier, that means tonight's 7 p.m. showdown at Clark Field is a must-win situation for his powerful Rebels.

"I really believe the district champion will be undefeated," Charpentier said. "So every game is for a district championship basically. It's kind of hard to get a real good read on Mamou. I've heard they had some injuries early in the season. We have seen a lot of different numbers on the films we've seen."

The Green Devils are led by the running of Snowy Jason (118-657, 9 TDs) and Peter Guillory (55-255, 1 TD).

"Their bread and butter is running the football," Charpentier

said. "It's about 70-30. They have two or three different running backs."

Their biggest threat, however, is returning All-State tight end Darvin Georgetown (18-471, 3 TDs). His quarterback is Shannon Douget (20-31-3, 430 yds, 4 TDs).

"We really haven't played a receiving tight end like this kid," Charpentier said. "He's 6-3 with long arms and he can jump fairly well. We really haven't faced many teams that throw the ball at all."

"They like to line him up at wide receiver sometimes too. We're not going to change anything defensively. Our secondary has done a good job so far this year. We're going to keep (Joey) Moss over the top from his free safety position."

The Rebels sport a balanced attack. Moss has 421 yards and seven touchdowns rushing on 97 tries and also has 15 catches for 380 yards and four scores receiving. Reggie Trosclair has 427 yards and seven touchdowns on 51 carries with seven grabs for 112 yards.

Quarterback Kyle Stutes (49-86-7, 1029, 11 TDs) has been one of the area's most productive quarterbacks. His other top targets have been Corey LeBlanc (12-209, 4 TDs) and Dennis Skains (6-181, 2 TDs).

Rebels exorcise Demons to set up war with Devils

Now the Teurlings Rebels can finally put their full focus on Port Barre.

Coach Sonny Charpentier's No. 6-ranked squad dusted off the Mamou Green Demons 40-6 Friday night at Clark Field to run their record to 8-0 and 3-0 in District 7-AA, setting up next week's critical visit to Port Barre that fans have been anticipating for weeks.

Trouble is, so were the Rebels.

"We've been fighting knowing that Port Barre was coming up," said Charpentier. "And, that's hard to do. I don't want to take anyone lightly. Mamou was the district champion last year. We did what we had to do."

So did the No. 7 PBHS Red Devils, blitzing Livonia 43-7 to improve to 7-1 and 3-0.

Teurlings was never threatened in its contest, rolling to a 17-0 lead before Mamou could find the Rebel end zone and generally controlling play throughout.

By the time it was over, Kyle Stutes had hit 12-of-19 passes for 150 yards and touchdowns of 12 yards to Ryker Melancon and 16 to

Ryan Gravouia, Corey LeBlanc had four catches for 85 yards and Joey Moss rushed 15 times for 96 yards and TD jaunts of four and five yards.

"We like to mix it up on offense," said Charpentier, who got a healthy combination of 161 on the ground and 150 through the air. "We try to be balanced. We've got good skill people, so we try to take advantage of the skills they have and put them in position to be successful."

"When you've got people who can catch, throw and protect, it makes it tough on a defense. We were able to throw a lot more tonight than usual."

But Charpentier only ordered one pass in the second half, an 18-yard hit to Melancon, as TCHS pulled in on the reins.

"We never want to be accused of running up the score on anyone," said Charpentier. "We were able to look at some things tonight and get some things done."

Mamou's task was made tougher by field position. The Rebels' first two touchdown drives covered 45 and 42 yards and the first half was spent in Demon territory.

Moss's 29-yard punt return positioned the first march, capped by

Stutes' pass to Melancon and a scrambling two-point throw to Melancon from LeBlanc when the snap went awry.

The Rebels' next drive fizzled on the MHS one-yard line, but three plays later Shannon Douget was swarmed under for a safety and a 10-0 lead. Reggie Trosclair ran back the ensuing kick to the Demons' 42, and six plays later Stutes found Gravouia to make it 17-0.

David Thomas sandwiched runs of 19 and 24 yards around a 14-yarder by Snowy Jason to awaken the visitors' offense. Thomas's 24-yarder reached the three and Jason plowed over one play later with 1:58 left in the half.

Teurlings wasn't through, though. Melancon made a crafty adjustment on a 50-yard Stutes bomb to reach the Demons' six, and David Domingue hit a 23-yard field goal 17 seconds before the break.

"We were always on the plus side of the field in the first half," said Charpentier. "We had some changeovers and our defense did a good job of stopping them. That's always nice."

PORT BARRE - The motivation's been easy. During the offseason. Throughout the spring. And into the summer.

Whenever Port Barre needed a source of inspiration, all the Red Devils had to do was reflect back on the empty feeling of a year ago.

That's where - on the final drive of the regular season - Port Barre witnessed the District 7-2A championship changing hand. It was almost a helpless feeling ... watching Mamou drive 85 yards in the final two minutes of the game, go for two points and win 21-20.

"All we had to was kill the clock, but we were unable to," said Port Barre Head Coach Donnie Perron. "It was very disappointing, but it was good execution on their part ... the kind you dream about. By far, it was one of the toughest losses I've had to swallow."

It's been a season of redemption for Port Barre ... from a last-second victory over University ... to a perfect 3-0 start in district play.

— and I thought we did a decent job of it — in the back of their minds they were looking forward to it,” Charpentier said of Port Barre. “Just the competitiveness. It’s the reason you play in athletics. But a lot of people didn’t think we would be playing for the district championship.”

That however, did not include the 47 players and four coaches who’ve worked collectively toward this goal. Not a day went by, when the thought of being anything less than a champion ever entered the picture.

Now Teurlings is on the brink of realizing just that.

“We will not be satisfied being 9-1 and finishing in second place,” said Charpentier. “Our expectations have been met, but we have the opportunity to get the prize. We won’t be happy unless we get it.

“We told the seniors that they could be the foundation,” added Charpentier. “I couldn’t think of a better foundation than to be 10-0 and district champs. That’s a great building block in the first year.”

Teurlings has gradually pointed toward this moment ... outscoring its opposition by 32 points per game. In 32 quarters of football this season, the Rebels have trailed only once.

Joey Moss leads Teurlings in both rushing and receiving. The senior running back has carried 83 times for 517 yards and nine touchdowns. In addition, he has caught 18 passes for 392 yards and four touchdowns.

Quarterback **Kyle Stutes** has thrown for 1,179 yards and 13 touchdowns on 61-of-105 passing. Corey LeBlanc follows Moss with 16 grabs for 294 yards and four touchdowns.

The Rebels’ top-ranked defense allows 123.1 yards per game — including just 66 per outing in district play.

“We really haven’t had any adversity ... we really haven’t played bad yet,” Charpentier said. “Not that it has to happen, but to see how we respond when it does. But I really don’t think about that too much.

“This is an important big game,” Charpentier added. “Against Notre Dame (a 17-14 win), we saw a great crowd and a tremendous atmosphere for a high school game. We know a lot of kids were nervous before the game, but they can fall back on that a little. There’s a district championship at stake ... and a undefeated season. Something no one expected us to be in the hunt for.”

Trosclair tallied on runs of one and 44 yards, and Stutes took one in from two yards out to help Teurlings to a 21-12 halftime lead. The Rebels put the game on ice on Stutes' seven-yard fourth-quarter TD run and David Domingue's 24-yard field goal.

Port Barre had driven 71 yards in six plays on the first series of the game to go ahead 6-0 on Jerome Pickney's 19-yard run. Pickney, who finished with 114 yards rushing on 14 carries, turned in an 85-yard kickoff return late in the second quarter to trim the Teurlings lead to 21-12 at the break, but the Devils couldn't get back in it in the second half.

"Defensively, I was pleased with the way we played for most of the game," noted Charpentier. "They (Port Barre) did a few things different and went down and scored on their first possession. But, that didn't seem to phase the kids and they came right back. When your defense gives up only six points that's not bad at all."

However, the Rebels' offense stole the show as Teurlings piled up 411 yards in total offense and moved the ball almost at will.

"When you don't punt I guess your offense is doing something right," said the Rebels' mentor. "We came into the game planning on running the ball more than we usually do. We felt we could run the ball on them, and the kids executed very well. Our offensive line played well and picked up a lot of their stunts. We didn't really have to throw the ball that much."

Following the Devils' first TD, the Rebels answered with their own uprising, driving 76 yards in seven plays to go up 7-6. Moss ripped off a 40-yard run on the first offensive play for Teurlings, which should have been a sign of things to come.

Moss carried four times for 64 yards in the march, but Trosclair capped the series with a one-yard dive at the 6:31 mark, and Domingue's PAT put the Rebels ahead for good.

An eight-play, 80-yard drive, kept alive by a personal foul penalty on Port Barre, ensued, and Trosclair went the final 44 yards with 11:51 left in the second period to make it 14-6.

Stutes' two-yard run with 3:13 showing increased the lead to 21-6. Pickney returned the kickoff 85 yards to cut the margin to nine at the break, but Teurlings added 10 insurance points in the fourth quarter.

Rebels capture district crown

PORT BARRE — While some still doubted whether Teurlings Catholic was the real deal, the Rebels players themselves never wavered from their belief.

Teurlings may have silenced the doubting Thomasas for good here Friday night as the Rebels put dazzling display of dominating football in their most important game of the season to date.

The Rebels' offense put up big numbers while not having to punt, and the defense stiffened after allowing an opening-drive touch-down as Teurlings waxed Port Barre 31-12 to clinch first place in District 7-2A and kept alive its hopes for a perfect regular season.

"Teurlings has a very good football team," Port Barre coach Donnie Perron commented about his opponent. "They made some big plays and got the job done. They ran the football more than we expected. We missed a lot of tackles, but you've got to give them credit. (Joey) Moss had a lot to do with that."

Reggie Trosclair and Kyle Stutes scored two touchdowns each, and Moss rushed for 183 yards as the Rebels had a pair of 100-yard rushers in the game while accumulating 379 yards on the ground.

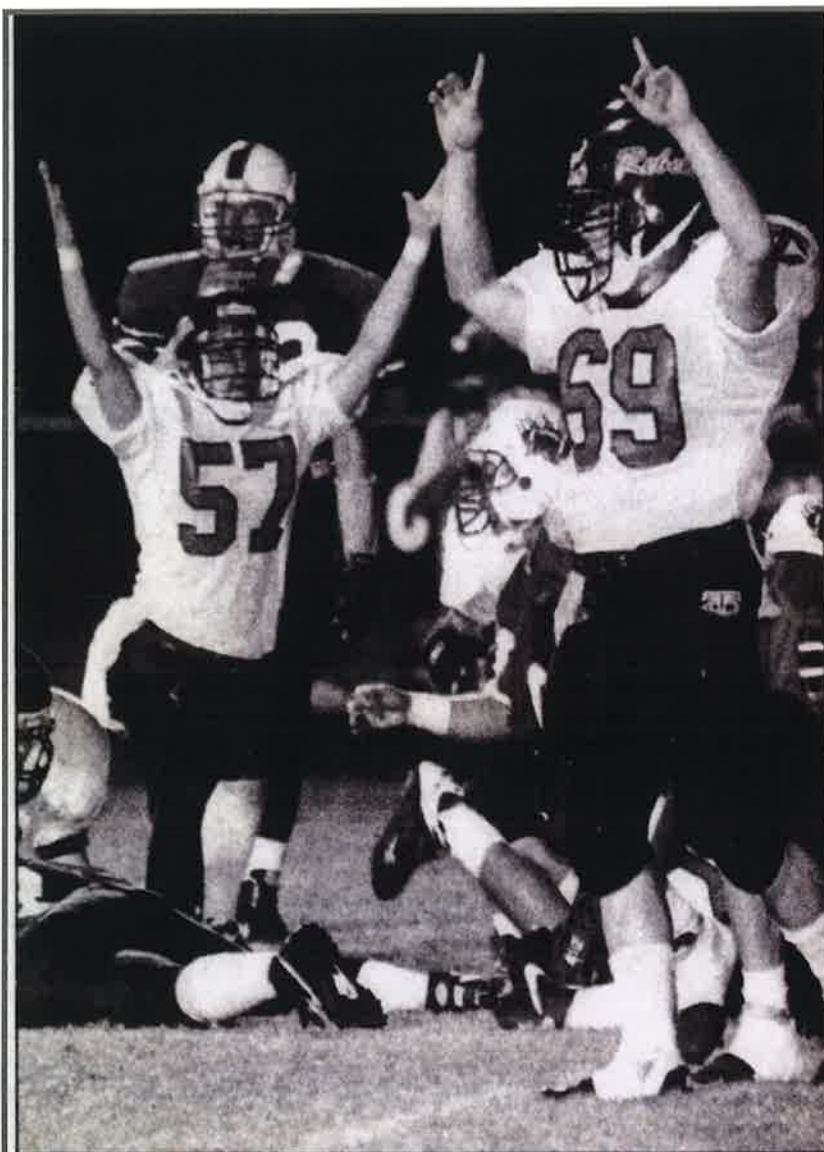

Rebels achieve perfection

One thing Sonny Charpentier learned from playing for one of the greatest high school coaches was to never establish a ceiling over your head.

If you're talented enough and work hard diligently toward a goal, there's no reason why you can't expect immediate results.

For Teurlings, that philosophy Teurlings paid dividends this season.

The fifth-ranked Rebels completed one of the greatest turn-arounds in the state this year — regardless of classification — with a 35-0 District 7-2A win over North Central Friday at Clark Field to wrap up a perfect 10-0 regular season.

It was the Rebels' first such year since 1982 — a feat that came after a 1-9 season a year ago.

"(Hanson) Coach (Dick) McCloskey always told me to never place limitations on yourself," said Teurlings' first-year Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "If you play 10 games, you should expect to win 10 games. Now our next goal is to win the state championship. That's the top prize. You've got to reach for the highest point. That's something I always learned."

Joey Moss' 7-yard run ignited Teurlings' 21-point first half production. Kyle Stutes also connected with Corey Leblanc on a 31-yard scoring strike and Reggie Trosclair scored on a 7-yard run.

Stutes, who was 7-of-16 for 132 yards, found Moss for a 12-yard touchdown pass. Moss finished with 101 yards on 13 carries and caught three passes for 47 yards.

The Rebels also recorded their fifth shutout of the season — including three in district play.

Charpentier has unbeaten Rebels looking ahead

The natural tendency would be to celebrate the past.

For the first time in 13 years Teurlings Catholic finished the regular season with a perfect 10-0 mark and claimed the District 7-2A championship.

On top of that, the Rebels will take part in their first state playoff game since 1992.

Not bad for a team that was 1-9 a year ago and turning in its equipment at this point in time last season.

While the regular season achievements are a testament to state's greatest turnaround this year, Teurlings continues to press ahead, rather than dwell on the past. It's the type of focus and consistency that have been key ingredients in the Rebels' climb to Class 2A prominence.

Teurlings hopes to continue its ascent when the fourth-ranked Rebels play host to wild-card entry St. Louis (6-4) at Northside's Viking Stadium in a Class 2A bi-district contest. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.

"We challenged them Monday to get refocused and pick it up a couple of notches," said first-year Teurlings Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "It was a natural feeling of

relief ... I know I did ... to get through 10-0. But we have to realize it's time to pick it up to another level if we want to go anywhere in this playoff situation."

For a team driven by perfection, Charpentier doesn't anticipate any problems in motivating his club to new heights. After all the Rebels have yet to hit their stride, despite outscoring the opposition by 31 points per contest.

"We have not put a whole game together," said Charpentier. "We have not peaked yet. If we're going to do it, this is obviously the time we hope to do it."

Due to Pickering's usage of an ineligible player, St. Louis was in position for the District 5-2A championship before falling to DeQuincy, 20-14. Nonetheless, the Saints present quite an opening playoff task.

"We have our work cut out for us," said Charpentier. "St. Louis plays good, fundamental football. They like to mix it up and throw a lot of different formations at you. They're well coached and have a lot of similarities to St. Ed's with their skill athletes and size."

The game will feature two of the top quarterbacks in Class 2A with St. Louis' David Ardoin and Teurlings' Kyle Stutes matching skills.

Ardoin has completed 94-of-173 passes for 1,247 yards, nine touch-

downs and five interceptions, and a Acadiana area's best 15 Stutes has thrown for 1,341 yards touchdowns on 71 of 131 passing.

the Saints with 57 catches for 687 yards and six touchdowns followed by tight end Scot Stewart with 18 grabs for 238 yards.

St. Louis also features running back Carl Ross who has carried 191 times for 929 yards and five touchdowns. Carver High transfer Tevis Stutes, a McNeese State basketball signee, has also given the Saints an added dimension since becoming eligible four games ago.

St. Louis' offense — which averages 303.7 total yards and 19.4 points — will test a Teurlings defense which has recorded five shut-outs and allowed 41 points and 141.6 yards.

Conversely, Teurlings' offense, which averages 330.8 yards, faces a St. Louis defense that surrenders 233.8 yards and 14 points per outing.

Along with Stutes, the Rebels will count on seniors Joey Moss (118-801-10) and Reggie Trosclair (77-609-10) for backfield production. Moss also leads the team in receiving with 21 catches for 439 yards and five touchdowns while Corey LeBlanc has 18 catches for 332 yards and five touchdowns.

"This is not lagniappe ... we're not just happy to be here," said Charpentier. "We feel we have a good enough shot to go to New Orleans. But talking about it is one thing. St. Louis has a good enough team to beat us."

Rebels take care of bottom line

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels enjoyed a lot of firsts during their undefeated campaign this season.

For practically the entire squad, Friday night was the first-ever state playoff game. So any analysis of the Rebels' performance must be preceded with the fact that the No. 4-ranked Rebels moved to 11-0 with a 17-7 victory over the St. Louis Saints in a Class AA state bi-district contest at Northside High.

After that, however, there was very little jubilation, very little leaping for joy at the playoff victory.

Part of it was the knowledge that the No. 2-ranked Riverside Rebels were coming to town next Friday. The rest of it was a mild distaste for their showing on the field.

"I don't know what it was," TCHS Head Coach Sonny Charpentier said, "but we didn't play well at all. I don't want to take anything away from St. Louis, because they were very well prepared and did a good job."

"I'm not going to make a bunch of excuses. I just don't feel like we played well. It started with me and went down the line. The kids know it, though. Everybody knows we're going to have to play better next week."

The Rebels' first two drives resulted in two punts. St. Louis, however, wasn't allowed to take advantage of the good field position, ending drives on the TCHS 44 and 30. The Saints had only a missed 47-yard field goal to show for it.

They quickly regretted it when Joey Moss broke loose for 57 yards on the first play to the SLHS 23. Four plays later, Kyle Stutes plunged in from the one at 11:21 of the second for the 7-0 lead. Stutes would finish with 74 yards on 11 carries, while Moss had 83 yards on 15 tries.

"The big run with Moss really ignited us," Charpentier said. "It got us down there and we were able to get it in. That proved to be big."

Then the Rebels' defense got into it when Reggie Trosclair picked up fumble and returned it 17 yards for a touchdown with 10:35 left until intermission.

"Our defense came up with some big plays tonight," Charpentier said. "They did a good job with their backs against the wall tonight. We just didn't do a good job offensively. My play-calling was atrocious. They did a good job of mixing up their coverages on us in the second half. They sent the outside linebackers and inside linebackers at the right times and we were outnumbered."

The offense simply continued to ride the wave, driving 53 yards in

six plays to set up a David Domingue 32-yard field goal with 4:55 left in the first half. The drive was sparked by an impressive Stutes 49-yard run on a unique option off a reverse.

St. Louis attempted to get back into it with a 15-play, 64-yard drive right before the half, but was forced to turn it over on downs at the TCHS 17.

Neither offense did much until Tevis Stukes got hot early in the fourth period. A 14-yard run cross midfield and then Stukes (10-104, 1 TD) broke loose on a 46-yard touchdown run to narrow the gap to 17-7 with 8:33 to play.

"I wasn't real worried," Charpentier said. "I have a lot of confidence in our defense. They found something at the end of the first half and used it in the second half. They used a lot of cutbacks and things we haven't seen on film. Our defense did a good job of bending and not breaking, though."

Things still seemed in hand for the Rebels until the Saints' defense forced them to turn it over on downs at midfield with 6:06 left.

"I was confident that we'd pick it up," Charpentier said. "I know the rule of thumb is to punt the ball."

Teurlings awaits Riverside invasion

It's much earlier than Teurlings Catholic Head Coach Sonny Charpentier would have preferred.

But if his No. 4-ranked Rebels (11-0) were to keep winning, he knew they'd probably have to meet the No. 2-ranked Riverside Academy Rebels (11-0) somewhere along the line. The bracket says that time and place must be tonight in a Class AA state regional showdown at Lafayette High, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

"It's disappointing," Charpentier said. "Anybody we were going to play in this round was going to be good, but the system is flawed. I've been saying that for years in basketball. It should be done from the standpoint of seeding. If teams don't want to travel, get somebody that does."

The result of the current system is that area fans get to see quite a second-round meeting tonight.

"It should be a real good game," Charpentier said. "Our kids are looking forward to it. They've got a real good team. They wouldn't be 11-0 if they weren't good. Their big advantage is they don't have anybody going both ways. They do have one kid who plays both ways in special situations."

The big question is whether or not Riverside's top running back Jimmy Dattole will be available. He suffered an achilles tendon injury

in week nine and hasn't played since then. For the season, he's got 970 yards and 16 touchdowns on 127 carries.

Other threats include running back Jarrett Entremont (107-68, 6 TDs) and receiver Mike Abreo (34-730, 7 TDs). The quarterback is Preston Hayes (71-131-4, 1,243 yds, 12 TDs). Riverside's other big threat is sophomore kicker John Ryles, who has a 49-yard field goal to his credit this season.

"We're expecting him (Dattole) to play," Charpentier said. "He makes a big difference in their offense. They just don't beat themselves. They've got a real good receiver. He caught a ton of passes in the six games we've seen on film."

"We have a few matchup problems. Their defensive front is bigger than our offensive line. I think we have a small advantage in team speed."

More than Riverside, though, Charpentier's more concerned with his Rebels improving on last week's performance over St. Louis. Actually, neither team stayed undefeated in an impressive manner. Teurlings held off St. Louis 17-7 and Riverside squeaked past Episcopal 10-7.

"After looking at the film, you have to give St. Louis a lot of credit," Charpentier said. "I just never had a good feel for what they were going to do against us, and I didn't do a very good job of guessing. I don't think Riverside will

be duplicating very much of what St. Louis did.

"They pretty much line up in their '5-3' and dare you to beat them. They play three deep and come with one linebacker. They just count on being stronger than you. They kind of remind me of Notre Dame."

The result of disappointing performance was an inspired week of practice.

"To play poorly and still win is getting the best of both worlds for a coach," Charpentier said. "It really caught the players' attention. They were probably too relaxed."

Teurlings, as usual, will be relying heavily on Joey Moss. Moss has 884 yards and 10 touchdowns rushing on 134 carries, as well as 12 receptions for 454 yards and five more scores. Reggie Trosclair adds 639 yards and 10 scores on 84 attempts.

Kyle Stutes is the 14th-leading passer in the state, hitting on 74 of 144 passes for 1,376 yards with 15 touchdowns and nine interceptions. His other top targets are Corey LeBlanc (19-344, 5 TDs), Dennis Skains (9-233, 2 TDs), Ryan Gravouia (9-154, 2 TDs) and Trosclair (8-118).

Riverside advanced to the state semifinals a year ago, before losing in a fluke fashion to Loyola.

"There is no substitute for experience," Charpentier said. "That's something you try to play up when you've got it and downplay if you don't."

Teurlings just hopes it can use what it learns tonight as soon as next week.

Teurlings tops No.2 Riverside

What does it take to beat the No.2 team in the state?

Start with focus and belief in a cause, and throw in a critical switch of field position, and you've got Friday night's 14-7 victory by the Teurlings Rebels over No.2 Riverside at Lafayette High.

"We're 12-0, and there are a lot of teams with more talent than we have," said Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "But these kids have been able to focus on one week at a time. The difference in being a good team and a great team is that ability to take it one at a time and be consistent.

"I'm just proud of these kids. They kids believe in a dream, that it can happen. They're a special group."

Resilience was another key for No.4 Teurlings, which travels next week to meet Northeast, a 39-23 winner over Loranger.

Charpentier's squad ruled the first half, but let Riverside stay close at 7-0 at the break. Then a fumble at the TCHS 46 set the visitors up with a chance to tie the score.

Coach Mickey Roussell's squad did just that with an 11-play advance. The big blow was a 22-yard pass to star tailback Jimmy Dotto to the seven. He was hurt on the play, though, and exited for good two plays later, costing Riverside its main weapon.

Preston Hayes bootlegged around left end for the score from

six yards out.

Teurlings was hit with penalties on both the ensuing kickoff return and its first play, digging a hole back to the six. But Joey Moss ran 15 yards to the 21 for one first down, Kyle Stutes hit Corey LeBlanc for 11 to the 32 for another and a quick-kick punt by Moss carried 47 yards to the Riverside 13 to reverse momentum.

"That was the turning point in the game," said Charpentier. "If we hadn't been able to pick up a couple of first downs and put them in the hole with that kick, they might have had the ball at the 50 with momentum."

As it was, a Hayes pass was picked off by Moss and returned 42 yards to the end zone, only to be placed at the Riverside 35 by a clip. Reggie Trosclair's 17-yard run reached the nine on third and one on the first play of the fourth quarter, and Stutes soon snuck the remaining yard for the winning score.

Riverside came back, sparked by a 27-yard flea-flicker pass from tight end Chris Stein to Mike Abreo to the TCHS 49. A 12-yard pass to Stein netted the 30, but the visitors got no closer than Hayes' fourth down scramble to the 26, one snap after an inadvertant whistle halted what would have been another flea-flicker try.

Fittingly enough, it was Trosclair, who had 85 yards on the ground, who snuffed the final Riverside hope with a tackle of Hayes at the TCHS 38 with 1:43 to go.

An 11-yard punt by Riverside's Nicky Avocado that went out of

bounds on the visitors' 41-yard line set up the only score of the first half. Teurlings first converted a fourth-and-five play when Stutes hit LeBlanc for 10 yards to the Riverside 26. Stutes then found Ryan Gravouia for 22 yards to the four.

Two Trosclair runs got the touchdown, the second a plunge from a yard away, as TCHS grabbed a 7-0 lead with 11:19 to play in the half.

Special teams also played a role in the visitors' best chance before the break, as Dottolo broke loose for 42 yards on a punt return to the TCHS 23 with 1:08 left until half.

A seven-yard Hayes pass to Randy Cashio picked up a key first down at the 12, but time was running short for Riverside. Hayes missed on one pass and then aimed over the middle for Stein, only to have Teurlings' Dennis Skain pick the pass off at the five and return it to his 32 to snuff the threat with just 17 ticks on the clock.

"Our defense did a great job," said Charpentier, "with big plays all night long."

Both teams had trouble holding on to the ball in the first half, each losing scoring chances as a result. Teurlings' Moss galloped 37 yards to the Riverside 32 one possession after the TCHS touchdown, but on the next play Trosclair had the ball ripped from his grasp at the 22 and claimed by Kevin Holley.

That missed chance prevented Teurlings from taking early command of the game, and Riverside remained a threat despite being outgained 135-68 at the break.

The loss of half the stadium's lights delayed the second half, too, but most of the lights were fixed and the Rebels' future remains bright.

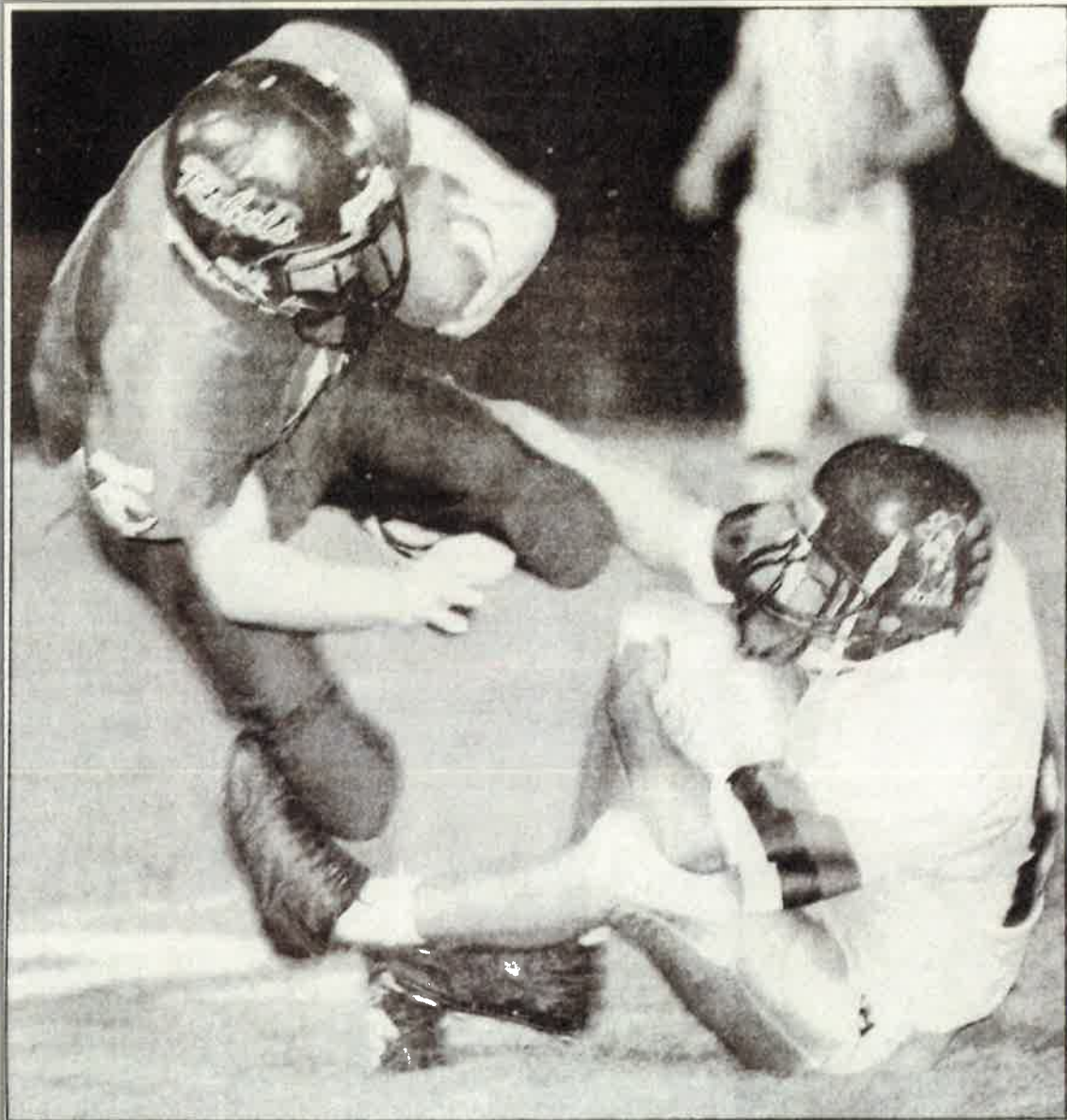

Benoit: Man in the middle of Rebels' success

When Teurlings Catholic's Jake Benoit departs the practice field, he doesn't necessarily leave the game of football behind.

Along with the necessities of school — textbooks, tablets, pens and pencils — you can find Benoit carrying around game film as well.

The senior linebacker has been Teurlings' leading tackler this season — averaging 11½ tackles per game. For the year, he's registered 138 total tackles, two quarterback sacks and two fumble recoveries — including a touchdown against Livonia.

"He's kind of the unsung hero for our defense," Teurlings Head Coach Sonny Charpentier said of Benoit. "The defense is set up for him to make the plans and he's done a good job. He's not flashy, but at the end of the game he's got the most tackles."

Benoit has simply been a constant in a Teurlings defense that been among the Acadiana area's best all season long.

From his middle linebacker position Benoit has helped the Rebels:

- Record five shutouts.
- Hold five other opponents to only one offensive touchdown.
- Limit five opponents to 100 rushing yards or less.
- Allow 4.6 points and 151.6 total yards per game.

"I'm not sure how many, but I think a lot of guys look up to me as a leader," said Benoit. "I think the whole defense looks to each other for help. When you

look at the whole defense, it reflects us as individuals.

"Overall we're not very big," added Benoit, "but we have a lot of team speed and quickness.

When we get to the ball, you're going to see 9, 10 and 11 people to the ball. That's the key to why our defense is doing what it's doing. (Defensive coordinator) Coach (Fred) Menard has helped us turn around the defense."

Case in point has been during Teurlings' run through the state playoffs.

While the high-scoring Rebel offense has scored well below their season norm, the defense has more than held up their end of the bargain against St. Louis and Riverside.

"We know the offense will put points on the board, we just don't know how many," said Benoit, who is also a starting guard. "But in the playoffs, we've have to step it up on defense and keep them to as few as points as possible."

Benoit has progressed to this point in his career after starting since his sophomore season. He began as a tackle and moved to linebacker a year ago.

Not only has Benoit emerged as a

two-way starter, but he participates on all but one of Teurlings' special teams.

"Being only 5-8, I've learned to rely on my speed and quickness to get to the corners and fill in where I need to," Benoit said. "If I can't make the tackle myself, then I know help is coming."

"I like it being on the field as much as possible, because I feel I have more control of the game when I'm in," Benoit added. "I think I have a better opportunity of changing something in the game if I'm on the field."

Benoit's presence has certainly impacted Teurlings' season positively thus far. Now he's content on remaining focused on the business at hand which is Friday's contest with Northeast.

"One thing the coaches have told us is not to get too overconfident and take care of our responsibilities," said Benoit. "Sure we're two games away from the Dome, but we're staying focused because we know Northeast is a good team. We just can't expect to show up and win. Because every game could be your last if we're not ready to play."

"Looking at the beginning of the year, I wasn't sure I could be that good," added Benoit. "But I set goals to be first team All-District and maybe a spot on the All-State team. I knew it would be hard. But I figured if I worked as hard as I could, and pushed myself, I could achieve that."

And leave the practice field with a strong sense of satisfaction.

Teurlings maintains high hopes against Northeast

ZACHARY - Sonny Charpentier waited five weeks for the validation. Seven weeks later he added another stamp of approval.

With Teurlings Catholic off to a fast 4-0 start, Charpentier waited until after a 17-14 victory over previously undefeated and second ranked Notre Dame to deliver the much-awaited news.

"I hadn't called them a good team yet," said Charpentier. "I told them I was going to wait until after the Notre Dame. After the game, I told them that they were a good football team."

Teurlings continued to prove that over the remaining portion of the season. Instead of falling victim to complacency, the Rebels wanted to live up to their coach's claim.

However, this group wasn't satisfied.

Teurlings simply strived for more - winning the District 7-2A championship, attaining a perfect 10-0 season and registering

back-to-back state playoff victories.

Yet the Rebels pushed ahead ... finally forcing Charpentier's hand after defeating their second undefeated and second ranked team of the season with a 14-7 verdict over Riverside.

"Last Friday I told them they were a great football team," Charpentier said. "I think we have a great football team that's capable of going to the Superdome."

Teurlings can further add to Charpentier's claim here tonight when the fourth-ranked Rebels (12-0) travel to meet Northeast (9-3) in a Class 2A state quarterfinal. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m. at Doug Williams Stadium.

"I honestly don't think the kids have gotten enough credit," Charpentier said. "I don't think people understand what it entails to get from get from Point A to Point B. No one else on this team has experienced what they've experienced. It's us against the world."

That mentality was derived out of necessity to silence the cynics and doubters that have been at every turn waiting for Teurlings' fall. Instead, the Rebels have completely distanced themselves from the stigma of last year's 1-9 record and gained state-wide respect.

"It's obvious they're a well coached team," said Northeast Head Coach Grover Perkins. "It should be a very good game. It's usually the team that makes the fewest mistakes that will win."

Teurlings has every intention of upholding its end of the deal.

Thus far the Rebels have relied on poise, persistence and defense in recording a pair of 14-7 wins over St. Louis and Riverside.

"We'll take it ... whatever the score is as long as we have more points than the other team," said Charpentier. "Maybe we spoiled some people, but we've faced some pretty good caliber defensive teams."

Teurlings will rely on its 1-2 running punch of Joey Moss and Reggie Trosclair along with the strong arm of quarterback Kyle Stutes.

Moss leads the Rebels with 144 carries for 961 yards and 10 touchdowns while Trosclair has 104 attempts for 724 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Stutes, who scored the game-winning touchdown last week, has thrown for 1,448 yards and 15 touchdowns on 80-of-155 passing. Moss is his top target with 23 catches for 472 yards and five touchdowns followed by Corey LeBlanc with 21 grabs for 365 yards and five touchdowns.

"We're going to continue doing the things we've been doing," said Charpentier. "It's a rule of thumb against teams quicker than you that you don't run wide ... you run at them. We feel we've got some

things we can hurt them with."

Like defense.

That unit has been rock-solid for Teurlings all season long and especially during the playoffs.

"They haven't missed a beat," Charpentier said. "A lot of credit goes to (defensive coordinator) Fred (Menard), (assistant) Kevin (Blanchard) and (assistant) Kim (Hebert) for doing a great job. I know it's a cliché, but offense wins games and defense wins championships. I knew if we were going to compete for a state championship, we had to have a sound defense."

Northeast, the District 8 runner-up to Christian Life, will challenge that defense with a balanced running game and capable passing attack.

Scott Wicker leads the Vikings with 139 carries for 818 yards and 12 touchdowns while Derrick Rogers has 133 rushes for 713 yards and seven touchdowns.

Quarterback Otis Hamilton has completed 83-of-171 passes for 1,329 yards and 15 touchdowns. Tight end Scott Landry has 21 catches for 280 yards.

"We're going to have to run to the ball, gang tackle and wrap up," said Charpentier. "We're not going to change a whole lot. We're going to stay with what we've been doing. They're good and have as good or better team speed than anyone we've faced all year long."

"We've told the kids that no one believes that you're going to go to the Superdome," added Charpentier. "We don't just want to make a statement ... we want to make national news. We've expected it ... and here we are. The Dome is our goal. If we don't get there, we'll be disappointed."

But it won't change Sonny Charpentier's opinion of his team.

Northeast rolls past Teurlings

CHANEYVILLE — A season may have ended, but a once-proud tradition was restored.

Teurlings Catholic, a year removed from a 1-9 season, put itself back on the Class 2A map with a breakthrough season behind the leadership of nine seniors.

Now it's up to the rest of the Rebels to build on the momentum of the 1995 season — a year which Northeast ended with a 35-9 Class 2A state quarterfinal victory here Friday at Doug Williams Stadium.

"Hopefully we've established something for a very long time where Teurlings will be a state championship caliber program," said senior offensive lineman Greg Boudreaux. "We tried to set a foundation and I really believe we did that."

A school-record 12 wins, an undefeated District 7-2A championship, first playoff appearance in three years and the state's No. 4 ranking were among the groundwork laid by this year's Teurlings quarterfinal squad.

"It's hard to put into words ... I'm just proud of these nine seniors

that did a great job of leading us all year long," said Teurlings' first-year Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "I didn't see any quit in them out there when things didn't go our way. It just wasn't meant to be tonight. They had the better football team."

Northeast did what no other opponent did against Teurlings — strike early and build on that momentum.

The Vikings (10-3) scored 14 points en route to a 21-3 halftime lead and cemented the victory with a pair of third quarter touchdowns en route to their seventh-straight victory.

"I figured they couldn't stop us once we got on a roll," said Northeast Head Coach Grover Perkins Jr. "I'm not cutting their program, but the competition (level) makes a difference. We played Glen Oaks in the jamboree, McKinley a 5A team and we beat a good 4A team in Walker. In our district, we had runningbacks that had as much speed as they thought they had. So I felt like we could match up with the quickness, and they couldn't match up with the size up front."

Northeast's defense neutralized

Teurlings' speed on the perimeter and made life miserable for quarterback Kyle Stutes with constant pressure. Defensive end Greg Coleman's interception and four-yard return less than a minute into the third quarter solidified a 28-3 advantage.

"I figured we could shut them down," said Perkins. "He tries a lot of trick plays. Tricks plays are fine, but if you have to resort to trick plays you're in trouble. You have to have some basics that you can be consistent with."

Northeast relied on its big-play ability to establish a 21-3 halftime lead.

The Vikings matched the highest point total allowed by Teurling this year — scoring twice in the first quarter — and became only the third team this season to reach double fig-

ures against a Rebel defense which allowed 4.6 points per game.

Quarterback Otis Hamilton connected with a wide open Carl Primus for a 46-yard score following Joey Moss' fumble.

Northeast also converted a pair of short Moss punts — the first of which Derrick Rogers went over the right side from 25 yards out with 1:50 still left in the first quarter. He later added his second touchdown — a 13-yarder with 3:20 showing in the third quarter to complete the Vikings' scoring.

"Give them credit ... they were ready to play football and took it to us," Charpentier said of Northeast. "They deserve all the credit in the world, but that doesn't diminish the way we feel about the year we had. Yeah we're disappointed and it hurts, they did a great job of playing foot-

ball and they deserve all of the credit."

The Vikings completed their first-half surge on 2-and-12. Hamilton escaped Jon Comeaux's rush and found Scott Wicker on a screen pass along the sideline and scored from 38 yards away. Carl Primus added his third of five extra points.

David Domingue's 35-yard field goal gave Teurlings its first points with 7:18 showing in the second quarter. Jesse Cormier then went 49 yards for the Rebels lone touchdown with 23 seconds left in the third quarter.

"At halftime, everyone was kind of down and we tried to them up," said senior offensive lineman Jared Latiolais. "We wanted to go out in the second half and keep up the tradition for next year. That's what we went out to do."

Walker, Breaux highlight All-Parish football squad

■ Charpentier, Hightower share Coach of Year honor

Some honors are just meant to be shared. Take this year's Daily Advertiser Pepsi-Cola All-Parish Coach of the Year award. Try and separate the top two candidates - St. Thomas More's Jim Hightower and Teurlings Catholic's Sonny Charpentier.

Hightower's credentials are impressive. Very few predicted that his Cougars won win the District 5-4A crown after moving up from Class 3A. Winning it by two games was just unthinkable, but that's exactly what Hightower's club did.

After an early-season blowout at New Iberia, STM recovered with back-to-back upsets of No. 4-ranked teams in Crowley and St. Martinville and would lose again until a 27-24 loss to Wossman in the state quarterfinals.

That's an 11-2 season after losing practically his entire offense and defense and moving up in class. Tough to argue with.

Then there's Charpentier. This is just classic Coach of the Year material. The Rebels were 1-9 last season as Charpentier merely

observed from the stands as the school's basketball coach.

He decides to try his hand at football and takes basically the same group of kids to one of the most unbelievable turnarounds ever. Teurlings enjoyed its first 10-0 regular season in 13 years and lost at Northeast in the state quarterfinals for a 12-1 campaign.

Fortunately, the individual awards were a little easier to determine. No one offensive player was more dominant than STM's Javon Walker, this year's Daily Advertiser Pepsi-Cola Offensive Most Valuable Player.

Walker carried the Cougars to the quarterfinals with 1,565 yards and 19 touchdowns on 201 carries. He also had 12 catches for 192 yards and two TDs. He ended the season with a string of nine consecutive 100-yard games, including a pair of 200-yard contests.

The Defensive MVP award went to Carencro's Devon Breaux. His career with the Golden Bears was marked by consistency. He then mixed in with a little more flash his senior season, which was marked by the defense carrying along an often-reluctant offense in the post-Kevin Faulk Era.

The four-year starter and 3-5A Defensive MVP had 78 tackles, 17 assists, five intercep-

tions, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 11 stops behind the line, one blocked punt for a touchdown, nine pass break-ups and five sacks.

Walker's backfield mates include Comeaux's Reggie Flugence at quarterback and the running back corps of Carencro's Camille Batiste (187-1159, 13 TDs) and Acadiana's Buckley Davis (183-1019, 12 TDs) and Bomani Henry (183-1019).

Flugence, the runner-up to Walker for top offensive honors, was quite often a one-man show for the Spartans.

He ran for 602 yards and nine touchdowns on 132 carries and also completed 91 of 217 passes for 1,283 yards with seven touchdowns and 14 interceptions.

The receiving corps consists of STM's Lance Strother (43-683, 6 TDs) and Carencro's John Bernard, who had 28 receptions for 310 yards and one touchdown and also ran it 92 times for 612 yards and six scores.

The offensive line includes Carencro's Andrew Humphrey and Moses Comeau, STM's Mike DeVries, Teurlings' Matt Roberts and Acadiana's Tim LeJeune.

Acadiana's Matt Ronquillo is the tight end.

The defensive line consists of Carencro's Collis Chatman, Northside's Billy Clay, Acadiana's Brandon Hargrave and Comeaux's Willie Griffin.

Chatman had 67 tackles, four sacks, 10 stops behind the line and two blocked kicks.

Clay had 52 solos, 31 assists, 13 tackles behind the line, four sacks and two blocked punts.

Hargrave was a 'Mr. Everything' for the Wreckin' Rams.

As a 5-9, 190-pound nose guard, he had 47 tackles, two fumble recoveries and a blocked punt.

Griffin had 52 solos, 23 assists, three sacks, three fumble recoveries and four stops behind the line.

The other player that made things difficult on both sides was Teurlings Catholic's Joey Moss, who finished in the top three of Most Valuable Player consideration on both sides of the football.

Defensively, Moss had 62 tackles, five interceptions, eight pass break-ups and two caused fumbles.

Offensively, he had 988 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns and 25 receptions for 502 yards and five touchdowns.

Joining Breaux and Moss in the secondary are Comeaux's Terence Senegal and Northside's Kevin George.

Senegal had 75 tackles and eight interceptions, while George had 72 tackles and four interceptions.

The linebackers are Lafayette High's Jake Wright, Teurlings' Jake Benoit, Carencro's Altony Davis and Northside's Corey Willis.

Wright had 121 tackles, two fumble recoveries and an interception return for touchdown.

Benoit had 149 tackles, nine behind the line, four sacks, four fumble recoveries (one for TD) and three caused fumbles.

Davis had 78 tackles (10 behind the line) and three sacks. Willis had 55 solos, 40 assists, three caused fumbles, two fumble recoveries, a sack and an interception.

Davis doubles as the team's return specialist with 15 kickoff returns for 670 yards and four touchdowns.

Moss, Davis Charpentier lead choices

Versatility

That's the name of the game when it comes to describing Teurlings Catholic's Joey Moss and Lake Arthur's Tarrin Davis.

Place Moss or Davis on either side of the football and what you have is a player of significant impact.

For the purposes of the 1995 Daily Advertiser/Pepsi Small School All-Acadiana team, Moss is this year's Offensive Most Valuable Player while Davis is the team's Defensive Most Valuable Player.

Moss was a key figure in Teurlings' reversal of fortunes this year - serving as not only a capable running back and receiver, but a viable force in the Rebels' secondary.

When Moss wasn't delivering ferocious hits from his free safety slot, the 6-foot-1, 180-pound senior was totalling nearly 1,400 offensive yards and 13 touchdowns.

Moss rushed 151 times for 968 yards and 18 touchdowns during a season in which he played sparingly due to several blowouts during the season. He also was an adept receiver, catching 21 catches for 302 yards and five touchdowns.

Davis, who combined for 1,644 offensive yards and 21 touchdowns, was a menace on the defensive end as well. The 6-foot-1, 190-pounder had a total of 32 tackles from his free safety position, recovering 10 fumbles - one of which he returned for a touchdown - and also recorded five interceptions.

Teurlings' Sonny Charpentier was the runaway winner as the All-Acadiana Coach of the Year - and with good reason.

Charpentier guided Teurlings to the greatest turnaround in the state this season - regardless of classification. He took over a program that was 1-9 the year before - and had won only four games in three years - and led the Rebels to an undefeated District 7-2A championship and subsequent run to the state quarterfinals.

The offensive squad features a total of five repeat performers.

All-State tight end Darvin Georgetown of Mamou enjoyed a solid senior season, catching 36 passes for 896 yards and eight touchdowns.

Two of the other repeat first-team choices include offensive lineman Josh Zumbrescher of Notre Dame and Brad Clifton of Loreauville. They were joined by Seth Dykes of Lake Arthur, Benji Guilford of Notre Dame and Matt Roberts of Teurlings.

St. Ed's of Brad Fontenot earned a second straight first-team selection after rushing 222 times for 1,012 yards and 14 touchdowns - fourth best in the Acadiana area. Fontenot and Moss comprise the backfield along with Jota's Josh Ortega (257, 1,490, 11) and Loreauville's Errol Jefferson (139, 934).

Teurlings' Kyle Stutes is the quarterback after completing 88 of 172 passes for 1,562 yards and 15 touchdowns. The wide receivers are Central Catholic of Morgan City's Daniel Matthews (41-495-3) and Port Barre's Gary Soileau (22-397-4).

Port Barre's Jerome Pickney, who averaged 36.7 yards per kickoff return and 22.2 yards on punt returns, is the squad's return specialist. North Vermilion's Isham Mercure is the final first team returnee after kicking five field goals and didn't miss an extra point in 11 attempts.

Defensively, there are two returning first teamers - linebacker Kerry Link and defensive lineman Jeff Duhon of Notre Dame.

Link totalled 133 tackles - including 13 for loss - with four sacks, four fumble recoveries and one interception. Duhon finished with 53 stops - including seven behind the line of scrimmage. He caused three fumbles, recovered one and had 19 hurries.

Joining Link among the first team linebackers were Central Catholic's Bret Bailey, Teurlings' Jake Benoit and Port Barre's Mike Kuhn.

Bailey had 142 total tackles - including three sacks for minus 14 yards - along with causing three fumbles, recovering three fumbles and picking off two passes. Benoit was a mainstay in the Rebels' defensive unit with 149 total tackles - including nine for losses, four QB sacks, four fumble recoveries (one for a touchdown). Kuhn recorded a team-high 191 tackles with five fumble recoveries, two interceptions and two QB sacks.

Duhon leads an interior line group which also consists of Teurlings' Jon Comeaux (86 tackles - 22 for losses totalling 93 yards - seven sacks, four caused fumbles), Loreauville's Albert Green (72 tackles, six sacks) and CCMC's Curtis Randall (85 tackles - 14 for losses - four caused fumbles, three fumble recoveries and seven sacks for minus 51 yards).

Port Barre's Judith Sylvester (88 tackles, eight interceptions - including two for touchdowns - joins Davis in the secondary along with Notre Dame's Taylor Gray (62 tackles, three fumble recoveries, three interceptions - including two for touchdowns - and eight breakups) and Vermilion Catholic's Arlyn Dozier (68 tackles, two fumble recoveries and two interceptions).

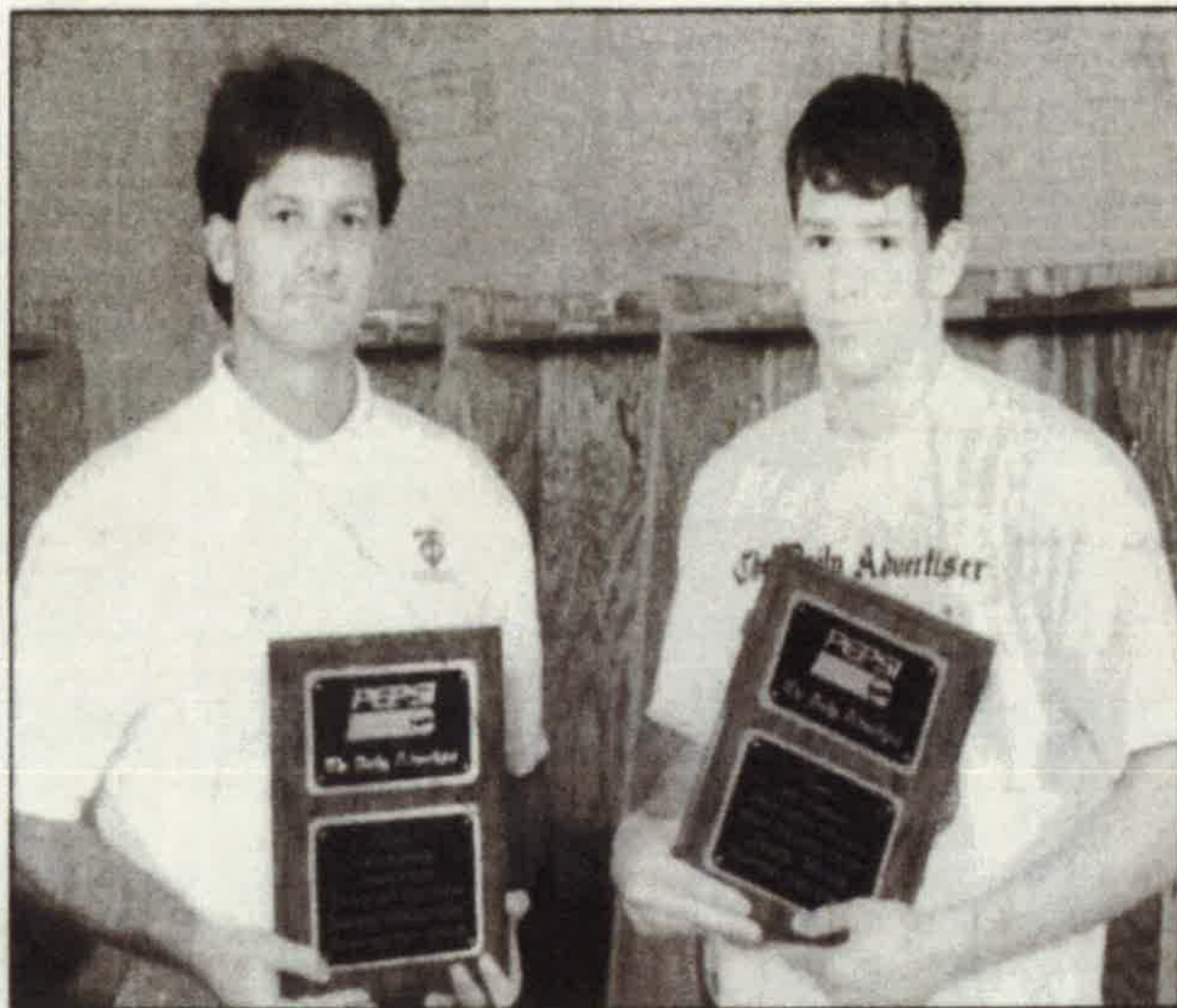
