

SCOUTING REPORT

Strengths

Despite significant losses on the offensive side of the ball, expect the Rebels to once again sport one of the most high-powered offenses in the area this season. They'll look different with Hayden Cantrelle taking over for the departed Cole Kelley, with Cantrelle more of a running threat in the read option game, making the Rebels a little more difficult to game plan against.

Jansen Lormand is back as a top option in the passing game after proving to be a good underneath threat last season, while Holland Griffin will take over as the top receiving threat on the outside after showing flashes of talent during his junior campaign. The Rebels have two running backs they'll lean on this season in Hunter Landry, who will be the power back and Cole Champagne who will be the speed back, giving the Rebels a couple of different options to turn to. Defensively, Tyler Batiste will man the inside linebacker spot after being injured last season and should help solidify a young defensive front.

Question Marks

As with most teams throughout the Acadiana Preps area, experience is one of the biggest question marks heading into the season for the Teurlings Rebels. Cantrelle has shown a nice arm in the offseason and runs a 4.4-40 yard dash, but has yet to start a game at the quarterback position for the Rebels and will have to adjust to a new leadership role within the team. The offensive line returns only one starter, Justin Matthews, from last season's dominating group, and will have to come together quickly, espe-

gle early. Going on the road to Calvary Baptist will be quite the opening test for Cantrelle at the quarterback position and he'll have to find his voice as a leader of the team from the quarterback position. When it's all said and done, though, this team will compete for a district title.

Kevin Foote's area preseason poll

1. Notre Dame Pioneers

It's not just that the Pios won a state championship in undefeated fashion last season. It's that it comes on the heels of almost two decades of dominance that makes coach Lew Cook's team a no-brainer choice for preseason No. 1.

2. Acadiana Wreckin' Rams

Coach Ted Davidson's Rams ended last season in disappointing fashion, not being able to stop Parkway's powerful offense. The good thing about establishing a winning tradition is you can virtually pick up where you left off. The Rams are huge upfront, still filled with stars on defense and perhaps just a little hungrier than a year ago.

3. St. Thomas More Cougars

On paper, there are a ton of reasons to not give the Cougars the benefit of the doubt after reaching the Division II state finals last season. STM has got a lot of holes to fill, but we've played this game before with the Cougars and they almost always seem to answer the call.

4. Carencro Golden Bears

The Bears took another step last season. One year after winning the district title but faltering badly in the first round of the playoffs, Carencro tied for first place in 4-4A last season and won a playoff game before having

to go to No. 1 Neville. New quarterback and new tailback, sure, but the Bears appear primed to continue that upward trend.

5. Teurlings Catholic Rebels

No one quite seems to be able to separate STM, Carencro and Teurlings at this point. In effect, they could all be considered tied for No. 3. All three have new quarterbacks, but the Rebels have one in Hayden Cantrelle who was the starting short-stop on a state championship baseball team. It will be interesting to see how the season plays out.

6. Kaplan Pirates

The Pirates have won at least seven games for the past seven seasons. That's enough consistency to earn the preseason benefit of the doubt. Kaplan has the heart and soul of its team back in workhorse back Julius Johnson and a tough district, but seven starters back on offense should keep it going.

7. Breaux Bridge Tigers

The Tigers have always played rugged defense. Coach Terry Martin's system is coming off a memorable offensive season full of fireworks at

Cecilia. And while Martin no longer has Raymond Calais in his arsenal and is wearing maroon again, it'll be interesting to see if the BBHS defense of old can remain intact while a new offensive system is being installed.

8. Catholic-NI Panthers

Last season was one of total frustration at times for coach Brent Indest's Panthers' program. It started with the inconsistency of playing so many sophomores and ended with forfeits that kept Catholic out of postseason play. Well, those sophomores are juniors now and the Panthers are hungry. Look out.

9. St. Martinville Tigers

The rebuilding process may not be completely finished, but coach Vincent DeRouen certainly has the Tigers thinking big again. Breaking through with a win over BBHS last season was huge for the program in that parish. Now St. Martinville tries to reach that next step — being consistent contenders.

10. Ascension Episcopal Blue Gators

The final preseason spot was tough. Erath, Vermilion Catholic and Eunice were strong contenders. August injuries have made the Blue Gators' chore of repeating last year's 11-win season a tough one. But AES gets the first chance to prove that its reached that 'perennial' level.

1. Acadiana Wreckin' Rams

The Rams are going to sport one of the most imposing defenses in the state this season, especially in the secondary with Bralen Trahan leading the way. Combined with one of the biggest offensive lines in school history, the Rams start the season at the top of the area.

2. Notre Dame Pioneers

The Pios lost so much from last season's state championship winning team, but any team coached by Lewis Cook is going to be near the top of the standings when it is all said and done.

With the addition of Tyler Shelvin to the defense, the Pios should rebound quickly on that side of the ball.

3. Carencro Golden Bears

The Bears were inconsistent last season, but showed flashes of being a dominant force.

This season, with Carl Randall at the helm of the offense, the Bears should be a little more balanced on that side of the ball. Defensively, although thin up front, the Bears will be fast and athletic and give plenty of teams trouble.

4. St. Thomas More Cougars

The Cougars came close to their first ever state championship last season, but have a big hole to fill at the quarterback position with Will Bellamy no longer under center.

Nate Cox is talented but unproven, and the Cougars might have to lean on the running game more than they did last season. With a potentially

5. Teurlings Catholic Rebels

As with so many things, the Rebels and the Cougars are connected in these rankings. With pretty much the same question marks personnel-wise and great coaching on both teams they are essentially tied in my mind. The Rebels have a few more question marks on the defensive side of the football, so they come in a little lower, but don't be surprised to see the two teams battling it out with Carencro for a district title at the end of the season.

6. Catholic-NI Panthers

The Panthers experienced a down year last season, but they return most of the major starters, including quarterback Diallo Landry and stud defensive lineman Zi'Yon Hill.

Hill is a dominant force on the defensive line and with the Panthers looking to spread things out more to take advantage of Landry's talents at the quarterback position, the Panthers led by coach Brent Indest will be back at the top of the standings this season.

7. Kaplan Pirates

Kaplan had quite the

under-the-radar season last year and should have another typically solid season under coach Stephen Lotief. Julius Johnson is back and will be near the top of the rushing leaders for the state in 3A and if the defense comes together the Pirates will have a stout unit.

8. St. Martinville Tigers

The Tigers have one thing over their St. Martin Parish rivals: continuity. In Vincent Derouen's second season at the helm the Tigers should take another step forward, especially with quarterback Jared Davis fully healthy this season. Deantre James is a game-changer and the Tigers will have a solid defense.

9. Breaux Bridge Tigers

Terry Martin might be new to some people, but old Breaux Bridge fans know all about where Martin's coaching roots come from.

The Tigers generated just about more buzz than anyone this offseason after winning two 7-on-7 titles, but have question marks on the defense, especially the defensive line that make me wary of placing them too high on this list to start the season.

10. Loreauville Tigers

Kind of the forgotten force in District 5-2A behind Notre Dame and Catholic-NI, the Tigers have one of the best coaches in the area in Trent Delahoussaye and plenty of athletes at the skill positions to compete.

But with a freshman at quarterback and a thin group in the trenches, the Tigers will have to avoid the injury bug to stay afloat this season.

Acadiana 28; Turlings 21

In perhaps the most explosive game of the Kiwanis Jamboree, the Teurlings Rebels and the Acadiana Wreckin' Rams put on a show on the Cajun Field turf in the final game Friday night.

When it was all said and done Acadiana took home a 28-21 victory, but both teams had impressive moments through-

out the game.

The scoring opened quickly when on the first play of the game the Rams fumbled the ball on the quarterback-to-running back exchange that was recovered by the Rebels.

A couple of plays later, Rebels' quarterback Hayden Cantrelle took a zone read into the end zone from close range for the first touchdown of the game.

The Rams responded immediately on the next drive, marching down the field with a long touchdown run by Ziggy Francis giving the Rams their first touchdown of the evening.

Then the madness really broke out.

Teurlings defensive back Justin Murray returned the ensuing kickoff for a touchdown, giving the Rebels a 14-7 lead.

The Rams didn't wait long to respond, with Bralen Trahan taking the Rebels' kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown. The Rams missed the extra point following the touchdown and trailed 14-13.

Cantrelle rushed for another touchdown before the half was over,

cutting up field and making a move for a 45-yard touchdown scramble. Cantrelle's second touchdown gave the Rebels a 21-13 lead heading into halftime.

Scoring slowed early in the second half, but the Rams were eventually able to break through to tie the game on another touchdown by running back Ziggy Francis. Francis actually fumbled the ball before crossing the end zone, but recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchdown. Junior quarterback Jaylon Borel converted the two-point conversion on a bootleg to tie the game 21-21.

The Rams and Francis weren't done, though.

After forcing the Rebels to punt, the Rams drove down the field and Francis picked up his third touchdown of the night on a 25-yard scamper with 1:11 remaining in the game to give the Rams a 28-21 lead.

The Rebels drove the ball into Acadiana territory to make it interesting in the final minute, but couldn't convert a fourth-and-10 situation to keep the game alive.

What we learned about Teurlings:


Cantrelle can really scamper. The speed was there last season at receiver, but he's got a good amount of wiggle to him and on a few occasions avoided sacks or turned short gains into long gains for the Rebels.

On Cantrelle's second touch-down run, he never slowed down on a nice inside cut to leave a Ram in the dust and was decisive with the ball in his hands.

It seemed that the passing game was just a little off throughout the night, but as we attributed the Rams struggles to contain Cantrelle on the ground to his ability, the Rebels faced probably one of the best defensive backfield's in the state, so the passing game will look better in upcoming weeks.

Defensively, the Rebels struggled to stop Acadiana — but again, that might be something every team has trouble doing this season.

Tyler Batiste, coming off an ACL injury last season, jumped clear over the center on an extra point and almost blocked the kick, so it is safe to say he's just as explosive as ever, which will be a major boon to the front seven.

Teurlings hits the road to face Calvary

Last year, the Teurlings Rebels used a pounding running game behind a big offensive line and a 6-foot-7, 240-pound quarterback they turned into a human bowling ball to wear down Calvary Baptist throughout the game, eventually blowing the game open in the second half.

This year though? The Rebels are a little different.

Gone is the pounding threat of having to tackle Cole Kelley and Noah Harris, replaced by the shiftier Hayden Cantrelle at quarterback.

Cantrelle used his legs and improvisation skills to rack up some serious yardage against Acadiana in the jamboree, but coach Sonny Charpentier said the Rebels would have to be a little more effective in the traditional running game moving forward.

"It was a combination between the offensive line and running backs,

but we couldn't create any holes to run through," Charpentier said. "It was a good opportunity for us to learn. They had some looks up front that confused us.

"We didn't control the line of scrimmage; they whipped us on both sides of the ball. They blitzed us a little more than we were expecting and exposed us a little bit."

players in their defensive back field last season.

For the second week in a row, Teurlings Catholic's high-powered offense proved to be too formidable for the opposition.

Teurlings Catholic scored on its first three drives as the Rebels rolled the visiting Archbishop Shaw Eagles 38-0 on Friday night. This comes a week after scoring 50 points in a shootout road victory over Calvary Baptist.

Pios, Rebels clash in battle of undefeateds

The more things change, the more they stay the same.

That's the unofficial motto of the latest meeting in what has become a fierce, rivalry between two teams with great respect for each other in Teurlings and Notre Dame when the two teams face off at Rebel Field at 7 p.m. on Friday.

Both teams made deep

playoff runs last season — the Rebels made it to the Division II semifinal and the Pios were the Division III state champions — but were forced to replace several of their top performers from last season's squads.

So far so good for both teams who have enjoyed undefeated starts to the season.

Although the Pios are the same for the most

part, the Rebels have undergone more sweeping changes, offensively at least, with the change from Cole Kelley at quarterback to Hayden Cantrelle.

"It's a complete contrast from last year," said Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook. "It's gone from a classic pocket passer to a dual-threat guy who throws it as well as anybody, but also has the running ability."

"(Kelley) was effective on short runs, but you weren't worried about him taking it 80 yards on you. Sometimes you hope he just sits back there in the pocket."

Cook said perhaps most impressive about Cantrelle this season is the way he's taken leadership over the offense.

"Everybody seems to play better around him, which is a credit to him," Cook said.

Even with the changes on offense, Cook said the Rebels were the same well-coached team they always have been under long-time coach Sonny Charpentier.

The defense, which pitched a shutout against Shaw last week, was particularly impressive.

"They're balanced offensively; that's why they are scoring 30-something points per game," Cook said. "They maybe aren't as big as they have been at times, but they are pretty darn athletic. Calvary had a couple of big runs on them, but we don't have those kind of backs."

For the Pios, it's more the personnel that changed rather than the system.

Replacing 10-of-11 starters on one side of the ball would normally be something a team couldn't overcome, but the Pios have seemingly sported the same old defense thanks to solid discipline and the coaching wizardry of defensive coordinator Jimmy McCleary.

"It's the same characteristics. They play tough defense and field position; they aren't afraid to punt," Charpentier said. "They wear you out and they did a good job of that against

Charpentier pointed out the Pios' success on special teams, where they changed the game last week in the comeback win against Breaux Bridge, as a major characteristic of any Cook-coached team.

One of the new starters on the Pios' defense is someone Charpentier and the Rebels have become familiar with through the years in District 4-4A play. Defensive tackle Tyler Shelvin is one of the most highly recruited players in the state and the top-rated player in the state for the 2017 class.

However, Charpentier said that as talented as Shelvin is, he's only a portion of Notre Dame's success on the defensive side of the ball.

"He's a big ole human being," Charpentier

said. "When he wants to go somewhere, he goes. He's a tremendous individual talent. The defense they have was good before he got there and it will be good after he leaves."

One of the major characteristics of the Pios' defense in the first two games of the season is their ability to make opposing offenses one-dimensional.

Charpentier said it was imperative for the Rebels to control the line of scrimmage to avoid being one-dimensional and falling into the Pios' trap.

"You have to stay on schedule and be as balanced as you can," Charpentier said. "Have to throw it when you want to, only when you have to."

The Rebels are catching the Pios at a time of high confidence following their come-from-behind win against Breaux Bridge last week.

Cook said during the second half of the win the offense finally started to click as everything fell into place.

"It was a big confidence boost for the kids. You could see them growing up a bit as the games have gone on," Cook said. "Especially having been behind, doubt starts to creep in. Now we've found our stride and we're going to see where it's going to get us."

Notre Dame still undefeated

After taking over on the Rebels' 45-yard line with 21-14 lead, Notre Dame Lewis Cook thought the Pios needed go for Teurlings' jugular.

After pounding the Rebels all game with a relentless rush-

ing attack — the Pios finished with 47 rushing attempts for 223 yards — quarterback Bryant Thevis faked the hand-off and lofted a perfectly thrown ball over the outstretched hands of the Rebels' defensive back for a 45-yard touchdown to Landon Meche to give the Pios a 28-14 lead with 11:10 remaining

in the game.

"We were in great field position, we may have gone for it on fourth down, so we had a down (to use)," said Notre Dame coach Lewis Cook. "Meche made a nice catch. It was contested a little bit, but Bryant put

it right in there and it was a nice catch. It was blocked well and Bryant is stepping up big."

When it was all said and done, the Pios (3-0) went on to beat Teurlings (2-1) on the road to remain undefeated on the season.

Before the season, Cook said Thevis could give the Pios the opportunity to be more balanced on the offensive end, giving Notre Dame a quarterback who could push the ball down the field when his number was called.

Thevis finished 7-of-9 with 101 yards and the touchdown to Meche.

The senior had another nice throw in a crucial situation to end the half, hitting senior running back Collin Kirsch out of the backfield on a wheel route to give the Pios a scoring chance.

Notre Dame ultimately missed a long field goal attempt, but Cook said the throw showed the growth of the offense.

"You watch our guys and they are growing up right there in front of us," Cook said. "It's fun to watch them play."

The field position battle ultimately ended up being the deciding factor in the game.

As the 45-yard touchdown strike showed, when given the opportunity to attack the Rebels on a short field the Pios' offense kicked into overdrive. In the fourth quarter, Notre Dame had two touchdown drives that took a total of 47 seconds off the clock.

Special teams play once again played a major role for Notre Dame when determining field position. The Pios tackled well on kick off coverage, punted well — a 38-yard per punt average — and added in a long punt return, something Cook said

the Pios hadn't done yet this season.

"They won the battle of special teams and they won the battle of field position," said Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier. "They took advantage of the short field and we didn't, so that was part of it. We didn't make plays. They played better than us and they deserved to win."

Red zone efficiency hurt the Rebels, with Teurlings going 2-for-4 inside the Pios' 20-yard line after forcing turnovers.

After having some success running the ball in the first half, quarterback Hayden Cantrelle was the Rebels' leading rusher with 20 carries for 100 yards, the Rebels were forced to turn to their passing game once the Pios took a two touchdown lead.

Before the game Charpentier said the Rebels needed to avoid being one-dimensional and throw the ball when they wanted to rather than when they had to.

"You gotta be one-dimensional and we had some drops there. We had some calls that didn't go our way," Charpentier said. "But ultimately, the kids battled and we'll learn from this."

In the first three quarters the Rebels actually

moved the ball well through the air, with Cantrelle hooking up with receiver Luke Vidrine five times for 70 yards.

Notre Dame opened the scoring in the second quarter with a 4-yard touchdown run from Justin Guidry with 11:58 remaining in the second quarter.

The Rebels fired back before halftime with a 1-yard touchdown plunge from senior running back Jansen Lormand, who scored two touchdowns on the night. Lormand's other touchdown came in the third quarter on a 4-yard touchdown run through the middle.

The Pios opened the scoring in the second half when Kirsch, who led the Pios with 24 carries for 124 yards scored his only touchdown of the night on a 7-yard touchdown on third down.

Cook said the touchdown from Kirsch was big for the Pios, who once again took advantage of a short field with a 3-play, 10-yard drive.

Notre Dame scored the final three touchdowns of the game, with Guidry scoring his second of the night to open the fourth quarter, the long touchdown to Meche and a 4-yard run by Sam Hoffpauir to cap the scoring for the night.

Rebels subdue rival

Both head coaches in Friday's old parish border rivalry between Breaux Bridge and Teurlings Catholic knew they had plenty to fuss about come Saturday morning.

The difference is Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier will be able to get on his Rebels for their miscues with a smile inside, while Breaux Bridge coach Terry Martin will be saddled with a frown after the Rebels claimed a 28-14 victory to move to 3-1 on the season.

The Rebels had seven penalties and fumbled four times, losing three.

"We hadn't put the ball on the ground all year long and then that happens tonight," Charpentier said. "That was very uncharacteristic of us this year. It's kind of like free throw shooting. You don't talk about it and just hope it doesn't happen."

"It wasn't pretty at times, but we were able to pull out the win. That's the important thing."

The Tigers, meanwhile, fumbled six times, losing two, and threw two interceptions to go along with six flags.

"We turned it over four times," Martin said. "You can't do that. We talked about that every day all week. Now, I almost feel like I jinxed us by talking to the kids so much about it."

The first half was a seesaw bat-

tle of sloppiness.

After Teurlings instantly put the visiting Tigers in scoring range to start the game because of a 3-yard punt. But the Rebels' defense held, forcing Breaux Bridge to turn it over on downs at the TCH 28.

The Rebels then followed that huge stop with a 15-play, 72-yard scoring drive in 7:07 to take the early 7-0 lead. Hayden Cantrelle completed four passes, including a 1-yard TD pass to Tyler Broussard.

One play later, the Tigers fumbled and Teurlings quickly turned that into a 14-0 lead with a 20-yard connection to Luke Vidrine and a 1-yard TD run for Jansen Lormand with 11 seconds left in the first quarter.

Lormand ran hard the rest of the night, finishing with 96 yards on 22 carries and three touchdowns.

"We had to be patient tonight," Charpentier said. "It's hard for me to be patient sometimes. It's kind of like basketball again. If you don't score quickly, the longer you have it, the better chance you have of turning it over."

Then it was the Rebels' turn to fumble on their 42 and Breaux Bridge obliged with a four-play scoring drive, ending in a 13-yard TD run by Malik LeBlanc to make it 14-7. Teurlings then fumbled the ensuing kickoff and the Tigers hit Dartravian Girod for 33 yards to the 1 before Julian Leon sneaked

it in to tie it at 14-14.

A 54-yard punt by Aaron Broussard then pinned the Tigers on their own 1. BBHS would get two first downs, but the Rebels set up shop at the BBHS 41 anyway. That led to a Lormand 1-yard TD run to give the Rebels the lead for good at 21-14.

The Tigers threatened with a 14-play, 54-yard drive to open the second half, but had to settle for a missed 42-yard field goal after an intentional grounding call.

"That was big stopping them on that drive and earlier in the game after the bad punt," Charpentier said. "We've still got some work to do with our special teams."

That's when Teurlings put it away with a 10-play, 80-yard drive, culminated by a leaping 16-yard TD run by Lormand with 2:29 left in the third.

Cantrelle, who finished 13-of-23 passing for 128 yards, had key completions of 11 yards to Vidrine and 19 to Broussard on the drive. Vidrine finished with six catches for 72 yards.

"We do some things better (in passing game) and then we got in the other direction," Charpentier said. "We're still dropping too many passes."

Leon was 12-of-22 passing for 162 yards. Tyrick Davis had three catches for 51 yards.

"We put some pressure on him (Leon)," Charpentier said. "We got him out of the pocket."

Catholic pulls away from Teurlings

At least someone in the Miles and Cameron families had good weeks in the football world.

Both Chris Cameron and Ben Miles, sons of Cam and Les, respectively, scored second-half touchdowns as the Catholic Bears (5-0) pulled away from the Teurlings Rebels (3-2) in the second half to take home a 31-14 win at Olympia Stadium in Baton Rouge Friday night.

"I was proud of the effort; we just didn't play well enough," said Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier. "Against a quality team on the road you can't give them short fields and things of that nature."

Starting senior quarterback

Hayden Cantrelle was ruled out before the game with a rib injury, so junior quarterback Wesley Blazek got the start after only three days of practice this week.

Blazek started off well, firing a 36-yard touchdown to Darrian Clark in the first quarter, but the Rebels were stifled after that, not scoring any more points until late in the fourth quarter.

Charpentier said he was happy with Blazek's performance under the circumstances.

"I thought he did a great job. He practiced for three days," Charpentier said. "He's been playing defensive end. He played quarterback through the spring and summer, but I thought he did a great job of do-

ing what he was capable of doing and we couldn't ask for more."

Charpentier said the Bears didn't make any real adjustments after the touchdown to open the game, but stuck to their fundamentals and buckled down.

In the second half, the Rebels had to switch to more max-protection sets to account for the Bears' vicious pass rush.

"They just played good, sound defense," Charpentier said. "They had some mismatches and we had some problems blocking some guys, especially when we were trying to hold the ball a little longer to try and get the ball down the field. We tried to adjust with some max protection, but they are good up front and they gave us some fits in some match-

up situations."

The Rebels went into half-time trailing 17-7, and after a long kickoff return by senior Jansen Lormand, they looked poised to make it a one-score game to start the second half.

Teurlings drove inside the Bears' 40-yard line, but the offense stalled out and turned the ball over on downs.

"We got a great return, and I thought if we could get a touchdown there or even a field goal — who knows? — we put a little bit more pressure on them," Charpentier said. "But we got the fourth and two and didn't convert, so give them credit."

The Rebels will now try and bounce back at Northside next week as Teurlings starts its district slate.

Cantrelle, Rebels cruise past Beau Chene

On a night in which the stands were full and expectations were high, the Teurlings Catholic Rebels delivered with a 31-7 victory over the Beau Chene Gators.

The Rebels got off to a great start and took control of the game in the first half, but the Gators kept fighting and made it tough on the Rebels in the second half. Rebels quarterback Hayden Cantrelle made his return to the starting lineup this week, and had a solid performance.

"He was a little rusty," Rebels coach Sonny Charpentier said of Cantrelle. "He had a good week of practice, and I'm glad we were able to get him in this game to get

the rust off."

Cantrelle finished with 152 yards and threw a 24-yard touchdown strike to Luke Vidrine. The running game was strong with leading rusher Tyler Bruno finishing with 76 yards and Jansen Lormand finishing with only 49 yards, but scored three rushing touchdowns.

The Rebels' offense got off to a great start in the first quarter despite Cantrelle missing some open receivers and took a 7-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Lormand. On the next drive, Rebels kicker Aaron Broussard kicked a season high 45-yard field goal to make it 10-0.

Cantrelle threw a 24-yard touchdown pass to Vidrine to on the next drive to make it 17-0. Can-

trelle connected on a nice throw to Holland Griffin to set up a four-yard run by Lormand to make it 24-0 Rebels at halftime. Lormand ran in an eight-yard touchdown on the Rebels first drive in the second half to make it a comfortable 31-0 lead for the Rebels.

The Rebels defense also did very well and helped keep the Rebels in control of the game.

"Defensively we were in control," said Charpentier. "They weren't able to get very much done from an offensive standpoint and I feel like we had good field position."

Despite the tough Rebels defense, the Gators kept fighting and forced two turnovers in the 4th quarter. Gators running back Jylon Henry broke a 47-yard run to set up a

1-yard touchdown run by quarterback Drahcir Duplechain. The Rebels ate up the clock at the end and did what they had to do to close out the game.

The Rebels are now 5-2, but face a tough road ahead with big district games against STM and Carencro.

"We've got to take them one game at a time," said Charpentier. "Starting tomorrow we'll focus on STM, and the only way you can find out if you're ready is to go play."

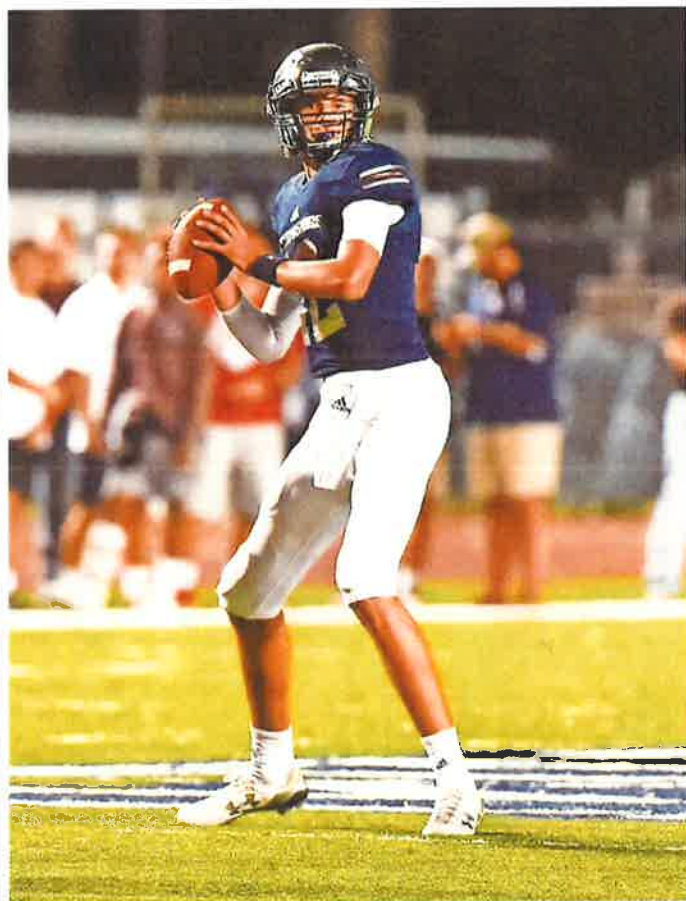

Cox, Cantrelle leading teams into fierce rivalry

Last year, St. Thomas More had the dual-sport, baseball-playing quarterback who was slightly undersized, but still was considered one of the best in the state, and Teurlings had the towering 6-foot-7 pure, pocket-passing quarterback.

This year though? The roles and skill sets are reversed.

When Teurlings travels to St. Thomas More on Friday, two of

the state's premier offenses will be teeing off, and they do it in completely contrasting styles.

STM quarterback Nate Cox isn't the college prospect his predecessor Cole Kelly was.

The former Teurlings Rebel is now a No. 2 quarterback for a Southeastern Conference school, but he's near the top of

the state leader board in passing yardage and has tossed 24 touchdowns in seven games so far.

Teurlings QB Hayden Cantrelle has plenty of arm strength, but he's most dangerous with his legs, showcased by an impressive performance on the ground against Notre Dame before the Pios forced the Rebels into throwing the ball more than they wanted.

Both present their fair share of problems for opposing offenses, and have given the coaching staff on the other side of the field plenty of headaches this week in figuring out a way to slow them down.

For St. Thomas More defensive coordinator Terry Tidwell, the Rebels' offense this year resembles the same type of offense Teurlings ran before Kelly came onto the scene.

"They run counter trap three different ways, stretch, inside zone... They do it better than anybody," Tidwell said.

"Cantrelle can really hurt you when he starts moving, and he has the arm to hurt you in the passing game if you load the box."

Tidwell said it wasn't the same type of down-the-field passing game the Rebels sported with Kelly, but a creative blend of underneath routes and screens that stretched defenses to the breaking point.

The screen game can be especially difficult to defend with how well Teurlings sets it up with the running game, getting the defensive line used to rushing up the field before someone slips by them for a long gain on a screen.

20-yard comeback, but they have the 12-yard comeback," Tidwell said. "Their screen game is excellent. They can run all kinds of screens out of different formations and different looks. It's a challenge every day trying to get the defensive line to stay disciplined."

Cantrelle recently game back from a rib injury that held him out of the Rebels' loss to Catholic and a win against Northside, but Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said he would be 100 percent for the St. Thomas More game after a good week of practice.

As for protecting him at all in the running game, Charpentier said the Rebels can't go into games worrying about injuries and have to put players in positions where they can be most effective.

"We're going to use him where he can be most effective and he has the green light on taking off in pass plays if he sees an opening," Charpentier said. "Now, we want him to be smart about it and not take any unnecessary hits, but we can't worry about those things."

The Rebels have their own set of challenges in trying to stop Cox and the Cougars' explosive

passing game.

While last year's combination of Trevor Begue, Griffin Hebert and Matthew LaGrange proved difficult for teams to stop, the Cougars have transitioned Mason Pesson seamlessly into the starting group with Begue now at McNeese State.

"It's the same St. Thomas More," Charpentier said. "I've said it before, some teams look like clones from year to year because they've had the same coaching staff for years."

Cox has thrown for 1,860 yards and 24 touchdowns this season, including a five touchdown performance against Carencro in a win last week.

Three of those touchdowns went to Hebert, who was playing in his first true game of the season after suffering an injury before the season to his hamstring.

"Hebert is a big weapon. He's another guy out there you have to worry about. He's a special high school player," Charpentier said. "Its not just him we have to worry about though."

Charpentier said the Rebels would try to do a combination of things to slow down Cox and the passing game from switching up coverages to bringing pressure and doing things up front to try and knock him out of rhythm.

As for any residual bad feelings from last time the Rebels traveled to St. Thomas More — where they were knocked out the playoffs in the semifinals in a classic game — Charpentier said there were none and once the game started none of that would matter.

"That was last year's football team on both sides," Charpentier said. "Once the whistle blows and we kick off, it will have no bearing on the game."

Powerful 3rd quarter takes down rival Teurlings

It was a night of threes for the St. Thomas More Cougars.

In the third quarter, the Cougars scored three touchdowns in three minutes to give themselves a 35-14 lead against Teurlings that they would never relinquish on their way to a 42-14 win against their arch-rival in Division II.

Senior quarterback Nate Cox tossed four touchdowns in the win, giving him 17 touchdowns in the last four games and 28 on the season through eight games.

Cox had touchdown tosses to Griffin Hebert, two to Matthew Gautreaux and Matthew LaGrange in the game,

with the short touchdown to LaGrange capping the Cougars' scoring on the night.

It was Cox's first time starting in the rivalry game, and he said the intensity surprised him at first, but he settled into his groove in the second half and helped direct the Cougars to the win.

"It (the game) was definitely hyped. I didn't know it was going to be this intense on the field," Cox said. "I had a rough first half, but the coaches rallied around us in the locker room and we came out and had a dominating second half."

Although the Cougars' offense certainly did their job on the night, it was the defense pitching a shutout in the second half and scoring a touchdown of their own that

sealed the victory for St. Thomas More.

After getting cut up by Teurlings' quarterback Hayden Cantrelle — who drew rave reviews from the Cougars' coaches after the game — in the first half, St. Thomas More defensive coordinator Terry Tidwell made some adjustments to help slow down the shifty signal caller.

After having defensive end Hunter Bergeron drop off of the line of scrimmage and act as a "spy" on Cantrelle in the first half, Tidwell directed his team to execute a different kind of pass rush.

"At halftime, we had to make some adjustments cause Cantrelle was just whipping us," Tidwell said.

"He has better feet than my lineman have. So I gave my guys the signal to screen rush. We wanted them to get up the field, but not sprint up the field and control the blocker. Hunter was able to get his hands up and knock some balls down."

In the middle of the Cougars' scoring barrage in the third quarter was an interception returned for a touchdown by line-backer Paul LaBorde. St. Thomas More forced three turnovers on the game, recovering two fumbles in addition to the interception.

Tidwell said creating turn-

overs was a requisite for the Cougars going into the game.

"All week long we talked about going for the ball. We have not done a good job of creating turnovers this season," Tidwell said. "Tonight we created some turnovers... Generally speaking, the team that has the best turnover ratio is going to win."

Cantrelle opened the scoring for the Rebels in the second quarter with a 33-yard touchdown run that saw him burst through the line of scrimmage before making the safety miss and strolling into the end zone.

Randall would be a game-time decision after being a limited participant in practice this week.

Rebels sneak past Bears on gutsy last-minute call

There was little question that Teurlings Catholic was choosing to go for two points and the win late Friday night.

The host Rebels had just driven 81 yards in 11 plays in the final 2:14 and Jansen Lormand had just powered the final yard to bring his team within 38-37 of Carencro's Golden Bears with 43 seconds left.

The question was what play.

"We were going to go with something that had been good for us, the power read from the quarterback," said Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier. "But they (Carencro) overshifted and brought a safety up in there, so we decided to run the counter back to the other side."

That meant Lormand carried on the two-point conversion, and when he cut back and found just enough space to get into the end zone, the Rebels had escaped with a wild 39-38 District 4-4A victory over the Bears.

Carencro had just driven to a go-ahead touchdown with that 2:14 remaining when the cat-

quick and dangerous Kendarius Poullard cut up-field on a sweep and raced in from 15 yards out to snap a 31-all tie. And even that touchdown followed each team getting a field goal on their previous possession in a four-score fourth quarter. Teurlings' Aaron Broussard and Carencro's Logan Boudreaux had matched field goals with 9:46 and 5:08 remaining, during a final period in which both teams were wracked with injuries and cramps.

That physical toll was most of the reason that Charpentier sent the offense back out for a win-or-lose two-point conversion in the final minute.

"We were playing with some makeshift guys out there," he said. "We were a lot of people down. That was two pretty beat-up football teams."

"It didn't surprise me," said Carencro coach Rip Eveland of the Rebels going for the two-pointer. "They were thinking they didn't want to play overtime. This was a really physical game."

The Rebels (6-3, 3-1) were ranked sixth in the Division II select power ratings and could move up a spot and gain a first-round bye with Friday's

win, pending a season-finale contest at Opelousas next Friday.

Carencro (7-2, 2-2), ranked sixth in the Class 4A power listing, found itself down 10-0 less than two minutes in when Lormand took the opening kickoff back 96 yards for a touchdown and the Bears fumbled on the ensuing kickoff. Blaise Begnaud recovered at the Carencro 8, setting up the first of three Broussard field goals.

But the Bears struck right back with two touchdowns in a four-minute span. Poullard had a 23-yard scoring run — moments after brother Mondarius Poullard broke a 47-yard run to set up the score — Brendan Willis intercepted Rebel quarterback Hayden Cantrelle and returned it to the TCHS 14, and line-backer-turned-fullback Jalen Angelle powered in from one yard out for a 14-13 Carencro lead with 41 seconds left in the first period.

"We did some good things," Eveland said. "The only problem was we made the hill real big to get up. They got the big play at the end and won."

Broussard's second field goal and Cantrelle's

49-yard scoring pass to Holland Griffin gave the Rebels a 20-14 halftime lead. However, Bear quarterback Carl Randall came out on fire after halftime and hit Kendarius Poullard for a 65-yard scoring strike up the hash marks only 90 seconds into the second half.

Randall, who missed most of the last two games with a leg injury, threw for 268 yards on 14-of-24 passes, with Poullard catching six of those for 121 yards and that go-ahead score.

The Rebels drove right back, with Lormand scoring from one yard out and getting a throwback to Cantrelle on a two-point conversion for a 28-21 lead. But two plays later, Randall found Eric Toli-vour with a lofted 47-yard pass to the Rebel 1 and Treylon Barnaba scored on the next play for a 28-all tie.

Cantrelle, who was 16-of-33 for 177 yards and rushed for 36 more, completed his last five passes on the winning drive including three to Griffin, who finished with five grabs for 101 yards and had a 23-yard catch that put the ball at the Carencro 3 with less than a minute left.

The wait is finally over for the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

After taking the week off thanks to a bye week in the first round of the LHSAA Division II playoffs, the Rebels are finally set to take the field in the post-season.

The reward for their patience? Defending Division II state champion Parkview Baptist. The Eagles have won five state championships since 2001 and have seen their program develop into a powerhouse in recent years.

Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier said it's no secret what the Eagles do — it's just trying to stop it that is the problem.

And for the Rebels, it all starts up front on both sides of the ball.

"They're very good and they are very good at exactly what they've been doing for years," Charpentier said. "They are going to run it 80 percent of the time on offense. And they're going to run the 3-3 stack on defense and send a fourth, fifth and sometimes sixth guy on defense."

"Those guys closest to the ball, the offensive and defensive line, they're going to be the key. Defensively, it is paramount that we stop the run."

The Eagles run the veer on offense, and similar to Acadiana, they have become masters at it.

Although the Rams' version of the offense is a more classic interpretation of the old system, the Eagles have several wrinkles installed into the running game and used a devastating counter, trap play in their jamboree demolition of Breaux Bridge.

Although last year's state championship MVP Reggie Hayes is gone, McKane Kinchen has settled into the starting role and proved to be more than competent at the position.

Kinchen isn't quite the quick-twitch athlete Hayes was, but he's been effective running the ball for the Eagles and efficient when Parkview decides to take a shot down the field.

"He's a good athlete, and he's got 10 games under his belt against quality opponents," Charpentier said. "He runs that offense really well. They'll take their shots down the field if we stack the box against them."

Charpentier said the Rebels would have to remain balanced on offense to attack the 3-3 Stack defense of the Eagles.

The 3-3 Stack the Eagles run puts pressure on opposing offensive lines with stunts and movement.

Teurlings running back Jansen Lormand and quarterback Hayden

Cantrelle combined to run for 1,331 yards and 22 touchdowns this season to lead the Rebels on the ground.

The extra week of rest helped the Rebels rest a little bit, but they will still be missing several key players for the contest.

Kade Sonnier, who broke his collarbone in Week 9, will not be back, and receiver Luke Vidrine will be a game-time decision. The Rebels could possibly get tight end Tyler Broussard back after he practiced some this week.

Vidrine's absence has been softened by the emergence of Holland Griffin who finished the year on a hot streak. In the last four games of the season, Griffin hauled in 13 passes for 242 yards and three touchdowns.

"It started in the Carencro game where he had the opportunity to make some plays late in the ball game... hopefully we can continue that trend," Charpentier said. "It takes a little bit of time to develop chemistry between quarterback and receiver, and it's clicked there."

With a full two weeks to prepare for the matchup, Charpentier said the Rebels would be ready for a good football game.

"We feel prepared and we know they are, too," Charpentier said. "Sometimes you can feel like one week isn't enough, but we definitely had enough time this time. It isn't going to be a lack of preparation, both sides will be prepared and play well. The kids have done a good job."

Teurlings Catholic unable to overcome a pair of first-quarter miscues

Teurlings Catholic just wasn't able to overcome a pair of first-quarter miscues.

Back-to-back mistakes on special teams in the first quarter put the Rebels in a 14-0 hole and against visiting Parkview Baptist. That, and the defending Division II champion's power rushing attack, proved to be too much for the Rebels to overcome in a rain-soaked 38-21 loss on Friday night.

"This was a big ball game, and they took advantage of some mistakes,"

longtime Teurlings Catholic coach Sonny Charpentier said. "That is not a team you want to have to come from behind on. They were simply the better team tonight."

The Rebels went three-and-out to start the contest and punted away, but a Teurlings Catholic player unfortunately touched the ball before it was able to be recovered by a Parkview player. That resulted in a 15-yard penalty and gave the Eagles the ball at the 32-yard line.

A mere six plays later, Parkview Baptist running back Connor Joffrion scored a 2-yard touchdown.

Teurlings Catholic (7-4) got the ball back but was once again forced to punt, but this time the punt was blocked. With the ball at the 21-yard line, the Eagles needed only seven plays to find the end zone as Joffrion would score his second touchdown of the night, this one from two yards out as well.

"I think it was a trade off because our first punt wasn't very good," Parkview Baptist coach Jay Mayet said. "But that blocked punt put us right back there with a chance to score on a

Despite using their last two timeouts of the half on the Eagles field goal attempt, the Rebels still had a chance to put points on the board.

Cantrelle hit Darian Clark with a 40-yard completion down the left sideline putting the ball at the 36-yard line. Cantrelle though would be sacked for a 12-yard loss but then made that up and picked a few more with a 19-yard run. With 12 seconds left, the Rebels got to the line to run another play but Cantrelle was brought down behind the line of scrimmage for a four-yard loss, thus ending the half.

The Rebels high-pow-

ered offense was held to only 213 yards of offense on Friday.

"We had too many mistakes tonight," Charpentier said. "We had opportunities, but we didn't capitalize on them. But give them credit. Their defense did a nice job of keeping us off-balanced."

Parkview Baptist put the game away in the second half with its veer offense.

After Caleb Meaux picked off a Cantrelle pass, the Eagles got into

the end zone again as Jofrion scored his third touchdown, and once again it was from two yards out.

After another Rebel punt, the Eagles produced another run-heavy scoring drive, this one capped by fullback Matthew Murla who powered his way from eight yards out. Murla also converted the 2-point conversion.

As rain fell during the fourth quarter, the Eagles added another touchdown this one by Preston Rob-

erts from three yards out. Parkview Baptist would not attempt a pass in the second half as the Eagles rushed for 250 yards in the last two quarters, and ended the game with 351 yards on the ground.

Charpentier, though, was pleased with the effort those players and the entire team gave even if the result was not what they had hoped for.

"They always play hard to the very end," Charpentier said. "I am proud to be their coach."

Charpentier retires as Teurlings Catholic head coach

Spent 22 seasons
leading the Rebels

The Sonny Charpentier era, in football anyway, is over for now.


Teurlings Catholic officially announced Charpentier's retirement as head football coach in a news release Tuesday evening. Charpentier will remain at the school as the athletic director.

Charpentier informed his team of his decision last week prior to the team's playoff loss to Parkview Baptist.

"I sent him a note to him that high school football is going to miss him," St. Thomas More coach Jim Hightower said. "He was a competitor. I'm sure Teurlings is going to miss him, but the greater high school football community is definitely going to miss Sonny."

For more than two decades, the expectations each fall around Teurlings Catholic have been pretty high.

It wasn't always that way, though.

The 60-year-old Charpentier arrived on the campus at Teurlings for the 1988-89 season as a head basketball coach and football assistant.

He led the Rebels to the Top 28 Tournament and coached basketball until 1995. That's when Charpentier took over as the school's head football coach.

In the two seasons prior to him taking over, the Rebels were 4-16. Six of the eight years prior to Charpentier were losing seasons. Teurlings went 12-1 in his first season as head coach in 1995.

In his 22 seasons as the Rebels' head football coach, Teurlings endured only two losing seasons. His career record is 194-73, including 91-21 in district play. Charpentier led the Rebels to 11 district titles, advanced to quarterfinals 11 times and the state semifinals three times.

Charpentier took over as

athletic director in 1998. Since then, Teurlings teams have won 24 state titles, 20 state runners-up, 100 district crowns and 49 district runner-up finishes.

"Not only did he turn a program around, his tenure marked the most successful football program in school history," Teurlings principal Mike Boyer said. "Sonny was more than a football coach on a school campus. He was a leader, father-figure, mentor, and role model for students, teachers, and staff. He has always been available in every facet of life that is a Catholic school. I am pleased he will stay on as athletic director. Since Sonny took over as athletic director we have enjoyed much success, and I see it continuing in the future."

Many coaches would stay one more season to reach the historic 200-win career total, but Boyer said that wasn't part of Charpentier's decision.

"With Sonny, it's never been about Sonny," Boyer said. "It's always been about the pro-

gram."

No program coached against Charpentier more over the years than coach Lewis Cook's Notre Dame Pioneers.

"Sonny did it the right way for the right reasons," Cook said. "You never saw a bunch of recruited athletes out there. He took what was coming to Teurlings and he got them ready to play and made them better."

Cook said their relationship grew over the years.

"For a while, we were both cordial to each other, but there was no real relationship," Cook said. "Over the last 10 or 12 years, we've gotten to be pretty close friends. We've texted each other every week for a few years now. I remember when they beat us in 2012, (son) Stu and I were sitting around and he said, 'Dad, I really hope Teurlings can get to the Dome.' I did, too."

"We've always had that mutual respect for each other. I hated those years when we had to play a second time (in play-offs). We had some knockdown, drag-out games with them, but there was never any noise that you get in some of those games. I'm definitely going to miss that competition. They made us better every year."

Cook said he saw the great competitor in Charpentier again in this year's game. The Pios were up by two touchdowns and Teurlings faced a fourth down near its own goal line.

"A lot of coaches would have punted right there to make the final score look more respectable," Cook said. "Sonny wasn't worried about that. He was trying to win the game."

Few know Charpentier's competitive manner any more than his prize pupil, Jake Delhomme.

Delhomme played basketball for Charpentier, who also helped the Rebels reach the state semifinals in 1992 as an offensive coordinator with the future UL and Carolina Panthers star at quarterback.

"I've always said that I was so fortunate to have two of the best coaches anywhere in Sonny and coach Cook," Delhomme said. "When I got to the NFL, I knew how to play. No coach had to teach me the fundamentals. Sure, I was a little bit of a gunslinger, but that was just me. I knew the fundamentals. I was still doing the things Sonny taught me all those years in the NFL."

Delhomme said Charpentier

coached basketball with that aggressive football mentality. He remembers a basketball tournament when the Rebels were clearly over-matched in the finals by an undefeated Franklin squad.

After falling in the championship game, the reception from Charpentier in the locker room afterward wasn't what Delhomme and his teammates expected.

"He said, 'Y'all like second place? Second place is fun to y'all? Y'all like this second-place trophy?'" Delhomme related. "Then he picked up the trophy and threw it against the wall. It shattered into pieces. Then he said, 'Get on the bus.'"

"He knew we had no chance to beat that team, but that's what he gave to us. It was always: 'Strap it up, let's go.'"

Throughout his career in the NFL, Delhomme said he'd routinely call or text his old coach about the Rebels.

"They could be playing the Chicago Bears that week and he'd always tell me what they were going to do on offense and how they were going to score," Delhomme said. "He always thought he was going to win. That's just the kind of competitor he is."

Younger Charpentier takes over at Teurlings

If Dane Charpentier said that he never thought about one day being the head football coach at Teurlings Catholic, he'd be lying.

It's not something he ever spent much time pondering, though.

He always thought that was a bridge to be crossed way down the road.

But when his father, Sonny, who happens to be the program's all-time winningest coach with a record of 194-73, officially announced his retirement last month, that timetable quickly changed.

So at the young age of 32, Charpentier's career plan hit the fast-forward button in a hurry. On Thursday, Teurlings principal Mike Boyer announced Charpentier as the Rebels' new head football coach.

"To be honest, I really didn't think about it much, because I thought my dad would coach at least another 10 years or so," Charpentier said.

"When he decided to retire, it caught me by surprise just like everybody else."

After serving as an even

younger head coach at Opelousas Catholic for two seasons in 2014-15, Charpentier elected to get a little more seasoning before embarking in his next head-coaching venture by serving as the offensive coordinator at Cecilia High under the Bulldogs' new head coach Dennis Skains.

"I definitely thought I'd be at Cecilia for more than one season," said Charpentier, who led the Vikings to records of 10-2 and 7-4 in his two seasons as a head coach.

It was a productive one, though. He made the move from OC to Cecilia to both run an offense and go to graduate head coaching school at the same time.

"That was a huge factor why I went (to Cecilia)," Charpentier said. "I knew how good (Cecilia head coach) Dennis Skains was, and I needed to get some of that. Things like his mechanics in practice, his routines, just the nuts and bolts of running a program. He's a very meticulous planner."

"After two years at OC, I knew I had to get better. I looked at it as an opportunity to improve."

"I wanted to steal everything he's got and I did. That's a compliment to him. That's how good of a coach I think he is. He does things that not many programs around do and I wanted to be around that."

Skains, like Charpentier, both played under Sonny Charpentier at Teurlings.

Now Dane inherits the duty of continuing the winning tradition his father built.

"It's a completely different situation," Charpentier said. "When my dad took over, the team was coming off a 1-9 season and rarely had winning seasons. I'm taking over a program that's a consistent winner."

"I'm unbelievably fortunate to even be considered qualified to take over what the whole Teurlings family has built there."

One huge advantage Charpentier had was that Boyer's known him for the last two decades.

"When I first got to Teurlings, Dane was about 11 or 12," Boyer said. "I've watched him grow up. He's only 32, but he's

exceptionally mature. That's what impressed me so much in the meeting."

In addition to playing for the Rebels before a college career at Northwestern State as a wide receiver, Charpentier did coach receivers under his father for one season in 2010.

Of course, he's naturally spent a lifetime in football under his father's influence.

"I wouldn't say we're identical (philosophically), but we're probably pretty close," Charpentier said. "He's obviously been my main influence."

Although Charpentier understands the coaching challenge he's facing in trying to uphold the competitive standards of father, who only missed the playoffs once in 22 years as a head coach at Teurlings, he knows that's not his largest task.

"My dad was always very competitive, but he actually cared more about the kids than winning," Charpentier said.

"He always included as many kids as he could in his program, so he could affect the lives of as many kids as he possibly could."

"It was the way he treated people. He had such a profound

effect on the lives of people. It was a very unique thing. You only see it in a handful of coaches. He always told me that I've got a lot of my momma in me, but I'd like to think that I've got a little of that from my dad in me as well."

Like his father, Charpentier plans on being the primary offensive play-caller for the Rebels as the head coach, but will certainly be getting plenty of input from his younger brother, Roch, who was the freshman offensive coordinator during that 2010 season.

"Roch's going to have a huge part in the offensive game-planning," Charpentier said. "It's not about titles. It's about getting it right. Sometimes, Roch's going to have the best way to do things. We're brothers. We'll work it out."

With the elder Charpentier now watching from a little farther away as the athletic director.

"My dad's main philosophy in coaching was always to take the kids he's given and work tirelessly to get everything he possibly could out of them," Charpentier said.

By the tone in his voice, that approach isn't about to change.
