Rebels survive

Teurlings Catholic holds off late Lafayette High charge

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels had their backs against the wall.

Lafayette High was driving, threatening to punch in the winning score with under a half-minute to play in Friday's 60th annual Lafayette Kiwanis Club Football Jamboree at Cajun Field.

It was perfectly set up for a successful debut at the LHS helm for TCHS graduate Jay Domengeaux as his Lions gave the ball to senior Devin Benjamin on second and goal at the Rebels' 2-yard line.

But providence intervened as a defender got a helmet on the ball at the 1 and jarred it loose. When the ball then scooted out of the back of the end zone for a touchback with 23 seconds remaining, the Rebels had a 16-10 victory in the books.

The dramatic finish proved to be the best of the two-day event.

In Friday's other action, Acadiana held off Breaux Bridge 9-7 and Notre Dame handled St. Martinville by a 21-7 count.

Lafayette High faced a fourth-and-2 at the Rebels' 42 on the crucial drive, and Benjamin (10-55) burst through the defense for 18 yards to the 24. The Lions overcame a subsequent holding penalty with an 11-yard pass from Tommy

Coverage from jamborees throughout Acadiana.

Jackson to Jacob Beasley and a 9-yard Benjamin run at the 2:59 mark. Jackson gained another first at the three, setting up the final dramatics.

Senior quarterback D'Shaie Landor directed the Rebels 66 yards in 12 plays to take an early 8-0 lead, shaking free for runs of 17, 10 and 11 yards and hitting key passes of 11 yards to Dylan Bossier to the Lions' 18 and 9 to Zach LaFleur to the 12 after a loss.

Landor's 11-yard run reached the 1, and TCHS scored on second down from the 6 on a run by Blair Lormand.

Brady Burch ran for the 2-point conversion.

The Lions got within 8-3 at half when Sam Mestayer kicked a 26-yard field goal one play before the break.

Benjamin put the Lions ahead 10-8 early in the second half with a 6-yard run, coming three snaps after Joseph Provost intercepted a tipped Landor pass and returned it 13 yards to the Rebels' 17.

But Landor responded by marching his team 71 yards in six snaps to regain the lead, 16-10. The payoff was a 45-yard sideline pass to Bossier on which the elusive receiver escaped the Lions' secondary with 7:02 remaining.

That left enough time for Lafayette to respond, and the Lions came within a fateful fumble of doing that.

A new alignment of the district brings together some of the top football programs in the Acadiana area

And now, in this corner, weighing 250 pounds ...

When LHSAA reclassification forged a new alignment of schools, the new District 5-4A became an immediate focal point for the 2011 football season.

With its combination of quality, rivalries and tradition, it's going to be hard to beat Breaux Bridge, Cecilia, St. Martinville, Northside, Teurlings Catholic and St. Thomas More.

All are successful programs — some more recently than others, but all have history on their side.

There is also talent to spare, the kind that makes coaches look brilliant on Friday nights.

When league play cranks up in Week 6, fans will be treated to Northside at Cecilia, St. Martinville at Breaux Bridge and Teurlings at STM. That's just the appetizer for what promises to be an entertaining stretch run.

Every game has the potential to decide the crown. Each contest could be The Main Event.


"It's as competitive as any district I've ever been a part of," said St. Thomas More coach Jim Hightower, whose Cougars are dropping down from Class 5A after sweeping District 4-5A, going 10-0 and reaching the 5A state semifinals a year ago.

"From week to week, there's no let-up," he added. "You have to show up ready to play. You hope to stay healthy, because with this schedule there's no time to heal."

A high level of play is no surprise to Breaux Bridge coach Paul Broussard. His Tigers went 6-4 a year ago, then lost to district foe Northside in the playoffs.

"It's always been a competitive district," Broussard said. "This year it makes it a little more so with St. Thomas More dropping down from 5A to 4A. From top to bottom, it's going to be very competitive week in and week out."

"The district is tough again," said Northside coach Vincent Derouen. "It got tougher with St. Thomas More. But that's good for the programs and good for the community. We always like a good gate. In this day and

age, that definitely helps."

"It's always been a brutal district," Cecilia's Terry Martin said. "The addition of STM makes it more so. We played them the last two years with an open date, and now as fate would have it we're playing them again."

"They're so well-coached, so fundamentally sound. And they've got more depth than anybody."

When a team goes 13-1 in a higher classification and has talent returning from that squad, as STM does, it's natural for foes to assign them the favorite's role.

"Obviously, the big change is St. Thomas More," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They just win. That makes it tougher. They're our first district game in Week 6. But, every game is going to be tough."

Breaux Bridge has four Division 1 commitments, Teurlings has quarterback D'Shaie Landor back at the controls, Northside has enough depth to overcome defections and Cecilia has key building blocks in Jereny Doucette, Tylor Robin and D'Andre Dartez.

St. Martinville, under new coach Gary Adkins, is the wild card in the mix. The Tigers could revitalize a rich tradition by shaking up the district race.

"St. Martinville is much improved," Martin said. "Coaching is going to be good across the board."

"All the teams are well-coached," Hightower said. "The schools each have good tradition, and take a lot of pride in what they do. They go all-out to compete."

"There is playoff tradition at each school," Charpentier said. "St. Martinville is going in the right direction. Their numbers are up. It is what it is. Football is important to each school, and when it's important it makes for competition."

While the bottles are expected to be epic each week, the advent of power ratings has changed the dynamic of district races. Winning district is still a great source of pride, yet it's not as do-or-die as it once was.

"With power ratings, district isn't as important as it was in the old format," Broussard said. "To get into the playoffs, you have to win games and earn power points. Now, you have to

pull for your rivals, instead of against them.

"Now one or two losses don't doom you for the playoffs."

"With the power ratings, the better the seeds, it helps you go a little further," DeRouen said.

"Traditionally, we've done better in the playoffs when we've had those higher ratings."

Still, the district race will always provide a focus.

"It's almost like a playoff atmosphere each week," DeRouen said. "And for us, with STM and Teurlings, it's amplified that much more."

Teurlings faces STM, Breaux Bridge, Cecilia and Northside in consecutive weeks.

"We have four weeks in a row with no breather," Charpentier said. "You can't get too high or too low. You have to stay even keel. You have to be ready to go, then turn around and be ready to do it again."

"But, I like it better. Kids are smart today. They know when you're playing somebody good, and when you're not."

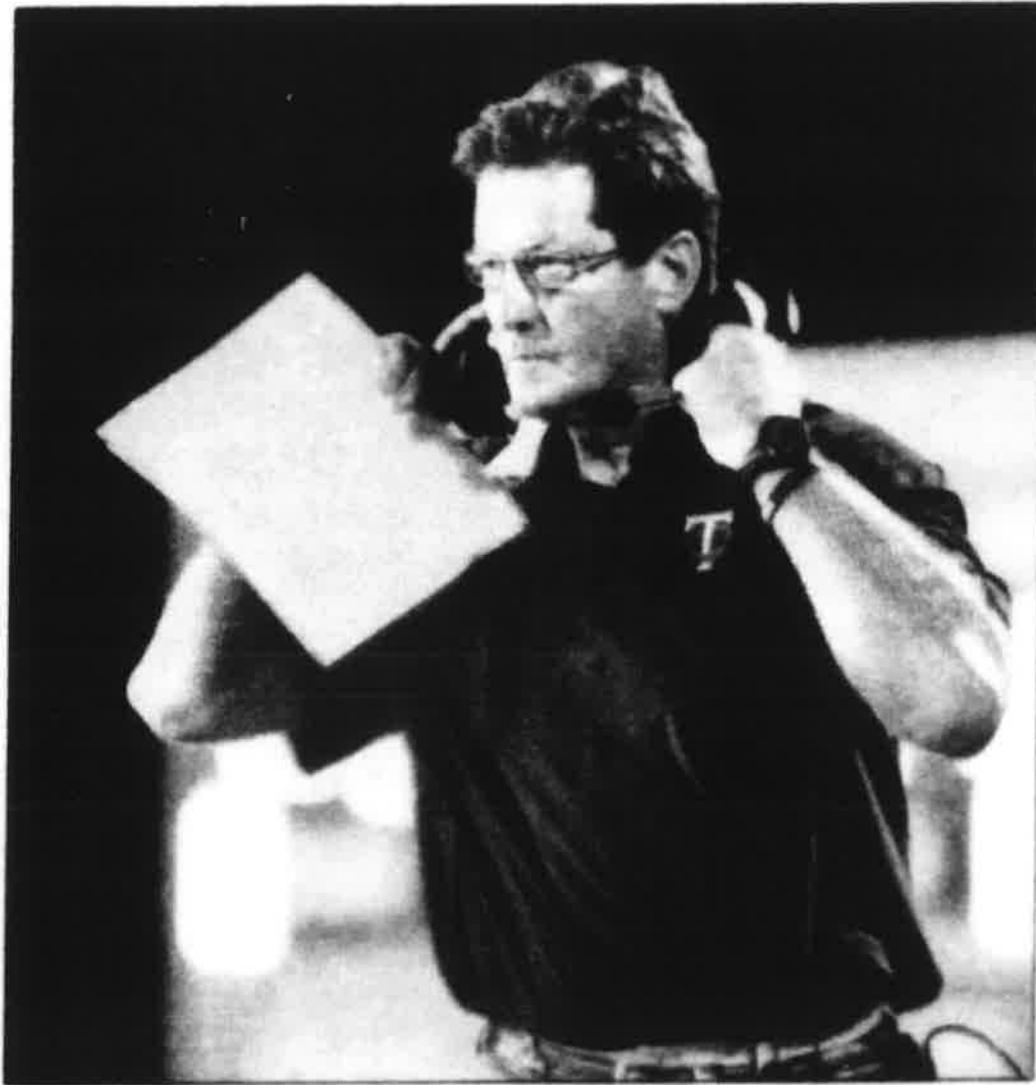
With District 5-4A this fall, that won't be hard to see. Every week could be The Main Event.

District 5-4A: Land of rivalries

Everywhere you look in District 5-4A, there are rivalries past, present or about to be.

The 2011 football season offers fans juicy possibilities at every turn.

Three of the members — Breaux Bridge, Cecilia and St. Martinville — compose a St. Martin Parish trio that regularly packs the stands with rabid fans for their meetings. It doesn't seem to matter if it's Cecilia vs. BBHS or Tigers vs. Tigers with Breaux Bridge-St. Martinville matchup.

Any combination sets their fans on edge.

The other half of the league presents three successful programs from Lafayette Parish — Northside, St. Thomas More and Teurlings Catholic.

Northside ruled the 2010 version of the district (6-4A) and is a regular playoff participant. Teurlings bounced back from a rare losing season to reach the state semifinals last fall.

Then there is new member STM, which was a nearly-perfect 13-1 semifinal participant in Class 5A last season and is dropping down in class but not in degree of difficulty.

The Cougars haven't played the Vikings or Rebels much lately, but their meetings this fall take on an electric significance.

Northside and TCHS are natural rivals, located a few miles apart in upper Lafayette, and there is an equally compelling series for both against nearby Breaux Bridge.

And all, it seems, are rivals of St. Thomas More — the high-profile school playfully re-named Stop Trampling Me at a recent luncheon.

The season is rich in potential, one that will prepare survivors for anything they'll face in the state playoffs.

The only problem with such a competitive and talented league is that a school could field a good team yet be left out of the postseason party. That's what rivalries are for, though — bragging rights and movin' on up.

Rebels survive Catholic

Conventional wisdom dictates that when a football team commits six turnovers, that team will have a tally added to its loss column.

On Friday night, Teurlings Catholic completely defied conventional wisdom in its 14-13 victory over Catholic of New Iberia.

The Rebels committed five turnovers on their first five possessions of the football game, and the sixth possession of the first half ended with the sounding of the halftime horn.

In response to the high turnover count, TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier touted the Catholic defense, "A lot of the mistakes we made were forced mistakes. I give them credit."

Capitalizing on those first half mistakes, the Panthers jumped out to a 10-0 lead. Following a Rebel fumble, at the 3:22 mark in the first quarter Quarterback Joe Lissard connected with wide receiver Rhett Gonsoulin with a 15-yard pass along the sideline.

Gonsoulin did the rest, scampering 30 yards zig-zagging across the field and into the end zone. Catholic would later add a Grant Quinlian 32-yard field goal at 9:51 in the second quarter before Teurlings would get on the board.

Fittingly, Teurlings' first score was created by a turnover. Fittingly, Teurlings' first score was created by a turnover. If the first half characterized by turnovers and sloppy play, the second half was characterized by excitement and drama.

With only one turnover in the second half, the Teurlings offense was able to find some consistency, yet Catholic continued to put pressure on the Rebels by adding another field goal and extending the lead to 13-7 with 8:49 left in the game.

Then, the Rebel offense finally held onto the football, mounting a 9-play, 63-yard drive capped by one-yard Blair Lormand touchdown run. After the extra point, Teurlings led 14-13.

Coach Charpentier noted that his team was able to overcome the turnovers because they "just kept playing, kept playing all the way to the last play."

The game would come down to just that, the last play.

In response to the Rebel score, the Panthers mounted their own 9-play 43-yard drive down to the 15. Down by one, the Panthers were well within the range for Quinlan who had successfully converted two field goals (32,38).

"Once we got the big first down, let's just get the ball in the middle in the field, and let's kick a field goal," Menard said. "We'd been kicking the ball well. That's the odds you play for. We had to kick a field goal to win, and that's what we had to do."

With the odds, Quinlan attempted the 32-yard field goal with 38 seconds left on the clock. The ball was snapped, Teurlings got a push up the middle, Chris Trosclair got a hand on the ball, and Teurlings left the field with a 14-13 victory.

Understanding the conventional wisdom of football, coach Charpentier wisely added, "It all evens out. We lost games like this before. We shouldn't win ball games like that."

Rebels' defense stifles Trojans

The Teurlings Catholic defense forced six turnovers as the Rebels beat the Alexandria Trojans 53-13 at Trojan Stadium on Friday night.

"We played good on defense," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They gave our offense plenty of opportunities to score."

The Rebels' defense harassed Trojan quarterback C.J. Gatlin all night as TCHS finished the game with four sacks, three interceptions, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries as ASH could not overcome the mistakes.

"We couldn't block them," ASH head coach Chris Gatlin said. "We've got to block people better. We were running for our life back there."

The Rebels also played well on the other side of the ball as TCHS wide receiver Dylan Bossier scored on a 81-yard reverse play to take an early 7-0 lead. ASH couldn't respond as Rebel defensive end J.T. Hebert sacked Gatlin on consecutive plays to stall the Trojans.

TCHS would not score again until the second quarter when Rebel quarterback D'Shaie Landor hit Bossier on a 29-yard pass play to take a 14-0 lead. The Rebels would tack on another 10 points before halftime to take a 24-0 lead.

"We got beat up front on both sides of the ball,"

Gatlin said. "We have to run the ball better."

The Trojans would come out in the third quarter and score quickly as Gatlin hit wide receiver Jarrell Williams for a 77-yard touchdown pass.

Despite the big play, the Trojans were still down 31-7. The Trojans would add another big pass play score in the third but it was not enough as the Rebels would hang on for the win.

"Anytime you can come on the road and win is big," Charpentier said. "I am pleased with the win."

With the win, TCHS improves to 2-0 while the Trojans fail to 0-2 on the season.

Pios survive Rebels

Notre Dame holds off rally from rival Teurlings

Following Teurlings

Catholic's week one win over Catholic of New Iberia in which the Rebels committed six turnovers and still were able to squeak out a one point victory, coach Sonny Charpentier stated this football truism: "We shouldn't win ball games like that. It all evens out."

On Friday night versus Notre Dame (2-1), the football gods may have just evened things out as a late game turnover deep in the Rebels' own territory lifted the Pioneers to a 21-15 victory over Teurlings.

With the score tied at 15-15 and 1:42 left in the game, the Pioneer offense stalled at the Rebel 49 and was forced to punt. The punt left the foot of the ND punter, bounced at the 20-yard line when the TCHS returner attempted to field the punt. The ball bounded off his shoulder pads and was recovered by the Pioneers on the one yard line.

"The kid played hard the whole game. The kid tried to make a play," NDHS coach Lewis Cook said. "It's unfortunate that it came down to something like that."

The rest was a formality as ND quarterback Waylon Young ran behind his center for the eventual game winning

touchdown with 1:34 in the game.

The Pioneers were coming off their first regular season loss since the 2006 season, ending a 4-game regular season win streak. After the first half, it looked like NDHS was certain to begin a new streak as they took a 15-0 lead into halftime.

In the first half, the Pioneer defense held the Rebel offense to just four first downs and 79 total yards. Adding an exclamation point to the first half defensive effort, a host of Notre Dame defensive players brought down a Teurlings running back in the end zone for a safety at the 6:05 mark in the first quarter.

Contributing to the Pioneer lead was Nick Gossen, who scored two touchdowns from three and four yards out respectively in the second quarter and finished with 81 yards on 24 carries.

"It wasn't real pretty offensively," Cook said. "Our defense kept us in it."

The second half was a complete role reversal as the Rebel defense stifled the Pioneer offense.

"Defense kept us in the ball game," Charpentier said. "We couldn't get anything going [offensively] until the second half."

When the TCHS offense did get the ball back with 8:03 left in

the game, they hit their stride, embarking on a 12-play, 97-yard drive capped by a juggling reception by Dylan Bossier from D'Shaie Landor (15-30-154) for a 14-yard touchdown. The two-point conversion was successful, and the game was tied 15-15 with 4:19 left in the game. Momentum had swung the way of the Rebels.

After the late game turnover, the Rebels momentum waned as they were unable to mount another long-yardage drive.

"(1999) was the last time we lost back to back games," Cook said. "Thank god we don't have to wear that collar again."

Balanced Rebels roll

Teurlings offense explodes past Crowley on ground, in the air

CROWLEY — When Teurlings Catholic's Devonte' Jackson caught a 15-yard touchdown pass with 11:55 left to play in Friday's 55-20 road victory over the Crowley Gents at Gardiner Memorial Stadium, it gave the Rebels 271 passing at the time.

One play earlier, teammate Zach LaFleur had gained three yards on a running play to give the Rebels 273 yards passing at the juncture.

It's hard to get much more balance than that and the Rebels rode that two-edged attack to eclipse the 50-point margin for the third time in five games to improve to 3-2 on the season.

"We try to stay balanced as much as we can," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't."

"I feel like we were a little sluggish at times on offense tonight, but we were still able to make some plays."

The Rebels (now 3-2) started the game by scoring touchdowns on their first four drives and five of their six possessions.

Quarterback D'Shaie Landor got the Rebels going with a 30-yard pass to Dylan Bossier and then ran in a 27-yard TD run.

He then made it 14-0 with a 28-yard TD pass to Philip Vidrine.

Landor finished the game 16-of-29 passing for 271 yards and three touchdowns, while also rushing for 108 yards and a score on 16 carries.

Perhaps the biggest aspect of the win for the Rebels' win was continuing the develop a rushing attack with starting tailback Blair Lormand out with an injury. Zach LaFleur certainly did his part with 119 yards and three touchdowns on 14 carries.

As a team, the Rebels finished with 357 rushing yards and a total of 27 first downs.

"We're kind of doing it by committee right now," Charpentier said. "We're trying to get a lot of players involved right now."

For instance, nine different Rebel backs got carries in Friday's win. In addition to both Landor and LaFleur rushing for over 100 yards, Nick Garber collected 86 yards on 13 carries, including a 42-yard TD run on fourth down.

The other spark for the Rebels' offense came from Jackson, who had three carries for 23 yards and also caught six passes for 119 yards and two touchdowns.

"I expected to do well tonight," Jackson said.

"We're starting to come together. We made a lot of big plays last week. It just wasn't enough to win the game."

"When I get the ball, I'm just trying to get in the end zone. The passing game has been good the last two games. It just keeps getting better and better."

With all of that offense, the Rebels' defense didn't have quite the challenge it faced in last week's 63-53 loss to Calvary Baptist. In fact, Teurlings limited Crowley to 141 yards rushing, 151 passing and 17 first downs. Five of those first downs and 82 total yards came on Crowley's last drive that ended with a 10-yard TD pass to Kaleb Cormier with 22.4 seconds left.

Crowley star tailback Davante Bourque finished with 107 yards rushing and a score on 17 carries, while also catching two passes for 85 yards, including a 67-yard TD pass.

"He's the kind of athlete that you hold your breathe every time he touches the ball," Charpentier said. "He's got speed and he's a physical runner. I think we did a pretty good job of holding him down, except for that long touchdown catch. But you can always do better."

Rivalry revisited

Silent rivals Teurlings, STM meet for first time since 1988

Can it be a rivalry if two teams don't play?

It has been 23 years since Teurlings Catholic and St. Thomas More last met in football, since a 41-13 STM victory in 1988 drew the Cougars with in 4-3 in the brief but memorable series between the parish's two Catholic high schools.

It has been so long none of the current players for either program were born yet, and a few of the younger coaches weren't around very long.

"It's like a rivalry, but we've never played," said Rebels offensive guard Kade Steiner.

"We haven't talked about it much," STM tight end Jordan Murray said.

"We're treating it like just another game."

It will be more than that, of course, when the two square

off at STM this evening.

STM is 5-0 and ranked No. 1 in the state in Class 4A, with 3-2 TCHS coming in at No. 7.

The Cougars reached the semifinals in Class 5A last fall and finished 13-1 before dropping to 4A this year. The Rebels achieved the Class 4A semifinals in 2010.

Both will count the season unsatisfactory if it doesn't

include deep postseason success.

Both are explosive on offense, Teurlings led by quarterback D'Shaie Landor and STM countering with Brandon Bergeron, and resourceful on defense.

There are plenty of challenges ahead for both teams in District 5-4A from Breau Bridge, Northside, St. Martinville and Cecilia, but tonight's TCHS-STM meeting has been the buzz since redistricting threw them together for 2011-12.

Two things are certain — emotions will run high and parking will be at a premium.

But there also is a feeling of familiarity, especially for a rivalry dormant for nearly a quarter century.

"There will be a lot of ties," said TCHS Principal Mike

head coach Jim Hightower at both Catholic-Pointe Coupee and at STM and also served as an assistant principal at STM before moving to Teurlings.

"Jim and I coached together a long time," Boyer added. "He and (St. Martinville coach) Gary Adkins were both in my wedding. I coached (STM assistant) Lance Strother. And, of course, Terry Tidwell has been at STM the whole time."

Tidwell's brother Greg coached Teurlings to the Class A semifinals in 1992 with Jake Delhomme as quarterback. The year before, current STM baseball coach Gary Perkins was the Rebels' football coach.

"(Cougars safety) Beau Brodhead grew up on this campus, until Gary (coach Gary Brodhead) went to McNeese," Boyer said. "They lived near STM, and he ended up going there. A lot of the kids attend city schools and attended some of the feeder schools."

"It's all good." Current UL Ragin' Cajun defender Andrew Hebert is a former TCHS standout whose father Jay starred on the 1982 Rebel team that capped a 10-0, unscored-upon regular season with a 25-0 win over STM in the schools' initial meeting.

Current Rebel J.T. Hebert is the son of Jay's twin brother, Jed, who joined his brother playing for UL.

St. Thomas More defender Andrew Mahtook's father is Robert, part of a line of star athletes at the school that includes LSU baseball All-American Mikie.

thedral-Carmel before Cathedral and Fatima student bodies were merged to form STM.

There is tradition and winning on both sides. Although they haven't shared the same stage in football recently, they aren't total strangers.

"We've played each other in every sport there is," Boyer said. "We just haven't been on the football field with them."

They share that field tonight, though.

"They're the No. 1 team in the state in power rankings and in the polls," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "This is an opportunity to measure where we are, playing the best team in the state. It's what you play for, what you work for."

"We've played them in JV and freshman ball, and done 7-on-7 drills in the summer. The guys have grown up competing against each other. Jim Hightower is a good friend, and our two staffs get along. Jim is a great coach. His record has

stood the test of time. All they do is win."

district, we've got to line up and play every week."

Charpentier knows his team will be tested by the versatile STM attack.

"Offensive balance is always good," Charpentier said. "That puts a lot of pressure on your defense. They also play extremely fast. They get their personnel in and out quickly. They keep you off balance. That's tough on your defense."

"This is the third NAS-CAR team we've faced. You've got to cover the whole field."

Bergeron runs that unit crisply.

"Last week he did what he had to do," Hightower said. "He's quiet. He leads with dedication. He's a student of the game who's intelligent on the field."

Landor, meanwhile, has paced the Rebels to three 50-point games.

"They're super explosive on offense," Hightower said. "Landor is the trigger man who does it all, and Sonny does a good job calling plays. They're similar to what we saw at Barbe. I don't know if we've seen an arm as strong as Landor's."

Charpentier wants the 23-year wait to be worth it.

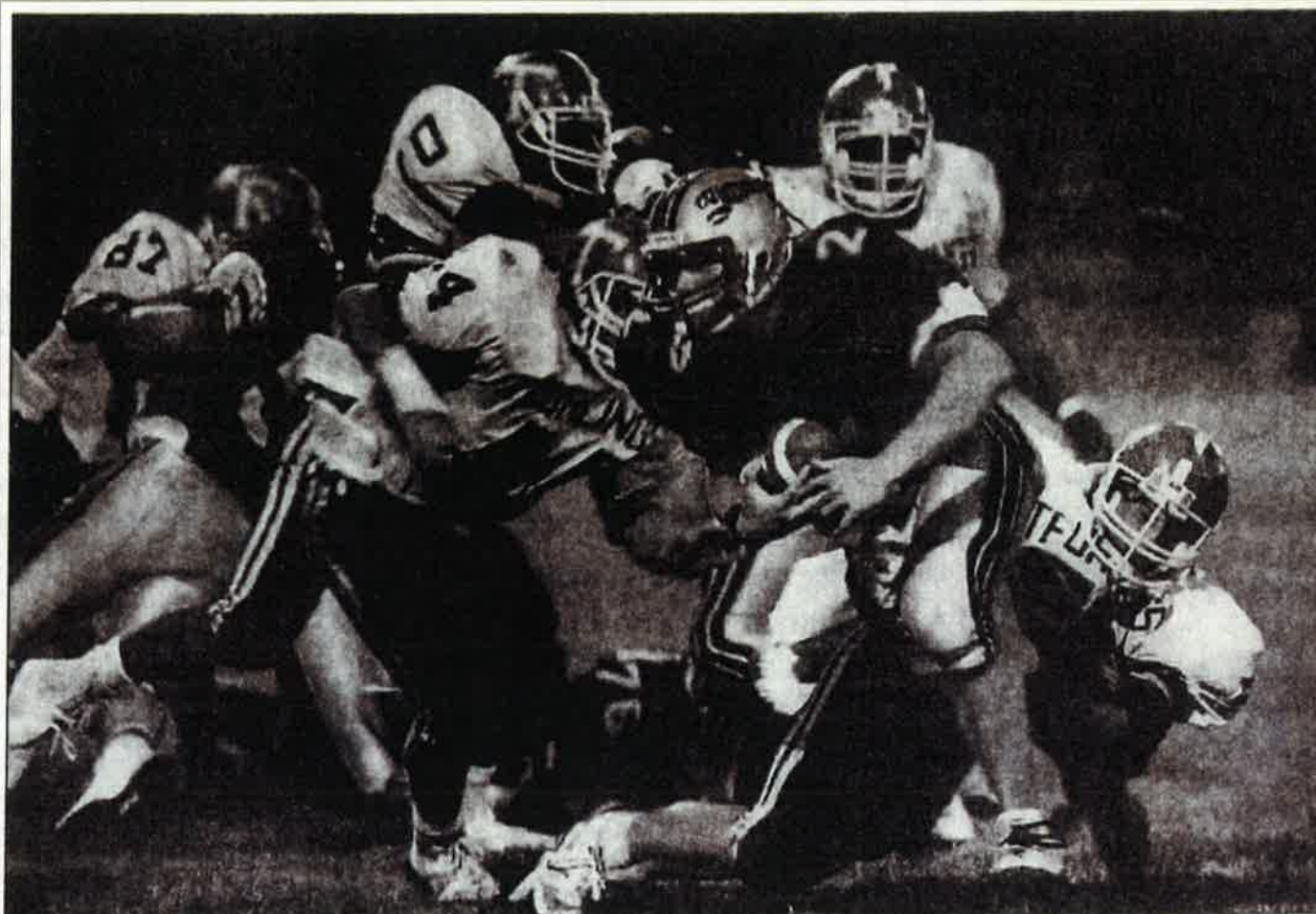
"We're still trying to find our identity," he said. "If we don't play well Friday, it could get ugly."

Worth the wait

Cougars withstand Rebels challenge to win 5-4A opener

This one was worth the 23-year wait.

No. 1-ranked St. Thomas More held off No. 7 Teurlings Catholic 27-24 in Friday night's District 5-4A opener at STM, leaving fans of both teams eager for the next meeting in a series dormant since 1988.

The victory was not fully sealed until Brandon Bergeron's 10-yard pass to tight end Jordan Murray reached the TCHS 27 and allowed the Cougars to kneel down for the final seconds.

Senior quarterback D'Shaie Landor had just finished a 9-play, 80-yard drive with a 10-yard touchdown pass to J.T.

Hebert, drawing the visitors within 27-24 with 4:04 to play.

But runs of 18 and 10 yards by Matt Flores earned a pair of first downs, and Bergeron put the icing on the cake with his fourth-down conversion to Murray.

It was a breathless ending to a dramatic contest.

"We gave it a great effort," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We gave ourselves a chance against the No. 1 team in the state, and you can't ask for more than that. We just couldn't get a stop at the end.

"You can't fault the kids' effort."

Flores rushed for 173 yards on 20 carries and scored on runs of 35 and 62 yards, the latter giving STM the lead for

good at 14-10 after the Rebels briefly jumped ahead in the third quarter.

"Flo played super, but he plays like that every week," Cougars coach Jim Hightower said. "When it's crunch time, you like to have him with the ball."

When the inspired Rebels defense put the clamps on the STM passing game (60 yards), the Cougars turned to the ground game and gobbled up 317 yards in 37 carries. They were especially effective on the left side behind tackle Will McMillan and Murray, but the entire line was dominant.

"Our offensive line bowed their necks and gave us some

great play tonight," Hightower said.

"The whole offensive line blocked great," said Flores. "Everybody does a great job. We do what we do. And, I couldn't do it without the job our wide receivers do blocking downfield."

St. Thomas More moved briskly to a 7-0 lead with a 9-play, 87-yard drive to open the contest. Flores scored from 35 yards out one snap after TCHS dropped a certain interception.

Landor converted a fourth-and-15 with a 21-yard pass to Zach LaFleur, setting up a 28-yard Jacob Cunningham field goal with 3:35 left in the opening half.

It was 7-3 at the break, surprising those who expected a shootout between two high-powered offenses. The two teams countered each other so well, it was as if they played every week, instead of every quarter century or so.

"At the half, we talked about picking up the tempo, speed it up some," Hightower said. "I thought we played a little slow in the first half."

But it was the Rebels who struck first after the break as a 47-yard Landor pass to Dylan Bossier set up a 16-yard scoring strike to a leaping Phillip Vidrine in the corner of the end

zone for 10-7 lead.

Three plays later, Flores escaped for his 62-yard TD to make it 14-10, and on the first Rebels snap after that, an overthrown Landor pass was intercepted by Beau Brodhead.

Brodhead returned the theft 18 yards to the TCHS 27, and a 7-yard run by Patrick Scott quickly made it 20-10. Teurlings refused to fold, though, marching 86 yards in 13 plays capped by LaFleur's 5-yard run with 7:56 remaining. Landor converted a fourth-and-11 with a 26-yard aerial to Devonte Jackson reaching the 15 to set up the touchdown.

"D'Shaie battled," said Charpentier. "He's got the heart of a lion. He played tough against a good defensive team."

"He's good, but he didn't do it alone," High-

tower said. "He had some help. Bossier (9-for-123) is talented."

Unruffled, the Cougars responded with a quick-strike march of four plays capped by a 35-yard scoring dash by Scott (8 for 83 yards in support of Flores) at the 6:09 mark.

Once again Landor came back, hitting Hebert, and once again the Rebels couldn't stop the No. 1 Cougars from powering down the field. "We did a good job on offense," Hightower said. "We didn't have any stupid plays. I don't think we had any turnovers, and in a game like this that's key."

"We know what we'll be facing each week in our district," Flores said. "We know we'll get their best shot. We'll go back to work and try to get better at what we do."

Rebels pound Tigers

Teurlings handles No. 2 BBHS in gut-check district victory

The entire week leading up to Friday's District 4A meeting with the state's No. 2-ranked Breaux Bridge Tigers, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels heard how they would struggle to bounce back following last week's close defeat to St. Thomas More.

But the Rebels proved the naysayers wrong, doing everything but struggle en route to crushing the previously unbeaten Tigers 28-7 at Clark Field.

"We heard all of that being said as well and I couldn't have disagreed with it more," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said.

"We heard how it would be hard for us to follow up the big effort we gave last week against STM and that we would have a letdown, but our program is way better than that."

And they proved it Friday, behind a stifling defense that suffocated

the Tigers' offense and a quarterback/receiver tandem in D'Shaie Landor and Dylan Bossier that left Breaux Bridge's defense gasping for air.

"I don't think we played well on either side of the football," Tigers coach Paul Broussard said. "But I give all of the credit to Teurlings, because they played very well. They made plays and we didn't. They deserve the victory and we didn't."

The victory, their first over Breaux Bridge (6-1, 1-1) since 2007, marked only the fifth time in 23 meetings the Rebels beat the Tigers, snapping a three-game losing streak to them.

With the exception of a couple of big plays created by the Tigers' Travin Dural, who finished the game with five catches for 88 yards and one touchdown, the Rebels' defense proved to be too much for Breaux Bridge to handle.

The Rebels, who improved to 4-3 overall and 1-1 in district, was stellar

defensively as they allowed six yards rushing (121 passing) and six first downs, while recording five sacks, forcing one turnover on downs and nine punts en route to holding the Tigers to a season low seven points.

"Our defense played extremely well," Charpentier said. "I really have to take my hat off to those guys for holding their offense to only seven points."

After watching film of the Rebels prior to the game, Broussard said he noticed a great improvement in Teurlings' defense.

"Going into the game, I felt that Teurlings was really good on defense," Broussard said. "They played extremely well and they executed their game plan. They had a good scheme and we had no answer for it."

The Tigers didn't have much of an answer for the Rebels' offense either, which recorded 382 yards of total offense.

Landor had another solid game, completing

13-of-23 passes for 260 yards and three touchdowns, but it was the play of senior receiver Bossier that had everyone talking at game's end.

Although the Tigers' Dural, who is an LSU commitment, received much of the attention before the game, it was Bossier who garnered the spotlight as he hauled in five receptions for 179 yards and two touchdowns.

"We feel like athlete for athlete we have a chance," Charpentier said. "We still feel like we had some missed opportunities."

Bossier consistently got behind the Tigers' secondary and burned them for touchdown grabs of 65 and 73 yards that helped break the game open.

"D'Shaie is D'Shaie," Broussard said. "He's been starting for three years, but it was the big plays by (Bossier) that they got on us. That's what hurt us."

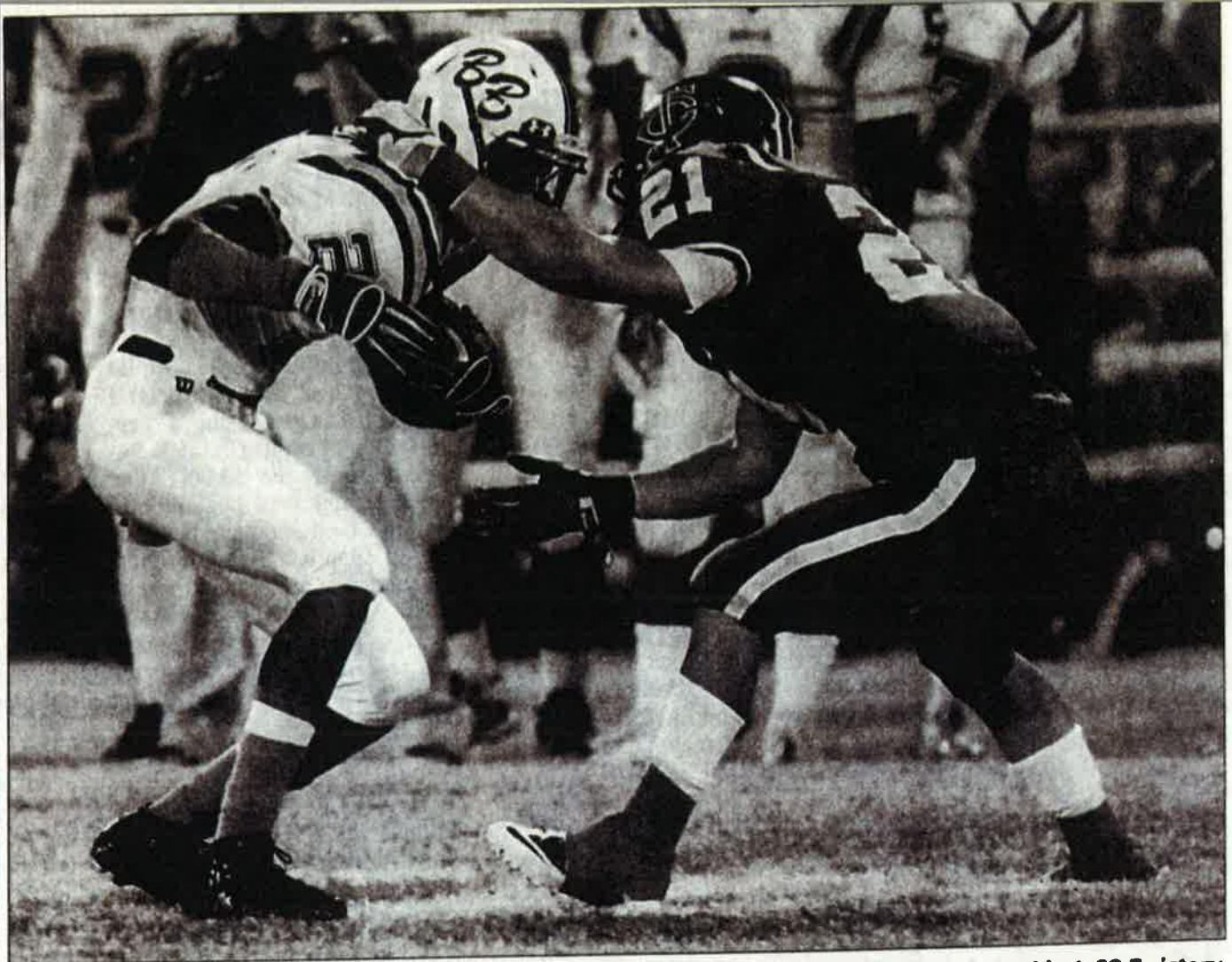

Rebels roaring

Cecilia braces for No. 5 Teurlings

Cecilia coach Terry Martin already knew it was going to be a very difficult task for his Bulldogs to try to pull off an upset of the No. 5-ranked Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

Then he watched the film of the Rebels handling Breaux Bridge 28-7 last Friday. Now the challenge seems even greater when Cecilia hosts Teurlings at 7 p.m. Friday at Bulldog Stadium.

"I was already expecting them to be tough to prepare for on offense, but they look great on defense as well," Martin said. "Their front six players are strong and run to the ball well."

The Rebels' defense limited Breaux Bridge's offense to six first downs and six yards rushing.

"It was impressive," Martin said. "They didn't leave any doubt. Their line (BBHS offensive line) didn't move them and they couldn't get around them."

"They even ran a speed sweep once, and the Teurlings safety just stepped up and stopped them for no gain."

Cecilia's offense has been pretty explosive itself of late. In last week's 35-29 win over St. Martinville, D'Andre Dartez rushed for 201 yards and caught two passes for 50 more yards.

"Dartez is the real deal," Teurlings coach

Sonny Charpentier said. "They put him in the slot, he returns punts and he returns kicks. Like anyone would do when they have a talent like that, they try to get the ball in his hands as many different ways as they can."

"He's a one-cut kind of runner. He's not a juker. He puts that foot in the ground and runs north and south."

Even before seeing the film, Martin knew his offense needs to tie up a few loose ends if the Bulldogs are going to win any more games in this rugged District 5-4A schedule.

"There are still times when we're making mental mistakes that I wish we still weren't making," he said. "Even in last week's game, we had some opportunities to score that we didn't capitalize on. We had an interception at the 7 and then another first-and-goal situation where

we ran a play-action pass and fumbled the ball. We still have plenty of room to improve."

Ironically, the Rebels stuffed STM's rushing game for most of that encounter two weeks ago.

"We did a good job of taking away some of the things they (BBHS) wanted to do," Charpentier said. "We just made a lot of plays on defense. We tell our offense that sometimes the defense just makes plays."

"We put pressure on their quarterback and made him take his eyes off his receivers."

Assuming the Bulldogs can figure out a way to deal with the Teurlings defense better than Breaux Bridge did, they still will have the chore of slowing down Teurlings quarterback D'Shaie Lander.

In last week's win over BBHS, Lander threw

for 260 yards and three touchdowns and also ran for 45 yards.

"D'Shaie is as accurate a passer as I've seen in this area in a long time," Martin said. "He's got an extremely quick release and he can run it. Last year, he really hurt us running it."

"And that (WR Dylan) Bossier kid is as fast as anything I've seen."

As life goes in this district, Teurlings (4-3, 1-1) still has Northside on its schedule even after this challenge, while Cecilia (3-4, 1-1) must still play Breaux Bridge and St. Thomas More.

"It doesn't get any easier," Martin said.

TC Rebels soar past Bulldogs

CECILIA — For the better part of the past three years, it's been quarterback D'Shaie Landon that football fans think of when the Teurlings Catholic Rebels are brought up.

And while Landon continues to put up solid numbers week after week, it is the Rebels defense that is beginning to draw attention, as they once again turned in another solid performance to propel Teurlings to a decisive 42-13 victory over the Cecilia Bulldogs Friday night.

"Overall, I think we were sluggish at times throughout the game," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "But when you go on the road, you are just happy to get a win. Cecilia has a lot of tradition over here and it is always a battle for us and tonight was no different."

The Rebels, who improved to 6-3 overall and 1-1 in District 5-4A, intercepted four passes, held the Bulldogs to 3-for-10 on third down conversions, forced two punts, two turnovers on downs and held them in only seven first downs in the game.

"This is definitely one of the better defensive teams Teurlings has had in a while," Bulldogs head coach Terry Martin said. "They are very strong up-front and their defenders all run very well. They are a very good defensive team."

It was the Rebels' defense who turned in what was arguably the turning point in the game, when they forced an interception with less than one minute remaining until halftime in the Bulldogs' territory to set up a score.

Leading 8-0 with less than one minute remaining and the football at the Bulldogs' 18, Rebels linebacker Michael Courville picked off the first of his two interceptions on the night; when the ball went through the hands of Jean Angelle and returned it to Cecilia's 7.

Two plays later, Rebels running back Zach LaFleur punched it in from three yards out to increase Teurlings' lead to 15-0 with 18 seconds remaining.

"The score right before the half was huge," Charpentier said. "It was huge because it looked like we were going to be going into halftime leading only 8-0, but that interception and score was a big momentum builder for us. When you look back at it, going up by two scores; it probably was (turning point in the game)."

That turnover right before the half that gave the Rebels an extra possession with great field position which they took full advantage of, proved even more costly for the Bulldogs in the second half as they opened with a four play 74 yard drive that was capped by a 45-yard touchdown run by Jeremy Doucette to cut the deficit to 15-6.

"We came out right away in the second half and scored," Martin said. "But we gave them too many chances and they are too good of a team to give that many extra chances to."

Being down nine early in the third quarter is as close as the Bulldogs would get the rest of the way, as they went on to be outscored 27-7 en route to the 42-13 victory.

"Against a team like that you can't give them extra chances," Martin said. "A team that is so explosive on offense, you just can't give them those extra opportunities with the ball. We made too many mistakes and that's kind of how it's been all year."

Devonte Jackson rushed for 67 yards and one touchdown.

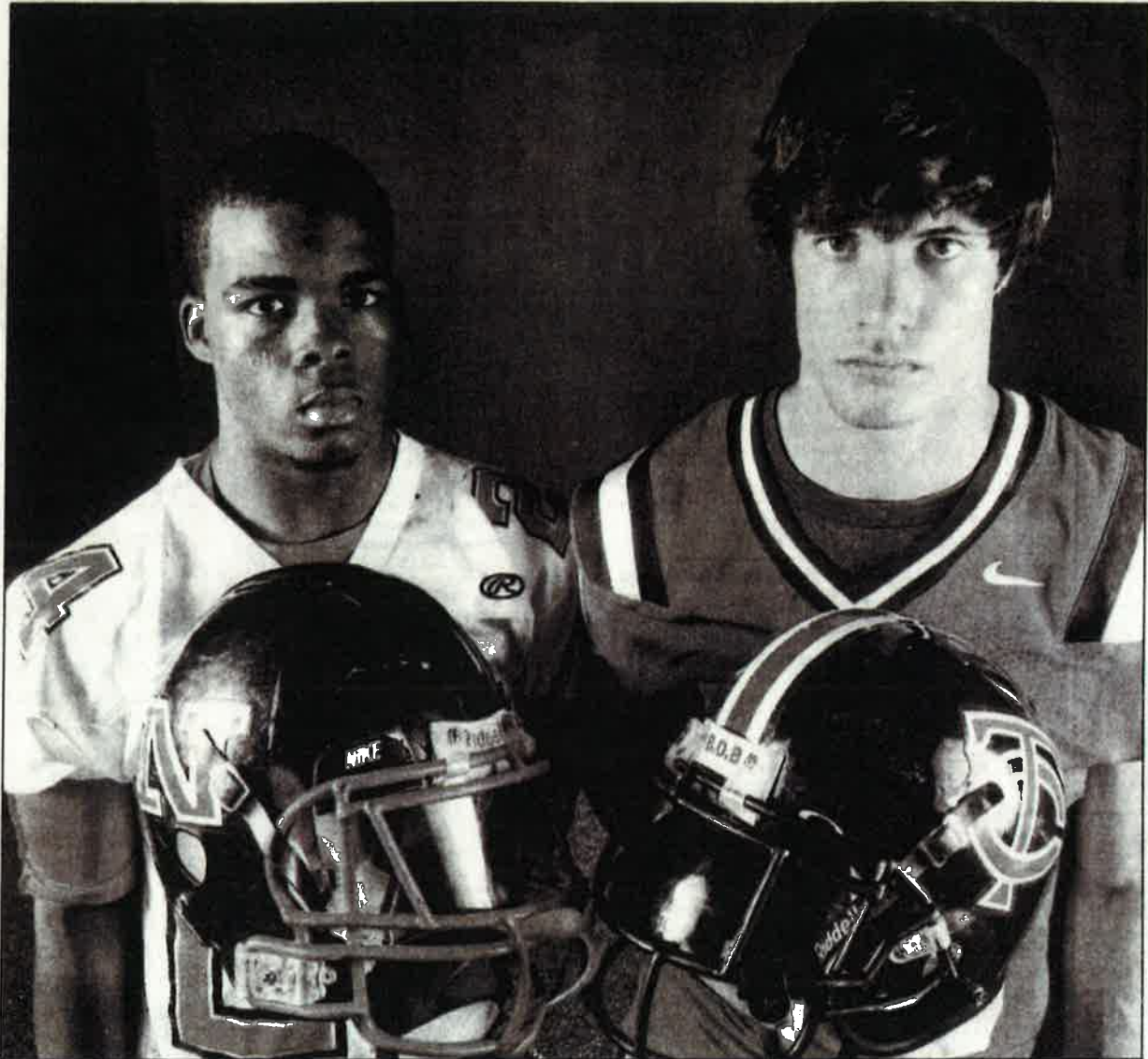

Northside, Teurlings battle to climb district ladder

Unless you share a stadium, there's no shorter road trip than Northside at Teurlings Catholic.

The neighboring rivals meet tonight at Clark Field with the state playoffs and a chance to share the District 5-4A crown still on the table for both programs.

Tonight's game is a showcase for two of the four teams tied atop the 5-4A race with 2-1 records. The other two are on the road — St. Thomas More at St. Martinville and Breaux Bridge at rival Cecilia — so the victor has an outside chance at gaining an edge.

Either way, it's a high-level matchup of contenders on a mission.

"To be honest, it is what I expected," NHS coach Vincent DeRouen said of the district logjam. "It has stayed true to form. It's a dogfight, just as I thought it would be."

Northside (5-3) has recovered from a short-handed 0-2

start, while TCHS is No. 6 in the state despite three losses largely because the Rebels (also 5-3) are the only team to top Breaux Bridge.

Rebels. "Every year is different. Every game is different. It's a matchup deal.

"I felt all along that we would be pretty good defensively. Now the offense has kind of caught up."

Charpentier's squad followed its upset of Breaux Bridge with a 42-15 road win at Cecilia, one week after bouncing back from a heartbreaking defeat at STM to stun BBHS, so focus has not been a problem.

"No," he said, "we had done it already. I knew we could do it. Any time you can win on the road, it's good.

"We led 8-0, then kind of fizzled on a couple of drives. But our defense turned them over and we were able to score just before half to make it 15-0. That's huge on the road."

While the Rebels were disposing of Cecilia, the Vikings were surviving a 20-19 homecoming thriller over St. Martinville.

"We're still having nightmares about it," DeRouen said with a laugh. "We were able to bounce back after we came out so flat (following a loss to STM). We had a lot of negative plays early, but we hung on for the win."

DeRouen credited the play of his offensive line, led by Alton LaGrange and Calan Angelle, for restoring order, as well as defensive linemen Gerren Powell and Sederra Leopaul for their performance.

The Vikings, who got a spark with the midseason return of Jasper Turner at quarterback, have Charpentier's attention.

"Turner is as good a quarterback as we're going to face from an athletic standpoint," he said. "He's equally dangerous with his arm or his feet. We have our work cut out for us. They keep you off-balance. They're also huge up front. I hope we don't get smothered by them.

"On defense, it's the same old Northside with their run blitz package. They've been playing well."

Senior quarterback D'Shaie Landor will direct the Rebels against that defense, aided by receiver Dylan Bossier and backs Zach LaFleur, Devonte Jackson and Blair Lormand.

"They make plays on offense," DeRouen said. "Their quarterback and receivers work well together, and they mix in the run to keep you honest. And, more so than in the past, their defense has been playing really well.

"We'll try to control the ball more and eat the clock. We haven't shown the ability to do that much, but we've been working on it."

LaFleur emerged for TCHS while Lormand was injured, making the Rebels more versatile.

"We made a mistake early using Zach in multiple spots," Charpentier said. "But since we kept him at our fullback position, he has begun to flourish. He's able to react and just play now. He's a heck of a player for a sophomore."

"Blair had his first game back against Cecilia, and it doesn't look like he's missed a step. Devonte could probably play all five (skill) positions if we were in a bind, and Dylan has taken his play up to a new level."

Safety Brandon Lard and the NHS secondary will be focused on stopping the Rebels' versatile aerial game, while TCHS defenders like Simon Hudi deal with running backs Kenneth Johnson and Carenski Andrus as well as the Monkurvis Irvin-led receiver corps.

Both teams know what to do once they reach the postseason. The Rebels reached the Class 4A semifinals in 2010 before being ousted by Karr, one week after the Vikings bowed out in the quarterfinals at the hands of the same Cougars squad.

But the focus is only on tonight's game for now.

"I don't look at the power points until next week," DeRouen said. "Once we play Week 9, then I'll sit down, do the math and look at it on paper."

Teurlings handles Northside to stay tied for 5-4A lead

Teurlings Catholic had too much firepower and too much versatility for the Northside Vikings Friday night as the Rebels followed resourceful quarterback D'Shaie Landor to a 35-16 victory at Clark Field.

Landor ran 15 times for 124 yards and two touchdowns and threw for a pair of scores to running back Zach LaFleur, propelling TCHS to a 6-3 record and a 3-1 mark in District 5-4A.

"Their offense kept us off-balance all night," said NHS coach Vince DeRouen, whose team fell to 5-4 and 2-2. "When we thought they were going to pass, they ran. When we thought they were going to run, they passed."

Teurlings netted 317 yards and 23 first downs despite top

receiver Dylan Bossier being held to one catch for three yards.

"Any time you try to take something away, that opens up something else," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They made a conscious effort to bracket him. We were able to have success running between the tackles."

LaFleur made sure Landor had other weapons, rushing 10 times for 58 yards and a touchdown and catching six passes for 58 more yards and two scores. Also, tailback Blair Lormand (9-for-39) continues to bounce back from an early-season knee injury.

While the Rebels had a full arsenal, Northside played without quarterback Jasper Turner, who was held out of action pending an eligibility probe. Turner left NHS last summer for Mor-

gan City, then returned this fall and was gradually worked into the lineup by DeRouen in tandem with Traven Lamelle.

"We learned last night that Jasper was under investigation for some things that happened while he was at Morgan City," DeRouen said. "So, we decided to be on the safe side and sit him out tonight. But I was proud of Traven. I thought he did a real good job running the offense."

"We knew their quarterback wasn't going to play," Charpentier said. "The kids knew. We (coaches) didn't make a big thing about it. But the kid who played (Lamelle) has taken a lot of snaps for them this year, and he kept them in the game until the end."

Northside expects to learn Turner's fate next week.

The Rebels drove to the Vikings' 1-yard line on their first possession before getting thrown back, then marched 43 yards in three plays for a 7-0 lead as Landor slithered through the defense from 16 yards away.

Northside answered with a brisk 67-yard march, sparked by Kevin Johnson's 29-yard run and capped by a 9-yard Carenski Andrus run, and Lamelle found Vondavious Breaux for a two-point conversion and an 8-7 lead.

Teurlings, which had 15 first downs in the first half alone, responded with a pair of touchdown drives. The first was climaxed by Landor's 8-yard run, and the second was a masterful 87-yard, 13-play march

ending in a 13-yard pass to LaFleur just 2:38 from halftime for a 21-8 lead at the break.

The visitors came out with a purpose to start the second half, and Monkurvis Irvin cut back with a short pass for a 46-yard gain to the TCHS 3 to set up Lamelle's 3-yard score. When Johnson added a two-point PAT, Northside was within 21-16 with plenty of time remaining.

But TCHS put together a 6-minute, 72-yard, 11-play drive to make it 28-16. LaFleur's 9-yard catch capped the effort.

"I thought the drive was huge after they closed within 5 points," Charpentier said. "There was a third and 5 or 6 where they were expecting pass and D'Shaie was able to pick it up on a quarterback draw.

"That was huge for us to be able answer them right there."

The final score, an 11-

yard run by LaFleur, came with 3:03 remaining, following the first of two pickoffs of Lamelle passes by Michael Hawkins.

Both teams lost starters in the game. Rebels guard Kade Steiner was felled by a dislocated kneecap in the first half, while NHS defensive back Katrell Fuselier tumbled to the end zone turf when he and a teammate collided on Landor's 9-yard pass to LaFleur in the third period.

"This was a life lesson tonight," DeRouen said. "That's what we preach to the kids. We've still got another game to play next week (against Breaux Bridge), so we'll come back and go to work."

"Northside's got a good team. I wish them luck," said Charpentier, whose team hosts St. Martinville in its finale. "Each game is different. We're finding a way to win."

More than football?

Believe it or not, there are things more important than a football game.

Teurlings Catholic defensive back Brady Burch was surprised at the beginning of the season when his father Kevin returned from a tour of duty as a defense contractor in the Middle East to share every game with his son.

And, now that the Rebels are one win away from sharing the title in rugged District 5-4A, every step of the way has had added meaning.

"Brady's dad got back into town and wanted to surprise him, so we arranged for him to be there for a program at school," Principal Mike Boyer said. "We talked about those with parents who are serving their country, and asked Brady to come up."

When Burch did, his father was brought out from behind a curtain and the two shared a heartfelt hug.

"It surprised me," Burch said. "It was pretty cool. He has served three tours so far, one in Iraq and two in Afghanistan."

"My junior year, he left after the third game and missed the rest of the season (as TCHS reached the Class 4A semifinals), but we had tapes of all the games and sent them to him."

"He definitely wanted to make it happen to be back for my senior year. I thought he would be back for our second game, but he was able to come back earlier."

When the Rebels stunned No. 2-ranked Breaux Bridge 28-7 in Week 7, it changed the complexion of the season.

"Nobody expected us to win that game," Burch said. "All the talk had been about St. Thomas More and Breaux Bridge. We were always pretty confident, but the Breaux Bridge game gave us that boost to finish out the season with wins."

The 6-3 Rebels, whose only loss in District 5-4A was 27-24 at STM, handled Northside 35-16 at chilly Clark Field on Friday. A win on the same field in the season finale against St. Martinville will earn a co-title. Then it's on to the playoffs.

"Last year at the end, we started to get on a roll," Burch said. "It's kind of like this season."

Kevin Burch wouldn't have missed it for the world.

The defending Class 5A champion Acadiana Wrecking Rams have a week off to await their playoff assignment next Sunday after rolling past Comeaux 49-7 on Friday.

At 7-2, coach Ted Davidson's squad looks like it's got the elements in place for postseason. Offense and defense are there, of course, but special teams are also key.

"You can't discount the kicking game," Davidson said. "Jean Breaux has done a tremendous job of turning the field around for us as a punter, and after we score our opponent doesn't start past the 20 (with touchbacks)."

Rebels roll on

Teurlings offense near perfect in big win

The St. Martinville Tigers put up 17 first downs, had two backs rush for over 100 yards and rushed for 350 yards as a team.

And didn't come close to winning.

It was that kind of night for the Teurlings Catholic offense.

Quarterback D'Shaie Landor led the Rebels' offense on eight possessions and scored a touchdown each time to carry Teurlings to a 56-36 homecoming victory over St. Martinville on Friday at Clark Field.

Before looking into all the statistics, first things first.

The win improved Teurlings to 7-3 on the season and earned the Rebels a tie for first in District 5-4A.

"This is definitely a nice season," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "It's a nice accomplishment. This is a good football season."

Now comes the post-season.

"It feels good," Landor said. "It feels good to do something that a lot of people didn't think we would do."

The first quarter started out innocently enough with each team scoring once. The Tigers drove 69 yards on eight plays in 3:44 for a 6-0 lead, only for Teurlings to answer with a seven-play, 67-yard drive in 2:34 for a 7-6 lead.

But once SMSH responded with an 11-play, 72-yard drive in 5:33 for a 12-7 lead with 11:52 left in the second period, the tennis match was on.

Nick Neumeyer's inter-

ception ended the Tigers' next drive. Other than that and a fumbled kickoff, the two offenses combined to score touchdowns in 12 of the game's first 15 possessions.

"It's not pressure," Landor said. "You always know that you have to outscore the other offense no matter if it's a shutout or you have to score a lot of points. So we didn't feel any pressure."

"We had a good game-plan going into the game." Did they ever.

Landor gave the Rebels the lead for good at 14-12 with a 22-yard TD run with 10:07 left until half-time and then followed Neumeyer's interception with a 20-yard TD pass to Phillip Vidrine for a 21-12 lead.

But SMSH quarterback Clifton Chaisson ended the Tigers' next two possessions with TD runs of

35 and 48 yards to try to keep pace at 35-26 with 3:03 left until intermission.

Chaisson finished the game with 156 yards and four TDs on 21 carries and that includes 17 yards lost on a pair of sacks by Logan Dupre. Jude St. Julien finished with 103 yards on 14 carries.

"I would have never thought that we'd score 36 points on Teurlings, although I'm not real good at predicting that kind of stuff," SMSH coach Gary Adkins said. "We did a really nice job of running the ball. The interception and fumbling that kickoff really hurt, but for a while there we were nip-and-tuck with them."

"We're just so excited to get the opportunity to be going to the playoffs."

Zach LaFleur, who had 72 yards rushing on the night, scored three first-

half touchdowns and wide receiver Dylan Bossier had an 11-yard touchdown run.

By the end of the first half, Teurlings had 14 first downs, 159 yards rushing and 142 yards passing.

The Rebels then opened the third quarter with a seven-play, 61-yard drive for a 49-26 cushion.

"I wasn't happy with the win, but I wasn't happy with everything about it," Charpentier said. "We didn't play well on defense. Give St. Martinville credit. They have good athletes. They ran hard. But we've got to play better defensively. You don't want to have to outscore teams like that."

Landor finished 14-of-19 passing for 228 yards and three touchdowns.

Bossier had five receptions for 121 yards and a score.



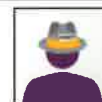

Rebels sweep Dogs

Teurlings downs Cecilia to reach regional round of 4A state playoffs

Teurlings Catholic kicked off the postseason at Clark Field with a colorful display of pregame fireworks. The Rebels offense flashed its own pyrotechnics with a 21-point burst in the second quarter, leading to the 31-6 first round victory over district foe Cecilia.

Statistically, the contest was closer than the scoreboard indicated. Teurlings dominated by playing mistake-free football, committing only one penalty to Cecilia's nine, and forcing two Bulldog turnovers.

"A win is a win," Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We weren't our best, but we get to play again next week."

D'Shaie Landor was effectively efficient, completing 17-of-27 passes for 212 yards and two touchdowns.

The Rebel defense held Cecilia's explosive tailback D'Andre Dartez to just 53 yards on 13 carries, and sacked Tylor Robin five times.

"They have some quality skill guys," Charpentier said, "But the bottom line was we were able to keep them out of the end zone most of the night."

Teurlings ate up five first quarter minutes with a 70-yard drive, but Cecilia's defense tightened at the goal-line and pushed

the Rebels backwards on three consecutive plays. The home team settled for a 22-yard Jacob Cunningham field goal.

Charpentier's offense found its rhythm in the second quarter, scoring touchdowns on all three possessions.

Blair Lormand was the first Rebel to reach the end zone with a one-yard plunge. The score was set up by a 59-yard catch and run from Landor to Lormand.

Teurlings' defense imposed its will in the first half, Cecilia failed to penetrate deeper than the Rebels 41. The visitor's best

play, a 25-yard completion from Robin to Jaquontae Espree which would have given the Bulldogs a first down at the Teurlings 20, was reversed because of two Cecilia penalties.

"Teurlings is a good team," Cecilia head coach Terry Martin said. "Their defense makes it hard to sustain a drive."

The Rebels extended their lead on a 26-yard dart from Landor to Dylan Bossier. The junior finished with 79 yards on seven catches. Late in the half, Jesse Provost blocked and recovered a Cecilia punt, giving Teurlings the ball at the 19.

Landor found Philip Vidrine for 16 yards on first down. The Ragin' Cajuns commitment demonstrated his skills on the next play. Under heavy pressure, Landor calmly sidestepped the rush and checked down to a wide open Vidrine. The touchdown gave Teurlings the 24-0 lead at intermission.

"I was going with my primary read but I saw the blitz coming," Landor said. "So I rolled to the right, my secondary route was open and I just dumped it off."

Cecilia drove 85 yards to open the second half, scoring on a 36-yard touchdown pass from Robin to Dartez. The extra point was blocked.

The Bulldogs broke into Rebel territory early in the fourth, but Charpentier's defense came up with a drive-killing turnover. Robin hurled a deep ball to Shane Dupuis, open at the five, but the leaping receiver was only able to tip the pass, which landed in the arms of free safety Brady Burch. Burch returned the interception forty yards and Cecilia never threatened again.

"We just didn't make the plays when we had the chance," Martin said.

Zach Lafleur added an insurance score for the Rebels late in the game on a 12-yard run.

Teurlings will host 11-seed O.P. Walker in the second round.

Rebels primed for O.P. Walker

Playing top-notch competition is nothing new to the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

When you play a schedule that includes nine playoff teams — with the 10th only being out because of LHSAA sanctions — and six still alive after the first round, you kind of get used to it.

That doesn't mean, however, that coach Sonny Charpentier and his Rebels don't have reason for concern with the O.P. Walker Chargers invading Clark Field for a 7 p.m. Class 4A state regional game at Clark Field.

"It's definitely going to be a challenge," Charpentier said. "They're fast in all the right places and their big in all of the right places. They really get in your face on defense. They try to take certain players away."

One of the primary ways of doing that is LSU commitment cornerback Dwayne Thomas, who figures to be locked down on Teurlings receiver Dylan Bossier.

Because of talents like Thomas, the Chargers have a big-play mentality on defense, "looking for turnovers and big plays."

Teurlings is hoping its versatility on offense will help counteract that. With a reputation of being a spread, wide-open attack behind UL commitment quarterback D'Shaie Landor, the Rebels have also shown the ability to run the ball.

The running game has been sparked by Zach LaFleur, who took over

after Blair Lormand's injury. Now both are available with Lormand adding to the passing game.

"We're going to have to run the football," Charpentier said. "We've seen some teams run the ball in between the tackles."

"Zach has really stepped

up for us. He's grown up a lot. At the beginning of the season, we were asking him to play different roles, but it's worked out much better now that we've locked him down into that one spot."

The Rebels don't often shy away from the passing

game even against elite secondary.

"We can't get caught up in that, but we'll take our shots down the field," Charpentier said.

The rest of the challenge is going to be on the Rebels' defense with a 6-5 quarterback in Devin Powell and tail, athletic receiver in Raymond Jackson.

"Our secondary is definitely going to be challenged," Charpentier said. "Their quarterback throws it well. He will run, but he wants to throw it. We're going to have to play really well collectively."

That big-play receiver is Raymond Jackson with seven touchdowns out of 30 catches in just eight regular season games.

Rebels win thriller

For most of three quarters Friday night, O. Perry Walker's offensive unit was having its way with Teurlings Catholic's defense.

But that Rebel unit responded when it was most needed, getting key stops on the Chargers' final four offensive series, and came up with the game's — and the season's — single biggest play at the end.

Pressure from the Rebels forced standout Walker quarterback Devin Powell to hurry a two-point conversion throw in overtime, and when running back Anthony Scott couldn't scoop that throw off the Clark Field turf the host Rebels had escaped with a stirring 35-34 Class 4A regional playoff victory.

Sixth-seeded Teurlings, advancing to a quarterfinal road game at Lutchter next Friday, trailed by 14 points twice in the game but rallied back both times. The second of those rallies came via 14 unanswered points in the final quarter — a

period in which the Rebel defense held the 11th-seeded Chargers to only one first down.

"We made just enough plays," said TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier, "and we needed to because they (Walker) have some guys that can make a lot of things happen."

At the end, though, it was the Rebels (9-3) who were doing the play-making after trailing 28-14 entering the final period. Zach LaFleur went over the top from one yard out with 11:06 left to make it an eight-point game after Dwayne Thomas stormed in to block Jacob Cunningham's extra-point try.

The Chargers had possession three times in Rebel territory after that but posted zero points, and TCHS quarterback D'Shaie Landor's nine-yard scoring run and his two-point conversion toss to J. T. Hebert tied the game at 28 with 4:03 left.

"That gave us a big spark on both sides of the ball," Landor said of the two scores in the final quarter. "The defense got some stops and that really

shifted the momentum for us."

In overtime, LaFleur burst into the end zone on a nine-yard third-down scoring run, and Cunningham's kick gave the Rebels a 35-28 lead. But Walker scored on the very first play of its possession, a pounding 10-yard run by Scott.

The Chargers, who went for two on all five of its conversion tries, lined up for the win-or-lose two-pointer, but pressure from the middle forced Powell to throw early and short of Scott, setting off a Rebel celebration.

"The coaches kept telling us to just stay confident and know we were going to win," said Landor, who struggled to a 4-of-17 throwing night against the talented Charger secondary, but who led all rushers in the game with 120 yards and two scores. "We'd faced adversity before this season ... we just had to keep playing."

Some of that adversity was in place Friday, when O. Perry Walker took an instant 14-0 lead and could easily have made it

a three-score game. The Chargers marched 66 yards in nine plays with the opening kickoff before Powell went one yard on a QB sneak for the touchdown.

Less than three minutes later, Landor's sideline pass was picked off by Damien Davis, who went 40 untouched yards for the score that made it 14-0. Then, after forcing a Rebel punt, the Chargers drove to the Rebel one-yard-line and had a first down.

"If they get up by 21," Charpentier said, "I don't know what might have happened. They're hard enough to get 14 back."

Two false-start penalties, a sack of Powell and two incompletions from the TCHS 30 followed, and it only took Teurlings to drive 70 yards the other direction before Dylan Bossier went the final three yards.

Rebel defensive back Brennan Stelly recovered a fumble three plays after the ensuing kickoff, and the Rebels drove 70 yards to tie the game on Landor's two-yard run.

Clearly, it's hard to rattle the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

Twice last Friday, the Rebels trailed visiting O. Perry Walker by two touchdowns in Class 4A regional playoff action, and twice they rallied.

Follow the leader

Outstanding Offensive title goes to Landor

D'Shaie Landor is a proven leader.

The senior quarterback paced the Teurlings Rebels to a share of the District 5-4A championship in 2011, earning the acclaim of coaches in the toughest 4A district in the state as they named him the league's Offensive MVP.

That was no surprise after Landor led TCHS to the 4A semifinals in 2010. In this year's playoffs, Landor sparked a wild 35-34 win over O. Perry Walker before Lutchel eliminated the Rebels in the quarterfinals.

Once again those efforts drew notice, as the UL Ragin' Cajun commitment was named the Outstanding Offensive Player on the LSWA Class 4A All-State Team selected by the state's media.

"Ever since I was small, my dad taught me that the quarterback is the ideal leader," Landor said during the season. "So I try to lead by example."

"D'Shaie is quiet, but he does the right things," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said. "He is a multiple threat who is a good fit for any school, especially with some of the things they're doing on offense now. But he's a passer first. He's definitely a quarterback, someone who has the ability to throw from the pocket or on the run."

Landor completed 175-of-315 passes for 2,360 yards 21 touchdowns. He also ran for 1,018 yards on 195 carries with eight TDs.

Two of Landor's rivals from state semifinalist Breaux Bridge joined him on the All-State Team — wide receiver and LSU commitment Travin Dural and linebacker and UL commitment Tyren Alexander.

Multi-threat Dural caught 45 passes for 902 yards and 19 touchdowns for the Tigers, and also scored on the ground as the focal point of the offense.

Alexander had 43 solo tackles,

94 assists, two fumble recoveries (one for a touchdown), two interceptions and two blocked punts (returning one for a score).

State champion Neville High claimed two of the top three awards on the team.

Linebacker Ricky Wyatt was selected as the Outstanding Defensive Player, while Neville's Mickey McCarty garnered Coach of the Year honors.

The 5-foot-10, 230-pound Wyatt led a dominating Neville defense by compiling a total of 113 tackles, including 70 solo tackles, 19 tackles for loss and three sacks. McCarty coached Neville to its second 4A title in three years, leading the Monroe-based Tigers to a perfect 14-0 record.

Joining Landor in the backfield were running backs Noble Johnson, of Franklin Parish, (1,686 rushing yards, 22 TDs), Daniel Taylor, of Lutchel, (2,086 rushing yards, 22 TDs) and St. Augustine's Leonard Fournette (1,957 rushing yards, 19 TDs).

Joining Dural at wide receiver were McDonogh 35's Kedrick Banks (21 catches, 471 yards, seven TDs) and Leesville's Clinton Thurman (57-1,346, 11 TDs).

The offensive line included Neville's Deion Scoby, Karr's Derek Edinburgh, McDonogh 35's Kenneth Santa Marina, Archbishop Shaw's Jude Bourgeois and Lutchel's Dane George.

Washington-Marion's Melvin Jones (67 tackles, 58 assists), Bastrop's Denzell Duvall (73 tackles) and Alexander joined Wyatt as linebackers on the defensive unit.

Neville's Lorenzo Lenoir (43 tackles, five tackles for loss), Woodlawn-Shreveport's Torshiro Davis (85 tackles), Karr's Titus Charles (65 tackles, 20 tackles for loss) and Karr's Leonard Washington (64 tackles, 25 tackles for loss) made up the defensive line.

The defensive backfield consisted of Alexandria Senior High's
