

SCOUTING REPORT

Strengths

As long as Cole Kelley stays healthy the Rebels offense will function at a high level. Only a couple of teams get the luxury of having a future SEC signal-caller at the helm of their offense, and with the Rebels' high-octane, spread offense Kelley is perfect fit. While they might not be as explosive next season, no clear deep threat has emerged, coach Sonny Charpentier is confident in his team's ability to spread the ball all over the field and move the ball effectively Jansen Lormand takes over as the top running back for the Rebels and gives them a physical presence in the backfield.

The front seven on defense should be able to hold up, as the Rebels have some experience returning along the line and in their linebacker corps. Linebacker Alec Robertson is the leader of that front seven, which did lose star defensive end Asa Miller, but Charpentier said he was confident in the returning players' abilities.

Question Marks

While the Rebels offense is in good hands, it's the secondary

that has Charpentier a little concerned. After losing some key members of the unit from last year's squad, Charpentier lost another player he was counting on the contribute this season to poor grades. While the Rebels spent the summer trying out players at different positions to try and find which players fit best at different positions, they may go through some growing pains in the early portion of the season before figuring it out completely.

Bottom Line

If the Rebels secondary can perform at a high level, this will

be a tough team to beat. As St. Thomas More learned last season, no lead is safe with Kelley at the helm, so as long as the defense can keep teams within striking distance while they get their feet under them the Rebels will be a threat for a deep playoff

COLE KELLEY QB, 6-7, 230, Sr

This one should be obvious. With the departure of Shea Patterson, Kelley is the best quarterback in the state. Watch for Kelley to improve on his short-to-intermediate passing accuaracy this season and if he does a lot of schools around the country are going to regret not recruiting him harder.



HAYDEN CANTRELLE

WR, 5-10, 170, Jr

Cantrelle spent most of last season on the bench behind Kelley, but Charpentier said he wants to get him on the field more this season due to his explosive athleticism. Cantrelle made a couple of touchdown grabs at the Quik Slants 7-on-7 tournament and could develop into a star in the slot.



ALEC ROBERTSON

LB, 6-1, 210, Sr

Robertson is the quarterback of the Rebels defense and is a rock in the middle. He has the speed to drop into coverage and flash out to the flat to run down a back on a flare route.



ASHTON WHALEY

OL, 6-1, 265, Sr

Whaley is a returning starter on what should be an elite offensive line. Whaley played guard last season and in offense like Teurlings where interior pressure can disrupt plays he'll be an important cog again this season.



JUSTIN MURRAY

CB, 5-11, 170, Jr

Murray, who coaches thought wouldn't be on the field this season due to academic trouble, is a shutdown corner with elite ability. Now that he's been cleared after some hard work during the summer, Murray goes a long way in shoring up the Rebels pass defense.



This district was tough before Carencro dropped down to 4A this season to throw another name in the hat.

Yep, the team that won the district with the state-champion Acadiana Wreckin' Rams in it now plays in the same district as St. Thomas More and Teurlings.

Oh, and don't forget Northside, who has one of the top players in the country in defensive tackle Tyler Shelvin, or Beau Chene, who has a new quarterback and a new offense this season.

Carencro, St. Thomas More and Teurlings will finish the year all in the top three in some order, but figuring out where is the difficult part.

The Bears won't be quite as powerful as last season thanks to the loss of quarterback Tyler Gaspard, who was steady as rock in the pocket for Carencro last season.

But they do still have Tyreik Campbell to hand the ball off to in the backfield.

Teurlings is huge, the Rebels offensive line is massive and they will give senior quarterback Cole Kelley plenty of time to show off that massive arm on throws down the field. The Rebels don't have that true downfield threat they possessed last season, though, and the defense will be a question mark even with cornerback Justin Murray qualifying academically.

St. Thomas More's coaching staff thinks this will be a true breakout year for the Cougars behind two experienced talented quarterbacks and a supreme athlete and recent McNeese state commit Trevor Begue running the offense. But the Cougars have been rocked with injuries during summer workouts and depth will be a slight concern, even for Jim Hightower's usually deep squads.

Carencro pulled the lucky card and got both Teurlings and St. Thomas More at home this season, which should be a big plus for the Bears. The Rebels play St. Thomas More at home, but as

we learned last season home field advantage doesn't really mean much when those two heated rivals meet.

Thanks to their size upfront and new coach Roch Charpentier joining the staff, I have Teurlings pulling off a tightly contested district title with St. Thomas More and Carencro in an absolute dog fight for the second spot. I give the Cougars the slight edge because of the uncertainty at the quarterback spot for the Bears, though.



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Kevin Foote's Preseason Top 10

1. Acadiana Wreckin' Rams

Still have plenty of questions to answer, but it just kind of makes sense to put a two-time defending state champion at No. 1 to start the season. Establishing a halfback rotation and finding a kicking game are on early-season checklist.

2. Teurlings Catholic Rebels

The Rebels' only two losses last year were close bookend setbacks to U-High and Rummel. Until somebody beats the Rebels around these parts, the program has earned a No. 2 preseason ranking.

3. Catholic-NI Panthers

I've heard the talk that the Panthers won't be as explosive as last season. While that may be true, there's no requirement that a team has to win 50-10 to get credit. It's Brent Indest, folks. If indeed offensive production is Catholic's biggest weakness, that's a bad sign for the opposition.

4. St. Thomas More Cougars

The temptation for many is to remember only the crazy loss to Teurlings and the upset playoff loss to Jesuit. But folks, they won every other game they played last season. There's plenty enough back to start STM out in the top five and see what happens.

5. Notre Dame Pioneers

The Pios' three losses last year were to Teurlings, Catholic-NI and U-High. No other opponent played a single-digit game against Notre Dame. The Pios certainly have some questions to answers, but betting on coach Lewis Cook to

discover solutions is normally a smart move.

6. Kaplan Pirates

The Pirates have developed quite a winning trend under coach Stephen Lotief. The Pirates have fewer questions on offense than they did a year ago, and playing tough defense has become a habit again at Kaplan.

7. Crowley Gents

This might be the first offense-heavy team in this poll. Simply put, the Gents will be fun to watch this season. There are no cupcakes in this new district, though, so maintaining this spot will require an upgrade defensively.

8. Church Point Bears

Coach John Craig Arceneaux has crossed the line. His Bears have now earned the right to receive the benefit of the doubt. So while they have some big shoes to fill, consistency is becoming part of Church Point's credentials.

9. Vermilion Catholic Eagles

The talk has been heard loud and clear – the rest of 7-1A has closed the gap on the Eagles. Perhaps the season will play out that way, but the Eagles have been so dominant that they deserve the right to prove people wrong.

10. Ascension Episcopal



WHO: The Rebels are looking to build upon last season's success and punch through to the next level and compete for a state championship in Cole Kelley's senior season.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR:

Everyone knows the Rebels offense will run smoothly this season behind Kelley, but watch how the Rebels defense holds up as the secondary could be the one big question mark in an otherwise solid club.

LOOKING AHEAD: Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said the Rebels offense might be less explosive this season without a deep threat, but would just as effective moving the ball. Kelley has grown in his ability to hit the intermediate routes and this will be the first look at how Charpentier's offense will run this season.

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3. Teurlings 28, South Lafourche 0

Teurlings absolutely dominated an over-matched South Lafourche squad on its way to a 28-0 victory.

Cole Kelley finished the night 5-for-6 with 138 yards and three touchdowns, including two highlight throws that showcased why he's considered one of the best prospects in the state.

After a play broke down, Kelley evaded the pressure to his left, waved his left hand to send senior receiver Jacob Richard down the field and delivered a perfect strike for a 66-yard gain. The drive was capped off by a Kelley to Chaney Dodge 4-yard touchdown.

On the first play of the ensuing Rebels' drive, Kelley fired an on-point overthe-shoulder throw to a streaking Hayden Cantrelle for a 44-yard touchdown to give Teurlings a 21-0 lead, and completing his work throwing the ball for the night.

"South Lafourche has had a lot of trouble with injuries, so they weren't at their best



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tonight," Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "It's always good to get the win, but I'm not sure how much we learned about ourselves tonight."

The Rebels have now scored 89 points in their last two 'games,' after scoring 61 points against Sam Houston in their scrimmage without utilizing Kelley at quarter-back.

STANDOUT PERFORMER:

Jacob Richard

Obviously Kelley was the best player in tonight's game, but Richard caught two touchdowns and at 6-1, 190 pounds and possessing 4.4 speed, Richard gives the Rebels a deep threat they thought they lacked.

WHAT WE LEARNED ABOUT TEURLINGS:

Really, not a whole lot, which is something Rebels' coach Sonny Charpentier alluded to after the game.

The Tarpons were completely out-classed in the game and Teurlings took advantage early and often.

But, after losing both starting wide receivers from last season's squad, Charpentier had expressed some concern about the Rebels' ability to attack defenses down the field this season.

Well, Jacob Richard and Hayden Cantrelle's performances might've done a lot to quell those concerns.

the next year or two."

The Rebels will be looking to keep their offensive momentum going after scoring 28 and 61 points against South Lafourche and Sam Houston, respectively.

And the Rebels have the added bonus of getting one, possibly two, of their preseason starters back into the lineup.

Senior running back Jansen Lormand, who missed the scrimmage and the jamboree, will definitely be back in his starting role for Teurlings on Friday night after recovering from his injury.

"He's a guy that we penciled in as a starter coming out of the spring," Charpentier said. "And he's just explosive, he's one of those guys that just makes plays whether running it out the backfield or catching it in the slot. He's just a football player — you try to give him the ball and let him

make plays."

Senior center Cole Quebedeaux could be back as well, helping to solidify the Rebels offensive line, one of the main strengths of the team.

Charpentier said Quebedeaux had knee surgery three or four weeks ago, but returned to practice this week and would be a game-time decision on Friday.

Even with Lormand returning, Charpentier said he was happy with the way senior Chaney Dodge filled in while Lormand was recovering from the injury.

Dodge caught a 5-yard touchdown pass from senior quarterback Cole Kelley in the jamboree.

"Chaney Dodge came in as a senior and it worked out well for him because he got some more experience and some more reps at two different positions early," Charpentier said. "He'll slide into a backup role, but he'll definitely get some minutes."

Even without the No. 1 quarterback in the country, the Cavaliers offense is still expected to be an

explosive unit.

Charpentier said Cavaliers new quarterback Jake Bartley was the quarterback at Calvary Baptist before Shea Patterson got there, and although he hasn't gotten first-team game experience, he wasn't the typical backup.

"We've got some film on them from the scrimmage and the jamboree, but they weren't showing all their cards," Charpentier said. "The new quarterback has been on the field as a receiver before, so you know he's a good athlete." Bartley was a receiver last season and flashed his athleticism for Calvary, and the Cavaliers showed they were willing to use him in the running game in preseason action.

"We don't know as much about what he can and can't do," Charpentier said. "They ran him a lot in the scrimmage, but obviously as a former receiver you would expect that he can run a little bit."

The Rebels defense has made strides in the preseason, but Charpentier admitted that this would be a major step up in competition and that the coaching staff would have to talk to the unit about facing adversity throughout the game.

But the talented Cavaliers have to make a long trip to make it to Rebel Field and Charpentier said his squad would be ready for the challenge.

"They've got a three hour bus ride and we've played there before and it is quite a haul," Charpentier said. "So we look forward to playing them at home."

The game didn't start well for either offense, with the teams both trading 3-and-outs on each of their opening two drives before the Cavaliers broke through for the first touchdown of the game.

Calvary quarterback Jake Bartley hit receiver Austin Cook in stride for a 70-yard touchdown pass to give his team the early 7-0 lead.

The Rebels responded on the next drive with a 10play, 77-yard drive that was capped by a 46-yard

touchdown reception by Paul Joe Hammes, includ-ing a nifty juke to elude a defender on the sideline. But the Rebels missed the extra-point, a problem for them on the night, to keep

Calvary in the lead.

Bartley ran for a touchdown on the next drive and after a stalled Teur-lings drive the Cavaliers scored again, this time on a 53-yard touchdown by Kordavion Washington, to extend their lead to 21-6.

But that's when the comeback began for the

Kelley hit receiver Ja-cob Richard on a pretty back shoulder throw that allowed Richard to break away from the defender and take it to the house for

an 82-yard touchdown.

Then with 4:09 left in the half Kelley led the Rebels on a quick 3-play, 59yard drive capped by a Kelley 7-yard touchdown run to bring the score to 21-19 and close the scoring for the half.



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

Faulk, Pios' balanced rushing prevail

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He really, really didn't want to give Cole Kelley and the explosive Teurlings Catholic offense the ball back.

So with an elite defense at his disposal, Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook elected to go for it on fourth down from his own 33 with 3:11 left to play.

Trusting his offensive line that had earned his Pioneers a five-point lead over the Rebels – ranked No. 2 in the state and No. 1 in the Acadiana area – at that point in the game paid off with a two-yard run by safety-turn-fullback Hayden Bourgeois.

hopes by running right and marching 40 yards to sew up a thrilling 28-23 home win for Class 2A's No. 5-ranked Pios over old rival Teurlings Catholic on Friday at Gardiner Memorial Stadium.

"At third-and-11, Coach just told me to run as hard as you ever run in your life," said Faulk, who finished with 108 yards rushing and 84 passing. "It (40-yard run) was a great feeling. I knew it was going to come down to the end like that. I'm just glad it ended like it did."

Prior to the play, someone suggested that the Pios opt for the pitch, which had worked for several big gainers earlier in the game.

"No, I wasn't going to pitch it in that situation," Cook said. "Joe grew up tonight. He seems to play his best when the most is on the line. That's what I like about that kid." Faulk's big run was especially frustrating for the visiting Rebels, who appeared in position of possibly overcoming a 28-17 deficit. In its final drive, Teurlings drove 82 yards on nine plays with Kelley completing key passes of 13 yards to Jansen Lormand, 14 yards to Paul Joe Hammes and then 17 to Noah Harris, who scored from 1 yard out.

The two-point conversion, though, failed and the Rebels trailed 28-23 with 6:23 left. It then appeared that Kelley and Company just might get the ball back at third-and-11.

"We would have liked to get the ball back," TCHS coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We had some momentum. We just couldn't get off the field.

"We knew they would try to keep it away from us and they did

Kelley, meanwhile, countered with an 8-yard TD pass to Lormand and a 30-yard scoring strike to Holland Griffin to tie game at 14-14 with 6:04 left until halftime.

Two plays later, the Pios fumbled at their 35. That's where the Rebels' second frustrating moment came, getting off 10 plays and reaching the Pios 5 before having to settle for a 22-yard Brayden Blanchard field goal and a 17-14 lead at intermission.

Teurlings escapes scare from BBHS

BREAUX BRIDGE — Rivalry games can be tougher than expected. The Teurlings Catholic Rebels found that out Thursday night.

But after being stymied by the Breaux Bridge defense for nearly four full quarters, the Rebels were able to mount an impressive 7-play, 65-yard drive, which culminated on a 10-yard touchdown run by Noah Harris with 1:04 left, to lift the visitors to a hard-fought 14-7 non-district win over the Tigers.

"This was our third game in 12 days, so that's a little tough on our kids," said Teurlings head coach Sonny Charpentier. "But

After a 4-yard loss on their first play, quarterback Cole Kelly dropped back and threw a screen pass to the left side caught by Harris. Harris then did the rest, running down left sideline for an 85-yard touchdown and a quick 7-0 lead.

Neither offense threatened the rest of the half, but the Tigers (2-2) would get a score nonetheless. That is, thanks to cornerback Sabarian Alexander.

Faced with a 2nd-and-10 from his own 43, Kelley attempted another screen play to the left side. However, this time Alexander was waiting for it, picking it off at his own 41 and running it back all the way for the tying TD with 9:15 left in the first half.

"He's been playing really good for us," said Breaux Bridge head coach Paul Broussard, of Alexander. "He's been making big plays for us all year and he came up with another one right there."

Alexander would come up big again later in the quarter when Kelley attempted a long pass into the end zone, but had it picked off in fine fashion by the senior.

Breaux Bridge's Korey Louis later blocked Brayden Blanchard's 33-yard attempt.

"We just had too many mistakes tonight," said Charpentier. "But I have to give the kids a lot of credit. It was a tough, hardfought game and at the end, they were able to score and pull out the win."

TEURLINGS GETS A TIGHT WIN OVER BREAUX BRIDGE

Every week we'll be breaking down the film from some of the area's games to try and figure out why certain teams had success and trying to identify some trends.

This week we look at the three big plays in the Teurlings-Breaux Bridge game from Thursday and why the offense should still be feared as one of the best in the state.

1. Noah Harris takes a screen 85 yards for a touchdown


What Happened: Breaux Bridge has a fast, aggressive defense that attacks the ball relentlessly and to this point this season has been one of the most underrated units in Acadiana. The Tigers proved their worth again Thursday night, limiting the Rebels' explosive offense to only 14 points (or nine less than the vaunted Notre Dame defense) and basically just one actual touchdown drive.

The Rebels' first touchdown came on the first drive of the game and they used the Tigers aggressiveness against them perfectly with a nicely executed screen pass.

At the snap, Tigers linebacker Kirkland Joseph flows toward the strong side of the formation, looking to snuff out any potential running play. Korey Louis (23) and Daryon Wiltz (34) are released into the backfield and charge upfield to sack quarterback Cole Kelley.

But Kelley releases a second before the pressure gets there and drops the ball into Harris' hands who gets excellent blocking from his lineman and shakes a tackle before racing up the field.

Result: Perhaps most impressively, Harris showcases both his ability to break a tackle with strength and then turn on the afterburners to rip off a long touchdown. After breaking the initial tackle, Harris outruns the rest of the Tigers defense and gives the Rebels the first of their two touchdowns on the night.



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What it Means: Kelley has rightfully gotten a lot of the press for his skill in running the Rebels offense, but Harris has been a legit stud for the Rebels through the first four games.

Teurlings is a more effective offense when they can be balanced (every offense is) and on a night when they were facing a tough defense to run against they still were able to get Harris involved in the action (4 catches for 100 yards).

2. Same play, different result

What happened: The bad thing about good defenses is they learn quickly from their mistakes. After getting burned on the touchdown play the Tigers reacted a lot quicker to the screen (looks like pretty much the same play, formation) and get a crucial turnover.


Kelley starts by rolling to his right to draw the defense to him before attempting the same type of lofty throw over the top to the running back for a screen.

But the Tigers blow the RB up in the backfield on the play action and take away the intended receiver on the play.

Kelley then makes a mistake and without identifying his screener (on the touchdown you can see him make eye contact with Harris) and lofts the ball over the top anyway.


Breaux Bridge defensive back Sabarian Alexander reacts first to the throw and makes the interception.

The sad thing about the play from the Rebels point of view, once again the offensive line did an amazing job of setting up the screen and would have had the play blocked perfectly. Might've led to another touchdown and at least a big play.



Result: Alexander rises and makes the interception and before the offensive lineman can react to what just happened he's already by them and running at full speed.


From there he only has one player to beat in Harris, and with Alexander running at full speed and Harris caught flatfooted because of the scenario it becomes an easy task for the athletic defensive back.



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


He outruns the rest of the reacting Rebels and scores the Tigers' only touchdown of the night.



What it Means: The Tigers offense has struggled through the opening weeks of the season and Breaux Bridge has had to rely on its defense and special teams for points.


Until the Tigers get it figured out on the offensive side of the ball, the defense will have to consistently come up with big plays like this to score points for the Tigers.



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3. The reception that was (or wasn't?)

What Happened: After being completely shut down since the touchdown in the opening minutes of the game, the Rebels ripped off a big drive at the end of the game to score the game-winning touchdown.

The Rebels used a series of quick-hitting routes and Kelley calmly drove Teurlings down the field quickly (calling his own plays it looks like, but I'm not sure) and efficiently and eventually the Rebels took the lead with less than a minute thanks to a Noah Harris touchdown.

There was one play that stood out on the TV broadcast of the game during the drive that look slightly controversial in real time.

On a quick hitch the far side of the field Kelley delivered a low ball to his receiver and the receiver made a diving catch for the completion, but in real time it look like he might've 'trapped' it against the ground to make the catch.

When viewing the play in slow motion and zooming in on the TV, it looks like the receiver gets both hands under the ball and safely brings it in. Really nice play by Isaac Boulanger to get down and make that catch.



Result: Another first down for the Rebels and it eventually led to Harris' touchdown romp. Kelley showed off his cannon arm a couple of times on the drive and for the first time since the interception looked comfortable in the offense.

What it Means: Some people might be questioning whether the Rebels' offense is all that it was hyped up to be after two 'subpar' performances.

They shouldn't.


The Rebels' offense is fine. They played two very good defensive teams (and three games in 12 days) and when it counted for all the marbles they drove down the field with little problems and scored a game-winning touchdown.

Add in the fact that receiver Hayden Cantrelle is still working his way back from an injury and the Rebels offense shouldn't worry anyone.

One of the things that makes the Bears rushing attack so strong is their wide receivers' willingness and ability to block on the outside, Charpentier said.

Catholic-BR's defense stunts Teurlings

Teurlings Catholic tried to overcome the sins of its first half against Catholic High of Baton Rouge on Friday night, but fell short 28-14 at Teurlings Field.

The opportunistic Bears defense held Rebel gunslinger Cole Kelley to 208 yards passing, picked him off three times and forced a fumble on their fifth sack of the night.

"We just didn't play well enough," TCH coach Sonny Charpentier said. "Against a quality opponent you can't turn the ball over four times and expect to win."

At the end of the third quarter, the Rebels (3-2) rode high on a wave of momentum, scoring on their opening possession of the quarter on a 15-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard barrel by quarterback Cole Kelley (28-14). After a quick change of possession the Rebels inched down to the Bear's 38 as the quarter expired.

However, on the next two plays Kelley was sacked for 11 yards, and then 8 yards to push the Rebels back onto their own side of the field.

"I felt like that was really a turning point," Charpentier said. "We didn't capitalize on field position. It's a good opponent and you can't dig a whole like that and expect to come back."

Kelley fumbled the ball on the Rebels' next possession after tak-

ing another crunching sack, setting up the Bears with ball on the TCH 27-yard line. But the defense held strong, forcing a turnover on downs to give the Rebels new life.

Kelley engineered four plays that pushed the Rebels down to the CHS-BR 20-yard line in only 30 seconds of game time. However, his next three passes would fall in-

complete and the Rebels never possessed the ball again.

"We'll watch the film tomorrow and get this one behind us," Charpentier said. "This is a learning experience for us and we'll take some things and move on to district play next week."

Catholic marched down the field on their opening possession, taking more than five minutes to go 80 yards in 14 plays. James Berrigan capped the drive as he tum-

The ball whizzed into the hands of Isaac Boulanger, who out-wrestled the Catholic defender for the touchdown (14-7).

TCH's defense forced a three-and-out and the Rebels put together another long drive. However, 15 plays and 55-yards of hard work were undone, as Kelley tried to throw across his body as he rolled to his right side. Lying in wait was Connor

Six plays later the Bears pulled off a double pass; Ian Brian threw backwards to Parker Sulik. Sulik then set his feet and tossed the ball 19 yards to a wide open Tyler Mason (21-7).

On the third play of the next drive, Kelley tossed his third pick of the night. The Bears struck quickly, capping off a two-play drive with a 15-yard pitch-and-catch from Brian to Patrick Dunn (28-7).





Even a coach as experienced as St. Thomas More's Jim Hightower admitted playing Teurlings put stress on the Cougars.

Well, not the type of stress most people would think of.

"On the game field because of all the different looks the give you that's where the stress comes from," Hightower said. "That's where the stress comes from. From what they do in between the white lines.

"It becomes a mental game as much as a physical one. They stretch the field vertically and horizontally, you've got to cover the whole thing."

Charpentier knows the Rebels have a tough task on their hands defensively, trying to slow down a Cougars offense that has been white-hot the last few weeks.

In their last three games, the Cougars have averaged 50 points per game and put up 70 on Beau Chene in week six.

"I don't think you can really stop them altogether," Charpentier said. "You can try to do some things to slow them down, but I don't know about stopping them completely."

Charpentier said the Rebels' ability to apply pressure on St. Thomas More senior quarterback Will Bellamy would be crucial to their defensive success.

"He's not a runner, but he's a good athlete," Charpentier said. "He does a good job of moving around and keeping his eyes St. Thomas More

down the field and looking for plays."

The Cougars have used senior receiver Trevor Begue in a variety of ways this season to keep defenses off balance and from limiting him too much.

Begue will often either start in the slot, or motion before the play starts to prevent players from jamming him at the line of scrimmage as well as to help identify what coverage a defense might be using against him.

"They do a really good job of moving him around the formation," Charpentier said. "You have to be focused at all times to keep track of him. And since he's mostly in the slot you can't pressure him at the line of scrimmage."

Charpentier said the Rebels primary task will be forcing the Cougars to be one dimensional, so that they can easier predict what they can do on offense.

It's a task easier said than done, with St. Thomas More running back Evan Trahan having an efficient season in the backfield, rushing for 569 yards on 83 carries good for just under seven yards per carry.

"We have to take away something and limit one thing they want to do," Charpentier said. "We can't let them have both." "It's a game that everyone circles in red, whether they do it physically or not. It's a great, fun rivalry. This is what high school sports are all about."

Hightower has similar concerns about the Rebels offense.

Even with the loss of senior running back Noah Harris, Hightower was still concerned about the Rebels' ability to run the ball with junior Jansen Lormand filling in for the injured Harris

Hightower said the Rebels give teams a multitude of looks in the running game.

"They are very balanced in what they do," Hightower said. "They run the ball in some power sets, they run whams and some counter treys, they run a good compliment of draw plays and the quarterback runs a decent amount."

Charpentier said the Cougars defense makes teams earn every yard and doesn't make mistakes, something he attributed to the coaching of veteran defensive coordinator Terry Tidwell.

The Rebels have proven to be very effective in the offensive screen game this season, using Lormand and the injured Harris to great effect out of the backfield.

Hightower said he was wary

of the Rebels' screen game because if they committed too many bodies to stopping it, it would give Teurlings senior quarterback Cole Kelley a chance to show off his cannon arm.

arm.
"Their screen game is very good as well," Hightower said.
"But with that big arm they like to throw the ball down the field and get yards in big chunks."


Even though the Rebels get the chance to host St. Thomas More this season, they perhaps know best that home field advantage matters little in this contest after what they were able to accomplish last season.

Charpentier said with a game as big as this, home field advantage didn't seem to matter and it came down to what the players did on the field, a sentiment Hightower echoed.

"There's nothing foreign about what happens between the stripes," Hightower said. "I think all the other stuff, in terms of two really good football teams meeting out on the field, I think that's going to be the biggest challenge."

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

Teurlings out-muscles St. Thomas More

With 33 pass attempts the first half, it looked like the Teurlings Rebels were relying on the arm of Cole Kelley to win the game against their heated rival St. Thomas More.

But in the second half, they turned to their defense and offensive line, as well as the legs of Kelley, to out-physical the Cougars at the point of attack and win their second in a row over St. Thomas More, 42-28.

"It's just Football 101. When you've got an explosive offense like they do, they can't score if they are sitting on the bench," said Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said. "We went into the ball game hoping to limit their possessions. Someone said we had 33 first downs. Anytime you can do that it is a tremendous advantage."

The Rebels only had 31 first downs, but they did run 83 offensive plays to St. Thomas More's 48, wearing out the Cougars in the second half with a pounding running game.

pounding running game. Kelley ran the ball 21 times in the game for 58 yards, picking up first down after first down as

the Rebels' offensive line pushed the Cougars' off the line of scrimmage.

"(My offensive lineman) are some hogs. That second half, I think we might have worn them out and we could just run the clock out," Kelley said. "That's really nice to be able to do, to not just be one dimensional and just have to throw it which I think we had to go to in the first half."

In what proved to be the game-icing drive, Kelley rushed the ball eight times for 45 yards and the Rebels used 11 plays and more than six minutes of game clock to drive down the field and take a two touchdown lead.

St. Thomas More coach Jim Hightower said the Rebels beat them at the line of scrimmage and proved to be the more physical team.

"Hats off to Teurlings, they were definitely the more physical team tonight. They took control of the line of scrimmage at times," Hightower said. "We weren't winning the battles we needed to up front."

Kelley said the Rebels' offensive game plan centered around throwing the ball in the first half to wear the Cougars out and then using their running game to pound them in the second half.

with defensive coordinator Tony Courville's grueling conditioning regimen, Kelley said the Rebels were one of the best conditioned teams in the state

state.
"That was our game plan, to throw it around a

little bit in the first half and just make them run to the ball and wear them out a little bit," Kelley said. "I think we're in better shape than almost every team we play because of coach Courville."

The Rebels running game excelled even without senior Noah Harris, who broke his collarbone in the game against Northside, thanks to Kelley and junior running back Jansen Lormand who rushed 15 times for 52 yards and a touchdown.

Lormand chipped in seven receptions, 49 yards and a touchdown in the receiving game as well.

"We pounded them in the second half even without Noah," Kelley said. We miss him, this game was for him."

It was another of Courville's concoctions that helped slow the St. Thomas More offense down, holding the Cougars to 21 offensive points — the Cougars scored a defensive touchdown courtesy

of a Peyton Broussard interception return.

terception return.

The Rebels threw a couple of different looks and blitzes at the Cougars that they hadn't used this season in an attempt to stay aggressive and force the Cougars to be one dimensional.

"That was the goal to make them one dimensional," Courville said. "And we had some things we hadn't shown in the past that we worked on this week that the kids executed well. "It's attributed to those

"It's attributed to those kids and the belief they have in the system and in the program."

After losing all five games between the years 1987-to-2013, the Rebels have now won the last two meetings between the two teams and tied the all-time series at six wins a piece.


"We had an excellent game plan going into the game and we knew if we executed it properly, good things would happen," Courville said.

Kelley uses arm, legs to propel Teurlings to win

Nobody would ever mistake Cole Kelley for Leonard Four-nette, but the Teurlings Catholic quarterback showed Friday night that he can be a bruising

running threat also.
Kelley did throw for 369 yards, but it was a fourth quarter filled with calling his own number and pounding inside for

yardage that made the biggest difference Friday as the Rebels posted a 42-28 win over District 4-4A and crosstown rival St. Thomas More.

With a packed Rebel Stadium rocking as the homestanding Teurlings squad scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns, the Rebels (6-2, 3-0) took charge of the district race with two games remaining.

The Cougars (6-2, 2-1) suf-fered their first loss since an early-season setback against Catholic-Baton Rouge in the matchup of the state's third and fourth-ranked Class 4A clubs. Kelley nired it out 42 times in the game, completing 26 of them including a fourth-quarter screen to running back Jansen Lormand that covered 21 yards and gave the Rebels a 35-28 lead

rally, it was Kelley who capped the drive with a one-yard quarterback sneak with 2:57 left to give Teurlings the two-touchdown lead.

"I wouldn't want to have to tackle him," said Rebel coach Sonny Charpentier, whose squad has won the local rivalry game two years in a row. "We knew we had to keep their offense off the field, and I'm proud of the way our guys were able to do that in the second half."

That clinching drive began with 8:19 left and with the Rebels starting inside STM territory at the 45 after a short punt, but the short march short by the standards of the rest of the game came entirely on the ground and included three of the last four of the Rebels' stunning 32 first downs.

On the third play after Kelley's score, STM quarterback Will Bellamy was picked off by Kade Sonnier in Rebel territory, and Teurlings was able to run out the final 2:30 in taking their second straight win in the series. TCHS had stunned the Cougars 56-46 last season, rallying back from a 43-17 deficit in the final quarter and a half.

STM themselves had rallied back twice in the third quarter after the hosts led for most of the first half. Bellamy, who connected with Griffin Hebert for two first-half touchdowns, found Bellamy again with a 15-yard toss to cap a quick drive with the second-half kick-off. That score gave the Cougars a 21-20 advantage, their first since early in the second quarter.

Teurlings came back with an 80-yard drive of its own, with Lormand scoring from five yards out with 6:52 left in the period and the Rebels taking a 28-21 lead with a trick two-point play, wide receiver Hayden Cantrelle throwing back to Kelly for the conversion

The Rebel defense stopped STM on a fourth down at the TCHS 13 on the next drive, but Kelley was victimized three plays later. Peyton Broussard stepped in front of one of Kelley's aerials and returned it 35 yards for a score that tied the game at 28 with 1:14 left in the peri-

od.

But Teurlings marched right back, going 80 yards in nine plays and Kelley hitting Lormand with the 21-yard scoring pass to give the Rebels the lead for good.

Teurlings totaled 516 offensive yards in the game including a surprising 147 on the ground, even with top running back Noah Harris sidelined by injury.

"We were able to do some things in the second half," Charpentier said. "I think they (STM) got tired on defense and we were able to take advantage of that. We gave them one back (on the interception return), but I'd proud of the way our guys answered after that."

Bellamy, who was 19of-28 for 271 yards, hit Hebert with touchdowns of 20 and 15 yards for the Cougars' two first-half scores, but the Rebels took the lead on one of those Bellamy throws when Luke Mahne stepped in front of a cross-field pass and returned his interception 28 yards to give Teurlings a 10-7 lead on the third play of the second quarter.

Kelley ran in from one yard out with 2:28 left in the first half to make it

17-7, but the Cougars drove to a touchdown in just over a minute with Bellamy hitting Hebert with 1:10 left in the half.

Brayden Blanchard had the other scoring for the Rebels with a pair of field goals, the last of which came from 21 yards out with four seconds left before halftime for a 20-14 advantage.

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

Carencro surges in 2nd half to outlast Teurlings

The Carencro Bears coaching staff preached patience all week.

The team got the message. After falling behind in the first half, Carencro erupted for four second-half touchdowns, including the go-ahead score by running back Tyreik Campbell, and the Bears rallied for a 33-21 victory against the Teurlings Catholic Rebels on Friday in the Cro Dome.

Cro Dome.

The come-from-behind win placed Carencro (6-3, 3-1) into a three-way tie with the Rebels

(7-3, 3-1) and St. Thomas More for first place in the District 4-4A race with one regular season game remaining. It was the type of win Caren-

It was the type of win Carencro coach Rip Eveland had waited all season for.

"it's the district championship," Eveland said. "It's for all the marbles. We played good against some teams that are pretty good earlier this year. We just needed to win one against a good team."

The Bears rode Campbell to this thrilling victory.

Facing a third-and-31, Campbell took a handoff and broke free down the left sideline for a 71-yard touchdown to put his team in front, 27-21, with 4:21 remaining. Carencro quarterback Gabriel Duffy added a 51-yard score on the next possession to put the game away and keep the Bears' district title hopes alive.

After the Rebels held the Bears' rushing attack in check in the first half, Campbell and Duffy combined for 272 yards on 25 carries (10.88 yards per rush) after the break, which wasn't shocking to Eveland.

"Duffy's special because he's so unpredictable, and things can just happen," Eveland said.

"You can count on Campbell to make plays because he's such a talented guy. If you read the papers, he's one of the [state's] top rushers. He's a great running back and a great kid."

Campbell finished with 236 yards on 28 carries (8.43 yards per rush) and added a two-yard touchdown reception for the first of his two fourth-quarter scores

The Bears needed all of Campbell and Duffy's second-half heroics after the Rebels put them in a two-score hole.

Teurlings quarterback Cole Kelley threw a 70-yard touchdown to receiver Hayden Cantrelle on the first play from scrimmage. Kelly added a oneyard touchdown plunge later in the quarter to make it 14-0 early.

But Teurlings turned the ball over three times in the game — two interceptions and a fumble from Kelley — that resulted in 13 points, including an 87-yard pick six by Carencro defensive back Drakelle Harmon to kickstart the Bears' comeback in the third quarter.

Kelley finished with 22-of-32 for 294 yards, but a interception by Carencro defensive back Kevin George in the endzone sealed the Rebels' fate and left the district title up for grabs.

"We left too many points on the board," Charpentier said.

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



And Harris' injury wasn't a minor hairline fracture or an easy break, the running back needed seven screws and a metal plate to mend his broken shoulder.

The plate is something Harris can still feel from time to time, not as a pain, but as a reminder of the hard work he put in to continue his season when everyone counted him

out.
"I know it's there; I can feel it sometimes when I rub my shoulder or somebody taps me at school," Harris said, "It doesn't hurt but I know it

is there." Despite the odds against him, Harris made an incredible recovery and was cleared 27 days after shattering his collarbone.
Aside from being on

the extreme front end of any recovery predictions

"That's what happens when you work hard and you have good people around you. There were so many people helping me and praying for me. It motivated me to work hard and come back."

the typical recovery for a broken collarbone is four-to-six weeks — Har-ris' jersey number is 27. "I was shooting for

that four week healing time. It ended up being three weeks and six days," Harris said, "It all makes sense now. It didn't make sense right

then, but I know now.

Ron Harris, Noah's father, said his son put together a recovery plan with the doctors as soon as he could, and refused to let the the injury finish

The first step to recovery? A hyperbaric chamber that would pump air that was filled with three times the normal amount of oxygen into Noah's lungs to speed up the healing of his bone.

Something that sounded farfetched as recently as a couple of years ago, Noah said without the chamber he wouldn't have made it back onto the field as fast as he did.

Harris said the chamber feels surprisingly normal, even relaxing enough to hit a quick nap in after school.

"Every day after school going over there and trying to get the bone to heal faster," Harris said. "I would stay for two hours and take a little nap in it five times a week for weeks straight, and that's what really got

my bone growth back, I

think.
"I was able to start doing exercises after that, but the hyperbaric chamber is definitely what kickstarted it."

After roughly two weeks of the hyperbaric chamber, Harris was cleared to begin strengthening exercises for his shoulder as well as cardio to keep his body in shape, but not for contact. While Harris worked

hard throughout his recovery, two of the Rebels' games at the end of the season kicked him into overdrive.

The first was against Teurlings' biggest rival St. Thomas More - a game that the Rebels won, but a game that brought up a lot of emotions for the senior who thought it might be the last chance he got to play

the cross-town rivalry.
"The STM game was hard to sit out," Harris said. "I started crying when they broke the banner and the fireworks went off."

But it was the Rebels' loss to Carencro, a loss that essentially ended their shot at sole possession of a district title, that lit a fire under Har-

That night was a long one for Harris, who took his frustrations out in his rehab work,

"After the Carencro game, after the loss, that game made me really start working hard," Harris said. "I was just starting to do my exercises and get full motion, and after the game I stayed up and ran for an hour on the treadmill and did work with my therapy bands for another

"I stayed up late that night just thinking about the playoffs and when I would make it back.

Harris got his wish in the Rebels' quarterfinal against De La Salle, re-turning to the field with the chance to help his team keep their season alive and perhaps get one more shot at St. Thomas More in the semifinals.

It felt as good as he had imagined.

Even the hits. "(The game against De La Salle) I just felt so confident," Harris said. "I was smiling in the huddle and it just felt so good to finally be back out on the field with the boys.

"All week I didn't really make good contact with anyone in practice. I was telling our trainer that I only needed to get popped one time to be OK, and on the first drive I squared up with a defender and drove him back a little bit and just though, 'All right you're good.

Harris said without the support of his teammates and his family, the road to recovery would have been that much harder.
"That's what happens

when you work hard and you have good people around you," Harris said. "There were so many people helping me and praying for me. It motivated me to work hard and come back."

"All four receivers there have been gantes where they have been the key to our offense success," Strother said. "Whether that's converting sticks or sooring touchdowns, each one of those four receivers have stepped up in a major way throughout the season."

up space for me to run different read routes," Begue said, "It forces the outside linebacker to have to guard me and that's a better matchup that's a better matchup for me, if I can get around him it's pretty much me one-on-one with a safety so I'm just really looking for space." that hasn't been as big of an issue."

Savoie said being out of school can be a double-edged sword, as the coaches aren't as sure the players are using their free time effectively, but the nature of the game and the opponent has helped keep everyone on their game.



STM wins battle in the trenches vs. Teurlings

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St. Thomas More flipped the script on Teurlings in the team's second matchup of the season and it proved to be the deciding factor in the Cougars win.

In the game between the two teams in district play, the Rebels absolutely dominated the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball in the 42-28 win.

St. Thomas More defensive coordinator said the Cougars had to evaluate themselves after the loss and get back to the basics.

"We knew we had basically five weeks left in the season, five weeks until the Superdome," Tidwell said. "We said we're going to rebuild this team from scratch and get back down to fundamentals and we have to get back to playing our kind of football.

"That means running and that means hitting them every time you can hit them and harassing (the quarterback)."

St. Thomas More beat up Teurlings senior quarterback Cole Kelley throughout the night, hitting him constantly as they rush continued to get home.

Tidwell said the Cougars made some personnel changes throughout the defense, moving people around to different positions and injecting life into the defensive line.

"We moved a linebacker down to give us a little more speed, we took a linebacker from outside and moved him inside and a few things like that," Tidwell said. "Basically what it was is that we needed to learn how to play basic football and then I said, 'I'll stunt you so that you have a shot.""

The Cougars defense used defensive line stunts to devastating effect throughout the night, twisting tackles to the outside with crashing defensive ends and mixing linebackers into the pass rush when they could.

Both St. Thomas More defensive ends, Aaron Monrose and Christian Leonard, had standout performances in the win.

"We definitely took advantage of it, we hit Cole a number of times tonight," Tidwell said. "We got the linebackers in sometimes, but it was mostly our defensive line stunting around on them and somebody would get free and have a shot at the quarterback."

Tidwell said the Cougars' started practicing pure man coverage after the Rebels' win earlier in the season because they knew that they would need it for the next four games.

The man coverage on the back end helped free up a linebacker to blitz when the Rebels' went empty in the backfield and only blocked with their five offensive lineman.

"We did a little better of a job in pass protection when we kept six in," Charpentier said.

Monrose and Leonard took advantage of the extra rusher on the inside, using their speed to rush around the edge and give the Rebels' offensive tackles trouble.

The Rebels' tackles had trouble slide stepping to the outside in pass protection and often gave up pressure on the edge, forcing Kelley to step up into the pocket, right into the teeth of the Cougars' defense.

"We crossed the end and crossed the nose and just tried to keep them guessing on where we were coming from and Christian and Aaron did such a great job of rushing on the outside," Tidwell said. "Their tackles would have to jump out to the outside in pass protection and they just couldn't."

Two plays later, senior running back Evan Trahan made Teurlings pay with a 2-yard touchdown run to give the Cougars a 20-14 lead with 22 seconds remaining in the half.

"It certainly didn't hurt," said St. Thomas More coach Jim Hightower. "We had an awful lot of guys step up and make big plays for us. It's not just down to one or two guys."

The touchdown was especially crucial, as the Cougars received the ball to open the second half and promptly extended their lead to two scores.

Trahan scored his second touchdown of the night on St. Thomas More's opening possession of the second, making a nice cut up the field and racing 28-yards for the touchdown.

Senior quarterback Will Bellamy found fellow senior Trevor Begue in the back of the end zone for the two point conver-

The Bellamy to Begue connection proved to once against be a fruitful one for the Cougars, with the two connecting for big plays throughout the night.

Begue had receptions for 43 and 82 yards and finished with 141 total yards

"They had a couple of big plays," Charpentier said. "That's the problem with not tackling, it looked we had him wrapped up for a second."

After Trahan's second touchdown the Cougars went for the jugular, utilizing a surprise onside kick which they recovered to keep Teurlings' offense off the field.

before tapping it forward
and falling on the football
after letting it travel 10
yards.

But the Rebels defense

held firm and forced the Coguars' offense to punt to keep themselves in the contest.

Teurlings' senior quarterback Cole Kelley hit Paul Joe Hammes on a seam route down the middle of the field to move into the red zone and give themselves an opportunity to score, but couldn't finish off the drive with points as St. Thomas More's defense rose to the occasion.

"The big play to Paul

Joe getting down there and not being able to score didn't help matters," Charpentier said.

St. Thomas More's defense held firm until late, pressuring Kelley and wearing out the Rebels' offensive line.

Things threatened to get out of hand in the fourth quarter, with two Teurlings players being ejected for confrontations on the field as tensions rose between the teams.

But right before St.
Thomas More looked
ready to end any chance
of a Teurlings victory,
driving all the way down
to the two-yard line before Trahan fumbled as he
attempted to dive into the
end zone with the fumble
being recovered by Teurlings.

"We had some missed opportunities tonight," Hightower said. "We had a missed field and then the fumble on the one-yard line, but we were able to overcome it."

The Rebels methodically drove down the field and were finally able to unlock St. Thomas More's defense on Kelley's second touchdown run of the night, this one from four yards out.

After the extra point,

Teurlings lined up for an onside kick and recovered it after the ball bounced around and ended up in senior linebacker Jonathon Fontenot's hands.

"Our boys battled to the end," Charpentier said. "The kids never quit. We had a couple of situations where we could've made plays and we didn't and that's what it came down to tonight." Despite the Cougars'

Despite the Cougars' reletitless pass rush, the Rebels kept pushing to tie it, at one point converting a fourth and 19 to keep their drive alive.
But on what was essen-

But on what was essentially the last play of the game, Kelley tried to throw the ball out of bounds as he was being wrapped up in the backfield and was intercepted by Begue to ice the game.

"We beat a really good football team and our kids played their hearts out and I'm just really proud of the way they just kept coming and coming," Hightower said. "This is a team that deserves to keep playing and they showed that on the field tonight."
