Rebels top NHS Vikes in Kiwanis

LAFAYETTE -- Despite the one-sided final score, a pair of well executed offenses were on display in Friday's first game when the Teurlings Catholic Rebels defeated the Northside Vikings 21-0 at the 49th Kiwanis Football Jamboree at St. Thomas More.

The Rebels finished with 13 first downs, 196 yards rushing and 20 passing. The Vikings countered with nine first downs, 139 yards passing and 67 rushing.

Teurlings scored in five plays on its first drive, finishing on a 45-yard Dominique Floyd run at 6:24 of the first half.

Corey Chaisson's interception at the NHS 4 prevented another Rebel score, but Floyd followed a fumble recovery by ending a three-play, 30-yard drive with a 2-yard TD run for a 14-0 lead at 8:16 of the second half.

The final score was on a 9-yard TD pass from Dustin Arnaud to Kory Hebert with 3:27 left.

Floyd finished with 73 yards on eight carries, and Adam Fisher with 56 yards on six tries. Arnaud added 48 yards on five attempts and was 2-of-4 passing for 20 yards to earn team MVP honors.

Viking starter Joseph Thibeaux finished 6-of-9 passing for 84 yards, while Desmond McNeil hit four of nine passes for 55 yards.

Steven Anderson had four catches for 42 yards for team MVP honors. Phillip Norman had 10 carries for 37 yards and four receptions for 67 yards and

there, but right now, we're not there."

PBHS at Teurlings

Rebels feel back home at Clark

LAFAYETTE — There are two things about last year's thrilling state semifinal campaign that the Teurlings Catholic Rebels want to change.

One, they would like to get at least one step farther, and two, they want to play all their home games in one place.

The Rebels' hopeful road to the Superdome begins at their old Clark Field home at 7 p.m. today when Teurlings hosts defending Class 2A state finalist Port Barre.

"The kids love it there," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "You won't recognize the place. There's a new scoreboard, raised-up bleachers, new goal posts and no more baseball dirt. It's beautiful and the kids like the atmosphere."

The truth is that there's also a lot for Charpentier to like about his Rebels, who rushed for 196 yards in the 21-0 jamboree win over Northside. That was achieved by the balanced rushing of quarterback Dustin Arnaud (5-8), tailback Dominique Floyd (3-7), L TD and fullback Adam Fisher (5-6).

"Dominique had a good game, and Adam's a real good runner," Charpentier said. "Adam put on 15 pounds since last year and it's all in his legs. Dustin did a good job. He was a lot less excitable than I thought he would be."

Defensively, end Nick Webre will return after missing the jamboree and safety

Charlie Garrett is expected to play despite missing time in the jamboree due to a high ankle sprain.

"We tackled very poorly at times," Charpentier said, "and we didn't do a good enough job of getting pressure on the quarterback."

Fewer missed tackles will be necessary against speedy Red Devil quarterback Greg Bing and tailback Daniel Francis.

"Bing's a real playmaker," Charpentier said. "We've got to make sure we contain him. He (Francis) is the typical Port Barre tailback that they've had the last few years. He's got outstanding speed. If he gets loose, we don't have anyone to catch him."

Something else the Rebels hope to repeat is a thrilling 33-29 come-from-behind victory over Port Barre.

Impressive start

TCHS Rebs outscore Port Barre

LAFAYETTE — The Port Barre Red Devils found out firsthand why they've been so successful over the past four seasons.

Spice a triple-threat backfield with a fullback that keeps you honest up the middle and opposing defenses are in big trouble.

Only it was the Devils on defense this time around, and the Teurlings Catholic Rebels was the offense calling the shots, rushing for an impressive 395 yards in capturing a 35-21 victory Friday at Clark Field.

"Teurlings is big and strong," Perron said. "They have an excellent football team. I would say they're as good as anybody in 3A right now. It was an uphill battle. I was pleased with the way our guys never gave up. We just have to keep battling and try to stay healthy."

Teurlings ended each of its seven first-half possessions in Devil territory. The second one produced a 5-yard Adam Fisher TD plunge for a 7-0 lead at 6:44 of the first.

The Rebels would then score on two of their next three drives, first on a 16-yard TD pass from Dustin Arnaud to Kory Hebert and then a 10-yard Dominique Floyd scamper for a 21-7 lead with 6:35 left until intermission.

To its credit, Port Barre stayed close for a while with the big play Marvin White busted a reverse for a 64-yard

TD run at 4:33 of the first and Daniel Francis broke loose on a 94-yard kickoff return to narrow the gap to 21-13 at 6:23 of the second period.

But when the half ended, Teurlings had run 36 offensive plays to 15 for Port Barre, relating to a 255-95 rushing edge. That kind of domination on the line produced an 8-yard TD pass to Dustin Quebe-deux with 19 seconds left for a 28-13 lead.

Things got a little testy for the Rebels, though, when an 11-play drive to open the second half ended with a fumble at the

PHHS 15.

Three plays later, White caught a 75-yard TD pass from Greg Ring, who then hit Abale Levier for the two-pointer at 4:02 of the third.

Suddenly, Port Barre with just three first downs was trailing just 28-21 to a Rebel club with 20 first downs.

"That's the game of football," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "You've got to play all the plays. We controlled the line of scrimmage and moved the chains, but there were a couple of situations where we didn't execute. We had a break

down on special teams and took a poor angle on a hitch."

Teurlings had 321 yards rushing at the time behind Fisher with 101, but he was now on the sidelines with cramps.

Teurlings would deliver the fatal blow after a big defensive stand on a Floyd 7-yard TD Run to make it 35-21 with 3:20 left to play.

The game was halted with 3:41 left in the third when Port Barre's C.J. Mallet was taken off on a stretcher with a neck injury. The postgame report, though, was encouraging.

"He was scared and in pain," Perron said. "He said he couldn't feel his limbs, but he was moving them."

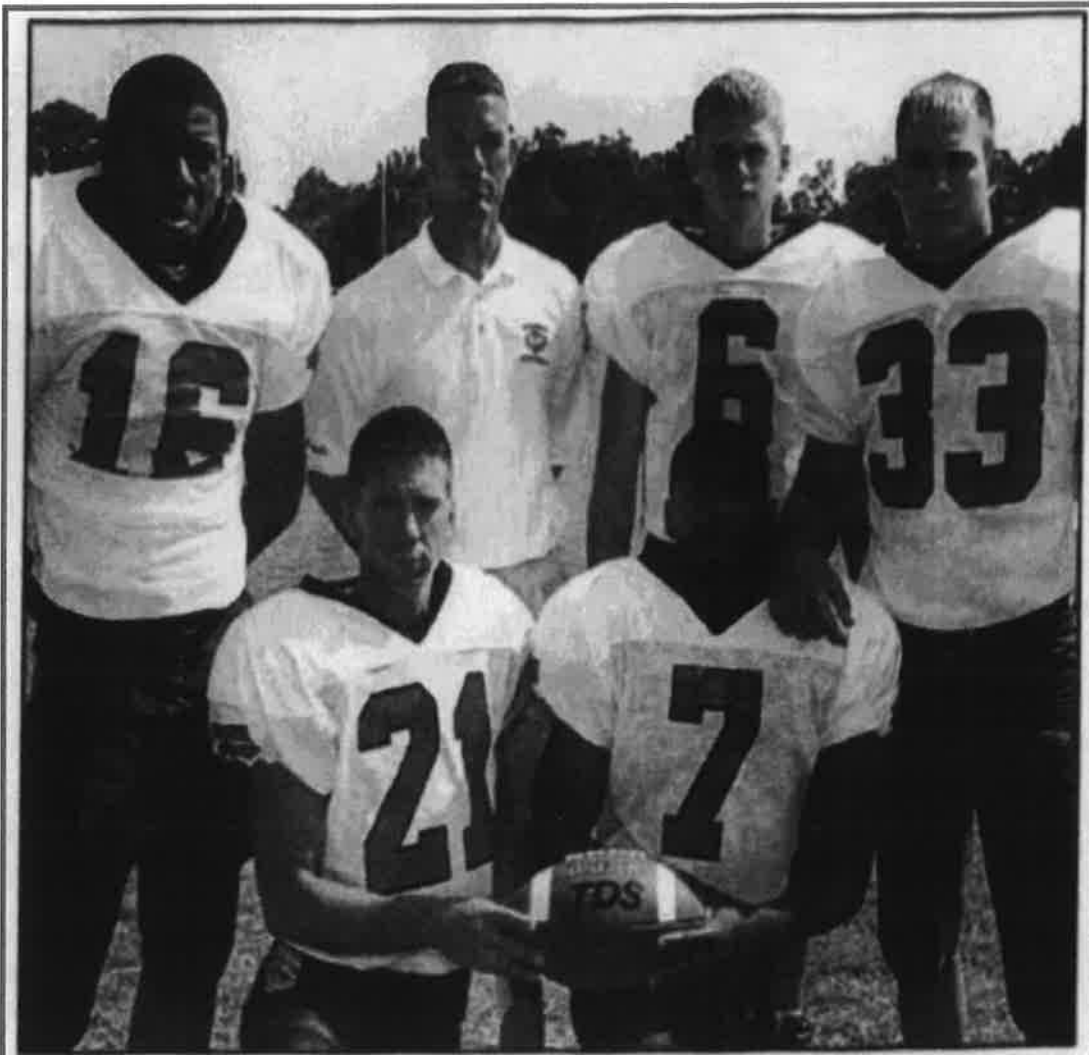

BBHS vs. TC — family war

LAFAYETTE — It's time for the family rivalry.

When Teurlings Catholic and Breaux Bridge tie up, it's neighbor against neighbor for the schools separated by only a few miles of highway. Significant numbers of Rebel students hail from St. Martin Parish, creating a level of excitement not normally seen for a non-district game.

"It's a different type of intensity," said Breaux Bridge head coach Mike Mowad. "We've been pretty successful over the last few years, but we know it's going to be a heck of a game especially with the way Teurlings is playing right now."

"We've got a lot of kids from over there," said TCHS' Sonny Charpentier. "It's been a good rivalry. All the kids know each other."

The two teams square off at Clark Field Friday at 7 p.m. after a pair of strong offensive and defensive performances in their opening games. Breaux Bridge tossed a 28-0 shutout at Jennings, rolling up 372 yards offensively and holding the Bulldogs to only five first downs and a measly 106 total yards.

"It wasn't quite that easy," Mowad said, "but we had some big plays and also controlled the football pretty well. We had two touchdowns called back, and Jennings had a couple of guys out at key positions."

"We were able to put a lot of pressure on them early in the game defensively, and on offense we were able to get outside on them pretty handily."

The host Rebels, meanwhile, recorded a 35-21 win over Port Barre in a matchup of teams that reached the Class 3A semifinals and Class 2A finals respectively last season. In that contest, TCHS generated 392 yards rushing and 467 yards overall, and ran off 73 offensive plays to only 36 plays for the Red Devils.

Even with those numbers, Teurlings only led by a 28-21 margin in the fourth quarter.

"It was a strange game," said Charpentier. "We only punted twice and had that huge discrepancy in plays. We were able to do a lot of things defensively to control them except for a couple of plays and a kick return."

Big plays could also be a big factor on Friday, with the Tigers sporting enough team speed to give Charpentier nightmares.

"They've got outstanding speed on both sides of the ball," he said. "They've got five or six guys that can just motor. We've got to contain that kind of stuff to have a chance. I think they're better this year than they were last year, and I know they're faster and more explosive. They make you defend the whole field."

Sophomore quarterback Darren Noel, making his first start, rushed for one score and threw for one, hitting seven-of-11 passes for 127 yards and carrying for 58 more. Junior fullback returnee added a team-high 87 rush yards and two scores including a 56-yard burst early in the third period to lock up the Tiger victory.

"I'm not sure we're as good in the offensive line as we were last year," said Mowad, "but the people we have in the backfield and at the receiver spots make us better than we really are. Darren gives us something that we haven't had in a while ... he can handle the offense, throw it and run with it."

"Right now, our people are catching the ball, and we're getting a lot of people involved in the offense."

The Rebels also had numbers in their opener, with four players rushing for 58 or more yards including a pair of 100-yard performances. Senior Dustin Arnaud went for a team-high 111 yards and one score while throwing for two others, and tailback-turned-fullback Adam Fisher went for 103 yards and the game's first score against

Port Barre.

"We thought we'd be able to move the ball on the ground," Charpentier said of his offensive unit that features seven returning starters and nine seniors, "but you never know. Our kids were able to hold on and get it done."

"They're really experienced," Mowad said. "They've got a lot more experience than we have. Our young kids can run, but they're young kids that can also make mistakes. We're killing ourselves with penalties now, and we've got to eliminate mental mistakes."

Tigers stake claim

BBHS downs TCH Rebels

LAFAYETTE — As usual, the Breaux Bridge Teurlings Catholic football matchup was n't decided until the final horn.

Or, in this case, after the final horn.

The host Rebels got off a play after time expired, at the end of a desperation late drive, but quarterback Dustin Arnaud's last play pass was batted away in the end zone as the Tigers held on for a 14-7 victory here Friday night.

The late breakup by the BBHS defense was a microcosm of the entire game, with Breaux Bridge holding the normally-potent TCHS offense in check the entire night. With only one minute left, the Rebels had only five first downs and only 119 yards in total offense, and had not assembled an offensive drive of more than five plays.

Those numbers changed in that final minute, when Arnaud connected with wide receiver Dustin Padgett three times for 55 yards in a desperation march that eventually reached the Tiger 15-yard line on a 16-yard hookup between the two.

The Clark Field clock ticked off two final seconds after the completion, but officials gave the time-out-less Rebels one last play. Arnaud lobbed into the end zone aiming for tight end Kory Hebert, but two Tiger defenders converged to break up the final attempt.

"Our defense won this for us," said BBHS head coach Mike Mowad. "We've got a lot of young guys out there, but we've

also got some seniors in some key places. They give us a lot of leadership when we need it."

The Tigers (2-0) needed all that leadership after going into halftime down 7-0, despite not giving up an offensive score. Teurlings (1-1) thwarted BBHS' first offensive salvo and capitalized on a turnover when line-backer Brooks Stuart stepped in front of a Darren Noel pass and returned it 60 yards thanks to a convoy of Rebel blockers for the half's only score.

However, Breaux Bridge came out after halftime and scored twice in the first three and one-half minutes of the second half. Noel broke loose on a sweep to the right side on the half's first play and took it 76

yards for a tying touchdown.

Then, after Arnaud fumbled on the first play after the kick off — one of three lost fumbles and one of four Rebel turnovers — the Tigers marched 38 yards on six plays with Noel hooking up with Corey Potier from 15 yards out on a fade in the left corner of the end zone.

After that, the Tigers held Teurlings to 25 rushing yards and 19 passing yards in the second half until the Rebels' final minute drive.

"They did a great job defensively," said TCHS head coach Sonny Charpentier. "We didn't get any continuity or rhythm going. They outplayed our offense — our offense got shut out tonight."

The Rebels hurt themselves with two midfield fumbles in the first half, but Breaux Bridge had four drives end in Rebel territory in its scoreless first half.

"Hats off to the way our defense played," Charpentier said, "but we've got to play all phases of the game. We've got a lot of work ahead of us."

The Tigers had possession a total of 19 times in TCHS territory on the way to rolling up 292 yards in total offense.

"We're playing pretty well right now," Mowad said. "The character of this team came through tonight. We've put pressure on these guys, especially our seniors, and they've been able to handle it."

CLINTON — Sonny Charpentier doesn't exactly know what to think about Clinton, which has defeated Kentwood and lost to West Feliciana so far this season.

CROWLEY — The No. 10-ranked St. Thomas More Cougars got tuned up for next week's clash with the No. 3-ranked Sam Houston Broncos in fine fashion Friday with a 42-14 road victory over the winless Crowley Gents.

The Cougars (2-1) used a balanced effort to continue their longtime domination of Crowley High. Fullback Eraste Autin rambled for 70 yards and three touchdowns on six carries, while quarterback Jerry Babb added 65 rushing yards and a touchdown on four carries.

Andre Broussard returned from his injury to add 52 yards and a score on 10 attempts, not to mention two receptions for 13 yards.

Babb was also 3-for-3 passing for 65 yards, while Michael Cason added two completions in three tries for 21 yards.

The Cougars led just 7-6 after the first period, but then poured it on with 21 points in the second period on short touchdown runs from Babb, Autin and Gothe. Then the Cougars began to go long distance with a 60-yard run from Gothe and a 34-yard run by Autin for serious breathing room.

Teurlings 45, Clinton 14

CLINTON — Apparently, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels didn't like the taste of losing, because coach Sonny Charpentier's club bounced back in style with a 45-14 road win over Clinton.

Dustin Padgett got Teurlings (2-1) going with a 39-yard TD pass from Dusty Collette, but then Patrick Sanders returned the ensuing kickoff 95 yards for a score to tie it.

Adam Fisher then gave the Rebels the lead for good with a 3-yard touchdown run, before Dominique Floyd added a 1-yard himself. Clint Hebert's 22-yard field goal earned TCHS a 24-7 halftime lead.

Floyd, who finished with 31 yards, had back-to-back touchdown runs from 7 and 4 yards in the third. Josh Dean finished up the Rebels' scoring with a 7-yard run. Fisher added 65 yards and a score.

Padgett finished the night with 103 yards receiving on six receptions from Dustin Arnaud, who was 12-of-20 passing for 148 yards.

LaGrange 35, Comeaux 12

LAKE CHARLES — The LaGrange Gators jumped out to a 21-6 lead in the first half and never looked back in taking a 35-12 win over the Comeaux Spartans in District 3-5A action.

Teurlings at Erath

Rebels try to hold off 3-0 Bobcats

ERATH — The Erath Bobcats are riding a natural high after starting the season 3-0, but not too high.

That's because Erath coach Jacob Byler knows how easily a team can go from the ranks of the untested to fighting for a 500 record.

Last year was a good example. The Bobcats entered last season on the heels of an 8-2 season and playoff appearance as a Class 3A school in 1999. With the move down to Class 2A anticipation for the 50 season was at an all-time high.

Then the bad breaks started to happen. The Bobcats opened the season with a 14-6 loss at Delcambre before getting in the win column with a 41-20 victory over Opelousas Catholic.

Unfortunately for the Bobcats, that would be the last time they would taste victory in 1999 as the Bobcats lost eight straight to finish the season with a 1-9 mark.

Apparently, last season left a bitter taste in the Bobcats' mouths as Erath has opened the season with three consecutive wins heading up to tonight's showdown with the # ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

The Bobcats will face their toughest test of the season tonight at Bobcat Field when they confront the highly explosive Rebels (2-1).

"Every one from here to the rest of the way will be pretty big," Byler said of his team's remaining schedule. "I think we learned that last year. I don't know if we were quite ready to play every week last year. We had a two or three week stretch that I think we were looking ahead to district

ready to play every week last year. We had a two or three-week stretch that I think we were looking ahead to district. We didn't play well in those games and it kind of went downhill after that."

And the Bobcats are currently in the middle of that stretch. Last year, Erath opened with a tough loss at Delcambre before bouncing back with a convincing win over Opelousas Catholic.

Then Erath hit that three game stretch that Byler and the boys would like to soon forget. In their next three games, the Bobcats lost by a combined score of 126-30.

Erath survived their first test of "the stretch" with a 14-13 win over Port Barre. Now comes the hard part, getting past a Teurlings team that's coming off a 45-14 rout of Clinton.

"They're the best people we've played so far," Byler said. "They have a large number of returners off that state semifi-

nal team (from a year ago). They don't have too many flaws."

The Bobcats will counter with a ball-control offense that uses a wide variety of backs and receivers.

Bruce Fourroux (47-195, 2 TDs), Ted Toups (28-111), A.J. Arceneaux (16-71) and Lenny Giardelli (15-96) will try to open things up for quarterback Adam Davis (6-72 rushing; 16-38-5 190 yards, 2 TDs).

"We need to be able to move the ball," Byler said. "If we get into a punting war, it's going to be a tough situation. If we can play the same type of game we played last week, we will be alright."

The Rebels are led by the

duo of Adam Fisher (26-182, 2TDs) and Dominique Floyd (30-149, 4 TDs). Quarterback Dustin Arnaud is more of a running threat (40-119, 1 TD), but is capable of throwing the ball (26-52-1, 308 yards, 2TDs). Dustin Padgett is Arnaud's favorite target (14-206, 1 TDs).

"(Teurlings coach) Sonny (Charpentier) and them do a super job of exploiting weaknesses," Byler said. "We don't have anybody in our secondary that can really match up with them, especially their tight end. We have a 5-6 kid, we have a 5-8 kid and a 5-9 kid. And they're going to be going up against a 6-5 guy."

"They're going to have to rely on their teammates. We've been winning as a team and we have to continue playing that way. There are going to be some times when we are going to be

tested and so far we've answered all the challenges. We just need to keep trying to do that."

The Rebels opened with a 35-21 win over Port Barre before falling to 7th-ranked Breaux Bridge 14-7 in week two. Teurlings then pounded Clinton 45-14 last week to move to 2-1.

Teurlings began the year ranked No. 3 in Class 3A before dropping after the Breaux Bridge loss.

"I think (our kids) have developed a respect for other teams, but I think they also respect themselves," Byler said. "I think it's more of how good we are going to play and not who we are playing. Respect the other team and try to know what they are going to do, but focus on what we have to do as a team."

Rebels overcome penalties in rout

ERATH — Friday night's matchup with the Erath Bobcats was a game of extremes for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels. On one hand, the Rebels rolled up 507 yards in total offense. On the other hand, the Rebels amassed 170 yards in penalties.

In the end, the total offense won out as the 8th-ranked Rebels cruised to a 35-7 win over the Erath Bobcats here Friday night.

The Rebels scored 21 points in the second quarter to take control of a game that was 14-7 with four minutes to play in the first half.

"I'll have to look at the video to see if all the calls that were made were (substantiated) and they very well could be," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We had way too many penalties. We are still making way too many mistakes, mentally and physically."

The Rebels were hit with a lot of the 15-yard variety, mostly

coming on unsportsmanlike conduct calls. Despite the numerous penalties, the Rebels were still able to pick up 359 yards in the running game.

"It's not as bad as the score-

board," Erath coach Jacob Byler said. "Our kids played their hearts out and that's all I can really say. They have a good football team, that's all I can say about them really."

The Rebels got an early scare in the contest when they fumbled the opening kickoff and Erath recovered. But the Rebel defense pushed the Bobcats backwards and Erath turned the ball over on downs.

Teurlings took over and drove the length of the field to take a 7-0 lead in the contest. Dustin Arnaud hooked up with Dustin Padgett for a 47-yard gain to put the Rebels into Bobcat territory. On the next play, Adam Fisher rumbled in from 13 yards out for the score.

The Rebels made it a 14-0 game two possessions later, driving 85 yards in 14 plays. Fisher capped off the drive with a 10-yard touchdown scamper.

Teurlings was driving again on its next series, but the Erath defense came up with a big break when Arnaud mishandled the snap and the Bobcats were able to pick up the loose ball.

The turnover seemed to spark the Bobcats as Ted Toups streaked 75 yards to paydirt on the Bobcats' first play to put

Erath on the scoreboard.

Teurlings seemed to get a call in its favor on the next series when Arnaud pitched to Dominique Floyd and Floyd fumbled the ball. Both teams were fighting for the loose ball, but Arnaud won the battle by pouncing on the football. But a late hit was called on the Bobcat fighting for the loose ball, erasing the long loss and giving Teurlings a second-and-five at the 39-yard line instead of a second-and-22.

Four plays later, the Rebels made it a 21-7 ballgame with a 35-yard touchdown pass from Arnaud to Kory Hebert. The Rebels added a 46-yard TD strike from Arnaud to Dustan Collette on their next series.

"We were going for the football," Byler said of the late hit call. "How can you call a late hit on a loose ball? That call was big because they lose 14 yards on the play and instead get a first down out of the call. It's a 14-7 ballgame at that point and that seemed to take the momentum away from us."

Teurlings hoping to be tested

LAFAYETTE — Blowout wins sure beat losses, but they don't always do a awful lot to improve your team for rough roads ahead.

That's pretty much the circumstance the No. 8-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels find themselves in after outscoring the opposition 194-41 over the past four weeks.

So the Rebels' excitement level is up a bit with the St. Louis Saints (2-4) coming to town for a 7 p.m. non-district contest tonight at Clark Field.

The Saints are only 2-4, but took No. 2-ranked Notre Dame to the wire two weeks ago.

"They were ahead of Notre Dame until late," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They have a pretty good club. Our kids are looking forward to a challenge.

"They mix it up well offensively. They're about 60-40 run-pass. They have a receiver who made some outstanding catches against Notre Dame."

This is the fifth time the Rebels have played St. Louis under Charpentier. The Saints' only win was 14-7 three years ago.

"Last year, we were ahead just 28-20 in the fourth quarter and went on to win 35-20," Charpentier said. "I think we're ready to

defend the pass. That's why we participate in the pass scales during the summer. It's not just for the offense. You have to defend the pass."

The Rebels sport a balanced rushing attack, led by Adam Fisher (56-499, 9 TDs), Dominique Floyd (52-463, 8 TDs) and quarterback Dustin Arnaud (56-259, 1 TD), who is also 43-of-79 passing for 540 yards with six TDs and one interception.

Barbe at Acadiana

SCOTT — One week after snapping a four-game losing streak with a 28-0 victory over winless Opelousas, it's back into the frying pan for the Acadiana Wreckin' Rams when they host No. 5-ranked Barbe in a 7 p.m. District 3-5A contest.

The challenge really gets

tougher for Acadiana's defense, which turned around its fortunes by tossing a shutout last week.

"Barbe's good, really good," AHS coach Willard Hanks said. "They spread the field on you and they have so many weapons. They have two really good receivers, a big back who is extremely tough and their quarterback has a strong arm."

The good news for the Rams is that their offense also appears to be in high gear, averaging 31 points over the past two games. That offense is led by the rushing of Skip Babineaux and Alley Brousard and the passing of Brandon Pellerin.

"Our offensive line is in tact," Hanks said. "We're playing well offensively. Hopefully, we can keep our defense off the field."

The Northside Vikings got two much-needed new members to their coaching staff since last week's 35-0 loss to the St. Thomas More Cougars in the District 5-4A opener.

Getting job done

TCHS' Arnaud making good on promise to team

LAFAYETTE — Before he even got the job, Dustin Arnaud made a commitment to his Teurlings Catholic Rebel teammates that he would do his part to help the program achieve its goal of reaching the Superdome Classic.

Through seven weeks of the season, it's fair to say that Arnaud has kept his word.

The pledge came immediately after the 1999 Rebels lost at Karr in the state semifinals. Now 6-1 and ranked No. 7 in the state, Arnaud certainly has Teurlings headed in the right direction.

"I'm very hungry," Arnaud said. "I told some of my teammates after they lost to Karr last year that I would do everything in my power to take them to the Dome. They were all crying. I was sad for them, because I knew how hard the seniors worked to get there."

First came the determination. Then came the process of transforming those words into actions. The initial step was winning the starting quarterback job during the spring drills.

Once that was done, then came maturing to the point where Arnaud was confident as a quarterback and a leader.

The 5-10, 170-pound speedster played wide receiver and tailback as a sophomore and sat out his junior year with a knee injury.

"I played quarterback in middle school," he said, "but I knew there was much more reading defenses in high school. I feel much more comfortable now. Going to the UL pass scales over the summer really helped me a lot."

Arnaud has also been recep-

tive to instruction from coach Sonny Charpentier and advice from last year's quarterback Justin Guy.

"I've learned a lot from coach Charpentier and from Justin," Arnaud said. "During the summer, Justin showed me a lot of things. And now during the week if I have a question or there's something I'm confused about, I just call him and ask him. He kind of settles me down when I'm nervous."

Also playing big roles in making Arnaud's transition smoother are his receiving corps and his offensive line.

"The receivers make it a lot easier for me," Arnaud said. "A lot of times I'll make bad throws and they'll help me out by making a diving catch or a one-handed catch or a leaping catch."

"And the offensive line has been awesome this year. I think it's the best offensive line Teurlings has had in a long time."

Ironically, nothing seemed to do more for Arnaud's approach to playing the demanding position than the team's first failure—a 14-7 loss to Breaux Bridge.

"I think I started getting confident when we were behind against Breaux Bridge and I had to throw it," Arnaud said. "We were throwing it, trying to get into the end zone. I don't know why, but that game helped me out a lot even though we lost. It made me realize that I can't afford to be nervous. That just hurts you."

"I made me settle down and that I needed to just worry about concentrating on doing my job and just letting it happen. I also think the loss made all of us want to play more as a team."

The result has been Arnaud

completing 50 of 87 passes for 642 yards with six touchdowns and one interception. He also is a threat to run with 269 yards and a touchdown on 62 carries as the leader of the Acadiana area's No. 1 ranked offensive unit.

Charpentier, for one, has been pleased with Arnaud from the beginning.

"It took him a while to get comfortable, but we're very pleased with the way he's progressed," he said. "Actually, he's already advanced to a level higher than we thought he'd be."

"He struggled a bit at first.

We put him through some tough practices. He was throwing late a lot at the beginning and making some bad reads, but he's making outstanding decisions now. He's throwing the ball to the right people."

"He's giving us so many of the things Justin gave us last year. He makes you play the whole field, because he can throw it and run it. I joke with him, though, that I'm still waiting for him to make that first long touchdown run."

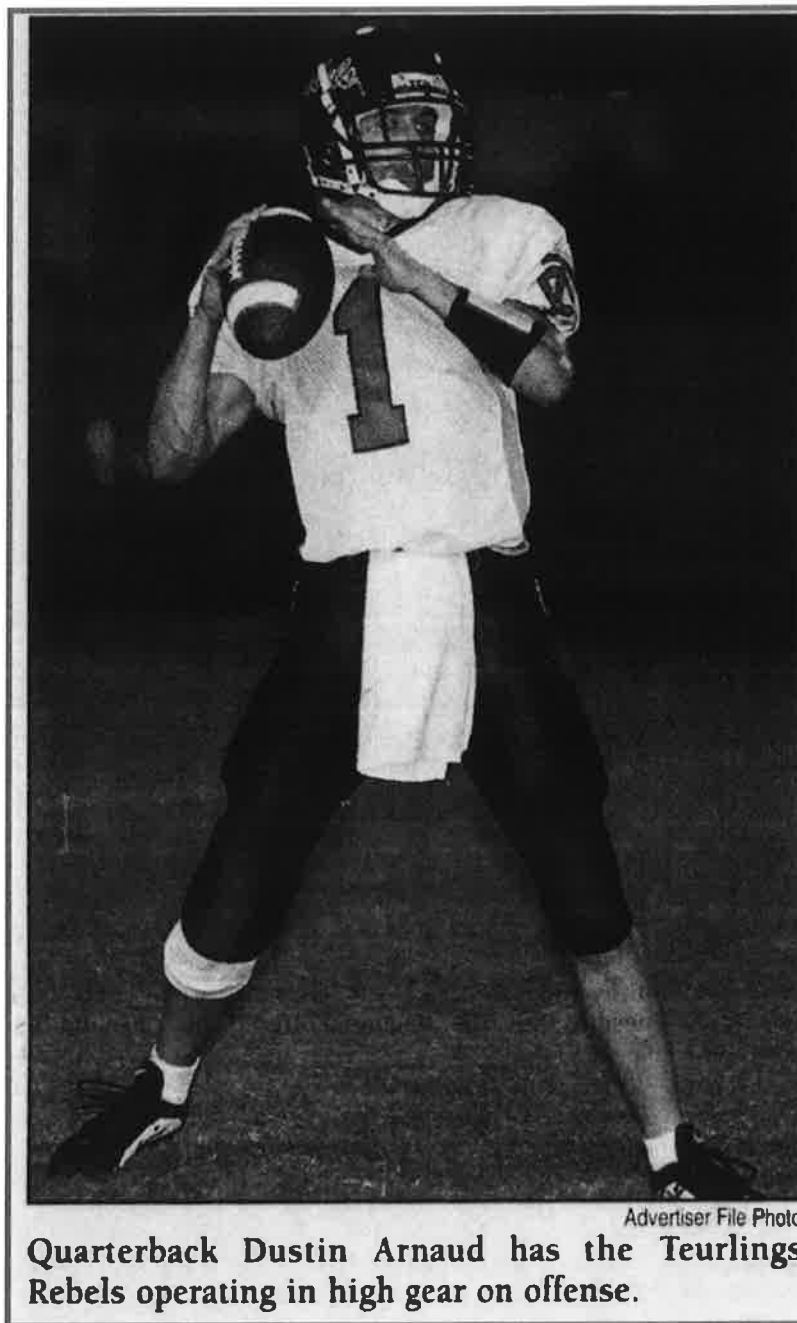

TCHS Rebels take care of business vs. Kaplan

KAPLAN — If a defense alone could win a game, the Kaplan Pirates' record would stand at 2-1 in District 5-3A instead of at 1-2 after they were defeated by the Teurlings Catholic Rebels 24-8 Friday.

"Kaplan played really hard," said TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier. "Their defense played really good, but we were able to complete a few plays here and there to pull it out."

Charpentier entered Friday's game worried that his Rebels would begin to look ahead to next week's showdown with Notre Dame.

"It's kind of hard to say," said Charpentier. "We were focus for the most part. We were at least focus enough to win."

The Rebels (8-1, 3-0) took their opening drive down to the Pirates' 31-yard line, before Dustin Arnaud fumbled the handoff attempt to Adam Fisher with the Pirates recovering to end the early scoring threat by the Rebels.

The second possession for the Rebels ended in a 22-yard field goal by Clint Hebert. The Rebels had to settle for the field goal after a holding penalty pushed them back.

The Pirates' defense held its own all night, beginning with their stop of the Rebels offense on fourth and one from the Pirates 43-yard line to begin the second quarter. But the Pirates defense held strong as they hit Arnaud as he pitched the ball to

Dominique Floyd. The hit on Arnaud caused the ball to be pitched high and Floyd bobbled it before being planted on the ground for a two yard loss. Floyd finished the game with 91 yards on 15 carries.

But once again the Pirates' offense would not be able to get anything going as they would give the Rebels the football back after three plays on a fumble by running back Blake Lemaire which was recovered by the Rebels' Jason McCartney with 9:05 left in the second quarter.

On the same drive after the fumble, the Rebels got down to the Pirate 7-yard line before Justin Broussard sacked Arnaud for a nine-yard loss. On third and goal from the 16 yard line, Arnaud found Dustin Padgett in the corner of the end zone to put the Rebels in front 10-0 with 6:06 left in the half.

Ahead 10-0 at the beginning of the third quarter, the Rebels came out smoking. It took the Rebels exactly two plays to add another score. On second down and five yards to go, Arnaud found Dustan Quebodeaux alone for a 55-yard touchdown strike to go ahead 17-0 with 8:07 left in the third quarter.

With 4:30 left in the third quarter, the Rebels struck again when Arnaud found Kory Hebert for a 37 yard touchdown to give the Rebels a comfortable 24-0 lead. Arnaud finished the game 15-of-19 for 230 yards and three touchdowns.

During the fourth quarter, the Pirates avoided the shutout

The Pirates offense had a total of 168 yards.

being consistent," said Pirates coach Keith Calvert. "They have a good ball club, but we didn't play as well as we could."

The Pirates know that they must play their best game of the year if they want to have a shot of making the playoffs.

"We are now in a must-win situation," said Calvert. "If we win we will have a good shot of getting in the playoffs."

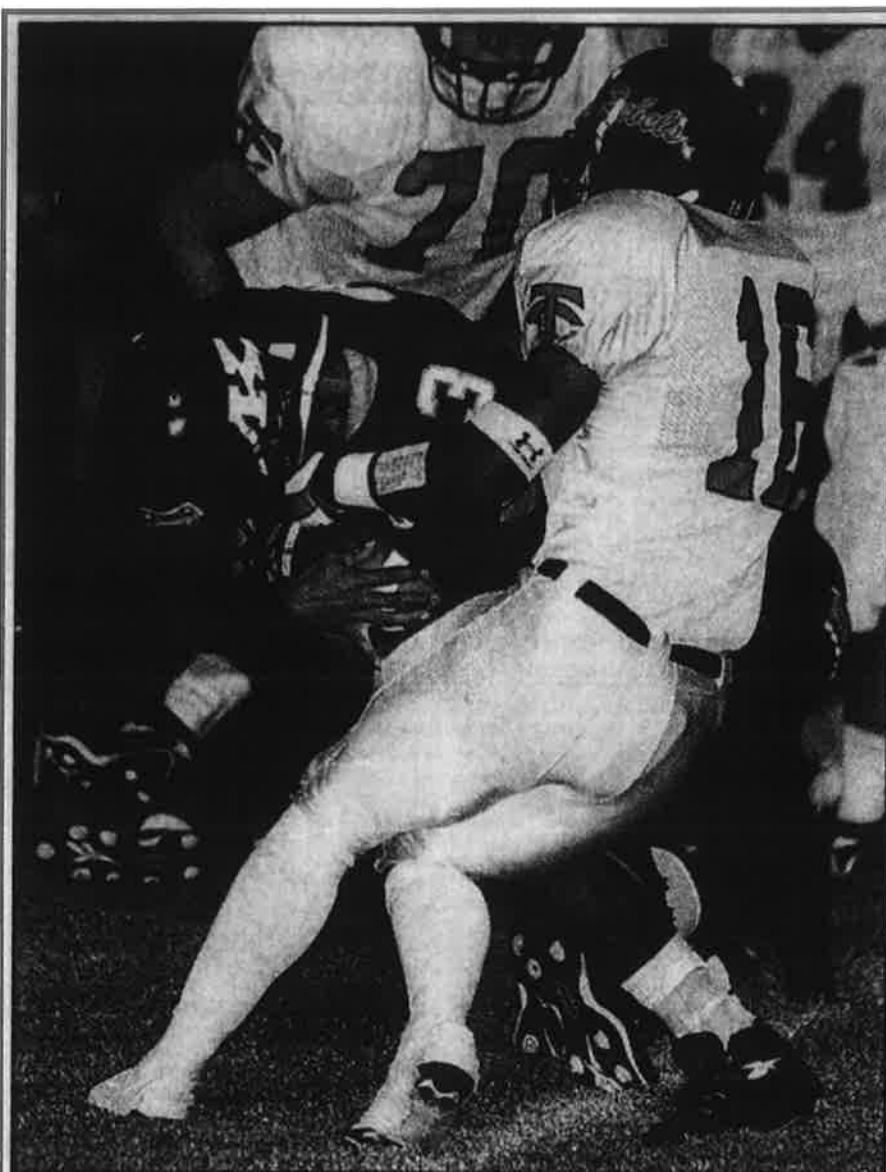
"I told the team that once you get in the playoffs anything can happen."

Pioneers hope that close calls will help their cause against rival TCHS Rebels.

LAFAYETTE — The 9-0 record that Notre Dame's Pioneers have compiled, not to mention the state's No. 1 ranking in Class 3A, hasn't exactly been a cakewalk.

Don't let the month of October fool you — a month when the Pioneer squad didn't allow a single point. There was a great deal of hand-wringing on the way to tonight's classic District 5-3A contest against Teurlings Catholic.

In the third week of the season, Notre Dame had to go into overtime before taking a win over Eunice.

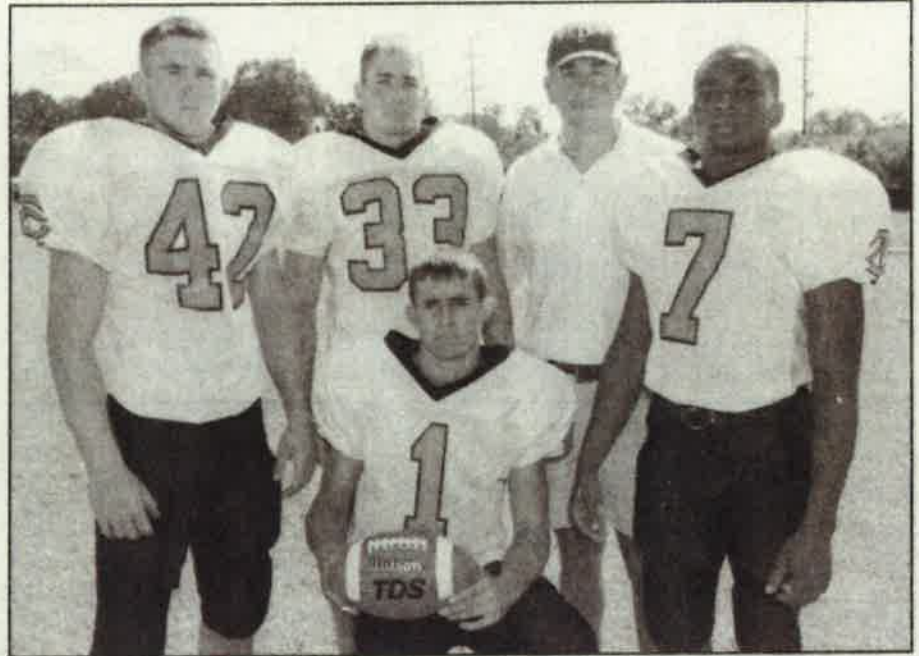

(62-356, 5 TDs) have provided most of that running attack, while Luke Guidry (35-491, 5 TDs) and Will Casanova (22-332, 5 TDs) have been Cook's primary passing targets.

It's defensively though, that the Pioneers have been the most impressive. Notre Dame leads the Acadiana area, allowing only 1,173 yards in total offense — an average of only 136 yards per game — in addition to the shutout streak. NDHS has given up only 57 points all season.

"We've had to have some breaks," said Cook of that

defense. "but they've given us a chance to win in every game. We still had to make the plays, but it's made a big difference."

Cook knows, too, that the powerful Teurlings offense will test that defense more than in any other game this season. If the Pioneers are going to match the 1994 NDHS squad that was perfect in the regular season and eventually won 12 in a row, they'll have to stop the area's top offensive attack.

"They're a well-balanced team because they're so versatile," said Cook. "They've got the option game and they can throw it well. They present a lot of problems defensively. You can't stop everything, so you have to ask the question what do you try to take away and what do you give up."

and haven't been tested much in that time.

Dustin Padgett (30-458, 3 TDs) and highly-recruited tight end Kory Hebert (18-311, 5 TDs) are the top passing targets.

"Dustin really does a job on reading what the defense is giving him," Charpentier said, "and those guys have been getting open. But you've got to give our offensive line a lot of the credit for that. They've played really well."

That offense will face the area's top defense in the Pioneers in what should be the game's biggest matchup.

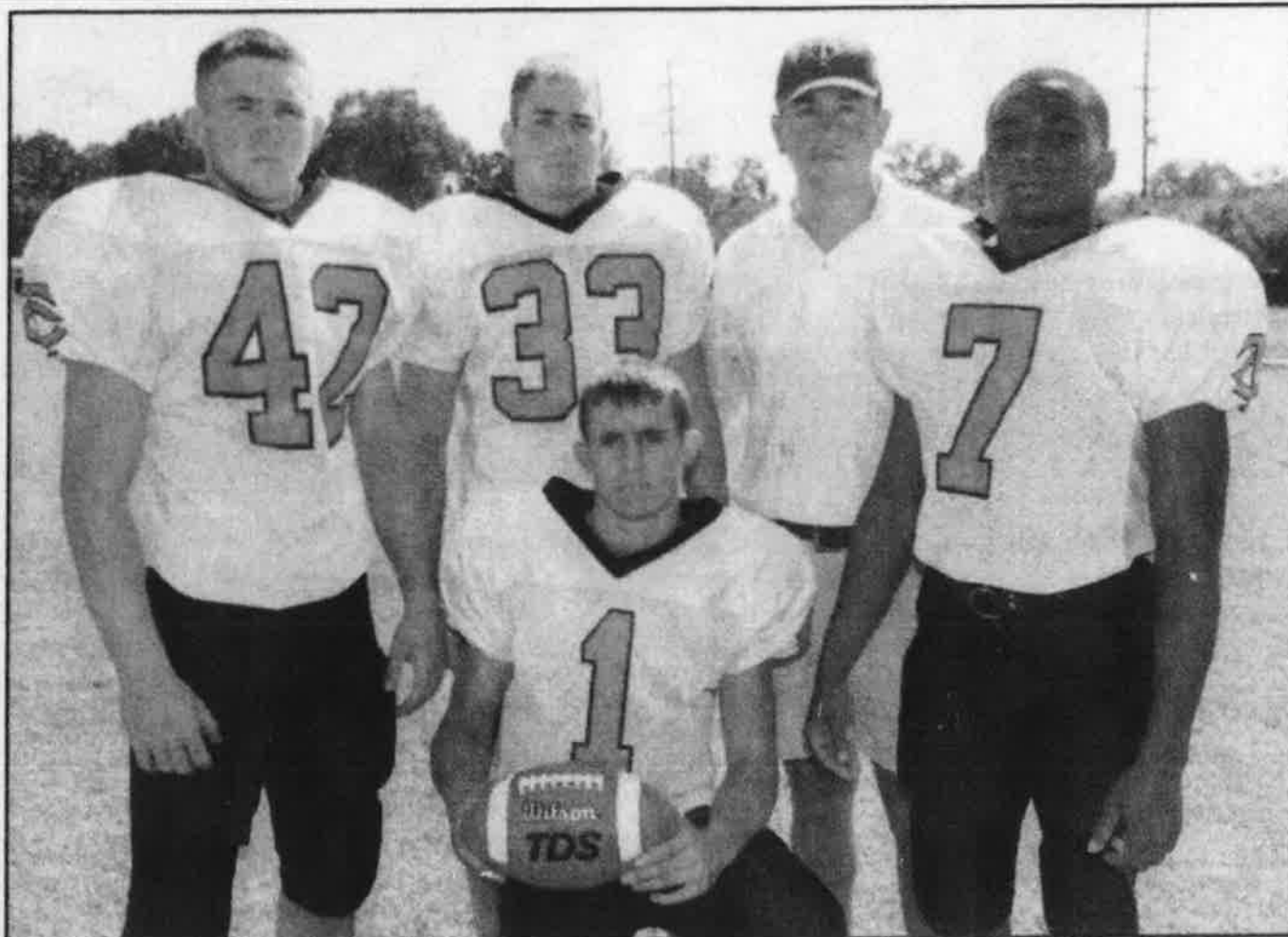

Notre Dame holds on to defeat Rebels

LAFAYETTE — He didn't break into the scoring column, but the difference in Friday's deciding District 5-3A clash between Notre Dame and Teurlings Catholic was a quarterback who had only 13 yards rushing all season.

Jeff Cook knew going into the game, though, that he'd get more of a chance to run in the Pioneer offense than he had all season.

The junior broke six double-figure yardage runs during the contest, and it was those efforts that set up the Pioneers just enough to take a 17-10 victory over the Rebels in their season-fine matchup.

The win wraps up a perfect season for Notre Dame (10-0, 4-0), the top-ranked Class 3A squad in the state, as well as the 5-3A district title for the second straight year.

Cook, who had been struggling with a pulled hamstring since July, had been limited in his rush attempts all season by head coach and father Lewis Cook. Friday night, he finished with 50 yards rushing, but that came after big losses on the game's final four plays when the Pioneers were running out the clock.

"It feels pretty good right now," said Cook of his hamstring. "This is the first time all year that I've felt really 100 percent, and I haven't been able to run the ball all season. I was excited going into tonight, because that's my favorite thing to do ... I've been missing that all year."

Cook's runs helped set up a pair of second-quarter touch-

down runs by Quinton Keigley and boosted Notre Dame to a 17-0 halftime lead, and the Pioneers then left it in the hands of the defensive unit that leads the Acadiana area and entered the game on a string of four straight shutouts.

"Our defense took them out of their game early," said the elder Cook of the unit that held the powerful Rebel offense to only 170 total yards. "Teurlings is so quick that we knew we'd have to contain them and keep them inside some way, but our defense can really run."

The Rebels (6-2, 3-1), last year's Class 3A state semifinalist, lost their second straight regular-season-ending game to the Pioneers, despite a strong

rally in the fourth quarter.

TCHS, in fact, used defensive plays of its own in that late rally. The Rebels picked off a pair of fourth-period interceptions — the first two that Cook had thrown all year — and converted them to a Clint Hebert field goal and Dominique Floyd's one-yard run to make it a 17-10 game with 6:19 remaining. Michael Ronkartz' theft and return to the Pioneer 7 set up the touchdown.

Despite the eruption of the overflow crowd at Clark Field, that was as close as Teurlings would get. The Rebels only had 6:19 left when they got the ball back at their own 20, and had a key procedure penalty on a third-and-one that preceded two

incomplete passes.

"I was proud of our effort," said Rebel head coach Sonny Charpentier. "Not getting points on the one chance we had in the first half was huge ... a big momentum switch. But our kids fought back in the second half, and put us in position to maybe get it into overtime."

It didn't look like it would be close in the first half, when the Pioneers jumped to a 16-0 lead in the first minute of the second quarter. NDHS drove to a 23-yard Greg Dupuis field goal on its first possession, and Teurlings came back with its best march of the night in going 68 yards to the Pioneer 10.

However, Hebert was wide left on a 27-yard field goal try, and Notre Dame marched right back 80 yards on only three plays. Mike Hensgens went 40 yards on the first play, Cook hit Will Casanova for 40 more after a clipping penalty, and Keigley burst loose on a counter up the middle and dove into the end zone to make it 10-0 with 11:05 left in the first half.

The Pioneers upped the difference to 17-0 late in the half, going 76 yards on 10 plays after a Rebel punt and getting a one-yard blast by Keigley only 47.5 seconds before halftime.

"That was a huge drive for us," said Cook. "We had a big

catch (a 28-yarder by Wesley Simon), and it was important for us to get that one in because we never got out of the hole in the second half."

"We felt pretty good at the half," said the younger Cook. "Our defense played phenomenal and they had to because Teurlings has a great offensive team."

The Rebel defense held Notre Dame to only 54 yards and four first downs in the second half, but it was still 17-0 when Dustan Quebodeaux picked off a Cook pass with 11:42 left to set up the field goal that started the TCHS rally that came up just short.

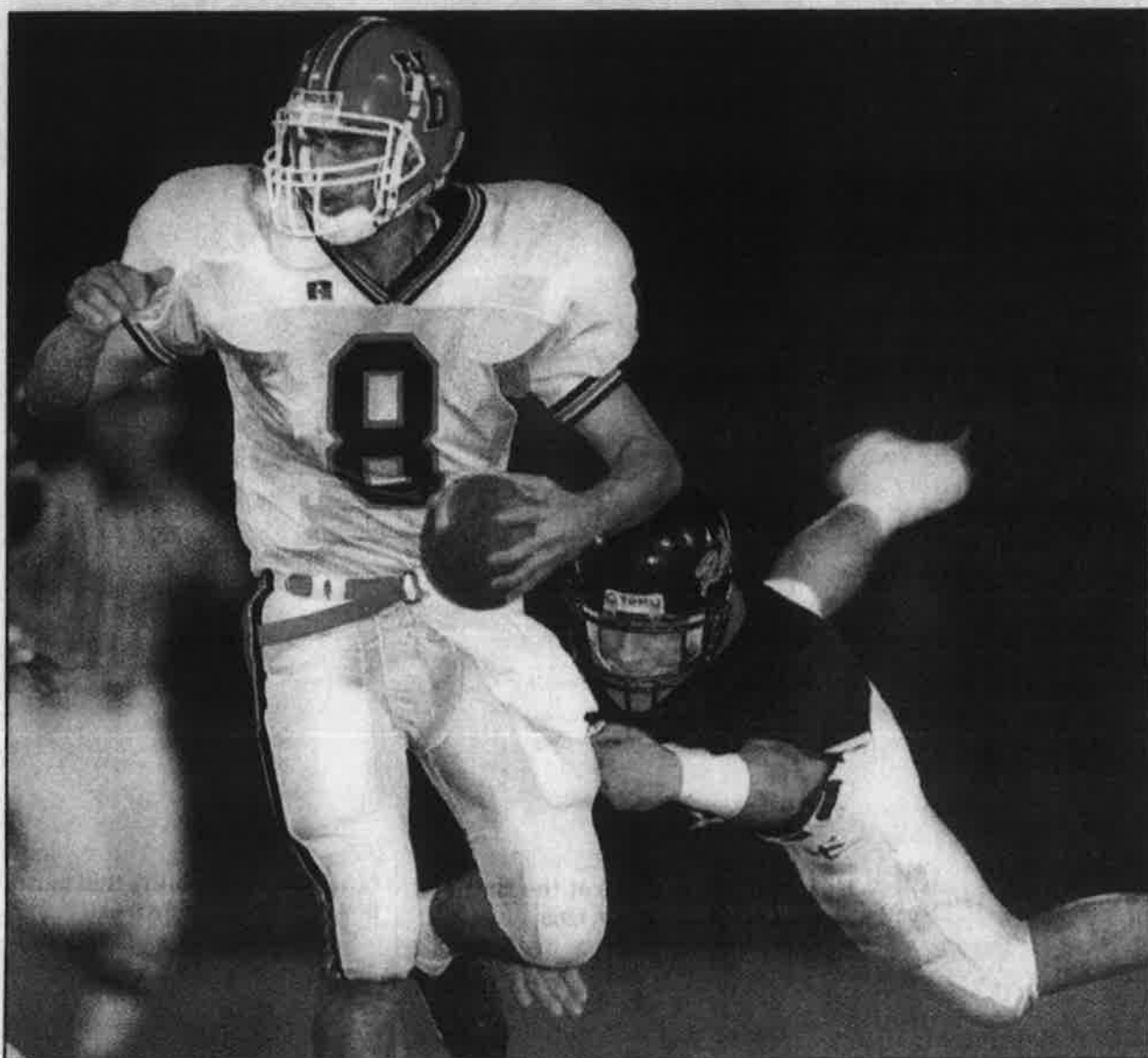

Fullback Tommy Dural (107-466, 5 TDs) leads Cecilia's balanced rushing attack, while receiver Marcus Broussard (18-259) is the top target for Miles Huval (25-73-5, 277 yds).

The Bulldogs have been outscored 48-14 over the past two weeks against Westlake and Breaux Bridge.

"Teurlings' offense kind of reminds me of Westlake," Waguespack said. "I think

Teurlings is probably better than Westlake overall and as good as Breaux Bridge. We're going to have to keep the ball away from them.

"I'm impressed with (fullback Adam) Fisher. He runs hard. Their quarterback (Dustin Arnaud) does a good job of running their offense and they have the big tight end (Kory Hebert) and the (Dustin) Padgett kid at receiver. They're pretty scary on offense."

LAFAYETTE — One wouldn't be far off to classify the Teurlings Catholic offense as fancy.

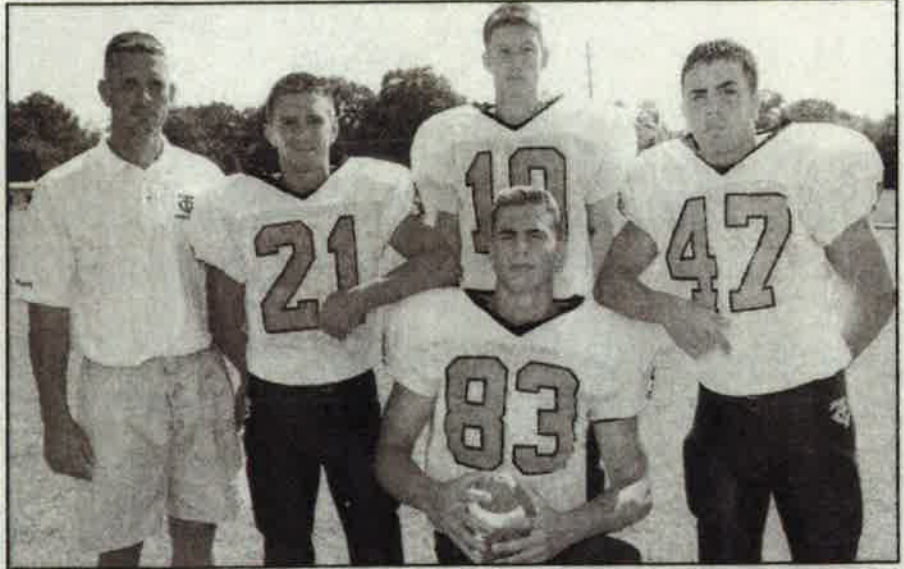
Coach Sonny Charpentier has been known to do a few unconventional things, and he's rarely boring. But now that it's time for the state playoffs, style points are no longer near the top of the priority list.

The bottom line is doing what it takes to get to the next game, and that process for the District 5-3A runner-up Rebels (8-2) begins at 7 p.m. tonight against the District 6-3A runner-up Cecilia Bulldogs (6-4) at Clark Field.

"We're going to try to establish the running game," Charpentier said. "If you can't run the football in the playoffs, you're going to be in trouble. We're not going for style points."

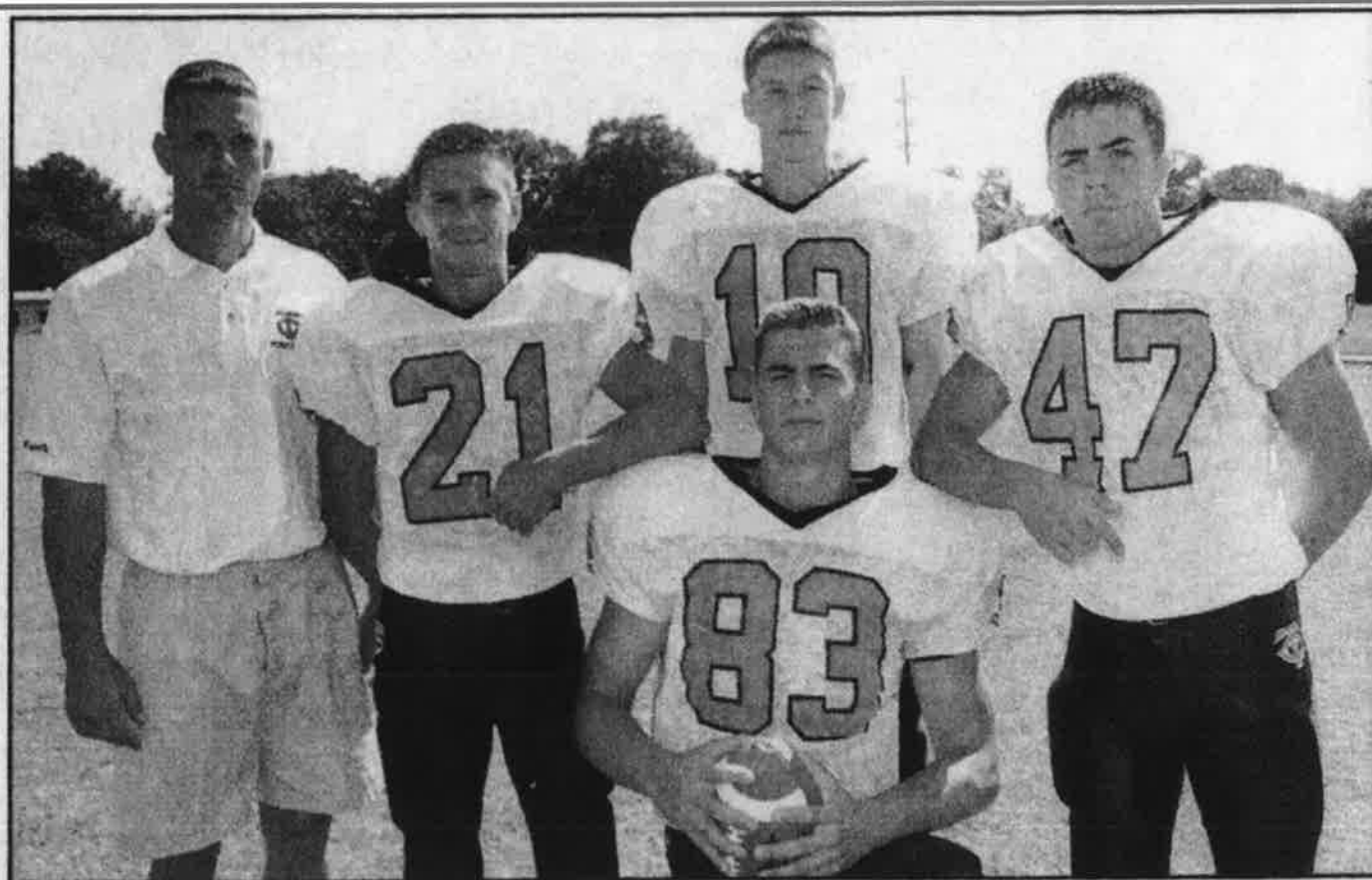

Teurlings demolishes Cecilia, 37-0

LAFAYETTE --- The week-10 loss to Notre Dame is officially behind the No. 8-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

Coach Sonny Charpentier's club opened the Class 3A state playoffs like it really was a brand new season, thumping the Cecilia Bulldogs 37-0 Friday night at Clark Field.

"The kids bounced back," Charpentier said. "We were extremely disappointed that we didn't win last week, but this is a new season. I felt good about the kids bouncing back, because we have enough seniors who have been in the wars."

The Rebels (9-2) will now meet Redemptorist in the state regional round in Baton Rouge next Friday, while Cecilia's season ends at 6-5.

Teurlings had six first-half possessions, resulting in four touchdowns, a field goal, an interception and no punts. As it turned out, the Rebels wouldn't punt the entire night.

It took just three plays to drive 87 yards in a minute for a 7-0 lead. Dominique Floyd's 32-yard run preceded a facemask on

Cecilia and then a 10-yard run by Dustin Padgett. Padgett then caught a 30-yard TD pass from Dustin Arnaud for the lead.

The next drive lasted five plays and ended with a 24-yard flanker pass from Brandon Charpentier to Padgett at 6:16 of the first period.

"We didn't do anything that was new to us, but we knew it wasn't on the three tapes that they had," coach Charpentier said. "I don't know how many other tapes they had, so we put in a few new wrinkles. The counters were new. Brandon used to be a quarterback. We knew he could throw it a little bit."

It appeared the Rebels were going for more when Johnny Singleton intercepted Arnaud at the goalline to end that threat.

Another Cecilia punt then set up 14-play Rebel drive that ended with a 45-yard field goal by Clint Hebert for a 17-0 lead with 2:27 left until intermission.

That's when the Bulldogs began to fall apart. First, Cecilia fumbled the ensuing kickoff to set up a 17-yard TD run by Padgett for a 24-0 lead at 2:27 of the second period.

Then on the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, the Bulldogs fumbled again to set up a 14-yard TD pass to Kory Hebert for the 30-0 half-time lead.

Teurlings finished with 325 yards rushing and 26 first downs, while Cecilia was limited to seven first downs and 154 yards.

"Teurlings came ready to play," CHS coach James Waguespack said. "They deserved it. They came out with a power game against Notre Dame and that's basically what we prepared for. Tonight they ran some different stuff, and they did a good job with it."

Padgett ended the night with 68 rushing yards on six carries and a touchdown, as well as three receptions for 68 yards and two more scores.

"We practiced a few plays, but I didn't expect it to be like that," Padgett said. "I'd say that was probably the best game of my career. The counters were wide open. I like doing a lot of different things -- running, throwing and catching."

Just about everything Padgett and his teammates did Friday night turned to gold.

BATON ROUGE — There's nothing easy about playing an 11-0 team on the road in the second round of the playoffs.

So the Teurlings Catholic Rebels (9-2) are by no means making state quarterfinal plans just yet as they prepare to meet the undefeated and No. 2-ranked Redemptorist Wolves at 7 p.m. in Baton Rouge tonight.

They aren't exactly making arrangements for the postseason banquet yet either.

They came out throwing last week, because Lake Charles-Boston put eight and nine guys on the line. We're going to put eight and nine in the box at times, but not on the line of scrimmage."

Charpentier's other goal is to get off to a quick start, much like the Rebels did in last week's 37-0 demolition over Cecilia.

"They haven't really been behind," he said. "We don't know how they would react to that, but we'd like to find out. We'd like to get a touchdown or two up on them early."

Don't put it past the Rebels to accomplish that goal either. With its line back in tact, the offense operating smoothly and explosively last Friday.

It rolled up 421 total yards, largely behind the two-way threat of Dustin Padgett (13-178, 1 TDs; 37-538, 5 TDs rec.).

The other offensive weapons include: quarterback Dustin Arnaud (88-145-4, 1237 yds, 13 TDs; 92-518, 2 TDs rushing), fullback Adam Fisher (105-811, 12 TDs), tailback Dominique Floyd (97-734, 12 TDs) and tight end Kory Hebert (22-373, 6 TDs).

A Spartan uprising

Lindon, Dupree
lead way for
All-Parish squad

LAFAYETTE — There have been coaches who have done as good or perhaps an even better job in one particular season.

Few, though, have taken over a program as far down as the Comeaux Spartans were three years ago and accomplished what Chuck Dupree was able to enjoy during the 2000 season.

When Dupree arrived, the Spartans weren't just coming off an 0-10 season. They hadn't won six games on the field since 1982 and had never won a state playoff game.

Three years later, the Spartans finished third in the competitive District 3-5A behind perennial powers Barbe and Carencro with a 6-4 record, and then added to that a dramatic come-from-behind first-round playoff road win over St. Amant.

For his efforts in bringing life back into Comeaux's program, Dupree is this year's Coca-Cola Daily Advertiser All-Parish Coach of the Year.

While Dupree's energy and focus got Comeaux headed in the right direction, it was Dwight Lindon who carried the Spartans to each and every win. Lindon was a workhorse all season with 2,018 yards and 21 touchdowns on 335 carries to earn Coca-Cola Daily Advertiser Offensive Most Valuable Player honors.

With all of that said, it was

the Carencro Golden Bears who won the 3-5A district championship. The primary reason for that was a usually stubborn and sometimes explosive defense, led by line-backer James Sampy.

Sampy contributed 65 solo tackles, 44 assists, 10 sacks, five interceptions (returning three for scores), three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries (one run back for a TD) and nine other stops behind the line.

That was good enough for Sampy to be named the Coca-Cola Daily Advertiser Defensive Most Valuable Player.

Lindon was joined in the

backfield by Acadiana's Alley Broussard (207-1,402 yds, 15 TDs) and Jasper Faulk (197-1,390 yds, 20 TDs), as well as quarterback Dustin Arnaud (94-156-5, 1,384 yds, 14 TDs; 92 carries, 518 yds, 2 TDs).

Arnaud's receiving corps includes St. Thomas More's Jason St. Julien (22-500, 5 TDs) and Teurlings Catholic's Dustin Padgett (37-538, 5TDs), as well as Teurlings tight end Kory Hebert (23-388, 7 TDs).

St. Julien also doubles as the team's return specialist after averaging 19.6 yards a punt return with two touchdowns and 19.1 yards a kick-off return with a touchdown.

The offensive line consists of St. Thomas More's Reagan Tatford, Teurlings Catholic's Dean Carly, Lafayette High's Blake Deaville, Acadiana's Coy Duhon and Carencro's Bryson Cormier.

The defensive front line includes Carencro's Jirey Siner, St. Thomas More's Trey Landry, Teurlings Catholic's Nick Weber and Comeaux's Jamal Tessier. Siner had 43 solos, 39 assists, 9 sacks and two fumble recoveries. Landry had 18 solos, 31 assists, three sacks, four fumble recoveries and

two broken-up passes.

Weber had 25 solo tackles, 15 assists, seven sacks and nine tackles behind the line in district play. Tessier was a first-team 3-5A selection with 51 tackles and three quarterback sacks.

Rounding out the linebacking corps with Sampy are Teurlings Catholic's Brooks Stuart, Comeaux's Tanner Theriot and Lafayette High's Paul Randall. Stuart collected 65 solo tackles, 55 assists, 10 stops behind the line, three sacks,

four pass break-ups, two caused fumbles, a fumble recovery and an interception returned for a touchdown.

Theriot was a first-team 3-5A pick with 33 solo stops, 90 assists, eight tackles behind the line and a sack in the regular season. Randall was a second-team 3-5A selection after getting 56 solos, 11 assists, two sacks, a fumble recovery and an interception.

The secondary is made up of Carencro's Brian Angelle and Demathus Ledet, St. Thomas More's Fred Flugence, Comeaux's Terrence Guidry and Teurlings Catholic's Charlie Garrett. Angelle contributed 69 solos, 28 assists, seven interceptions,

four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery to Carencro's cause, while Ledet added 38 solos, 22 assists, five interceptions (two returned for scores), a fumble recovery (returned for TD in beating Barbe) and 10 pass break-ups.

Flugence had 26 tackles and four pass break-ups in district play. Guidry was a first-team 3-6A pick with 41 tackles, an interception and eight broken up passes. Garrett had 48 tackles and two sacks in district competition.

The specialists on the squad are Carencro's Damien Dabrey at kicker with 5-of-9 on field goals with a long of 58, and St. Thomas More's Lucas Murphy averaged 42.1 yards a punt.
