

And because of it, the Rebels successfully set up Class 2A's premiere matchup next week.

Teurlings rode the big-play combination of Kyle Stutes and Corey LeBlanc, along with a solid defensive outing, to a 27-0 victory over eighth ranked St. Ed's here Friday at Blue Jay Field.

The Rebels improved to 40 with their 14th straight regular season win and set up next Thursday's showdown at Notre Dame.

The Pioneers ran their record to 4-0 and could be the state's top-ranked team after No. 1 Northeast was upset 28-6 by Christian Life.

"This was a much bigger game than Notre Dame," said Stutes, who threw for 165 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another. "If we wouldn't have won this game, next week wouldn't have meant anything. Now we can go out and have fun."

"The kids were focused," said Teurlings Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "We felt his was a big game... just like last year. "I guess time will tell, but St. Ed's has a good club. It didn't look real pretty, but it doesn't matter if we pretty or win ugly. Just as long as we win."

The Stutes to LeBlanc combination worked for big yardage twice—resulting in a 20-0 lead at the 6.07 mark of third quarter. Stutes finished 6 of 7 for a season-high 165 yards.

LeBlanc set up his second score with a nifty 25-yard punt return to the St Ed's 47. Two plays later, Stutes pulled back and connected with LeBlanc on a 45-yard scoring strike.

"I talked to Kyle before the game and he wasn't sure he could throw when it was wet," said LeBlanc, who had four catches for 158 yards. "I just tried to talk to him, give him confidence. You also have to credit the offensive line for the pretection and the walls that were set up on the punt returns."

"That's been hurting us all year the big play," said St. Ed's Head Coach Scotty Richard. "Both touchdown passes were blown coverages. We've been saying if, if too much the last two weeks. That's what separates the good teams from the mediocre ones. Just making the plays."

"I think that broke their backs," said Charpentier. "They had us at the one, we weren't punting well and ended up not having to punt."

"I think getting the touchdown there gave us some momentum," continued Charpentier "That put us up two touchdowns and on a sloppy field that was a big advantage. Especially for a team that likes to throw the ball."

Stutes opened Teurlings' scoring af

ter LeBlanc's 19-yard punt return to the St. Ed's 35. On the first play from shotgun formation. States kept right and went down the sidelines for a 35-yard touchdown. Brock Misques kicked the first of his two extra points.

St. Ed's threatened several times in the first half, only to be turned away on each occasion.

"The defense played real well," said LeBlanc "I just told the guys we were going to get a shutout and that's what we did. We played hard-nosed defense."



Teurlings Catholic's Sonny Charpentier remembers the first team meeting being nothing out of the ordi-

Just a bunch of attentive kids look-

ing for a better way.

It was Charpentier's initial gathering with his team after taking over a Teurlings program in the spring of 1995. Prior to his arrival, the Rebels had won a total of four games in two years including a 1-9 season in '94.
"You could tell they were hungry,"

said Charpentier. "The big thing we brought was consistency. Our expectations were high. It wasn't a matter if

we were going to do it, but when. We had a good assistant coaches that came in and the kids were hungry. It was a great combination.

In just 1 years Teurlings has gone from 1-9 to No. 1 in the state. The Rebels, on the strength of their 30-20 victory over previously top-rated Notre Dame, were voted No. 1 by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association in the Class 2A poll which was released today.

For Teurlings, it represents the first-

ever No. 1 ranking for the school.
"We didn't go into the game thinking
that," Charpentier said of the ranking. "We looked at it as another opportunity for us to get better. The other stuff was

lagniappe. If it happened, then it hap-

"We told them they had the opportu-nity to do what no other Teurings foot-ball did," Charpentier added. "Someone else may come along and do it also, but they could be the first to do it."

Teurlings (5-0) earned nine of the 10 first place votes and had a total of 110 votes District 7-2A foe Port Barre (5-0) moved up to No. 2 while Notre Dame (4-1) slipped to fourth.

Not only is Teurlings off to a 5-0 start for the second straight season, but the Rebels have won 15 consecutive regular season games. Under Charpentier, they've gone 17-1 with a trip to the state quarterfinals a year ago.
"What excites me about this team is

that we have so much more room for improvement," said Charpentier. "I don't know at this time a year ago if we

they can get better. These kids still think they can get better. Teurlings displayed that ability in last Thursday's showdown with archrival Notre Dame. The Rebels scored 23 unanswered points in the second quarter to wipe out a 7-0 deficit. They finally put the game away on Kyle Stutes' 24. put the game away on Kyle States' 34-yard touchdown run in the fourth quar-

"This probably seems to the average person that this has happened overnight," said Charpentier. "But they haven't been with us in the spring and the summer. It's been non-stop and the young men have worked hard. They deserve it."


"Livonia has some good athletes. I'd definitely take several of them, because they've got speed. If we let them get into the secondary, we'll have a hard time catching them."

Delhomme's centributions range much farther than leadership. The 5-9, 165-pounder plays both fullback and tailback on offense and is the defonce's strong safety after moving from cornerback.

"I'd much rather play strong safety than coroerback," Delhamme said, "You're more a part of it al strong safety. You're worked in almost every play. You're insolved in almost every play. You're kind of out on an island all by yourself at cornerback

and you have to wait on the receivers."

Offensively, however, he's not nearly as picky.

"The fullback's a lot easier, because you don't have all the passing routes that the tailback has to remember," Delhomme said, "I get a little mixed up on that sometimes. I really like both of them. It doesn't matter how which one I play. I'm probably going to be more of a fullback from now on because Chail (Verret) is taking care of tailback right now."

Delhomme has rushed for 366 yards and seven touchdowns on 34 carries, and his densive exploits were clearly illustrated when he earned Daily Advertiser/Pepsi Cola Defensive Player of the Week honors for collecting 13 solo tuckles, three assists and an interception in the Rebels' big 30-20 win at Noire Pame.

"R.T.'s flexible," TCHS Head Cosch Senny Charpentier said, "He runa well inside as a fullback and he's got enough speed to run

outside. He ran the ball well last year. He just didn't get it a lot. This year, you hardly see him come off the field. He's not real big, but he's solid and he reacts extremely quick ly on defense.

"The thing about R.T. is that he's so consistent that you almost take him for granted sometimes. I'm real glad he's having some success this year. He's a good kit, I know coaches say that all the time, but I really mean that. He's a fun guy to be around."

As an All-District catcher in basehadl also, Delhamme just has fun competing. These days, though, fun on the football field is directly related to winning.

"It's real important for us to go 100 a again this year," Delhomme said. "I want us to do better than last year's team. Being No. It doesn't really mean a whole lot tus. It's great, but we really don't think about it a lot All that's really on our minds is getting to the Dome."

Now that would be a memory Delhomme would never forget



Green Demons try to knock off Rebels

MAMOU — One is 7-0 and ranked No. 1 in the state. The other is 5-2 and ranked No. 18 among Class AA teams across Louisiana.

The differences between the Teurlings Catholic Rebels and the Mamou Green Demons, however, may not be as large as one might think. The most important similarity at this point is both teams are 2-0 in District 7-AA play.

And that will change for one of them when Teurlings travels to meet the Green Demons 7 p.m. Fri-

day at Mamou High.

While Head Coach Sonny Charpentier has transformed the Rebels
into an instant winner with a 1-1
record over the last two seasons,
Kevin Manuel has developed a winning tradition of his own at Mamou
in recent years.

The Green Demons on well on their way to their fifth straight playoff appearance this season, they won the 7-AA title two years ago and reached the state quarterfinals last season before falling 20-6 to eventual state runner-up De-Quincy.

"I think most people tend to overlook us," Manuel said. "This could be our fifth year in a row in the playoffs and we returned 14 starters from a state quarterfinal team last year. I just think we've been overshadowed by Teurlings and Port Barre all year.

"There was no question in my mind that our district was going to be tough this year. We're just hoping that we can somehow knock off one of them and finish first or second"

More than a perceived lack of recognition, though, the Green Demons have a little retribution in mind after last year's 40-6 loss to Teurlings at Clark Field. Mamou wants to atone for what Manuel called its worst performance of last season.

"We've been thinking about this game for a long time," Manuel said. "It was easily our worst game last year. They just completely dominated us. We were real disappointed in our effort last year against Teurlings, and the kids are looking forward to playing them again.

"It's not going to be easy, though. Teurlings has a lot of size on their interior line, which hurts us because we're kind of small. Offensively, they have a lot of speed and a good quarterback. They have a well-rounded ball club. If they're not No. 1, they're pretty close to it. Teurlings is definitely one of the top teams in the state."

Mamou's balanced ground attack is led by Peter Guillory (34-414, 5 TDs), while Tim LeJeune came back from an injury last week with 82 yards and three touchdown:

What caught Charpentier's attention, though, was Mamou's defense limited Livonia's Jeremy Coleman to a minus-six yards on 13 carries after Coleman collected 123 yards against the Rebels' delense.

To further illustrate similarities between the two, Mamou's defense is currently ranked third in the area at 160.2 yards a game, while Teurlings is sixth at 170.4. Both have allowed exactly 53 points on the season.

"Mamou's got a pretty solid team," Charpentier said. "We definitely have our work cut out for us. They return about eight or nine on defense and did a much better job against Coleman than we did. They're 2-0 just like we are and they've got us at home. They run to ball well defensively and do a good job of getting off blocks.

"They went to quarterfinals last year just like we did and I'm tying to make our kids understand that This isn't going to be an easy ball game. We've got to beat Mamou before we can worry about Port Barre."

One thing the Rebels seem to have going for them is an upgraded passing game to go along with their balanced rushing attack of R.T. Delhomme (54-386, 7 TDs) and Chad Verret (37-334, 3 TDs).





Rebels tackle Comets

LaPLACE — Teurlings Catholic may enter this year's state playoffs with one more loss than the 1996 squad. But there's an bigger differ ence that separates the two squads.

Postseason experience.
That's an element that figures to make this year's edition of the Teurlings Rebels a greater threat after their '95 march to the Class 2A quarterfinals.

Second-ranked Teurlings will attempt to build on last year's magical run when the Rebels (9-1) travel to face District 10-2A runner up and eighh-ranked St. Charles (9-1) at 7 o'clock tonight in a Class 2A bi-district matchup here at Dupuy Memorial Stadium.

"I think we're a much different team," said Teurlings Head Coach Sonny Charpentier. "The kirls know what it's like. They know the finality. They know if you lose you go home.

"There's no substitute for experience," added Charpentier "We've got a lot of kids that went through it last year. That kind of thing is immeasurable. They've kind of been low-keyed about it."

Another distinct difference that this Teurlings squad had to respond to was its first regular sea son loss in two years. The Rebels bounced back after a 21-20 setback to Port Barre with a resounding 55-9 win over North Central.

"The loss was tough and no one liked it." said Charpentier "But it gave us a chance to see how they would respond. It was a disappointing game with a lot of ramifications. I was extremely glad to see them bounce back. These kids are probably more resilient then we give them credit for."

Teurlings opens playoff action against St Charles which finished second to the only team to defeat them — Riverside (23.7). The Comets are making their sixth straight trip to the playoffs under former Vermilion Catholic Head Coach Wayde Keiser.

Junior halfback Brian Horvath leads St. Charles' Wing t attack with 92 carries for 743 yards and 10 touchdowns while fellow halfback Brad Madere, who missed three games with an injured ankle, is next with 112 carries for 490 yards and eight touchdowns.

Quarterback Ty Monica has completed 47-of-82 passes for 571 yards with five touchdowns and six interceptions.

The Comets are averaging 250 yards per game on the ground and have scored 40 or more points in five games this season.

"I think the pressure's going to be on our defense," said Charpentier, who's unit allows 8.9 points and 178.7 yards per outing. "If we can play football like we're capable, we have an excellent chance of winning. If not, then it could be a scoring fest. It's going to depend on which defense steps up."

Teurlings counters with an equally-balanced running game and the capable right arm of quarterback Kyle Stutes

R.T. Delhomme (82-509, 10 TDs) and Chad Verret (58-499, 5 TDs) are the Rebels' leading rushers. States has passed for more than a 1,000 yards for the second straight season (67-of-143-1,004, 8 TDs) while Corey LeBlanc (41-670, 6 TDs) led the Acadiana area in receiving this season.

"The kids are focused ... it's a situation they know a lot about," said Charpentier. "Last year it was kind of surpise to people. It was kind of, 'let's see what this playoff thing is all about. And anything after that was lagniappe."

"The kids have confidence," added Charpentier. "And if we play up to our capabilities, we can go a long way."

"I think there's more pressure in this game because of the rivalry." NDHS Head Coach Donnie Gaspard said. "I know I feel it and I know my kids feel it. I'm sure Sonny (Charpentier) and his kids feel it also. This is definitely a pressure-packed game for both teams. I wish we could be playing this game in the Dome, but that's not the way it worked out."

Gaspard's Pioneers will be trying to avenge losses to the Rebels over the past two regular season. Teurlings upset Notre Dame 17-14 last year and then proved it was no fluke in week five this season 30-20 in Crowley.

"We felt like we had a good gameplan in the first game (this year) and we felt like the kids played well," Gaspard said. "We just made a few costly mistakes and you can't give extra chances to a team as good as Teurlings."

Despite winning the week five clash, Charpentier knows not all was well with the matchup.

The Rebels were limited to 69 rushing yards with 34 of that coming on Kyle Stutes' decisive touchdown run.

"We're going to try to run the ball," Charpentier said. "Our splits weren't real good in the first game. We're going to try to do some things a little differently.

"I think it was a matter of not executing, but if we're have trouble moving it on the ground again, we're prepared to throw it. We don't want to get in a situation, though, where their defense can just pin their ears back and rush."

Stutes (80-169-6, 1141, 15 TDs) is the area's fourth-leading passer, while Corey LeBlanc (51-794, 6 TDs) is the leading receiver. Teurlings' top rusher is R.T. Delhomme (101-682, 11 TDs), who rushed for 173 yards in last week's 21-17 win at St. Charles.


"Kyle's executing as well as he has all year." Charpentier said. "The passing game has made a lot of progress. The protection's better and the receivers are running better routes. Kyle's definitely the key to the whole game. He's making the right reads right now, but we've got to give him time."

Defensively, the Rebels' task is simple try to tackle Brent LeJeune. LeJeune's easily the area's top scorer with 1,974 yards and 36 rushing (37 total) touchdowns on 300 carries.

The biggest issue is the status of sophomore linebacker don Comeaux (knee ligament).

"It's going to be tough if he can't play." Charpentier said. "I'd say there's about a 75 percent chance."

For the Pios, it's a matter of not giving up the big play in the passing game. The Rebels had TD passes of 70 and 40 yards off trick plays in the first meeting.

"I don't know if anybody's pass coverage is good enough to shut their passing game down," Gaspard said, "We feel like our pass coverage has made a lot of progress and is definitely better than it was the first time we played. But it's still going to a challenge for us. We just can't give up so many big plays."

LeJeune-led Notre Dame rolls past TCHS, 49-14

LAFAYETTE - The Notre Dame Piencers are saddled up on their offensive horse and primed to go deeper into the Class AA state phyoffs.

Junior tailback Brent LeJeune dazzled the Teurlings Catholic Rebels with 392 yards and six touchdowns on 48 carries to propel the Pioneers to a revenge-minded 49-14 degloral win Friday night at Lafayette High.

Ledeune's scoring plays covered 1, 60, 56, 5, 6 and 6 vards and 61 all his carries, the 76 varder was the back-breaker for TCHS

The Rebels of Coach Sonny Charpen tier had remained close at half, trailing 14-7 despite the visitors dominating the trenches. But on the first snap of the third period, Ledeune escaped for the 76-yard dash that left little doubt about the outcome.

Brent was just in a zone tonight, said Notre Dame Coach Donnie Gaspard. It just went for him. He's getting better and better every game.

Every time the stunting Rebels were able to slow Ledeune down, fullback Jeremy Prevost did the damage. He totalled 204 yards on 16 carries, including a 32-yard. TD with 7-26 to play, as the Pioneers rolled to 606 yards on the ground and 32 first downs.

"It was only Jeremy's sixth or seventh game as a starter and he's done a great job." said Gaspard "And, our offensive time, I can't say enough for them. We know the game depended upon them.



"Teurings bitted more than they did in the first game, because they were never behind in the first game. It helped Brent, because once he got past the line of scrimmage he had room to run."

The win sets up a home game next week in Crowley against Christian Life for the 11-1 Pioneers, while the Rebels bow out at 10-2.

The Rebels had topped Notre Dame 30-20 during the regular season in a highlyanticipated matchup of the Nos. 1 and 2 teams in the state. The Pios saw Rebel ingenuity and their own mistakes spell doom that night.

"I'm sure it was on the kids' minds," said Gaspard. "It was on my mind, I know. I don't think Notre Dame has a bigger rival than Teurlings."

Amazingly, LeJeune remained in the game through the final Notre Dame drive, scoring his sixth TD with 2:25 remaining. At the risk of injury, the star Pioneer kept rolling up yards.

"We didn't mean to score that last touchdown," Gaspard insisted, "But, we have great respect for their offense."

That Rebel offense struck quickly, as Kyle Stutes hit the Acadiana area's leading receiver, Corey LeBlanc, for a 69yartd touchdown pass on the second play of the game. LeBlanc was open by 20 yards when he gathered in the bomb.

"It was typical Teurlings," Gaspard said. "They pick you right and execute. They do a good job. We checked to a manto-man defense and our defensive back didn't get the call. After that, we played a lot of three-deep and nickel with five backs. We just wanted to keep them out in front of us."


Stutes later hit Ryan Gravouia on a 53yard TD aerial, but the Pioneers were too strong in the regional rematch.

"It's just a shame both teams won't be playing football next week," said Gaspard.
