Carencro Bears survive slugfest with Rebels

Thursday night's Kiwanis Jamboree finale at Cajun Field started off as a scorefest in the first half, but ended up being a penalty-fest in the second half as the Carencro Golden Bears edged the Teurlings Catholic Rebels 28-21.

The two offenses took turns slicing and dicing the opposing defense in the first half with both teams scoring twice to go into the half tied at 14-14.

In the second half, though, the Golden Bears took control as Alex

Johnson returned the second-half kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown and a 21-14 lead.

Teurlings was game on keeping the shootout going, as they drove into Carencro territory on their next possession, but Adam Angelle fumbled at the Golden Bear 25-yard line to turn the ball over.

The Bears turned that fumble into the game-winner as Jalen Nixon kept it around the right end and raced 54 yards for the touchdown to put Carencro up 28-14.

The Rebels didn't give up, though, and made a game of it as D'Shale Landon hooked up with

Adam Angelle for a 14-yard touchdown pass to cap off a 73-yard scoring drive.

The Rebels tried for the onside kick, but Carencro recovered to run out the clock.

The two teams went back-and-forth in the first half, with the Rebels scoring on an 8-yard touchdown run from Landon to Dylan Bossier and a 2-yard run by Devonte Jackson.

Landon finished with 175 yards passing on a 13-of-20 slate. Paul Begnaud added 65 yards on the ground.

The Bears' first half touchdowns both came on the ground as Damian

Rubin scored from 37 yards out and Johnson scored from 18.

Rubin rushed for 55 yards on four carries. Nixon ran for 54 yards on two carries and Johnson ran for 45 yards on six totes.

The only time the offenses were stopped were in the second half when the flags started to fly. The two teams combined for 18 penalties and 151 yards in penalties.

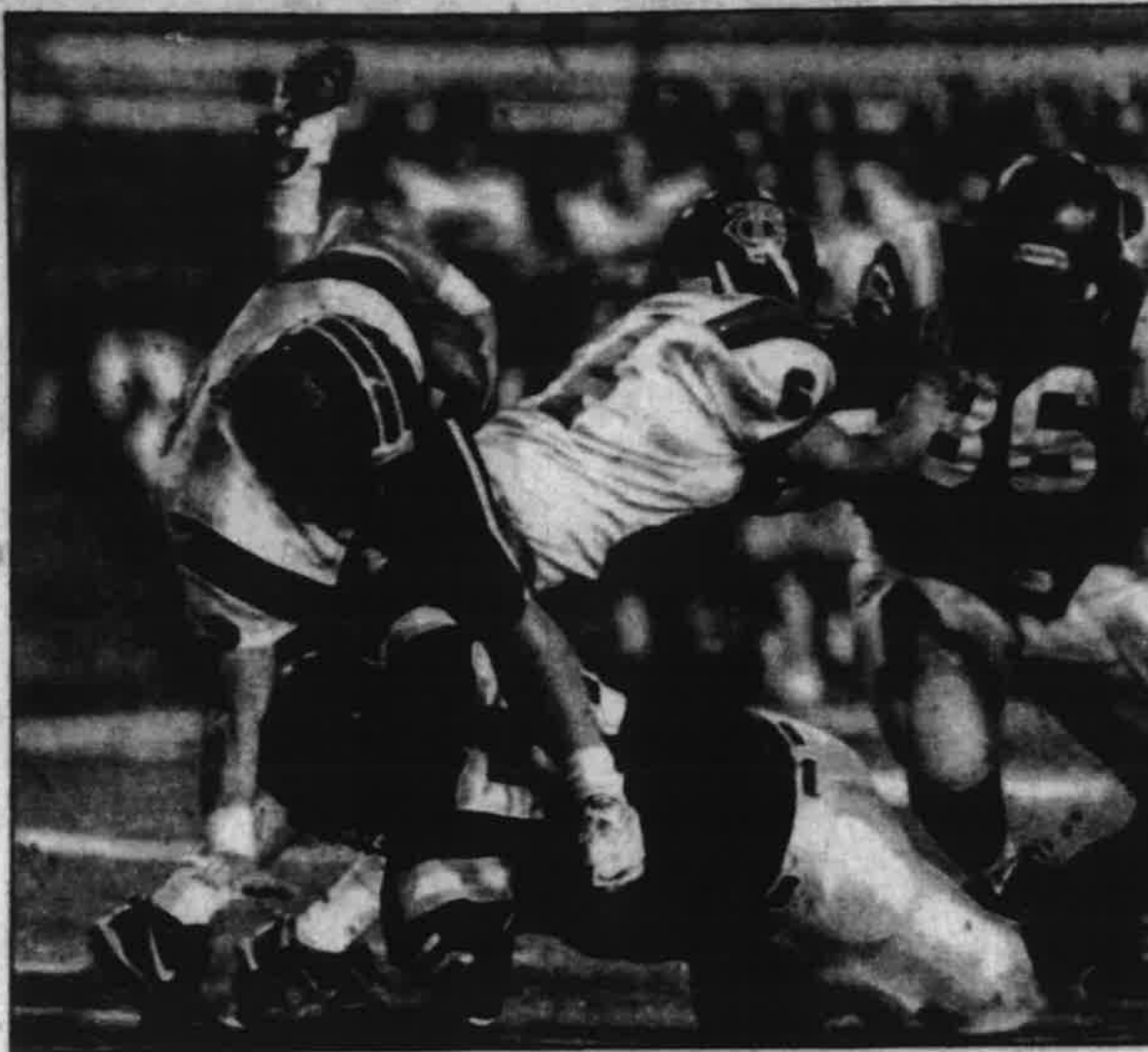
The Bears had another spectacular run by Nixon called back on one of those penalties, wiping out a 42-yard TD run at the end of the game.

Skinny: Rebels return six starters on offense, including playmakers quarterback D'Shaie Landor, split end Dylan Bossier and slot back Adam Angelle. Plenty of motivation to improve on last year's first non-playoff season under coach Sonny Charpentier.

Analysis: If Carencro is No. 6, it makes sense to have Teurlings right underneath them. Teurlings actually played Carencro heads up on Thursday night, but fumbled inside Carencro territory. If that turnover doesn't happen, we're probably looking at a 28-28 tie. But like Carencro, the Rebels have some work to do on defense. They open with No. 3 Notre Dame on Thursday in Crowley.

Epic clash

Rivals Teurlings, Notre Dame kick off 2010 football season tonight

Anybody familiar with the Teurlings-Notre Dame football rivalry certainly doesn't need a history lesson.

But for those new to the scene, the Rebels and Pios have played 35 times since 1975.

Since 2003, the two teams have been scheduled to meet every year in the season opener.

Twice during the course of the rivalry, the game has been canceled by hurricanes — Hurricane Gustav in 2008 and Hurricane Lili in 2002.

This is one of those rivalries where if either team had a record, you'd throw it out the window.

"It's Teurlings-Notre Dame, there's not much more you need to say about it," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said.

Teurlings hasn't beaten the Pios since the 2004 season, when the Rebels beat Notre Dame 19-6 at Clark Field.

Last year, the Pios beat the Rebels 30-13 en route to a 15-0 record and Class 3A state title. Meanwhile, the Rebels limped to a 4-6 record and the program's first non-playoff season under

coach Sonny Charpentier.

"It seems like they've set themselves up for a redemption season," Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook said. "They're trying to get over that sting of not being in the playoffs. I would say they're coming in with a greater sense of urgency."

"When it's Notre Dame-Teurlings, it's always the first game so you don't know how it's going to go. But they

always come at us, and hopefully we'll go back at them."

Both teams are coming off jamboree losses and hoping for better efforts in the season opener. The Pios dropped a 15-0 loss to the Acadiana Wreckin' Rams, while the Rebels lost a shootout against Carencro, 28-21.

Despite the losses, though, both coaches were impressed with what they saw in their opponent this week.

"The quarterback's (Teurlings' D'Shaie Landor) improved a great deal from when we played him," Cook said. "He's a lot better and (split end Dylan) Bossier and (slot back) Adam Angelle have another year under their belt. I think putting (tailback Paul) Begnaud in the backfield makes them a better offense."

"Their offense is always in mid-season form in jamboree and first two games. They definitely present some matchup problems with how they spread the field."

The Pios were dominated in their game against Acadiana, but Charpentier said he doesn't expect that to have any lingering effect on Notre Dame.

"Acadiana's obviously outstanding in what they do," Charpentier said. "(Acadiana) comes off the ball really well, better

than any team I've seen. So I don't know if you can get a whole lot from that."

"Looking on film, they (Notre Dame) still have some kids that can play. We have our work cut out for us. We have to go over there and play hard."

Both teams feature playmakers at quarterback, with Stu Cook moving over from tailback to quarterback to replace graduated Ryan Leonards. The Rebels feature junior D'Shaie Landor, who threw for 175 yards in the jamboree against Carencro.

"(Cook is) one of those guys that when he gets back in the pocket and he has running lanes, that's when he really becomes dangerous," Charpentier said. "He's really a tailback by trade. When you've gotta worry about that kind of quarterback, it adds so many other problems to you."

"You get everybody covered, and the next thing you know, he slips pressure and scampers for a first down. I think that's one thing D'Shaie will be able to offer us this year."

Landor did show a calmness in the pocket, as well as a willing to tuck and run, which was evident by his 54 yards rushing on four carries last Thursday against Carencro.

"They make you defend the whole field," Cook said. "The quarterback is a threat to run, so you have to defend against that. They do a good job with what they do. They execute well and their timing is always good."

Pioneers pull away

Late drive helps ND rout Rebels

CROWLEY — It's a nice feeling to be a quarterback engineering a time-consuming, game-clinching drive over a rival, and it doesn't hurt if it gets the season started in the right direction.

Notre Dame senior Stu Cook enjoyed that feeling here Thursday night, driving the Pioneers 81 yards in 14 plays and capping it with a surprise 15-yard pass to tight end Brandon Sonnier.

The score, coming after a Teurlings Catholic touchdown was called back by penalty, put Notre Dame ahead 27-6 on the way to a 34-6 victory for the 2009 Class 3A state champions.

"We had been trying to hit the tight end dump pass against their blitz," Cook said. "This time it was wide open."

The march featured eight carries for 47 yards by Logan Venable, and Luke Besse had a key 15-yard run to the TCHS 24. The Rebels were back on their heels by the time Cook threw the touchdown.

"It's nice when you can hand off and turn around and see your offensive line-men 7-8 yards downfield," Cook said. "That makes it easy for our backs."

The game was loaded with big plays and momentum swings.

Notre Dame scored first as Kevin Johnston blocked a Jansen Calais punt and

recovered it in the end zone for a 7-0 lead with just 54 seconds left in the first quarter. When the Rebels fumbled away the ensuing kickoff, it took the Pios three plays to score again on Besse's 22-yard run.

The Rebels struck back just 48 seconds later when D'Shaie Landor found Christian Landry for a 64-yard touchdown bomb, and they were driving again before fumbling away on the Notre Dame 18. Four plays after that, Cook hit Zack D'Aquin for a 71-yard score and a 20-6 halftime lead.

It was the first crucial two-touchdown swing of the contest.

Coach Sonny Charpentier's Rebels proved resilient, putting together a 7 1/2-minute march in the third period sparked by a 14-yard scramble by Landor and a 10-yard run by Adam Angelle, whose injury-induced absence for most

of the first half hurt early TCHS chances.

Angelle's run was an apparent score, but he stepped out of bounds. Then from the ND 16, Landor hit Angelle for another TD, but a downfield blocking whistle called it back. Landor then missed into the end zone, and the Pios responded with their time-crunching drive.

The final TD was a 41-yard interception return off Landor by Ricky Stoma.

"With the exception of a couple of plays, I thought our defense did a good job," Charpentier said. "But our offense turned the ball over and our special teams were horrible. Then the touchdown got called back and on that last drive they wore us down."

"Give Notre Dame credit. They did a good job of scheming us. They always do."

"We made the plays

when we had to," Pioneers coach Lewis Cook said. "The first touchdown on the blocked punt was huge, and the pass to Zack gave us a little cushion. That last drive was the difference in the game. They had the touchdown called back, and we were able to finish and eat up the clock."

Teurlings Rebels roll on the road

MATHEWS — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels spent a week seeking improvement after an opening loss at Notre Dame, and that effort paid off on Friday night with a 29-7 victory over Central Lafourche.

Coach **Sonny Charpentier's** squad rolled to a 22-0 halftime lead and cruised in from there to even their record at 1-1 looking ahead to next week's crosstown battle at Comeaux.

Adam Angelle and Paul Begnaud provided

the needed spark against Central Lafourche.

Angelle escaped for a 60-yard punt return to put the visitors in command 16-0, and then scored again before halftime on a 24-yard run to enable TCHS to gain separation.

Begnaud provided bookend scores on runs of 37 and 2 yards.

The homestanding Trojans finally scored in the fourth period, but by then the Rebels had decided the issue with a balanced attack that featured 203 yards on the ground and 196 through the air.

Terrebonne 35, Lafayette High 21

HOUMA — Mike Williams was too much for Lafayette High's Mighty Lions on Friday night.

The Terrebonne quarterback ran for one touchdown and threw for two more deciding scores in a wild fourth quarter as the Tigers pulled away from LHS 35-21 to improve to 2-0 on the season.

With the score tied at 21 apiece in the fourth quarter, Williams found Cameron Pellegrin for a 15-yard touchdown pass to break the deadlock with

5:46 to play. He then drove a dagger in Lions' hopes when Robert Gordon took a screen pass 68 yards for the clincher.

Lafayette's Jordan Romero had pulled the visitors even in the first minute of the fourth quarter when he scored from a yard away.

Comeaux coach Kevin Magee is beyond the point of moral victories.

After back-to-back close losses to open the season, he'd like to get a real victory.

The Spartans will go in search of that first win tonight when they play host to the Teurlings Catholic Rebels in a 7 p.m. kickoff.

"(Last week's 19-16 loss to Northside) wasn't so much a moral victory, it's a game we walked off the field and I felt we could have won and should have won," Magee said. "I thought we improved from week one to week two.

"If we played with that kind of energy in week one, that game might have been a different situation."

Comeaux has lost two games by a combined five points heading into tonight's showdown with the Rebels.

"I told the players after the game, you've heard all year about how good a team Northside was and we played them tooth and nail, so what does that say about us,"

Magee said. "If you throw out the first half of the first game, we've given up 19 points in six quarters."

Magee said. "That score is kind of deceiving.

"They are a veteran ball club, they have a lot of starters back. It's another tough challenge for us."

Both teams are led by junior quarterbacks — Teurlings is led by D'Shaie Landor, while Comeaux is led by Kevin Fouquier.

Rebels explode

Landor, Angelle lift Teurlings Catholic to blowout road win over Spartans

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels didn't really know what type of performance it was going to take in order for them to be successful against the Comeaux Spartans, so they turned in arguably their best performance of the young season.

Behind the combination of an explosive passing and running attack, coupled with an opportunistic defense the Rebels made defeating the Spartans look relatively easy en route to a 45-20 victory Friday night in non-district action at Spartan Stadium.

"Obviously when you score 45 points you are doing something right," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Offensively we did a lot of good things tonight (Friday). We were able to mix the run and the pass and our defense played well enough to help us win. It was a total team effort."

Offensively, the Rebels racked up 479 yards of total offense including 292 yards passing by D'Shaile Landor, who was unstoppable. Landor was sensational, completing 13-of-15 passes for 292 yards and three touchdowns.

"I think I did well," Landor said. "But there are always things that I can improve on. My offensive line did a good job of protecting for me and my receivers did a great job of catching the ball. It's a lot easier to be success-

ful) when you have both the pass and run working effectively, because the defense doesn't know what's coming."

Rebels senior receiver Adam Angelle came away impressed with the performance turned in by Landor, who also rushed for 34 yards on four tries.

"D'Shaile did really well," said Angelle, who was equally impressive hauling in five passes for 133 yards and a touchdown. "He had a lot of time to throw the football, because our offensive line did an unbelievable job blocking tonight. He played extremely well."

Charpentier said Landor's desire to learn has aided in his success.

"D'Shaile is an extremely bright person," Charpentier said. "He takes coaching really well. He wants to learn. He wants to get better. But

tonight was a total team effort, because the guys upfront did a good job of blocking for him."

Landor enjoyed having the ball bounce his way on the Rebels opening drive, when he connected with senior receiver Christian Landry for a 71-yard touchdown pass although the ball wasn't originally intended for him. Landor dropped back to pass on the second play from scrimmage and threw the football in the direction of Angelle, but it was too high for him to catch.

The ball then sailed over the head of two Spartans defenders and right into the hands of Landry, who raced up the sideline for the score.

"I knew the football was going to be over his (Angelle) head as soon as I let the ball go," Landor said. "But luckily for me my receiver Landry made

a great play on the ball and caught it."

Trailing 7-0, the Spartans responded immediately on the ensuing kickoff when Quintonterries Augustine returned the football 80 yards for a touchdown to tie the game 7-7 with 10:48 remaining in the first.

But that would prove to be the last highlight for the Spartans in the first quarter as the Rebels went on to take a commanding 21-7 lead behind a second touchdown pass by Landor to Chase Garrett and a 4-yard touchdown run by Paul Begnaud.

The Spartans trimmed the margin to 21-14 with 6:28 remaining in the second quarter on a 1-yard TD run by Jordan Porter.

From that point on the Rebels dominated the football game, as Landor connected with Angelle for a 69-yard touchdown pass with 5:50 remaining in the second quarter to give Teurlings a 28-14 lead.

The Rebels extended their first half lead to 21 on a 3-yard touchdown run by Jeremy Jones, giving TCH a comfortable 35-14 lead going into halftime.

"We came out very explosive offensively," Angelle said. "Our goal was to take it to them early and we did that. We played really well as a team tonight (Friday)."

After a scoreless third quarter, the Rebels extended their lead to 45-14 behind a 40-yard field goal by Christian Hurst and a interception return for a touchdown by defensive back Josh Fontenot.

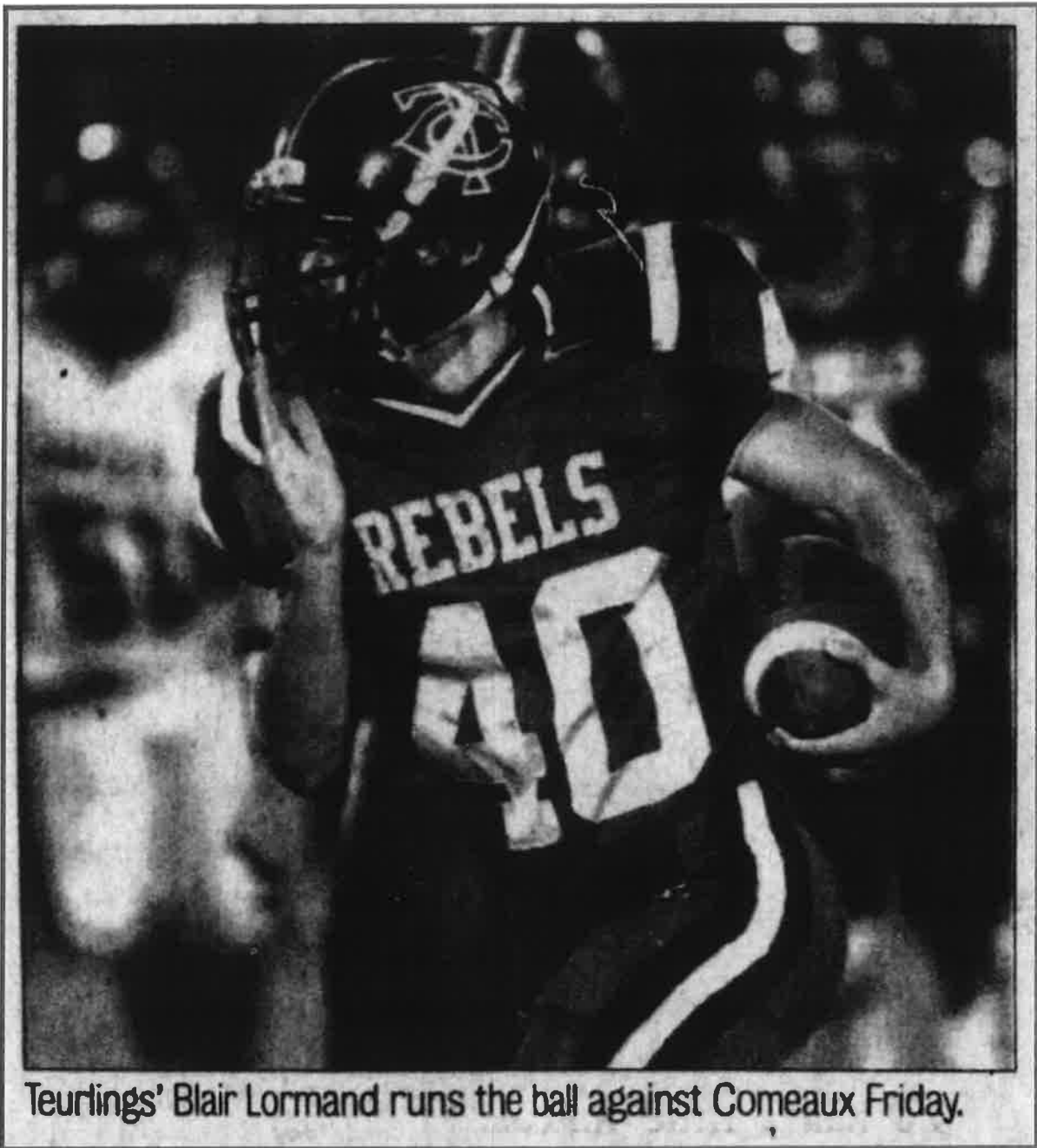

Double trouble

Dual-threat quarterbacks all the rave

By and large, football is a covecat sport.

In the 1980s, when Nebraska and Oklahoma was dominating college football, coaches across the country installed option offenses.

When Bill Walsh and the San Francisco 49ers began their NFL dynasty in the 90s, the West Coast offense became all the rave.

These days, most coaches are looking for the next Michael Vick, Vince Young or Terrell Pryor.

If you look at college football the last few years, it's been going that direction," Ville Platte coach Roy Serie said. "It's getting to where you're putting a running back at quarterback, especially if he can throw it a little bit."

That has certainly trickled down to the prep level and specifically the Acadiana area. Several area quarterbacks have been equally dangerous on the ground as they have been through the air.

Serie's star player Cody Jones has been the best of the bunch, rushing for 469 yards and six TDs, while throwing for 456 yards and five touchdowns.

But Jones is certainly not alone. Lafayette's Jordan

Romero (258 passing, 3 TDs; 222 rushing, 9 TDs), Comeaux's Kevin Fouquier (341 passing, 1 TD; 151 rushing, 3 TDs), Northside's Jasper Turner (602 passing, 3 TDs; 146 rushing, 4 TDs) and Crowley's Tusconi Figaro (341 passing, 4 TDs; 159 rushing, 2 TDs) have been other area quarterbacks showing off their propensity to take off and run at a moment's notice.

"I definitely think it's a trend," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Those guys are tough to prepare for. Sometimes you prefer when a guy just throws it."

Charpentier has almost always had a traditional drop-back passer in his offense.

But that changed with the arrival of D'Shaie Landor to the high school. Landor has thrown for 605 yards and six touchdowns while averaging 6.5 yards per carry when he tucks and runs.

"I've never been a big proponent of letting my guys take off and run," Charpentier said. "We do have one that can run. We don't do a lot of option, but we like it when he keeps the play alive with his feet. This year he's done a remarkable job of picking and choosing."

"That's the difference between a quarterback and an athlete playing quarterback. I think he's a football player playing quarterback. A lot of guys will put their best athlete and he's just an athlete playing that position. The first sign of trouble, he go back to his natural instincts. Like the saying goes, a scared rabbit always runs back to his favorite hole. D'Shaie uses his legs to look for second and third receivers."

In the case of both Landor and Jones, they're quarterbacks first — with an ability to run. And Serie said that seems to be the difference between good dual-threat QBs and great ones.

"It's a definite benefit to have a guy that can also throw," Serie said. "They have some schools where it ends up being more of a Wildcat offense. You know he's going to run it. When you have a guy that can throw it well, it puts pressure on the defense."

And despite what many people may think, the offense doesn't necessarily change with the quarterback. Charpentier said the Rebels haven't made a lot of wholesale changes with their offensive scheme.

"We still run the same offense we've run the last few years," Charpentier said. "The difference is this year I told him we want him to make a play when it's there. If everything else fails, make a play with your legs."

Teurlings runs past SMSH with 38-0 win

It's hard to imagine Friday's district opener going any smoother for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels, who scored seemingly at will in the first half, then took their foot off the gas after intermission to finish with a 38-0 victory over St. Martinville at Clark Field.

Coach Sonny Charpentier's squad improved to 3-1 overall in the District 6-4A opener, while SMSH fell to 1-3, 0-1.

"The good sign for me was that our team showed up ready to play, no matter who the opponent was, and I mean no disrespect to St. Martinville when I say that," Charpentier

said. "I think that shows the maturity level on this team. We've got good senior leadership."

That was more than enough against an outmanned Tigers squad that lists 21 sophomores on the roster. It was also the latest installment in a pattern; in four meetings with SMSH, Teurlings is 4-0 and has outscored the Tigers 169-39.

The only bad sign was the sight of junior quarterback D'Shaie Landor seated on the sidelines in the second half with an ice pack on his right foot.

"It looks like he's got a turf toe," Charpentier said. "We were only going to play him one series in the second half anyway, so this allowed us to ice it earlier. I think he'll be all

right."

Since it was 35-0 at half-time, there was no need to risk the TCHS starter with a road game at Opelousas coming up next week.

"This was big for us to open district with a win," said senior running back Adam Angelle. "This sets the tone. Now we need to keep pushing forward."

Angelle scored on a 38-yard run to run the score to 28-0 and totalled 99 yards on just five carries, all in the first half. He subbed at quarterback for Landor to start the second half, and promptly drove the team to a field goal for the final margin.

Landor started the game well, hitting Christian Landry for a 48-yard touchdown on the third Rebels snap of the

night and scrambling 25 yards to make it 14-0.

The third score came when Josh Fontenot blocked a punt and Nick Neumeyer pounced on it in the end zone, while Paul Begnaud's 1-yard plunge made it 35-0 at the break.

"It wasn't hard to focus for a game like this because we're coached well," Angelle said. "That keeps our heads straight. When we looked at them on film, we saw some good players. Our job was to play hard, get open and run hard."

"We ran the ball really well tonight. The (offensive) line's blocking was outstanding. There were some big holes."

The Rebels finished with 248 yards rushing, a total diminished by late

kneel-downs, as Begnaud (68 yards) provided power behind Angelle's speed.

St. Martinville, meanwhile, managed just 85 yards of offense. Senior running back Eddie Nelson provided most of that, with 68 yards on 16 carries.

"We have to keep pushing forward," Angelle said. "We can't bring ourselves down. We have to keep working hard in practice."

"The seniors understand the importance of keeping our focus," Charpentier said. "This is their football team. God willing, the rest of us will be back next year. But this is it for them. They understand that. We need to take the opportunity to get better each time out."

Turner has thrown for 998 yards this season on a 67-of-105 slate with six TDs and eight interceptions. Landor has thrown for 740 yards on 46-of-74 passing with six TDs and four picks.

said. "We felt like a lot of the things that happened last week were because of a lack of effort. We knew we had to pick it up this week."

A 31-yard Turner completion to tight end Jaquell Carter is what ignited the Vikings' offense. Terrell Alfred followed with a 32-yard TD run to narrow the gap to 21-12 with 7:32 left in the third.

Amazingly, though, Northside's offense was just heating up. Turner's highlight-film, 32-yard run preceded Alfred's 14-yard TD run to inch closer at 21-18 with 3:47 left in the third.

The third score was of the one-play variety, an 87-yard hook-up with Dwayne Benjamin to give the Vikings the lead for good at 28-21 with 56 seconds left until the third.

"Coach (DeRouen) felt like we needed to get the ball down the field," Turner said. "I enjoy both (running and passing). That run was a lot of run, but I've been really working on becoming more of a pocket passer."

Fullback Ulysse Mouton then got into the act with two carries for 28 yards to set up Alfred's fourth TD of the night, and then got a 34-yard TD run of his own for the 40-27 final.

"Nothing against Teurlings," DeRouen said. "They have an outstanding team. But at the half, we just felt like it was things we were doing wrong that was keeping us from running the ball more effectively."

The corrections worked. Alfred finished with 125 yards and four

scores on 26 carries.

"They did a great job of sticking to their game plan," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "He (Turner) was impressive with the things he did and the things he didn't do. He did a good job of taking some sacks rather than just throwing it up for grabs."

Northside's furious third quarter overshadowed a stellar first half-plus for the Rebels. Teurlings QB D'Shaie Landor connected with Dylan Bossier on a 73-yard TD pass to get things going, before Adam Angelle gave the Rebels a 14-6 halftime lead with a 1-yard TD run.

Vikings uprising

Northside explodes in second half to claim key 6-4A win over Rebels

In their first eight possessions of Friday's huge District 6-4A showdown with Teurlings Catholic at Clark Field on Friday, the Northside Vikings hadn't exactly got their offense on track just yet.

The eight drives had produced one touchdown, two interceptions, one fumble, three punts and one turnover on downs.

The next five, however, the Vikings looked like a well-oiled machine ready for the Indianapolis 500.

Touchdowns on five consecutive possessions quickly transformed a 21-6 third-quarter deficit into an impressive 40-27 victory over the Rebels.

Northside improved to 4-2 overall and 2-0, while Teurlings fell to 4-2 and 2-1.

"Our offense has been on track for a while now," Northside coach Vincent DeRouen said. "Our problems were self-inflicted. I really think that what happened to us last week, though, helped the kids deal with some early turnovers. I think that helped us tonight."

Rebels spoil party

Teurlings outlasts Lafayette High in shootout win over Mighty Lions

Teurlings Catholic spoiled the party.

On a night when Lafayette High honored its 1965 Mighty Lions who reached the state semifinals and finished 11-1, the visiting Rebels created memories of their own on Friday by surviving a wild 33-27 shootout to improve to 5-2 on the season.

Paul Begnaud rushed for 85 yards and four touchdowns and caught three crucial passes for 65 more yards to spearhead the effort, while D'Shaie Landor ran for 101 yards and a score and passed for 100 more.

"We felt we could do all the things we'd been able to do before," Landor said. "We kept our wits about us, and just did what we did."

The Rebels' task was made tougher when halfback Adam Angelle sat out the second half with an injury, making Begnaud's play all the more vital.

"Without Adam, our whole offense had to adjust," Landor said. "We had to depend on other players to make plays. We put it on other shoulders."

The game wasn't decided until Teurlings went for it on fourth-and-6 from the LHS 44-yard line with

said. "We let our emotions get to us. We didn't control them."

The two squads traded punches in a long, wild first half that ended 21-21. Romero started the scoring with a 4-yard run, countered by a 1-yard Begnaud plunge. Devin Benjamin scored on a 7-yard run, then the Rebels responded with Landor's 66-yard TD run and a 2-yard Begnaud blast to go up 21-14.

Ray Thompson capped a 12-play, 69-yard LHS drive from a yard away with 52 seconds left in the half, and the two foes had settled nothing.

Devonte' Jackson's 33-yard run set up Begnaud from a yard away as the Rebels opened the second half with a score, and Landor's 38-yard pass to Begnaud to the LHS 32 set the stage for Begnaud's 1-yarder with 17 seconds

left in the third period.

The Lions, whose first two second-half possessions ended in lost fumbles and who failed on fourth down from the TCHS 29 on another, finally scored on Romero's 3-yarder with 2:54 to go. But they never saw the ball again.

"We wanted to run and pass, to even it out," Romero said. "We saw what worked and did whatever worked."

That balanced offense was sabotaged by turnovers and penalties as LHS dropped to 2-5.

"Paul carried the ball well, Devonte' had a big run and D'Shaie did a good job leading us," Charpentier said. "(Playing) 48 minutes was what we needed. We had not won a game this year where we needed all 48, and winning is the most important thing."

With the district championship out of their hands, Teurlings Catholic and Breaux Bridge turn their focus tonight to finishing strong when the Rebels travel to take on the Tigers.

The Rebels and Tigers both took their turns at slaying defending 6-4A champion Northside, and both failed the test. The Rebels dropped a 40-27 loss to the Vikings two weeks ago, while Breaux Bridge lost to Northside 26-13 this past week.

"It's about winning football games now," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "District championship, that's out of our hands. We had our chance. We're just going to try to win as many football games from here on out."

The Rebels (5-2, 2-1) bounced back from their loss to Northside with a 33-27 win over Lafayette High last week. Now they'll try to keep it going against a Breaux Bridge squad which has given them problems in the

Tigers get crucial win

First-time starter Williams leads Breaux Bridge to victory

BREAUX BRIDGE

— Josh Williams didn't even know he was going to be starting at quarterback until he got to school Friday morning. The junior cornerback was pressed into duty because of a hand injury to senior Chris Huval.

Williams shined in his first start under center for the Tigers, rushing for 114 yards and two touchdowns and adding another score through the air in Breaux Bridge's 31-23 victory over the Rebels in a crucial District 6-4A contest.

"I was nervous going in, but coach told me to settle down and just lead us to the win," Williams said.

Williams was aided by a strong offensive line, the tailback tandem of Adrien Menard (18-66 TD) and Darlan Thomas (15-119), and the electric play of wide receiver Travin Dural.

"Both our backs run hard and get a good push from the offensive line," BBHS head coach Paul Broussard said. "They don't have blazing speed but they always have a chance to break big runs."

The Tigers led 28-17 at intermission, and had the first possession in the second half. Williams and company pieced together a 14-play, nine minute drive that resulted in a 23-yard field goal.

"That was our most important drive of the game," Broussard said. "We took a lot of time off the clock and ended up only giving them one possession in the third quarter."

D'Shaie Landor's

touchdown pass to Paul Begnaud with four minutes to play in the game pulled the Rebels within eight after Tiger linebacker Daltonio Elaire blocked the Teurlings extra point attempt.

The Rebels got the ball back with two minutes left and drove to the Tiger 36-yard line before Breaux Bridge's defense stifled the rally.

"We know we can't win district," said Broussard. "But this was a huge win in terms of playoff position and possibly getting a home game in the post-season."

The first half was a shootout. Williams opened the scoring with a 3-yard keeper set up by a 21-yard Menard run. The extra point failed.

Teurlings answered on the next possession with a 68-yard touchdown drive. Landor connected with Begnaud for 43 yards, and two plays later the senior fullback bulldozed his way to paydirt. The Rebels led by one.

Dural returned the ensuing kickoff into Rebel territory. Big runs by Menard and Williams moved the ball into the red zone, and Thomas com-

pleted the drive with a 15-yard power run through the heart of the Teurlings defense.

The lead changed again when Landor and the Rebels got the ball back. After converting a fourth and two near mid-field, the Rebels' fleet-footed gunslinger weaved his way through multiple tacklers for a 44-yard scoring run. At the end of the first quarter, the Rebels led 14-13.

Both teams exchanged punts at the start of the second quarter.

Unfortunately for the Rebels, the snap sailed over punter Christian Hurst's head and deep into Rebel territory.

Breaux Bridge capitalized four plays later with a one-yard Williams plunge to take a 20-14 advantage.

The Tigers extended their lead to 14 later in the quarter on a high-light-reel catch by Dural. Facing third-and-10 from the Rebel 23, Williams threw deep in the direction of the streaking Tiger receiver. Dural, despite tight coverage and an underthrown ball, dove into the end zone and cradled the ball for the touchdown.

Rebels survive Carmouche, BCHS

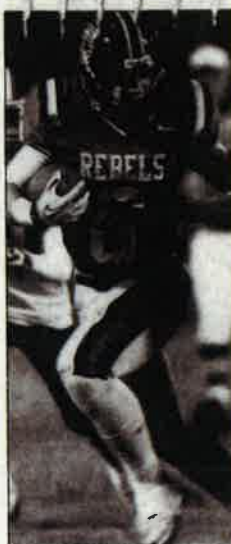
Adam Angelle and his Teurlings Catholic teammates put on an offensive clinic in the first quarter of their key District 6-4A contest against Beau Chene Friday night.

And the Rebels needed every bit of that first-period onslaught just to hold off Jacob Carmouche.

Beau Chene's talented tailback rushed for 293 yards and three touchdowns, personally keeping the Gators close, but the early deficit was too much as TCHS held on for a 38-25 victory that put the Rebels in solid shape in the Class 4A playoff picture.

Teurlings (6-3, 3-2) went into the game unofficially ranked 25th in the state 4A power ratings, and regardless of next week's outcome against Cecilia in the regular-season finale the Rebels will likely avoid the highest-seeded teams in the first round of the playoffs.

"That's probably true, but the biggest thing is that we're trying to play better football and get some momentum going," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "I don't know if we accomplished that. At times we played well both offensively and defensively, but other

with 5:25 left in the period and an 11-yarder after a Brennan Stelly fumble recovery set the Rebels up at the Beau Chene 17-yard-line.

times we didn't execute the way we would like to. But give Beau Chene some credit for that."

The Rebel defense had all sorts of trouble with Carmouche, who entered the game as one of Acadiana's rushing leaders with 1,116 yards and 10 scores. Two of his touchdown runs covered 65 and 93 yards, the latter coming with eight minutes left and putting the Gators (5-4, 2-3) within 31-19.

Teurlings, though, recovered an onside kick attempt and quarterback D'Shaie Landon took the Rebels 44 yards in only four plays before scoring himself on a five-yard run with 6:08 left — a touchdown that became even bigger when Beau Chene's Jamell Chavis returned the ensuing kickoff 89 yards for the game's final tally.

The game was marred by at least 11 personal-foul penalties, some of them offsetting each other. Both teams were flagged 11 times and were whistled for over 100 yards in infractions, many of them dead-ball fouls after plays were over.

That took some of the luster off the individual performances, especially after a first period when the Rebels and Angelle looked unstoppable. TCHS scored on each of its first four possessions and needed only 18 plays in those four drives combined, including a quick strike less than two minutes into the game when Angelle took a handoff and launched a halfback pass to a wide-open Dylan Bossler for a 43-yard touchdown.

Angelle was on the receiving end of two Landon touchdown passes on the next two drives, catching an 18-yarder

"We came out and executed really well early," Charpentier said. "Our kids did a good job with the game plan ... we thought we could spread them out, and we did a good job of taking what they gave us early."

In all, Angelle accounted for 214 offensive yards in the first half alone including six receptions for 158 yards.

"He's so versatile," Charpentier said. "We try to get him the ball so many different ways, he's such a huge weapon for us and just makes a lot of plays."

Carmouche cut into the 21-0 Rebel lead two plays after Angelle's second TD catch, streaking 66 yards on a sweep, but Paul Begnaud answered with a two-yard scoring run moments later after Landon hit Angelle with a 52-yard pass to the BCHS 2.

That made it 23-7 before the end of the first period, but Christian Hurst's 24-yard field goal was the only scoring for most of the next two quarters. A 41-yard sprint by Chavis set up Carmouche's four-yard TD run with 1:16 left in the third period.

Still, it was 31-13 and it appeared that Teurlings had locked up the win with a drive to the BCHS 1, thanks in part to a muffed punt by the Gators. But the Beau Chene defense held three times there, and one play later Carmouche took a direct snap and broke loose on a cutback 98-yard ramble that made it a 12-point game.

"They (Beau Chene) did the Wildcat formation a little more tonight than we'd seen them," Charpentier said. "I'm glad they didn't do it too much more."

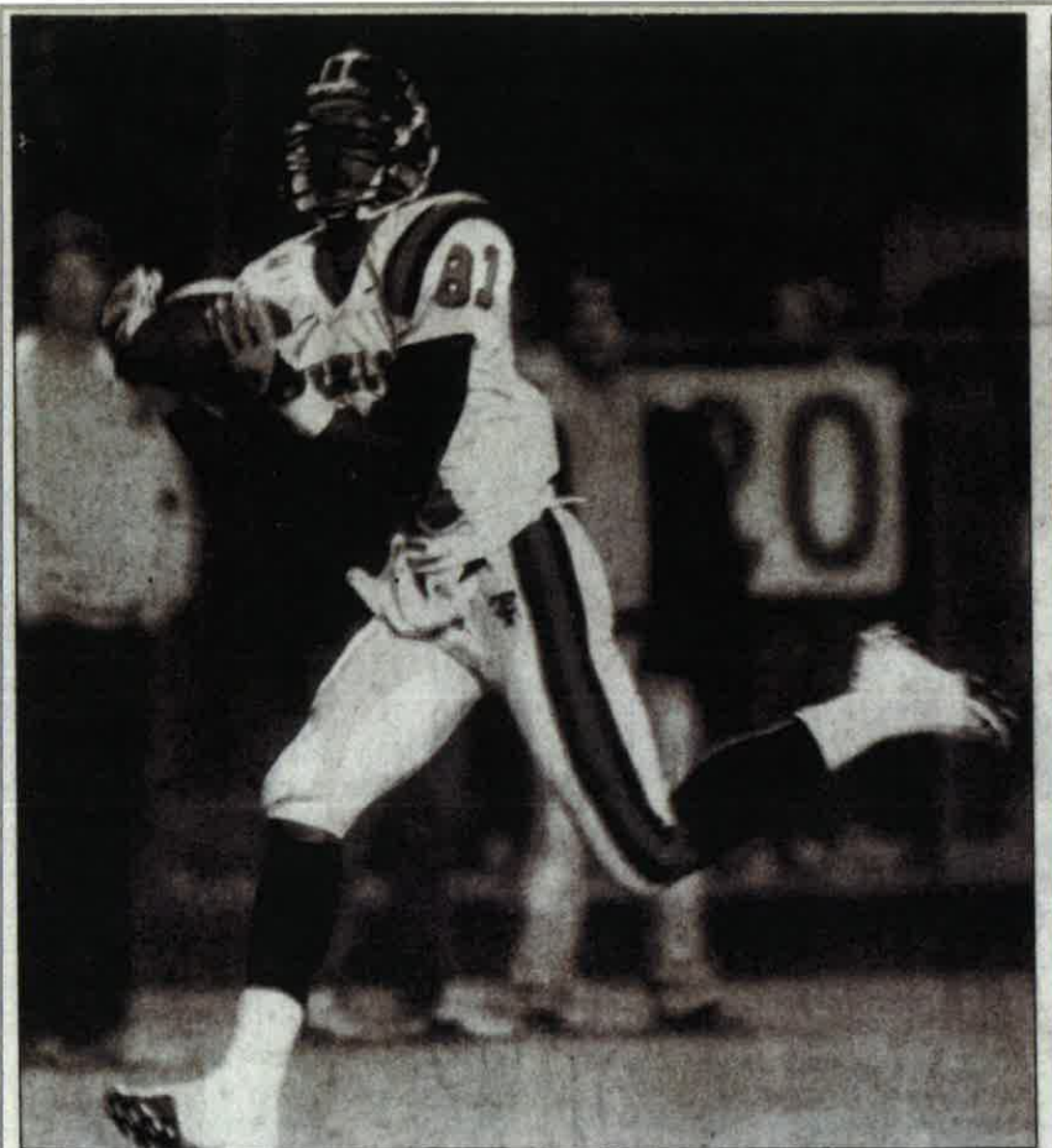

Rebels finish strong

Teurlings holds off late Cecilia rally to nail down seventh win

CECILIA ... With 6:25 left in the game, Cecilia looked like it would have just enough to mount a come-from-behind victory over Teurlings Catholic at Bulldog Stadium on Friday night.

Senior tailback and linebacker Bryant Cormier had just displayed a phenomenal individual effort in intercepting Teurlings quarterback — tipping the ball at the line of scrimmage, then catching it and returning it for a 33-yard touchdown to bring the Bulldogs to within one at 21-20.

But Paul Begnaud and the Rebel offense showed their determination, rushing it right down the field before scoring on a 3-yard run by Begnaud to extend the lead to 28-20.

That would be all the cushion the Teurlings defense would need as it forced two turnovers in the final 2:35 to seal the 35-20 win for the Rebels.

Adam Angelle added the exclamation point for TCH, as he scored on a 6-yard run after the defense had sacked Cecilia quarterback Tyler Robin on fourth down.

While both teams were firmly in the playoffs next week, the win does bolster TCH's power ranking for playoff seeding.

After throwing for 135 yards in the first half, the Rebels moved to a ground attack in the second half, rushing for 250 yards in the game.

"The defense moved from a four-man line to a three-man line and the best thing to do is to try to run them out of that," TCH coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Plus it allowed us to keep control of the ball and keep No. 3

(Montrell Carter) off the field.

"He's always one play away from scoring a touchdown."

Carter, who rushed for 175 yards on the night, flashed his speed early in the third quarter, bringing the Bulldogs within a touchdown with a 56-yard run (21-14).

Robin started the play by faking the handoff up the middle, as he made his way around the right end he pitched it at the last second to Carter, who then outraced the rest of the Rebel defense to the end zone.

That play followed an eight-play, 71-yard drive from Teurlings. Angelle tallied his second touchdown of the night, this one coming on a 35-yard run in which he broke two tackles and dodged behind his lead blocker all the way to paydirt.

Turnovers and penalties kept the Rebels from pulling away early as TCH quarterback D'Shaie Landor's second turnover of the game gave the Bulldogs the ball back with 1:18 left in the half.

Quarterback Tyler Robin then engineered a 5-play, 52-yard drive to bring the Bulldogs within seven at 14-7. Robin accumulated

all 35 of his passing yards in the half on the drive, including a 2-yard pass to William LeBlanc with 6 seconds left in the half.

Of course, Landor also accounted for 90 percent of the Teurlings offense in the first half.

Landor threw for 130 yards and two touchdowns in the first half, the first coming on a 48-yard, pitch-and-catch with Dylan Bossier to give the Rebels a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Rebels put their second score of the game up on an 18-play, 81-yard drive that took 4:48 off the clock.

Cecilia thought they had ended the Rebel drive after a Landor interception. However, a roughing-the-passer penalty negated the interception and gave Teurlings the ball on the Bulldog 48.

Later in the drive Landor dropped back to pass. He was pressured and rolled to his right. One defender grasped his jersey, but Landor broke free, spun around and tossed a 25-yard touchdown pass to a wide open Angelle, who did a nice job of keeping his feet in-bounds as he made the catch.

Teurlings cruises past Sam Houston

MOSS BLUFF — The Teurlings Catholic Rebels looked to be a dangerous No. 20 seed and the No. 13-seeded Sam Houston Broncos found that to be true the hard way.

The potent Rebels' offense was clicking in fine fashion Friday, rolling past Sam Houston 40-25 on the road to advance to the state regional round of the 4A playoffs.

Quarterback D'Shaie Landor was on fire, hitting on 18 of 25 passes for 259 yards and a touchdown, but the Teurlings running game also played a key role in the win.

Teurlings, Westgate win on road

Teurlings Catholic made its return to the playoffs on Friday and made up for lost time.

The Rebels, who missed the playoffs last year for the first time since 1994, went on the road Friday night and knocked off No. 13 Sam Houston, 40-25.

"We thought if we could jump on them and force them to play from behind, we had a chance," Teurlings coach **Sonny Charpentier** said. "Early on, it wasn't looking good because they drove down the field and used seven minutes on their first drive and missed a short field goal."

"What I like about D'Shaile is that we came right back and he threw one down there for 45 yards to get us back into scoring position," Charpentier said. "He has a short memory during the game. He doesn't let one play affect him."

been really exciting, especially with it being our senior year.

"It's a big family, you can tell the team has really come together and it's a lot of fun being in the playoff atmo-

sphere."

Not much has changed since the Rebels and Bulldogs last met in 1999, other than both teams moving up in classification. The Bulldogs are still

loaded with playmakers on both sides of the ball, including LSU commitment Jarvis Landry at wide receiver.

"Lutch is full of athletes," Teurlings senior linebacker Jake Miller said. "A program like that, you have to have a good week of practice and you have to be ready."

"Obviously, (Landry is) a good player because he's an LSU commitment. But they have other athletes out there, like (Daniel Taylor) and their quarterbacks. You can't really focus on Landry, because they have several threats on their offense."

Rebels move on

Teurlings claims dramatic win over traditional power Lutch

CARENCRO—Lutcher had a three-headed quarterback. Teurlings Catholic countered with a heady leader named D'Shaie Landor, and he was more than enough.

Landor rushed for 198 yards and a touchdown and connected with Dylan Bossier for a 40-yard score that turned out to be the game-winner here Friday night as the Rebels outlasted the Bulldogs 32-25 in Class 4A Regional action at Carencro High.

The junior outplayed an LHS offense run by Austin Brack, Jared Poche and Ruston Matherne, sending the No. 20 seeds to next week's quarterfinal round against Neville, a 20-16 winner over St. Louis, also to be played at Carencro.

Senior Taylor Newland sacked Brack on fourth down at the TCHS 48 with 2:11 to play to end the final threat from the No. 4-seeded visitors.

After an Adam Angelle first down, all the Rebels had to do was kneel with the ball. Those three straight plays pushed Landor under 200 yards on the ground; before them, he had 212.

"I felt honored to carry the ball that much," said Landor, who had 149 yards on the ground by halftime alone. "It was great that the coaches had so much trust in me to call my number."

"We felt we would

be able to run the ball tonight," said TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier. "They have a lot of good athletes with speed on defense. They're aggressive and play man-to-

Hurst field goal and runs of 3 and 8 yards by Angelle. All the Bulldogs had was a 1-yard run from Jarvis Landry, especially once Angelle intercepted Brack at the TCHS 4 with 31 seconds to go in the half.

After the break, though, the visitors woke up.

On the first play of the third quarter, Daniel Taylor escaped down the LHS sidelines and dashed 63 yards to a touchdown that jolted his team awake. Then a Landor pass was tipped at the line and intercepted by Londres Johnson, setting up a 10-yard TD run by Poche.

The Bulldogs missed a pair of two-point conversions, but were back within range at 24-18, and they surged into the lead when they got the ball back as Brack hit a sliding Trevor Englade for a 10-yard score on fourth-and-goal. Brack's extra point made it 25-24, setting up a tense fourth period.

"We knew they were going to come back on us," Charpentier said. "That is a championship, 10-1 team that has a lot of weapons on offense. You just play your base defense and hope to tackle. Of course, the last thing we needed was for them to score on the first play of the second half."

Poche had LHS on the move again, but he was stripped of the ball at the 48 with Devin Delcambre on the recovery with 10:47 to play. Three plays later, Landor executed an out-and-up for Bossier, and the rangy receiver made a leaping grab over the defender for the score.

"My receiver went up and made a play for me on that one," Landor said. "He's a big part of our offense, and he really came through for us."

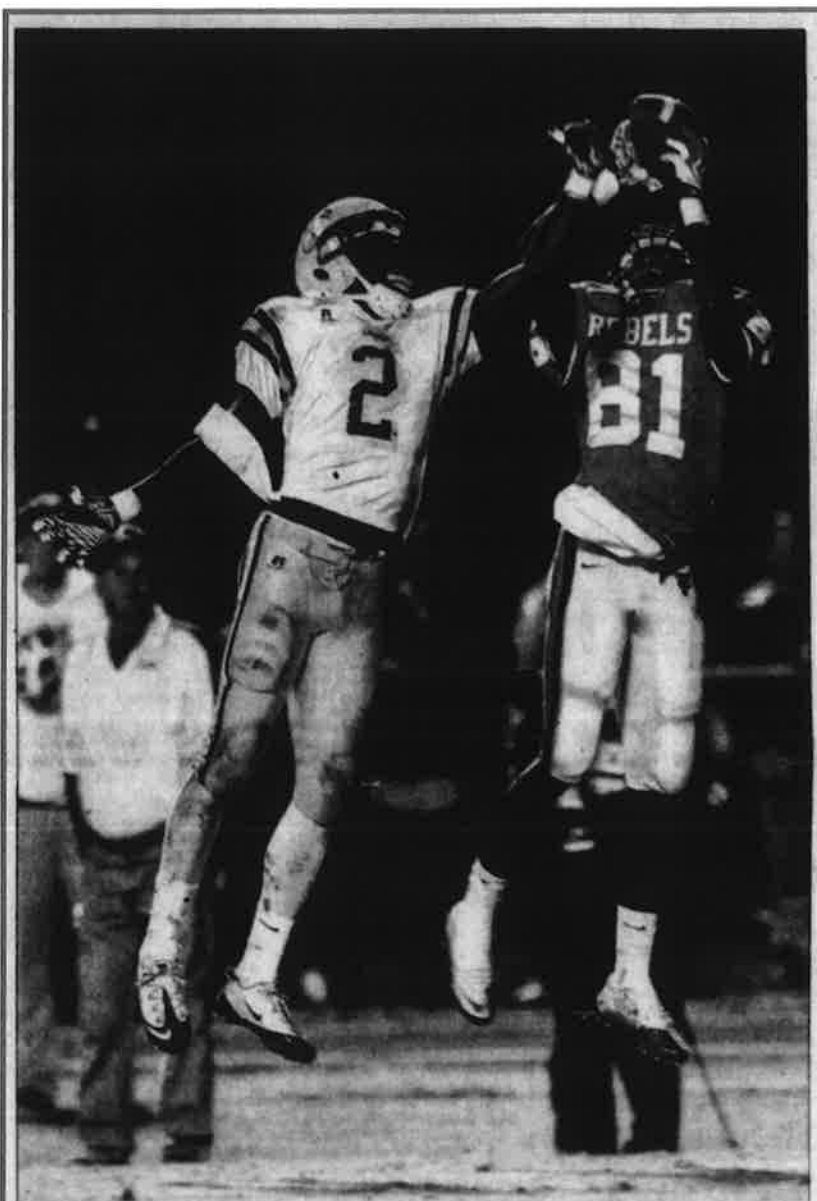

Rebels host defending champ

A week after knocking out the No. 4 Litcher Bulldogs, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels will get their shot at the defending Class 4A state champions this week.

The No. 21 Neville Tigers (7-5) and No. 20 Rebels (9-3) square off tonight at Carencro's Cro-Dome, with the winner advancing to the Class 4A state semifinals.

"They're the defending state champs and they're battle-tested," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said of the Tigers. "When you get in the quarters, there's no bad teams left. Their record is deceiving. When you look at their schedule, you see why they're 7-5."

Neville got off to a rocky start this year as they were having to replace a ton of starters off last year's 4A state championship squad. The Tigers lost early games to Ouachita, West Monroe, Marshall High in Texas and Carroll.

Since losing a 20-19 contest against Ruston in the District 3-4A opener, the Tigers have won six straight games, including beating No. 5 seed St. Louis, 20-16, last week.

Like the Tigers, though, the Rebels are also battle-tested. Teurlings' three losses came to Notre Dame, Northside and Breau Bridge. The Rebels went on the road in the play-off opener and shocked Sam Houston, 40-25, then returned home last week to oust the higher-seeded Litcher Bulldogs, 32-25.

"I think our kids had to play well last week," Charpentier said. "We had

our moments as far as bad plays, but the majority of our play was good, especially in the first half.

"The thing I was most proud of was after having a 24-6 lead, they came back and took the lead and we battled back to get the win. That showed a lot for our guys and gave them

The Tigers are led by John Diarse, who was a receiver on last year's state championship team. Diarse has moved to quarterback this season and

"They do a good job of running their spread offense," Charpentier said. "They want to run it primarily, like most teams, but he can throw it enough to keep you honest. (Diarse) is a big part of their offense."

"Every so often, they will line him up at receiver and throw it to him, but the last couple of weeks he's been primarily at quarterback."

Defensively, the Tigers

tend to be aggressive. It could work in the Rebels' favor, as their balanced attack features several playmakers in quarterback D'Shaie Landor (107-655 yards, 7 TDs rushing; 130-224-11, 1869 yards, 16 TDs passing), tailback Paul Begnaud (115-659, 15 TDs) and all-purpose athlete Adam Angelle (85-674, 12 TDs rushing; 47-599, 5 TDs receiving).

"They're real active up front and they're big up front," Charpentier said. "They normally want to keep six guys in the box and they play man-to-man on the outside, nothing we haven't seen."

"We're going to try to take advantage (of the one-on-one situations). But it's easier said than done. They have good athletes and run to the ball well. It still comes down to you having to be able to run the football and stop the run."

The biggest concern this week at Teurlings was whether the Rebels could come down from their high of knocking off traditional power Litcher in the second round. Charpentier said the team has been pretty focused this week.

"It's an opportunity in a two-week stretch to play two teams who have a combined 15 state championships between them," Charpentier said. "That's something you don't see every two weeks. I think the kids have been focused on what we have to do. This is a good group, they've been real attentive at practice."

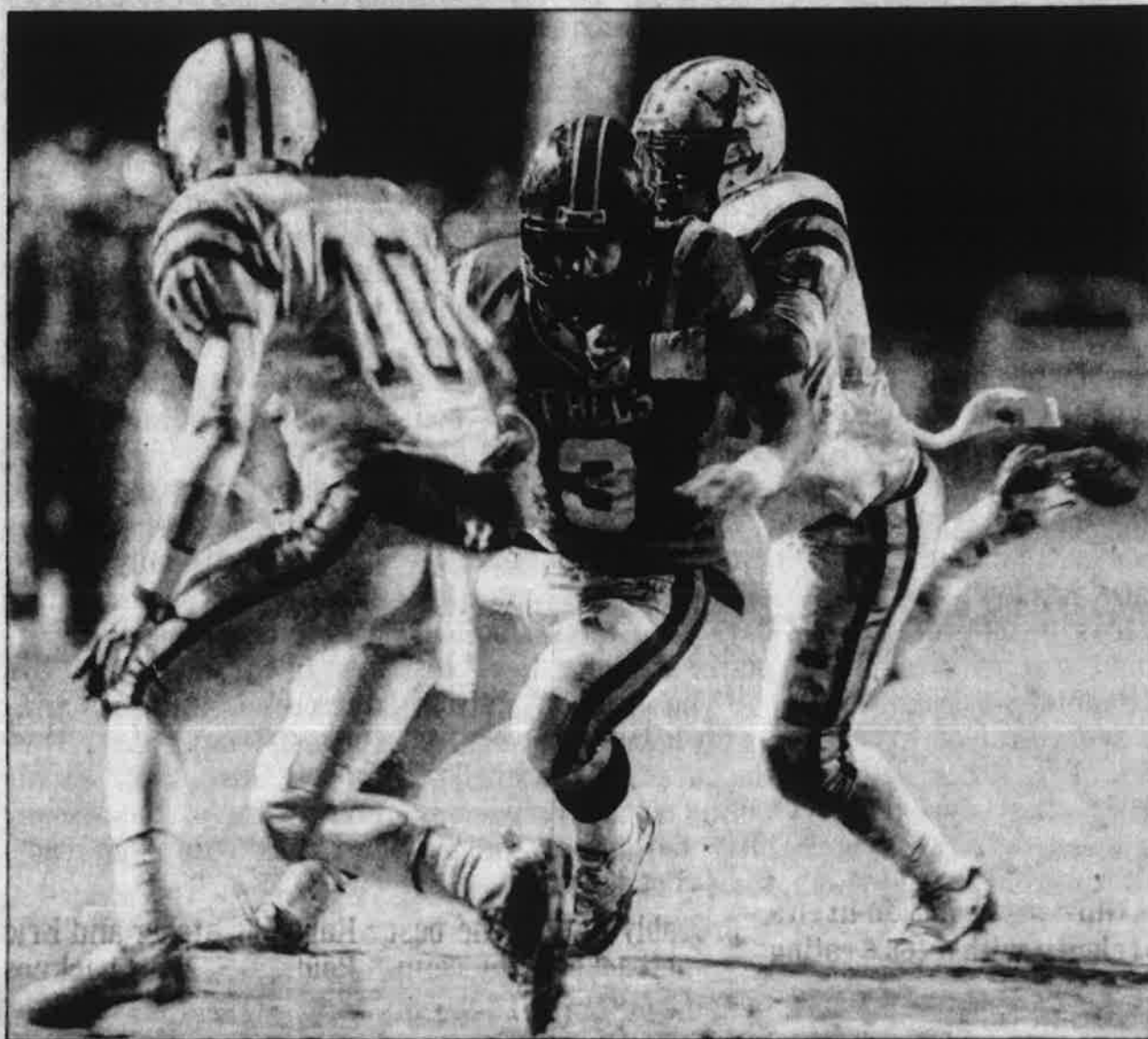
"They understand what's at stake. I fully expect us to go out there and play well."

Rebels win another 4A thriller

CARENCRO — Neville kicker Reagan Wise stood alone on the turf.

The Tigers had just scored to pull within one point of Teurlings, 27-26, in overtime.

As the Rebel defense trotted onto the field, Wise sprinted toward his sideline.

Neville was going for two, and Wise's presence was a ruse by Tiger head coach Mickey McCarty. Teurlings quickly called a timeout in order to reshuffle its defensive alignment.

Since losing star quarterback John Diarse to a high ankle sprain early in

the first quarter, Neville operated its offense primarily out of the jumbo set. The Tigers had been successfully playing smash-mouth football for four quarters, and now they were two yards away from the 4A semifinals.

Eniandrius Levine took the snap and handed off to power back Ricky Wyatt. Wyatt had given the Rebel defense fits all night. The senior accounted for three touchdowns (including the score in overtime) and was averaging 6.9 yards a pop.

Two more yards and the Rebels season would be over.

The Teurlings defense tore through the Tiger line like a swarm of Black

Friday bargain-hunters, gang-tackling Wyatt for a loss and punching its first ticket to the state semifinals since 1999 with the 27-26 win.

"There is obviously a lot of emotion right now," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Both teams made plays and had opportunities to win this game. We just hung in there."

Neville was 0-for-2 on extra points in the contest, and McCarty explained his decision to go for two.

"It's a tough way to end the season," he said. "But we weren't executing on extra points. The kids wanted to go for it."

The coaches wanted to go for it. It was the right call."

The Rebels scored first on a 24-yard reverse play in which Dylan Bossier outraced the Tiger defense into the end zone. The score was set up by a 23-yard completion from D'Shaie Landor to Christian Landry. Landry made the catch from his knees after slipping on the wet turf.

Landor was 8-of-24 on the night for 100 yards. He added 106 yards rushing on 15 carries.

Teurlings' next score followed a Neville turnover. The handoff between Osha Ceaser and Levine was muffed and hit the turf. Freshman defensive tackle Jesse Provost, making the start in place of injured starter Taylor Newland, recovered the fumble at the Neville 35.

Teurlings failed to advance the ball despite the excellent field position, but the Rebel drive was kept alive by a fourth down pass interference call. Three plays later, Adam Angelle broke through the center of the Tiger defense for the 7-yard touchdown. Angelle rushed for 57 yards on nine carries in the contest. Paul Begnaud also chipped in with 41 hard fought yards.

Trailing 13-0, Neville scrapped the passing attack and focused on pounding the ball down the throat of the Rebel defense. The strategy worked, and the Tigers put together a 70-yard scoring drive on six run-

ning plays. Sophomore Salarrious Jones scampered into the end zone from 36-yards out to pull the Tigers within a touchdown.

Jones led the Tigers on the night with 132 yards on nine carries. Normally efficient kicker Reagan Wise missed the extra point to make the score 13-6 at the half.

The Tigers continued to rush the ball effectively in the second half. They opened the third quarter with a nine play, 62-yard drive capped off by an eight-yard Wyatt touchdown. The extra point sailed wide, and the Rebels led 13-12.

Teurlings answered the Neville score on its next drive with a four-yard Angelle touchdown. Key plays on the drive included a 13-yard completion from Landor to Angelle that ended with a 15-yard late hit on the Tigers, as well as a 39-yard Landor scramble.

Late in the third, the Tigers trailed 20-12 and faced a third and 12 from their own 32. Levine eluded a heavy Rebel rush and heaved a prayer that was caught by a well-defended Charles Jones for a 28-yard completion. Several plays later, Neville tied the score with a Wyatt touchdown and a Salarrious Jones two-point conversion.

Twice in the fourth quarter the Rebels drove into Tiger territory, but both drives ended in missed field goals.

Angelle scored the go-ahead touchdown in overtime on a one-yard plunge.

"It's not about style points or being pretty," said Charpentier. "It's about living to play another week."

St. Aug, set the Cougars up near midfield.

Rebels' run mirror image of '99 semis

This looks a lot like 11 years ago.

So far, this year's play-off run for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels bears a striking resemblance to 1999, right down to getting paired with the Karr Cougars in this week's Class 4A semifinals.

The '99 Rebels lost to Karr, 10-7, halting their dreams of a first trip to the Superdome Classic and a chance to play for the LHSAA state crown, but it remains a memorable campaign in school history.

"It was exciting," said TCHS athletic secretary Tina Stroder, whose son Justin was an all-states safety in 1999. "We were underdogs, just like we are this year. We played Luther that year (Teurlings also bested Luther 32-25 in the regionals two weeks ago), and last week (27-26 overtime win over Neville) was like our game against Cecilia. It was really cold, and we stoppped a 2-point conversion to win."

The experience was doubly intense for Stroder, since she worked with the coaches and had a son on the squad.

"It was very nerve-wracking, working behind the scenes and seeing everything that goes on," she said. "There's no comparison, since Justin was on that team. There are some great memories. We talk about it all the time."

Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier recalls Stroder's key contributions to the program.

"He wasn't playing much as a junior, then someone got hurt and I think he had nine interceptions the rest of the season," Charpentier said. "He got the opportunity

and soul into it. They play so hard. It's everything you want your children to go through for life.

"You learn so much. Hard work does pay off."

"That season really jump-started the school year," said guidance counselor Milton Rohm, who was the basketball coach in 1999. "There was a tremendous amount of excitement. It was a wonderful time for the school."

Rohm recalled how close the Rebels came to winning against an imposing Karr squad.

"There was a tremendous amount of people there at Behrman Stadium," he said. "When Justin Guy hit Kory Hebert with a long bomb, there wasn't a person on our side who didn't think we were going to win the game."

"At one time, late in the game, I remember standing on about the 8-yard line, and we had the ball fourth-and-goal on the 1. Karr had 6-foot gaps in the line. The hole blew wide open, then closed just as fast. They were that quick. Three minutes later, we had the ball on their 3, and they stopped us again. It was heart-wrenching."

 "Then he made All-State as a senior. I remember in the Lutchter game that year, we were ahead 21-14 and they drove inside our 5. They ran a naked boot-leg and Justin intercepted in the end zone and ran it out to about the 15, and we were able to hold on."
 "I remember being nothing but proud," said Stroderd, who is affectionately called "Psycho Mom" around TCHS athletics for her involvement. "The kids put their heart

Reversal of fortune

Teurlings hopes to turn tables on No. 1 Karr

HARVEY — You can see the lights of downtown New Orleans from here.

It's just a short hop over the Mississippi River to the Louisiana Superdome, home of next weekend's Superdome Classic that will crown the five LHSAA state high school football champions.

A berth in that showcase is just a few miles and one victory away for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels, who meet the Karr Cougars at Hoss Memtsas Stadium in a 7 p.m. Class 4A semifinal contest.

The game offers a chance to erase painful memories of a 10-7 semifinal loss to Karr at nearby Behrman Stadium in 1999, capping a playoff surge that parallels this year ... so far.

"We've stayed in it long enough for it to be similar," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "I'd like the similarities to end this week."

Charpentier's Rebels

outlasted defending state champion Neville 27-26 in overtime in last week's quarterfinals, similar to a narrow win over Cecilia at the same stage in 1999. They also knocked off Lutchier in regional play, as in '99.

The loss to Karr 11 years ago remains fresh for Charpentier.

"Karr was very good in 1999, and I think we were a No. 15 seed at the time," he said. "We made some big plays and had opportunities to win the game. Now we have the same scenario, and we have a chance. That's all you can ask as a player and coach."

"Our guys have earned the opportunity. We're going to go put forth the effort. There's not a lot of people who thought we'd still be playing (TCHS was a No. 20 seed). But our guys thought we would, and I liked our chances."

Teurlings got three touchdowns from Adam Angelle and held off Neville by stopping a two-point conversion run in overtime. The gritty win

"The best thing is, I don't think we played our best football," he said. "We left three touchdowns out there, and still found a way to win against the defending state champs. It was cold and wet, and we didn't play that good, but still won."

Karr knocked off Northside 39-14 last week at Memtsas, or else the Rebels' semifinal road trip would have been chopped by 250 miles or so.

Karr KOs Teurlings

Cougar rally before half proves too much for TC

HARVEY — Look at your watch. Now watch the second hand move for 1 minute and 4 seconds.

It's not a lot of time, but in 1:04 of crucial clock time just before halftime, the Karr Cougars paved the way for a 32-0 victory over the Teurlings Rebels on Friday in the Class 4A semifinals at Hoss Merittas Stadium.

The two teams were in a 0-0 deadlock midway through the second quarter, seeking a berth in next week's Supertome Classic.

Karr drove 81 yards in 11 plays at that point, capped by a 1-yard touchdown run by quarterback Tillet George with 1:08 left in the half.

The Rebels couldn't move and the Cougars took over on their 39 after a punt. Just five well-executed plays later, George hit Neal Randall with a 3-yard score with a mere 4 ticks on the clock.

A competitive defensive struggle had quickly been transformed into a battle from behind for the visitors.

In the end, the battle was too much to win as the 13-1 Cougars rolled to victory.

"That was a tremendous turning point in the game," said TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier. "Even if we had gone in at half down 6-0, we would have had the chance to compete. But coming back from two scores down is tough, especially against a team like this."

George hit Randall for 19 yards to the Rebels 40, ran 11 to the TCHS 21 and hit Jarrell Bennett for 20 to set up his first score. The dagger in the heart on the second quick march was a dazzling 45-yard catch to the Rebels' 3 by diminutive sophomore Rasheed Davis (5-5, 140).

"We were hoping to keep it close," Charpentier said. "But, when it gets away from you like that, it takes away your opportu-

nity to kind of sneak one in."

The Cougars posed a threat to score on most plays, with the elusive George buying time with scrambles or scoping for key gains as the sparkplug. Davis was another thorn in the Rebels' side with seven catches for 94 yards — all in the first half. And running back Johnathan Hill (9-130-1) was also dangerous.

Once the Rebels trailed by two scores, the task became that much more difficult.

TCHS staged a goalline stand to start the second half, but on their next possession the Cougars got an 18-yard run from Hill setting up a 34-yard scoring pass to Randall. It was 20-0 and hope was fading quickly for the visitors.

The Rebels mounted their best drive as D'Shaile Landon hit Adam Angelle for 15 yards to the Karr 18 and Angelle sliced down to the KHS 1 with a 10-yard run. But the Cougars turned the Rebels away on downs.

That set the stage for the finishing touches for Karr: First, capping a 96-

yard drive after the goalline stand, Hill dashed around end for a 70-yard touchdown. George provided the final score on an 18-yard run with 2:15 to play.

The better team won the game, leaving Charpentier to ponder an inspired season for a program that missed the playoffs in 2009.

"I can't say enough about how proud I am of the kids," he said. "This senior group was motivated. They're all winners in

my book.

"Life presents you times when you're going to get knocked down, and we ate some humble pie last year. But this is how they reacted, and that's what you want to see, to bounce back off the floor."

"This is like 1999, too (when Teurlings lost to Karr 10-7 in the semifinals), after we'd gone one-and-done the year before. That's what I'm most proud of."
