

Rebels don't plan to falter

Teurlings hopes passing, speed enough to shine

LAFAYETTE — No one has to tell Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier how many productive players his Rebels lost off last year's state quarter-final club.

He's also confident that he's developed a good enough program over the past seven years that the Rebels' success will continue in 2002.

It also doesn't hurt that he's got a few talented players coming back.

"We lost a lot of good players, especially on the defensive side," said Charpentier, who has a career 66-21 record. "We had some kids step up last year for us and we're hoping that will happen again."

Three fixtures in the Rebels' offense do return in quarterback Dusty Collette (5-10, 175, Sr), tailback Andy Camel (5-11, 160, Sr) and wide receiver Dustin Smith (5-8, 145, Sr).

Collette is coming off a stellar season in which he was 131-of-228 passing for 2,028 yards with 18 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. He also ran 76 times for 266 yards and five scores.

"We worked on 7-on-7 pass scales more than we ever have this summer," Charpentier said. "The big thing that I've noticed (about Collette) so far this year is

that he's not making up his mind where he's throwing it ahead of time. He's just letting it happen, and he's a little more patient."

Smith made 51 receptions for 766 yards and seven touchdowns as part of the 1-2 punch with Dane Charpentier, who has walked on at Northwestern State. Jacob Delahoussaye (6-0, 170, Sr) takes over at receiver, while David Schexnayder (6-2, 195, Sr) returns at tight end.

Heading a group of fullbacks expected to play is senior Tyler

Hebert (5-10, 175).

"Jacob is actually bigger and more physical than Dane, and he's got a little experience because he played for Smitty (an injured Smith) in the play-offs," Charpentier said. "David has made great strides. He's gotten a little faster and he's got excellent hands."

The offensive line is loaded with newcomers in Matt Kennedy (6-2, 230, Sr), Matt Robicheaux (6-3, 260, Jr) at left tackle, Gary LeBlanc (6-2, 245, Jr) at center, Jake Gary (5-10, 195, Sr) at right guard and Ryan Vincent (6-1, 165, Sr) at right tackle.

Defensively, only Gary returns on the defensive front, while Kennedy and Hebert are two-way newcomers, and Jake Toups (6-5, 195, Jr) takes over at one end.

Much like the offensive line, the linebacking corps is loaded with newcomers in Josh Moseley (5-10, 175, Sr), Adam Camel (5-11, 180, Sr), Ty Stuart (6-0, 190, Jr) and B.J. Hayes (5-9, 205, Jr).

"We were very physical last year at linebacker," Charpentier said. "This year we're not as big and we're going to have to rely more on our speed. Those guys are just going to have to learn to be more physical as the season

goes on."

Smith returns in the secondary with Delahoussaye joining forces with him at free safety. Junior Dural Watson (5-9, 155) is a newcomer at cornerback.

"This is the second year that we've used this defense and we feel pretty good about it," Charpentier said.

One area that Charpentier doesn't have to worry about is in the kicking game where Schexnayder returns at punter and Clint Hebert at kicker.

"I'd prefer not to have so many guys go both ways," he said. "We need some other kids to step up."

Camel expected to be versatile offensive force for TCHS

LAFAYETTE — It wasn't that Andy Camel didn't play a key role in the Teurlings Catholic's state quarterfinal campaign a year ago.

After all, the speedy tailback did rush for 616 yards and eight touchdowns on 87 carries.

If coach Sonny Charpentier has his way, however, those numbers will pale in comparison to those put up by Camel this fall.

"We've got to create situa-

tion to get Andy the ball in space."

Charpentier said. "Andy's one of those guys that can go the distance. It just worked out last year that we didn't get him

the ball as much as I would have liked to. He needs to touch the ball a large percentage of the time. I would say 15 to 20 times a game at the minimum."

One slight adjustment this

year may be doing so more via the passing game.

"He can run between the tackles," Charpentier said. "He's a good cutback guy. But we're going to use him more in the slot and in trips. With a guy who can run, you've got to get him the ball."

The initial reason why Camel's carries were limited last season was an early-season ankle injury that kept him from approaching 100 percent until week three against Iota.

Because of that, Camel's role last season was splitting

time with Charlie Garrett, among other backs. Camel claims he's ready for a heavy workload, and the added duty of pass catching is no problem.

"I played receiver before they moved me to tailback, so I'm not worried about being able to catch the ball," he said. "At first I had trouble with blocking. I also had to get used to running the ball. It was hard at first. It took a lot of reps until I got comfortable with choosing the right hole to run through."

Adding 10 pounds to his

frame since last season will also help him handle the increased work load.

"I wouldn't say that I'm in great shape yet, but I'm going to be," he said.

As a team, Camel is convinced the Rebels will be better prepared for a complete season.

"Because we lost so many seniors, a lot of people don't think we can do it again this year," he said. "The confidence is there. I think we can. I think that if we go that far again, we'll be better prepared to go all the way."

Prep jamborees offer matchups worth watching

LAFAYETTE — The games may not count just yet, but that doesn't mean that the matchups aren't worth watching.

Led by the 51st Annual Lafayette Kiwanis Club Jamboree at Carencro High, this year's crop of jamboree in the Acadiana area is filled with showdown of teams that figured to be ranked among the Top 10 in the state next week.

The Lafayette event features back-to-back nights of triple-headers. It begins at 6 p.m. today when Acadiana meeting Abbeville, followed by Comeaux and Northside and then Carencro against St. Thomas More.

Acadiana reached the semifinals last season and sports LSU

commitment Alley Broussard, Abbeville, though, will be without Tulane commitment Ray Boudreaux with a nagging ankle injury.

Comeaux's Spartans unveil Tyler Benoit as their new starting tailback, while Northside's Vikings have high hopes after a 5-8 playoff year in Vincent DeRouen's first season last fall.

Carencro will try to build on last year's state quarterfinal finish. That process begins with settling on a starting quarterback with junior Quinton Lawrence and sophomore Lucas Taylor battling for the spot.

St. Thomas More is coming off a semifinal campaign, and officially hands over the reins of the offense to quarterback Jefferys Tafford tonight.

Friday's tripleheader is St. Martin Parish Night at the Lafayette Kiwanis Jamboree.

Breaux Bridge opens what it hopes will be a Super(dome) season by warming up against 5-2A's Vermilion Catholic in the first game.

The middle contest features Mark Barousse's unofficial debut as Lafayette High's new head coach, while Chris Towery hits the field as Cecilia's rookie coach.

The finale has St. Martinville's powerful rushing attack taking on Teurlings Catholic's explosive passing game.

As good as those matchups are, however, not all the fun and intrigue will be in Lafayette. With Towery at

Cecilia that means that James Waguesspack begins his reclamation project at Beau Chene on Friday at Donald Gardner Stadium in Opelousas against North Central.

That game will be followed by prime Superdome contender Port Barre playing Northwest.

The finale of that jamboree features former UL Lafayette assistant coach Cordell Bailey taking over at Opelousas High against Eunice High, which is determined to return to the top of 4-4A after having its five-year reign ended last fall.

Friday at Catholic High in New Iberia, Rick Hutson's New Iberia Yellow Jackets will display their new triple-option attack after three seasons of leading the area in pass

attempts.

New Iberia will be taking on top 7-3A contender Catholic High at 8:30 p.m.

That game will be preceded by Delcambre and Jeanerette at 5:30 p.m. and Loreauville against Westgate at 7 p.m.

At Erath High, Kaplan will be going in the opposite direction as New Iberia, unveiling its two passing approach against Gueydan at 6:30 p.m. Friday.

Host Erath then meets North Vermilion in Stephen Lotief's head coaching debut.

"We'll be more prepared defensively this week," Langlinais said. "We didn't have any film on Northside and went into that game blind."

Comeaux may know a little too much about Catholic, however, like the fact that the Bears will be seeking revenge after falling to the Spartans in Baton Rouge last year.

"They have a senior ball club with a flamboyant running back (Tasmin Knockum) who is one of the best in the state and a very good quarterback," Langlinais said. "To me, the quarterback is the key. You never know what he's going to do."

The bad news for Comeaux is that safety Brandon Davis will be out injured until week three.

St. Louis at Teurlings

LAFAYETTE — Losses have been few and far between at Teurlings Catholic since Sonny Charpentier took over the football program seven seasons ago.

So the Rebels weren't exactly all smiles after getting thumped 30-14 by St. Martinville in the jamboree last Friday.

Nevertheless, Charpentier knows a valuable learning tool when he sees it, and he hopes that begins paying off when Teurlings entertains the St. Louis Saints at 7 p.m. today at Clark Field.

"We got what we needed out of it," Charpentier said. "We gave up a lot of yards on the ground, but I don't think we're going to face a running back or a quarterback like that the rest of the season. It was a good experience for us. It showed us what we need to work on. I didn't come out discouraged at all."

The most positive sign from the loss was that the passing game is strong as expected behind Dusty Collette (12-22-2, 180 yds, 1 TD) and Dustin Smith (6-78, 1 TD).

"We knew what they were going to do and couldn't stop it," Charpentier said. "But they also knew what we were going to do

and couldn't stop it. That's encouraging for our passing game, but our inexperience showed on defense. We just have to get better."

What wasn't there, though, was the Rebels' running game, limited to 44 yards.

"We've put a lot more emphasis on the passing game," he said. "We just need to put more time into the running game."

St. Louis, meanwhile, lost to Washington-Marion 26-0.

"St. Louis is young this year," Charpentier said. "They're playing a lot of freshmen and sophomores. They're building for the future."

Lafayette High at Bro. Martin

METAIRIE — The Lafayette High Mighty Lions are hoping that a new head coach can change their luck against Brother Martin.

The Lions have lost the last three meetings against the Crusaders, despite jumping out to a 14-0 lead in last year's meeting.

The two teams meet again at 7:30 tonight at Tad Gormley.

"Some of the older guys haven't beaten them yet, and they really want to," LHS coach Mark Barousse said. "It's a big deal to them. From what I understand, Brother Martin is fairly young this year."

The Lions showed consistency on both sides of the ball in their 14-14 jamboree tie with Cecilia. Defensively, they allowed just 85 total yards, and got 158 yards rushing from Caleb Rubin.

A bad snap on a punt and a long punt return help set up both of Cecilia's scores.

"Our special teams are definitely something we need to work on," Barousse said. "We made some mistakes, but really a lot fewer than I was expecting for as young a team as we have."

Kennan Wilson is expected to start at quarterback.

"He's run the team the best," Barousse said.

Rebels roll to win, Lions fall on road

LAFAYETTE — It was a virtual two-man show on offense for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels in Friday's 35-3 victory over the St. Louis Saints.

Quarterback Dusty Collette completed six of nine passes for 95 yards and two touchdowns. He also had six carries for 18 yards and a score.

All six of those completions were to wide receiver Dustin Smith for the 95 yards and two touchdowns. He also had three carries for 32 yards and a touchdown.

Andy Camel did his part also, however, with nine carries for 75 yards and a touchdown.

Teurlings jumped out to a 14-0 lead after one period and then cruised to a 28-3 halftime edge. The biggest scoring play of the night came on a 29-yard connection between Collette and Smith.

The only down side to Friday's win for Teurlings was yielding 210 rushing yards to the Saints, led by Freddie Hanne with 107 yards on 20 carries.

Teurlings, ranked No. 6 in Class 3A, will now play 4A's No. 3-ranked Breau Bridge next Friday at Clark Field.

Tigers seek to continue success against Rebels

BREAUX BRIDGE -- The factors working in Breaux Bridge's favor heading into today's 7 p.m. neighborhood road showdown with Teurlings Catholic at Clark Field are almost too many to name.

For starters, the No. 3-ranked Tigers are coming off a dominating performance in limiting Acadiana to 86 total yards in a 33-8 win.

It also happens that Breaux Bridge is 5-0 against a top-notch Rebels' program since Sonny Charpentier took over.

The injury list appears to be working in the Tigers' favor also. Early reports of a serious injury to two-way standout Jonathan Zenon were false. He's even been upgraded to probable for tonight's game with the sprained knee.

Still, coach Mike Mowad is preaching caution. "That was just one game," Mowad said. "Acadiana's got some inexperience on the offensive line and we were just able to take advantage of it."

"I was worried about the kids being focused

LAFAYETTE -- Sometimes things happen in sports when you least expect them.

That's kind of what Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier is hoping for when his Class 3A No. 4-ranked Rebels entertain 4A's No. 3-ranked Breaux Bridge at 7 p.m. today at Clark Field.

No, he certainly hasn't lost any confidence in his program, which has made the playoffs in each of his seven seasons.

He just knows that he's 0-5 against Breaux Bridge and that this is the best Tigers' team he's prepared for yet.

"They've always had good athletes, but I've never seen so many good ones on the field at one time," Charpentier said. "This is definitely the best Breaux Bridge team we've seen. It's not that they're hard to prepare for."

because of all the preseason hype. But the seniors took control and it really paid off."

A week ago, the Rams were 0-of-11 passing with four interceptions. Mowad is expecting a much tougher assignment for his pass defense.

"We certainly can't afford a letdown this week, because can really throw the ball," he said. "That (Dustin) Smith kid is something special. He runs great disciplined routes and catches the ball with total con-

centration. And to make matters worse, they don't just line him up at one position.

"And you don't find many high school quarterbacks that can roll out and put the ball on the money like the (Dusty) Collette kid can."

In other words, Mowad isn't buying that this is an easy contest for his Tigers, despite the recent dominance over Teurlings.

"I wouldn't say that we dominated them at all," Mowad said. "All of them have been close games. It just so happened that we came out on top in all of them. It's been a real intense rivalry. It's a game the kids look forward to because of the proximity of the two schools."

and look what happened. They're scary."

Charpentier faces an interesting dilemma in this matchup. His Rebels pass the ball as good as any behind Dusty Collette (6-9-0, 95 yds, 2 TDs) and receiver Dustin Smith (6-9-5, 2 TDs), but the Tigers pressure the quarterback as good as any.

"Pressure on the quarterback is the best pass defense," Charpentier said. "Our offensive line has done a great job of protecting Dusty so far, but we haven't played Breaux Bridge

yet.

"We're not going to abandon the running game. Our best defense might be controlling the ball, whether it's running it or with a short passing game."

As good as Breaux Bridge's defense is, Charpentier's biggest concerns are on his unseasoned defense.

Although the first team didn't play four quarters, the Rebels allowed 262 total yards in last week's 35-3 win over St. Louis.

"We're still inconsistent there, but we knew it was going to take a little while on defense," he said. "There's just too much indecision and that comes with being inexperienced. We're going to get better. We just have to keep working at it."

LAFAYETTE — Teurlings Catholic's Rebels knew that they could win their annual bloodletting with rival Breaux Bridge Friday night, if the Tigers made enough mistakes.

Breaux Bridge made plenty of those, but the third-ranked Tigers also had a surprise up their sleeves in Donald Benoit.

The lightly-used tailback came off the bench to rush for 159 yards and two touchdowns, including a momentum-turning 55-yard scoring run late in the second quarter, and that effort helped BBHS survive in a 35-20 win.

"He's a guy that's been injured and hasn't played that much," said Tiger head coach Mike Mowad. "He stepped out there and did a good job. You never know when you're going to get an effort like that."

The Tigers (2-0) needed all of that effort in holding off an upset-minded Rebel squad that leaped out to a surprising 10-0 lead midway through the second period and then had the ball at the BBHS 30 on its next possession.

Darrell Alexander, though, picked off a Dusty Collette pass at the Tiger 15, and six plays later Benoit broke a sweep to the left side untouched for 55 yards to pull Breaux Bridge within 10-7.

On the second play after the kickoff, Collette was intercepted again, this time resulting in a 37-yard touchdown return from Reginald Boutte.

"You can't make mistakes against a good team like that," said TCHS head coach Sonny Charpentier. "We had some opportuni-

ties, but you've got to capitalize on them, and Breaux Bridge made the plays they had to make."

The Rebels (1-1) came back to take a 17-14 half-time lead on Collette's second TD pass to Jacob Delahoussaye, with one from 19 yards out 0:39 before intermission. However, Breaux Bridge scored on three of its first five possessions in the second half, the clincher on a 10-yard burst by Benoit with 4:17 left.

That tally came after a 10-minute delay when the field lights went out at Clark Field. It was fitting for a night loaded with mistakes, including 15 Tiger penalties for 135 yards and

a total of five BBHS turnovers including three lost fumbles.

"I don't know if I can count high enough to count the mistakes we made," Mowad said, "but they didn't break us. This is never an easy game when these two teams play Teurlings is so scrappy. I know our kids love playing this game every year."

The Tigers weren't loving things through most of the first half, especially after Rebel kicker Clint Hebert toed through a 51-yard field goal late in the opening quarter and TCHS' Dustin Smith picked off his second Darren Noel pass on the first

play of the second period.

That theft set up a 20-yard drive that Collette capped with a nine-yard toss to Delahoussaye to make it 10-0.

After that, though, the Rebels struggled to sustain drives, with Hebert's 44-yard field goal late in the third period their only scoring after halftime.

Noel had a TD pass called back on the sixth play of the second half, but he eventually linked with Jesse Daniels on a 17-yard score that gave Breaux Bridge the lead for good. Noel also connected with Trey LeBlanc on a 53-yard toss over the middle for a 28-20 edge.

Rebels, Bulldogs square off again

IOTA — A year ago, it was Teurlings Catholic's superior passing game against Iota's superior rushing attack.

The result was a thrilling 35-28 win in overtime for the Rebels.

Now first-year head coach Neal Lege' is hoping his running game can still be as effective without Mr. Football Jason Miller when his Class 2A No. 8-ranked Bulldogs (2-0) entertain 3A's No. 7-ranked Rebels (1-1) at 7 p.m. today.

"I still don't know if we're experienced enough up front to move the ball with any consistency," Lege' said. "We have all new faces on both lines this

year. Our tailback (Dores Ledet) is getting better. He just didn't get a lot of time last year behind Jason. He needs to see his holes better.

"If we have too many three-and-outs, we're going to be in trouble. Teurlings likes to light it up on offense. You have to bring your 'A' game or you could get embarrassed."

The Rebels are coming off a 35-20 loss to Breaux Bridge, and are putting a lot of emphasis on this game.

"I was proud of the kids' effort against Breaux Bridge," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "I'm not sure if we ran out of gas, or if it was just Breaux Bridge. The big thing is that we had some ques*ion

marks going into the game, and now we know the kids can do it.

"We've been able to avoid losing streaks, so we really need this one. Last year, it was a big game for us. I felt like it was the impetus to get something going."

The Rebels' passing game already appears in high gear behind quarterback Dusty Collette (20-48-3, 358 yards, 4 TDs) and receiver Dustin Smith (12-172, 2 TDs). More threats — like Jacob Delahoussaye — were added to the arsenal last week as six different Rebels caught passes.

The running game, however, produced just one yard.

"Delahoussaye stepped up and we needed him to do that," Charpentier said. "We knew we

couldn't go to Smitty all the time. I'd like seeing a few more people to catch balls.

"We didn't make a big push to run the ball last week. I still feel like we can run it. Maybe that will happen this week."

Iota, meanwhile, is coming off a rare early-season scare in beating Church Point 17-14 on a last-second field goal.

"Church Point outplayed us," Lege' said. "I just didn't feel like we played with a lot of enthusiasm. We're still making changes. We're giving kids a chance to play. If they don't get the job done, we'll try some other people.

"We're just not as aggressive as we need to be on the defensive front right now."

Hayes ignites Teurlings' running game in victory

IOTA — Apparently, B. J. Hayes had it all along.

Teurlings Catholic's Rebels had been searching for their running game, and Hayes found it in a big way Friday night.

Making his first appearance in the backfield this season, Hayes rushed for 80 yards and scored the Rebels' first two touchdowns. He also keyed a ball-control attack that was the biggest factor in Teurlings' 21-0 victory over Iota.

"We felt like we could move the ball in the running game," said Rebel head coach Sonny Charpentier. "We'd had a full-back starter (Tyler Hebert) go down with a knee injury, and B.J. stepped right in."

Actually, the Rebel offense stepped right in, marching for touchdowns on three straight possessions in the first half, and then mounting a drive that didn't produce points but did take up more than 10 minutes in the final quarter.

Meanwhile, the host Bulldogs only managed a team total of 79 yards on their 42 offensive plays.

"We knew if we didn't generate anything offensively that we'd have trouble," said Iota

head coach Neil Lege. "We were pretty poor on offense, but Teurlings swarms to the ball so well. And they made the third-down plays that kept drives going."

The Rebels (2-1) converted first downs seven times in third and fourth-down situations, and also came up with big special-teams plays with three punts either partially blocked or disrupted. Ty Meche had two of those blocked punts.

"They've got an outstanding club," Lege said of the state's seventh-ranked 3A team. "They just swarm you. Our defense stayed on the field way too long."

The Bulldogs (2-1) were also hurt by the absence of area leading rusher Dorus Ledet. Ledet, who had 303 yards in Iota's first two wins, ran only the Dogs' first play from scrimmage before re-aggravating an ankle injury from last Friday's win over Church Point.

The Rebels had no such problems, going for 170 yards on the ground after totaling 132 in the season's first two games. That attack also helped quarterback Dusty Collette, who hit on 13 of 18 passes for 163 yards.

"A quarterback's best friend is when you get your running

game going," said Charpentier. "That was good to see. We made a lot of good decisions."

TCHS drove 76 yards on 15 plays on their second possession, with Hayes going the final five yards for a 7-0 lead with 1:07 left in the first quarter. Then, after Iota drove to the Rebel 37, Colin Duhon got a hand on Lorne Doucet's punt and the Rebels only had to go 47 yards to take a 14-0 lead.

Hayes ran up the back of his own blockers on a 12-yard burst up the middle for his second score.

Doucet was again bedeviled in punt formation, with Meche deflecting a punt and putting the Rebels in business at the Bulldog 48.

Collette had two key completions in that drive, including a 20-yarder to Andy Camel on fourth down, before Michael Pearce went the final 11 yards for the 21-0 lead.

Iota reached the Rebel 22 late in the first half, and then had a nearly eight-minute drive in the third and fourth periods before running out of downs at the TCHS 10 with 10:47 left in the game.

The Rebels then held the ball for all but the final 31 seconds, getting five first downs before giving the ball up at the Iota 18.

Rebels take on Pios

CROWLEY — It's been seven years since Teurlings Catholic has been the road team in a homecoming game.

It's doubtful that Notre Dame has ever had a homecoming celebration like the one scheduled to take place Saturday afternoon.

The game has been pushed back to 3 p.m. Saturday at Gardiner Memorial Stadium. The idea of postponing homecoming until later in the season was considered, but not employed.

The parade will just be cancelled this season and the football game played, if weather permits.

"This has definitely been one crazy season so far," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said. "With all the injuries we've had, plus all of these hurricane threats, it's been weird. I think we've held more indoor practices this year than all my years of coaching combined."

Despite the unusual circumstances of this year's contest, Cook expects another

naillbiter against the Rebels.

"I don't think it's going to be any different this year," Cook said. "It was 28-27 three years ago, 17-10 two years ago and 20-14 last year. Teurlings is really good on offense. They do a lot of things that you have to prepare for, and everything going on this week definitely makes that tougher."

Notre Dame's offense is a balanced one, led by quarterback Patrick Hensgens (28-53-0, 357 yds, 2 TDs). The leading rusher is shift Michael Istre (43-330, 3 TDs), while Nicholas Leonards (10-163, 2 TDs) leads a deep receiving corps.

"They don't have that one guy they depend on heavily like they did last year with Jeff (Cook)," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They have a lot of different weapons this year. That little running back has a lot of speed and quickness. Size-wise, it's not a typical Notre Dame team, but they still come off the ball extremely well."

"Their quarterback is very efficient. He's very under control. This is definitely going to be the best passing game

we've faced so far this year. It's something our secondary is going to have to deal with."

The Rebels' offense, on the other hand, is more weighted to the passing game thus far this season. Quarterback Dusty Collette (33-66-4, 423 yds, 4 TDs) is expected to return after missing last Friday's 37-7 win at Berwick with a nagging back injury.

Dustin Smith (21-284, 3 TDs) is the leading receiver, and Andy Camel (32-180, 3 TDs) the top rusher.

"Win or lose, this is a game that we really want to play," Charpentier said. "The reason why you play and practice is to go against teams like Notre Dame."

Offensively, Teurlings is averaging 263 yards a game, while giving up 242. Notre Dame is averaging 274 yards a game on offense, while giving up 208 on defense.

"Obviously, our best defense is going to be keeping the ball," Cook said. "We need to be strong in the kicking game and at least try to make first downs. Defensively, we need to make them travel a distance to score."

Admitting that his Rebels will again be at a physical disadvantage, the next big chore is for the TCHS offensive line to keep the Wildcats' pass rush off quarterback Dusty Collette (47-88-5, 661 yds, 6 TDs).

Collette is coming off a 238-yard passing effort, led by wide receiver Dustin Smith (29-420, 4 TDs) collecting 136 yards on eight receptions.

He's not Collette's only target, however, with Jacob Delahoussaye (7-136, 2 TDs), tailback Andy Camel (8-84) and David Schexnayder (4-60) also

playing key roles.

The rushing game is led by Camel (38-241, 3 TDs) and Michael Pearce (37-168, 4 TDs).

"We've kept it a lot simpler for those guys this year, but I feel good about where they are," Charpentier said. "The play of the line really hasn't changed up from last year. They've done a good job."

"We're just going to have to be very aware of No. 3 (Jason O'Brien). He's a linebacker that does a great job of disguising his blitzes."

While the Rebels sport one of the area's top passing games, Indest's Wildcats may have the area's top rushing attack.

It's led by Tulane commitment Ray Boudreaux (102-642, 15 TDs), but the speed of Brandon Gilliam (31-340, 3 TDs) and the power of Derick Gaspard (57-238, 1 TD) provide balance.

Quarterback Chris Campbell (29-52-3, 381 yds, 4 TDs; 30-123, 1 TD rushing) also adds to the running game as a scrambler.

"I know a lot of people think that Teurlings isn't as good on defense this year," Indest said. "Their linebackers were bigger and more physical last year, but

these guys fly to the ball. They do a good job of mixing up their fronts."

"They have more of a big-play defense this year, and I honestly would prefer to play against last year's defense."

With Abbeville losing a game to a 5-0 Baker club and Teurlings not being able to play 4-1 Notre Dame, this matchup becomes even more important.

"There's no doubt," Indest said. "Losing the Baker game made this game even more important. The big advantage that Teurlings has on us right now is that they've played Breaux Bridge. With losing Baker, we really haven't faced a top-caliber team yet."

Of course, this game was huge to the AHS players and fans long before anybody started trying to figure out power points.

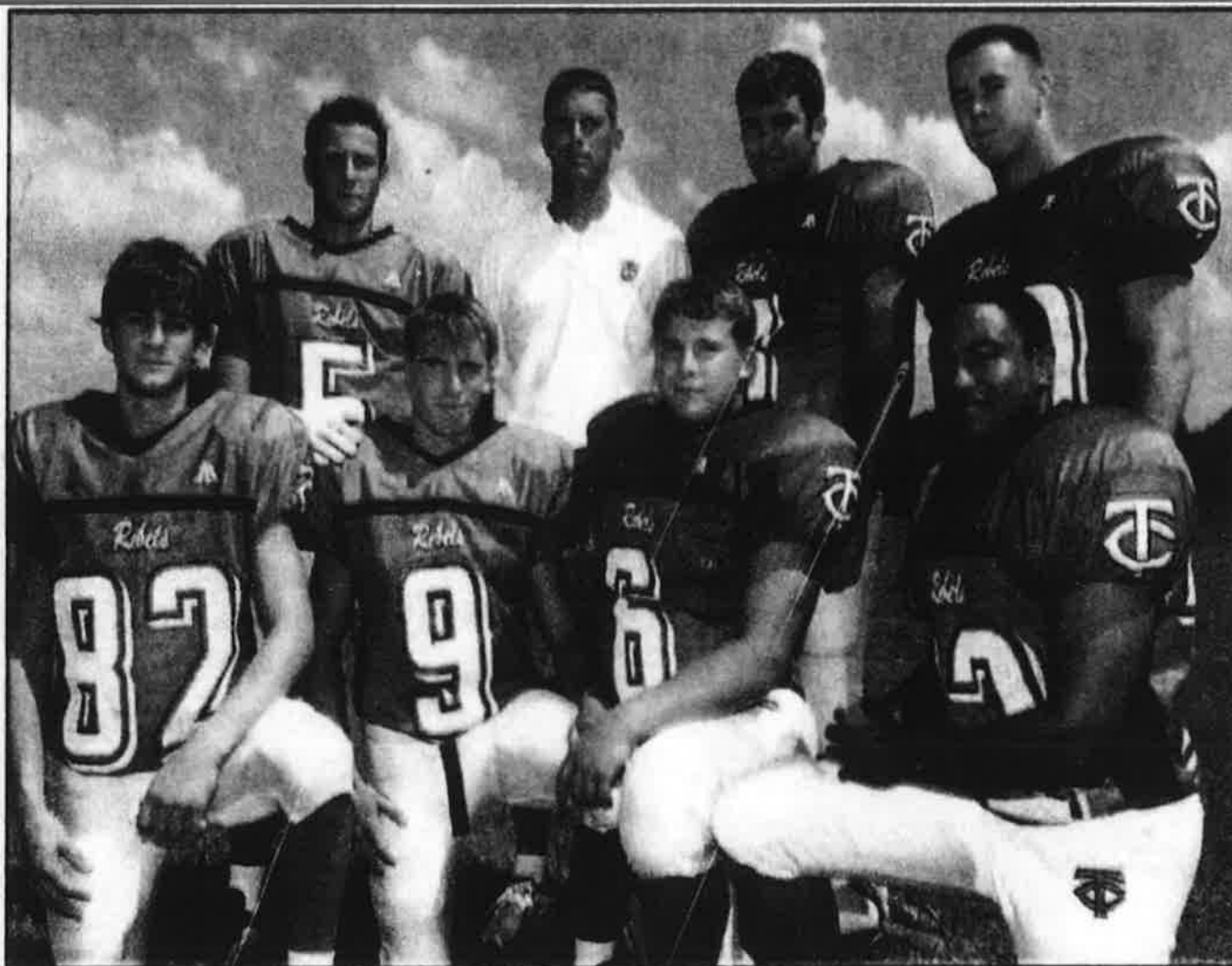

Rebels rip Wildcats

**Teurlings logs
crucial win over
Abbeville.**

ABBEVILLE — Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said that Dusty Collette was on target here Friday night.

Yeah, and a Rolls Royce is a nice car, and the Mona Lisa is a cute little painting.

Collette bedeviled Abbeville's area-leading defense to the tune of 365 passing yards and four touchdowns, guiding the Rebels to a 42-21 victory in the battle of District 6-3A favorites.

"It's nice when it works out like you planned," said Charpentier. "I thought we'd be able to throw it some. We worked really hard on it, and everybody just did their jobs."

The Rebels (5-1, 1-0) were a model of efficiency, scoring on six of their first seven possessions and missing a field goal try on the seventh. They also broke loose from a 21-all tie late in the second quarter with three touchdown drives in the next 12 minutes that totaled only nine plays.

"They got it going and they got it going quick," said Abbeville head coach

Brent Indest of the Rebel explosion. "That just takes all your momentum. It's tough to fight back after that."

It wasn't as if the host Wildcats (5-1, 1-1), ranked second in the state 3A ranks, didn't do good things. Abbeville totaled 386 yards offensively, got 162 rushing yards from tailback Ray Boudreaux and never turned the ball over until the final minute of play, but the 'Cats couldn't keep pace with a

Rebel offense that consistently clicked through three quarters.

"We played good offensive football," Charpentier said, "and we had to. They (Abbeville) brought their 'A' game tonight too. The difference was our defense stepped up in the second half."

The difference was also a period of three minutes late in the first half. The Wildcats had just rallied back from a two-touchdown deficit on back-to-

back Brandon Gilliam touchdowns that tied the game at 21 with 3:28 left before halftime.

The Rebels, though, drove 66 yards in four plays with Collette hitting Andy Camel with a nine-yard flare in the end zone, and after forcing a three-and-out TCHS went 76 yards in only two plays with Collette again finding Camel wide open over the middle for a back-breaking 33-yard touchdown.

"That was huge," said Indest. "We had fought back to tie it, and they just went bam-bam. They just had a great offensive game plan."

Collette hit Dustin Smith with touchdown throws of five and 15 yards for his other two tallies, and finished the night 18-of-26 as part of Teurlings' 410 passing yards and 497 yards of total offense. Smith caught nine passes for 174 yards and Camel finished with six catches for 124 yards, while running back Michael Pearce had a 103-yard ground night.

Despite all those numbers, Abbeville was very much in the game in the third quarter when the Wildcats drove from their own 10 to the Rebel 15 with the second-half kickoff. That drive took almost eight minutes, but came to a halt when AHS jumped offside on third-and-two and quarterback Chris Campbell was then sacked twice.

"Our defensive staff got together and made some changes at halftime," Charpentier said, "but it came down to us just playing more aggressive. That's what I'm most proud of."

After that stand, Collette hit Smith with a 39-yard toss on the first play and one play later threw him a 15-yard fade route to provide the final tally.

ERATH — Erath's Bobcats had weathered the early storm that was Teurlings Catholic's offense, and was within 13-7 early in the third quarter of their District 6-3A showdown Friday night.

That's when one play turned things around, and gave the visiting Rebels no worse than a share of the district title.

"That just killed us," said Erath coach Jacob Byler. "We were right there, but that took any momentum we had away from us."

That play also propelled Teurlings (7-1, 3-0) to 16 unanswered points in the third quarter, and that proved to be too much for the host Bobcats to overcome.

The Rebels did it with a balanced attack, with three players rushing for 60 or more yards including quarterback Dusty Collette, who rushed for a 27-yard score in the game's first three minutes and then went to the air in a 16-of-25 passing performance for 208 yards.

He also had a six-yard scoring toss to David Schexnayder with 1:14 left in the third quarter that provided a 29-7 margin.

"We try to spread it around," said Rebel head coach Sonny Charpentier, "and Dusty's a big part of that. Erath played hard, especially in the first half, but in the second half we were able to do some things that we needed to do."

Erath (5-3, 2-1) spotted the Rebels the early lead on Collette's deft option fake that resulted in a 27-yard untouched ramble to the end zone, and three plays later Duriel Watson stormed in to block Vice's punt and set up a 24-yard Clint Hebert field goal.

Hebert had two more field goals, hitting from 38 yards on the final play of the half and a 28-yarder midway through the third quarter. The Rebels threatened more, but Collette fumbled at the Erath 23 midway through the second period.

The Bobcats promptly drove 77 yards and Matt Faulk's second effort provided a score from one yard out to make it 10-7 before Hebert's second field goal.

"We were really concerned at halftime," said Charpentier, "but our guys came out with a lot of emotion in the second half."

Pearce's 5-yard ramble came before Hebert's third field goal which made it 22-7, and after a short punt the Rebels went 44 yards in only four plays before Collette hit a wide-open Schexnayder in the flat.

Erath came back to go 68 yards and Fourroux hit J.J. Davenport with a two-yard pass to cut the margin to 29-13, but a 65-yard Rebel drive set up Watson's clinching 11-yard scoring run with 6:53 left.

The Rebels ended up rushing for 270 yards on only 35 carries, with Andy Camel getting 89 yards and Pearce 64 in the balanced attack.

"We're so small up front," Byler said, "we struggle when we play big people. Their size kind of wore us down, but Teurlings has quickness and speed to go with that size."

LAFAYETTE — For the third time in the last four weeks, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels' offensive machine has done it again.

Quarterback Dusty Collette was a two-time award winner, and running back Andy Camel was a runner-up after his all-around effort in the win over Kaplan.

This week, it's wide receiver Dustin Smith's turn.

Smith caught 10 passes for 147 yards in leading the Rebels to a 36-13 victory over the Erath Bobcats to earn this week's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Offensive Player of the Week honor.

Rebels rip Pelicans

Teurlings Catholic rides big first half to easy Class 3A first-round playoff win.

LAFAYETTE — All Teurlings Catholic wanted to do was control the tempo and put the ball on Dusty Collette's right arm.

Both happened in a big way here Friday night, and because of that the Rebels are on their way to a rematch with District 6-3A rival Abbeville in the second round.

Collette threw for three first-half touchdowns, and the Rebels kept the ball away from Port Allen's explosive offense on the way to a 27-6 3A bi-district playoff victory at Clark Field.

"The idea at this time of year is just to win and keep playing," said Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier. "We're still playing next week."

Much of that should be credited to Collette, who hit on 14-of-25 passes for 230 yards in the first half alone before the Rebels put the offense on cruise control after intermission. He also had touchdown throws of 30, 43 and 11 yards to three different receivers.

"They do a great job with their offensive execution," said Port Allen head coach Paul Distefano. "The first half, we turned the ball over too much, and they just controlled the ball and the clock in the second half."

The win by the second-ranked but ninth-seeded Rebels (9-1) puts them into a road contest at Abbeville in the regional round. Teurlings took a 42-21 win over the Wildcats, who beat Winnboro in a Friday first-round game, during the regular season on the way to the 6-3A title.

Teurlings scored on four of its six possessions in the first half, running out of downs at the Pelican 16 on one and missing a field goal on the other. In addition, the four scoring drives totaled only 19 plays.

"We moved the ball well in the first half," Charpentier said. "But scoring right before half was really a key. That let us relax and play a lot of guys in the second half, and rest some guys who were dinged up."

That late score followed the Rebels getting possession on a punt at their own 47 with 1:47 showing. Collette drove TCHS 53 yards on seven plays, linking up with Dustin Smith on a 24-yarder on third-and-11 before finding a diving Smith on the right side of the end zone with an 11-yard scoring

toss 16 seconds before halftime.

That made it 24-0, and Clint Hebert's 38-yard field goal on the Rebels' first possession of the second half gave Teurlings all it would need.

Port Allen drove 82 yards after that field goal on its only sustained drive of the night, with quarterback Brandon Bass scoring on a sneak with 3:25 left in the third period for the game's final score.

Collette linked up with tight end David Schexnayder on a 30-yard scoring pass late in the first quarter, with Schexnayder breaking a tackle on a quick-hitter, and the Rebels then forced a pair of turnovers that helped expand the lead to 17-0.

Smith's interception of a Bass pass set

up Hebert's 43-yard field goal with five seconds left in the first, and Kyledren Antoine's fumble was recovered by Jacob Delahoussaye at the Pelican 30 one play after the kickoff on the last play of the period.

On second down, Collette swung a pass to Camel, who raced down the left sideline and split two defenders at the goal line on a 30-yard score.

"Those turnovers were huge," Charpentier said. "We were only up 10-0 and got that fumble that led to a big score. Our defense did a good job ... they were doing a lot of subtle things that we had to adjust to, but we did a good job of bending and not breaking."

Teurlings Catholic gets wild win over Abbeville

ABBEVILLE — What's 1 1/2 yards after you've already rushed for 340?

For Abbeville coach Brent Indest and his Wildcats, it was the difference between total elation and bitter disappointment.

Teurlings Catholic line-backer Ty Stuart's tackle of Abbeville's Ray Boudreaux on a two-point attempt with 12 seconds left allowed the No. 9-seeded Rebels to survive a thrilling 31-30 decision over the No. 8-seeded Wildcats Friday in a Class 3A state regional contest.

"I thought they would run the fullback," Stuart said. "I came on a blitz. I was going to hit whoever came my way. I saw Ray coming. I hit him before he got to the goal line. I knew he didn't score."

The Wildcats actually lined up for the game-tying extra point, but elected to go for the win instead after the Rebels jumped offside.

"That's something we had planned all along," said Indest, who was ejected after two unsportsmanlike flags. "If we were in that situation, we were going to try to draw them off-sides and then go for two."

"To be honest, I feel like we have just as good a chance of getting 1 1/2 yards as we do kicking an extra point."

"We knew they would have the middle packed. The numbers were there. The TV guy told me he (Boudreaux) got in, but I'm not going to say anything until I see the replay."

Teurlings coach Sonny

Charpentier admitted Indest for his decision.

"I've done it before," he said. "All you need to win is 1 1/2 yards. I have all the respect in the world for doing that."

"It was a great game. They did some things a little different. They rushed three and dropped eight a lot. We thought they might do that. We should have been able to run it better."

That bit of late-game drama came just one play after the Wildcats (9-2) faced a fourth-and-goal from the 1 down 31-24 with 16 seconds left to play. Fullback Derik Gaspard did the honors with the 1-yard scoring plunge to draw within 31-30.

"This was too close," TCHS quarterback Dusty Collette said. "I hate these kind of games. It's exciting, but it drives me crazy."

Collette certainly did his best to provide a great cushion at 19-of-30 passing for 258 yards and four touchdowns.

With the game tied at 21-all at the half, Collette hit three straight passes on the Rebels' first drive of the second half, including a 25-yard scoring strike to Jacob Delhoussaye for a 28-21 lead midway through the third period.

Abbeville would answer with a 15-play, 80-yard drive in 8:45, but an offside flag on the Wildcats forced them to settle for a 30-yard John Piragone and a 28-24 deficit with 10:48 left.

Teurlings answered with a Clint Hebert 32-yarder for a 31-24 lead to set up the finish.

"They started blitzing in the second half," Collette said. "They tried to surround me, so it would be hard for me

to find a receiver and I'd have to scramble."

As exciting as the game's ending was, the first half was pretty eventful in its own right. As expected, Abbeville put on a clinic in running the ball, while Teurlings did so throwing it.

Collette was 7-of-9 passing on the first drive, finishing with a diving Smith grab for a 14-yard touchdown midway through the first. Hebert missed the extra point, though, for a 6-0 lead.

The rest of the first half was a seesaw battle. Abbeville scored on its first three of four drives. The 13-play, 74-yarder in 6:30 ended with a Chris Campbell 3-yard leap.

Gaspard stole the show on the next one, ending the eight-play, 80-yarder in 3:28 with a 2-yard TD plunge for a 14-12 lead with 6:23 left until intermission.

The final one was a Campbell 1-yard score to finish up a nine-play, 80-yard drive in 3:06 for a 21-18 lead with 1:46 left.

Teurlings, meanwhile, took advantage of two Abbeville fumbled punts to keep pace. Collette hit Delhoussaye on a 19-yard score after the first one, and then connected with Smith on a 24-yard score to give the Rebels the 16-14 lead at the time.

Hebert made up for his missed extra point on the final play of the first half with a 47-yard field goal to knot it at 21-21.

The field goal came after a Wildcat fake punt attempt fell incomplete with 15 seconds left in the half.

"The bottom line was the turnovers," Indest said.

And one play that will be discussed for a long, long time.

Delahoussaye provides solutions for Rebels

LAFAYETTE — When the Teurlings Catholic Rebels were eliminated 42-35 in heartbreaking fashion by Belle Chasse in the state quarterfinals last season, it seemed like the program's best chance to reach the Superdome Classic was gone.

Nobody thought the Rebels would be poor this season, but many questions had to be answered to become another prime Superdome contender in Class 3A.

One of the biggest answers was found in senior Jacob Delahoussaye.

Not only did Delahoussaye fill the vacant free safety spot, but he also replaced Dane Charpentier on the back end of the 1-2 wide receiver punch in the Rebels' vaunted passing attack.

And suddenly Delahoussaye and the Rebels find themselves right back in the Class 3A state quarterfinals when they host

Patterson at 7 p.m. Friday at Clark Field.

"It was so disappointing when we lost last year," Delahoussaye said. "We really thought we had a great chance of going to the Dome. We gave it our all. It just didn't happen."

"At first, we all kind of thought that there was no way we could be as good as we were last year, because we did lose so many good players. But this is an amazing senior class and we've really pulled together as a team."

Delahoussaye's most apparent contribution to allowing Teurlings to maintain its recent success is as a receiver. He's caught 19 passes for 272 yards and five touchdowns as the complement to leading receiver Dustin Smith.

"Dane left some big shoes to fill," Delahoussaye said. "He was a great athlete. I practice hard all summer. The route running was probably the hardest part for me. I'm a pretty clumsy

guy, he is always falling down."

"It was kind of tough at first to run the routes as precise as I needed to. I know it's frustrating for a quarterback to see a receiver not running his routes good."

Glaring evidence of exactly how much progress Delahoussaye's made as a receiver came in last Friday's 31-30 regional win at Abbeville when he caught four passes for 64 yards and two touchdowns.

Both touchdowns were a result of him breaking off pass routes to get open for scrambling quarterback Dusty Collette.

"I could see Dusty scrambling, so I just tried to see where he was looking and found an open spot," Delahoussaye said.

"I knew where the defensive back was, so I just tried to get away from him."

"That was a great game. It was a lot of fun going back and forth. Abbeville did a great job. It was like playing yard football."

But while Delahoussaye's most noticed for his part in the Rebels' prolific offense, his play as a safety may actually be a bigger factor in Teurlings standing 10-1.

Like on offense, fulfilling his defensive responsibilities didn't come without adjustment.

As a part-time player last year, Delahoussaye primarily played strong safety in nickel and dime coverage situations.

"At free safety, you're a little more in charge of the team, making most of the calls in the secondary," he said. "There's just a lot more involvement. The big thing about free safety is that you can't just fly up. If you miss a tackle, there's nobody behind

you. There's some pressure there."

Defensive assistant Mike Doherty, who coached such standout safeties as Orlando Thomas and Thomas King as secondary coach at UL Lafayette, certainly understands the dilemma all free safeties face.

"Believe me, Orlando and Thomas made mistakes too," Doherty said. "You want to be aggressive. You're asked to play the run, but you can't get caught being too aggressive. You've got to read every thing, and Jacob's done a good job with that."

So far, the 6-4, 175-pound Delahoussaye has collected 60 tackles, four stops for a loss, a fumble recovery and an interception.

"He's really made a lot of defensive progress in a year's time," Doherty said. "He's a smart kid. He's got good size and strength. He comes from an athletic family (sister Lauren plays softball at LSU). I really wish he

had another year, because I think colleges would be talking to him after one more year of improving."

While he's glad he's got him on defense, Doherty also knows how important Delahoussaye's contribution has been on the other side.

"He's done an excellent job as a receiver," he said. "You've got to remember that he's playing both ways and Dane didn't. He's come a long way there. He's probably improved more as a receiver than he has as a defensive back. That was really important, so people can't jump all over Smitty (Dustin Smith)."

One more big game and the Rebels would actually surpass last year's level, meeting the Notre Dame-Archie winner next Friday in the semifinals.

"Patterson's very athletic," Delahoussaye said. "We've got to keep flying to the ball, we can't arm tackle and we've got to make plays."

They have the best cover corner (C.L. Grogan) that we've seen this year."

Charpentier's No. 1 concern in this matchup, though, is picking up Patterson's blitz packages.

"I don't normally work on Sundays," he said, "but I was there Sunday night by myself trying to get a feel for their blitzes and I couldn't do it. It's hard to predict where they're going to be coming from. We're normally able to tell our linemen where to expect pressure, but they come from everywhere at any time."

In addition to his offensive line, the Rebels' defense will be under seige by another explosive offense, led by tailback Kendrick Smith.

"He can pound you and he can run away from you," Charpentier said. "He's 190 pounds, which is big for a high school back. He's more physical and a better athlete than (Abbeville's) Ray Boudreaux. We've definitely got our hands full."

Of course, the Rebels always have their passing game to fall back on if all else fails.

It's led by quarterback Dusty Collette (132-235-5, 1965 yds, 22 TDs; 57-235, 3 TDs rushing). His top targets are Dustin Smith (65-1009, 11 TDs), Jacob Delahoussaye (19-336, 4 TDs) and Andy Camel (34-491, 4 TDs; 61-515, 5 TDs rushing). The leading rusher is Michael Pearce (102-550, 6 TDs).

Collette has thrown for over 200 yards in five of the last seven games, including a season-high 365 yards and four touchdowns in the regular-season meeting over Abbeville.

One of two Abbeville games Charpentier wants to forget about for now.

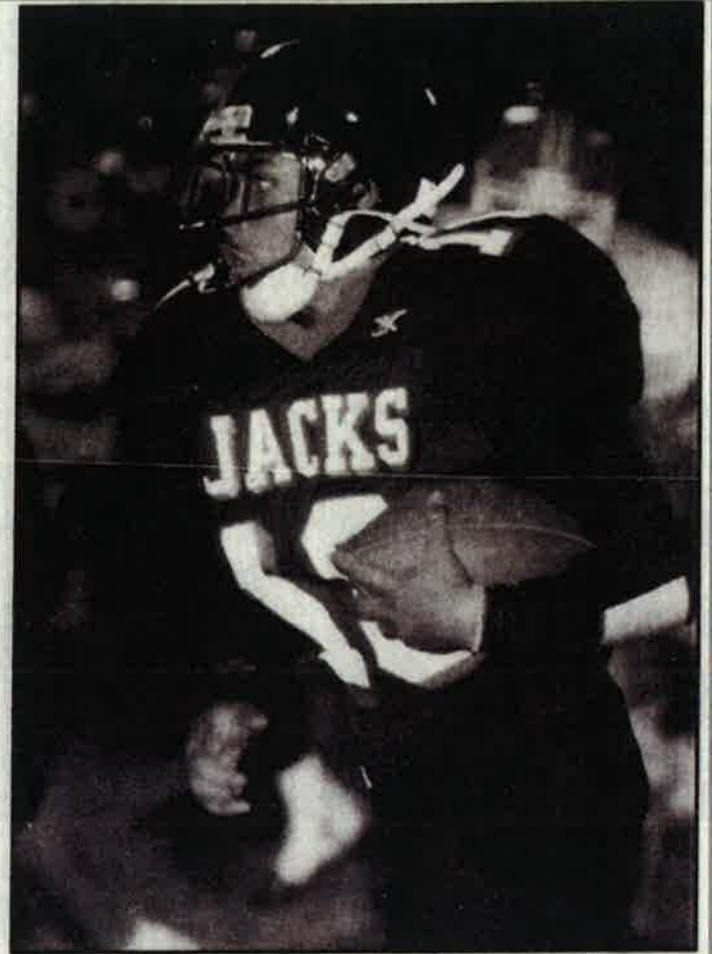

Collette, Vaughns, Minton take top All-State honors.

NEW ORLEANS — State champion Redemptorist and runner-up Patterson finished as the top football teams in Class 3A.

The two teams also helped set the pace for the Louisiana Sports Writers Association's Class 3A All-State squad.

Each team placed three players on the honor squad. Patterson coach Tommy Minton was voted Coach of the Year. Patterson's Tremaine Vaughns was voted Defensive Most Valuable Player.

Teurlings Catholic quarterback Dusty Collette edged out Redemptorist running back Jay Lucas in the vote for Offensive Most Valuable Player honors.

Minton led Patterson to its first title-game berth since 1979 and an 11-3 record in a season filled with personal hardship. Minton's wife, Sheila, died of cancer during the season.

Teurlings' Collette is a senior who completed 145 of 260 passes for 2,266 yards and 27 touchdowns while leading his team to the quarterfinals. Vaughns of Patterson, a junior, finished with 39 tackles, eight interceptions and a fumble recovery.

Lucas of Redemptorist is another junior who posted some impressive offensive numbers. He finished with 1,982 yards and 30 touchdowns after rushing for a 3A record 267 yards and four TDs in the Wolves' 31-19 title-game win over Patterson. Lucas rushed for more than 1,000 yards in five playoff games.

Joining Lucas on the 3A squad are teammates Matt Valentine and Kyle Hebert. Valentine, a senior offensive guard, was a top blocker for the Redemptorist offense that tallied over 5,000 yards. Hebert is best known as the Wolves' senior quarterback. However, Hebert made the 3A squad as a punter after averaging 37.7 yards per punt.

Joining Vaughns on the 3A squad are Patterson teammates Kendrick Smith and C.L. Grogan. Smith rushed for 1,172 yards and 28 TDs. Grogan is a defensive back who had more than 60 tackles for

LAFAYETTE — The one constant of the 2002 high school football season in the Acadiana area was Dusty Collette to Dustin Smith.

Teurlings Catholic's throw-and-catch duo took the passing game to new heights this fall, putting the Rebels among the first to be penciled in on this year's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola All-Parish football team.

The biggest honors went to Collette and the man who trained him, Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier.

Collette completed 145 of 260 passes for 2,266 yards with 27 touchdowns and only eight interceptions this past season. He even threw for 301 yards in the quarterfinal loss to Patterson, and had a season high of 365 yards passing in a win over Abbeville.

Those numbers and the consistency with which Collette compiled them were enough to earn him the All-Parish Offensive Most Valuable Player award.

Charpentier helped the Rebels overcome preseason question marks to again win the District 6-3A title, before losing a heartbreaking 51-41 quarterfinal thriller to Patterson.

The 10-2 mark, though, was good enough to earn Charpentier All-Parish Coach of the Year honors.

The other given during this fall was the top-notch play of Carencro junior linebacker Garren Jim.

The 6-0, 200-pounder dominated with 101 solo tackles, 35 stops behind the line, 12 sacks and seven caused fumbles to earn All-Parish Defensive Most Valuable Player honors.

Smith, meanwhile, led the remainder of the offense with 77 receptions for 1,192 yards and 15 touchdowns. He too shone in the Rebels' last game with 10 catches for 183 yards and a score.

The rest of the receiving corps included Northside's Mike Hobson (40-929, 8 TDs) and Teurlings tight end David Schexnayder (20-277, 3 TDs).

Joining Collette in the back-

field are last year's All-Parish MVP Alley Broussard of Acadiana, along with St. Thomas More's Andre Broussard (166-973, 14 TDs) and Comeaux's Tyler Benoit (145-927, 14 TDs).

Broussard overcame a nagging ankle injury to flourish down the stretch again, finishing with 1,910 yards and 27 touchdowns on 290 carries.

Carencro's Quinten Lawrence brings versatile play to the squad with 957 yards rushing and 12 touchdowns, as well as 14 receptions for 234 yards and three scores.

The offensive line consists of Acadiana's Donovan Arce-neaux, St. Thomas More's Geoff Bernard, Carencro's Ed Miller, Teurlings Catholic's Jake Gary and Comeaux's Matt Taghe-hchian. Jim is joined on the linebacking corps by Acadi-

ana's Ed Sonnier, St. Thomas More's Mark Risher and Lafayette High's Alton Boudreaux.

Sonnier had 78 tackles and an interception in the regular season. Risher had 123 total tackles (six behind the line), six sacks, eight hurries, an interception, two fumble recoveries, two pass break-ups and an interception. Boudreaux collected 122 total tackles and an interception.

The defensive line is led by St. Thomas More's Ray Martin, who was the runner-up for MVP honors. Martin had 87 tackles (nine behind the line, 17 sacks, 10 hurries, two blocked punts (one for a TD) and four caused fumbles.

He's joined by Lafayette High's Stephen Hearen (52 tack-

les, 2 sacks), Carencro's DeMar-cus Carmouche (38 tackles) and St. Thomas More's Nick Colomb (64 tackles, 7 sacks).

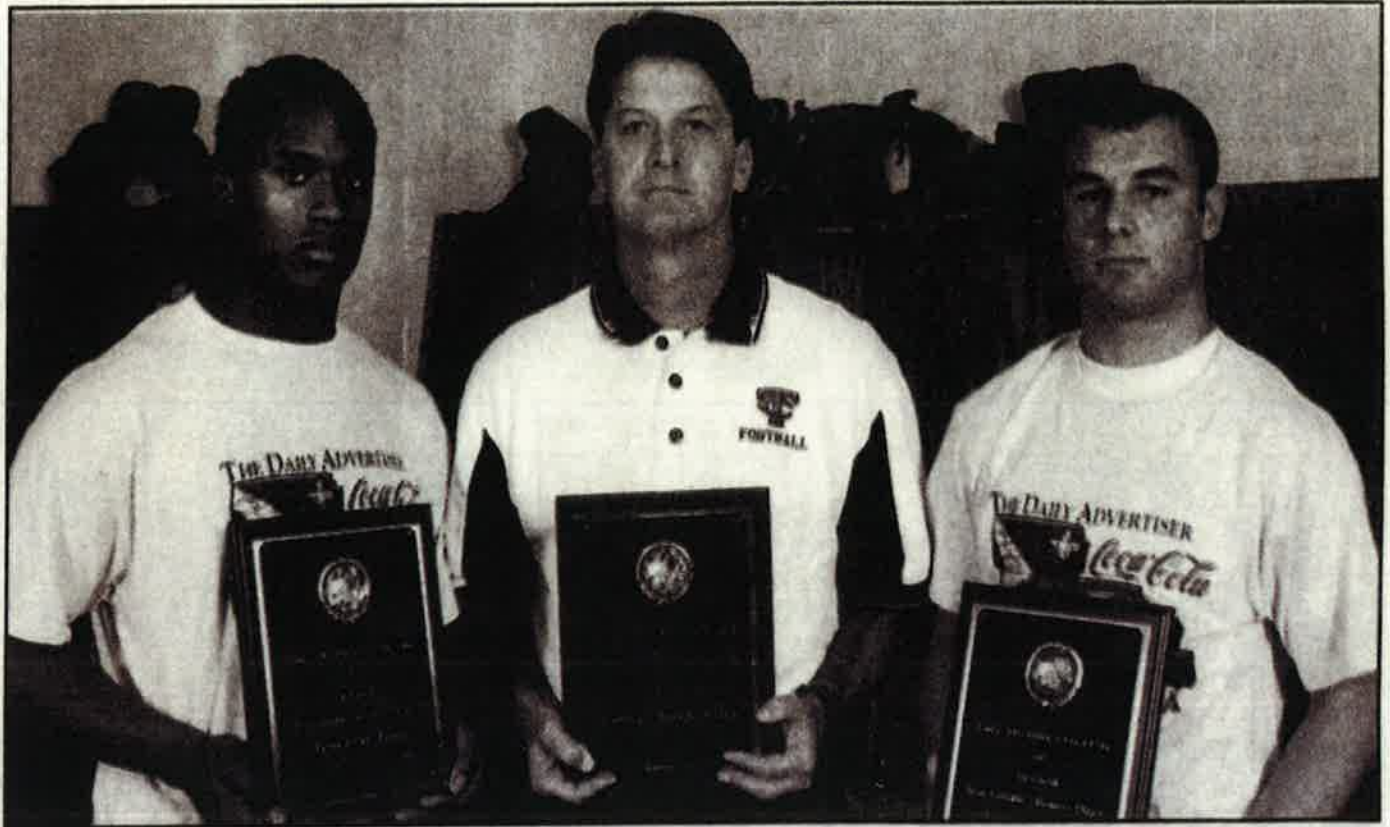

Breaux Bridge's Williams, Teurlings Catholic's Collette earn MVP awards.

LAFAYETTE — If ever a movie was going to be made about a team's season in the Acadiana area it would need to be focused on the 2002 edition of the Patterson Lumberjacks.

It was a season filled with tragedy, amazing comeback victories and ultimately the triumph of the human spirit.

So it's a fitting end to the story that coach Tommy Minton is this year's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Big School All-Acadiana Coach of the Year.

Minton led the Lumberjacks to the school's first state final appearance in 23 years while battling the personal war of his wife dying of cancer at midseason.

The signature victory of Patterson's season was a 51-41 comeback win at Teurlings Catholic in which the Lumberjacks scored 27 points in the final six minutes to overcome a 41-24 deficit.

One of the stars of game in the losing cause was Teurlings Catholic quarterback Dusty Collette.

Collette is the Big School All-Acadiana Offensive Most Valuable Player after throwing for 2,266 yards and 27 touchdowns with just eight interceptions on 145-of-260 passing.

Ironically, Collette's only other loss this season was to Breaux Bridge and linebacker Tim Williams.

Williams wrapped up his stellar career in the fine fashion this season by being named as the Big School All-Acadiana Defensive Most Valuable Player. The 5-11, 25-pounder collected 143 total tackles, seven stops behind the line, 10 sacks, 11 hurries, three caused fumbles and three interceptions.

Collette is joined in the backfield by Acadiana's Alley Broussard, St. Martinville's Martelle Narcisse and Patterson's Kendrick Smith.

Broussard had another All-State campaign with 1,910 yards

and 27 touchdowns on 290 tries to carry the Wreckin' Rams to a second to straight state semifinal appearance.

Narcisse led his Tigers to a second semifinal appearance in three years after rushing for 1,895 yards and 30 touchdowns on 195 carries.

He also had 11 receptions for 307 yards and three more scores. Smith finished with 222 total points.

The athlete selection on the squad is St. Martinville quarterback Early Doucet. The junior rushed for 1,166 yards and 20 touchdowns, threw for 480 yards and five scores and returned three kicks for touchdowns.

The receiving corps includes Teurlings Catholic's Dustin Smith (77-1192, 15 TDs), Northside's Mike Hobson (40-629, '8 TDs) and tight end David Schexnayder (20-277, 3 TDs).

The offensive line consists of Acadiana's Donovan Arceneaux, St. Thomas More's Geoff Berniard, Notre Dame's Jason

Williams is joined at line-backer by Carencro's Garren Jim, Abbeville's Jason O'Brien and St. Thomas More's Mark Risher.

Jim collected 144 total tackles (35 behind the line), 12 sacks, two interceptions and seven caused fumbles. O'Brien had 115 total tackles (20 behind the line), six sacks, 10 hurries, an interception and four caused fumbles.

The defensive line is made up of St. Thomas More's Ray Martin, Notre Dame's Brantley Yeager, Breau Bridge's Charles Alexander and Eunice's Jeremy Faulkner.
