

Area's best meet at UL's Cajun Field

The search to find answers to troubling question marks speeds up for high school coaches around the Acadiana area tonight and Friday with seven football jamborees on the schedule.

A dozen of the area's most successful programs will be at Cajun Field over the next two nights for the 57th Annual Lafayette Kiwanis Club Jamboree.

Tonight's 6 p.m. kickoff begins with Acadiana vs. Breau Bridge, followed by Vernon Catholic and Souring's Catholic and concluding with St. Thomas More vs. Calcasieu.

Friday's schedule begins with a 6 p.m. clash of Class 3A powers in Cecilia vs. Notre Dame, before a cat-crostown rivalry between Northside and Lafayette High follows and St. Martinville takes on Cormeau in the finale.

The Lafayette jamboree games will be reduced from two 15-minute halves to a pair of 12-minute halves this season.

There will also be jamborees at Donald Gardner Stadium in Opelousas tonight, as well as the beginning of the inaugural Acadia-Vernon Parish Jamboree in Iota, which switches to Abbeville High on Friday.

Of the 12 teams in the Lafayette jamboree, 10 made the playoffs last year. Of those 10, three enter tonight's games with issues to resolve on offense and one with potential trouble on defense.

Both Acadiana and Breau Bridge lost their starting quarterback, leading runner and leading receiver. Louis Hottel begins his journey as the Rams' QB, while Hunter Landry takes over for his older brother, Brock, for BRHS.

The Rams also lost a pair of All-State offensive linemen.

"It's been a challenge," AHS coach Ted Dornison said. "It's been a pretty rough August."

Both, however, are expected to be improved on defense. Even at Tuesday's Oryx Bowl luncheon, BRHS assistant coach Ryan Frederick couldn't deny how talented the Tigers appear on defense.

Souring's Catholic knows what losses on offense are all about. The Rebels lost a pair of three-year starters in quarterback Taylor Dugan and tailback Elliot Hebert, the All-Acadian Offensive MVP last year.

That places a larger burden on the talented shoulders of four-year starter Andrew Hebert, as well as the promising Rebels' defense. At the same time, a new regime begins as TCH coach Sonny Chapenter starts to mold

sophomores starting quarterback Adam Angelle as he did Dugan three years ago.

"We've got a lot of guys back on defense," Chapenter said. "They're going to have to carry us a little bit early on until our offense matures."

In tonight's finale, one thing to watch out for is the Cougars' passing game, which has been decimated this August by a rash of wide receiver injuries. Matt deGuzman, Philip Peters, Cruz Angelle and Donny Washington are among the STM receivers battling injuries. Expected to play some quarterback and running back as well, deGuzman's injury is expected to keep him out for 4-6 weeks.

"Matt is definitely a key guy for us," STM coach Jim Hightower said. "He can do so many things for us, and he was really having a good camp."

For Calcasieu's Bears, August battles have mostly surrounded a defense that only returns one starter. The Bears' offense appears powerful, but isn't without some transition either with tailback Juwanne Domingue back after sitting out a season after transferring from Cormeau.

In Friday's opener, the Pioneers hope to unleash a more potent offensive attack this season with Jordan Bertrand returning at tailback after an injury-plagued junior year and Ryan Leonards providing a stronger arm at quarterback.

Cecilia's Bulldogs, meanwhile, "got whipped" by Northside in a scrimmage last week, although coach Terry Martin's club didn't have Marcus Witz in that workout.

"I've been trying to tell people for two months now that yes, we have several good kids back, but that we also lost eight All-District players on the offensive and defensive lines," Martin said. "And five of those are on the offensive line. It takes time."

Two quarterbacks making their first varsity starts are Lafayette High's Joe Jackson and Northside's Nathan Brummand.

Unlike Acadiana and Cecilia, these two teams are loaded with returning offensive linemen. For these two teams, it's a matter of how quickly the unproven skill position players improve.

The most interesting story line in Friday's finale may be sitting or standing next to SL Martinville principal Mike Kinsman whose son, Garrett, is the starting quarterback at Cormeau.

SL Martinville is hoping for a more productive offense this fall, while the Spartans are hoping that eight returning starters do the trick on the defensive side.

Rebels cruise to 35-0 victory

It was supposed to take the Teurlings Catholic Rebels' offense a little time to gel this season.

If Thursday's game two is any indication, the defenses on their schedule may have a tougher time than originally expected.

The Rebels scored touchdowns on all five of their possessions and cruised to a 35-0 victory over Vermilion Catholic.

The first three carries of the game for Teurlings went for 9, 83 and 18 yards and two touchdowns.

A punt into the line set up Andrew Hebert's 9-yard TD run to get the scoring under way for the Rebels. Hebert finished the game with five carries for 49 yards and two scores.

Sophomore quarterback Adam Angelle then showed his running abili-

ty with a nifty 83-yard scoring run. Angelle finished with 98 yards on three carries to earn team MVP honors.

Hebert wrapped up the third score with a 6-yard run.

The first half ended with a 10-yard TD pass from Britt Collette to Kyle Calais for the 28-0 lead.

VC slowed Teurlings down a bit in the second half. Instead of big plays, though, the Rebels drove 73 yards on 12 plays in 6:19 on their only drive of the second half.

A 10-yard run by Emmanuel Noel wrapped up the scoring for Teurlings. Noel finished with 63 yards on nine carries.

The Eagles were limited four first downs, two yards rushing and 39 yards passing. Johnny Living had two catches for 40 yards to earn team MVP honors for the Eagles.

1. Acadiana Wreckin' Rams 3-5A 2-0

Skinny: It wasn't exactly a typical Acadiana High win. The Rams' offense was limited to 168 rushing yards by a New Orleans area team, which normally doesn't happen. Still, East St. John was ranked No. 6 and all wins against ranked teams are good. Getting a score on a blocked punt shows that the Rams are more than just a running game.

On tap: The Rams get a rent-a-win at home against Belaire on Friday.

2. Eunice Bobcats 4-4A 2-0

Skinny: Another week and another dominating victory for the Eunice Bobcats. Eunice has outscored its first two opponents 86-7.

On tap: Travels to meet 2-0 Church Point on Friday.

3. Notre Dame Pioneers 5-3A 2-0

Skinny: For the second straight week, the Pioneers played without their starting quarterback and the defense took care of things. It may not be pretty just yet, but there's nothing wrong with a 27-7 win over a perennial playoff team.

On tap: The challenge gets a little tougher at undefeated St. Louis on Friday.

4. St. Thomas More Cougars 3-5A 2-1

Skinny: The Cougars are still a long way away from being a polished football team, but they did get a win on the road at Woodlawn on Friday. Andre Ozene and the running game is having to be depended upon a little too much, but Ozene has now delivered two in a row. The current level of play probably won't cut it in 3-5A play, but there's time.

On tap: At 1-0 Westgate on Friday.

5. Breaux Bridge Tigers 5-4A 1-1

Skinny: There was a lot of talk about how good the Tigers' defense was going to be this season. The two regular season games thus far haven't done anything to dispute that claim. Holding Cecilia to three first downs and 35 total yards was a pretty awesome feat.

8. Teurlings Catholic Rebels 5-4A 1-1

Skinny: Like many teams in the area, it remains difficult to get a pulse on the Rebels. Sure, they got pounded at St. James on Friday, but many teams have fallen at St. James over the years. Going 1-1 in a two-year series against the Wildcats is still better than most would do.

On tap: Westgate will really get tested Friday at home against St. Thomas More.

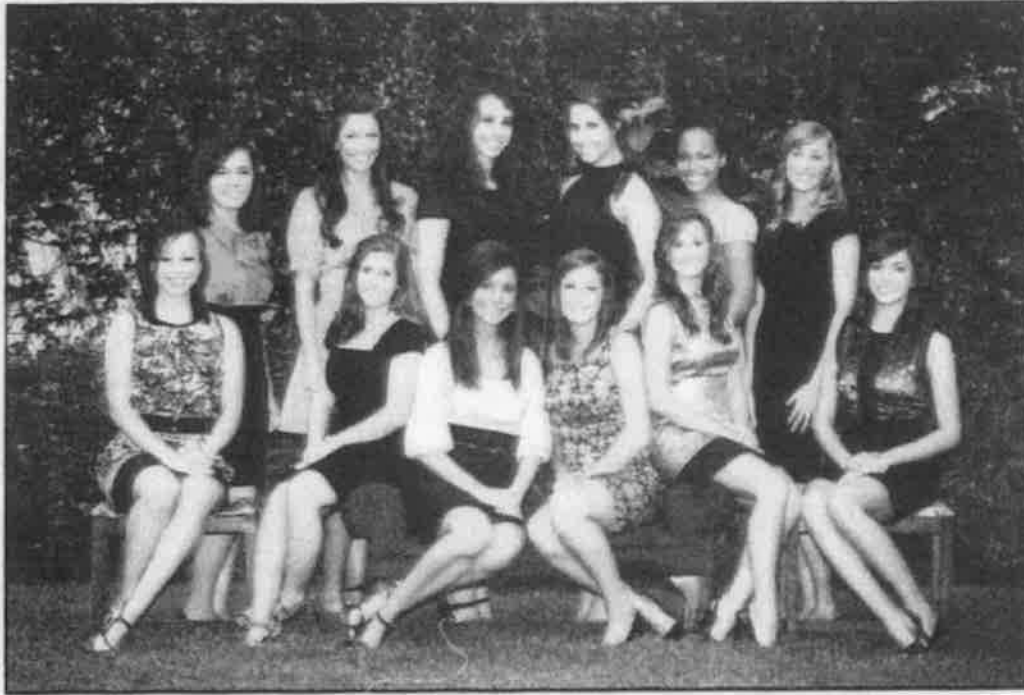

Rebels have issues starting 5-4A play

It's not that Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier doesn't respect the threat presented by the Abbeville Wildcats.

"They're a good-looking football team," he said. "They definitely pass the eye test."

But when you're 1-1, just got beat 48-21 and have turned it over nine times in two games, the opponent isn't exactly near the top of the priority list as the Rebels open District 5-4A play against Abbeville at 7 tonight at Wildcat Stadium.

"When you turn it over four or five times against a team with tradition like St. James, you don't even give yourself a chance to win," Charpentier said. "We needed a wake-up call. It's coach's peak I know, but it's true. I'm really just concentrating right now on us getting better as a football team."

That won't likely be a factor as 5-4A play opens tonight.

"To be honest, it is a different feeling this year,"

Rebels clear Wildcats

Rebels shake off first-half struggles in win

ABBEVILLE — Teurlings Catholic's Rebels had a change in latitude in Friday's second half of their District 5-4A opener.

But credit a change in attitude for the Rebels' 20-3 road victory over Abbeville's Wildcats.

Teurlings trailed 3-0 at halftime and hadn't seriously threatened on offense, never penetrating the Wildcat 25-yard-line. Four times, the ninth-ranked Rebels had come up short on fourth-down conversions.

"We came out soft, and we were blaming each other," said running back Andrew Hebert. "Coach Sonny (Charpentier) got on us pretty good at halftime."

The tongue-lashing worked. So did the Rebel running game, which had 218 of its 258 ground yards after intermission. The Rebels (2-1, 1-0) didn't complete a pass in the second half, but still scored on three of their first four possessions.

"The second half, they took it to us," said Abbeville coach Ward Courville. "The first half, we punched them in the mouth and they didn't flinch. The second half

they punched us, and we recoiled."

Hebert, held to 32 yards in the first two quarters, scored on runs of 10 and five yards early in the second half. He also set up the Rebels' final score, a 14-yard counter by Briston Dooley, with runs of 17, 11 and 21 yards on Teurlings' final drive. He finished with 157 yards on 21 carries.

"We told him that we were going to ride him in the second half," Charpentier said. "We had moved it pretty well between the 30's, but we had some negative plays that put us in long-yardage situations. Our guys stayed the course and kept doing what we wanted them to do."

Hebert and the Rebel offense wouldn't have been in position for a second-half rally had it not been for a strong defensive effort. Abbeville (1-2, 0-1) drove inside the TCHS 10-yard-line late in the first half and again in the game's final seven minutes, only to settle for a 34-yard Garrett Lege field goal 0:29 before halftime.

Then, trailing 14-3 but threaten-

ing with a second down at the Rebel four with eight minutes left, Wildcat quarterback R. J. Frederick was pressured into an incompletion and a sack, and the Rebels got a clinching interception in the end zone with 6:47 left.

Tailback Jhorian Henderson had a 28-yard run with two minutes left in the first half to set up Lege's field goal, and Frederick hit Cody Williams for 33 yards to the TCHS 7 on the late-game drive. Other than those two plays, Abbeville was held to 59 total offensive yards.

"I'm proud of our defensive guys," Charpentier said. "We harped on that all week. We didn't feel like we got the defensive effort we wanted last week (a 48-21 loss to St. James). Tonight they bought into what we wanted to do. When you hold someone without a touch-down, you should win."

Abbeville also pitched a TD shutout in the first half, getting a break when a holding penalty erased Emmanuel Noel's 58-yard touchdown run on the game's sixth play. But the Wildcats opened in a hole in the second half, starting three possessions inside their own 20, and the Rebels held AHS without a first down on all three.

"It's pretty easy to play when you get that kind of field position," Courville said, "but we had chances like that in the first half and we didn't take advantage."

Sophomore Adam Angelle has high standards to meet succeeding standout Taylor Dugas at quarterback for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels, but his plan sounds solid.

"I just play up to my standards," Angelle said. "I know I can trust my line, and everybody around me. I know they're going to make big plays."

Just as Dugas did before signing with Alabama in baseball, Angelle knows to look for versatile running back Andrew Hebert as often as possible.

"We get the ball to him on basic running plays, and we want to get the ball in his hands as much as we can," said Angelle, who directed the Rebels to a 35-6 thrashing of District 5-4A foe Opelousas Friday night for homecoming at Clark Field.

"We have a fast tempo every week, and we're getting better and better."

That defense left little room for argument on Friday, while

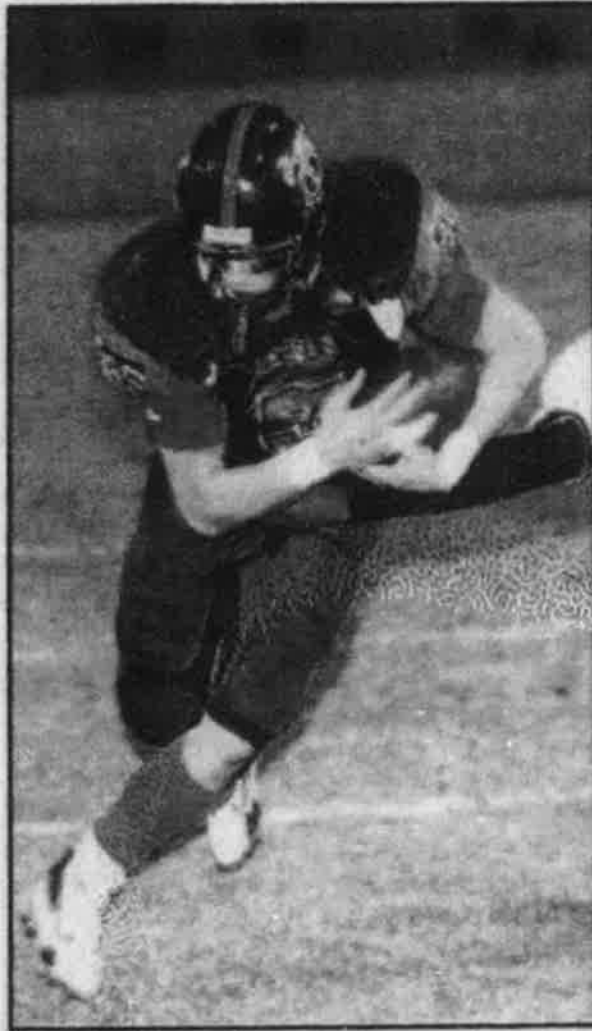
Opelousas fell to 2-2 on the year, dropping its league opener.

Rebels crush BC Gators

Teurlings Catholic's Andrew Hebert looked like a bull out of the chute. Then he burst to the sideline and looked more like a pure speed thoroughbred.

Whatever. According to the clock at Clark Field, he covered the 80 yards on the first play of the second half in just eight seconds, scoring his fourth touchdown and effectively burying Beau Chene, making the score 42-10.

The Gators put a couple of cosmetic touchdowns on the scoreboard to make the final 42-24, as the eighth-ranked Rebels moved to 4-1 overall and 3-0 in district play. The unranked, outnumbered and outmanned Gators dropped 1-3 and 1-2.

"Call him whatever you'd like," coach Sonny Charpentier said. "He's a glorified running back and we'll run him out that empty set. It puts pressure on the defense."

Talk about pressure. The 6-2, 215-pound senior

played running back, quarterback and flanker — and that was on the first series of the game.

There was no way the Gators could keep up with Hebert as he ran hog wild for 213 yards on 10 carries from every position. But that 21.3 yards per carry average doesn't even include the 45-yard kickoff return he had to keep Beau Chene from getting in the game.

Gator linebacker Dylan Stelly scored on a 34-yard interception return and looked like it might keep the Gators alive as they made it 21-10 in the first quarter.

But the Rebels' running man regained the momentum with his return and Teurlings never relinquished it again. Hebert heaped all the praise on the offensive line, but it was still the senior cutting chunks of yards out of the Gator defense and finishing what he started with a 10-yard scoring run four plays after the kickoff return, making it 28-10 to end of the first quarter.

Teurlings scored on six of its first seven possessions, showing off an offense that was hitting on all cylinders.

"I thought we had signs of putting it together last week (a 35-6 win over Opelousas)," Charpentier said. "That's when we started showing some signs of life."

That carryover was evident. The Rebels was definitely alive and well. Along with Hebert, sophomore quarterback Adam Angelle carried four times for 70 yards including a beauty zig-zagging 35-yard touchdown.

Senior Emmanuel Noel nearly cracked the 100-yard mark with 97 yards on six carries and a touchdown.

Noel might have had two scores but he fumbled at the two yard line and junior tight end Conner Green scooped the ball in stride giving Teurlings a 35-10 lead right at the halfway mark.

"We seized the momentum early and our guys did a great job of keeping it going," he said.

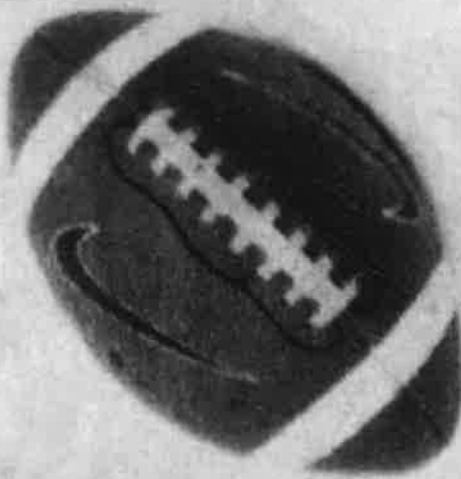

Versatile Hebert chosen for Player of the Week

Teurlings RB scored four times in win

Some players are quarterbacks or running backs or receivers or linebackers.

Teurlings Catholic's Andrew Hebert is one of those athletes who could do any of them.

As a freshman, he played some defensive end.

As a sophomore, he was an All-State tight end.

As a junior, he made a successful conversion to the backfield as a running back, while still catching a lot of passes.

So far as a senior, the 6-1, 195-pounder has watched his receptions drop as he's had to shoulder most of the rushing load as the primary running threat for the young Rebels' offense.

And if you listen to Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier, his best position is probably outside linebacker.

As a runner in Friday's 42-24 win over Beau Chene, Hebert did his job in a big way by rushing for 213 yards and four touchdowns to earn this week's Daily Advertiser Player of the Week recognition.

"Andrew's just a football player," Charpentier

said. "He's done so many different things for us over his career and done them all very well. He just likes to win. It doesn't matter to him if he's catching the ball or running it or whatever. He's just a football player."

After starting the game with a 3-yard touchdown run, Hebert followed it up in the second period with a 58-yard scoring run and later added touchdown runs of 9 and 80 yards to eclipse the 200-yard mark in only 10 carries.

For the season, Hebert is now rushing the area's third-leading rusher with 774 yards and 12 touchdowns on 92 carries, effectively handling the increased workload this season.

"He's fine (physically)," Charpentier said.

"He takes a beating now. He gets a lick and he delivered a lick, but he's a tough kid. He's as tough a kids as I've ever had physically and mentally, and he practices the same way that he plays."

With all the offensive success Hebert's had during his career with the Rebels, Charpentier claims that his best position down the road as a college performer will probably be on the defensive side of the ball.

"We use him on offense, because I feel like he can have a much greater impact for us on the offensive side of the ball," Charpentier said. "I'm convinced, though, that his position in college will be on the edge, kind of an outside linebacker-type, like a Grant Fleming at UL."

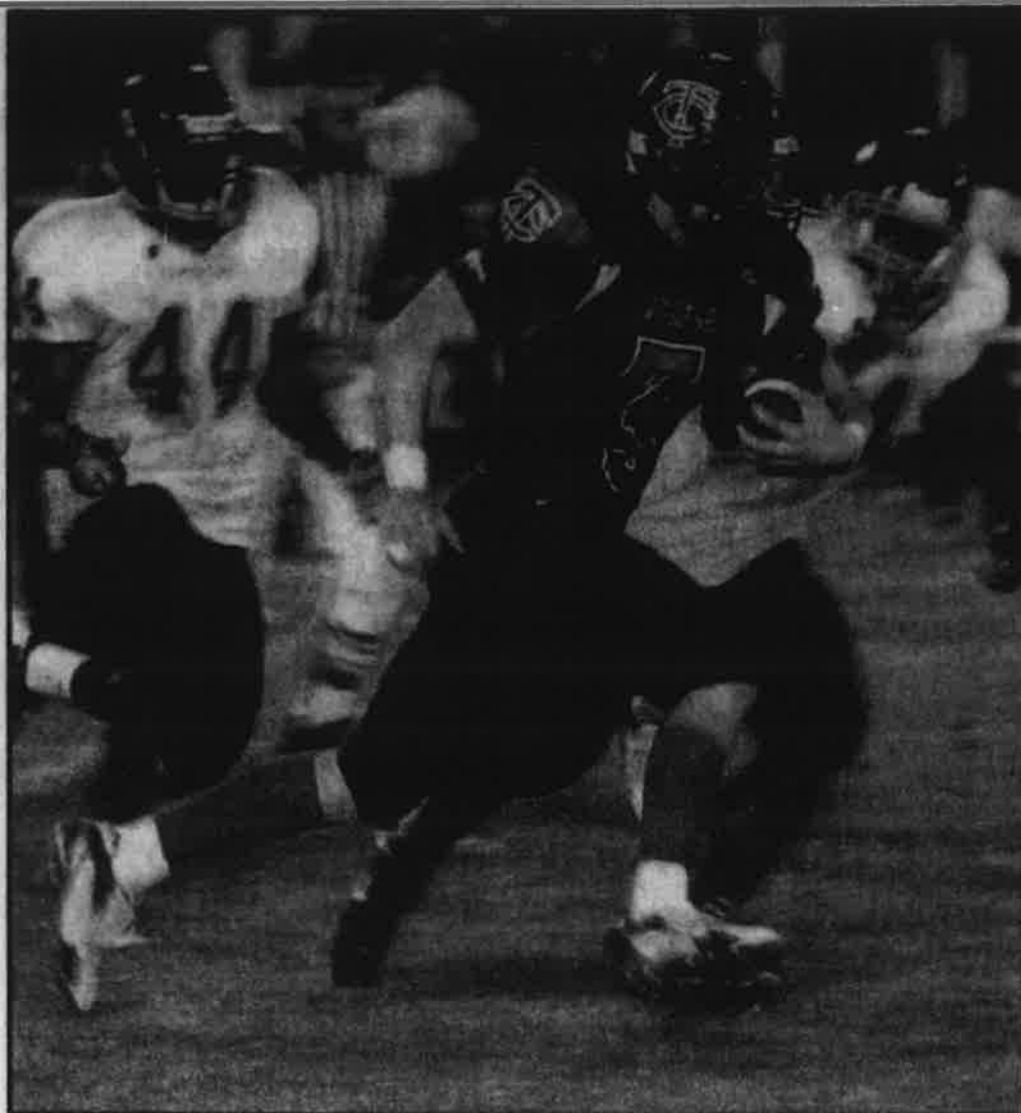

important to all four teams.

At Viking Stadium on Friday, a pair of 4-1 teams undefeated in District 5-4A play will square off. The two teams met last year for the first time since 1984 and Teurlings captured its first win in the five-game series in a 46-36 thriller.

As good as that game was, though, it did little to make Friday's rematch any more than another important game in the district standings.

"Nothing's changed," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "There's just not really anything there other than two good football teams playing. We've got along very well with them. We've used their stadium before and they've always been very gracious in dealing with us. Nobody's really crossed paths."

Northside coach Vincent DeRouen said he fully agrees with Charpentier's assessment and hasn't sensed that last year's game has added

any more to what is a non-rivalry between two teams just a few stone throws away from each other.

"Nothing has changed that I've seen," DeRouen said. "I haven't heard anything from the kids or anyone in the community that would make me think it's any different from last year."

And while it's curious, DeRouen thinks it's a good thing, even if the status doesn't change over time.

"I think it's good," he said. "I like it better this way. It becomes more about the kids this way. I'd rather it be about two good teams both trying to get to 5-1 than have all the animosity (that other rivalries produce). I hope it stays friendly."

While the last of games over the years may be one reason, it didn't seem to have the same affect when St. Thomas More and Northside began playing in the same district in 1985 after only two previous meetings in the two school's histories.

"Don't get me wrong, the kids are excited about the game," Charpentier said. "It's just that the kids don't really know each other and there's no

animosity between the kids."

The situation is a little different between Comeaux and St. Thomas More. Many of the players do know one another. Some of them are even neighbors.

The stakes are high here as well when the two teams meet Friday at Spartan Stadium.

And yet, St. Thomas More coach Jim Hightower said he wouldn't put the game-week or the game-time intensity meter any higher for Comeaux than when the Cougars play any other parish team or older district rival as St. Martinville or Breaux Bridge.

"It will be neighbor going against neighbor, so there will be some familiarity there between the kids," Hightower said. "It just isn't a longstanding rivalry, because we haven't played them that frequently."

"We have a lot more history with other programs. When we played last year, it was the first time in the last 10 years or so."

While it may not have the hatred and fierce history of Lafayette vs. Acadiana, Breaux Bridge

vs. Cecilia, Catholic High vs. Erath or Rayne vs. Crowley, Comeaux coach Brian Langlinais said that some elements of a rivalry are there between Comeaux and St. Thomas More.

"There's no animosity at all," Langlinais said. "A lot of the kids from both teams are friends and we're friends with their coaches, but there are some bragging rights for this side of town on the line."

"With so many of the kids knowing each other, there's naturally a pride factor there. It is going to be like a backyard football game."

The Cougars and Spartans have played seven times since the first meeting in 1989. One thing that may make it more of a focus for the Spartans is that fact that Comeaux High has never defeated St. Thomas More in football.

"Truthfully, I didn't realize that the two schools had played that many times, but our kids are aware of that (winless vs. STM), and hopefully that pride comes out Friday night and we can get that 'W'," Langlinais said.

receiver (Kyle Calais).

Vikings triumph in double OT

Northside wins close contest over Teurlings

Northside coach Vince DeRouen turned the tables on Teurlings Catholic Friday night, using a bit of the Rebels' speciality — a little trickery and a lot of prayer.

DeRouen kept a rosary in his right pocket, as he's done all season, and went to it from time-to-time for some divine intervention.

But in the fourth quarter with time winding down and his Vikings trailing 21-14, DeRouen decided to add a little insurance to the prayer.

DeRouen called for a double-pass at the Rebels' 25-yard line, and it completely caught the Rebels off-guard for the game-tying touchdown to send it into overtime.

The two teams traded field goals in the first overtime, then the Northside defense held the Rebels to a field goal in the second OT to set up Ridge Wilson's game-winning 1-yard touchdown run to boost the Vikings to a thrilling, 30-27 double-OT win over the Rebels.

"It's something my wife gave me, I keep it with me every game," DeRouen said of the rosary, which was specially made with tiny footballs as the beads. "I go to it a lot, especially in a game like tonight. If you see my hand in my pocket, I'm

praying." As for the double-pass, DeRouen said it's a play that never seems to work in practice, but was definitely worth the risk.

Quarterback Roshon Broussard threw a backward pass to receiver Dalfred Jones, who then threw it down the field to a wide open Jereon McGilvery for the 25-yard touchdown strike.

"It's a play we work on a lot in practice, it never works for us in practice," DeRouen said. "It set up perfectly, and I saw that they would probably bite on the screen."

The Vikings (5-1, 3-0), who were penalized 14 times for 110 yards in the contest, got a call

to go their way in the fourth to set up the game-tying TD.

On a third-and-20 situation at the 50-yard line, Roshon Broussard's pass to Dalfred Jones was incomplete. But the Rebels were flagged for pass interference when it appeared Jones and a teammate collided with each other.

"It was a horrible call, and this is the first time in 29 years of coaching that I've said something like that (on the record)," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "The (side judge) was out of position, the back judge tried to tell him the two guys ran into each other. The (back judge) was right in front of it, he tried to tell him it was the wrong call and he blew it."

"I like our chances if it's fourth-and-20."

Instead, the Vikings got it

first-and-10 at the Rebels 35-yard line. After a 13-yard run by Wilson, the Vikings went to the bag of tricks for the neutralizer.

"They did a great job of executing, caught us in man coverage," Charpentier said. "It's the first time we've seen them running it. They did a good job executing."

The teams went into overtime and neither offense could penetrate the goalline, instead settling for 25-yard field goals by Northside's Jacoby Angelle and Teurlings' Travis White.

After each team notched field goals in the first OT, the Vikings stuffed the Rebels and forced White to hit a 26-yard field goal to go up 27-24.

The Vikings opened their possession with a big 9-yard run by Terrell Alfred down to the 1-yard line and Wilson punched it in from there for the game-winner.

"I knew once our defense held them to the field goal that we had it," said Wilson, who ran for 115 yards and two TDs in the win. "It was a big win for us, Teurlings has a great team. But we have another big one next week with Breau Bridge."

The Vikings did an admirable job on Teurlings tailback Andrew Hebert, who entered the game with 774 yards and 12 touchdowns. Northside held the senior to 79 yards on 20 carries.

"I don't want to take anything away from Northside," Charpentier said. "I thought both teams played really hard, competed really hard. It's one of those games when you hate to be on the short end of the stick."

Rebels tame Tigers

For years, Teurlings Catholic has been lauded for its potent offensive attack.

Those offensive fireworks were on display again Friday night as the Rebels rolled to a 38-7 District 5-4A victory over St. Martinville. But Tiger head coach Marc Broussard was more impressed with the Teurlings defensive effort.

"Their offense is very good and it's getting better each week. That's obvious from watching them on film," Broussard said. "But nobody talks a lot about their defense. They do a lot of good things on defense."

The 10th-ranked Rebels moved into a tie for second in the rugged 5-4A race by holding St. Martinville to six first downs and not allowing the Tigers inside their 20-yard-line until the game's final 10 minutes. By that time, Teurlings (5-2, 4-1) had taken a 31-0 lead.

The Tigers went three-and-out on seven of their first nine possessions through two and one-half quarters and had only one first down each in their other two chances.

"This was only the second time this year that our guys had seen the Wing-T," said Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier. "It's tough to get ready for in only one week, but our guys did a great job with it. They had some good field position a couple of times and we didn't let them take advantage of it."

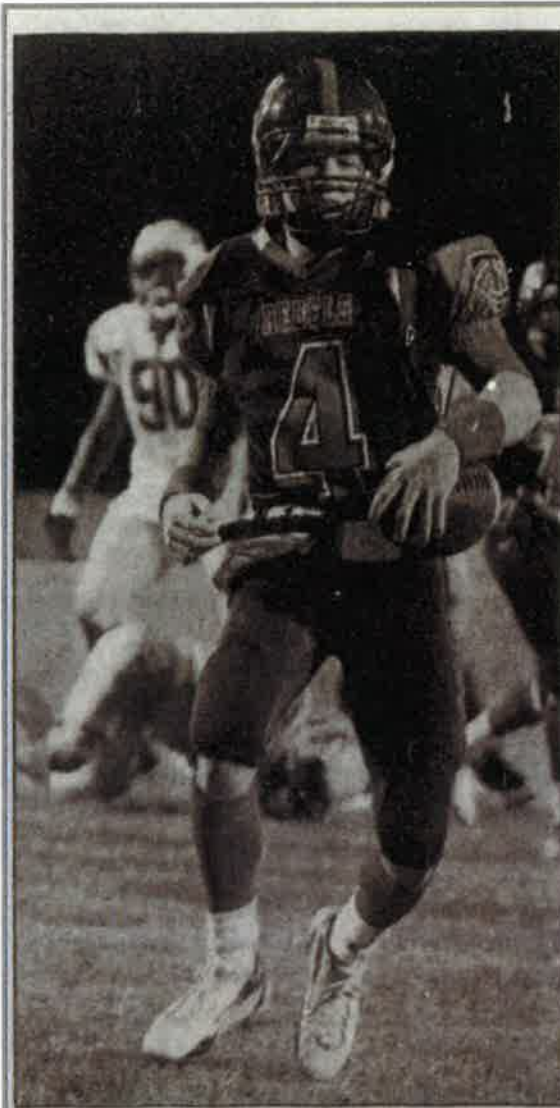
The Rebels also had Emmanuel Noel on their side. The senior running back, often lost in teammate Andrew Hebert's big rushing performances, broke loose for 150 yards on only five carries and scored three touchdowns.

Noel matched his season touchdown total with scoring runs of 37, 50 and seven yards, the first two on quick bursts directly up the hash marks. The first of those came with 6:57 left in the opening period and gave the Rebels the lead for good.

"He knows where to go when he gets the ball," Charpentier said. "It's that deal about a straight line being the shortest distance between two points. I wasn't that good in math, but I know he runs north and south."

Tigers take a stand

Rebels' key drive fails on goal line in battle for second in 5-4A

BREAUX BRIDGE — It was almost as if Breaux Bridge's Tim Duhon was in the Teurlings Catholic huddle.

When Rebel quarterback Adam Angelle sprinted out to his left on a first-and-five play at the Rebels' own 45-yard line late in the game with the Tigers clinging to a 6-0 lead, he barely had enough time to go through his progressions, let alone make a throw.

Duhon was there to gobble him up all the way back at the Rebel 45-yard line.

The sack punctuated a dominant night on defense for the Tigers as they limited the potent Rebel attack to only 130 yards of total offense and came up with a big goal line stand in the third quarter to pull out a 6-0 win over the rival Rebels.

"It's all about the coaches preparing us all week," Duhon said. "I knew what they were about to run. I knew they were about to run a sprint-out. On the sprint-out, I have to fire off the end. I just had to take on the back and get past him."

"It was a big play, but I think the play of the game was when our defensive back Trevence Patt made that big

play on the quarterback on the goal line."

Duhon is referring to the Tigers' goal line stand which preserved the victory and moved the Tigers to 6-2 overall and 5-1 in District 5-4A.

Patt made a big play on Adam Angelle's scamper down to the 1-yard line, turn-

ing Angelle back into the meat of the Breaux Bridge defense.

From there, the Tigers stuffed Andrew Hobert on two goal-line runs from the 1-yard line. Breaux Bridge then turned around and drove out of the shadows of its own end zone and melted eight minutes off the clock in the process.

"We had a chance on the goal line and it didn't happen," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Then hopefully you get a turnover and we almost got a turnover, but you have to give them credit."

"They were on the one-yard line and made some plays and were able to kill the clock a little."

The Tigers' lone touchdown of the night came during a first quarter in which the Breaux Bridge defense continued to push Teurlings deeper and deeper into its own territory.

Eventually, that push paid off as Teurlings muffed a punt at their own 16-yard line. Two plays later, Breaux Bridge got all the points they needed with a 10-yard touchdown pass from Hunter Landry to Dayne Thibodeaux.

"They've got a good football team, we've got a good football team," Breaux Bridge coach Mike Mowad said. "We were just hoping we wouldn't give up a big play. We knew that if we didn't give up any big plays, it would be a kicking game, a field position game, which it was tonight."

"I just can't say enough about our defense, that goal line stand was big right there."

Rebels survive

Long-distance touchdowns by Emmanuel Noel and Kyle Calais, coupled with the bruising runs of workhorse Andrew Hebert, enabled Teurlings Catholic to withstand the one-man show of Jennings quarterback Bryson Abraham in Thursday night's regular season finale at Clark Field.

Conner Green claimed a JHS onside kick with 17 seconds remaining to preserve the 24-18 victory after Abraham scored three second-half touchdowns and almost overcame a 17-0 TCHS lead.

It was a perfect spot for an upset, with the Rebels coming off a rugged 6-0 District 5-4A loss to Breaux Bridge and the playoffs looming next week. And when starting quarterback Adam Angelle re-injured his left ankle in the third period, the door was open.

But the Rebels survived to finish 6-3 heading into postseason play.

"When we lost 6-0 last week, it made us mad," said Hebert, who

carried 23 times for 197 yards and became the first 1,000-yard rusher for coach Sonny Charpentier at the school. "It made us want to do better."

"I'm going to give our guys credit for winning the game," said Charpentier. "In the first half, we left too many points off the board. You're always nervous when you play an athlete like Abraham. I'm just glad we were two scores up when they scored at the end."

Noel knifed through a huge hole and raced to a 55-yard touchdown on the game's first play, and Calais put the Rebels up 14-0 with a 42-yard punt return. Both teams squandered opportunities to leave it that way at halftime.

A 34-yard Travis White field goal put the Rebels ahead 17-0 midway through the third quarter, and they looked in control. But Angelle turned his ankle on that drive and the visiting Bulldogs revived behind Abraham's often life-saving scrambles.

He capped a 12-play, 77-yard drive with a 12-yard run, only to have TCHS respond with a 71-yard

march capped by Noel's 22-yard run. Abraham scores of 2 yards with 5:53 left and 1 yard with 17 ticks remaining narrowed the final tally.

The victory reflected Hebert's value to the Rebels, gaining big yards, drawing attention away from Noel and even recovering a Rebel fumble while ahead 24-12 at the 5-minute mark.

"We've asked Andrew to carry the load this year," Charpentier said. "He has played four different positions for us, and has done what we've asked him to do. And (running back) is probably not his best position. He affects the game and does a great job. And, I think Emmanuel is starting to feed off him for big gains."

"I've been with the program for four years, and you just learn to go with things," Hebert said. "Coach has everybody blocking. It's never just you. The line blocks well, and it never hurts to have another great back like Emmanuel with you."

Obviously, it's a winning combination.
