STM, Teurlings elect to play up

Cougars, Rebels would compete in Division I bracket in state playoffs

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When it has come to playing stiff competition, Teurlings Catholic and St. Thomas More haven't tried to avoid it on their schedules over the years.

So it should come as no surprise that despite having the

opportunity to avoid possibly having to face John Curtis and/ or Evangel in the postseason, Teurlings and St. Thomas More elected to join them in Division I.

Teurlings Catholic Principal Michael Boyer and St. Thomas More head football coach Jim Hightower con-

firmed that both the Rebels and the Cougars have elected to play up along with John Curtis and Evangel after all four participated in the Division II

playoff bracket a year ago.
"With less playoff games than we are used to playing regardless of the division, we felt it would be advantageous for us to play larger schools, get a larger gate and recoup some of the lost income from playing fewer playoff games," Boyer said. "The negative to doing so is that we are facing some schools that are larger than us, but the direction of the LHSAA

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Play

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is so unknown at the moment that we may end up in Division I in the future anyway."

Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier, who has made it a point throughout his career to challenge his team with a stiff non-district schedule, downplayed the notion that Teurlings and St. Thomas More sent a message to everyone else electing to avoid John Curtis and Evangel.

"I wouldn't say that we sent a message or that we are trying to send a message," Charpentier said. "We've never been afraid of competition. We know that we are not going to win them all, but we aren't going to back down from anyone."

In addition to John Curtis and Evangel, the Rebels and Cougars are entering a division that also includes St. Augustine, Catholic High of Baton Rouge and the defending state champion Rummel.

"It is what it is," Hightower said. "We'll strap it up and play whoever we have to play. I've never found an easy part in any bracket. Competition is competition and we have never dodged stiff competition."

Although competing in Division II last year was quite challenging as the bracket included John Curtis, Evangel, University, Notre Dame and Parkview Baptist, Boyer doesn't expect things to be any easier moving up to Division I.

"For us, we felt that moving up to Division I was beneficial regardless of who else moved up," Boyer said. "I can tell you it isn't that we feel it is going to be any easier than competing in Division II. I can say that it is still going to be a very tough bracket because we still are going to be facing John Curtis, Evangel and now Rummel and Catholic High. It won't be any easier."

It isn't known if the Rebels and Cougars intend to compete in Division I beyond this year and Boyer didn't state otherwise.

"We felt this was the appropriate move for us to make for a year and then revisit it again next year," Boyer said.

Teurlings Catholic

For a while there, the Teurlings Catholic football program was a tough one to figure out

Its history was filled with some great highs and tremendous lows. The year before I

began working at the Daily Advertiser, the Rebels enjoyed a sea-son for the ages in win-ning their first 11 games without giving up a single point on defense, before falling 26-8 at powerhouse John Curtis in the state quarterfinals.

That next season was pretty good as well with another district title and a 9-3 overall

Two losing seasons followed, before an explosive 1986 offense that scored more than 60 points in two games with another over 50 to post a successful 8-3

Instead of being a trend in the right direc-tion, though, four lean years ensued. Teurlings only won four of its

next 40 games,
Believe it or not, I do
remember covering
one of those four wins – a 27-6 shellacking of North Vermilion behind the big rushing night of Ed Stevens.

Ed Stevens.

But just as it appeared that the Rebels might be headed for a long drought, it turned around again with a 6-5 winning season and return to the postsea-son. Then in Jake Del-homme's senior season in 1992, the Rebels were back on top with a 10-4 record and making it all the way to the state semifinals. Unfortunately for

Rebels' fans, the roller coaster ride still wasn't over. Teurlings would go 4-16 over the next two seasons. Then, with two seasons. Then, win one decision by an coach, the roller coast-er ride ended with the hiring of Sonny Char-pentier as head football coach.

Charpentier played high school quarter-back, but was more known for being a college basketball player at Nicholls State and Top 28 basketball coach

at Teurlings. In his first season, the Rebels were 12-1 and then 10-2. Sure, there have been a few little speed bumps along the way – like 5-6 in 1998 and 6-5 in 2005 – but for the most part, Teurlings has been one of the most consistent winning programs in the area over the last two decades

It's amazing that

It's amazing that Charpentier's reign is about to hit his 20th season already. Along the way, he brought stability and made footbalf fun to play and watch at Teur-lings. The Charpentier era will also be remem-berted for exiting Clark era will also be remem-bered for exiting Clark Field for the Rebels' own campus stadium that must have seemed like a dream to many longtime fans.

But what I remem-ber most about the Charpentier era is the great games I've wit-nessed. A few really

nessed. A few really stick out in my mind. If I was going to list the top 10 games I've ever covered, several of them would likely be Teurlings games. One was a 21-14 regional round playoff win over Lutcher at Carenoro High in 1909.

High in 1999.
It was a perfect
example of what old
Dick Vitale meant by an all-airport team. Lutcher looked like a college team compared to Teurlings when the Bulldogs got off the bus, but somehow the Rebels prevailed that night on their way to a state semifinal appear

Then in 2002, there was a memorable state regional showdown in Abheville between Charpentier and Brent Indest's Wildcats, and the Rebels escaped with a 31-30 win thanks

to a stop on the goal line to secure it. (I also covered the quarterfinal game the quarterfinal game the next week against Pat-terson. I still haven't figured out what hap-pened at the end of that game and don't believe what I saw, so I'll spare everyone the details.) Then there was that crazy 49-48 triple over-time win over Frank-ligton in the first round

linton in the first round in 2006. No, through it all,

the Rebels haven't reached Louisiana high school football's prom-ised land, but much like the case with STM, the case with STM, that's done nothing to diminish Charpentier's reputation in my mind. When you look at how few college play-

now lew conege play-ers have been recruited out of this program and how many great wins Charpentier and his staff have produced, little more needs to be

said.
Going from the

the Rebels are competing for district titles in

And through the years, the Rebels continued to play elite teams like Notre Dame and Breaux Bridge when it would have been much easier to schedule down and

collect even more wins.
That earns respect.
These days, the Rebels begin the post-Zach
LaFleur era and look to quarterback Cole Kelley and Sage LeBlanc for big plays, while being forced to replace such defensive leaders as three-year starter Mi-chael Courville.

Catholic-NI slips past Teurlings Catholic

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Even though it's the preseason, both Catholic High of New Iberia and Teurlings Catholic treated their matchup at the Kiwanis Club Jamboree like a real game. It had the feel and the drama as both teams went after each other.

But thanks to a strong running performance by Seth Pierre and two touchdowns by Jason Pellerin and Andre Bellefontaine, Catholic High got a 21-14 win over the Rebels that

gave the Panthers a big boost of confidence heading into next week's season opener.

"We just stressed to the kids that we needed to play with a lot of toughness tonight," head coach Brent Indest said. "Last year, we started real slow, and we have a lot of changes, offensively and defensively starting this year. Our goal is to pick up where we left off last year, not start somewhere in the middle. I don't know if we're there yet, but we're close."

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Catholic

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Catholic's rushing attack pounded through Teurlings. Pierre ran for 84 yards on 12 carries, while Bellefontaine ran for 38 yards on seven carries, including a 4-yard touchdown run late in the second half that put the Panthers up 21-7.

The Rebels did strike back quickly as they took only four plays to cut the lead back to seven. After a 27-yard screen pass to running back Noah Harris, quarterback Cole Kelley found tight end Ike Hildago for a 19-yard touchdown catch to make it 21-14 with 2:04 left. But CHNI's running game was able to run out the clock and get the win.

"Even though they made us look silly at times – (Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier's) offense does that, they're excellent and great at what they do – but I was fired up at the way we hung in there."

Pellerin was solid in his first game as a senior. The Ole Miss commit was 4-of-6 passing for 50 yards, including a 28-yard strike to Bellefontaine late in the first half. He sneaked in for a 1-yard touchdown.

"(Jason) made one bad throw early where we had one guy wide open, but he came back on the same play and scored," Indest said. "Jason's Jason, and we need him to continue that. It was great to see him on a key third down step up in the pocket and scramble."

For Teurlings, the bright spot was the play of junior quarterback Cole Kelley. He went 13-of-17 for 185 yards and two touchdown passes. His first came in the second half as receiver Sage LeBlanc corralled a deflected pass in the back of the end zone for an 18-yard touchdown.

The Rebels open the season at home next Friday against University Lab, while Catholic faces Vermilion Catholic at home.

Balanced race expected

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If you ask the coaches from teams in District 5-4A what is the toughest district in the state, you will get a resounding response "ours."

Year in and year out, the district has proven to be quite tough and every week requires showing up primed and ready for a battle because nothing comes easy in the rugged District 5-4A.

Last year, the district ended in a three-way tie between Teurlings Catholic, Breaux Bridge and St. Thomas More all of whom finished 5-1 in district play.

With teams beyond the big three all expected to be greatly improved, District 5-4A has a chance to be even tougher than it has ever been before.

"I think our district is going to be even tougher this year than it has been over the past couple of years," Breaux Bridge head coach Paul Broussard said.

"St. Thomas More and Teurlings are going to be typical St. Thomas More and Teurlings. You know they are going to be good and in the thick of things. But the rest of

the district is going to be a lot better as well. It is going to be a very interesting race this year."

Although perennial powers St. Thomas More, Teurlings and Breaux Bridge are expected to be the frontrunners for the district title once again, they all have question marks which could possibly open the door for a darkhorse.

The Vikings are expected to be vastly improved, while the Cecilia Bulldogs behind a massive offensive line and the explosive Raymond Calais Jr. in the backfield appear ready to make some noise.

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Rebels figure to contend again

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The 2013 football season was one filled with trials and tribulations for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels and it began well before the opening kick-off.

In the preseason, the Rebels watched as several key players were hampered with injuries that cost them a significant portion of the regular season.

Nevertheless, despite an injury-marred season, the Rebels still managed to go 7-4, 5-1 in District 5-4A which was good enough to forge a three-way tie for first place and advance to the Class 4A regional.

Although they lost several key pieces on the offensive side of the ball, teams should beware of the Rebels as they return several standouts defensively that will make them a tough matchup week in and week out.

"Depth is something that we are always looking for and we feel that we have some quality depth at certain positions," TC coach Sonny Charpentier said.

"We have a lot of very good football players and the key for us is going to be getting them to settle into their roles."

Defensively, the Rebels return eight of 11 starters from

year," Charpentier said. "We feel that we can be pretty good defensively and it is no doubt we are going to be relying on that unit to carry us until our offense comes around."

Offensively, the Rebels will be forced to replace quarterback Brye Latiolais, three-year starter at fullback Zach Lafleur and several offensive linemen.

The 6-7, 225-pound Cole Kelley steps into the quarterback role, while Noah Harris and Baylor Thompson will be asked to replace Lafleur.

Senior running back Sage Leblanc will move from the slot to tailback as the Rebels attempt to get the ball in his hands more often.


"Sage is an exciting high school football player," Charpentier said. "He is fun to watch. He's one of those players that you can't tackle in a phone booth."

Charpentier has the largest number of players he's ever hadat Teurlings.

"Potential is a terrible thing," Charpentier said. "All potential means is that you haven't done anything yet."

Returning Credentials

The Rebels are coming off an injury riddled season in which they went 7-4 overall including 5-1 in District 5-4A that resulted in them finishing in a three-way tie for the district title. The Rebels advanced to the Division II regional round where they were defeated by University.

The Strengths

The Rebels have become known over the years for their dominant defenses and with the return of eight starters from last year, it appears Teurlings is well on their way to fielding another tough unit.

Highlighted by the return of defensive linemen Asa Miller, Hunter Venable, Ashton Boudreaux and Caden Malbrough, as well as linebackers Alec Robertson and Dylan Batiste and safeties Gavin Royer and Brandon Batiste, the Rebels are confident this unit can carry them to great heights this year.

The Question Marks

As good as their defense is expected to be, the inexperience starting at corner-

back for the Rebels is a cause for concern. Although they are excited about the potential of new starters Michael Boudreux and Luke Gossen, they aren't battle tested and there is still a dire need to develop depth behind them. In addition to the secondary, the Rebels will be forced to replace star kicker and punter Jacob Cunningham. Filling his shoes will be Braydon Blanchard.

Aces in the Hole

Sage Leblanc is a special talent and is arguably the most explosive offensive weapon the Rebels possess. After spending last season in the slot, the Rebels are moving the talented Leblanc into the backfield in an effort to give him more opportunities with the ball in his hands.

On the perimeter, the Rebels still are excited about the possibilities in the passing game because of the return of star receivers Ike Hidalgo and Nathan Arceneaux. With the big arm of first-year starter Cole Kelley, the Rebels are excited about the offense's potential.

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Miller the total package

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Like most coaches, Teurlings Catholic's Sonny Charpentier is ecstatic when he sees a player who is extremely athletic and filled with the type of talent that makes it possible for him to impact the game regardless of his position.

But what excites Charpentier even more is when that player also has the work ethic and desire to match.

So it comes as no surprise that Charpentier raves about senior defensive end Asa Miller.

"We have a lot of kids here and over the years that worked hard to achieve what they wanted to achieve and Asa epitomizes that," Charpentier said. "Not only is he hard working, but he is extremely focused. He is one of our better football players."

The 6-2, 240-pound Miller has impressed coaches.

"Last year, Asa was outstanding for us as a defensive end and now we're experimenting with him at linebacker," Charpentier said. "He's a good athlete that runs extremely well and in a perfect world he would be a great tight end. He was one of only four or five kids who had perfect attendance during the summer."

Being a team player is important to Miller, who admits that he works hard to lead by example.

"I'm willing to do whatever the team needs me to do," Miller said. "I don't have a preference on offense or defense or defensive end or linebacker. I just want to do whatever I can to help our team."


Charpentier believes Miller has the ability to play college football.

Rebels ready for familiar foe

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Last year, Teurlings Catholic's football season started and ended with losses to University High

The losses were by an average of 25.5 points and the Rebels weren't in either contest.

Although they competed better in the second meeting, Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier felt the slow start proved to be most detrimental to Teurlings' chances of pulling off the upset.

"We were not in either of the ball games against them last year and I think a lot of it was mental," Charpentier said. "University is a good football team that is comprised of great athletes. There are times when you have great athletes, but they aren't a great team. They are both and when we played them in the playoffs we got behind 14-0 and it was like 'oh, here we go again."

When the Rebels play host to University at 7 p.m. Friday in the season opener, Charpentier said it will be vital for his team to avoid a slow start and a "here we go again" mentality if things don't go

"University has a lot of players from last year's team back this year," Charpentier said. "I don't believe we are going to be shocked or surprised by anything they do, but it is important for us to get some momentum early. Gaining confidence in the early going of the contest is a big part for us. We have to maintain the mentality that we're going to win the next play and then try to win the next play after that. We have to win some battles."

If the Rebels are going to be successful, it will require a team effort in all three phases of the game, but especially on offense and defense. University

Rebels' upset attempt falls short

This time it wasn't over early.

In fact, Teurlings Catholic's Rebels came within a heartbeat of pulling off the prep football season's first major upset before falling 36-35 to University High's secondranked Cubs on Friday at Teurlings Stadium.

U-High battled back from a pair of two-touch-down deficits and mounted a game-winning drive in the final six minutes before Nick Brossette finished a busy night with a two-point conversion with 28 seconds left that provided the one-point margin.

The Rebels (0-1) had been handled by the powerful University squad, one that reached the Division II select finals last year before losing in the title game to John Curtis, to both start and end Teurlings' season.

The Cubs had taken a 41-15 win in last year's opening game in Baton Rouge, and eliminated the Rebels 55-30 in the regional round of the select playoffs

"We didn't like what happened in those two games last year," Rebel coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Tonight we had a competition. We built this program not to expect moral victories, but I'm still very proud of our

kids."

The Cubs, ranked second in Class 3A in the preseason prep poll, drove 68 yards in the final four minutes after stopping the Rebels on a key fourth-and-three at the U-High 33.

From there, backup quarterback Jalon Baker engineered a drive, throwing for a key fourth-down conversion with a 12-yard completion and then turning it over to the Brossette and Dylan Moses in the running game.

Moses eventually capped the drive from three yards out, powering up the middle with 28 sec-

onds left to make it a 35-34 game. The Cubs were without the services of starting quarterback Manny Miles – who is also U-High's placekicker – so there was no decision about going for a winning two-point conversion, and little on who was going to get the ball considering that Brossette had 150 rush yards in the game.

"Our guys just absolutely stepped up," said University coach Chad Mahaffey said. "We had so many things that we prepared for, but so many things we couldn't prepare for. It was an unbelievable team effort ... one

of the best I've ever been involved in."

The classic battle still wasn't decided, though. In that final 28 seconds after Hunter Sonnier's kickoff return to midfield, Rebel quarterback Cole Kelley hit running back Noah Harris for 14 yards and Ike Hidalgo for 13 more to take the ball to the Cub 22 with only one second left.

The first-year Teurlings placekicker was then called on for his first varsity field goal try, but missed the 39-yarder at the final horn.

The Rebels had taken that 35-28 lead after the Cubs (1-0) had battled back to tie the game for the first time on Baker's 28-yard scoring scramble on the next-to-last play of the third quarter. Kelley hit Nate Arceneaux on a crossing route for a 21-yard score.

U-High got two first downs on the ensuing drive, but Hunter Venable's fourth-down sack of Baker with 6:54 left ended the march. The Rebels, though, gave the ball back just over two minutes later when they came up short on a fourth down, setting up the visitors for a winning drive.

"They (University) did what they had to do," Charpentier said. "Our execution wasn't what it had to be. It's a first game and we've got a lot of football still to play."

Kelley, Rebels sink New Iberia

NEW IBERIA — As 6-foot-7 Cole Kelley lumbered toward the team bus Friday night, a stranger approached him.

Kelley pushed his sweaty blond hair back and reached down to grab the gentleman's outstretched hand.

"You've got a lot of talent young man," the man said. "You remind me of a young Peyton Manning."

If Kelley continues to compile performances like the one he had against New Iberia in Teurlings' 36-7 victory, there may be a lot more strangers saying the same thing.

The junior quarterback threw for 272 yards and four touchdowns, without attempting a single pass in the second half.

"They were bringing seven guys into the box against us a lot so we had one-on-one matchups (with receivers)," Kelley said. "My receivers did a great job of getting open."

Kelley only missed on six of his 22 attempts.

"He's a special player," NISH coach Rick Hutson said. "When you play against an offense like

that, the problem is you can make two good plays on defense and they can erase it all with one big play."

Those big plays included passes of 40, 55, and 28 yards. Kelley completed six passes of 20-yards or more and had one 34-yard touchdown dropped.

"We practice the deep ball a lot," Kelley said. "It's just something I've naturally been able to do well."

"He has such a high release point that the ball is coming from a different angle," Hutson said. "You aren't going to bat any balls down and sometimes he can throw right over two defenders."

The Jackets held tough in the first quarter, keeping the Rebel scoreless until the 2:27 mark. But Kelley found LeBlanc on a 55-yard bomb. LeBlanc outraced his defender and Kelley lofted a ball that landed softly in LeBlanc's bread basket to put TCH up 8-0, after a two-point conversion.

Kelley notched his second touchdown toss of the night, finding Beau Blanchard in the back of the end zone on 13-yard pitch-and-catch. That throw capped a sixplay drive, giving TCH a 15-0 edge.

The Jackets fumbled their en-

suing possession, and Kelley made them pay again. Two plays later he found Jacob Landry on a 7-yard strike, giving the Rebels a 22-0 lead.

His final touchdown of the night came on a 19-yard strike to Grant LaGrange. LaGrange darted for the back right corner of the end zone. Kelley rifled the ball off his back foot and LaGrange dragged both feet in the backright corner of the end zone. That play capped an 11-play, 82 yard drive that ate up more than four minutes (29-0).

The Rebels' final score of the game came on a 1-yard run by Noah Harris, to cap a nine-play 32-yard drive.

NISH's Xavier Berard lead the offensive attack for the Jackets, racking up 129 yards on 21 carries.

Timothy Declouet put the Jackets on the board late in the fourth quarter when he dodged a would-be tackler and dropped a ball in to wide out Brison Savoy for a 2-yard touchdown. Savoy hauled in six catches for 120 yards.

The Rebels (1-1) will host Notre Dame next week. New Iberia (0-2) will play Westgate at Lloyd G. Porter Stadium. Westgate will be considered the home team.

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

Rebels solve Pios

Teurlings holds off late rally for 17-14 win

In what has been called a friendly rivalry game, Teurlings Catholic knew Notre Dame was going to give the Rebels a tough game, even though for three quarters, it looked like it was going to be a blowout.

Teurlings took advantage of two turnovers to take a 17-0 lead in the second half and despite giving up two late touchdowns, held on to beat Notre Dame 17-14 at Rebel Stadium on Friday night.

Cole Kelley used his 6-foot-7 frame to his advantage as he was 23-of-40 for 345 yards and two touchdowns, along with the Rebels taking advantage of two first-half fumbles that led to 10 first-half points.

"(Notre Dame) is going to ground and pound it, and you have to stop them," Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "I thought overall we had them playing from behind. Once we went up three scores, that was a big advantage to us."

Notre Dame (2-1) took the opening drive and moved the ball deep in Rebel territory to inside

the Rebel 10. But a fumbled snap allowed Teurlings to recover the ball at the 1 to end the threat.

Teurlings (2-1) took advantage of the fumble by going on a long drive that bled into the second quarter, aided by a 33-yard pass from Kelley to wideout Nathan Arceneaux. The 14-play, 77-yard drive ended with a 40-yard field goal by Brayden Blanchard.

Later in the second quarter, Stoma fumbled while scrambling and Teurlings linebacker Asa Miller recovered. The very next play, Kelley found Arceneaux who made a juggling catch in the end zone for a 35-yard TD strike to put the Rebels 10-0.

"Nate is a hell of a receiver, plain and simple," Kelley said about Arceneaux, who had 86 yards on three catches. "He's always open and even when he struggles to get open, we still make connections. We're on the same page and we click like that."

Teurlings had a chance to tack on a late field goal, but Blanchard's 30-yard field goal hit the right goalpost right before halftime

The Rebels went back to work in the second half as Kelley hit

running back Sage LeBlanc for a 33-yard pass and a 28-yard pass to put them at the Pioneer 18. The drive stalled, but back-to-back offside penalties on the Pios on fourth down put the ball at the 8, when Kelley hit tight end Ike Hidalgo for a 17-0 lead.

In the fourth quarter, the Rebel offense begin to stall while the Notre Dame offense finally woke up. After holding Teurlings to a turnover on downs after they got to the Pio 15, Notre Dame went on a 11-play, 71-yard drive that was capped by a 12-yard TD run by Stoma to make it 17-7 with 6:45 left.

Then after forcing a Rebel three-and-out, Notre Dame struck with a big play as Stoma found receiver Boedy Borill for a 33-yard play that put the Pios at the Teurlings 5. Lance Bertrand ran it in on the next play that cut the lead to three with under four minutes left.

Notre Dame had one last chance to either tie or win the game, but a sack by Miller and two incomplete passes by Stoma ended the Pios' chance for a comeback.

Kelley, Rebels shine again

Junior quarterback Cole Kelley threw for 324 yards and four touchdowns on Friday night, helping lead the Teurlings Cathlolic Rebels to a 55-25 win over the Cecilia Bulldogs in the District 5-4A opener for both teams at Teurlings Stadium.

The win marks the third straight for Teurlings, which also recorded its sixth consecutive win against Cecilia, while improving their record to 17-7-2 against the Bulldogs in the all-time series.

Teurlings scored on the first possession of the game at the 8:03 mark of the initial period when Sage LeBlanc capped off an 8-play, 66-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown run, giving them a quick 7-0 lead.

The touchdown toss came just one play after a roughing the kicker call on a punt that allowed the Bulldogs to maintain possession of the football, and after an unsuccessful PAT, the Rebels held a 7-6 edge.



good football team."

But defending the Rebels' high-powered offense led by quarterback Cole Kelley, receivers Nate Arceneaux, Sage Leblanc and Ike Hidalgo among others won't be easy. Kelley leads the area in passing with 1,201 yards. He has completed 80-of-117 passes with 12 touchdowns, while only throwing three interceptions.

"It all starts with their quarterback, who is exceptional," Broussard said. "He throws the football really well and honestly he is one of the best high school quarterbacks

I've ever seen. On top of that his receivers do a great job of getting open and catching the football. We're going to have our hands full."

Although Kelley and his receiving corps receive a lot of the recognition for what the Rebels have done offensively, it has been the job of their offensive line led by center Zach Ashy, tackles Brilan Degeyter and Jacob Mathews and guards Grant Ray and Ashton Whaley.

Also, the Rebels often use tight end Jacob Landry to help protect Kelley as well.

"Our offensive line has been doing a great job," Charpentier said. "It all starts with those guys up front. Those guys get overlook, but Cole has only been sacked two or three times all season and we aren't doing a lot of play-action or rolling out. Those guys are doing a great job."

Knowing that defending Kelley and the Rebels will be quite the chore, Broussard is hoping his rushing attack led by the three-headed monsters Marquis Demonter, Edward Batiste Jr. and Ruben Hypolite, will help

the Tigers keep Teurlings' potent offense on the sideline.

"We have to control the ball offensively so that we can minimize their possessions," Broussard said. "We can't afford to give up big plays so we have to make them earn their points by driving the length of the field.

"We try to do those things every week, but it is especially important this week because Teurlings is a quick attack team."

Turning over the football has been the only thing that plagued the Rebels early on, but they appear to have rectified that the last couple of weeks.

"When we don't turnover the football, we are hard to defend," Charpentier said. "I'm not saying it isn't possible to stop us, but our goal offensively is to keep the ball and give our defense as much rest as possible.

"I think this game is going to come down to who wins the turnover battle and who converts on third down. The people who win those two parts of the game are usually the people who win the game."

Teurlings victorious

Rebels ride defense, Kelley to 31-15 win

BREAUX BRIDGE - It wasn't pretty, but Teurlings Catholic will take it.

Behind a strong showing from their defense and a solid performance from quarterback Cole Kelley, the state's No. 10-ranked Rebels rolled to a 31-15 victory over the Breaux Bridge Tigers in District 5-4A action Friday.

"We got the victory," Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "It wasn't pretty, but we got the victory and that's all that counts. Anytime you come on the road and you can come home with a win it is a good thing.

The Rebels entered the game sporting one of the top offenses in the state, but it was their defensive unit that sent a message as they forced four turnovers (3 interceptions, 1 fumble), scored a defensive touchdown and held the Tigers' offense to 223 yards of total offense.

"There's no doubt about it, our defense did a great job,"

Charpentier said. "Our defense doesn't get any respect, but the way you get respect is by playing the way we played (Friday). We went out and played well. They did a great job of running to the football and did a great job of tackling in space."

With the game tied 7-7, the Rebels' defense came up with arguably the biggest play of the game as Brandon Batiste intercepted a Drake Guidry pass and returned it 75 yards fdor a touchdown to give Teurlings a 14-7 lead that they would never relinquish.

"The three turnovers including the pick-six in the first half really did us in," said Tigers head coach Paul Broussard, whose team will play at Northside on Friday. "When you are playing against a team as good as Teurlings and a team with an offense as explosive as Teurlings, you cannot turn the football over three times. You have to control the football against them and we did, but the turnovers killed us."

Offensively, Kelley completed 16-of-30 passes for 187 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions, while rushing for another score.

The Rebels' leading rusher was Noah Harris and Sage Leblanc, who combined for 93 yards on 23 carries, while Ike Hidalgo caught five passes for 55 yards and Sage Leblanc caught four passes for 42 yards and two touchdowns.

"We save up a lot of

"We gave up a lot of points defensively, but considering the amount of turnovers and the bad position we put our defense in, I thought we played well," Broussard said. "I couldn't ask for anything more from our defense."

The Tigers, who fell to 3-2 overall and 1-1 in district, rushed for 99 yards and passed for 124. Offensively, they were led by Edward Batiste, who rushed for 47 yards and a touchdown on 16 carries, while Guidry completed 5-of-10 passes for 89 yards before giving way to freshman Julian Leon. Leon completed 2-of-4 passes for 35 yards, but did lead the Tigers on a scoring drive in the fourth quarter.

Breaux Bridge drew first blood in the game as they opened up the game with a nine-play 80 yard drive that was capped by a one-yard touchdown run by Orel Ledet for a 7-0 lead with 7:57 left in the first ouarter.





Rebels' QB Kelley breaks family STM ties

Cole Kelley grew up watching his two older brothers Lance and Seth star on the football field as members of the St. Thomas More Cougars.

Their success and legacy ul-timately resulted in Cole Kelley dreaming of one day doing the

"My whole life I grew up wanting to go to St. Thomas More," Cole Kelley said. "Just from watching my brothers do so well there, I just knew that I wanted to be like them and play for STM."

But after transferring from

But after transferring from Fatima to St. Leo-Seton in mid-dle school, that dream changed. Cole Kelley met new people, made new friends and in the end, it led to a decision that came as a surprise to everyone in his household.

"I told my family that I wanted to go to high school at Teurlings," Cole Kelley said. "When I switched middle schools I made some good friends and I became really close to a lot of people. I literally woke up one day and said that I wanted to go to Teurlings. My whole family was really shocked although my

was reany snocked almoughnly mom was pretty happy because she graduated from Teurlings." Including his brothers, although Seth, who is closer in age at 20 to the 17-year-old Cole, took it a lot harder than his 25-year-old by the property of the cole of the c

took it a lot harder than his 25-year-old brother Lance did.

"At first, I was definitely dis-appointed that Cole wanted to go to Teurlings," said Seth Kel-ley, who graduated from STM in 2012 and is attending South Lou-isiana Community College. "I was disappointed because Lance and I had both gone to STM and I really wanted the tra-dition to keep going."

dition to keep going,"
"I felt there was more pressure on him to go to STM than there should have been," said Lance Kelley, who graduated from STM in 2007 and currently resides in San Autonio, Tavas resides in San Antonio, Texas. "He had friends from middle school who were going to Teur-lings, so I understood it. It

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wasn't all that big of a deal to me. It would have been cool to see him where my jersey number at STM, but in the end, I was pretty indifferent about it."

But when Cole Kelley and the state's No. 5-ranked Rebels travel to face the state's No. 1-ranked Cougars at 7 p.m. on Friday in a pivotal District 5-4A matchup, there is no question who Lance and Seth are going to be pulling for.

"No doubt, I want Teurlings to win," Seth Kelley said. "I will always want my brother to win. I pull for STM as long as they are playing against my little brother, so yes I'm definitely going for Teurlngs."

"Of course I'm going for Teurlings," Lance Kelley said. "That's a no-brainer."

With Lance and Seth both expected to be in attendance for the game, Cole Kelley gets to show his other reason for choosing Teurlings over STM and that's the opportunity to shed the label of being "Lance and Seth's little brother."

"I really wanted the chance to start my own thing," Cole Kelley said. "I wanted to make a name for myself and not spend the next four years being looked

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at as their little brother. When I was younger it made me feel good when people said 'it's Lance and Seth's little brother.' But as I got older and became more involved in sports, I wanted to be known as Cole."

With the way he has performed this season – his first as a starter – Cole Kelley has ac-

With the way he has performed this season – his first as a starter – Cole Kelley has accomplished his goal of making a name for himself. The 6-7 junior quarterback, who has completed 96-0f-147 passes for 1,388 yards, five interceptions and 14 touchdowns, has gone from a relative unknown outside of the Rebels' locker room to a rising collegiate prospect.

collegiate prospect.
"We knew about him," Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We knew from the first day he stepped on campus that he had a chance to be really good. He hadn't arrived yet and he had a lot of football ahead of him, but we knew he had potential."

Although his height and strong arm may be what stands out to spectators, it is what is between Cole Kelley's ears that's most impressive to Charpentier

"Cole is a student of the game," Charpentier said. "He's a smart football player and that is a part of the game that you can never underestimate. He understands the game, what we are trying to do and what we are trying to accomplish. He is big and he has a strong arm, but what separates him from most is that he trust his receivers and he trust his eyes. This is a kid who has been blessed and what's between his ears is his greatest attribute."

greatest attribute."

Cole Kelley credits his teammates for his success and sudden rise up the prospect charts, citing his offensive line providing him with ample time to make reads, running backs running hard and catching and his receivers making him look good

with great catches.

"I've played alright," Cole Kelley said. "But I definitely can play better. Honestly, I haven't done that much. I've made too many mistakes and I've turned the ball over too much. The success I have had this year is all because of my teammates. My receivers have been making a lot of great catches. I don't feel that I've played up to my potential."

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

Thomas More and Teurlings Catholic are actually quite different in a lot of other ways. For some, it's north Lafayette versus south Lafayette. In the minds of others, it's Blue Collar versus White Collar.

In the perceptions of others, it's high society versus good ol' country living.

Adults need to keep it clean

When the Rebels travel across town to meet St. Thomas More at Cougar Stadium for Friday night's critical 5-4A showdown, however, it's just going to be two top-notch teams playing a high-profile week 7 football

At least that's what Teurlings principal Mike Boyer is hoping. "A lot of people have a lot of different

ideas, but it's just two Catholic schools," said Boyer, who began his time in Lafayette as an assistant coach at St. Thomas More under Jim Hightower. "It's no different than when Teurlings and

Cathedral (Carmel) used to play each other. The kids just play hard. The kids are fine. It's the adults that need to make sure it's a clean

"A lot of people focus on the fact that there's a lot more wealth at 5t. Thomas More," Hebert said. "But if you look at all the things that Teurlings has been doing, it takes money to do all of that.

"I don't really think it's about all of that stuff. As long as the two enrollments stay close enough, they should play each other.

It's just kids playing a game. If it becomes a big rivalry, then so be it."

That may be the case for some in today's STM-Teurlings rivalry, but back in Hebert's day, that Teurlings-Cathedral rivalry was more than a bit intense.
"When Cathedral and Teurlings played, it

was ugly," said former Rebels' star Gary Gerami, who had three older brothers play at Teurlings as well. "I had some friends (at Cathedral), but for 95 percent of Cathedral

and Teurlings, there was no love back then.
"They would vandalize the schools, burn out our bonfires and things like that. These days, it's a rivalry, but I don't see that ug-liness. It's not like the UL versus LSU thing between the fans around here. It's more of an emotional thing than a vendetta."

George Favaloro still remembers being right in the middle of some crazy high school hijinks during his days at Cathedral.





It was the 1980 season. Teurlings had defeated Notre Dame 24-7 in week six and was 9-0 under flamboyant head coach Tad Tatman going into the week-10 showdown at Cathedral-Carmel, coached by old-school Linden Bercegeay. Favaloro readily admits that he and two

of his buddies just happened to be driving of ms buddles just happened to be at ving down the Breaux Bridge Highway early that week when they decided to jump out of the car and steal the "Home of the Rebels" sign in front of the school. Later in the week, Cathedral's bonfire

then mysteriously got burned up.
"No one ever took claim of that," Favaloro said. "We admitted that we took the sign. After those two things, that's when the game was on. They were mad and we were mad.'

'You have to have those kinds of rivalries'

The Rebels' quest at perfection that season ended that Friday night with the Tigers beating Teurlings 20-6.

Favaloro is no longer keeping up with such high school tomfoolery, but he loves the fact that St. Thomas More families with Cathedral roots will be playing families with Teurlings roots on Friday in such a high-profile showdown.

"I love it," Favaloro said. "You have to have those kind of rivalries. It's been the

Not only did Cathedral win that 1980 game, but it won reach of the seven all-time meetings between the two schools from 1975-1981.

That's why it was so special for the Rebels in 1982 when Teurlings was striving for a

higher form of perfection.

Again, it was week 10 and again, Teurlings

was 9-0.
This time, though, it was St. Thomas More
— filled with ex-Cathedral players and coaches because Fatima had quit playing football about a decade before — and the Rebels had not only won every game to that point, but shut out all nine opponents.
One more shutout would break a 50-year-

old record that still stands today.

This time, Teurlings sealed the deal with a 25-0 win over the Cougars, thanks in part to a pair of missed field goals, one of which was

booked by Gerami.
To this day, Gerami maintains that Cathedral's players "were a lot more mischievous than we were."
Although former Cathedral players still

hold those wins over their old Teurlings friends, Favaloro said "I always said that Teurlings never got its proper recognition

for that (undefeated, unscored upon 1982 regular season)."
These days, STM and Teurlings players are openly friends off the field. In the late 1970s and early 1980s, such friendships were best search.

kept secret.
"A few of us were friends," Favaloro said,





"but we didn't let people know that."
Making it even juicier, Favaloro married
a Teurlings graduate named Mary and is
"still taking heat for that."
Taylor Davis knows all about how tangled

that web can get. He played on that first St. Thomas More team in 1982. He has a son, John, currently playing golf for the Cougars and a daughter, Alyce, playing tennis there. He also happens to have an older brother,

Hampton, who is now the chancellor at Teur-

lings Catholic.
"That still doesn't sit well with some of the Cathedral people," Davis laughed. "It's kind of like General Lee going to war with General Grant."

'Life goes on'

Although the old stories are fun, Davis said he's grown to have many close Teurlings friends over the years.

"Lafayette's still a small town," he said.
"You know those people. You do business with them. I have a lot of great friends who

went to Teurlings."
As Hebert put it, "Life goes on," after those emotional high school rivalry days.

Jacob Byler lived it back then, but his memories aren't of the bitterness. He was an assistant coach at Cathedral and then be-

came STM's first head coach.
"I think it (STM-Teurlings rivalry) is a
respect rivalry," Byler said. "Even back in
the Cathedral-Teurlings days, it was a very
heated rivalry. The kids always played extra hard in those games, but I don't remember a lot of serious problems.
"I only remember one incident in a game

where a punch was thrown, but that was a heat-of-the-moment kind of thing, just some thing that happened. It wasn't a violent hatred with a lot of animosity. A lot of those kids were buddies."

Byler said the recent renewal of the ri-

valry is good to see.
"I think it's great," Byler said. "It's gradually becoming a (big) rivalry again. They're

any teconing a (log) ITway a gain. They re two of the best programs in the area, so they deserve to play each other." Prior to Sonny Charpentier taking over as the Rebels' head coach in 1995, Teurlings had dropped to a Class IA school while STM was taking off as an emerging 3A and then 4A

powerhouse.
The two returned to the same district again in 2011 in what Boyer describes as much different climate than back in the Cathedral days.

The Teurlings principal explained that both schools now have students "from North Lafayette and South Lafayette and surrounding areas," meaning he doesn't buy that current rivalry is still a North versus South Lafayette issue.


"The two schools are competitive in all the sports. It's good clean competition on the fields, court and diamonds," Boyer said. "I think it's good."

But in a game set to fea-ture two of the top of-fenses in the state, the game could very well be decided by which defense is able to come up with more stops or force turnovers.

"I think the defenses very well could have the say in this game," Hightower said. "Which defense can get the most stops? Teurlings' defense is solid. They mixe the is solid. They pursue the ball well and they give you a lot of different looks."

"I think STM's defense often times takes a backseat to their offense," Charpentier said. "Their defense gets overlooked because of how good their offense is, but their defense is good. Their defense has steadily im-proved as the season has gone along. They definitely deserve that No. 1 ranking."

In the end, regardless of what happens, Char-pentier believes the game won't make or break their season.

"Win or lose, we're going to shake hands and go back to work," Charpen-tier said. "No matter what happens in the game, the sun will still come up Saturday morning again."



in the second half and the first came when Teurlings quarterback Cole Kelley threw looked like it was going to be an interception, but the football bounced off of an STM defender's shoulder pads and right into the hands of Sage Leblanc for an 80-yard touchdown to cut the deficit to 43-23. Hayden Cantrelle then ran it in for the two-point conversion to cut the Cougars' lead to 43-25.

After a defensive stop by the Rebels forced the Cougars to punt, Teurlings put together an impressive 8-play, 88 yard drive that was capped by a 38 yard touchdown pass from Kelley to Grant LaGrange. Kelley then ran it in for the two-point conversion and just like that it is 43-33 with 2:17 remaining in the third quarter.

The Rebels' defense came up big again by forcing the Cougars into another three-and-out. but on the punt attempt the snap was low and the punter Bailey Raborn was dropped at the STM two yard line. On the first Noah Harris play, punched it into the end zone and the Rebels found themselves down 43-40 going into the fourth quarter.

"It was just one of

those nights," Charpentier said. "I've been on both sides of games like this. You get a big lead and you think it is over and the other team comes back. When you are down like we were down in this game, a lot of things have to go right if you are going to come back."

The good fortune continued in the fourth quarter, as the Rebels' defense forced and recovered a fumble that gave the offense the ball back at the STM 26. On the first play after the turnover, Kelley connected with LaGrange for a 26yard touchdown to give the Rebels a 47-43 lead with just under 12 minutes remaining in the game. The lead was the Rebels' first since jumping out to a 14-0 advantage to begin the game.

After Brandon Batiste blocked a Cougars punt on STM's ensuing possession that gave the Rebels the football at the STM 26, Teurlings' offense appeared to be on the verge of settling for a 37 yard field goal attempt by kicker Brayden Blanchard.

But the snap was high and Leblanc, who was holding, caught it and ran around before throwing it up for grabs into the end zone. It appeared the Cougars defender was going to intercept it, but Gavin Royer took the ball away on the way down for a 20-yard touchdown.

The two-point attempt failed and the Rebels now lead 53-43 with 9:23 left in the game.

"Gavin can't catch a cold," Charpentier said. "That's why he plays defense. He just wanted it more."

"Coach is right, I can't catch," Royer said. "So, I did my best to just take it

The Cougars (6-1, 2-1) cut the deficit to 53-46 with 7:49 left in the game on a 22-yard field goal by Raborn and looked well on their way to being in position to tying the game when linebacker John Corry intercepted a Kelley pass on third and six from the STM 44 and returned it to the Rebels' 35.

But the play was negated as STM was called for pass interference which allowed Teurlings to retain possession. The Rebels went on to add 3-points on a 32 yard field goal by Blanchard to extend their lead to 56-46 with 3:54 left.

"Take your hats off to Teurlings, Cougars head coach Jim Hightower said. "They played a great ball game. Our kids played a great game as well. I'm really proud of the effort. The ball bounced Teurlings' way and that happens. They had some plays that could have gone either way, but the ball bounced their way. That's all you can say."



Tough to argue with Teurlings-STM classic

wasn't even at the game, but I certainly followed the tweets of Advertiser prep editor Eric Narcisse as he kept us up to date on the progress of last Friday's Teurlings Catholic at St. Thomas More District 5-4A showdown at Cougar Stadium.

When I began to head down from the press box at the Northside-Opelousas game to speak to Vikings' quarterback Ethan Rose and head coach Trev Faulk, the visiting Rebels had just scored a touchdown to cut into a surprisingly big 43-17 deficit.

Incredibly, by the time I got into my vehicle to head back to Lafayette, Teurlings had the lead.

As I followed the game on the way home – while also getting a few phone calls from friends who had been there and left the game amazed at what was transpiring – I truly couldn't believe what I was hearing.

Somehow the Rebels turned that 43-17 third-quarter deficit into a 56-46 win on the road against the No. 1-ranked

team in Class 4A.

We often used the word 'unbelievable' and it probably doesn't even apply 90 percent of the time. What happened on Friday at Cougar Stadium is now the new standard for using that word.

Yogi Berra would have been proud to witness that game.

And it's doubtful that anyone who saw it, heard it or read about it will ever forget it. It truly might have been the

It truly might have been th wildest, craziest high school football game the Acadiana area has ever seen.

"I've been involved in some crazy ones, but never anything like that," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "That was definitely the craziest game I've ever seen."

The Patterson game

As someone who loves the historical aspects of sports – usually even more than the games themselves – my immediate reaction was to try to compare this instant classic to memorable games I could recall from the past three decades of following high school football in these parts.

Ironically, the first one that came to my mind was a game that involved none other than the Teurlings Rebels.

It was 2002. I was covering a state quarterfinal game at Clark Field between Teurlings and Patterson. The Rebels led 41-24 with six minutes left to play and somehow the Lumber jacks scored 27 points in the final six minutes to claim a 51-41 win

51-41 win.
"That was probably the craziest one for me until this one," Charpentier said of a game that no one attending could believe as they exited Clark Field.

Moments later, another 'Yogi Berra' game came to my mind. Again it involved Teurlings, and again it was 2002.

This was actually softball, but the principle still applies. The Rebels were leading Parkview Baptist 4-0 in the sixth inning in the state finals, and All-State pitcher Beth Provost was throwing a perfect game through 5.2 innings.

Everyone watching just assumed the game was over. First, the Lady Eagles

reached on an error and then they somehow parlayed that into five runs to claim a 5-4 win that no one there could believe.

So maybe in some strange way, the Rebels were just due to fall on the winning side of one of these remarkable turnarounds.

71-70

Back to football, however, the next game that came to mind was Abbeville 71, Alexandria 70 in 1996.

It was Brent Indest's third game as a head coach. There were no 39-3 rallies like Teurlings somehow put together on Friday. But Indest's Wildcats did face road deficits of 63-49 and 49-35 to Craig Nall's Trojans and won.

Perhaps the key moment in

that game was a fourth-andseven midway through the fourth down down by 14 points. After making the decision to go for it, an assistant coach asked Indest, 'Do you really want to do this?'

Still a young head coach, he took a time-out to think about.

"I looked over at the few defensive starters who weren't starting on offense and asked them, 'If I punt, are you going to stop these guys and get the ball back?' They looked at me like I was crazy, so we went for it." Indest laughed.

it," Indest laughed.
Abbeville, led by quarterback Cooper Collins, converted
on its way to a touchdown,
before forcing a fumble and
tying it at 63-all. After allowing
Alexandria to score on firstand-goal from the Cats 4,
Abbeville then drove down the
field for a touchdown with 53
seconds left and got the twopoint conversion for the win.

539 yards and lost

Like Teurlings at St. Thomas More on Friday, this one required a call to Ripley's. Carencro High quarterback

Carencro High quarterback Lucas Taylor enjoyed a oncein-a-lifetime performance back in 2004. Unfortunately, he didn't even win the game.

The future Tennessee Volunteer wide receiver rushed for 539 yards and six touchdowns on 35 carries, and got beat 53-42 to the Barbe Buccaneers in Lake Charles.

Barbe quarterback Eric Fry threw for 258 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for 195 more with two additional scores. The two teams combined for 1,154 total yards. For the record, Teurlings and STM combined for 1,070 yards.

Crazy sequence

Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook couldn't come up with a complete game he's coached to top STM vs. Teurlings, but he certainly knows firsthand how quickly a 26-point could potentially evaporate.

In a state regional playoff game at Wossman back in 1987. Cook's Crowley Gents endured a 50-plus second turnaround the likes no one has seen.

the likes no one has seen.
Leading 7-6 with just under a minute to play until halftime, First there was an interception return for a score. Then after the kickoff, the Gents' quarterback fumbled on a sack. On the next play, Wossman threw a halfback pass for a touchdown for a 20-7 lead.

Still not done, the Gents tried to end the half with a Hail Mary into the end zone after a short kickoff with about "10 to 12 seconds left" and that prayer was intercepted and returned 90-plus yards for a touchdown to give Wossman a 26-7 halftime lead.

26-7 hairtime teat.
"That taught me a lesson,"
Cook said. "If I had a lead in
the playoffs, especially on the
road, I was a lot more conservative after that game."

Remarkable turnaround

In 2009, I covered a 5A state quarterfinal game in Baton Rouge in which Acadiana scored four touchdowns and rolled up 300 total yards in its first four possessions of the

That hot start earned the Rams a 28-7 lead and many of their fans were already making state semifinal plans. Instead, the Rams turned it over five times in five second-half possessions and that incredible reversal of fortune produced a 34-28 loss to Catholic High.

Just keep scoring

Comeaux coach Kevin Magee remembers a game as the defensive coordinator under Cook in 1986.

It was a showdown against Ville Platte and future UL quarterback James Freeman for the district title.

for the district title.

It turned out well for the Gents with Shane Garrett catching the game-winning pass for a 49-48 win, but Magee remembers some frustrating moments along the way.

"At one point, I just turned to Coach Cook and said, 'I'all are going to have to keep scoring, because we can't stop them.' It was just one of those back-and-forth games."

I'm sure there are fans all across the area with other games that come to mind, and it's all subjective anyway.

But it would be awfully hard to argue with that classic played at STM this past Friday night as far as dramatic comebacks, big plays, special teams thrills and remarkable shifts in momentum.

Now comes the chore of moving on for both of these elite programs.

LeBlanc's big play helps Rebels to 42-6 win

With the offense sput-tering and needing a spark, Teurlings Catholic Sage LeBlanc delivered it when the Rebels need-ed the most. Like he has done this season, LeBlanc took the pass from quarterback Cole Kelley and took off for a 64-yard touchdown that put Teurlings in con-trol of a 42-6 win over Westgate on Friday night.

LeBlanc has been the spark plug for the Teurlings offense this season, with 712 yards on 46 receptions this season, good for 15.5 yards per reception and six touchdowns.

He had 121 yards on only three catches and two touchdowns in Friday's win over the Tigers, all coming in the first half.

"He's a playmaker," Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "He's been one since he's been here. (Westgate) was trying to double-teaming him and we were able to get the ball to him."

Then early in the second quarter with Westgate backed up to their own 8, Rebel defensive lineman Hunter LeBreton was able to block the Tigers' punt and line-backer Jonathon Fonte-not recovered the ball in the end zone for the touchdown.





Running back Noah Harris ran in for the twopoint conversion to make it 15-0.

Then with 16 seconds left in the half, Kelley hit LeBlanc over the middle, and LeBlanc used his speed to go 64 yards for the score to make it 29-0 at halftime.

"We were trying to score before halftime and get things going and get momentum," Le-Blanc said. "Once I saw the ball, I knew I was catching and I turned and was gone"

Teurlings scored two more times in the second half as Harris scored on a 5-yard touchdown run and Kelley plunged in from a yard out to make it 42-0 going to the fourth quarter. Westgate finally got on the board in the final minute of the game as Tyler Phillips scored from 5 yards out.

It wasn't the best night for Kelley – who was 5of-14 for 142 yards – but he was effective with two touchdowns.

"We came out slow sometimes, but we ended up clicking," LeBlanc said. "Cole changes a few plays here and there to get us going."

The win keeps the Rebels' chances strong for a high seed in the playoffs going, but with a tough Northside team coming to Teurlings next week, Friday's win showed that the Rebels are still a strong team, even not at their best.

"I don't think we were as sharp offensively, but the defense played well tonight and our special teams were good," Charpentier said. "We were able to make some plays to come out with an easy win."

Rebels take title

Don't tell Teurlings Catholic head coach Sonny Charpentier that winning a district title doesn't mean anything anymore.

He and the Rebels finished off an undefeated District 5-4A record as quarterback Cole Kelley threw for 312 yards and six touchdowns to lead Teurlings to a 65-35 win over Northside Friday night at Rebel Field. The Vikings had a 21-10 first-half lead, but the Rebels scored 48 straight points to get the win and the district title outright.

"It means a lot. I'm 58 years old and I remember when district titles meant a lot," Charpentier said. "As long as they keep saying it and we have a district and we are playing for that championship, it means a hell of a lot to these guys, and I'm extremely proud of them."

The win also means that Teurlings will host a first-round Division I playoff game next Friday night.

And with the playoffs looming, Kelley – who was 21-of-31 for 312 yards – was on his game after a couple of games where he wasn't as sharp as he has been all year.

"I don't think Cole was offtrack, I think during the course of the season, you're going to have some not-so-good games," Charpentier said. "I thought he had a great week of preparation and he's just got it. He plays each play in itself, he doesn't worry about what happened before, he just keeps playing."

The Rebels got things going with Nate Arceneaux taking the opening kickoff and weaving down the sideline for an 85-yard touchdown return, but Northside responded with a long drive capped with a 23-yard touchdown run by Rose to tie it up.

Brayden Blanchard's 22-yard field goal put Teurlings up 10-7.

In the second quarter, Rose finds receiver Phabien Ryan for a 14-yard touchdown pass that put the Vikings ahead 17-14. Then after an interception by Chance Sam, running back Cozenski Alfred breaks off a 42-yard run that set up a 3-yard touchdown run by Rose to put Northside up 21-10 with 7:41 left in the first half.

Teurlings responds on the ensuing kickoff as Arceneaux got another nice return to the Northside 11 that set up an 11-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Cole Kelley to Sage LeBlanc to cut the lead to four.

Then after Northside's field goal attempt was blown up on a high snap, the Rebels drove 80 yards in 10 plays, as Kelley hit Arceneaux for a 47-yard touchdown to put Teurlings back ahead, 24-21.

The Rebels got the ball back with a minute left in the half and

ran a strong two-minute drill that resulted in Kelley hitting LeBlanc over the middle and weaving past Viking defenders for a 20-yard touchdown with 13 seconds left in the half to put Teurlings up 31-21 at the half.

The beat continued for the Rebels as Kelley hit Arceneaux for a 44-yard touchdown strike. Then after Northside fumbled the ball deep in Rebel territory and Teurlings recovered, then Kelly hit Le-Blanc for a 28-yard touchdown that put Teurlings up 44-21. Le-Blanc had 12 catches for 155 yards and three touchdowns on the night.

"We came out and played well," Charpentier said. "(Rose) we couldn't tackle a couple of times, but I think we had 48 unanswered points when we were down 21-10. So we just kept playing and the guys didn't panic."

Kelley then found running back Jacob Landry for a 17-yard touchdown throw to make it 51-21 to open the fourth quarter. After that, both teams traded touchdowns to hit the 100-mark in points for the game.

"We gave up too many plays to a really good football team to really give ourselves a chance," Northside head coach Trev Faulk said. "But hats off to them. For them to go undefeated throughout our district says a lot about the quality of football program, so congratulations to those guys."

walk in the park.
"They are a good football team and the biggest thing about them is that they are used to playing against good football teams on a weekly basis," Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "They have a lot of weapons and they run an up-tempo

no-huddle offense."

Among those weapons for the Tigers is their big-play receiver Michael Chigbu. Chigbu, who is 6-2 and 215-pounds, is a Georgia commitment. "They have a kid (Chigbu) who is a

matchup nightmare for us on the perimeter," Charpentier said. "He's a guy who is big, fast and he catches the ball really well."

Charpentier said. "They have weapons, so the biggest thing for us is getting them off of the field. We can't allow them to control the ball the entire game because want as many possessions on offense as we can get. They aren't a big play team, but they will nickle and dime you to death."

Asking their defense to turn in a great performance isn't unusual for Charpentier and his staff, because they admit they rely upon that unit every

week.

The Tigers' offense then picked an awfully bad time for a three-andout, giving the ball back to Teurlings.

This time, the Rebels went back to the passing game some.

First, Kelley hit Sage LeBlanc for 10 yards and then Ike Hidalgo for 38. Harris then finished off the drive with another 2-yard touchdown run for a commanding 31-14 lead with 4:07 left in the third and Teurlings never looked back.

Harris finished the game with 101 yards and three touchdowns on 16 carries, in addition to two receptions for 24 yards.

"Noah's a good back," Charpentier said. "He's just in an offense that doesn't really feature him."

Ironically, the other rushing star on the night was Kelley himself. The 6-foot-7 quarterback ran over and through enough Holy Cross defenders to finish with 65 yards and a touchdown on eight carries.

Jansen Lormand certainly did his part with 34 yards on five carries, not to mention a 23-yard reception.

And then there's the electrifying Sage Le-Blanc. He had five carries for 39 yards, four receptions for 100 yards and a touchdown and brought the fans to their feet ev-

ery time they kicked to him.

With the Rebels leading just 3-0 late in the first period, LeBlanc some broke loose from the coverage team for a 59-yard punt return to the Holy Cross 18 to set up an eventual 3-yard touchdown to Asa Miller.

On the next punt to him, LeBlanc was at it again with a 39-yard punt return to set up the first of Harris' three touchdown runs.

"Ilove it," LeBlanc said of his elusive work in the return game. "Every time I get the ball, they (teammates on return team) are all blocking 100 percent."

As good a game as the Rebels' rushing attack had, it wasn't like Kelley didn't make a dent in the passing game, completing 12 of 23 passes for 236 yards and two touchdowns.

"I think he (Kelley) as a little off tonight," Charpentier said. "They (Holy Cross) did a good job of holding us down on the outside guys a couple of times, but I think he just misfired a couple of times. Overall, I thought he did a good job."

By the end of his interview, though, LeBlanc deflected the praise toward the Rebels' defense, which also got it done on the line of scrimmage. Running back Tre Turner was stifled all night long, being limited to 29 yards on 16 carries.

In fact, the only real rushing took place on scrambling by quarter-back Kyle Hunter, who had 97 yards on 21 carries.

Wide receiver Michael Chigbu, a Georgia Tech commitment, didn't really impact the game until the second half, but did finish with eight receptions for 138 yards and a touchdown.

NEW ORLEANS Other than the people within their locker room and their community, not too many people gave Teurings Catholic much of a chance to upset the defending Division I state champions Rummel.

With a play here or there, it could have been a different story but in the end the Rebels fell short as they were defeated 28-20 by Rummel in the quarter finals of the playoffs on Saturday.

"Our guys played really hard," Rebels head coach Sonny Charpentier said. "I won't say impressed by the way we played, because I'm not. Being impressed would imply that I was surprised and I'm not. "We just couldn't get the ball from them," Charpentier said. "They just pounded us. Not being able to stop the run when we had to was the difference in the game. They kept the ball away from us and when that is happening one or two mistakes are magnified."

At the end of the game, Charpentier expressed to his team just how pleased he was to be their coach. "I told them how proud of them I am and that I was glad to be their coach," Charpentier said. "We had a special year and I know there was a lot of dissapointment on those three busses coming back to Lafayette, but it was a special year. We were good enough to win (Saturday), but we just didn't make enough plays to win."


Cook believes in the playoffs it is actually better to be on the road than at home because "you have less distractions."

Neville's McCarty takes 4A coaching honor

District 9-4A football did not win the race to the Class 4A state title. But the New Orleans league did manage the next best thing with a sweep of the top two individual honors bestowed upon players selected as All-

Warren Easton quarterback Deshawn Capers-Smith and Karr linebacker Tyrin Ferguson were chosen as the Outstanding Offensive and Defensive Players respectively on the Class 4A All-State team chosen by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

State champion Neville, a 28-27 winner against Capers-Śmith and Easton, did earn the distinction of having its Mickey McCarty honored as Coach of the Year.

McCarty directed Neville to a 13-1 season that included a brilliant 13-0 mark against instate competition that produced the Tigers' second Class 4A state championship in four years

The state title was Neville's 11th overall and third under McCarty, 46, who in completing his 16th season in charge of the Tigers equaled the three achieved by the legendary Charlie Brown.

As the Outstanding Offen-Player, Capers-Smith capped his four-year career as a starter with mind-boggling numbers as Easton completed a 12-3 season with its first appearance in a state final since 1958.

A 6-foot-1, 185-pound senior and Texas A&M commitment, who projects to play corner-back in college, Capers-Smith totaled 5,651 yards and 71 touchdowns with his passing and run-ning for the Eagles, who won their first district title since

Ferguson was chosen Outstanding Defensive Player after serving as a major linchpin for a Karr team that advanced to the state quarterfinals after defeating Easton in a regular season finale to earn a share of the District 9-4A championship along with Landry-Walker.

A 6-foot-2, 210-pound senior and Nebraska commitment. Ferguson recorded 104 tackles and 18 assists with nearly one third of those totals represented by 23.5 tackles for losses and 10.5 sacks.

Neville's state champions had five players selected with running back Kavontae Turpin heading the group that included offensive lineman Cole Thomas, defensive linemen Donald Louis and Rashard Lawrence and safety T.J. Lemoine.

Wide receiver Tyron Johnson and cornerback Dedrick Shy join Capers-Smith as Easton players chosen to the team.

Sage Leblanc of Teurlings Catholic and Isaiah Graham of Bastrop are the other wide receivers while Markell Haw-thorne of LaGrange and Cris-tian Wallis of South Terrebonne join Turpin at running back.

Teurlings Catholic quarter-back Cole Kelley earned a spot as the athlete selection.

In addition to Neville's Thomas, the offensive line in-cludes Franklinton's Adrian Magee, West Ouachita's Cody Goodwin, Plaquemine's Kevin Dotson and South Terrebonne's Dylan Perque.

The front four on defense in addition to Neville's Louis and Lawrence features George Lea of Landry-Walker and DeRidder's Daniel Crosley with Bren-nan Bourgeois of St. Thomas More, DeAndre McCarthy of Franklin Parish and Tirrell Gil-more of Landry-Walker joining Ferguson at linebacker.


