

Hayes squared

Cousins fit well into Teurlings Catholic's family atmosphere.

LAFAYETTE — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels return only four starters on defense from last year's 10-2 state quarterfinalist squad.

Fortunately, two of those players are cousins who've been playing together a long time.

When senior linebacker B.J. Hayes looks to his side, he sees fellow senior Ty Stuart ready to attack the offense with him.

"We're first cousins," Hayes said. "We grew up playing together in Carencro."

The family-type feel is one reason why TCHS is 76-23 under coach Sonny Charpentier, and one factor in postseason hopes again in 2003.

"The school is so small, so you know everybody," Hayes said. "We're close together as a team. We're friends, we're disciplined and we work hard."

"Also, Coach Sonny is real smart. He comes up with some awesome plays on offense. And on defense, the guys are smart."

Hayes and Stuart will be joined by returning starters Jake Toups at end and Duriel Watson at cornerback, with the other spots to be filled by relatively new faces.

"We'll have a lot of new defensive linemen," Hayes said. "But we have guys who have played before. We have a few different coverages that we'll have to get down, because we like to blitz a lot. I'm pretty sure we've got the speed on defense."

Before opening the season at Notre Dame, the Rebels will need to acclimate those new faces to the scheme.

"We have to get the plays down, and the new people will have to learn the coverages," Hayes said. "The young guys will have to step up and be more aggressive."

The chief aim for Hayes is to halt the opposition's ground game, although he has been known to take a turn or two at fullback on offense.

"My strong point in stopping

the run, inside and out," said Hayes, who also likes the view with the ball. "I play fullback a lot, on third-and-one mostly. Last year I ran the ball a lot against Iota. It was raining and we couldn't pass the ball."

"I like playing offense, but they like me at linebacker."

Either way, Hayes' experience and leadership will come in handy on a rebuilding squad.

"We want to win another district title," said Hayes, who was part of a 4-0 run in District 6-3A in 2002. "And, we definitely want to beat Catholic High (New Iberia). I heard they've been talking a little, like they're already the district champion."

quarterback Charpentier. "I had two others, but they didn't play quarterback. One did, but we moved him.

"The hardest thing there is,

the mother has a difficult time with it. I'll be tougher on him than the other quarterbacks. As a father, you want to see him do well. He's my last one. Hopefully, we'll have a good year."

Senior linebackers B.J. Hayes (5-9, 210) and Ty Stuart (6-0, 190), end Jake Toups (6-5, 210, Sr) and cornerback Duriel Watson (5-9, 165, Sr) are the returners on defense. Dueitt (free safety), Meche (corner-

back) and linebacker Aubrey go both ways, while end Jared Conques (5-11, 185, Jr), tackle Benji Hebert (6-0, 220, Soph) and linebacker Colin Duhon (5-8, 170, Sr) will step up.

"The last two or three years we've lost a lot of people, but the kids won district the last two years," Charpentier said. "I think our seniors want to go out with three straight."



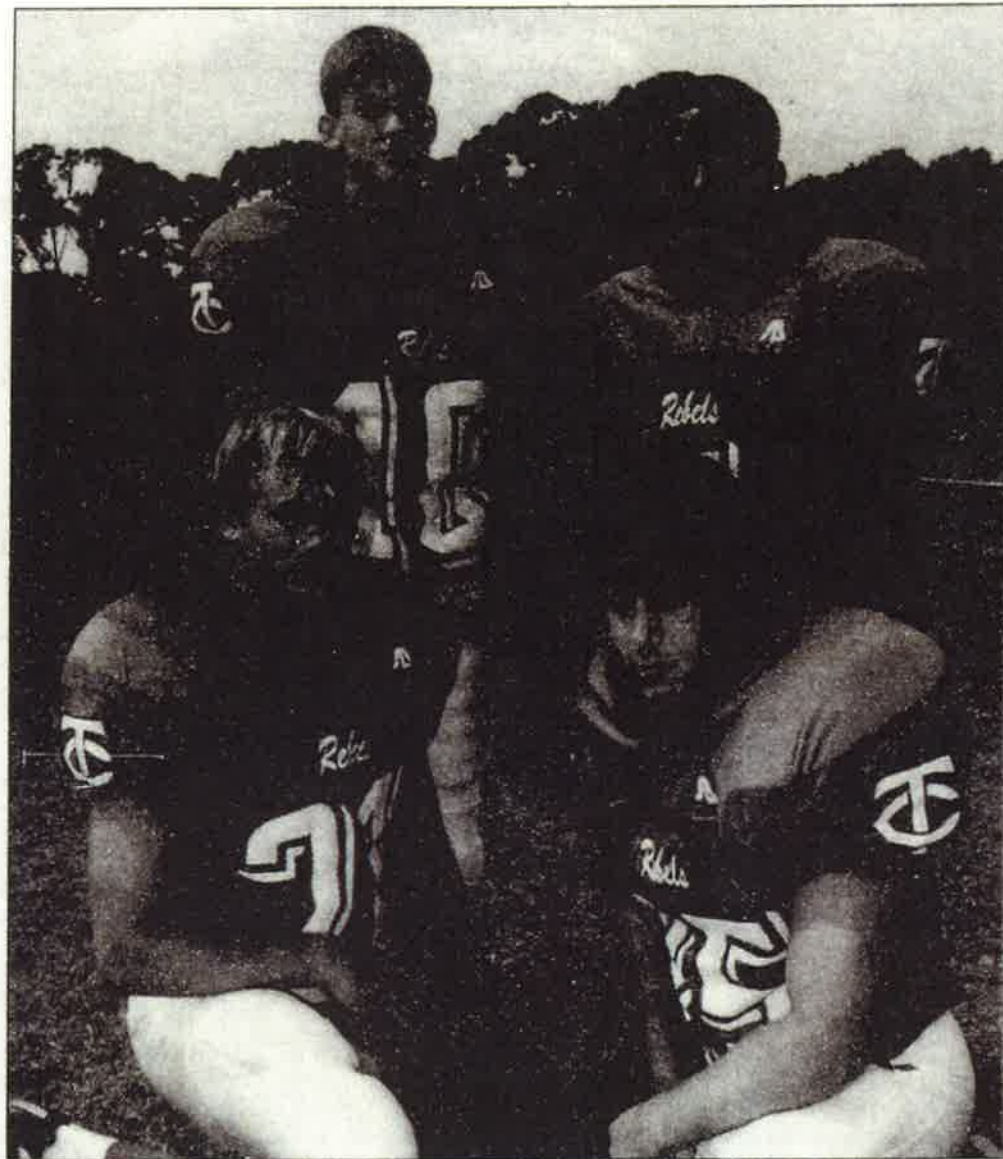

LAFAYETTE — Senior quarterback Roch Charpentier is a reflection of the Teurlings Catholic Rebels he'll lead into the 2003 season.

Like many of his teammates, Charpentier is new as a starter but familiar with the system that has made TCHS a perennial playoff team under his father, coach Sonny Charpentier.

Teurlings won a second straight District 6-3A title last year behind

quarterback Dusty Collette and reached the state quarterfinals before losing to Patterson.

Now, with an ever-changing cast of characters, the Rebels aim for postseason again.

"We've had the system for eight or nine years, so the kids are familiar with it," coach Charpentier said. "We'll have a new wrinkle here or there, but we'll mainly be looking to get the kids in the right place."

"Our biggest thing will be staying away from injuries. We have more players going both ways than we did at first. It's not the numbers — eight years ago we had 28 kids in the spring and this year we had 70, but we still have just 17 or 18 who can play."

"We're mainly working on finding depth. I'm focused on the guys closest to the ball, those in the two lines. If we don't find that, we're not going to win too many games. We have three new defensive ends, and we may do the 'down' technique (tackle) by committee."

Tackle Matt Robicheaux (6-3, 260, Sr) and center Gary LeBlanc (6-2, 255, Sr) return in the offensive line, braced by new starters Zack Brazda (5-10, 210, Sr) and Joe Carle (5-10, 180, Jr) at guard and tackle Kevin Suir (6-1, 210, Sr).

"We have some players who aren't young, but haven't played, who will have to step up," Charpentier said. "We've got some good skill people who've waited their turn."

One of those is tailback Austin Zaunbrecher (5-10, 170, Sr). Another is splitback Ty

Meche, stepping in for All-State member Dustin Smith.

"Ty can be as good as we've had, and that's saying a lot," Charpentier said. "He's improved tremendously, physically and otherwise. He's along the same line of Dustin."

"We'll try for some mismatches with (6-foot-4 tight end) Luke Aubrey, and we've got two split ends over 6-1 (Jer Dueitt is 6-foot-1). And our two tailbacks can catch the ball well, too."

The younger Charpentier, a 6-foot-1, 150-pounder, is the beneficiary of that weaponry.

"He's finally started to grow, and has gotten stronger," Charpentier said. "He started one game last year at Berwick and hit 8-of-10. He can run the show. He doesn't have the skill Dusty had, but if somebody had to follow Dusty, Roch is the right guy. He makes good decisions and has the right temperament for it."

"We'll still do the same things, use quickness and deception. That's where our strength lies."

Mentoring his third of three sons makes the campaign more meaningful.

"It is very special to coach your own son," said ex-Hanson

If Friday was any indication of what to expect in Week 4 when the Teurlings Rebels and Cecilia Bulldogs meet for real, then get your tickets now.

The Rebels and Bulldogs provided the overflow crowd at Carencro High with an electric finish as Cecilia's Shawn Alexander fumbled on the Rebels' goalline with 57 seconds left in the game as the Rebels held on for a thrilling 13-7 win.

The Bulldogs' chance at the victory was set up when Alexander returned a punt 33 yards and then had an additional 15 yards tacked on because of an unsportsmanlike conduct on the Rebels.

On first down, Lorenzo Williams took an end around 18 yards down to the Teurlings 4. Alexander got down to the 1-yard line on the next play, but on the Bulldogs' third play from scrimmage, Alexander was hit at the goalline and coughed up the football. Teurlings' B.J. Hayes dove on the loose ball to preserve the win for the Rebels.

The Rebels struck for paydirt on their second possession of the first half as Collin Duhon scored from two yards out. Duhon did most of the work on the 5-play, 53-yard drive as he ran three times for 42 yards.

The Rebels added another score right before the half after a big special teams play. Jared Conques came up the middle to block a Kyle Angelle punt. The ball was recovered at the 8-yard line to set up the short field for Teurlings.

Three plays later, the Rebels led 13-0 as Charpentier lofted a touchdown pass to Luke Aubrey from 16 yards out. The extra point attempt failed. Cecilia cut the lead to 13-7 on their first possession of the second half.

The Bulldogs drove 79 yards in 14 plays, capped off with Alexander's 10-yard touchdown run.

The drive actually stalled nine plays into the drive, but the Rebels were called for roughing the kicker to keep the drive alive.

Alexander led the Bulldogs with 85 yards on 20 carries. Roch Charpentier finished with 72 yards passing on a 7-of-14 slate with two TDs.

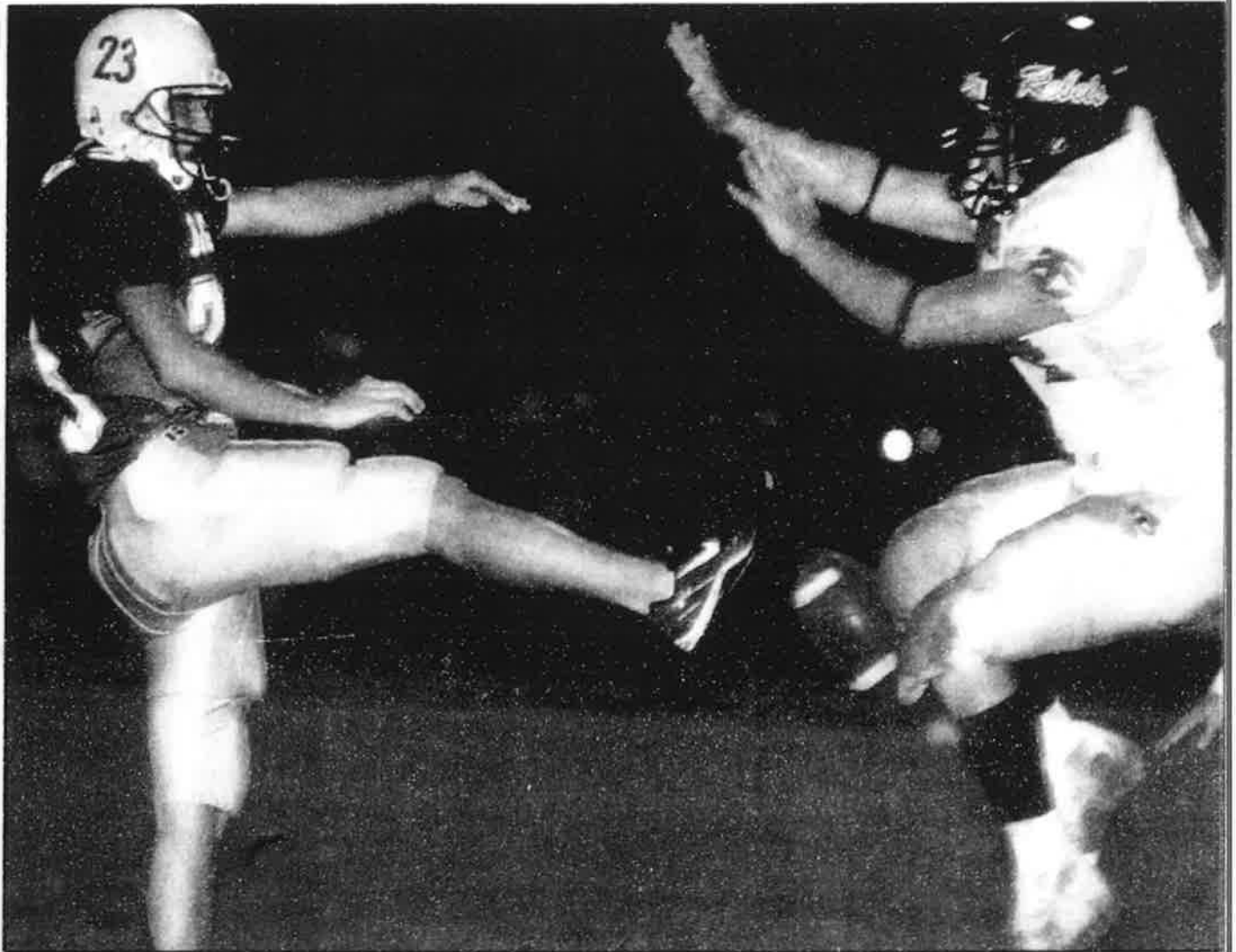

Rebels tackle Pios

CROWLEY — Fans of the Teurlings Catholic-Notre Dame rivalry won't have to wait very long this year.

After years of playing near the midway point of the season, the Rebels and Pios are moving things up to week one of the high school football season.

And if past years are any indication, area fans will be in for quite a treat to kick off the 2003 season when the two teams meet at 7 p.m. tonight at Gardner Memorial Stadium in Crowley.

"We didn't get to play last year because of Hurricane (Lili)," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said. "Three years prior to that, it's been really good football games."

"In 1999 and 2000, it was for the district championship. We beat them 28-27 in '99 and then beat them 17-7 in 2000. They came back and beat us 20-14 in 2001. It's been some really good games between us."

"Because of the interest in the game, it was one that we wanted to keep on the schedule."

But keeping it on the schedule proved to be tough for both coaches. They agreed that they wanted to continue playing each other and they agreed that they didn't want to play each other the week

before district.

"Because of the second agreement, the only possible date the two teams could meet would be in week one."

"Personally, I would have preferred to play them later in the year," Teurlings' coach Sonny Charpentier said. "But as the saying goes, one in the hand is better than two in the bush."

"We wanted them on the schedule, and we had to make a sacrifice. I'm not disappointed. We have them, and then Breaux Bridge in week two. We are going to find out pretty much where we are right away."

Cook favors the early game against the Rebels for

much of the same reasons. He says between the atmosphere and the competition, it's almost like exposing his players to playoff football in week one.

"It does give you the chance to learn a lot about your team," Cook said. "I think as often as you can put them in that situation, it helps you down the line."

"There's been a number of 100 teams that don't get past the second round. I think sometimes you need tough games like we'll have

Thursday night. You have to use it as a preparation for the last half of your regular season (district) and if things go well, another season (the playoffs) to follow that."

Both teams spent the early part of this week going over mistakes from the jamborees, but it didn't take long to turn their attention to their opponent.

"Ideally, you'd like to spend the first week correcting mistakes, but at the

same time we have to start preparing for Notre Dame," Charpentier said.

"They're always a very well-coached team. They are not going to make mistakes. They are always solid defensively and very fundamental on offense."

Cook nearly echoed Charpentier's words, saying preparing for Teurlings is always tough.

"They do a very good job of making you prepare for their looks," Cook said. "I was impressed with them in the jamboree. It's typical Teurlings. They are throwing the ball real well. They are aggressive on defense, they come after you play after play."

While it's still typical Teurlings, the cast has changed a little. Gone are All-State quarterback Dusty Collette and All-State wide receiver Dustin Smith. But as evident by the Rebels' 13-7 win over Cecilia in the jamboree, they've moved on without those two.

"In the past two years, it's been Collette and Smith, but I think now they have a little more depth," Cook said. "(Roch) Charpentier is very poised in the pocket from what I saw on tape. And he has a few different

targets he can go to.

"Smith was a hard one to prepare for, but I think they have a bigger advantage now because they have a few more weapons."

The Pioneers are coming off a 6-0 jamboree loss to Opelousas Catholic, a game in which the Pios dominated in the yardstick, but wound up losing on the scoreboard.

"It's really hard to get an idea about their team by watching the jamboree because they played two 10-minute halves," Charpentier said. "But I was impressed with what I saw.

"They moved the ball up and down the field, they were just plagued by turnovers. Those are the kind of things that get corrected between the jamboree and week one.'

Pioneers overpower TC Rebels

CROWLEY — On occasion, the show doesn't quite live up to the advanced billing.

Thursday night was one of those occasions.

The third-ranked Notre Dame Pioneers rolled up over 200 yards rushing in the first half alone and shut down the Teurlings Catholic offensive attack in rolling to a surprisingly easy 40-13 win here at Gardiner Memorial Stadium.

"We were hoping we could run the football," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said. "We knew that we would have to run it to be successful with a new quarterback out there. I thought the kids did really well with the running game. Our backs ran well and our offensive line really opened some holes and stayed on their blocks."

The Pios finished with 381 yards rushing in the contest while limiting the Rebel attack to only 151 yards total offense.

"They are just a better team than us right now," Teurlings coach Sonny Charp-

entier said. "They beat us at the point of attack, they beat us on the line of scrimmage. They just physically whipped us tonight."

The Pios (1-0) jumped out to a 6-0 lead early in the first period as they took their first possession and marched 46 yards to paydirt. All 46 yards were covered on the ground with Derrick McBride (19-120, TD) taking it in from two yards out to cap off the drive. The extra point attempt was blocked to keep it 6-0.

The score remained that way until late in the first period when Teurlings took their only lead in the contest. Durriel Watson read a screen pass perfect and stepped in front of Paige Hodges' pass and raced 33 yards for the interception return.

The extra point attempt by Kyle Boudreaux was good to give Teurlings new life with a 7-6 lead.

But the lead was short-lived as the Pios scored five plays later to take a 12-7 lead on Michael Istre's 41-yard TD run. Istre added the two pointer to put the Pios up 14-7.

A few plays later, the Pios got another big break when Rebel quarterback Roch

Charpentier fumbled after a 10-yard run.

The Pios responded by driving the 46 yards in six plays to take a 20-7 lead in the contest. Rick Zaunbrecher (20-185, TD) scored from eight yards out.

A few minutes later, the Pioneers extended the lead to 26-7 on a somewhat controversial fumble return. The play occurred when Charpentier threw a bullet to Ty Meche on a curl route. Meche was hit as the ball arrived and lost the ball.

J.T. Casanova alertly picked up the loose ball, which was ruled a fumble, and ran 21 yards for the touchdown.

The Pioneers put the game away in the third period when Hodges called his own number on a 1-yard touchdown dive. Trey Meche capped off the Notre Dame scoring with a 19-yard interception return.

"The turning point was when we came back after their interception return and scored to take the lead again," Cook said. "You never know how kids will react to adverse situations until they are encountered with it. They handled it well, we went right back out there and drove down the field and retook the lead."

about this week's practice. Notre Dame definitely opened our eyes."

The Rebels are led by quarterback Roch Charpentier. The senior completed 13-of-23 passes for 96 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Teurlings was held to just 151 yards total offense.

"It was worse than we thought," Charpentier said. "We didn't fight like we normal-

ly do, that was from the get go. This group needs to understand you don't just show up. Just because you've won in the past doesn't mean you will win again."

Breaux Bridge was led in the season opener by Jaret Aguilard, who finished with 90 yards on 13 carries with a touchdown. Quarterback Matt Broussard threw for 84 yards and a touchdown. Michael Batiste had 78 of those yards on five catches.

"They are still athletic," Charpentier said. "When you say Breaux Bridge, speed always come to my mind. Their defensive line is very big and athletic and they have some athletes on offense. I think you are going to see two teams in the same boat. It should be interesting."

Students take time to reflect

LAFAYETTE — The words "I Can Only Imagine" drifted through the air Thursday as seniors at Teurlings Catholic High School walked into the gym in twos.

Young men on the left carried small flags representing the states and countries of those killed in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. The young women in the procession walked on the left with lit candles.

Each duo bowed in unison, one group after another, as the flags were placed in a stand in front of a makeshift altar draped with candles.

The candles shone brightly in the gym filled with Teurlings High teachers and students, along with local police officers, firefighters, and service men and women.

Students in schools throughout Lafayette Parish remembered, reminisced and recalled the events of Sept. 11, 2001, in special cere-

monies and gatherings on Thursday.

At Teurlings, the Mass was planned by seniors, staff and campus ministry director Ramey Seré. Students commemorated the tragedy in song, dance and words.

Each of the readings at the Mass reflected Bienvenu's call to love and forgive.

Some students said they are still dealing with the emotional aftermath of the attacks in New York and Washington, D.C. In Seré's class after the Mass, several students discussed their feelings.

Breaux Bridge continues success over Teurlings

BREAUX BRIDGE — Not even leg cramps could shut down Breaux Bridge's Jarrett Auguillard.

The junior tailback amassed 130 yards rushing on 21 carries while overcoming the effects of dehydration to help the Tigers roll past the Teurlings Rebels 28-14 here on Friday night.

The Tigers (1-1) scored 28 unanswered points to put the contest out of reach in a game that featured 39 pass plays despite sporadic rain showers and a soggy field.

"We have a lot of young kids on our

squad so a victory is a victory," said Tigers coach Mike Mowad. "We still have a ways to go in terms of correcting mental mistakes, but I feel this game took us in the right direction."

Neither squad managed any points in the first period with the two defenses taking advantage of the field conditions and big plays to keep the contest tied.

The second quarter was a completely different story as Teurlings (0-2) jumped on the board first with 6:23 to go before the half. The Rebels capitalized on a pair of fourth down conversions to march down the field with fullback Michael Pearson pounding his way across the goalline from a

yard out. Kyle Boudreaux knocked in the extra point for the 7-0 edge.

Breaux Bridge answered on its next possession thanks largely to an acrobatic 41-yard catch by wide receiver Michael Batiste on a crucial third down near midfield.

The impressive play fired up a dormant Tigers offense to break into the scoring column with fullback Darrel Alexander diving in from the two five plays later. Jase Gerard tacked on the point after to tie the contest at 7-all.

The ensuing kickoff saw Teurlings cough up the ball, allowing Breaux Bridge to recover at the Rebel 25. One play later, quarterback Matt Broussard hit Batiste on a fly pattern for the score. Gerard's extra point gave the

Tigers their first lead at 14-7 with 4:29 left in the second period.

After Teurlings was forced into a three-and-out on its next drive, Breaux Bridge closed out first half scoring on another pass play.

Broussard again found Batiste (5 catches, 136 yards, 2 TDs), this time on a curl route, and the receiver did the rest, breaking five tackles on his way into the end zone. Gerard's point after made it 21-7.

"My line did a real good job blocking tonight," Auguillard said. "We were planning on running the ball a lot coming in because of the weather. However, we still threw the ball with a lot of success and that opened up the

ground game for us."

Breaux Bridge put the game out of reach early in the fourth period going almost exclusively to Auguillard on the ground in putting together an impressive 14 play, nine-minute march that saw Broussard (7 for 16, 152 yards, 3 TDs) find Heath Angelle on a 6-yard pass for the score.

Teurlings closed out the point tally with 4:24 left when quarterback Roch Charpentier (9 for 25, 113 yards, 1 TD, 1 INT) found Luke Aubrey for a 15-yard scoring pitch-and-catch.

Breaux Bridge will host Cecilia on next Friday evening, while Teurlings will welcome the Iota Bulldogs in their home opener.

Iota seeks improvement despite record

LAFAYETTE — The Iota Bulldogs football team is off to a hot start at 2-0, so one might think that head coach Neal Lege would be happy.

Not necessarily.

While Lege is happy that his team is 2-0, he is not happy about the way they accomplished getting to 2-0.

"We are definitely not where we want to be," said Lege, who is in his second season as the Bulldogs' head coach. "It's hard to gripe when you are 2-0, but I really felt that we would be further ahead than we are at this point."

The Bulldogs have victories over Jennings and Church Point, but in either game according to Lege, the Bulldogs never really played their style of football.

"We are a running football team," Lege said. "We have to be able to run the football if we are going to be successful."

The Bulldogs' running game is propelled by Dores Ledet, who in two games has rushed for 194 yards and two touchdowns on 43 carries, while Garret Lege burst onto the scene last week against Church Point with 97 yards and one touchdown on 14 carries.

"Dores has yet to get on track so far this season," Lege said. "But he can't open up holes for himself, that's the offensive lines' job."

And so far it has taken the offensive line a little longer than expected to come together, but they will get a lift with the return of junior left guard Brodie Bellard, who has been out with a knee injury since the spring scrimmage.

Iota's Phillip Bourque (74), Heath LeDoux (66), Bren Caswell (54), Brodie Bellon (53) and Kyle Hebert (50) hope to open some holes for the Bulldogs' rushing attack.

"It's going to be great having Brodie back," Lege said. "He's very smart and extremely aggressive and at the end of last season, he beat out a senior for the starting spot. So he is going to help us out a lot."

The Bulldogs will try again to establish a running game when they travel to face the Teurlings Catholic Rebels on Friday at 7 p.m.

The Rebels are off to a slow start at 0-2, but Lege considers them to be a very dangerous team.

"Teurlings is a very good D-2 team," Lege said. "They lost to two real good teams in Notre Dame and Breaux Bridge, so

they don't have anything to be ashamed of. We are going to have to play well."

Lege acknowledges that the Rebels have an high-powered offensive attack that is led by quarterback Roch Charpentier and receiver Ty Meche.

"The Charpentier kid is a good quarterback," Lege said. "Although he is not as mobile as the (Dusty) Collette kid, he is very effective. Plus, he has receivers that run super routes."

Charpentier has completed 22-of-47 passes for 205 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions, while Meche has caught 13 passes for 128 yards.

Teurlings notches first win

LAFAYETTE — For the first two weeks of the season, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels defensive unit was anything but spectacular.

In losses to Notre Dame and Breaux Bridge, the Rebels defense gave up an average of 345 yards a game giving head coach Sonny Charpentier many worries about this week's matchup with the second ranked Iota Bulldogs of Class 2A.

The Rebels defense righted their ship en route to a 24-7 victory over the slightly favored Bulldogs.

"Our defense did an outstanding job of keeping us in the game," Charpentier said. "Other than the first drive we did a good job of stopping them."

TCHS forced two fumbles and a bobbled snap on a punt, while holding the Bulldogs to only 125 yards of total offense.

The Rebels began the game with a passing attack led by quarterback Roch Charpentier, who completed his first six passes of the game driving the Rebels 79 yards down the field to the Bulldog 1-yard line. Three consecutive run plays failed, which resulted in a 24 yard field goal by Kyle Boudreaux at 3:38 of the first.

Charpentier finished the game 14-of-27 passing for 161 yards and one interception.

Iota responded with a drive of their own, going 64 yards. Garret Andrepont started the drive with a 29 yard run. After a 19 yard run by Wade Zaunbrecher to the Rebel 5-yard line, Dore Ledet capped off the drive on the next play to give the Bulldogs their only lead of the game at 7-3.

After an exchange of possessions, Iota punter Kurt Regan bobbled the snap on a punt and was brought down at the 15 yard line, giving Teurlings excellent field position.

Teurlings failed to convert the error into a touchdown though, as they struggled for a second time inside of the ten yard line. Boudreaux would convert his second field goal of the game, this one from 35 yards at the 6:57 mark of the second.

"We needed touchdowns early in the game but could only come away with field goals," Charpentier said, "We couldn't make any plays inside of the 20 yard line."

The Rebel defense would again pressure the Bulldogs into a turnover as quarterback Nick Francios and Ledet had a bad exchange, which Teurlings' linebacker Jared Conques recovered in Iota territory.

Charpentier would waste no time with the ball as he hit receiver Ty Meche (7-79) for two passes before taking it into the endzone on his own on a five-yard run. Charpentier would then find Meche on an out pattern for the two point conversion to make the score 14-7 in favor of the Rebels at halftime.

Iota would continue to struggle offensively in the second half as Teurlings would add another Kyle Boudreaux field goal and a 14-yard B.J. Hayes run to end the scoring at 24-7.

Teurlings Catholic hangs on to slip past Cecilia

LAFAYETTE — It wasn't raining and it wasn't muddy but Friday's non-district matchup between the Cecilia Bulldogs and the Teurlings Catholic Rebels was sloppy.

Despite the sloppiness by the Rebels, the Bulldogs had chance after chance to take control of the football game, but didn't do so as they allowed the Rebels to walk away with a 17-13 victory.

"There is no doubt this is a frustrating loss," said Bulldog coach Trace Sutton. "We were handed gifts tonight and we didn't do anything with them. But everyone in the

stands knows that Teurlings is the better football team."

No gift was bigger than the one the Bulldogs received in the fourth quarter, when the Rebels lined up to punt the football, but the snap went over Kyle Boudreaux's head and he fell on the loose ball at his own 17-yard line.

"That's football," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Plays like that happen all the time and it just so happens that it happened to us tonight."

But the Bulldogs didn't benefit much from the play. Two plays later quarterback Mory Vitte tried to throw the ball away to avoid a sack, but it went right into hands of senior Adam Peterson to end the threat.

After forcing the Rebels to punt, the Bulldogs began their quest at one last comeback attempt.

The Bulldogs moved the football 67 yards on nine plays all the way down to the Rebel 10-yard line. That drive included a 32-yard pass to receiver Ernie Pickens from Vitte and runs of 15 yards by receiver Lorenzo Williams and 14 yards by running back Shawn Alexander. Pickens had four receptions for 61 yards.

But the game basically came down to one play, a fourth down and five from the Rebel 10-yard line. But Vitte's pass attempt to Pickens fell short as he was pressured by Rusty Benezech.

"Our defense really turned it on

late," Charpentier said. "We brought our 'A' game defensively for the most part. Cecilia made plays, but we knew they would. They are too good of a team not to make plays."

Early in the third quarter, the Bulldogs took their first lead of the night when Alexander took a toss to the right side and walked into the end zone from three yards out for a 13-10 advantage. Alexander's touchdown run capped a eight-play, 82-yard drive that took 3:28 off the clock. Alexander ended the game with 50 yards on 15 carries.

But the lead didn't last long for the Bulldogs as the Rebels ran a fake bubble screen to receiver Luke Aubrey as quarterback Roch Charpentier threw the

ball deep to tailback Duriel Watson for a 77-yard touchdown to take a 16-13 lead.

There was controversy on the extra point as it appeared the kick was missed after hitting the right upright. The officials underneath the goal said it was no good, but were overruled by the referee to make the score 17-13.

"We had our chances," Sutton said. "We just have to develop consistency and discipline on offense. Until we do that we are not going to be a good team."

The Rebels were led offensively by Roch Charpentier, who completed 5 of 18 passes for 161 yards and two touchdowns, while receiver Ty Meche caught three passes for 73 yards and a touchdown.

Rebels, Panthers clash in 6-3A

NEW IBERIA — After the way their season began, head coach Sonny Charpentier and his Teurlings Catholic Rebels would like nothing better than to begin district play on the right foot.

The Rebels began the season with an embarrassing 40-14 defeat at the hands of the Notre Dame Pioneers, followed by a 28-14 loss to Breaux Bridge in week two.

"I truly believe that we lost all of our confidence after that opening week loss to Notre Dame," Charpentier said. "I think that loss was so bad that it actually affected us in the first half against Breaux Bridge."

But the Rebels bounced back in the second half against the Tigers to make it a game, which Charpentier says got them back on track.

"I think we gained some confidence back after our play in the second half," Charpentier said. "Even though we were down because we lost, we felt good about the way we finished off the game."

The result of their renewed confidence is a three-game win streak that includes victories over Iota (24-7), Cecilia (17-13) and Lake Charles-Boston (42-8).

"I think our win over Cecilia helped us a lot," Charpentier said. "When we played them they had just beaten Breaux Bridge the week before, so it was a big confidence booster."

The Rebels (3-2) will look to continue the win streak today when they open up District 6-3A play against the Catholic High of New Iberia Panthers.

"This is a huge game for both teams," Charpentier said. "In a five-team district, you can't really afford to lose a game. But for us we don't want

to start off the new season with a loss."

But the Rebels have their work cut out for them as they face one of the top quarterbacks in the Acadiana area in Michael Desormeaux.

"The Desormeaux kid is very dangerous," Charpentier said. "He is one of those players that can score at any time from anywhere on the field. Besides that, he has a lot of weapons."

In five games this season, Desormeaux has completed 69 of 120 passes for 867 yards, 10 touchdowns and three interceptions. He's also carried the football 28 times for 239 yards and five touchdowns.

Desormeaux's top receivers are Tyler Comeaux, who has 15 receptions for 240 yards and five touchdowns, and Tucker Lewis with 23 receptions for 224 yards and one touchdown.

But the Panthers (3-2) have

to be concerned with Rebel quarterback Roch Charpentier, who in his first year as a starter has completed 54 of 113 passes for 630 yards and six touchdowns along with five interceptions.

"Roch has done a wonderful job," Charpentier said. "He's very poised and has done a great job with game management. He's progressing really well."

Charpentier's favorite target is Ty Meche, who has hauled in 31 passes for 365 yards and three touchdowns.

Charpentier says that avoiding turnovers will be the deciding factor in whether or not his team is successful.

"We have to minimize our turnovers and create some turnovers on defense," Charpentier said. "We have to make them work for everything they get. Basically, we need to make them beat us and not beat ourselves."

NEW IBERIA — The Catholic High Panthers took a major first step in a loaded district race Friday night with a 16-12 victory over Teurlings Catholic in the 6-3A opener for both schools.

Victory was not assured until Jeffrey Toups scooped up a Rebel onside kick with 1:57 to play in a game that was soggy and at times sloppy, but every bit the battle expected.

"There's no doubt that this was a big win for us," CHHS coach David Comeaux said. "We thought our pre-district schedule would get us ready, and I know the rest of our (6-3A) games will be the same."

"We'll probably see an undefeated

North Vermilion when we play them and an undefeated Erath when we play them. It's up to us to prove ourselves."

Senior quarterback Michael Desormeaux engineered the win, hitting 12 of 20 passes for 227 yards and rushing 19 times for 85 yards. He plunged a yard for the first Panther score and his 54-yard scoring toss to Zeek Zacharie made it 16-6 with 20 seconds left in the third period.

"We thought we had a mismatch there," Comeaux said. "Then Zeek came back to us during the game and said he was open on the fade route."

It was a great throw and catch, and then Zeek took it to the house. All the momentum was ours after that.

The Rebels (3-3, 0-1) refused to go quietly, though, responding quickly to

the Zacharie score.

On fourth and four at the CHHS 17, Roch Charpentier found Luke Aubrey on a slant pass and the tangy junior headed for the end zone. A score seemed certain, but Desormeaux caught Aubrey, stripped the ball at the three and claimed the miscue in the end zone for a touchback.

The Panthers were running out the clock at the TCHS 15 with 3:37 to play when Desormeaux fumbled away to Ty Stuart.

Charpentier then hit 5 of 8 passes in a 9-play, 85-yard drive, including a fourth-down 12-yarder to the CHHS 15 and a 25-yard crossing route to Austin Zumbrocher to the 15 with 2:09 remaining.

Ty Morhe then got free for an 18-

yard TD that drew the visitors within four, but they would get no closer.

"Our reputation in the past has been that we score a lot of points," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "But this year we're not scoring that much."

"We missed opportunities to make plays, and had to settle for field goals. It's good to score (Kyle Boudreaux hit from 26 and 28 yards in a 6-6 first half), but we weren't able to finish drives."

Roch was out of sync, but he kept battling and I was proud of him. Our defense kept us in the game until the second half, but we didn't get going until it was too late."

The Panthers (4-2, 1-0) were plagued by their own mistakes, as they were flagged 11 times for 105

yards in penalties.

"Our problem was penalties," Comeaux said. "There were three times in the first half when we picked up first downs on third-down plays, but had it wiped out by penalties. Then in the second half on Michael's long run, we got a stupid penalty."

"I was proud of them for fighting through adversity, though."

"It's such a small district, you really can't afford one loss," Charpentier said. "With just four district games, each one is huge. The last two years we won it, and went undefeated."

"We have a lot of room for improvement, obviously."

No one at Catholic High is claiming a title yet, but the Panthers took that crucial first step.

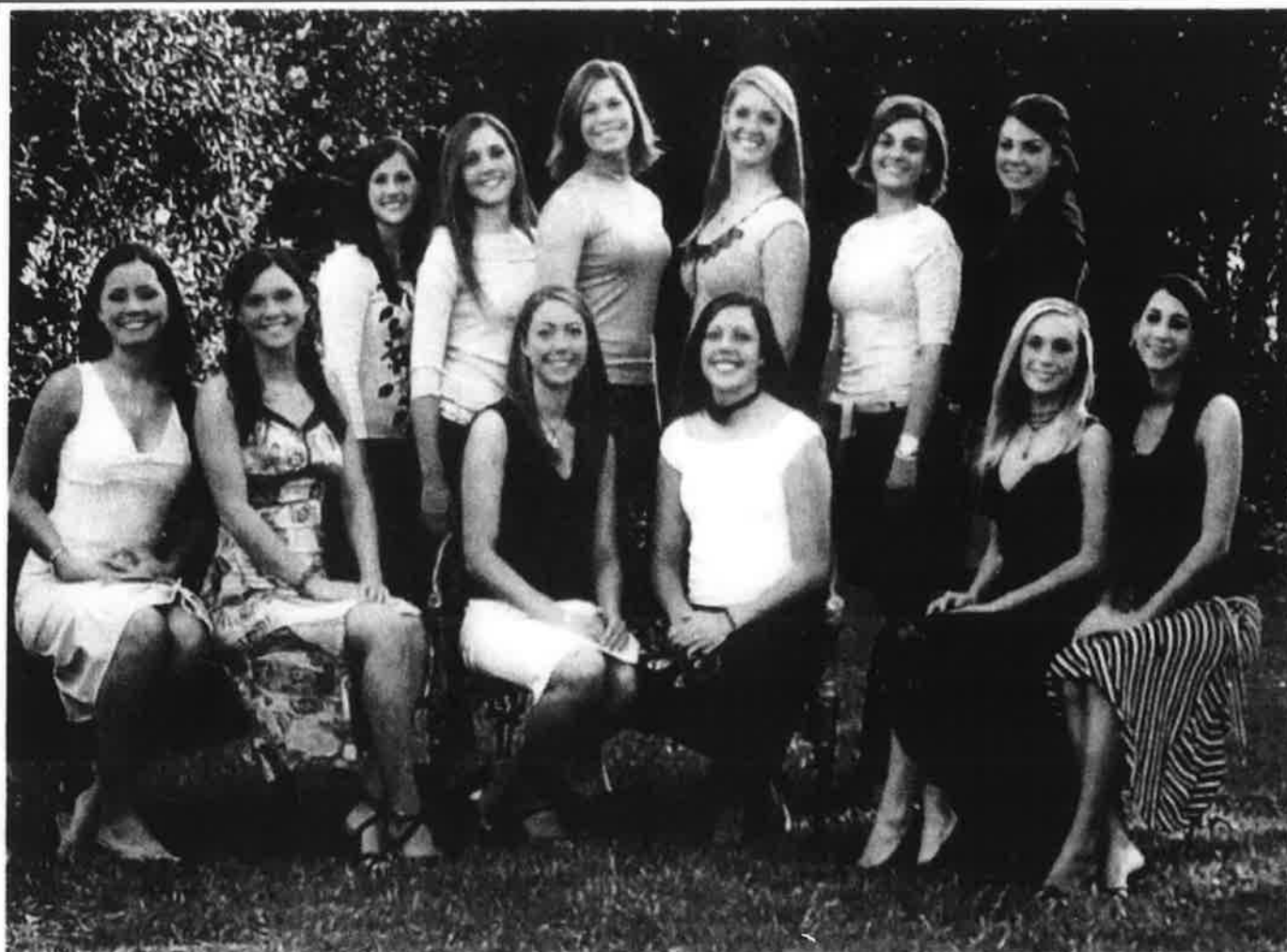

LEROY — With a must-win situation facing his Rebels, Teurlings Catholic head football coach Sonny Charpentier pulled out all the stops here Friday night.

And most of them worked. A 73-yard sideline streak on the game's third play — a reverse pass that set up the go-ahead score — and a fourth-down "swinging gate" that gave the Rebels the eventual winning margin.

Teurlings (5-3, 2-1) slowed down the Patriots' big number running attack, holding North Vermilion (5-3, 0-2) to only 104 ground yards and to only nine rushing yards in the second half.

In fact, after an early Patriot 62-yard march that tied the game 7-7 late in the first quarter, North Vermilion had only 41 ground yards the rest of the night after entering the game averaging 273 rushing yards.

"We were inconsistent, and they took it to us," said Patriot head coach Stephen Lotief. "A game like this always comes down to five or six plays, and they got them and we didn't."

The Rebels got one of them early, when Roch Charpentier found Luke Aubrey streaking down the left sideline right in front of the TCHS bench with a 73-yard scoring toss on the

game's third play.

"That was pitiful," said Lotief. "On third-and-eight, you're supposed to be expecting one of their big play guys and you gotta keep an eye on them."

That was one of three touch-down passes for the coach's son, who ended the night 15-of-29 for 246 yards. The other two scores went to Ty Meche, strikes of 34 and 49 yards as part of Meche's 10 catches for 187 yards.

"Ty's capable of doing that," said coach Charpentier. "He's been a little inconsistent, making great plays and then dropping some. He's too good a player to do that, and tonight he made plays for us."

The Patriots came back two possessions later with their best march of the night, going 62 yards and ending that drive with a one-yard J.J. Broussard run that tied the game 7-7.

TCHS took the lead for good late in the second period, with a 32-yard flanker reverse pass from Gabe Bagnaud to Meche to cap the 80-yard march.

Meche then leaped over two defenders in the end zone three plays later and hauled in a 34-yard scoring pass that made it 14-7 at halftime.

Back-to-back sacks on NVHS quarterback Codey Mire and a short punt gave the Rebels good field position to start the second half, and on fourth down from the Patriot 25 TCHS quickly lined up nine men near the left boundary. Deep snapper Jett Duenit picked up the ball and threw quickly to B.J. Hayes behind blocking, and he worked his way into the Patriot end zone for a 21-7 lead.

"We've worked it a lot in practice, but we've never used it," said coach Charpentier. "It was blocked well and B.J. ripped it open."

North Vermilion cut it to 21-13 on Mire's 19-yard crossing pattern touchdown pass to Jared Hebert with 9:43 left, a score set up by Andy Sandgram's interception.

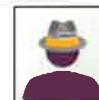

themselves in position to play for a championship."

"We needed help (after the loss to Catholic High), we knew it would take some good fortune

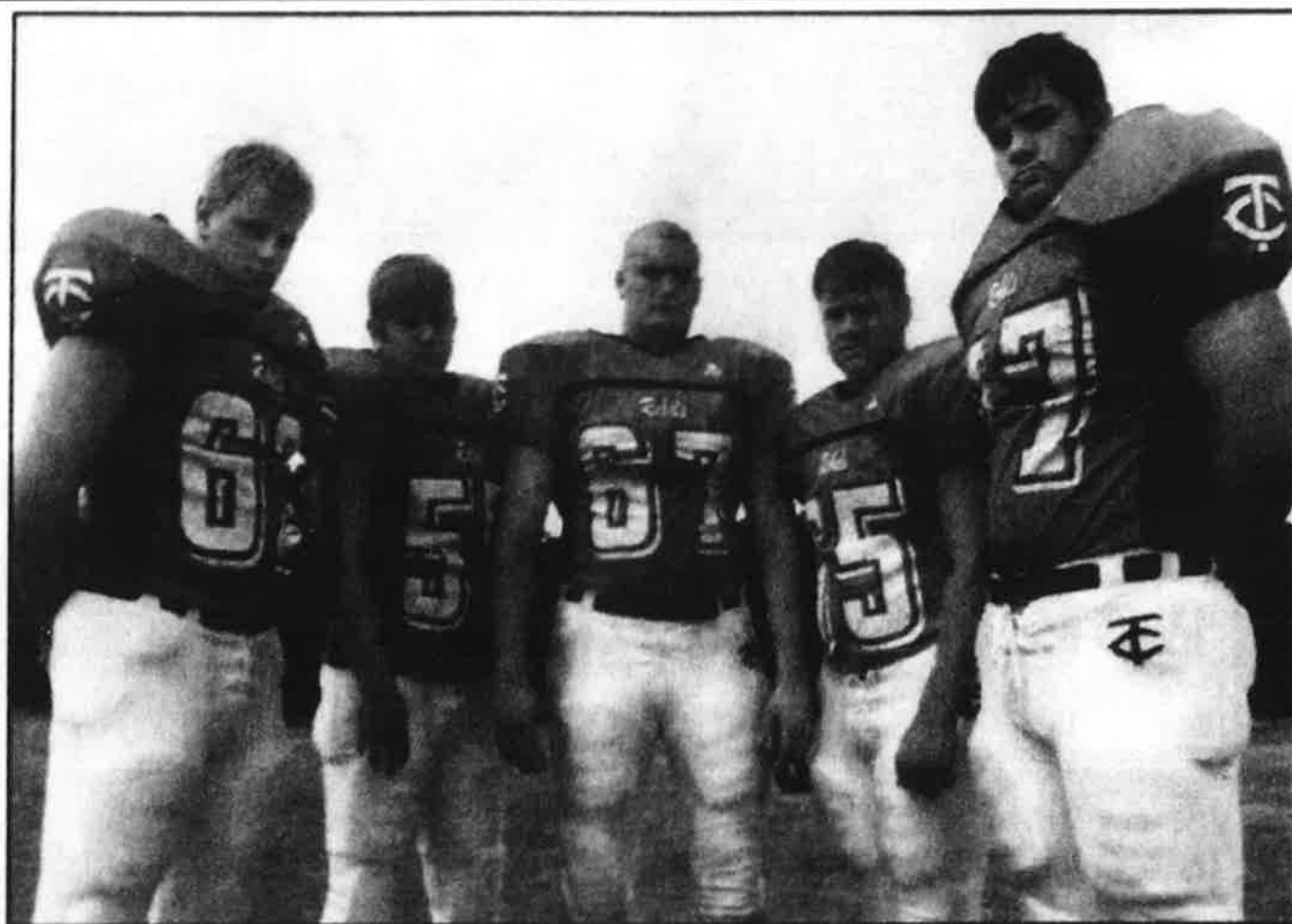

Rebels dominate

Teurlings blows out Erath with exclamation point

LAFAYETTE — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels went trick-or-treat on Friday night and came home with a ton of sweets.

But none of them were as sweet as their third straight District 6-3A championship trophy.

Senior quarterback Roch Charpentier threw four first-half touchdown passes and finished with 243 yards passing as the Rebels rolled past the eighth-ranked Erath Bobcats 44-28.

The Rebels led 41-6 at one point before the Bobcats scored some late touchdowns to make the final margin look respectable.

The coaches talked all week about when opportunity knocks, you have to open the door and let it in. Roch Charpentier said, "We had an opportunity to make history tonight and become the first team to win three district champi-

onships in a row. We talked all week about not letting this opportunity pass us by."

The Rebels certainly seized the opportunity right away as the first play of the game resulted in an interception by Jeff Dowitt on a deep pass by Derrick Fourroux.

Teurlings went 57 yards in eight plays to take a quick 6-0 lead on a 19-yard touchdown strike from Charpentier to Ty Meche.

The Teurlings defense went back to work, forcing Erath to punt on their next possession. The Rebels took over at their own 29-yard line and drove 71 yards in 10 plays to take a 13-0 lead when Charpentier hooked up with Luke Aubrey on a fade to the back of the endzone for a 19-yard touchdown strike.

After another Erath punt, the Rebels went up 20-0 on a 19-yard touchdown pass from Charpentier to Aubrey.

Erath's offense got going on

their next possession, driving into Teurlings territory, but the drive ended when Fourroux tried to escape the Teurlings pressure and when attempting to throw the ball away, he deposited right in the waiting arms of Rebel defensive lineman Dylan Dore.

The Rebels turned that turnover into a 27-0 lead as Charpentier hit Aubrey on a slant and Aubrey did the rest, racing 71 yards to paydirt for the touchdown.

Teurlings got the ball once more right before the half and looked to put the game away but on a 14-yard pass completion from Charpentier to Austin Zaunbrecher, the ball came loose and Erath pounced on the loose ball.

The Bobcats then used a little trickery to get on the scoreboard as Cory Racca raced 21 yards for the touchdown on the guard-around.

The Rebels put the game away

with their first possession of the third quarter as Michael Pearce scored on a 10-yard touchdown run.

Zaunbrecher led the running game with 137 yards while Pearce added 121 yards.

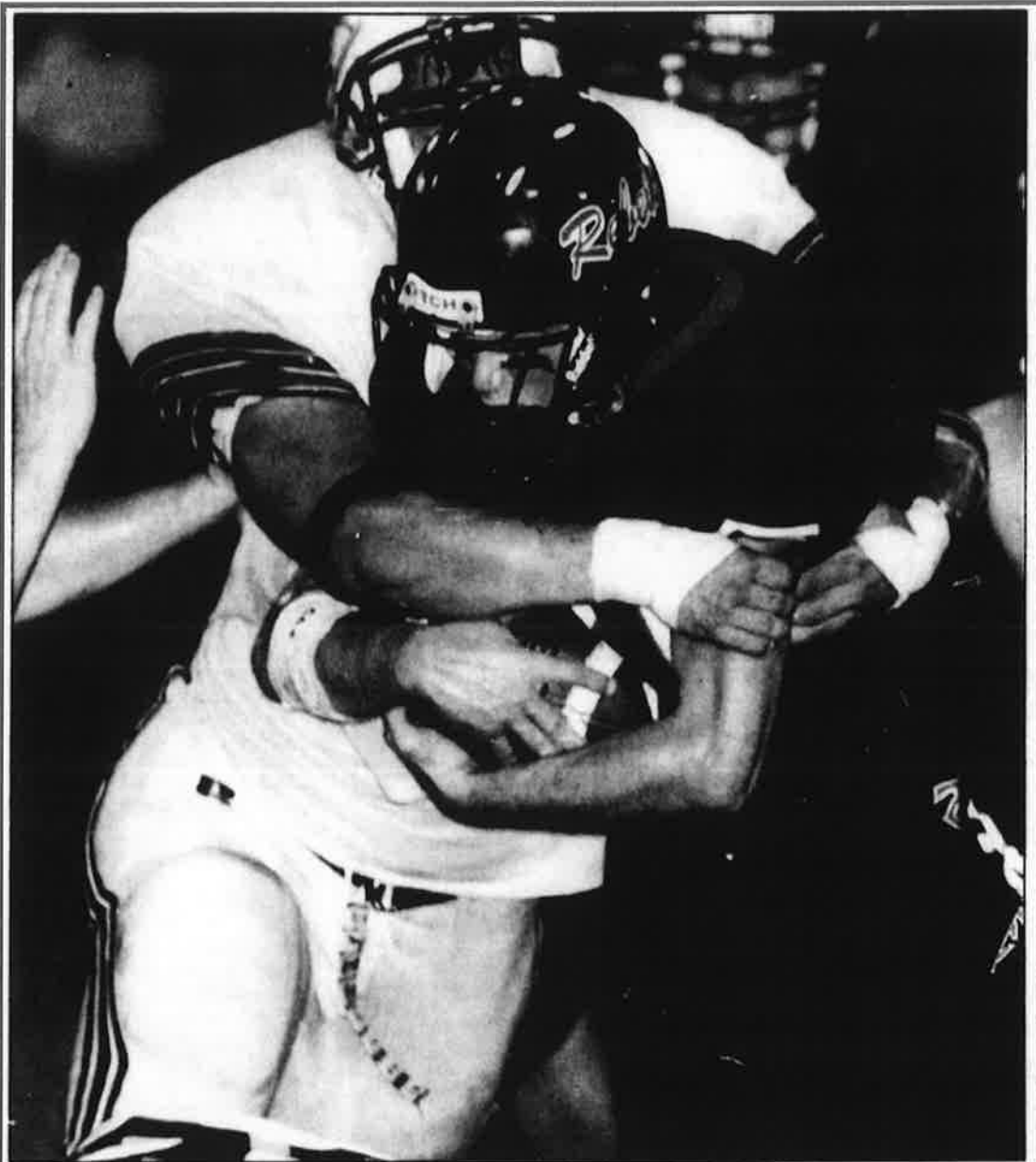

LAFAYETTE — It's hard to imagine having a better night on a high school football field than Teurlings Catholic quarterback Roch Charpentier did last Friday.

In leading his Rebels to a shocking 48-28 demolition of unbeaten Erath, Charpentier completed 13 of 19 passes for 243 yards and four touchdowns.

Somehow, however, St. Martinville's Early Doucet managed to do just that. Battling a nagging groin injury for most of the season, Doucet certainly illustrated what all the preseason fuss was about in Friday's 28-20 win over Breaux Bridge.

The versatile Doucet rushed for 231 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries, hit on two of four pass attempts for 23 yards and a touchdown and also caught a 10-yard touchdown pass.

That effort ended up nipping Charpentier at the wire for this week's Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Offensive Player of the Week honor.

The news was a little better for the Rebels on the defensive side, though, where defensive lineman Dylan Dore earned Daily Advertiser/Coca-Cola Defensive Player of the Week honors for his role in Teurlings Catholic's big win over Erath.

Dore contributed three solo tackles, three assists, a forced fumble, an interception, a pass break up and two quarterback hurries.

■ Lafayette High wide receiver Richie Falgout caught six passes for 105 yards and three touchdowns, and also had a 12-yard carry for a touchdown as the Mighty Lions drilled Acadiana High 35-9.

Teurlings blows out S. Houston

LAFAYETTE — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels continue to roll after capturing a 42-6 non-district contest over the Sam Houston Broncos, Friday night at Clark Field.

The win extended the Rebels' win streak to four and snapped the six game win streak that the seventh-ranked, 4-A, Broncos brought into the game.

Teurlings got on the scoreboard first, as running back Michael Pearce scored on a 2-yard run that capped off a 5-play, 49-yard drive to give the Rebels a 7-0 lead at the 9:12 mark of the first quarter.

After forcing Sam Houston to punt after only three offensive plays for the second straight time, Teurlings again found the end zone, scoring on a 16-yard touchdown pass from Roch Chapentier to Luke Aubrey, giving the Rebels a 14-0 lead at the 5:25 mark of the first quarter.

The Rebels extended that lead on their next possession, as Ty Meche caught a lateral, then connected with Duriel Watson on a 63-yard touchdown pass, to give Teurlings a 21-0 lead at the end of the first period.

The lone score of the night for Sam Houston came at the 3:18 mark of the second quarter, as Cole Graham scored on a 1-yard run, cutting the Teurlings lead to 21-6, but the Rebels came right back on their next possession as B.J. Hayes capped off an 11-play, 80 drive, with a 1-yard run, to make it 28-6.

Teurlings made it 35-6 at the half after Chapentier hit Aubrey on another touchdown, this one from seven yards out.

The Rebels then put the game completely away on their first possession of the second half, as Chapentier hit Austin Zambrecht on a 32-yard scoring strike to end the scoring in the game, and give the Rebels their most impressive win of the year.

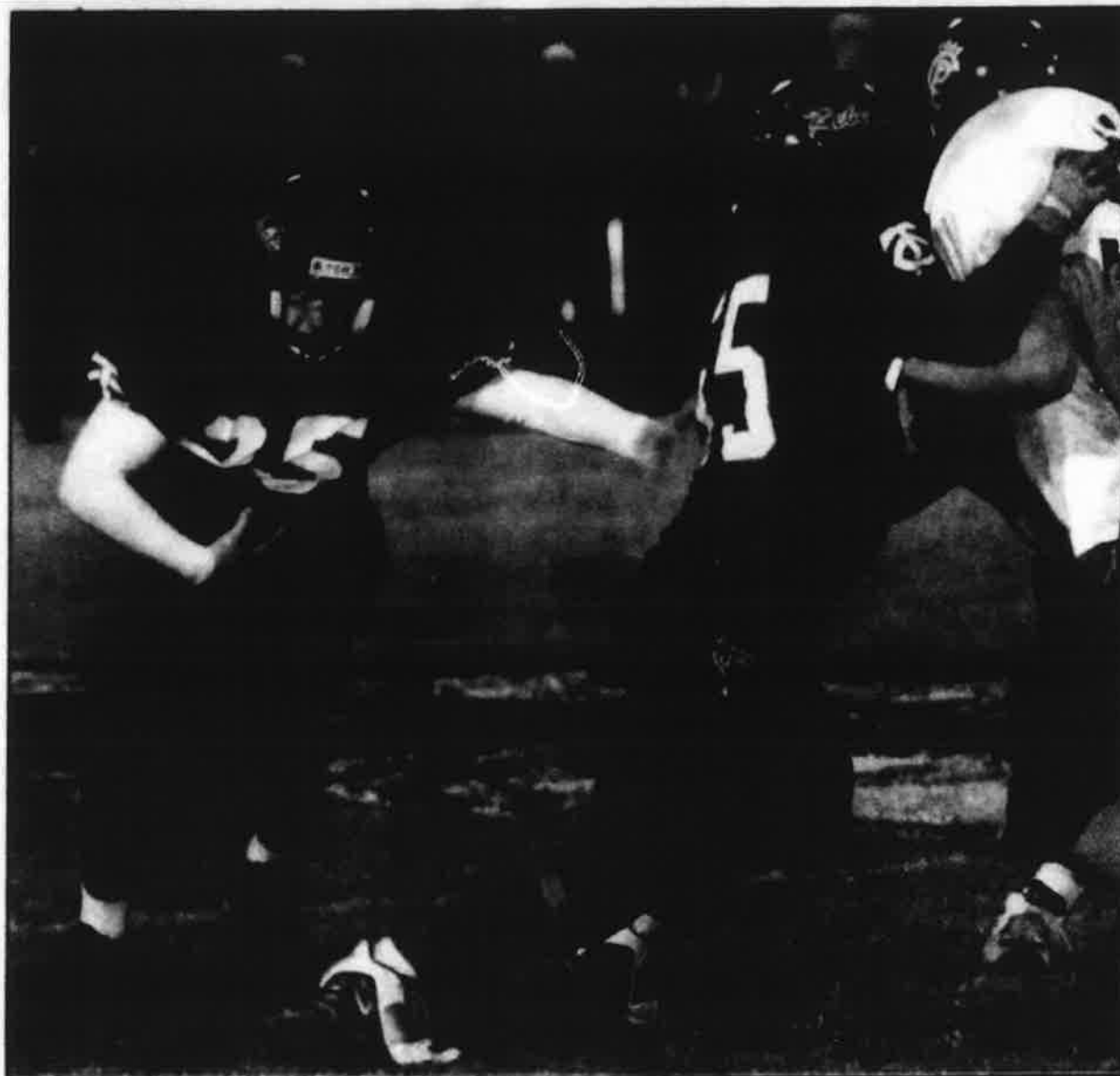

Meche's patience pays

Teurlings Catholic star has made the most of first chance to contribute

LAFAYETTE — If anything, Ty Meche knows about being patient.

Meche has spent the last two seasons waiting in the wings as All-State receiver Dustin Smith was working his magic for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

So, it comes as no surprise that when the Rebels struggled earlier this season, Meche didn't panic. He knew it was just a matter of time.

"I think we all started off slow," the senior receiver said. "I think early on, it was an adjustment period for us. A lot of guys were coming on from JV and things were different. I think we thought varsity would be just like JV but the speed of the game was different. It took us a few games, but we got it together."

Now, the Rebels are peaking at the right time. In the last five weeks, they've averaged 43.6 points per game on offense. They'll look to keep that offensive momentum going Friday night when they travel to Winfield for a second round contest.

"I don't think anyone ever thought we were going to have a hot season after we started 0-2," Meche said. "I think what really helped us is (junior receiver) Luke Aubrey really stepped up around the Catholic High game. He's had some big games and when (quarterback) Rich (Charpentier) has two receivers to throw to, it opens things up. It really spreads things out for us."

The addition of Aubrey has certainly helped Meche's numbers. Meche has caught 47 passes for 979 yards and nine touchdowns.

Just like his team, Meche has been on fire down the stretch. In his last four games, he's caught 29 passes for 627 yards and five touchdowns.

"Honestly I wasn't making the plays I was capable of at the beginning of the season," Meche said. "I wasn't running good routes. I just wasn't playing well. I think once I got used to the game speed, I started running better routes. I really expected to have the type of season I've had, but I didn't expect it to happen the way it has."

Prior to the season, the big concern from Teurlings fans was how they were going to replace the talented duo of quarterback Dusty Collette and receiver Smith.

But Charpentier and Meche combined with the emergence of Aubrey has helped ease those concerns.

"Me and Rich have been playing together since our freshman year," Meche said. "We were both receivers our freshman year, but he moved to quarterback our sophomore year. We've developed some chemistry through JV. He knows how I'm going to run my routes and I know how he's going to throw the ball."

If Charpentier and Meche can continue the magic they've performed the last few weeks, Meche says the Rebels can win up playing late into November and possibly early December.

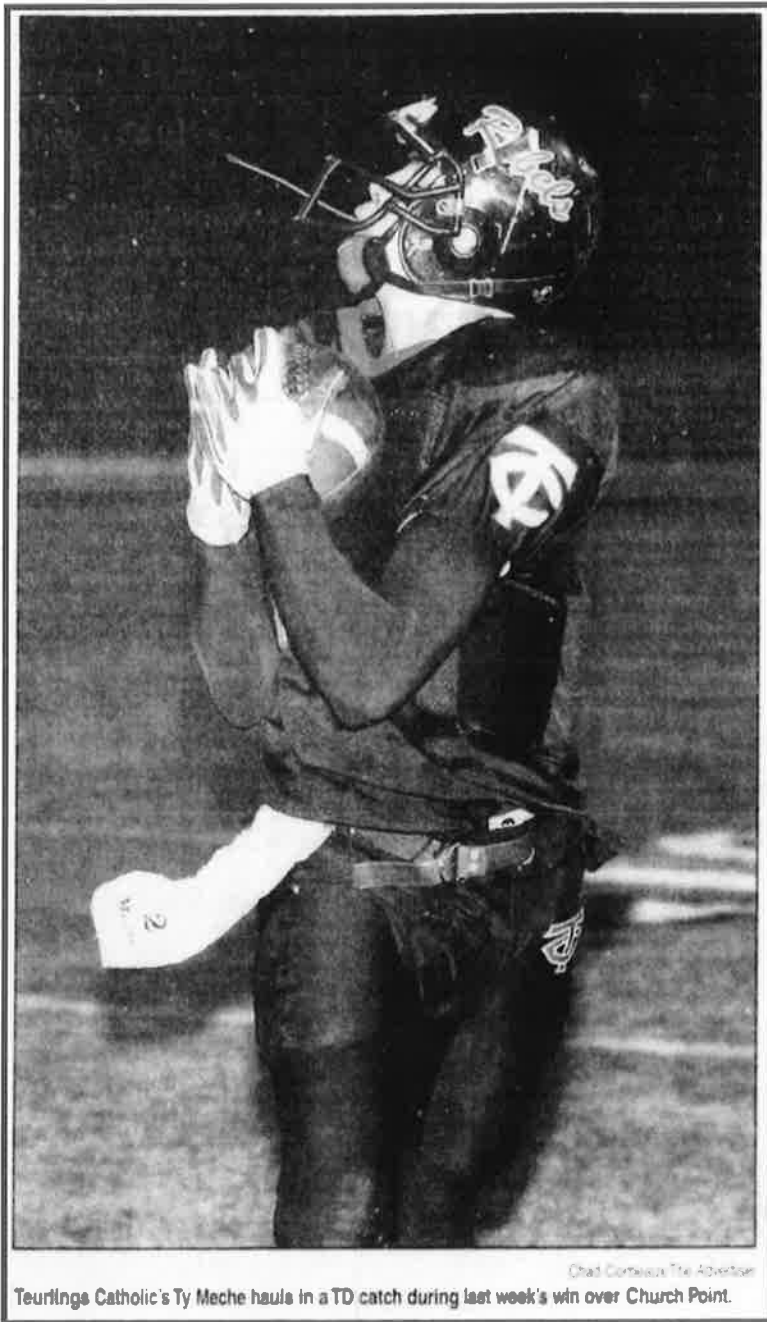
down on defense and had a great game on offense. If we can keep getting that kind of effort, we can go very far. We just have to stay focused on each game and not start looking ahead."

Teurlings tackles Winnfield

WINNFIELD — On the surface, it appears to be a classic showdown between a powerful rushing attack and an explosive passing game.

But before the two coaches completely commit to that view, they'd first like to play a few series.

Both are hoping it won't be too late by the time they size up the competition when No. 12-seeded Teurlings Catholic (8-3) travels to meet No. 5 Winnfield (10-1) in a 7 p.m. Class 3A state regional contest today.

"They've got two good backs," TC coach Sonny Charpentier said. "The thing that impresses me the most about them is how well they block for one another. I call it old-fashioned football."

"They appear to be about 75 percent run, but it's hard to tell on film exactly what we're going to see when we get there. We'll know after a few series."

The statistics certainly indicate that Charpentier's initial impression was accurate. Winnfield boasts a combination of Antonio Robinson (173-1348, 16 TDs regular season) and Jarvis Edwards (127-854, 11 TDs).

Robinson exploded for 212 yards and Edwards added 171 in last week's 56-30 win over Jena.

"They're both good backs and they're very coachable," WHS coach Joey Pender said. "We really emphasize blocking for one another. We joke that we could just as easily put a 60 number on them and play guard for us. If you can get every kid on your team thinking that way, you're in great shape."

It's in the secondary, however, that Pender may need his backs on this night. The Rebels' passing game has been kicked into high gear in recent weeks behind the play of quarterback Roch Charpentier (130-236-8, 1851 yds, 21 TDs) and receivers Ty Meche (67-979, 9 TDs) and Luke Aubrey (34-556, 9 TDs).

Handling the bulk of the Rebels' running game is Michael Pearce (142-704, 10 TDs).

Winnfield last saw such a passing-oriented offensive game in its lone loss, squandering a 21-point third-quarter lead in a 42-41 loss to Carroll.

"Carroll was more of a long-ball throwing team," Pender said. "Teurlings will throw it deep, but has a much more controlled passing game. It's hard to tell on film, but it looks like we're really going to have to play team ball on defense."

Charpentier is hoping his Rebels don't have to play comeback ball like Carroll did, however.

"We need to try to stop them before they get started," he said. "From watching them on film and from what I've heard, it's important for us to get a lead early."

Like Teurlings, Winnfield has been a perennial playoff team, reaching the postseason every year since 1998.

Winnfield is the only Central Louisiana team ever to win a state football title in the Superdome era, beating John Curtis in 1982.

The winner of this contest will meet the Notre Dame-North Vermillion winner in the state quarterfinals.

Teurlings Catholic overcomes road test to advance

WINNFIELD - At just after 10 p.m. Friday, a gaggle of police-escorted charter buses, filled with smiling fans, players and cheerleaders from Teurlings Catholic, pulled away from Stokes-Walker Stadium, no doubt in a hurry to get back home and bask in the glow of their second-round victory.

The destination, of course, was Lafayette.

But it might as well have been Crowley.

After twice coming from one touchdown behind to hand fifth-seeded Winnfield a 24-14 defeat, the No. 12 Rebels had just pointed their season in a most gratifying direction. What they'd done was earn a long-awaited rematch with rival Notre Dame, which embarrassed Teurlings in an opening-night showdown between two Top 10 teams.

"The longest 45 minutes of my life," Teurlings quarterback Roch Charpentier called the Rebels' ride back from Crowley on Sept. 4, after dropping a 40-13 decision to the Pioneers. "We wanted to play them again the very next week." Better late than never.

Even as he spoke Wednesday night of the challenges that his Rebels would face in the second round - Winnfield (10-3) entered Friday's game with only one loss and loads of confidence -

Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier, Roch's father, admitted that playing Notre Dame was a motivating factor for the team. The Rebels (9-3) had to have their shot at redemption, and they

knew one more victory would open the door for another crack at the fourth-seeded Pioneers (12-0).

"We wanted a chance to play those guys again and see how much we've improved," Coach Charpentier said after the win, Teurlings' eighth in nine games. "It's been 13 weeks since we played, and that's light years ago."

After Winnfield's running back tandem of Antonio Robinson and Jarvis Edwards helped give the Tigers the early edge, a rematch with Notre Dame looked like anything but money in the bank. But the Rebels never lost their cool, using their efficient passing attack to score the final 17 points.

That Teurlings wouldn't go away was thanks in large part to its savvy quarterback, who completed 19 of 28 passes (with one interception) for 245 yards, throwing one TD pass in the first quarter and another in the fourth.

It's the type of performance the Rebels have come to expect from the coach's kid, a 6-foot-1, 145-pound beanpole who's having a dream season.

"We knew this couldn't be our last game," said Charpentier, a first-year starter. "We stayed level-headed and did what we had to do."

While Charpentier may have been

the player of the game, the play of the game no doubt belonged to outside line-backer Ty Stuart. With Winnfield down by only a touchdown and facing a fourth-and-1 at its own 37, the 5-11, 180-pound Stuart stormed off the corner to take down the 6-1, 238-pound Edwards, who was dropped immediately for a 3-yard loss with 7:29 to go.

Nine plays and four minutes later, Teurlings kicker Kyle Boudreaux connected on a 19-yard field goal, giving the Rebels their biggest lead of the night. Jett Dueitt then recovered the ensuing kickoff - which was mishandled by Winnfield return man Kelvin Barnes - and from there TCHS could celebrate its third straight quarterfinal trip.

"It's a hard one to swallow," said Winnfield coach Joey Pender. "We were really hoping we could keep going."

As Pender and his assistants tried to console their dejected Tigers, a party was breaking out on the opposite side of the field. Players slid across the end-zone turf. Teurlings flags waved in the night. And talk of a rematch with Notre Dame spread through the stadium.

"We've got a second chance," screamed lineman Adam Peterson. "Let's go get 'em."

Pioneers surge in final period to notch sweep

CROWLEY—It was a completely different ballgame, but with the same result.

The Notre Dame Pios completed the sweep of Teurlings Catholic here Friday night as they came up with some big defensive stops in the second half en route to a 30-20 win over the Rebels.

The Pioneers (13-0) move into the semifinals for the fourth straight year and will travel to face Parkview Baptist next Friday with a trip to the Superdome on the line.

The Pios went into the fourth quarter clinging to a 21-20 lead before exploding for 19 unanswered points to pull away at the end.

"Everybody talks about the first game, but we knew it was going to

be a different ballgame," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said. "Our defense stepped up big tonight. J.T. (Casanova) had a really big interception in the first quarter when they got down inside our 20-yard line. And I thought when we held them to two field goals in the third quarter proved to be huge. We played well tonight, and now we'll go try to win one more and get back to the finals."

The two teams each scored twice in the first half to go into the break tied at 14-14. The Pios got the second half kickoff and drove 66 yards in 12 plays to take a 21-14 lead.

The Rebels countered with a scoring drive of their own, but the Pio defense lessened the blow as they held Teurlings to a 35-yard field goal by Kyle Boudreaux to make it 21-17.

It appeared as though the momentum was going to swing back into the Rebels' favor on the ensuing

kickoff as Joseph Voltier fumbled and Teurlings' Elliot Guidry pounced on the loose ball.

The Pio defense rose to the occasion again and held the Rebels to a 38-yard field goal by Boudreaux to make the score 21-20.

The bad news continued for the Pios on the following kickoff, as Voltier tried to field a low line drive by Boudreaux and was ruled down at the 9-yard line after his knee touched the ground.

But the Pios didn't blink, as they drove 91 yards in 14 plays to take a 28-20 lead on Rick Zaunbrecher's 34-yard touchdown jaunt. Zaunbrecher finished the night with 164 yards on 24 carries.

As quickly as the momentum had swung into Teurlings' favor, it went back to Notre Dame's side. The Pios forced the Rebels into a punting situation, and the snap to the

punter was high and glanced off Boudreaux's fingertips down to the 7-yard line, where Notre Dame took over on offense.

On the first play, the Pioneers put the game away as Derrick McBride (17-109, 2 TDs) raced around the left side and muscled past a Teurlings defender into the end zone to make it 34-20. The Pioneers two-point conversion attempt failed to keep it a 14-point game.

Teurlings was moving the ball down the field on their next offensive possession, but

it ended abruptly when David Hensgens picked off a Roch Charpentier pass and raced 75 yards for the touchdown and the 40-20 lead.

It was the third interception by the Pioneer defense. The first interception came early in the first quarter when the Rebels were driving. J.T. Casanova stepped in front of a Charpentier pass at the 13-yard line to thwart a potential scoring drive.

"I thought the turning point was when we got the turnover on the kickoff and we had to settle for a field goal," Charpentier said. "We felt pretty good at that point, we were playing well and we really would have liked to punch it in. But, we knew Notre Dame was going to be difficult to beat and I'm proud of the way we played tonight."
