

Senior Kevin Balfour (5-9, 150) joins the Rebel backfield as a wingback.

The Rebels return all but two of their defensive front seven, along with Verret at strong safety, which is similar to another linebacker in the Rebels' 4-3 defensive scheme.

Senior Justin Dugas (6-0, 195) is a standout at one end spot, where he will be joined by senior Chuck Stout (5-10, 195) at the other end.

Schexnayder and Briscoe are the starting defensive tackles for the '97 season.

Senior Travis Boudreaux (6-0, 195) shifts from his defensive end spot of last season to line-backer.

Meanwhile junior Harold

"Boo" Arceneaux moves from weakside to middle linebacker to replace the departed John Comeaux, who ended up transferring to Carencro.

However, Comeaux, who injured his knee in last year's state playoffs, won't be able to play for the Golden Bears.

"We're expecting big things out of Boo," Charpentier said. "We'll need him to step it up for us."

The other four defensive starters are new to the lineup and include senior linebacker Joe Oliver (5-10, 175), junior Ken Hanes (5-9, 155) and sophomore Chris Rood (5-9, 160) at the corners and Gibson at free safety.

The Teurlings kicking and punting game are in the solid hands (and foot) of senior Brock Migues (6-0, 165), who may give the Rebels an edge in close games.

But if Teurlings Catholic can win the battle of the front lineslike Charpentier thinks it can, there may not be much need for last-minute heroics.

# Dugas' speed paying huge dividends at defensive end

LAFAYETTE — Two springs ago, Justin Dugas briefly got his Teurlings Catholic head coach, Sonny Charpentier, in hot water.

The Rebels were scrimmaging St. Louis of Lake Charles, and then-sophomore Justin Dugas had just moved his then-175

pound frame to defensive end. The two coaches had agreed that there were would be no blitzing in the scrimmage and that was where the problem began. "Justin

came down the open end so fast that he was in the backfield almost before the quarterback." Charpentier said. "Their coach kept getting upset because he thought we were blitzing."

Once the St. Louis coach reviewed the tapes, though, he called Charpentier to apologize. Dugas, it turned out, was just that quick.

That quickness was apparent from the first day that Charpentier asked the former junior high and freshman quar"We put him down there a few times, and we couldn't block him. He's just extremely quick off the ball."

terback — Dugas still wears No. 11 — to take a try at the defensive line as a sophomore.

"We put him down there a few times, and we couldn't block him." Charpentier said. "He's just extremely quick off the ball."

"I was faster than the blockers," Dugas agreed. "I could shoot the gaps quicker and get past them. Speed had a lot to do with it."

Dugas was fortunate that he had 4.6 speed in the 40, because that first year he certainly didn't have the size generally required to play defensive tackle.

"He literally sacrificed his body that year. Charpentier said. "He took a beating. He was black and blue by the end of the season."

Last season. Charpentier moved Dugas to defensive end, which was even better suited to his falents "It gives me more time to see what's going on and react to the ball." Dugas said. "When I was inside, I was so small and the blockers were so big that I couldn't really see what was going on."

As a junior, Dugas led Teurlings in sacks, fumble recoveries, batted balls and tackles for losses, even running back an interception more than 70 yards for a touchdown for good measure.

Now, as a 190-pound senior. Dugas is no longer so undersized for his position, and still possesses the speed that has made him difficult to block from the beginning.

To Charpentier, though, Dugas' effectiveness is due to more than just his quickness.

"What makes Justin so good is that he gives 100 percent every play," Charpentier said. "He only knows one speed. We always tell the younger guys to watch him. It doesn't matter whether it's the first play or the fourth quarter. Justin gives his all every snap."

Recently, Dugas feared that he had run into one opponent that would have slowed him down for weeks — mononucleoisis.

# Teurlings Catholic rips up CHNI in Kiwanis Jamboree opener

LAFAYETTE — The Teurlings Catholic offense appeared to be in midseason form awfully early Thursday night in crushing Catholic High of New Iberia 42-14 in the 46th Annual Kiwanis Club Jamboree at Comeaux High.

Within the first five minutes of the first half, the Rebels had run five offensive plays and scored two touchdowns for a 14-0 lead at 10:46.

A 14-yard screen pass from Justin Guy to Justin Dugas scored the first TD. Then, after Chuck Stout's sack forced a fumble at the CHS 3, Jesse Cormier did the honors with a three-yard plunge.

Guy, only a sophomore, then connected with a wide-open Bryan Gibson on a 36-yard TD pass with 3:33 left in the first for a 21-0 lead.

Amazingly, though, the first-half excitement wasn't done. Zack Mitchell answered Teurlings offense with a 57-yard TD run to cut it to 21-7.

Moments later, after Charlie Molbert's interception, Scott Elias hit Molbert on a 33-yard scoring completion to make it 21-14 at intermission.

The Rebels, though, showed they could score from long distances also when they put together a six-play, 93-yard scoring drive for a 28-14 lead.

Punctuating the drive was a 38-yard TD pass to Chad Verret, who later added a 21-yard TD run. Verret finished with 62 yards rushing and 47 receiving.

Guy finished the game six for 10 for 118 yards and three touch-

downs in addition to 34 yards rushing on three carries. Cormier led TCHS on the ground with 151 yards and two touchdowns on 14 carries, including a 78-yard TD, to earn the game's MVP honors.

Teurlings had 15 first downs. 257 yards rushing and 118 yards passing to Catholic's five first downs, 84 rushing and 97 passing.



## Guy's progress helps Teurlings get off to fast start offensively

LAFAYETTE — Some coaches this week would love nothing better than to start from scratch after a disappointing jamboree performance.

Teurlings Catholic's Sonny Charpentier is no where near that group. His task is to get his Rebels to duplicate their impressive offensive showing in the 42-14 victory over Catholic High of New Iberia, And that task begins at 7 p.m. today when No. 2-ranked Teurlings hosts St. Louis of Lake Charles in the season opener at Clark Field.

"No. 1 wasn't surprised," Charpentier

"No, I wasn't surprised," Charpentier said. "Even though we lost some pretty good players off last year's team, I still feel like we've got a chance to be as good as we've ever been offensively."

we've ever been offensively."
While a huge offensive line and a capable pair of running backs are largely responsible for that opinion, the progress of sophomore quarterback Justin Guy might just be the biggest factor.

"He's really progressed in unbelievable ways," said Charpentier, who is 22-3 in his first two years as the Rebels head coach. He might be the smartest quarterback I've ever coached, especially considering the fact that he's just a sophomore. The great thing about him is that he rarely makes the same mistake twice.

"After the spring, I didn't think we were going to be able to pass the ball as much as usual, but he really worked hard over the summer. Now, our passing game is going to be a little different. We're going to have to do the things he can do,"

Another major factor in the Rebels rolling up 15 first downs and 375 yards in last Thursday's jamboree was the hardnosed running of Jesse Cormier, who had 151 yards and two touchdowns on just 14 carries.

"We knew Jesse had that kind of ability from when he was a sophomore." Charpentier said. "He runs hard and he's hard to bring down. What also helps our running game is that both are very good blockers. Chad (Verret) does a great job of blocking for Jesse." While the offense was shining brightly, Charpentier wasn't nearly as pleased with the Rebels' defensive effort in the blowout jamboree victory.

"We've got a couple kids playing positions they've never played before, so they made some mistakes," Charpentier said. "The good thing is that all the mistakes were made at 100 miles per hour. That comfort zone just is not there yet for them. It'll take time, but it's going to come." And Charpentier is confident St. Louis

And Charpentier is confident St. Loui will provide just the test his Rebels need.

"St. Louis has a good, well-coached team," he said, "They're going to throw multiple sets at us offensively and they run a 43 defensively. This was probably our best week of practice ever, so I feel like we're ready."

#### Port Barre at University

BATON ROUGE — Port Barre's Donnie Perron can't remember the last time his Red Devils were defeated as soundly they were in falling 27-0 to Eunice in the jamhorse.

Now it's time to see how well his No. 7ranked Red Devils can handle the disappointment. They should, of course, have no problem when they travel to meet the University High Cubs at 7 p.m. today in Baton Rouge.


After all, it was the Cubs that upset Port Barre in the first round of the state playoffs a year ago.

## Teurlings shuts down St. Louis

LAFAYETTE — While there might not have been quite as much of an explosion from the Teurlings Catholic offense Friday night after a 42-14 jamboree win, the consistency certainly was there.

Head coach Sonny Charpentier's No. 2-ranked Rebels scored in each of the four quarters to roll past the St. Louis Saints 24-6 Friday at Clark Field in the season opener for both teams.

The Rebels ran for 155 yards and passed for 97 in the victory, while limiting St. Louis to 66 yards rushing and 80 passing.

It was Travis Boudreaux doing the bulk of the damage for Teurlings on this night, rushing for 113 yards and two touchdowns on 20 carries.

Boudreaux got the Rebels' scoring under way in the first with a two-yard TD run, before Chad Verret made it 14-0 at the half with a three-yard scoring run.


Boudreaux was at it again with a one-yard scoring plunge in the third for a 21-0 lead. Then, after St. Louis got on the board with a David Donald one-yard run, Brock Migues got into the act for Teurlings with a short field goal to ice the victory.

## Rebels excited about challenge

BREAUX BRIDGE — It was

At least that's the way Tourlings Catholic head coach Sonny Charpentier saw it anyway.

Now that the Rebels football program is back on the right track, avoiding the old rivalry with the Breaux Bridge Tigers just seemed foolish.

Unless, of course, securing automatic wins is the objective. Charpentier certainly knows that won't be the case when his No. 2 ranked Rebels travel a few miles down the Breaux Bridge Highway to meet the Tigers at 7 p.m. today.

"I didn't really want to play Breaux Bridge and Rayne back-toback," Charpentier said, "That's just the way it worked out. I really think we should be playing Breaux Bridge though, It's a good rivalry and it was time to play again."

Charpentier knows, however, that playing the likes of Breaux Bridge, Rayne and Marksville will make it tougher to stay unbeaten.

"I think the kids realize that it's going to be a tough game to win, but we welcome the challenge," he said. "It's kind of like starting over with this kind of pre-district schedule. I just know it's going to make us better."

One thing that would also do

the trick is the unexpected return of fullback safety Jesse Cormier tonight after pulling his hamstring in last Friday's 24-6 win.

"It makes it lough on us because Justin (Dugas) has to play both ways now with Travis (Boudreaux) moving from tight end to fullback," Charpenter said.

Boudreaux surely played that role perfectly last Friday, filling in with 113 yards and two scores.

But even more than his backfield. Charpentier's concerned with stopping the speed in Breaux Bridge's backfield.

"Breaux Bridge wasn't a 12 football team last year," Charpentier said. "(Domanick) Davis is a real good back. They've got a couple backs that if they get in the secondary, we won't be able to catch."

Charpentier's just hoping his defensive line can hold its own.



Tomorrow's game would be more fun for Dauterive if he had the services of wide receivers Graham Martin (25 catches, 456 yards, four TDs) and Jason Lane (12-167). Martin cracked a vertebra and Lane broke two ribs in OC's 34-7 loss last week to St. Louis.

"We're going in with less weapons, and we didn't have a whole lot of ammunition before," Dauterive said. "Teurlings is the same team that beat St. Louis pretty bad (24-6), and it doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out that this is a mismatch."

If the Vikings can't block the likes of TC defensive ends Justin Dugas and Chuck Stout, it might indeed be a long night.

"The whole key for us is pass blocking," Dauterive said. "We threw the ball nice until last week, but we've had a hard time keeping guys out."

While Charpentier was impressed with the move, he wasn't surprised.



"He never comes off the field and the amazing thing is that he never takes plays off. As far as productivity, he's probably the most productive on our team. Because he does so much, he'd probably be the most missed player on our team."

The numbers certainly support Charp-entier's claim. As a back, Verret has rushed for 471 yards and seven touchdowns on 88 carries. As a receiver, he's caught 30 passes for 539 yards and five touchdowns. He's even the team's back-up quarterback. completing both of his pass attempts for 58

yards and a touchdown.

And that doesn't even include the defensive side, where he's contributed 42 tackles, three interceptions, a caused fumble, four pass break-ups and two fumble recoveries (one for a touchdown).

"Right now, I'm in pretty good shape." Verret said, "Sometimes I need a break on kickoffs, I was out of shape towards the beginning of the year. It's just my legs that get tired.

Back to Verret's ability to focus. Charp entier is often reminded how fortunate he is that Verret's mind doesn't grow weary.

'He's a smart kid," Charpentier said "He retains things well. Sometimes I'll even forget things and he reminds me." Verret came to Teurlings after one year

at Cecilia High. Upon transferring, he sat

out his sophomore season and watched.

Only Verret wasn't just watching. That year it was hard to miss the all-around con-tributions of All-Stater Joey Moss in leading the Rebels to the state quarterfinals, and Verret didn't.

"It's been like a challenge for me to try to beat him." Verret said. "He had a great senson and I set a goal for myself to reach him and to try to do more than Joey did."

Verret, though, isn't interested in a nine-week grade. All he's concentrating on is the final exam.

"I'm just taking it one game at a time," he said. "I'm more worried about team goals than personal goals. Our goal is to get to the state finals.

Verret also happens to be the center of

attention in the spring as the Rebels' centerfielder, hitting .424 as a junior.

And his 6-0, 170-pound frame actually has Verret considering a college career in baseball rather than football. For now, however, paramount in Verret's mind is Friday's showdown at No. 1-ranked Port Barre


"We set a goal to win the district chainpionship," Verret said, "That's what we've worked for. I don't really think about last year's game very much. I don't like to think about it because we lost. I just try to remember the happy times.

Verret's determination and focus over the past two years have certainly helped to produce quite a scrapbook.

# TCHS vs. Port Barre

## Rebels' focus is on sure tackling

PORT BARRE — It's a play that when rerun in his head is quickly transformed into a nightmare.

It took place late in Port Barre's 21-20 victory over No. 1-ranked Teurlings last season. On third down and somewhere in the neighborhood of 30 yards to go from the PBHS 5, Red Devil full-back Rusty Higdon broke tackle after tackle to pick up a key first down and ice the District 7-AA-clinching victory.

Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier is hoping to repeat any such incidents at 7 p.m. today when his No. 9-ranked Rebels (7-2, 4-0) travel to meet those same Red Devils. Only this time, it's Port Barre that's undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the state.

"We were looking at last year's film and we moved the ball on them." Charpentier said. "I'm just worried about tackling them. We can't let that (Higdon's run) happen again. We've got to tackle. They have big, physical backs, but if (Jerome) Pickney gets in the open field we don't have any-body who can catch him either."

As good as Charpentier feels

Port Barre's backfield is, however, he wouldn't trade it for his. The Rebels' backfield is more balanced and a bit more versatile, featuring Jesse Cormier (113-711, 7 TDs), Chad Verret (82-471, 7 TDs) and Travis Boudreaux (95-425, 3 TDs).

"I think it's a wash as far as comparing the two backfields," Charpentier said. "And although their backfield is very good, I wouldn't trade ours for it. People might think I'm crazy, and maybe I'm just too loyal to my players, but that's the way I feel."

As for the actual matchup, though, Charpentier views it as a virtual toss-up.

"I think overall, they're probably a little better offensively," he said. "Defensively, though, I'm not sure that they're better than we are. I feel like we've played a tougher schedule and I hope that'll pay off for us.

"Last year, there was a lot of hype. We were No. 1 and they were No. 2. They beat us and they deserved it. It was our first regular-season loss in two years and it was very disappointing."

A feeling Charpentier and his Rebels haven't forgotten.

## Consistency key to Devils' success

PORT BARRE — While the No. 9-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels have slowly been building towards their current level of high performance, head coach Donnie Perron's No. 1-ranked Port Barre Red Devils have been there all season long.

The Devils sport the No. 2-rated offense in the Acadiana area at 345.8 total yards a game, as well as the No. 2-rated defense in the area, allowing just 132.8 yards per contest.

Perron's simply counting on that consistency to carry his Devils through their toughest test yet when they entertain Teurlings with the District 6-AA title on the line at 7 p.m. today.

"I think we'll be prepared," Perron said. "We've played different kinds of teams during the season. We've played passing teams like OC and physical runing teams like Patterson and then teams that do a little of both like North Vermilion.

"Teurlings lost to two very good triple A teams, so they have a very good ball club. It's nice to be in this position again. We're looking forward to it. It should be a great game."

As usual, the Devils will be counting heavily on their running game of Jerome Pickney (171-1399, 21 TDs) and Rusty Higdon (125-786, 10 TDs). The big difference in this year's matchup, though, is the new quarterbacks—Joey Bing (27-57-1, 526 yds, 7 TDs) of Port Barre and Justin Guy (45-106-3, 737 yds, 6 TDs) of Teurlings.

"Both are younger kids that will get better," Perron said. "Joey (Bing) is coming along steadily and I've noticed that their kid (Guy) is throwing the ball with a lot more confidence than he was earlier in the season."

Perron's also hoping that the matchup leans his way because of overall improvements on both sides.

"Offensively, we're definitely better," he said. "The offensive line is blocking well, Joey gives us more mobility and our backs are more experienced. Defensively, we're using two inside backers this year and that's made us stronger."

# Rebels' Cormier comes alive in Teurlings' 27-20 triumph

## Potent rushing attack carries TCHS to win

LAFAYETTE — Just in case any Teurlings Catholic Rebel fans were starting to get a little concerned about Jesse Cormier, the senior fullback calmed any fears during a 27-20 road win over Buckeye Friday night.

Not only did Cormier rush for 177 yards and a touchdown on 17 carries, but also caught three passes for 51 yards and two touchdowns.

"Jesse hasn't been running as well as he usually does in the last few weeks," head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We saw a lot of the old Jesse last night. He ran hard and did a great job."

Buckeye actually had a 7-0 lead after one period on a Ron Cole 8-yard touchdown run. On the night, Buckeye rushed for 228 yards.

"Buckeye was real scrappy," Charpentier said. "They came in 7-3 and played with a lot of confidence. We had a tougher time stopping their running game than we thought we would have. One thing that killed us was penalties on both sides of the ball."

Offensively, the Rebels rushed for 268 yards and passed for 85 in the big victory that earned Teurlings the right to host University High at 7 p.m. Friday at Clark Field. University beat Riverside 34-20 Friday.

Also productive for Teurlings was sophomore quarterback Justin Guy with 71 yards rushing on nine carries and completing five of 12 passes for 85 yards and two scores.

After Buckeye's early lead, the Rebels stormed back with 20 unanswered points.

Cormier started it with a 13-yard touchdown reception from Guy, before Guy hit Brian Gibson with a 37-yard scoring play to give the Rebels the lead for good.

Cormier then got back into the receiving act with a 27-yard touchdown reception.

After Cole kept Buckeye alive with a 9-yard touchdown catch, Cormier went to the ground game with a 60-yard run.

Davis Willis then wrapped up

the scoring with a 5-yard touchdown run, but it was too little too late for Buckeye.

Despite the win, Charpentier knows his Rebels' performance will have to improve next week in order to advance to the Class 2A state quarterfinals.

"We had success running the ball, but we didn't take advantage of some good field position," Charpentier said.

"We had a few drives stalled. We're getting way too many penalties (12 for 100 yards). We're going to have to play better defensively and be more consistent on offense if we're going to beat University."

If Teurlings does come up with a way to defeat University, the Rebels will get another break in the bracket in the state quarterfinals. No matter which team prevails in the state regional contest between DeQuincy and Ouachita Chrisitian, Teurlings will host.

# U-High Cubs cash in on mistakes by Rebels

LAFAYETTE — Heading into Friday night's regional playoff game with the University High Cubs, Teurlings Rebel head coach Sonny Charpentier said that his Rebels would have to play better than they had been in order to beat the Cubs.

He was right.

Charpentier also said that the team that made the fewer mistakes would win the game.

Right again.

Costly mistakes and two costly turnovers by the Rebels proved to be the difference here Friday as Teurlings dropped a tough 17-7 decision to the Cubs.

"It's very frustrating," Charpentier said. "It was a strange game. I just didn't see the emotion that I thought we needed to win the game."

The Rebels dug themselves an early hole after Chad Verret fumbled University High's first punt

of the game and the Cubs' Chris Brooks kicked a 35-yard field goal to put the Cubs up 3-0 with 6:12 remaining in the first quarter.

On the ensuing kickoff, Teurlings' Jesse Cormier bobbled the ball before being tackled at his own five-yard line. The Rebels could get nothing going and the Cubs took over at their own 33.

That's when University running back Marcus Etienne, who finished with 177 yards on 25 carries, began to make an impact.

Etienne broke lose for a 31-yard gain on first down and then broke loose for 20 more yards to move the ball to the Rebel one yard line. Fullback Carter Hill then scored on a one-yard run to put the Cubs up 10-0 with 1:05 remaining in the first quarter.

Teurlings' lone touchdown of the game came on its second possession of the game when quarterback Justin Guy found Chad Verret open for a 13 yard touchdown pass with 7:53 remaining before half to close the gap to 107.

But that was as close as the Rebels would get.

In the second half, the Rebels managed just 35 total yards of offense, while the Cubs added one more score on a 15 yard pass from quarterback Will Stelly to Michael Selders.

"The second half was bad. No doubt about it," Charpentier said. "They made the plays and we didn't. We got down and we knew we had to get a quick score, but we had a few drops and a total lack of offense. They just wore us down emotionally"

The emotion was definitely there for Cub head coach Willis Stelly, who plans to retire after the season.

"It's definitely fun this time of year," Stelly said. "I don't mind postponing my retirement at all."

With the win, University advances to play Ouachita Christian, a 47-12 winner over DeQuincy, in the state quarterfinals.

of the season and Hanks followed Bill Dotson in style with an 8-3 state playoff campaign.


To cap off the season, the trio earned top honors on the 1997 Daily Advertiser/Pepsi-Cola All-Parish football team.

Joining Martin in the backfield are Acadiana's Steven Hava and Teurlings Catholic's Chad Verret. Hava rushed for 1,167 yards and 13 touchdowns, while Verret was an effective two-way threat for the Rebels with over 500 yards rushing, over 600 yards receiving and 13 total touchdowns.

The quarterback on the team is one of the nation's most recognized college recruits in Carencro's Damien James, who rushed for 1,686 yards and 18 touchdowns and also completed 38 of 88 passes for 755 yards and seven touchdowns.

The receivers on the squad are St. Thomas More's Adam Kennedy (44-679, 10 TDs) and Acadiana's Derek Newman (26-441, 5 TDs).

The team's offensive line consists of St. Thomas More's Jacob Crouch, Carencro's Nick Celestine, Teurlings Catholic's Eric Schexnayder and the Acadiana duo of Mike Smith and Ricky Shepheard and St. Thomas More tight end Buck Miciotto.

Davis is joined at linebacker by Lafayette High's Treverance Faulk, Acadiana's Justin Venable and teammate Wilson Noel. Faulk's numbers this year were simply incredible with 105 solos, 53 assists and three fumble recoveries. Venable battled injuries for 41 solos, 26 assists, two interceptions and 7½ socks

sacks. Noel had 42 solos, 72 assists, nine hurries, eight sacks, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

The defensive line consists of St. Thomas More's Adam Abdalla, Northside's Carlos Walker, Teurlings Catholic's Justin Dugas and Acadiana's Marcus Malveaux. \*... As usual, it will be the men in the trenches that will make all these offensive fireworks possible, and the All-Acadiana team will be no exception. Central Catholic's Allan Navarro gets the nod and center, where he will be flanked by offensive guards Brandon Briscoe of Teurlings and Chris Duhon of VC and tackles Eric Schexnayder of Teurlings and Bryan Sonnier of Port Barre.

The kicking game will be in solid hands, with Teurlings' Brock Migues handling the field goals and extra points and Pickney (two kickoff returns, one punt return for TDs) returning kicks

Though the First Team Offense promises to be explosive, the First Team Defense likely wouldn't need much help to win games. The unit features two starters each from Port Barre and St. Ed's, two of the top-performing defenses in the area, as well as a pair each from Teurlings and Central Catholic.

just as tough a time cracking this defense through the air against a secondary headed by District 7-A defensive MVP Salah Francis (35 solos, 46 assists, 11 INTs, 13 PBUs) of Central Catholic.

Alongside Francis will be Kaylam Guidry of surprising Westminster (39 solos, 36 assists, 12 caused fumbles, six INTs, 26 PBUs, four fumble recoveries, three sacks), two-way pick Knatt of Loreauville and Josh Andrus of St. Edmunds.

Not that this team really needs one, but Port Barre's Lance LeBlanc is the pick at punter. LeBlanc kicked 33 times for a 38.4 yard average, including three punts for a 53-yard average—including one downed at the 1—in a playoff game against St. Charles

VC's Ossie Blaize is the head coach who will get to put all this talent into motion. One year removed from a 2-8 campaign. Blaize led the Screaming Eagles to an 8-2 season and two playoff wins before a hearthreaking loss to Logansport on a final-play Hail Mary pass in the state quarterfinals.

Blaize likely wouldn't need to worry about such miracle comebacks against this team.
