TCHS gets quick jump for victory

LAFAYETTE — There's not much time in a jamboree game to play catch-up.

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels took full advantage of that by jumping out to a quick 9-0 lead and then holding on for a 9-0 victory over the Comeaux Spartans in the first game of the 50th Annual Kiwanis Club Football Jamboree Thursday at Lafayette High.

The Rebels wasted no time getting on the board when Dusty Collette connected with Dustin Smith on a 83-yard touchdown pass for a 7-0 lead at 13:25 of the first half.

Teurlings tried to add to that lead on its second drive, but Comeaux's Derrick Hines turned the Rebels away with an interception.

The field position gained, though, paid dividends when a high snap on the punt resulted in a safety and a 9-0 Rebels' lead at 8:13 of the first half.

Helping to keep the rest of the first half scoreless was Comeaux's Danny Flurgence with an interception and Aaron Hargrave of Teurlings with a fumble recovery.

Two more Spartan fumbles in the second half and one by the Rebels also contributed to the lack of scoring.

Teurlings won the battle in first downs 5-4, in rushing 60-25 and in passing 93-24. The Spartans were halted by two bad snaps on punts for a minus 36 yards.

Collette finished 3-of-8 passing for 83 yards and a touchdown. Smith finished the game

with two catches for 78 yards and four carries for 25 yards to earn team MVP honors.

Comeaux was led on the ground by Matt Thompson with 49 yards on 12 carries for Spartan MVP honors. Jeff Garner was 5 of 14 passing for 24 yards, while Ryan Zackary had three catches for 21 yards.

Cecilia 17, Vermilion Catholic 8

A blowout it wasn't.

On paper, it appeared the Cecilia Bulldogs might have an easy time with the Vermilion Catholic Eagles, who had 16 underclassmen on a 33-player squad.

Instead, the scrappy Eagles committed five turnovers and

still hung tough in losing a 17-8 decision to the Bulldogs in game two Thursday.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 3-0 lead thanks to Joel Stelly's impressive 45-yard field goal at 9:50 of the first half.

VC's Nick Choate, though, got the Eagles on the board by picking off a Miles Hines pass and returned it 46 yards for a touchdown. Blake Cormier then hit Jordan Romero for a 2-point pass and an 8-3 VCIS lead with 6:21 left until intermission.

A fumbled punt helped give Cecilia the lead back when a five-play, 26-yard scoring drive resulted. Kera Journeet did the honors with a 1-yard TD play, and Hines' 42-point run gave Cecilia

an 11-8 halftime lead.

Another VCIS fumble allowed CHS to set up shop at the Eagles' 22. From there, Donald Journeet's 14-yard run preceded a 6-yard TD pass to Alphonso Williams for a 17-8 lead with 11:24 to play.

Interceptions by Cecilia's Joey Williams and Travis Landry after Donald Journeet's pick in the first half, as well as two more Eagle fumbles, helped to keep VCIS off the board in the second half.

Journeet won team MVP honors for Cecilia after rushing for 32 yards and a score on eight carries, while Choate won MVP honors for VCIS.

Teurlings opens year at St. Louis

LAKE CHARLES — Sure there were mistakes made in last week's jamboree game, but a 9-0 win over a playoff 5A school for a 3A team is never anything to sneeze at.

Therefore, Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier has had a healthy blend of things to work on as well as strong points to draw confidence from heading into Thursday's 7 p.m. season-opening road encounter with St. Louis at Lake Charles-Boston.

"If you take away the turnovers, I thought we did OK," Charpentier said of the 9-0 win over Comeaux. "Offensively, though, we did have a tough time blocking their front people. We need to get better there. Comeaux's defensive front was as good and physical as we've faced in a while."

The Rebels are hoping to get tailback Andy Camel back this week after missing much of the summer with ankle sprains. Charpentier also plans on running Charlie Garret more this week.

"I kind of rotated him out of the offense last week," Charp-

entier said. "I didn't get him as many snaps as I wanted to, but once we got up two scores, I was more concerned with the defense."

"Charlie runs hard and he's a good receiver as a third-down back. He's in great shape, so I'm not worried about him going both ways."

Defensively, TCHS limited Comeaux to four first downs and 49 total yards.

"We really ran to the ball well," Charpentier said. "We made a couple of mistakes, but they were very correctable."

St. Louis, on the other hand, lost to 4A Washington-Marion 7-3 in the jamboree in its first season under former LaGrange coach Mike Johns.

"It's hard to tell a lot in a jamboree sometimes, but they tried to spread the field with one back on offense and ran a split 40 on defense," Charpentier said. "They ran a lot of quick hitters."

Rebels crush Saints

LAKE CHARLES — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels opened the 2001 football season on a winning note here Friday night, rolling to an easy 33-6 road victory over the St. Louis Saints.

The Rebels (1-0) drew first blood in the first quarter on the arm of quarterback Dusty Collette, who connected with tight end Bo Bowen for a 28-yard touchdown pass to give the Rebels a 7-0 lead after the extra point was kicked by Clint Hebert.

In the second quarter, the Rebels took a 13-0 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run by running back Josh Dean, which was set up by a 34-yard quarterback draw by Collette.

After running back Charlie Garrett increased the Rebels lead to 19-0 on a 9-yard touchdown run, Collette struck again on another 28-yard touchdown pass this time to wide receiver Dane Charpentier to give the Rebels a 26-0 lead after another Hebert kick.

Collette finished the night 8-for-13 passing for 137 yards and two touchdowns and five carries for 39 yards. Charpentier caught four passes for 80 yards and a touchdown.

The running game was propelled by Dean, who carried 10

times for 43 yards along with the touchdown.

Running back Andy Camel (4-23) completed the rout of the Saints with an 8-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter to give the Rebels a comfortable 33-0 lead.

The Saints (0-1) avoided the shutout with a 16-yard touchdown pass from Brandon Monceaux to Philip Vincent, but the extra point failed.

Teurlings will take its early-season 1-0 record to Breau Bridge next Friday.

Rayne 21, North Central 14

RAYNE — The Rayne Wolves jumped out to a 21-0 lead in the third quarter before holding off a late North Central rally to take a 21-14 win in the season opener.

The Wolves broke a scoreless tie in the second period when Shane Turner scored on a 1-yard touchdown run. Jeremy Webb ran in the two-point conversion to give Rayne an 8-0 lead.

The Wolves added to its lead early in the second half as Cody Myers hauled in a 25-yard touchdown pass from Turner.

Rayne made it 21-0 a few

minutes later as Manuel Guidry scored on an eight-yard run. Turner added the extra point.

The Hurricanes avoided the shutout with two touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

Shannon Washington led the Wolves with 88 yards rushing on 17 carries. Turner added 49 yards.

Avoyelles 6, Westminster 0

OPELOUSAS — Avoyelles' tailback Charley Simmons broke free for a 56-yard touchdown run in the first quarter and the Mustang defense did the rest in handing the Westminster Crusaders a 6-0 loss in the season opener.

Avoyelles limited the Crusaders to only 47 yards total offense, while forcing two turnovers in the contest.

The Mustangs, on the other hand, pounded out 242 yards on the ground, but got only a 56-yard touchdown scamper from Simmons to take the win.

Teurlings at BBHS

Charpentier knows that annual rivalry isn't a make-or-break battle for Rebels.

LAFAYETTE — Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier will be the first to tell you that no Rebel season is defined by how his club does against Breaux Bridge.

He also knows, however, that most great rivalries aren't entirely one-sided.

Since the two schools began playing again under Charpentier four years ago, Breaux Bridge is 4-0. The Rebels hope to change their luck when they travel to meet the Tigers for a 7 p.m. contest tonight.

"It's a rivalry because we've got a lot of kids from Breaux Bridge and they've got a few kids who went to school here," Charpentier said. "By no stretch, though, is either of our seasons riding on this game. We felt like we should have beaten them two years ago, but we didn't. We'd just like to win a game or they might quit calling it a rivalry."

The last two games were actually 14-7 BBHS wins with the one two years ago being in overtime. With all the preseason accolades the Tigers enjoyed, this wouldn't seem to be the year for the Rebels to break through, but Teurlings demolished St. Louis 33-6 in its opener.

"We got some confidence offensively," Charpentier said. "It was the first time we were able to move the ball consistently on the ground and in the air."

"It's scary playing a team that you feel like you're better than in muddy conditions, but the kids never let that be an equalizer."

Defensively, the Rebels limited St. Louis to just 120 yards with the only points coming late against the reserves.

"We're going to be facing a lot more speed

this week obviously," Charpentier said. "The thing that scares me the most is the quarterback (Darren Noel) can turn a bad play into a big play in a hurry with his athletic ability."

Quarterback Dusty Collette showed why Charpentier is high on his potential in his first game that mattered, rushing for 30 yards and throwing for 157 yards.

"Dusty is as good a runner as Justin (Guy) was and maybe even better, because he's faster and he's strong," Charpentier said. "He can break tackles against people his size."

The only real question now is the Rebels' backfield rotation. Tailback Andy Camel could provide a lot of answer if he continues to get healthy.

"I kind of wore (safety) Charlie (Garrett) out running the ball last week because I didn't get him enough carries in the jamboree," Charpentier said.

"I need to find a happy medium with Charlie. Really I feel comfortable with about six backs."

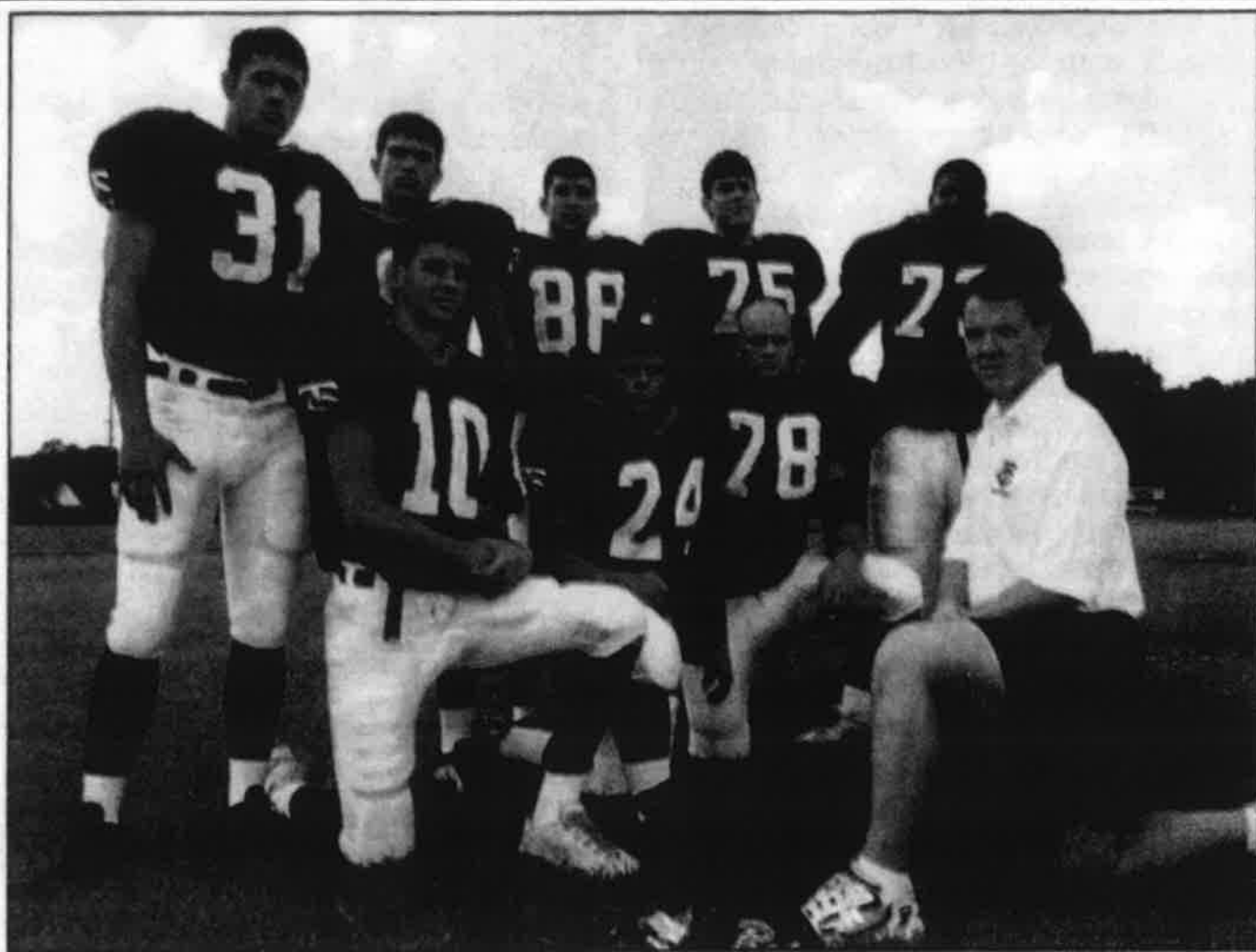
"I really like Andy's quickness. He's one of the few backs we've had that can make cuts without losing any speed."

Special teams key to BB win

BREAUX BRIDGE — For Breaux Bridge's Tigers, special teams giveth, and special teams almost taketh away.

The final tally in big special teams plays was Tigers two, Teurlings Catholic one, and that was just enough margin for the host BBHS squad to take a 20-13 victory over the Rebels here Friday in their annual rivalry battle.

The Tigers (1-1) used two long punt returns to set up short scoring runs in the second and third quarters in taking a seemingly safe lead, and then watched the Rebels pull off a big play of their own to get back within striking distance.

With 5:05 left, Kelly Dauphine's punt attempt was blocked by Teurlings' Ty Stuart, the Rebels' Jacob Delahoussaye came up with the loose ball for a second before bobbling it, and Tyler Hebert picked the ball off the turf and returned it 19 untouched yards to pull TCHS within seven points.

However, the Tigers were able to run out the final five minutes with one of the night's few sustained drives by either club

in taking their fifth straight win in the series.

"It's hard to believe we can make that many mistakes," said Breaux Bridge head coach Mike Mowad. "But our kids just kept playing hard and we were able to take advantage of a couple of

big plays."

Teurlings (1-1) can relate to the mistakes. The 3A third-ranked Rebels were their own worst enemy, suffering four turnovers and committing 15 penalties for 134 lost yards in addition to giving up the two

long returns.

"We just played very poorly," said TCHS head coach Sonny Charpentier, "but Breaux Bridge may have had something to do with that. Special teams hurt us, but we got the block late. But we couldn't stop them on that last drive."

Breaux Bridge's Dwayne Alexander brought a punt back 42 yards early in the second quarter to set up Marcus Davis' seven-yard scoring run, and then had a 44-yard return midway through the third period that led to Ricky Gary's second touchdown of the game, a two-yard run that gave the Tigers a two-score lead.

Those returns provided impetus for a BBHS offense that struggled for most of the night. The Tigers, who still managed to finish with 219 total yards, had only 12 yards and one first down with 1:54 left in the first half, before marching 80 quick yards in six plays against the clock.

Quarterback Darren Noel set up that score with a lofting 42-yard completion to Alexander to the Rebel one before Gary scored 29 seconds before halftime to make it 13-6 at halftime.

Teurlings had dominated play offensively in the first half but only had six points to show

'Dogs, Rebels tangle

LAFAYETTE — Some matchups just have a special ring to them.

The Acadiana area has already enjoyed several of those kind already this season. Add Friday's 7 p.m. Clark Field showdown between Class 2A's No. 3-ranked Iota Bulldogs (2-0) and Class 3A's No. 6-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels (1-1) to that list.

"It's going to be a very good matchup," Iota coach Rick Wriberg said. "Teurlings has a big, well-coached team. They do many things correctly."

"Offensively, they're as strong as any team in South Louisiana from 3A on down. They lost last week to a very good Breaux Bridge team, but that game could have gone either way."

That loss was tough to swallow being the fifth straight time the Rebels have fallen to Breaux Bridge.

"We've got to execute on offense better," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We've got to take away those 15 penalties. Special teams-wise, they had two long returns on us that really made it tough on the defense. We've made some changes on special teams."

"I thought we played outstanding on defense. Offensively, we moved the ball at times, but nothing consistent. We've got to eliminate the mistakes. I think it's an inexperience problem, but I don't want to use that as an excuse."

The challenge of playing an upgraded schedule is that the Rebels don't have a long time to

lick their wounds after a 20-13 road loss with a program as consistent as Iota's now on tap.

"Iota has a very good team," Charpentier said. "They have a very physical team, but I'm not overly concerned about the physical aspect of the game. We haven't been outphysicked yet."

Effectively dealing with Iota's potent rushing attack — led by Jason Miller (44-372, 6 TDs) — is the Rebels' No. 1 priority.

"I really like the Miller kid," Charpentier said. "He's got great vision. He just explodes into you when you're trying to tackle him. He reminds me a lot of the old Washington running back,

John Riggins."

"The thing about Iota, though, is that it's not just him. They have a fullback (Armand Leduc, 10-117, 2 TDs) and a slotback (Doree Leduc, 6-95, 2 TDs) who also run the ball very well."

Despite those accolades, Wriberg doesn't feel his Bulldogs have reached their potential yet.

"This is a big test for us," he said. "It's going to tell us where we're at."

"We're just starting to make some progress on offense, but it's come slower than I expected. Our line is just starting to make some of the decisions they're supposed to be making."

Defensively, we've pretty much where I expected to be."

With that said, Wriberg knows the task is just as tall on both sides of the ball this week.

"Teurlings likes to throw the ball as much as they like to run it," Wriberg said. "And their backfield is a lot like ours. Jason Miller got 150 yards and two others got about 80 last week. Without those penalties, we could have had three 100-yard backs last week."

"Teurlings has several backs that can beat you. It's going to be the biggest challenge our defense has faced so far."

"It's all part of being one of the best matchups around."

Teurlings claims thriller over Iota in overtime

LAFAYETTE — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels beat Iota's explosive offense in a truly action-packed contest that ended with a stadium that sounded more like the SEC than high school.

Amid shouts of "Defense" by the Rebels' crowd, Teurlings secured a 35-28 overtime win by holding a tired Jason Miller and Rick Wriborg's surprised Bulldog offense.

While, as Coach Wriborg of Iota predicted, the game turned on mistakes and turnovers it had something for everyone. The Rebel fans were in a frenzy during the final defensive play of fourth and goal from the 11 yard line in overtime.

That defensive stand, though, wasn't until after the Rebels had earned the tie by going 96 yards in a drive that took less than 20 plays and less than 2:30 minutes to execute.

Miller also hobbled on the Rebels' 1 yard line to create Teurlings' last chance when Iota was up by touchdown and on the way to a steady lead.

In the first half, Miller rushed for 45 hard yards and a

touchdown against a gang of Rebels.

He kept the entire Teurlings defense honest enough for fellow Iota senior Armond Leder to pick up 63 and a score on only four carries.

The first half closed out evenly because the Rebels had 79 yards and a touchdown in their passing game, while holding Iota to only 12 passing yards and no scoring passes.

Teurlings' Dusty Collette completed four consistent capital passes to Dustin Smith in the first half including a 43 yard pitch for the touchdown. Collette also hooked up with coach Charpentier's son Daze for an 11 yard touchdown as well as a 25 yard pitch.

If emotion and intensity dominated the game then it is hardly surprising given the context of the day.

To spend words on ceremonies after such a game that seem like a violation of journalistic protocol, but as Teurlings Campus Ministry Student Emily Fisher said the "Star Spangled Banner" and as the Lafayette Marine Color Guard maneuvered there was the feeling that the ancient Greeks had about sport.

This game was charged

with patriotism, reverence and a massive desire to win. That would have been an important story for anyone who attended the game.

The second half ended as a Teurlings tour de force but it featured a 75 yard drive by Iota for a touchdown in six plays and less than two minutes.

"This was a total team effort," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said after the game.

I predicted that the team with the best use of the opponents' mistakes and the least crucial mistakes would win this game, Wriborg said. "You can't turn over the ball to good team."

Miller gave us his best efforts and that near goal line fumble tore him up inside. Teurlings played well and used our mistakes against us well. He was tired at the end."

This was a game for the books and one that will be remembered because of the dark days preceding it. Teurlings student Channing Coudert's prayers for the victims and the sense of battle in the stands will all form a memory that may ease some other memories these young Americans must live.

LAFAYETTE — Acadiana are high school football has definitely changed.

There was a time when a completed pass was an accomplishment.

Of the schools that reported their statistics from last Friday's action, 11 area quarterbacks threw for over 100 yards. Three of those went for over 200 yards and one threw for over 300 yards.

In an era where running the football is still king, the uniqueness and impact of such achievements were simply too much to ignore.

So despite the fact that St. Martinville's Martel Narcisse and several of the area's other top backs were virtually unstoppable again Friday, a quarterback takes home the top offensive honor.

Teurlings Catholic's Dusty Collette is this week's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Offensive Player of the Week for the role he played in the Rebels' dramatic 35-28 overtime victory over Class 2A's No. 2-ranked Iota Bulldogs.

Collette completed 19 of 26 passes for 315 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions.

As impressive as those numbers are, they don't include two drops and the fact that he orchestrated a memorable 99-yard scoring drive with a no-huddle, last-ditch drive that forced overtime in the final three minutes of regulation.

While Collette was leading the Rebels to 450 total yards,

the Breaux Bridge Tigers were limiting Comeaux to no points and 64 total yards in a 24-0 road victory over the Spartans Friday.

Consequently, it's only fitting that Tiger linebacker Terence Alexander being recognized as this week's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Defensive Player of the Week.

Alexander collected 12 total tackles, two stops behind the line, a sack and caused two fumbles to help record the shutout.

While there was another team — ironically Notre Dame, the team that beat BBHS in the state semifinals last year — that also recorded a shutout despite playing up in class Friday, week three was an offensive showdown in many ways.

Joining Collette for the Rebels was a duo of 100-yard receivers in Dustin Smith (10-

143, 3 TDs) and Dane Charpentier (6-132, 1 TD).

Smith caught the 10-yard TD in overtime for the game-winner.

Also in that game, Iota's Jason Miller (33-214, 2 TDs) was dominant again, and he was joined by Armond Ledet (13-103, 1 TD) also with a 100-yard effort. The top 1-2 rushing punch of the week, though, by unquestionable turned by in St. Martinville's two special backs — Narcisse (18-168, 4 TDs) and sophomore quarterback Early Doucet (11-184, 2 TDs).

The next level of prolific passing was performed by Loreauville's Jonathan Zacharie (15-21-0, 254 yds, 3 TDs) in a 35-7 win over Catholic High of New Iberia, Abbeville's Dustin Guidry (8-12-0, 249 yds, 3 TDs) in a 54-12 win over Alexandria and Berwick's David Domangue (8-22-0, 220 yds, 2 TDs) in a 37-6 win over Morgan City.

While Teurlings' Dustin Guidry had the top receiving performance of the week-end, not far behind him was Abbeville's Brett Doucet (6-145, 1 TD), or Loreauville's Ricardo Jeanlouis (2-120, 2 TDs).

As for notable double

threats, Notre Dame's Jeff Cook ran for 108 yards and threw for 129 more and two touchdowns.

Also helping Breaux Bridge to its second win was fullback Marcus Davis, who rushed for 135 yards and three touchdowns and also caught two passes for 14 yards.

Port Barre's Abdulle Levier (21-180, 2 TDs) had another huge night rushing, while teammate Chris Keys (6 tackles, 2 interceptions, 1 receiving touchdown) had an all-around performance.

Another offense that enjoyed a great night was Church Point, which had two 100-yard rushers in Anthony Citizen (19-132, TD) and Marcus Roscoe (18-112, 4 TDs).

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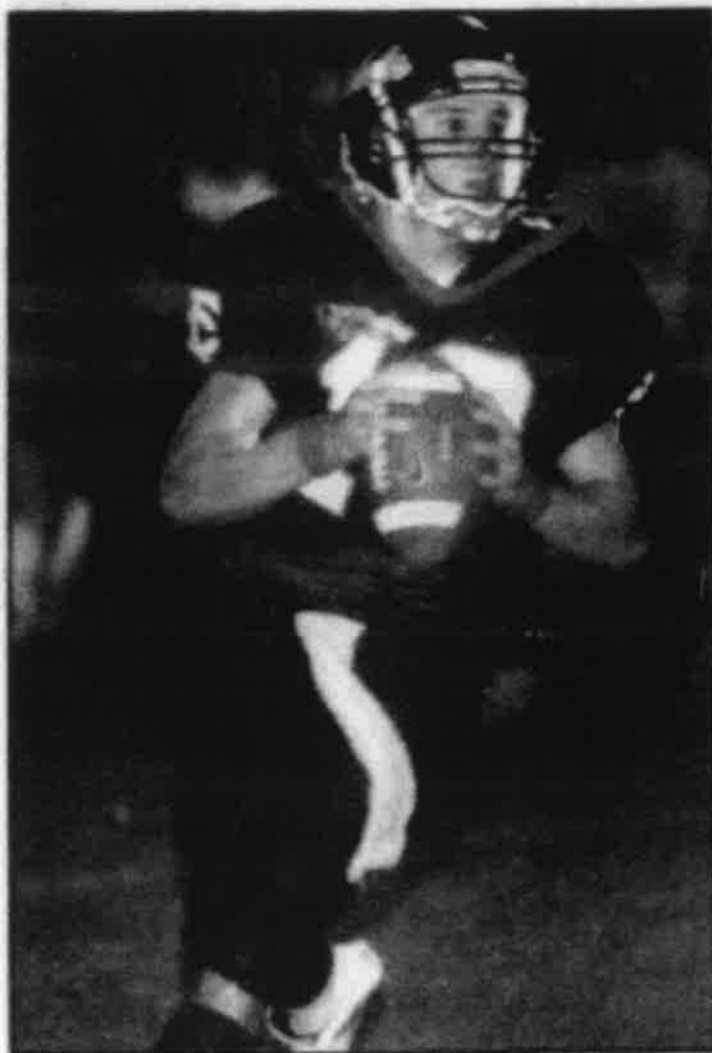

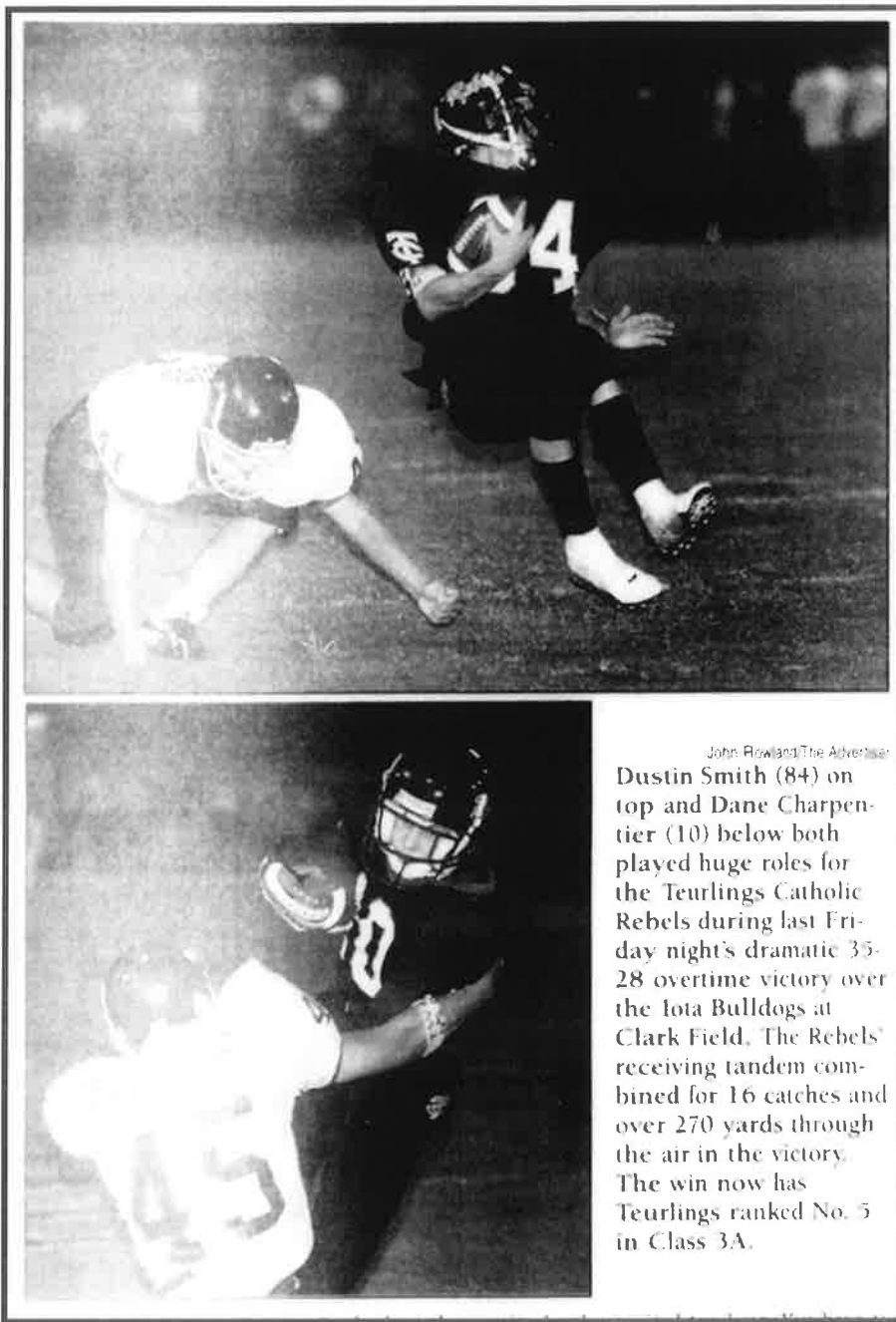

Teurlings rips Berwick, 36-0

LAFAYETTE — One week after a 35-28 overtime win over Iota and with defending Class 3A champion Notre Dame on deck, the No. 5-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels needed a bit of a break.

And they got just that with a 36-0 demolition over the Berwick Panthers for homecoming Friday at Clark Field.

"Our goal was to get through the second half without any injuries," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "With the tough schedule we have coming up, it was good to have a breather."

The game was delayed 50 minutes due to a lightning storm in the area, and then the Rebels went to work.

Trying to pick up where they left off after a 315-yard passing performance last week, quarterback Dusty Collette hit Dane Charpentier for 25 yards and then Dustin Smith ran a reverse 22 yards to reach the Berwick 9.

Teurlings would then fumble on second-and-goal to avert the scoring threat. Little else would go wrong for the Rebels (3-1) the rest of the evening. A 14-yard run by Collette set up a Charlie Garrett 23-yard TD run at 5:02 of the first period.

CROWLEY — When the season started, the Notre Dame Pioneers might have been best described as a sleeping giant.

Everyone knew how capable they were, but there were a few nagging questions due to heavy graduation losses.

the Pioneers' offense, which is averaging 347.8 yards a game.

LAFAYETTE — District 63A play hasn't even begun yet for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels, but they won't likely play a bigger regular-season game than the one taking place at Clark Field tonight.

The No. 2-ranked defending Class 3A state champion Notre Dame Pioneers (3-1) invade for a 7 p.m. contest that offers the No. 5-ranked Rebels (3-1) a chance to knock off perhaps their biggest rival and pick up valuable power points for down the road.

"It's really become a good rivalry," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We enjoy the competition. Notre Dame is very good. They're playing with a lot of confidence. They even did a lot of good things against STM in the game they lost."

"There's no doubt that this is a very big game for us. District championships are nice, but power points are still the most important thing."

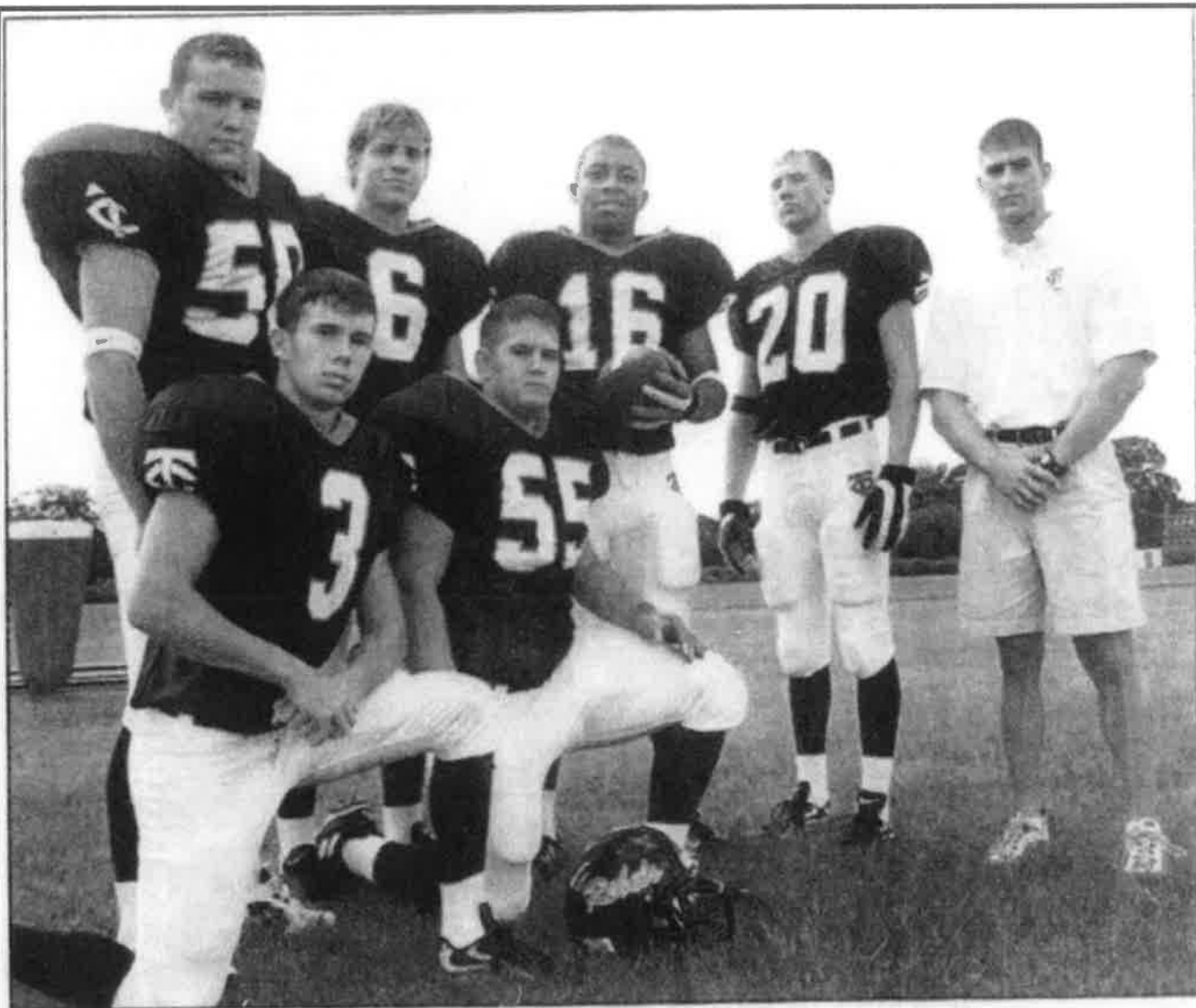

Rebels hold back Pioneers

LAFAYETTE — Teurlings Catholic's Rebels drew gasps from even their own fans with their passing game success in the first half.

In the second half, the Rebels and the Rebel faithful also had breathing problems. This time, though, they were holding their breath for the final 24 minutes.

The Rebs bolted out to a 20-7 halftime advantage and held on the rest of the way, and Notre Dame's late comeback fell short in the closing minutes as Teurlings posted a 20-14 victory in their annual bloodletting Friday at Clark Field.

Fifth-ranked Teurlings (4-1) followed the strong arm of quarterback Dusty Collette, who passed for 180 yards in the first half alone, and then turned it over to a defensive unit that held the second-ranked Pios (3-2) scoreless in two trips into Rebel territory in the final period.

"It was offense in the first half and defense in the second half," said Rebel head coach Sonny Charpentier. "Dusty created some plays for us and bought himself some time, and we were able to get some big pass plays on them."

Collette, who finished the night 14-of-23 for 247 yards, completed seven straight passes at one point in the first half. His most important completion, though, came with 51 seconds left before halftime when he found Dustin Smith open from five yards out to give the Rebels the 20-7 lead.

That score was set up by a Rebel defensive play Notre Dame quarterback Jeff Cook was hit while throwing late in the half, and Allen Milligan stepped in front for an interception and took it 30 yards to the Pio five-yard line to

set up the score.

"When you give up a touchdown like that late in the half," said Notre Dame head coach Lewis Cook, "it usually comes back to haunt you. But their quarterback did a good job. He'd break containment, and you can't cover those guys forever. He bought himself some time and found open receivers."

The Pioneers, who had won the last two games between the two since the series was restarted in 1999, used a turnover of their own early in the second half to get that touchdown back. Collette's fumble was recovered

by J.T. Casanova at the Pio 39, and Notre Dame went 61 yards in 13 plays to set up Adam Ware's two-yard run with 3:59 left in the third period.

Notre Dame reached the Rebel 38 one possession later before running out of downs, and with less than five minutes left Cook drove the Pios to the Teurlings 8 with a first down. Two sacks and two incompletions, though, ended that final threat.

"We made some plays," said coach Cook, "but they did a good job defensively and

turned us back a couple of times. We had it first-and-goal for the go-ahead touchdown. We just couldn't get over the hump."

Teurlings scored on its second and third possessions, going 60 yards in only five plays after a

punt. Collette hit three straight passes to take it to the ND 2 before Jiles LeBlanc scored the first of his two scores on a two-yard run.

Notre Dame took the kickoff and went 76 yards with Cook capping the drive with a one-yard burst, but the Rebels came right back to go 78 yards in five plays. LeBlanc, who was making his first start, broke loose on a 41-yard run to give Teurlings the

lead for good.

"We executed really well," said Charpentier. "We missed some opportunities, but we've got a lot of confidence in our quarterback and receivers. They've worked together well since last spring."

Collette connected with Dustin Smith six times for 111 yards and with Dane Charpentier five times for 100 yards in that aerial attack.

LAFAYETTE — It was a night filled with great defensive performances.

Among the efforts topping that list were the Teurlings Catholic Rebels, the St. Thomas More Cougars and the Lafayette High Mighty Lions.

The Rebels' defense limited the area's No. 2-rated offense in Notre Dame to 194 total yards after the Pios entered Friday's showdown averaging 348 yards a game.

The Cougars' defense, meanwhile, held Breaux Bridge to just 37 total yards in a 24-7 victory.

Not to be outdone, the Lions reduced the Carencro Golden Bears' offense to just three first downs and 80 total yards in a 3-0 win in 3-5A play.

And that doesn't even include Northside's 46-0 thumping of Beau Chene, Catholic High of New Iberia swamping South Beauregard 30-0,

Port Barre handling North Vermillion 14-0 and Westgate turning away Opelousas 9-0. It certainly was a Friday night for the defenses.

Needless to say, selecting this week's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Defensive Player of the Week from that group was a tough chore. Of the nominees, Teurlings Catholic senior defensive end Bo Bowen is the winner after collecting eight solo tackles, two assists, four tackles behind the line, contributing to four sacks and one pass hurry.

Believe it or not, there was some offense on Friday, and leading that parade was Acadiana High halfback Alley Broussard. The Wreckin' Rams' junior exploded for 236 rushing yards and three touchdowns on 21 carries in

Port Barre's Daniel Francis (19-105) and Abdul Levier (25-103, 2 TDs) are still looking like one of the top combos in Class 2A and Erath's A.J. Arceneaux (15-109, TD) and Hunter Fawcett (17-108) also delivered double 100-yard performances.

Tigers challenge Rebels

JEANERETTE — If the Jeanerette Tigers (3-2) are planning on upsetting the No. 2-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels (4-1) today when they host them at 7 p.m., their defense will have to stop TCHS potent passing attack which has racked up 1,610 yards of total offense in five games.

"They are very polished at what they do offensively," said Tigers head coach Zeb Simon. "They throw the ball and run the ball equally well. They have a big offensive line that always know what they need to do."

The Rebels offense is triggered by junior quarterback Dusty Collette, who has passed for 898 yards and seven touchdowns on 56-of-94 passing through five games.

"Collette is what makes their passing game go," Simon said. "He has some good mechanics and he knows where his receivers are all the time. He is a smart kid."

"Dusty hasn't surprised us by how well he has thrown the football," said Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier. "He makes the plays when they need to be made and for us to be successful he has to play well."

Collette has developed a good chemistry with his receiving corps, including senior Dane Charpentier and junior Dustin Smith.

"They developed their chemistry during the spring," Charpentier said. "With two talented receivers, it gives Dusty a lot of confidence to throw the ball down the field knowing that one of them will go and get it."

The 6-1, 160-pound Charpentier, has caught 22 passes for 413 yards and three touchdowns, while the 5-9 Smith has made 25 receptions for 374 yards and three TDs.

"Our concern is to stop the quarterback," Simon said. "In the game that I saw the receivers were wide open. So, my biggest concern is to rattle their quarterback to where he makes some bad throws. Their receivers are good, but the quarterback is what makes their offense click."

The Rebels offense will be tested by a Tigers defense that has only allowed 886 yards (631 rushing, 255 passing) in five games.

"They are very athletic on defense," Charpentier said. "They come off of the football well and they attack the run really well."

But the Tigers will more than likely be

without the leader of their defense in junior noseguard Treméal Jack, who has a finger injury.

"Treméal is doubtful for this week's game with an injury to his finger," Simon said. "If surgery is needed he will be out for the rest of the year. I would much prefer to have him for district then playing him now and losing him for the season."

"The Jack kid is a force to be reckoned with," Charpentier said. "He gets off of the football really well."

With the 6-4, 265-pound Jack out of the Tigers lineup, they will lose their big force in the middle that they could count on to stop the run.

"This will definitely be a big loss for our football team," Simon said. "Berwick hurt us by running the football with Treméal out of the lineup. We are going need someone to step it up."

For the Tigers to pull off the upset a lot of the pressure will rest on the shoulders of their offense and how well they sustain drives.

"To win this game our offense will have to keep their offense off of the field," Simon said. "If we slow down their offense and keep their offense off of the field it's going to be a heck of a ball game."

Wildcats hoping to solve Teurlings' balanced offense in key District 6-3A game.

ABBEVILLE — Brent Indest has frustrated many an opposing defense over the years with the ability to both run and throw the football.

Now Indest and his Abbeville Wildcats' coaching staff will find out how the other half has been living then they travel to meet the No. 2-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels (5-1) at 7 p.m. today in a crucial District 6-3A contest at Clark Field.

"They're just so balanced," Indest said. "They remind me a lot of St. Thomas More when Matt Lane and Britt Brodhead were there, except that Teurlings has two very good receivers, and the tight end's not bad.

"The whole key is the quarterback (Dusty Collette). He's capable of throwing or hurting you with his legs. They throw the out route as well as any high school team I've seen in a long time."

The running game is led by Ray Boudreaux (83-601, 10 TDs) and Tim Boudreaux (86-471, 8 TDs).

"All year, people have been focusing on

Ray and Tim has hurt them," Indest said. "The other night, they focused on Tim and Ray had a breakout game (236 yards)."

Abbeville's had scoring nights of 63-28 over North Vermilion and 54-12 over Alexandria so far this season.

"You look at what they did against Notre Dame (in a 20-14 win), and it's scary," Indest said. "They give you a lot of looks on defense. They're big on the defensive front and their linebackers make plays. You have to be patient.

Rebels not surprised to be battling Abbeville in crucial district contest.

LAFAYETTE -- Sonny Charpentier and his coaching staff sure aren't surprised.

And it's doubtful his players are, either.

All indications are that the biggest District 6-3A contest of the season will be played beginning at 7 p.m. today at Clark Field when Charpentier's No. 2-ranked Rebels (5-1) host the Abbeville Wildcats (4-2, 1-0).

"When the new districts came out, we knew right away that Abbeville would be the team to beat," Charpentier said. "They do just about everything well. I know they're not ranked, but I've seen a top five team when I look at them on film."

In a matchup of two top-notch clubs, every area of both teams will be challenged, but it's the Rebels' defense that figures to be facing the tallest task tonight.

Abbeville entered last week's game as the No. 4-rated offense in the Acadiana area and promptly put up 63 points in the district opener over North Vermilion. By comparison, Teurlings' offense was No. 6 a week ago, before putting up 350 yards and 54 points on Jeanerette.

"Their offense gives you a lot of different formations out of the Wing T," Charpentier said. "They're really balanced, and they really make you cover the whole field. Coaches say that a lot, but they really do make you cover sideline to sideline."

Unlike some Wing-T teams, the Wildcats can burn you with the passing game, led by quarterback Dustin Guidry.

"They have a very good receiver in the

(Brett) Doucet kid, and they have a dangerous tight end (Darrell Briggs). The tight end is a big weapon in high school football. We had (LSU signee) Kory Hebert for two years.

"He (Briggs) can get deep and he's a load to bring down once he catches the ball. It's going to be a matter of us lining up properly. It's a disadvantage for us, because we don't see a lot of Wing T."

As sharp as the Rebels have been in putting up a 5-1 start, including wins over Iota and Notre Dame, Charpentier doesn't

feel they've peaked yet.

"We had six fumbles against Jeanerette last week and lost two," he said. "We can still get a lot better. I think there's a lot of upside to this team. We just have to keep working hard to get better."

"Also, our running game definitely needs to get better. We still have backs missing too many holes. We're still using a rotation and I don't know if that's good or bad. They all deserve to play, but sometimes you don't get the continuity that you want back there."

Teurlings survives Abbeville

LAFAYETTE — Sometimes, you need breaks to go your way. Friday night was one of those nights for the second-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

The Rebels (5-1, 1-0) were the benefit of a controversial call in the third quarter, then dodged another big bullet when a wide-open Abbeville receiver dropped a sure touchdown in the fourth quarter to survive a 27-20 scare from the Wildcats (4-3, 1-1).

Teurlings trailed 20-14 late in the third quarter when they faced a second-and-goal at the Abbeville 1-yard line.

Teurlings quarterback Dusty Collette handed the ball to the fullback, Charlie Garrett, but it appeared Garrett never got the handle on the football. The ball was kicked around before finally going out the back of the end zone.

Initially, the officials signaled a touchback and the Abbeville offense ran on the field. But the officials huddled in the end zone and eventually reversed the call, giving Garrett the touchdown.

Television replays of KLAF's broadcast of the game showed that Garrett never got control of the football, but the play stood and the Rebels went up 21-20.

Then early in the fourth period, the Abbeville Wildcats drove deep into Teurlings territory, threatening to take the lead back. But the Wildcat offense stalled at the Rebel 3-yard line to bring up

a fourth-down situation.

The Wildcats' kicking game had resulted in two blocked extra points earlier in the game, so Abbeville coach Brent Indest called for the fake. It turned out to be the perfect call as holder Dustin Guidry rolled out to his right and threw back to the left sideline to a wide open Jason O'Brien. But O'Brien didn't look the ball in and it fell incomplete to preserve the lead for the Rebels.

Later in the period, the Wildcats got another opportunity to threaten the Rebels' lead, but a second down pass by Guidry was ruled an interception by Teurlings Catholic's Dustin Smith. Once again, television replays showed the ball bouncing off the turf into Smith's hands. The game will be replayed today by KLAF at 2 p.m.

After the game, a distraught Indest praised his team's efforts despite the loss.

"Everybody here is blaming the officials, but I'll check on the film and wait for that judgement," Indest said. "I can tell you that they were awful on both sides and it's a shame that a group of adults have to screw up a good football game.

"It's an easy cop out to blame officials, but if what everyone is saying about the replays are true, I hope those guys have a hard time sleeping tonight."

As Indest pointed out, the calls went both ways as a fumble by Collette early in the fourth quarter appeared to have Collette down when he fumbled the ball. In fact, it took a while before the officials signaled Abbeville had the ball.

And earlier in the game, an interception by Abbeville's Kenneth Lewis also appeared to hit the turf before he caught the ball. That interception led to a 6-yard TD run by Tim Boudreaux to give AHS a 20-7 lead.

Teurlings bounced back from that turnover to score right before the half to cut the lead to 20-14. Collette marched the Rebels 66 yards in only 1:46 to make it a 20-14 deficit with a 1-yard TD pass to Dustin Smith.

"It's definitely a big win for us," Rebel coach Sonny Charpentier said. "I thought we played better defense in the second half. I thought the big thing was us going down and scoring right before the half. It seemed to give us the momentum in a back-and-forth game.

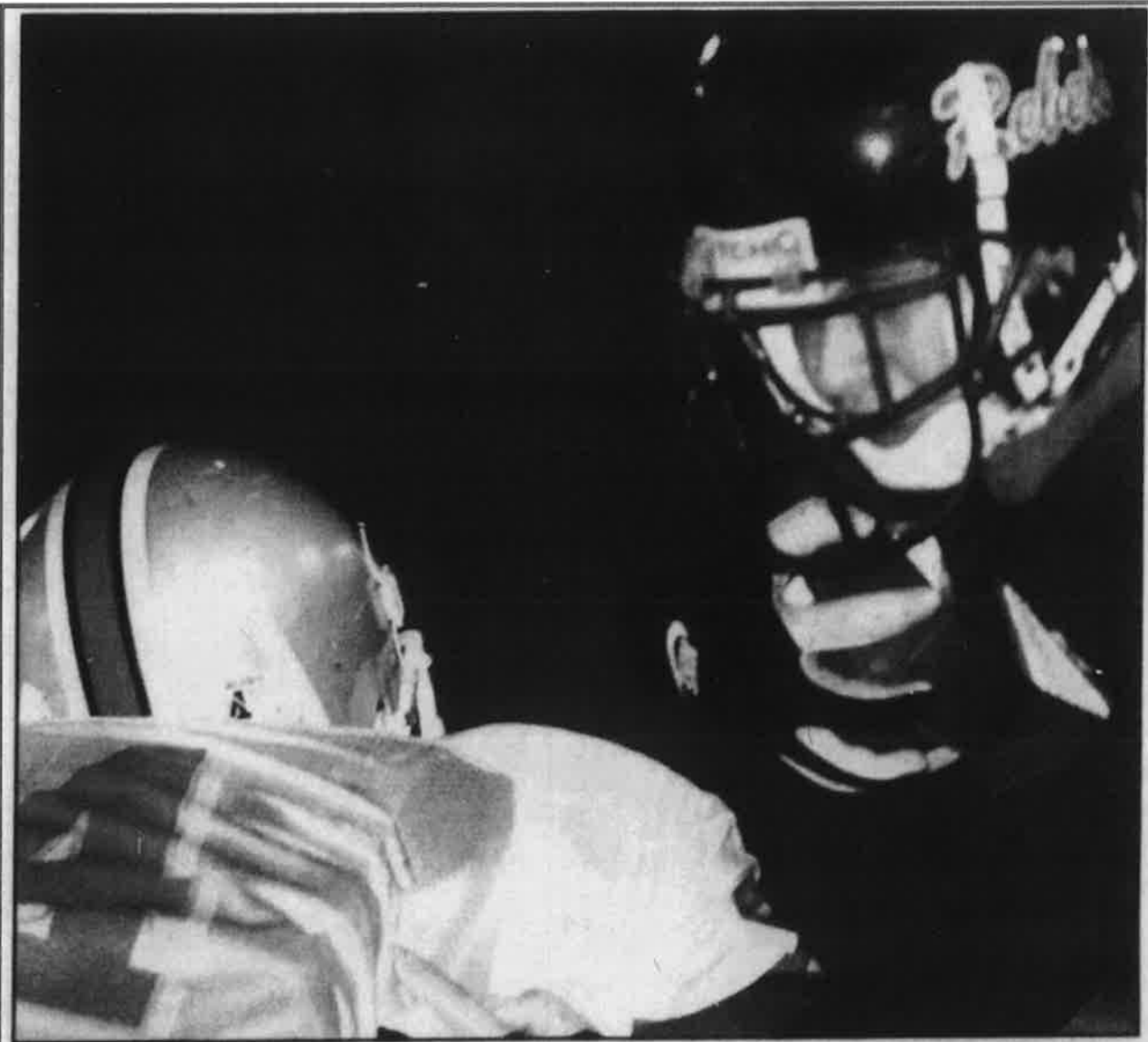

LAFAYETTE — Students at Teurlings High School stood Friday to recite the Pledge of Allegiance as part of the national Pledge Across America event.

Cari Broussard, 16, said students are dealing with the fear and uncertainty caused by the terrorist attacks.

"It makes us all aware of what is going on," Broussard said. "It makes you feel better to know what is going on."

LAFAYETTE — Jason Miller is making this a habit.

The Iota fullback rushed for 265 yards and four touchdowns in Friday night's 35-6 win over the Iota Yellow Jackets to capture Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Offensive Player of the Week honors for the second straight week and third time this year.

Miller's 265-yard, four-touchdown night comes a week after the senior rushed for 402 yards and six touchdowns.

But unlike last week, Miller actually had some competition for this week's award.

Acadiana High's Alley Broussard rushed for 194 yards and three touchdowns in leading the Rams to a 21-13 come-from-behind win over LaGrange. Lafayette High's Jasper Faulk rushed for 134

yards and a touchdown in the Lions' 28-24 win over Comeaux.

Teurlings Catholic's quarterback and wide receiver tandem of Dusty Collette and Dustin Smith wreaked havoc on the Abbeville defense in the Rebels' 27-20 win. Collette threw for 203 yards and a touchdown while Smith pulled down eight passes for 112 yards and a score.


Church Point's Anthony Citizen ran for 152 yards and a touchdown in the Bears' 29-14 win over District 5-3A rival Crowley. And Delcambre's Quentin Comeaux was impressive in a losing effort for the Panthers, rushing for 168 yards and three touchdowns.

Cecilia kicker Joel Stelly had an outstanding night for the Bulldogs in Cecilia's 48-8 win over North Iberville.

Stelly made good on 6-of-7 extra points, had four of eight kickoffs for touchbacks and had a punt for 65 yards that was downed at the North Iberville 4-yard line.

Defensively, Teurlings Catholic defensive back Tyler Stutes was impressive as the Rebels held off Abbeville in the final minutes. Stutes recorded nine solo and seven assists for the Rebels, who shut out Abbeville in the second half of its 27-20 win.

For his effort, Stutes was named the Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Defensive Player of the Week.

Teurlings blows past Kaplan

KAPLAN —The No. 2-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels rolled to a four-touchdown victory Friday as they shut out their district foes at the Pirates' home in Ed Douglas Memorial Stadium.

The 28-0 victory showed several drives with brilliant combinations of passing and rushing for Teurlings' victory over a team that did make big plays on special teams and defense, but never seemed to come together on offense.

Erath held the normally impressive Robbie Howze to single digit rushing. Teurlings' own offense struggled with a Kaplan defense that generated interceptions including one that Daniel Allen ran back for 43 yards.

Kaplan struggled with technical problems on offense, missing snaps and showing a weakness around the slightly injured Howze. Teurlings, meanwhile, kept looking better on the pass and the run until the third quarter ended.

Teurlings first got on the board with a drive of 4:33 in the first quarter which yielded two first downs before Charlie Garrett's 12-yard run into a misled defense and the Kaplan end zone. The Clint Hebert PAT kick was good as were all of his PAT attempts on the night.

In the next quarter Dusty Collette would lead an effective mixed drive that would see him connect with Dane Charpentier, one of his favorite targets on a crucial 7-yard pass to the 1-yard line where he was brought down by a tightening Pirate defense. Josh Dean then punched in the TD run.

The performance by Collette was less controlled and icy in

the first half than one expects of this young athlete.

"I did struggle with some indecisive passing (in the first half) reading our offense against their defense was costing me a step," Collette stated after the game.

The third quarter was the time when "we played our game, this is football and we were just a little inconsistent outside the third quarter," according to Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier.

In the third quarter Charpentier's squad would score twice and when Collette completed a pass to Andy Camel that was good for 62 yards and a touchdown, it was clear that the offense had already heated up to the level that seems to win this team so many games this season.

The final Teurlings drive of the third quarter was good for 88 yards and five first downs not counting the touchdown. The entire offense clicked around strong efforts by Collette, Dustin Smith, Camel and Jiles Leblanc.

The Leblanc touchdown punched in from the 2-yard-line would bring Teurlings within an Hebert kick of its final 28 point sweep. This team did not score in the final period but that may be because they did not stick with their toughest game. It is definitely partly due to the fact that Kaplan gained yards, minutes and first downs that prevented Teurlings from scoring.

Kaplan coach Tim Gabor stated that "our special teams and defense made a good effort but our offense did not spark even when they gave us great field position. They are clearly a very good team. Howze's ankle was tweaked at a very bad time."

Bobcats challenge Rebels in 6-3A

LAFAYETTE — With all the hype surrounding the big win over Abbeville, it almost seems like the No. 2-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels have already clinched the District 6-3A title.

The standings show, however, that coach Sonny Charpentier's club is tied with Erath for the top spot at 2-0.

Consequently, it's today's 7 p.m. showdown at Clark Field between Teurlings and Erath that the Rebels needs to help secure the district crown.

A Teurlings win would then require the Rebels (7-1, 2-0) to beat North Vermilion (1-7, 0-3) to win the outright title.

Although they want to win the district title, Charpentier is focused on getting things pol-

ished up for the playoffs.

"We really haven't put it all together yet, and it's time to do that," he said. "I've been waiting for it to happen and sooner or later it needs to. Don't get me wrong, the kids have played well, but we still haven't put all three phases of the game together yet."

The Bobcats (6-2, 2-0) have been steady all season, with the exception of a disappointing fourth quarter at Catholic High of New Iberia two weeks ago.

"Erath's much better this year," Charpentier said. "Their offense is kind of scary in that they run the option very well and we haven't faced a lot of option this year. Breaux Bridge did somewhat, but not as much as Erath does."

"Their quarterback (Brennan Bernard) is a good athlete.

We're going to have to play good assignment football on defense this week."

The Rebels may get some play out of offensive tackle Errol Solomon this week after sitting out a couple weeks with a bad ankle. Effectively replacing him has been Brenton Collinsworth.

"He's doing a good job at left tackle for us," Charpentier said. "In fact, because of his speed, he can do some things that Errol can't."

The Rebels sport one of the area's most explosive offenses, thanks largely to the passing game of quarterback Dusty Collette (83-150-11, 1324 yds, 10 TDs) and receivers Dustin Smith (41-647, 5 TDs) and Dane Charpentier (30-506, 3 TDs).

"We just can't afford to give up the big play," EHS coach

Jacob Byler said. "Last year, we were only down by a touchdown late in the first half and then gave up two big plays in a row and all of a sudden it was 28-7."

"Teurlings just runs so much stuff, it's hard to prepare for them. We just have to rely on our option game to keep it away from them. When we've run it well this year, we've won. When we haven't we haven't won."

Erath has some injury concerns itself with nose guard Shane Delcambre and receiver A.J. Davenport not playing.

"We're just happy to be in position to play for a district championship," said Byler, whose Bobcats were picked to finish last this fall. "Hopefully, our kids just go out and play relaxed and try to have fun. Nobody expected us to be in this position."

TCHS Rebels storm back to hold off Bobcats

LAFAYETTE — It took more than a quarter to get a first down, and longer than that to dent the scoreboard, but the Teurlings Catholic Rebels stormed back to defeat Erath 21-13 Friday night at Clark Field.

The victory put TCHS (9-1, 3-0) in the driver's seat for the District 6-3A crown, with next week's finale at North Vermilion standing between the Rebels and an outright title.

Erath fell to 6-3, and 2-1, but not before rocking the hosts back on their heels with inventive play-calling and aggressive play.

"Give them a lot of credit," TCHS

coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They were ready to play tonight, and they got after our butts. This was the first time in nine weeks that we weren't ready emotionally but they were ready."

The Bobcats made it clearly early that they were primed, marching 66 yards in 11 plays to a 6-0 lead. Fullback A.J. Arceneaux started it with a bruising 19-yard run, and a 19-yard guard-around to Zack Buck got another 19 to the TCHS 12-yard line.

EHS's touchdown came on Brennan Bernard's 6-yard slant pass to Rhett Hebert.

The Rebels punted on their first three series and faltered on the EHS 32 after having a 17-yard touchdown pass from Dusty Collette to Dane

Charpentier called back on an offensive interference call.

Erath coach Jacob Byler then reached into his bag of tricks on a 67-yard march that made it 12-0. A pitch to Ian Vice gained 19 yards, and an end-around pass from Hebert to Drew Carlin picked up 32 yards to the Rebels' 11.

On third-and-9 at the 16, the Bobcats went to the guard-around again and Buck stormed into the end zone.

It looked bleak for the Rebels moments later when Buck claimed a fumble at the TCHS 6, but the Rebels held to keep the count 12-0 at the break.

"If they score there, they're up three scores and that would have been hard to make up in the second half," Charpentier said. "It's not impossible, but it

would have been tough. That was a big, big turning point for us."

The Rebels turned up the heat in the third period, forcing a punt that Dustin Smith returned 34 yards to the EHS 21 and scoring on the a fourth straight Jiles LeBlanc run, from 8 yards away. Clint Hebert added the extra point.

On the next EHS punt, Tyler Hebert stormed through to block Vice's punt and Trevor Kling ran the ball to the Bobcats' 5. Andy Camel scored on a pitch to put the Rebels ahead. After fumbling away another scoring chance, TCHS got a crucial third TD on a 17-yard Collette pass to a diving Charpentier.

"That touchdown pass was huge," coach Charpentier said. "It put us up by two scores."

Collette hit 10-of-17 passes for 111 yards, including 5-for-49 to Charpentier, while LeBlanc paced the ground game with 98 yards on 12 attempts.

EHS rushed for 199 yards, with Vice (7-94) and Arceneaux (13-48) the leaders. Arceneaux also had three catches for 52 yards and Hebert had 6-for-43.

"We made a few adjustments on blocking schemes at halftime," Charpentier said. "They were slanting on the tight end side, and we took advantage to pop some quick hits. Then, our field position in the third period gave our offense a tremendous boost."

"I don't believe we've been scored on yet in the third quarter this year. Give credit to our kids. They believed we could get it done in the second half."

Rebels move on without Smith

LAFAYETTE — The state playoffs isn't the time to get one of your top players injured.

But although it appears the No. 2-seeded Teurlings Catholic Rebels will have to make the rest of their Class 3A playoff run without leading receiver Dustin Smith, coach Sonny Charpentier refuses to dwell on the negative.

He and his Rebels (10-1) simply can't afford to with the No. 15-seeded Westlake Rams (8-3) coming to town for a 7 p.m. state regional contest tonight at Clark Field.

Smith, who had 51 catches for 766 yards and seven touchdowns on the season, is out four weeks after injuring his hip in last week's 34-0 win over North Caddo.

"We're all very disappointed for Dustin," Charpentier said. "He was having a great year. I really don't think the team has lost confidence. They're more concerned for Dustin than anything else."

"I never got the sense that they were thinking, 'What are we going to do now.' They were just genuinely concerned for Dustin and disappointed for him."

Without Smith, who also played cornerback, the Rebels

will have to make adjustments. One of those will require safety Charlie Garrett playing more offense.

He had been a spot offensive player throughout the season.

"Dustin was very valuable to this team, but we feel like we've got capable players to back him up," Garrett said. "I don't think we've lost any confidence. We still feel like this is our year."

Garrett (34-235, 6 TDs rushing this season) will likely have to play some flanker, as well as

running back tonight.

"I'll do whatever the team needs me to do," he said. "I'm comfortable catching the ball. I don't think it's going to hurt my play on defense."

"Our defense has been strong all year. We have a lot of depth on defense. Our defense knows the offense is going to pull through. We just have to go out there and execute like we have all year long."

Jacob Delahoussaye will also likely see more playing

time.

"Charlie is a good receiver, and he runs good routes," Charpentier said. "He would have played more offense this year if he wasn't so valuable to us on defense. Jacob may not be as quick as Dustin, but he can catch the ball."

Charpentier's next concern is Westlake, which lost in the semifinals last season.

"Offensively, they throw it right at 58 percent of the time from the tapes we've seen," he said. "The quarterback may not be as good as last year's (Stephen F. Austin signee Zeke Dixon), but they run the same offense. The quarterback they have now is more dangerous as a runner than a passer."

The Rams, who defeated Menard 19-14 last Friday, changed to Jordan Buller (72-136-5, 948 yds, 6 TDs; 102-603, 11 TDs rushing) at quarterback at midseason.

The leading rusher is Marlon Pettaway (138-701, 5 TDs).

Westlake's top player is safety C.J. Grant (96 tackles, 4 sacks, 4 ints.), who also is the top receiver with 26 grabs for 402 yards and two scores.

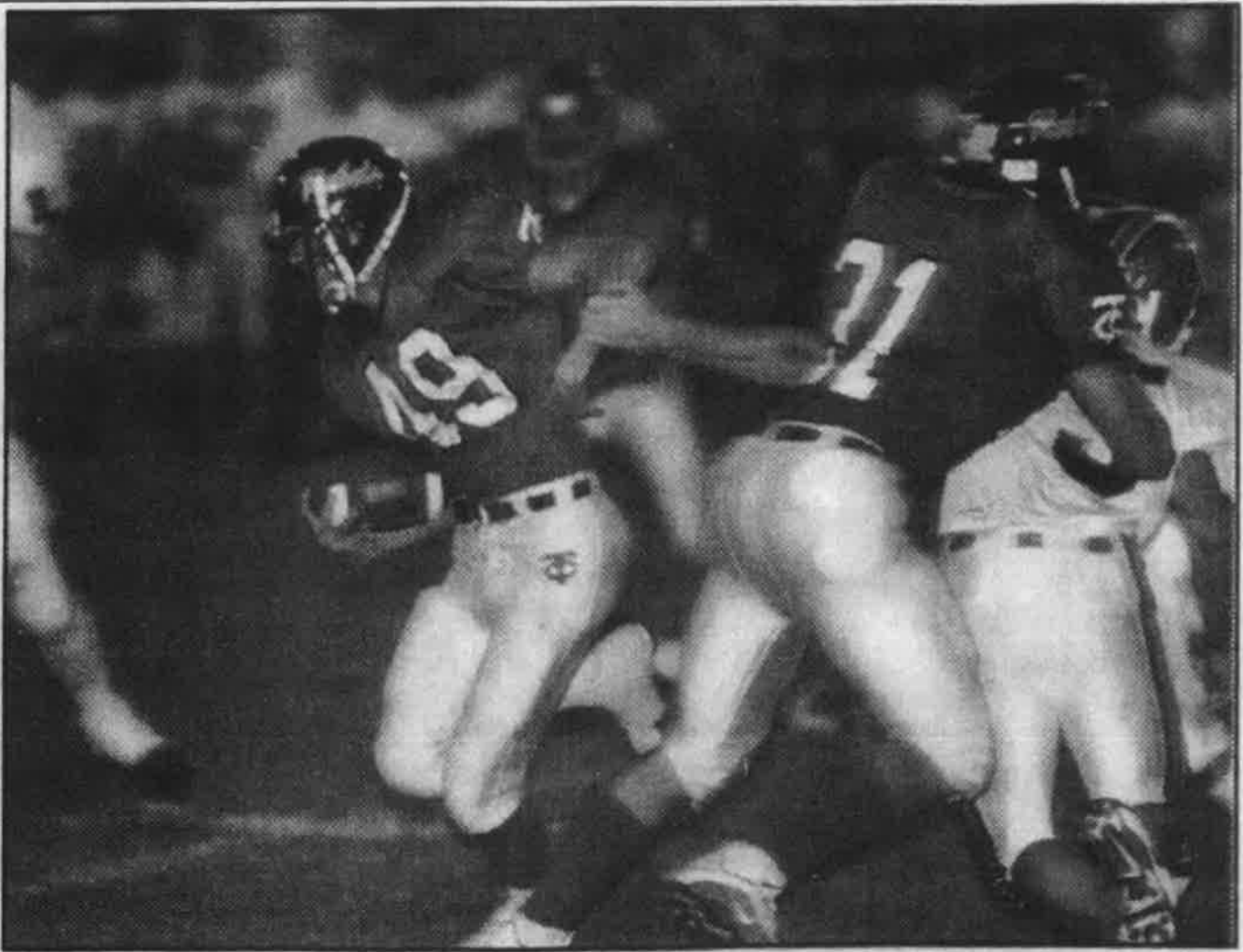
"Defensively, they like to bring people," Charpentier said. "They want to stop you before you get started. If we're able to protect, we should get some 1-on-1 situations."

Quick start propels TCHS Rebs

LAFAYETTE — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels played without leading receiver Dustin Smith, but found a way.

The Westlake Rams lost starting quarterback Jordan Buller three plays into the action, and never recovered.

With Friday's 27-14 victory at Clark Field, coach Sonny Charpentier's Rebels earned a berth in the Class 3A quarterfinals and will host Belle Chasse next week at home.

"The best thing we did was, we got up early and we hung on," said Charpentier, whose 11-1 squad scored on its first three possessions for a 17-0 lead and led 24-0 at halftime.

"That was very big for us. When you can come out and jump on a team early, especially against a

team that you consider a favorite, it's big. When you let a team hang in there with you, you can be in trouble.

"We did a good job of taking advantage of opportunities we had early. That's something we didn't do last week (a 34-0 win over North Caddo), and we emphasized getting a good start this week."

Junior quarterback Dusty Collette fared well, even without Smith's 51 receptions in the lineup, as he hit 9-of-11 passes for 168 yards and a pair of long touchdowns.

Buller's only pass was intercepted by Trevor Kling on a tip drill in the opening minute of play, and TCHS moved quickly to a 26-yard field goal by Clint Hebert. On the first snap after that, Buller was slammed on a 10-yard run

and separated his shoulder to exit for the evening.

Collette followed a WHS punt with a brisk 66-yard, 5-play march to make it 10-0. He hit Dane Charpentier on passes of

18 and 10 yards then dashed through the Rams defense on a quarterback counter for a 27-yard touchdown.

The next time they got the ball, the Rebels marched 75 yards in 4 snaps. Collette's play-action fake froze the defense long enough for Charpentier (8-115-1) to work clear on a deep post for a 47-yard score.

A 1-yard WHS punt then

positioned TCHS at the Rams' 42, and Collette cashed in with a screen pass that Tyler Stutes carried 38 yards to the end zone.

Hebert's 42-yard field goal in the third period finished off the Rebels' scoring, and Westlake picked up a pair of fourth-period scores on a 13-yard run by Dominique Eaglin and a 12-yard pass from freshman Channing Kile to Marcus Coleman.

Kile saw most of the action at

quarterback substiting for Buller and finished 15-of-28 for 172 yards once he settled down. Some 163 of the Rams' 261 total yards came on their late scoring drives, as TCHS had the game well in hand after three periods.

"Things clicked for us early on offense," Charpentier said. "We rocked them back on their heels. We didn't make a big deal out of not having Dustin in there. We came with

some offensive wrinkles we might have used, even with Dustin in there."

Buller's exit clearly shook the 8-4 visitors, while the Rebels had a week to adjust to Smith's absence.

"You hate to see that happen," Charpentier said. "He's a good player for them. Our defensive end, Bo Bowen, broke his left hand. It's a battle of attrition at this point in the season."

Bowen provides TCHS motivation

LAFAYETTE — When Teurlings Catholic gets ready to host Belle Chasse Friday in the Class 3A quarterfinal playoffs, the Rebels probably won't need any extra incentive.

However, should they need that little extra motivation, all they have to do is look toward the defensive end slot and look at Bo Bowen — and look at the cast on his hand.

Bowen suffered a broken hand last Friday in the opening minutes of the Rebels' 27-14 second-round win over Westlake, but the thought of not playing this week never crossed his mind.

"I'm gonna play," he said this week. "The trainers had to come up with some kind of cover for it to make it legal, but I'll be there Friday."

That doesn't surprise head coach Sonny Charpentier one bit.

"As much as any kid I've ever coached," he said. "Bo's motor runs as fast as it can go all the time. He's always on the go, and playing defensive end in our scheme really suits the way he plays."

Bowen was an undersized defensive tackle as a sophomore and junior, and even now at six feet and 200 pounds he's going up against bigger opponents every week.

"He was even smaller than that the last couple of years and playing tackle," Charpentier said. "But we've always liked to have really good athletes there even if they're undersized so they can use their quickness."

That's worked in Bowen's case. He's already recorded 15 quarterback sacks this season for an under-appreciated Rebel defense, and has 19 other tackles for negative yardage.

"Playing at the end has made a big difference to me," Bowen

said. "It's a lot less physical. At tackle you just try to play with all-out heart, but at end it's more mental and you use your head a lot more."

It also has helped Bowen, and the 11-1 Rebels overall, that he's moved more from a two-way performer to concentrating on defensive assignments as the season's progressed. He was doing double duty as a tight end offensively until mid-season when David Schexnayder began stepping into that role.

"He was so valuable to us that we needed him in both places," Charpentier said. "But now, he can be as fresh as possible."

Since Bowen's forte is his speed and ability to run down ball carriers, that freshness has helped a unit that has basically pitched shutouts in its first two playoff games. Both of Westlake's scores came against a mostly backup unit after the Rebels shut out North Caddo 34-0 in the opening round.

"I felt I could play both ways," said Bowen, "but it does help. I know I'm not as tired and that's probably helped. But I could still do it if we needed it."

Of that, Charpentier has no doubts.

"He's probably more dangerous when people run away from him," he said. "because he's got outstanding closing speed. He causes things to happen."

Bowen's efforts have been part of a defensive unit that hasn't received the credit it deserves because of the impressive offensive efforts and the success the Rebels have had in the passing game on the way to the state's number two ranking.

"All people want to talk about is offense," Charpentier said. "but the defense has been what's gotten us where we are. They've given us great field position and gotten the ball back for the offense. We knew our defense would be our strong point."

"Our team's a whole unit," Bowen said. "We're doing well as a team, so it doesn't matter who gets the publicity. The defense has been able to give the offense a lot of opportunities, and that's helped a lot."

Rebels host high-powered Cardinals

LAFAYETTE — Don't expect Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier to apologize for his No. 2-seeded Rebels (11-1) getting three home playoff games this season.

After all, they had to travel to state runner-up Redemptorist in the second round last season.

As convenient as not traveling is, however, Charpentier knows that home games don't automatically produce playoff wins.

To take full advantage of it, his Rebels must first take care of the red-hot, No. 7-seeded Belle Chasse Cardinals (11-1) when the two teams meet at 7 p.m. tonight in a Class 3A quarterfinal at Clark Field.

"Sure, it's nice, but we feel like we've earned it," Charpentier said. "Under this system, that's what you play the regular season for. It goes with the territory of being seeded No. 2."

Perhaps the most important thing for the Rebels is that they showed in last week's 27-14 win over Westlake that the loss of receiver Dustin Smith can be overcome. The Rebels still put up 27 points and 335 total yards.

"We've got to start spreading it

around more," Charpentier said. "(Jacob) Delahoussaye (Smith's replacement) needs to start catching some balls. We've got to do some things we haven't done before. We worked on a lot more things than we actually used. We've just got to keep working and when we need them, use them."

The balanced rushing attack of Andy Camel (75-548, 7 TDs), Josh Dean (82-391, 6 TDs), Charlie Garrett (41-249, 6 TDs) and quarterback Dusty Collette (70-267, 5 TDs) may play a greater role tonight.

The passing game, led by Collette (121-212-33, 1869 yds, 16 TDs) and receiver Dane Charpentier (40-803, 6 TDs), remains the mainstay of the Rebels' offense.

On paper, Teurlings will be challenged by Belle Chasse's defense, which hasn't allowed a touchdown since a 60-15 win over Booker T. Washington in week nine. In the playoffs, the Cards have outscored Northwest and Bunkie 79-0.

For the season, BCHS has outscored its opposition 502-153. Its only loss was 35-31 to Port Sulphur in the opener. Teurlings, on the other hand, has outscored its foes 369-116.

"They run a '50' front with good sized kids at linebacker," Charpentier said. "Their really good receiver

also plays safety. He's kind of a centerfielder back there."

Offensively, Belle Chasse is led by quarterback Shane Shelley (56-113-6, 984 yds, 19 TDs, 794 yds rushing), running back Elijah Gary (731 yds, 5 TDs) and receiver Chris Henry (41-797, 17 TDs).

"Teurlings is huge," BCHS coach Bob Becnel said. "Their size concerns me. Offensively, they're just so balanced. They don't really have any tendencies. If they're really executing their offense, they're almost unstoppable."

One advantage the Rebels may have is their playoff experience. While BCHS has made the playoffs nine straight years, this is the first trip to the quarterfinals since 1983. The Cards lost to Jena 42-41 in the first round last year and has suffered four losses to St. James during that nine-year stretch.

"I've been very proud of the kids," Becnel said. "They've been really grounded and really focused since the playoffs started."

The winner will meet the Amite-Abbeville winner in the state semifinals next Friday.

For Teurlings, it would be its first road trip of the playoffs. Charpentier and the Rebels are just hoping they get to make it.

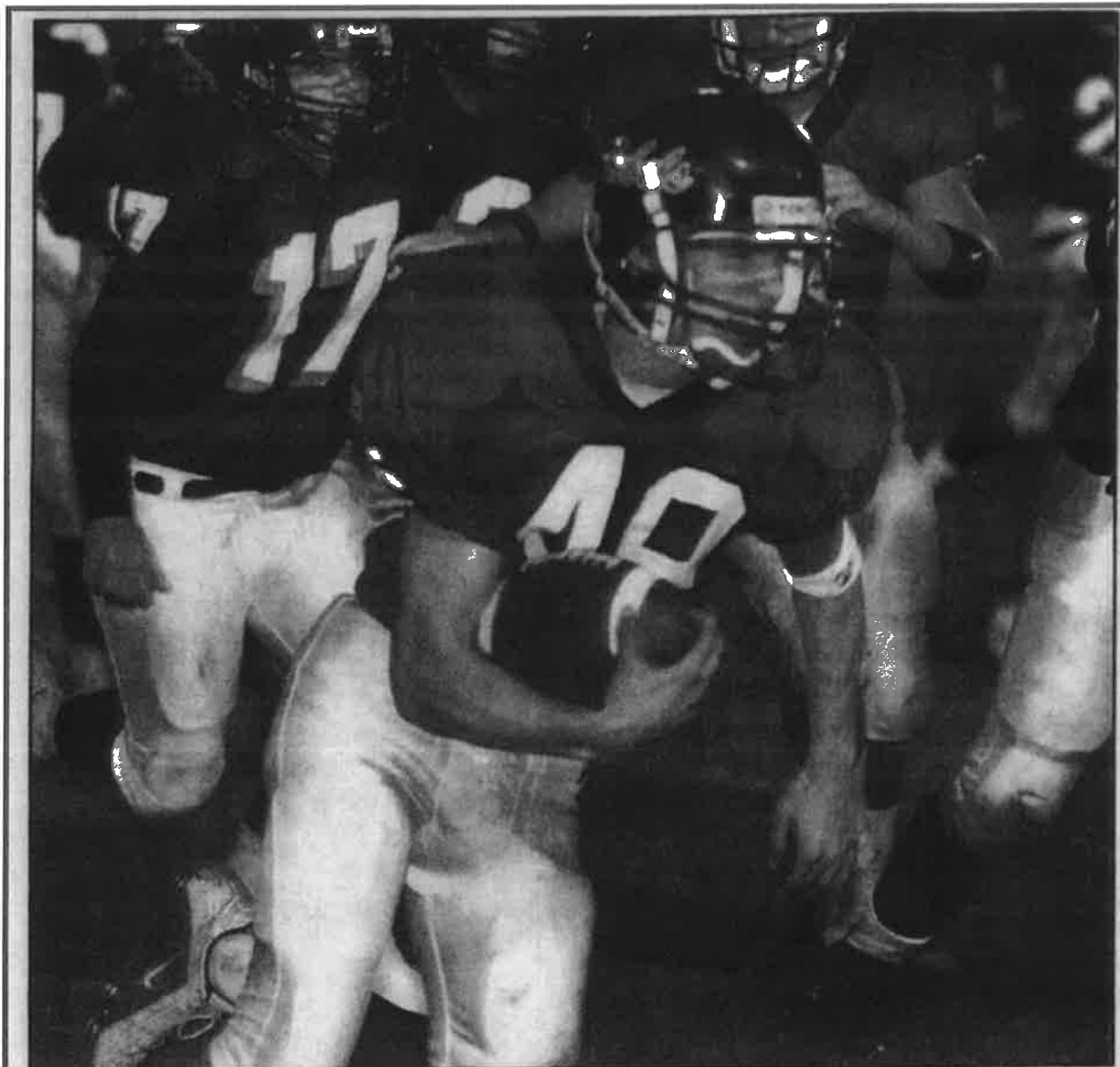

Rebel heartbreaker

Belle Chasse receiver proves too tough for Teurlings in 42-35 loss to BCHS.

LAFAYETTE — Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier knew Belle Chasse's 6-5 receiver Chris Henry was a prime-time scorer, but never could he have foreseen Henry catching four touchdowns to lead the Cardinals to the thrilling 42-35 win over Teurlings Catholic (11-2).

Teurlings' defense had the BCHS quarterback Shane Shelley (15-18-0 214 yds, 4 TDs) scrambling all night, but could never corral the nifty passer.

Rebel defensive end Bo Bowen had Shelley in his grasp on several occasions but could never bring him down. The play caller from BCHS torched the TCHS secondary en route to putting up 514 yards of total offense.

BCHS did not allow a touchdown in its first two Class 3A playoff games, but the Rebels stopped that streak five minutes into the game.

Junior quarterback Dusty Collette (10-36-1 159) found his best receiver Dane Charpentier (7-106) on a swing pass to the Cardinal 1. The next play found Josh Dean (8-54) diving for the first score of the night on the first Rebel possession.

On the ensuing drive, BCHS answered with a 8-yard pass on a circus catch by Henry (9-121, 4 TDs). The drive was set up by a 27-yard strike to receiver Kevon Smith.

After only a 14-yard possession by Teurlings Catholic, BCHS went ahead off a fade route and catch by Henry over three defenders. Rebel backs could not match the height of the Cardinal wideout.

TCHS bounced back with a 35-yard scamper off the left end to tie the score at 14-14. Junior tailback Andy Camel (12-68, 1 TD) found open field and was not touched on the run.

After stuffing the BCHS running attack, Teurlings took possession and didn't have to wait long until Charpentier added the go-ahead score. Charpentier took advantage of a defender slip and walked to payday 49 yards with two minutes left in the half.

With 2:38 left in the half BCHS fumbled on the first play after the TCHS score. Defensive end Matt Kennedy recovered a costly fumble and put the Rebels in great field position at the 7-yard line.

Four plays and seven yards later, Teurlings went ahead 28-14 off a Jiles Leblanc (11-58) run of six yards. The half, however, ended with BCHS getting back on the board with a 47-yard pass to Henry for his third touchdown of the half.

The second half belonged to the Cardinals from Belle Chasse.

BCHS held the mighty Rebel Offense to only one score and went ahead of TCHS 33-28 with 5:31 left in the game.

Teurlings Catholic would not go away finding an open receiver Jacob Delahousaye (2-45) beating Henry for a 37-yard score with 2:48 remaining.

BCHS answered with a 15-yard run from Shelley to go ahead 42-35 with less than a minute remaining.

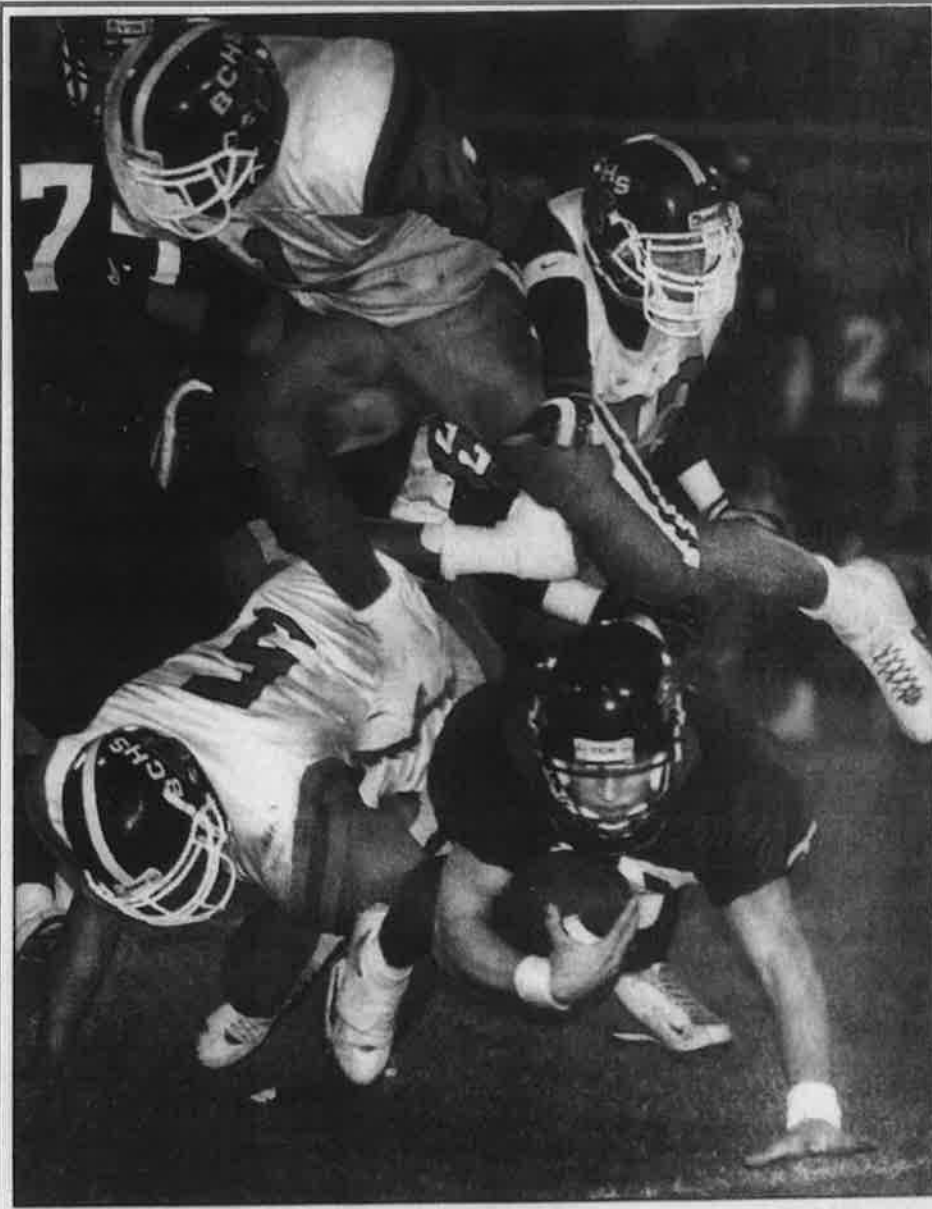
Collette was picked off in a desperation heave with 10 seconds left in regulation. Belle Chasse faces Amite in the semifinal next Friday.

Acadiana's stalwarts

**Broussard, Barrett
take All-Acadiana
individual honors**

LAFAYETTE — He hardly seemed headed for such an honor in week three of the 2001 prep football season.

Acadiana High's star junior halfback Alley Broussard was on the sidelines nursing a bad ankle, while St. Martinville's junior workhorse Martel Narcisse was looking like a runaway locomotive in leading the Tigers to a 51-26 blowout victory over the Wreckin' Rams.

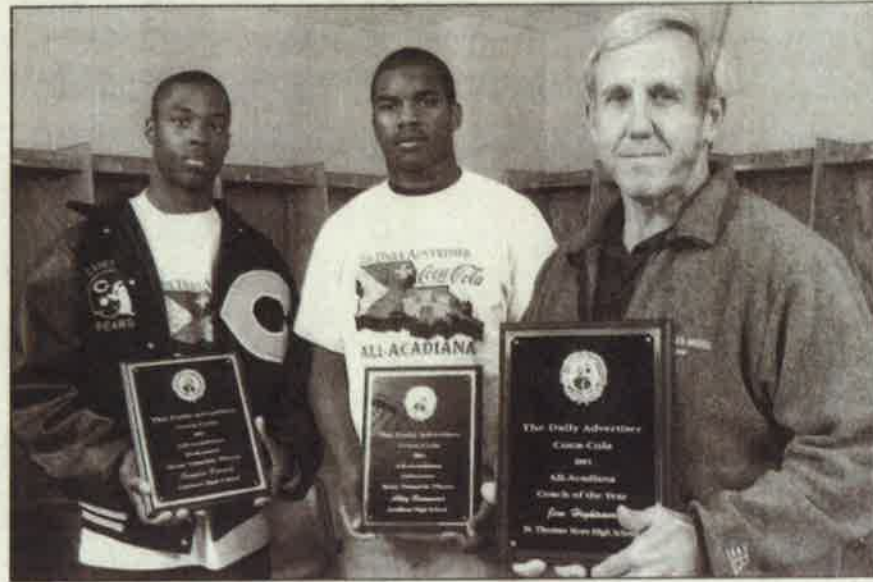
A lot has changed since then.

A healthier Broussard exploded late in the season, carrying the Rams to the Class 5A state semifinals for the first time since 1977. The 6-1, 208-pounder earned first-team All-State status after rushing for 2,252 yards and 28 touchdowns on 290 carries.

He's now followed that up with Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Big School All-Acadiana Offensive Most Valuable Player recognition.

Broussard and the Rams got to the semifinals after a thrilling 20-17 overtime quarterfinal win over rival Carencro High. Without question, however, the Golden Bears wouldn't have gotten that far without the services of senior free safety Stephen Barrett.

The 6-1, 195-pounder did a little bit of everything for the Bears, ranging from scoring touch-

downs at tailback to running back kicks to being one of the state's top defensive backs.

In all, he collected 67 solo tackles, 50 assists, forced six fumbles, recovered four others, picked off eight passes and knocked down 16 others while scoring three defensive touchdowns. That was good enough for All-State accolades, as well as being named this year's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Big School All-Acadiana Defensive Most Valuable Player.

With a huge list of great candidates to select from, St. Thomas More's Jim Hightower

emerged as this fall's Big School All-Acadiana Coach of the Year.

Hightower's Cougars (12-2) were picked to finish third in the powerful District 5-4A race, and instead ran roughshod over that rugged league schedule and didn't have their incredible run halted until a 21-14 loss at Baker in the state semifinals.

By the way, Narcisse didn't exactly struggle after his 168-yard, four-touchdown performance against Acadiana, finishing with 1,696 yards and 20 touchdowns on 235 carries to join Broussard on the first-team backfield.

The other two members are Notre Dame tailback Michael Hensgens, who not only ran for 1,270 yards and 25 touchdowns, but also caught 35 passes for 528 yards and five more scores, and St. Martinville sophomore quarterback Early Doucet, who rushed for 1,293 yards and 13 touchdowns and threw for 139 yards and two scores.

The receiving corps includes Abbeville's Brett Doucet with 53 catches for 940 yards and six TDs, Patterson's Terrell Gray with 41 catches for 724 yards and 12 touchdowns, and Acadiana's All-State tight end

Brandon Beasley with 25 receptions for 528 yards and four scores.

The athlete selection on the squad is St. Thomas More's Jerry Babb, who ran for 658 yards and seven TDs, passed for 637 yards and 10 scores and caught 17 passes for 358 yards and three touchdowns.

The return specialist is Abbeville's Ray Boudreaux, who had 171 yards in kickoffs, 124 in punts and rushed for 1,360 yards and 28 touchdowns on 219 carries on offense.

The offensive line consists of Acadiana's Sean Doucet, Notre

The defensive front includes St. Thomas More's Brian Etier (91 tackles, 14 sacks), Teurlings Catholic's Bo Bowen (97 tackles, 26 CBLs, 16 sacks), Breaux Bridge's Mike John and Carencro's Tony Cormier (47 tackles, 2 interceptions, 2 blocked kicks, 2 TDs in regular season).

The linebacking corps consists of three district MVPs in Lafayette High's Dale Thomas (82 tackles, 6 sacks), Breaux Bridge's Terence Alexander (135 tackles, 3 sacks), Cecilia's Travis Landry (113 tackles, 4 sacks, 2 interceptions) and Carencro's Lyle Woods (87 tackles, 4 sacks in regular season).

Barrett is joined in the secondary by Notre Dame's Wes Simon (52 tackles, 10 interceptions, 18 PBUs), St. Thomas More's Mark Graham (50 tackles, 5 interceptions, 7 PBUs) and Breaux Bridge's Jessie Daniels (104 tackles, 7 interceptions, 16 PBUs).

The kicking game features St. Thomas More kicker Brennan Landry, who made eight field goals, and Carencro punter Eric Viviano, who averaged 41.7 yards and booted 15 inside the 10.
