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
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Teurlings remains potent as 2nd Charpentier era begins

SCOUTING REPORT

STRENGTHS

Dane Charpentier takes over the Rebels' program after his father, Sonny, stepped down after last season with a few holes to fill but also plenty of talent and depth returning. Charpentier professes to be a coach who likes to run the ball and stop the run. Fortunately for the Rebels' new leader, he's got plenty of personnel to achieve both this season. On the offensive side, Teurlings returns three starters on the offensive line, two of which go over 300 pounds in senior returning All-Acadiana performer Justin Mathews (6-3, 300) and junior LSU commitment Thomas Perry (6-7, 320). On the defensive side, new TCHS defensive coordinator Brad Taylor returns bookend defensive ends in the McGuire duo as well as last year's leading tackler Beau LeBlanc at middle linebacker, and team leader Cole Newland moves from end to outside linebacker in his third season as a starter. While a new quarterback is a question mark to some, Charpentier has confidence in Wesley Blazek. Also expected to make Charpentier's first season at the helm smoother is senior Hayden Judice, who will play both ways for the Rebels as a running back and at free safety. Depth in the secondary should also help Teurlings against sophisticated passing attacks such as Rummel, STM and Catholic High of Baton Rouge

QUESTION MARKS

All of those strengths wouldn't seem to leave a lot of room for many question marks, but all teams have those. The Rebels will open the season with a running back-bycommittee approach. Over the years, that has worked and not worked in different situations, so time will tell here. The Rebels also don't have a ton of District 4-4A experience at wide receiver. Combine that with a new guarterback, and the passing game has plenty to prove early on. While many members of the coaching staff remain, there will be different playcallers on offense, defense and special teams this fall for Teurlings. Making that transition even more difficult is the brutal schedule the Rebels must play with four teams that have won state championships in recent seasons, not to mention perennial district title contenders like Rayne, Breaux Bridge, LaGrange and Carencro.

THE BOTTOM LINE

Barring some really bad weather, the Rebels figure to make a ton of money this season with Rummel, Notre Dame, Catholic-Baton Rouge, St. Thomas More and Carencro all at home. That ranks as one of the most prestigious home slates in the history of the Acadiana area. How that translates to a successful first season for Charpentier remains to be seen. Obviously, his Rebels could play very well against a schedule like that and it not show up in the win-loss column. A potentially dominant offensive line should make room for a little margin for error early in the season, but that won't likely last very long. Even with all the depth Teurlings sports, key performers like Judice and Newland will need to stay healthy. If nothing else, Charpen tier's maiden voyage as Teurlings' head coach should be quite a ride.

HAYDEN JUDICE RB/FS, 6-0, 190, SR. Critical two-way standout for the Rebels. On offense, Judice will be part of a three-headed monster rushing attack. But when he's not running hard, Judice will be a physical, punishing centerfielder in the back of the Rebels' secondary.



COLE NEWLAND OLB, 6-1, 210, SR. After two years of starting on the defensive line for the Rebels, Newland will move to the "Will" linebacker spot as a senior to fill a hole in that spot. Newland should be able to better utilize his speed and aggressiveness playing more in space.



WESLEY BLAZEK QB, 6-2, 205, SR. Coming from a defensive end spot, Blazek brings a tough, rugged, competitive mentality to the QB position. He got some critical experience against an elite Catholic-BR team last season and that should serve him well as the full-time starter this fall,



BEAU LEBLANC LB, 5-10, 205, SR. One of the most important returning starter for the Rebels, considering Charpentier's No. 1 priority on defense is to stop the run. His tough, run-stopping game should be aided by being one of eight returning starters on defense.

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STM favored in powerhouse District 4-4A

If you want to measure the strength of District 4-4A, a league composed entirely of Acadiana-area teams, the numbers paint a picture.

For starters, look at the numbers 37 and 12. That's the combined 2016 record of the top four teams in the preseason polls compiled by the district's coaches and The Daily Advertiser voters. Next, look at the number 14. That's the number of players in the district who were named to the All-District first team, including one district's offensive most valuable player (Rayne and Westgate were in District 3-4A and 5-4A, respectively, in 2016).

Finally, consider the number 11. That's the number of players from this district that we, at The Daily Advertiser, deemed to be among the best in the Acadiana area, named to our preseason All-Acadiana team.

Those numbers should illustrate why this league is one of the deepest and most difficult to project. But the defending state champions in Division II, St. Thomas More, have received the benefit of the doubt by the coaches when it comes to picking a winner.

The Cougars garnered five of the six first-place votes and

31 total points to be the coaches' league favorite.

STM has several spots to fill on both sides of the ball, including replacing quarterback Nate Cox, Distict 4-4A's Offensive MVP last season. The Cougars, however, had the most preseason All-Acadiana selections (4) of any team, and at least two other players were considered for the list.

Three of the Cougars' preseason All-Acadiana picks came on our defense — defensive tackle Sam Greenwood, inside linebacker Paul LaBorde and safety Cade Broussard and preseason All-Acadiana wide receiver is expected to be the next great wideout in a program that has a tradition of producing them.

Though the coaches think Jim Hightower's squad is the clear favorite, The Daily Advertiser voters expect the district to be much tighter at the top. Carencro, which gained the

Carencro, which gamed the only other first place vote by the coaches, is tied with STM for the most first-place votes (2) in our poll. The Cougars earned only more point (27) than Carencro (26), followed Teurlings (19), Rayne (18), Westgate (9) and Northside (6). The fourthplace Wolves received one of the five first-place votes

the five first-place votes. And there's a reason we believe the Golden Bears are neck and neck with STM. Though youth exists on the offensive line, Carencro is loaded with talent in key areas.

In preseason All-Acadiana selections Keon Jean-Batiste, Jalen Angelle and Traylon Barnaba, new Golden Bears coach Tony Courville has one of the best pass rushers, outside linebackers and two-way players in the area. That's not including junior wide receiver Deion Senegal, who Courville believes won't fly under the radar much longer. Carencro also has two capable quarterbacks at its disposal in Austen Breaux and Northside transfer Chance Preiean.

But even if the Cougars and Golden Bears are the frontrunners, it would be foolish to overlook Teurlings Catholic, Rayne, Westgate and Northside.

With Dane Charpentier taking over the Rebels program for his father, Sonny, Teurlings Catholic has three preseason All-Acadiana selections — tackle Justin Matthews, outside linebacker Cole Newland and two-way stud Hayden Judice. LSU commitment Thomas Perry will play opposite of Matthew on the offensive line. Rayne, of course, has two

Rayne, of course, has two 1,000-yard rushers returning to its Wing-T offense: Trent Winbush and Darien Harmon. Harmon was named the District 3-4A Offensive MVP in 2016, and Winbush landed on the preseason All-Acadiana team. Defensive tackle Antonio Gabriel, an All-Acadiana selection at the end of last season, returns to man the middle of the Rayne defense.

Rayne defense. Westgate didn't see any players named to preseason All-Acadiana team, but Tigers center Jessie Badeaux was among the players we considered. In running back Tyrese Jackson and defensive back Deondre Spencer, Westgate has two other first-team All-District picks returning, meaning the Tigers have the pieces to be competitive in this league.

New Northside coach John Simmons is amid a rebuild job with the Vikings, a team that went 1-9 last. But it's a program and a community he knows well, and his roster has drastically increased since Northside ended spring practices. So the Vikings could make some strides in the first year of his tenure.

Put simply, even if the favorite is a familiar face, there shouldn't be large separation between the top and bottom of District 4-4A.

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

t certainly wasn't the first time Dane Charpentier ran onto a football field representing the Teurlings Catholic Rebels.

After all, he played for the Rebels his senior season of 2001, not to mention growing up on that campus with his father being the head coach for two decades. For that matter, it wasn't even the first time he led a team onto a field as a head coach, serving as Opelousas Catholic's head coach for two seasons.

^bBut there was no denying the scenario was very different last Thursday night at Cajun Field when, ready or not, Charpentier led the Rebels onto the field as the head coach of Teurlings for the first time. "Definitely, it was a lot different," Charpentier said. "For one, they had a lot more kids behind me (than in OC days)."

That, however, was a dress rehearsal. At 7 p.m. Friday night in St. Martinville, Charpentier will do it for real in the Rebels' season opener against longtime rival Breaux Bridge.

"Really, I felt part of a tradition that I've been looking at outside-in for the last few years," said the 33-year-old head coach.

Índeed, two years as OC's head coach and one year as Cecilia's offensive coordinator, doesn't erase 27 years of being associated with Teurlings Catholic. His father, Sonny, joined the Teurlings family as the head basketball coach 30 years ago when Dane

was only 3. As far back as he can remember, Teurlings athletics has pretty much been his life.

So he'll likely be pinching himself at different times during this entire first season as the head coach who replaced his dad

"I don't know if it's going to be out of the way ever, really," Dane said. "I think this whole season is going to be a little surreal."

"No he really hasn't scratched that itch, but I know it's there," Dane said. Dane said they rarely talk

unique experience for Sonny as well, with his son unofficially in his spot on the sidelines for the first time.

"It was fine," Sonny said. "It's not like I wasn't prepared for it. I've been knowing it was coming.

'I wasn't nervous for Dane. He knows what he's doing. I was just pulling for Teurlings.

Dane had his fair share of nerves, especially when the intense jamboree game against his former team Cecilia heated

up. "I could have done without a lot of that," Dane said. "Man, the second half suddenly felt like it was a state semifinal. It was ri-diculous. Our kids got so emotionally high for the game.

"Once that wears off, it's can you sustain that level of play? Cecilia's got some really good players who are going to make big plays."

After the game, he did call his father for his initial impressions.

"The first thing he said was that so-and-so was wearing ear-rings on the sidelines," Dane laughed.

Yes, while Dane will do many things just like his dad did, he's certainly not a carbon copy of his father.

"Hopefully, I can get along with the referees a little better than he did, but you probably can't count on that too much," laughed Dane.

Scheme-wise, Dane is a "no-huddle guy" whereas his father always like his quarterback in the middle with his guys." Because of the no-huddle ap-

proach, "the offense looks a lot

different, but it's really not." He showed in the jamboree win over Cecilia that you can run clock in the no-huddle.

"Just because you're in no-huddle doesn't mean you have to snap the ball every 10 sec-onds," Dane said. "We can still change tempo even though we're in no-huddle."

Unlike other coaches, the younger Charpentier believes strongly in playing his frontline performers on special teams to enhance those units.

"To me, if you don't have good

players on the special teams, they won't be good," Dane said.

The Rebels' new head coach won't be able to run from an emotional start on Friday either with Breaux Bridge. That's a challenge, though, Charpentier is pleased with.

"I think it's good," he said. "When you play a team that the kids really want to beat, you get a lot more out of your kids are practice because it means a lot to them.

"You might say that it's my responsibility to get the kids motivated no matter who you play, and you'd be right, but external motivation is real too."

And no, no one has to tell this new head coach how important it is to win. His father's taught him that his whole life.

"He (Sonny) doesn't really have to say anything (about winning)," Dane said. "Growing up in my house, there was always pressure to win in everything. You're supposed to win or bust your behind trying to win. If not, you probably shouldn't be doing whatever you're doing.

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Teurlings triumphant over Breaux Bridge after week of uncertainty

NEW IBERIA — Dane Charpentier completed his two postgame interviews and sprinted to the opposite side of the football field at New Iberia Senior High, gunning for his awaiting players.

Charpentier, Teurlings Catholic's first-year head coach, leaped into the cluster of players and jumped up and down in celebration. The Rebels had just beaten Breaux Bridge for the seventh straight time a 44-7 triumph Friday night in which the game was blown open in the second quarter.

Charpentier's debut as Teur-

lings' head man started with uncertainty. Schools were closed until Wednesday due Tropical Storm Harvey, and the Rebels didn't practice outside Monday. The Rebels have the luxury of an artificial turf field, so they could practice outside every other day leading up to the opener.

It was a home game for the Tigers, but the game was moved to St. Martinville's turf field as Harvey drenched the area. But St. Martinville had electrical issues with its scoreboard, so the game was then relocated to the turf playing surface at New Iberia. But none of those changes ul-

But none of those changes ultimately mattered for the Rebels. After Charpentier congratulated his players on a job well done, then shifting the focus to next week's home opener against LaGrange, Teurlings quarterback Wesley Blazek handed Charnentier the game ball.

Lacrange, rearrings duarterback Wesley Blazek handed Charpentier the game ball. "One-hundred and ninety nine more to go," Rebels wide receiver Noah Romero shouted at his coach, referencing the amounts win Dane's father, Sonny, had as Teurlings' coach. Sonny, who retired from coaching in November to become the Rebels' athletic director, technically had 194 total wins in 22 years with the Rebels.

"It feels great, even more so because we beat a really good

Teurlings offense still making strides

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels home opener got off to a rocky start after the Rebels defense dropped not one, not two, but three possible interceptions on the opening drive.

It wouldn't matter, though.

The Rebels' offense was just too efficient for a few dropped interceptions to matter in a 41-14 win over the LaGrange Gators.

"I thought the offense was very efficient tonight and did a great job of controlling the ball," Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier. "We never lined up in punt formation, that was a really positive thing to see from the offense tonight and we stayed ahead of the chains most of the night."

Quarterback Wesley Blazek led the dynamic Rebels offense, and was impressive once again after a big performance last week. The first-year starter threw for 171 yards and three touchdowns along with 42 rushing yards.

"I thought he had a great game tonight at quarterback," Charpentier said.

Wide receiver Seth Laviolette also had a breakout game with 96 receiving yards, including a 79-yard touchdown on a perfect pass from Blazek. He also had a rushing touchdown. The 79-yard touchdown bomb was a crucial turning point in the game, and established the Rebels as the dominant team before halftime.

"I thought Laviolette played great," Charpentier said.

Running back Hayden Judice was having a great game with 70 total yards and two touchdowns in the first half, but did not see the field in the second half. There was speculation that he was injured during the game, but there was no injury according to coach Charpentier.

"He was just being rested," said Charpentier. "We have good depth at that position, and we wanted to get some other guys on tape, and we were able to do that."

Landon Trosclair and Zander Garber took over in the second half and rushed for more than 50 yards each.

The defense also had a solid performance despite the early dropped interceptions, allowing only 14 points along with getting two interceptions, a forced fumble, and four sacks. "I thought they played better last week," Charpentier said.


"You have to give La-Grange credit tonight, it was hard to tackle those guys."



He's not a starter yet, but Lewis Cook knows who Hundley is. He even knows his middle name: Albert.

But Paul often gets confused for his brother, Christian, who also played guard for the Pioneers and graduated in 2014. Christian was known as "Bull" on the football team.

And sometimes, Paul is called "Christian" or "Bull" on purpose. "I don't know how many times Paul

Albert has been called either 'Christian' or 'Bull,'' Cook said. "He's just one of several that it's hap-



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Notre Dame trounces Teurlings

Lewis Cook couldn't help but be worried.

Yes, Notre Dame deals with this sort of thing every year — replacing starters on a team that is always senior-laden. And, yes, the Pioneers never really look inexperienced. It's a product of player development over four years and seniors taking advantage of, perhaps, their only opportunity for significant playing time.

Notre Dame's No. 1 ranking in the LSWA's Class 2A poll after the second week of the regular season is based on pedigree as much as anything else.

"I think it's a four-year process for us," said Notre Dame defensive coordinator Jimmy McCleary. "We're always senior-heavy every year, so these guys are playing freshmen and (junior varsity) for three years and continuing to develop. continuing to learn.

ty) for three years and continuing to develop, continuing to learn. "By their senior year, it's important to them because it's their year. It's their only time on varsity. Sometimes, we do have underclassmen that participate, but for the most part it's senior heavy."

But no matter how seriously you take Notre Dame's lack of experience, they're still mostly untested at the start of every season. Cook guessed about 18 players made their first starts in the Pios' season opener against Breaux Bridge last Friday. Notre Dame's originally scheduled season opener against LaGrange was canceled due to Hurricane Harvey.


cane Harvey. The Pios eased past an overmatched Tigers team, but Friday's matchup with rival Teurlings Catholic, which won its first two games by a combined 64 points, had Cook apprehensive.

had Cook apprehensive. The Rebels, ranked sixth in the Class 4A poll, returned 12 starters from a year ago, including three preseason All-Acadiana selections and an LSU commitment, tackle Thomas Perry.

ment, tackle Thomas Perry. So Cook said he honestly couldn't have imagined walloping the Rebels 44-7 on the road Friday night, the largest margin of victory by either team since the Pios won by 37 points in 2005.

gin of victory by enner team since the Pios won by 37 points in 2005. "I didn't expect this at all," Cook said. "I wasn't sure we'd even win the game tonight."

Teurlings Catholic first-year coach Dane Charpentier refused to make any excuses despite losing two of three aforementioned preseason All-Acadiana picks — two-way player Hayden Judice and inside linebacker Cole Newland — to injury early in the game.

Newland was actually one of two starting inside linebackers that went down early — the other being Beau Le-Blanc. The Rebels were already without running back Jakyre Journet, whose ankle injury likely ended his season. "I don't think two guys going out is

"I don't think two guys going out is anything to blame a loss like this one," Charpentier said. "They beat a lot more people than just (Judice and Newland). We've got some good backups; we've got quality at both of those positions. You would like to think those guys would have made a big difference, but the score kind of speaks for itself."

Charpentier, naturally, doesn't feel like his team is 37 points worse than Notre Dame, but he admitted his offense simply had no answers for the Notre Dame defense. The Rebels took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter after forcing a turnover on downs in the Pioneers territory, but that was mostly the extent of any success by Teurling's offense. The Rebels mustered just 189 yards of

The Rebels mustered just 189 yards of total offense, and the Pios intercepted Teurlings quarterback Wesley Blazek three times. Blazek, who completed only 7 of 21 passes, was also sacked three times. "It's not his fault," Charpentier said of his quarterback. "Some of the play calls I made weren't real good. Like I said, they

made weren't real good. Like I said, mey do a good job of pressuring with four guys. Not a lot of place to throw the ball. We got a get a lot better to try to compete on the same level as they are." Notre Dame turned all three of the

Notre Dame turned all three of the Rebels' turnovers into touchdowns

"It's big to get a turnover, especially when it's on their side the field," Cook said. "But if you don't do anything with it, you don't build any momentum. I thought we built momentum all the way through the game."

through the game." Thomas Stevens paced the Notre Dame defense with 13 total tackles, including a tackle for loss and a pass break up. Fellow linebacker Cameron Nelson — who, along with Stevens, is one of three returning starters on defense had eight total stop and one of three interceptions. Stevens and Nelson praised

Stevens and Nelson praised McCleary's releatless preparation for a physical Teurlings offense that prides itself on being multiple.

self on being multiple. "Just got to give it all to him," Nelson said of McClearly. "He teaches us where to go. By the time we get on the field on Fridays, it's like automatic." McClearly said the Rebels' ground

McClearly said the Rebels' ground game presented the biggest challenge, but the task of limiting Teurlings became more difficult when they show different formations than Notre Dame had prepared for. The Rebels seemingly tried to outflank the Pios defense by showing unbalanced looks, McCleary said, so in game adjustments were required.

The adjustments worked, and the Notre Dame offense made Teurlings pay when they gave the ball away. "I think what we do offensively and


"I think what we do offensively and defensively support each other so well," McCleary said. "We're so physical in practice because of what coach (Cook) does offensively. He holds the ball. He runs the clock out. (He) puts pressure on the opponents to get their offensive tempo up a little bit, throw it a little bit more.

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downs with no interceptions while running for another 191 yards and two touchdowns on 22 carries — are certainly impressive. But he hasn't had to beat teams by himself, and based on what the opposing defense shows, LCA can be flexible with its offensive approach.

"Really, it just kind of depends on the opponent and kind of what they're doing defensively," Faulk said. "Sometimes you'll face teams who'll load the box up. It leads to more one-on-one opportunities on the outside, and so we kind of have a tendency to throw the ball a little bit more early on in the game in those situations to kind of loosen them up and hopefully pull a couple guys out of the box. Where there are teams that are trying to be more coverageoriented, we come out and try to establish the run."

Versatile tailback Trey Breaux has scored a total of six times, accounting for 147 rushing yards and 125 receiving yards. Receivers Errol Rogers Jr. and Sage Ryan have each recorded over 150 receiving yards for the season, combining for four total touchdowns. Jordan Hall has added 95 receiving yards and two touchdowns, while Montreal Felix, though he hasn't scored, has racked up L31 rushing yards on 15 carries.

Blue Gators lose Vascocu

Ascension Episcopal senior quarterback Jake Vascocu was off to a fabulous start to the season.

Going into last Thursday's home game against North Vermilion, he was 19-of-32 passing for 257 yards with five TDs and one interception. After leading the Blue Gators to touchdowns on each of their first three drives, including two TD passes, Vascocu rolled to the right on the first play of Ascension's fourth possession.

The good news is he gained 12 yards. The horrible news is he suffered a torn ACL knee injury on the play and will be lost for the rest of the season.

Freshman Cole Simon finished the game and will be making his first start at Delcambre on Thursday.

"He (Šimon) knew he was our backup," AES coach Matt Desormeaux said. "He was ready. Sure, he was nervous, but he wasn't scared. He didn't play scared at all. I thought he played pretty well. I thought he made some good decisions."

Simon figures to be more prepared this week after getting all the practice reps. Sophomore receiver Andrew Stolzenthaler will be the new backup quarterback.

Junior receiver Seth Kerstetter is another option at quarterback if needed, but "we definitely don't want Seth being a full-time quarterback" due to his elite skills as a receiver.

Rebels fighting injuries

Since the high school football schedules were made officials, people have been commenting on the rugged stretch of games on Teurlings Catholic's schedule. It began with Notre Dame last week and then continues with Rummel, Catholic-Baton Rouge, Rayne and then St. Thomas More.

That's a tough road fully stocked, but suddenly coach Dane Charpentier's Rebels have been overwhelmed with key injuries.

Two of the team's three running backs are out. Two members of the secondary and two linebackers, not to mention potentially a starter on both sides of the line. Team leader and linebacker Cole Newland (dislocated elbow) is likely out for a month and fellow linebacker Beau LeBlanc suffered a broken arm.

Hayden Judice, like Newland a preseason All-Acadiana selection, is questionable for Friday's game with a sprained ankle.

"It's never a good time for injuries, but this definitely isn't a good time." Charpentier said. "It was just a bunch of freak injuries all at once. But we're staying positive. We still have a lot of guys who can step in. They're just not the starters."

Lamm big weapon for Plos

There hasn't been too many times where Lewis Cook, at least as Notre Dame's coach, has been forced to attempt two-point conversions because he lacks a placekicker capable of hitting extra points.

But it also isn't lost on him the luxury of having an elite place kicker, one that can connect from more than 40 yards or hit a field goal with the game on the line.

For the last year, Cook has had that in junior John William Lamm, and he proved his value again last Friday against Teurlings Catholic. Lamm booted a 49-yard field as the first half expired, giving the No. 1 Pioneers a 23-7 lead and furthering the momentum they were building in a 44-7 win.

Lamm missed his first extra point attempt of the game, but he maintained his composure to convert the remaining five extra points and drill the deep field goal at the end of the half. He's 10 of 11 on extra points through the first two games.

"The thing you really like about him is he missed that extra point, which was the first one he missed this year, and then he nails every other one and hits a 49-yard field goal with the time running out," Cook said. "It doesn't affect him."

Lamm served as Notre Dame's kickoff specialist in his freshman year, a season in which the Pios won the state championship, before transitioning into a full-time role as the place kicker.

"He's going to have chance," Cook said of Lamm's opportunity to play collegiately. "A guy that can stand there and hit it from 49 like he did the other night, a lot of colleges would like to have a guy that's got that kind of range and (is) pretty accurate. He doesn't miss very many.

"He's long. He's only going to get stronger. By doing that, he's giving himself an opportunity, if he wants to, to have that chance to continue to kick once he's out of high school."

Let's start at the beginning: Who's No. !? James: "I'll jump Acadiana back to No. 1 since STM lost."

Kevin: "I had Acadiana at No. 1 already." Which teams come next?

Kevin: "My problem at the top is, which team should I put second? STM doesn't really deserve to drop after giving up their first points of the season and losing at Catholic High. But then there's the quality of wins factor. Notre Dame just demolished both Teurlings and Catholic High of New Iberia."

James: "I've decided that I'm going to move LCA up to four. I know they haven't really been tested yet, but I just feel like they've gotten off to the fourth best start in the area.'

Kevin: "I'm just not ready to drop Catholic down very far for

losing at Notre Dame. A tougher call to me was how far up do you move Ascension when it just lost its starting quarterback for the season?

What effect do routs have on ranking?

Kevin: "I still believe Teurlings and Carencro will be fine by the end of the season, but both have been routed in back-to-back weeks, so they need to drop some. Ascension's getting a big chance to prove that it deserves a top five billing when they go to Berwick this coming Friday."

James: "I'm not really down on Catholic at all, but I feel like Rayne needs to be at seven and I just can't drop Teurlings too far down yet for losing to two really good teams with all of those injuries."

Rounding out the rankings:

Kevin: "I think LCA will continue to rise, because the chances of them losing anytime soon probably aren't good. Until they get a marquee win, I think their slide up the ladder needs to be more gradual. Rayne is a tough team to place for me. I really think how they fare against the top teams in their new district is one of the most interesting aspects of the 2017 season. They haven't beaten a real good team yet, but they also haven't been competed with yet either."

Not time to jump off Teurlings bandwagon

The Teurlings Catholic Rebels lost at home in non-district action on Friday night, dropping a 41-23 decision to the Archbishop Rummel Raiders, to fall to 2-2 on the season.

Despite the setback, there are a number of reasons for Teurlings fans to be encouraged, and five are listed below:

1 Competition

This is both in terms of Friday night and through the first four games of the season.

Rummel is an undefeated 5A school that has a number of players who will be playing college football at some point, including senior receiver JaMarr Chase, a Florida commitment, and sophomore receiver Koy Moore, who has been offered by multiple SEC schools, including LSU. The Raiders are as talented of an offensive team that Teurlings is going to face all year, and the Rebels will be better in the long run because of it. "We played a team that

made no mistakes tonight," Teurlings head coach Dane Charpentier said of Rummel. "They made no mistakes with super-talented players, and when you play a team that has their level of talent — who is one of the best teams in the state for a reason — that makes no mistakes, it really puts a lot of pressure on you to be perfect."

Teurings lost to another outstanding team in Notre Dame last week after defeating Breaux Bridge and LaGrange to begin the season. Going 2-2 against that

Going 2-2 against that level of competition is not bad, especially when you're playing shorthanded due to injuries.

2. The game was much closer than the final score

The Rebels cut the Rummel lead to 21-16 with :06 remaining in the first half, knowing they would get the ball to begin the second half, before Chase returned a kickoff 70 yards for a touchdown.

There was an instance in the second quarter in which the Raiders converted on a third down and 18 play, as well as another instance in the fourth quarter in which Chase broke a tackle, which could have forced a Rummel punt, to keep the drive alive and ultimately score.

Take those three plays away and Teurlings played Rummel straightup.

up. "Our kids played their tails offs, but a few crucial errors cost us," said Charpentier. "The error in the kicking game right before the end of the half was something that we wanted to squib shallow, but we squibbed it deep, and he took it to the house with no time left on the clock.

"That's a very avoidable mistake that changed the whole complexion of the game," said Charpentier. "It made it a two score game, but it's something that we'll learn from, like some of our other mistakes, and get better."

3. Time to deal with injuries

The Rebels lost three defensive starters and a running back in the loss to Notre Dame, and it showed on the score-board.

Losing starters during a game is brutal on a high school team, because a lot of their back-ups aren't necessarily back-ups. A lot of the time, players are shifted to other positions. This week, Teurlings

had time to prepare, and shift a few players to other areas. "We had a kid who is a

junior (Tate Buller), who played very few snaps in JV last year, who has to line-up at safety against SEC caliber players," said Charpentier. "So that's what losing starters does to you, but I thought our guys played as hard as they could."

When those starters return, Teurlings will obviously be immediately better.

In the meantime, the more the current group plays, the more experience they'll get and the better they'll get. Just like they got much better from week three to week four.

4. Blazek makes the rebel offense go

Blazek threw for 101 yards and rushed for another 94 as the Teurlings offense showed that they can move the ball against anybody.

"He played lights out tonight," Charpentier said of Blazek. "On any team, a quarterback makes the offense go, and he made our offense go tonight against a team that can beat anybody in the state.

"Offensively, there's a lot to build upon," said Charpentier. "We only had to punt once tonight. So if you can move the ball against these guys like we did, you should feel pretty confident that you can move it against almost anybody."

Even more reason for optimism when it comes to the Teurlings offense: The Rebels' offensive line did not allow a sack, and seven different receivers caught passes from Blazek.

zek. This offense is going to move the football and score points.

5. Tradition

Teurlings is going to be good because they almost always are. This is a program that won District 4-4A titles in 2007, 2011, 2013, 2014 and 2015 and finished as Division 11 quarterfinalists in 2015 and 2014, and Division 11 semifinalists in 2015.

This group knows what it takes to win, and that will likely do a lot of that in the remaining six games, and into the state playoffs.

"Our kids competed as hard as they could compete, and we're going to get better," said Charpentier. "I really like our team and feel good about where we're headed."

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Blazek shouldering load for banged-up Teurlings offense

Quarterbacks often receive as much blame when an offense struggles as they are given credit when an offense is rolling.

Sometimes the blame can be warranted, but Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier doesn't feel that should be the case when evaluating the Rebels' 44-7 loss to Notre Dame two weeks ago. Despite Rebels quarterback Wesley Blazek throwing three interceptions, Charpentier shouldered some of the blame for the offense's ineffectiveness against a stout defense.

The Rebels (2-2) have played without its top two running backs — Jakyre Journet and Hayden Judice — for the last two weeks due to injury, so that certainly didn't make things any easier against Notre Dame. The game against the Pios began a brutal three-game stretch for Teurlings, including this week's road matchup against Catholic-Baton Rogue, before the Rebels enter District 4-4A play.

But despite a 41-23 loss to Archbishop Rummel last week, Blazek was the catalyst behind an offense that gave the Raiders' defense fits at times. The senior completed 16 of 27 passes for 97 yards with a touchdown and an interception while also running for 100 yards on 19 carries.

"They had trouble defending him," Charpentier said of his signal caller. "He did a great job running the football for us. Obviously, he was able to take advantage of some things in the passing game... not the overall result we wanted, but definitely a much better performance than the week before."

The Rebels' passer has thrown for 336 yards and six touchdowns through the first two weeks. And the physicality he adds to the running game gives an extra dimension to an offense that's missing its two best tailbacks.

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Loss won't deter Teurlings from playing high-level teams

BATON ROUGE — Teurlings Catholic has dealt with injury issues all season.

Now they can add second-team All-District offensive tackle Thomas Perry to the list. Perry limped off the field with the help of trainers in the fourth quarter of Teurlings' 34-7 loss to Catholic-Baton Rouge.

It's a sprained ankle," said Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier. "Not sure of the severity of it; we'll know more about it tomorrow."

Perry's injury added to an alreadytough night for the Rebels. The team struggled to move the ball consistently, turned the ball over multiple times and had a punt blocked. Teurlings' lone touchdown was an 80yard touchdown run by senior running back Zander Garber in the second quarter.

"I thought there were some plays to be made on offense that we just didn't make," Charpentier said. "Hats off to them, they have a great football team, but I told the kids after the game, we're not going to stop playing great teams anytime soon. So we have got to focus on ourselves and what we need to get better to try and play at a higher level, to try and compete at a higher level."

Defensively, Teurlings struggled to stop Catholic and junior quarterback Cameron Dartez. Dartez threw for over 300 yards and scored four total touchdowns, including two screen passes that went 48 and 50 yards for touchdowns. The defense, led by banged-up senior safety Hayden Judice, stopped Catholic on fourth down inside the 10-yard line twice but struggled with the misdirection of the Bears' offense.

"They have great play design," Charpentier said. "Whenever you take away one thing, they have an answer. We were trying to take away some things that they were good at, and like I said, they had the answer in the screen game."

Teurlings (2-3) will need to recover fast, especially with start of district play and a game against Rayne (4-0) next weekend. "It's a combination of a bunch of dif-

"It's a combination of a bunch of different reasons, but all of them are fixable," Charpentier said regarding his team's slow start. "I don't know how much time it's going to take, but we are going work until we get them fixed."



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New kids on the block

Unbeaten Rayne holding its own in District 4-4A

Rayne coach Curt Ware admits the talk surrounding the Wolves football program entering the 2017 season had a consistent tone.

Despite returning 11 starters from a 10-2 team, many of his conversations with fans had somewhat of a "Yeah, but..." kind of vibe.

"I've heard a lot from people, 'Coach,

you got a pretty good team coming back, but, man, that district," Ware said. "It's kind of like the SEC West. There's no break in there."

Indeed, Rayne, a team that's become used to winning under Ware, drew the short end of the stick when it comes to the realignment of the two Class 4A districts in the Acadiana area.

On one side, you have District 5-4A, which includes Livonia, Beau Chene,

Breaux Bridge, Cecilia, Opelousas and St. Martinville.

Although their combined 2016 records were 29-23, five of those six teams reached the playoffs last season. So that league certainly figures to be very competitive this season, especially with Opelousas doubling its win total from last season through the first five weeks of 2017.

But when compared to District 4-4A, at least entering the season, there appeared to be somewhat of an imbalance. As Ware suggested, it's somewhat reminiscent of the divisional split in the Southeastern Conference.

District 4-4A — featuring Rayne, St. Thomas More, Teurlings Catholic, Carencro, Westgate and Northside — included one less 2016 playoff team than District 5-4A, but the combined record of those four playoff teams from last year was 37-12.

was 37-12. Three of those playoffs teams — Rayne, Carencro and STM — advanced past the first round. Although Rayne dropped its second-round matchup, Carencro reached the Class 4A quarterfinals and STM claimed the Division II state title.

Once you account for 14 first-team All-District returners, the district appeared to be a meat grinder. Entering this league is especially tough for a school like Rayne, which is a fringe 4A school, Ware said.

school, Ware said. "To be honest with you, Rayne has been a 3A school forever. We're barely 4A," he said. "This is kind of my feeling: Carencro,

"This is kind of my feeling: Carencro, Westgate, STM, those are all SA schools. Westgate and Carencro, they're like 1,100 kids. They're almost 5A, both schools. And they've been 5A, traditionally, forever. STM, obviously a private school, they can kind of control their

numbers. They have been 5A a few times. It's a number things for us. We don't have the numbers they have."

Nevertheless, Rayne charges into district play with an unbeaten record (4-0) and a No. 10 ranking in the LSWA's 4A poll, hosting Teurlings on Friday. As the only team in the district to run a Wing-T, the Wolves' district matchups create plenty of intrigue.

Ware concedes that his team may not have the size to muscle up with some of its district opponents, but the Wolves' speed and athleticism is certainly comparable, especially with Trent Winbush and a healthier Darien Harmon in the backfield. Ware's just hoping the Wolves have

Ware's just hoping the Wolves have enough offensive opportunities against teams like the Rebels (2-3). "It's kind of like they talk about all the

"It's kind of like they talk about all the time with Acadiana and the veer offense," Ware said. "People struggle to prepare for it and this and that. It's kind of the same thing with our offense. You don't see it very often. "I always talk to coaches, and they

"I always talk to coaches, and they complain about, 'We can't simulate it in practice.' We have a lot of motions and all of those things, and it's not easy to do that in a week.

"So I'm hoping it helps us and then the speed factor. They're going to be bigger than us. They're a lot bigger than us. So we got to move the ball and hope to kind of shorten the game and do that to compete with those guys."

Part of the reason Rayne ended up in District 4-4A is because, when realignment discussions were occurring, Livonia didn't want to have to travel as far for district games, Ware said. But in the Ware's mind, Livonia's

But in the Ware's mind, Livonia's proximity to Baton Rouge should preclude it from being included in the Acadiana-area districts. But Ware is confronting the hand he

But Ware is confronting the hand he and his team have been dealt, and he's also realistic. It would be unreasonable to think the

It would be unreasonable to think the Wolves would go undefeated in district play, so a strong non-district record was imperative.

Ware, however, didn't shy away from scheduling a tough non-district slate, but due to Rayne's success last season, scheduling proved to be challenging. The Wolves' season opener against Welsh, which would have been Rayne's toughest matchup to date, was canceled due to Hurricane Harvey, and opponents like Erath and Eunice have underperformed thus far.

Despite a 10-point win against a quality Leesville team last week, the Wolves have been mostly dominant, outscoring its opponents 152-41.

"It wasn't like we tried to schedule cupcakes," Ware said. "We wanted to play some people that

"We wanted to play some people that we're going to get us ready (for district play), but also knowing we needed to win as many (as possible). You always do, but to say you're going through the district undefeated, that's a tall, tall task."

as many (as possible). Four always do, but to say you're going through the district undefeated, that's a tall, tall task." As far as facing a team like Teurlings, it's difficult for Ware to get a sense of how good the banged-up Rebels are. Teurlings has lost three straight games, but the defeats came against powerhouses: Notre Dame, Archbishop Rummel and Catholic of Baton Rouge. The Bears beat STM 20-0 a week before playing the Rebels.

ing the Rebels. "It's difficult to tell because the teams they're playing are really, really good," Ware said. "Yeah, they're losing, but they're losing to 5A, potential state champion teams. Catholic of Baton Rouge and Rummel, I've seen them in the Dome myself. Those are two bigtime schools.

"It's hard to judge by that. I know Teurlings has a good football team, and Teurlings is huge. What I'm concerned is how much our offense will have the ball."



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As district play begins, no rest for weary Rebels

Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier can understand if one might assume he's feeling a sense a relief as the Rebels (2-3) begin District 4-4A play.

But with a road matchup against unbeaten Rayne, ranked eighth in the LSWA's Class 4A poll, Charpentier can't call it a reprieve from the grueling schedule Teurlings has endured this season.

"I guess, outside looking in, it kind of seems like that," Charpentier said. "But you turn on the tape of Rayne, and honestly Rayne's skill guys are probably better than anybody Catholic High or Rummel or Notre Dame had, as far as guys in the backfield. This is probably the best running back we've faced all season."

After three straight losses to the Pios, Raiders and Bears — all of which came by at least 18 points — the Rebels will square off against the second-leading rusher in the area, Trent Winbush. Winbush's running mate in the Wolves' backfield, Darrien Harmon, will also see an

increased role after missing most of the last two games with an injury.

Cheap wins will be hard to come by for Teurlings in District 4.4A, but Charpentier said his team won't face anyone more talented than the three it just faced. Despite a rash of key injuries an amount Charpentier calls "unprecedented" for his coaching career — the Rebels' first-year coach can rest on the fact that his squad has been battle tested.

Though Teurlings hasn't lost three straight games since the beginning of the 2009 season, Charpentier ensures the final score of those games how the Rebels have played.

"It's a deal where we kind of just preach to the kids — and we talk about it before the season starts — we got to look at it as three separate seasons," Charpentier said. "We got non-district, district and then postseason. So we're looking at is as a fresh start, like everybody is 0-0 going into district.

"So I think our kids still have a lot of confidence in themselves. You can't fool kids. They know the competition that they've been playing. I told them the other day, 'We're a lot better team now than what we were three weeks ago.'

"Just because we lost three in a row, I think we got a lot better. I don't think you're automatically worse by losing a game, especially when you're playing some of the best competition in the state. But we still have a lot of confidence with our guys, and they'll be ready to play hard."





Snapping losing streak against Rayne, Teurlings shows it's better than record

RAYNE— Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier couldn't stand to see the Rayne offense on the field too many times Friday night. The Wolves' Wing-T attack is difficult

enough as it is. It's also nothing like what the Rebels (3-3, 1-0) have seen this sea-son. And, as Charpentier points out, Rayne's play calling is "complemen-

tary." "It's an offense that's hard to stop be cause their plays complement each oth-er so well," Charpentier said following Teurlings' 34-20 win against the previously unbeaten Wolves, snapping the Re-bels' three game losing streak. "The buck sweep complements the trap. The

'G' off the jet motion complements the jet sweep. So you got to play great technique. You got to be super with your fundamentals and everything. "One little guy that kind of widens out

a little bit too much or doesn't squeeze tight enough and they get gap. And their backs are so talented, it doesn't take much of a gap.

Charpentier isn't exaggerating about the skill of Rayne running backs. Trent Winbush entered the game as the Acadiana area's second-leading rusher, having racked up 878 yards and 15 touchdowns in one fewer game than many of his con-temporaries. The Wolves' season opener against Welsh was cancelled due to Hurricane Harvey.

Darien Harmon, Rayne's other firstteam All-District rusher, saw his role increase Friday after being limited over the last two games by an injury. The gaps in the Teurlings defense did in fact show up on occasions, as both Winbush and Harmon had scoring runs of 49 and 52

So Charpentier knew he had to "steal a possession" from the Wolves (4-1, 0-1) at some point in the game. Considering Re-bels linebacker Blaise Begnaud had just returned an interception for a touchdown, which gave Teurlings a 14-7 lead, Charpentier's decision to try an onside kick on the ensuing kickoff was not just opportunistic. It was a calculated risk that could save his defense from going

immediately back on the field. The onside kick not only worked, but quarterback Wesley Blazek hit Caleb Whittington on a 49-yard touchdown on

the first play of drive. It capped off a 20-point swing that started with a little over a minute left in the first quarter and ended fewer than two minutes into the second quarter.

Charpentier couldn't deny how the momentum changed in such a short period of time.

"That was the ball game," he said. "I thought the game was nip and tuck. I thought it was an evenly matched game except for that little sequence of plays.

Rayne did cut its deficit to 20-14 on Harmon's second touchdown run, but the Rebels wore down an outnumbered Wolves team in the second half on their way to a 14-point win. Playing Rayne, ranked No. 8 in last

week's Class 4A poll, certainly wasn't the ideal district-opening matchup for Teurlings, especially with the amount of key injuries the Rebels have endured. But the silver lining to Rayne's threegame slide was the difficulty of it. Even in the playoffs, Teurlings isn't likely to play any opponent much better than Notre Dame, Archbishop Rummel or Catholic-Baton Rouge, all of three of which played for state championships two years ago.

"We thought of (district play) as a new season," said Blazek, who completed 16 of 28 passes for 210 and three touchdowns. "As a team, I don't think that we played poorly the past three weeks. We played some good teams, some previous state championship-winning team. I just think we took that motivation of just being down and having to work back up, and we used all that intensity and put it into practice and gave it all out tonight."

"I feel very confident in our team and our abilities because we've faced some of the best teams in the state," he added. "I think tonight was really a good win for us, mentally knowing that we can go out, move the ball and win a ball game."

What makes a good rivalry?

To me, you know it when you see it, which is ironic because I was never part of one while I was in high school.

When I was playing sports at De La Salle High School in New Orleans from 2007-2012 — excuse me for showing my age — we didn't have a true rival. That was partially because De La Salle's historic rivals are in the New Orleans Catholic League, something the Cavaliers haven't been a part of since 2003.

While I was there, any "rivalry games" didn't feel legit. We played Isidore Newman, a school blocks away from De La Salle, in football jamborees, and it was somewhat billed as a neighborhood rivalry. But the Greenies, at the time, were a step or two above us in talent, including when Odell Beckham Jr., was catching jump balls over hapless cornerbacks like me.

The closest thing I got to a real rivalry in high school was against one of the Cavs' old Catholic League rivals, Holy Cross. The Tigers played in the same Class 3A district as De La Salle for two years —

Holy Cross rejoined the Catholic League in 2013 — so there was history and animosity there. But it was mainly reserved for baseball, a sport in which we were most competitive.

So when I look at some of the rivalries across the Acadiana area, I'm a little jealous I was never part of anything like them. Even if there isn't much hatred between the two rival schools, having games that matter more than a win or a loss is what makes sports fun.

And the rivalry game I'm covering this weekend — St. Thomas More at Teurlings Catholic — is one I've had circled on my calendar since the season began. Actually I've been looking forward to it since I moved to Lafayette in July.

"Is it emotional, intense? Yeah. I think that's what high school football and athletics should be," said former Teurlings coach Sonny Charpentier, now the athletic director at the school.

"That's what makes it fun, because it's just like when you line up, whether you're playing somebody you like or you don't like, you still want to win. And you still want to measure yourself against good competition. Obviously, St. Thomas More is that."

I've learned quickly, however, that this game is not a normal rivalry.

It was once a heated affair between Teurlings and Cathedral Carmel. Before Cathedral and Fatima merged to become STM, the Rebels beat the Tigers in all seven meetings from 1975-1981.

But from 1982-1986, including Jim Hightower's first year with the Cougars, Teurlings won four of the five meetings.

Then the Cougars won the final two meetings in 1987 and 1988 before the two school didn't play each other again until 2011. Since 2011, competing in the same Class 4A district, STM is 5-2 against Teurlings, including a playoff win in 2015.

"To be frank with you," Charpentier said, "we probably never would have played if it wouldn't have been in the district."

One of those two wins by the Rebels was the epic 26-point comeback in 2014 that was spearheaded by current Arkansas quarterback Cole Kelley (Kelley, by the way, may make his first collegiate start this weekend against, of all teams, top-ranked Alabama).

"It was one of those games where we were dead in the water, and they did some things to help get us off the mat," Charpentier said. "You don't come back from — I think it was 26 down in the third quarter on the road — without having some things go your way. I think there was a muffed snap on a punt. But momentum changed, and before you knew it, it was a game.

"The ironic part about it is I think we ended up winning by 10, so it tells you something funny about it. But it kind adds to it. It's not rivalry if (one team) wins every time."

Though the rivalry has been resurrected and the games are just as meaningful to both schools, the vitriol isn't what it used to be. At least not with the players and coaches, said Cougars offensive coordinator Shane Savoie, who didn't face Teurlings while a player at STM in the early 1990s.

In fact, the respect level between the teams is at its highest.

"It was more of a deal for our parents than it is for our current kids," Savoie said. "I guess I would equate it to this: Years ago, Cathedral and Teurlings, it was almost like Alabama-Auburn rivalry, in the fact that you wanted to beat them, but you also wanted everybody they played to beat them. There was that much hate.

"I would equate ours now to more of a UL-LSU rivalry, in the sense that, when we play each other, I want to win. But, really, I got to think they wish well for us throughout the rest of the year, and we wish well for them throughout the rest of the season."

But don't mistake the lack of hatred for lack of drive to beat each other. These schools and football programs are similar in so many ways that Savoie even used a familial analogy to describe how competitive the game is.

"It will be a stressful week for both of us because they don't want to lose to us, and we don't want to lose to them," Savoie said.

"But a lot of it just has to do with I don't want to lose to my brother in a game of pickup basketball. I don't want to lose to him a game of Jenga. I want to win because I want to be beat my brother. It's an exciting week. It's stressful, but it's exciting."



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

walked up Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier, who was mingling with his family after what was, I'm sure, an exhausting game to be a part of Friday night.

He seemed in no mood to talk about how his team blew a 12-point fourthquarter lead against rival St. Thomas More, but he kindly agreed to answer a few questions.

And the first thing that came out my mouth was perhaps one of the dumbest questions I've ever asked in my young journalism career.

"How are you doing?"

"I've been better," he deadpanned. Of course he's been better. Aside from a safety on a poor snap at the end of the first half, Teurlings did almost everything right for three quarters. Yet a series of critical mistakes doomed them with less than 10 minutes to play, resulting in a 24-21 STM win.

First it was fumble by Seth Laviolette that gave a Cougars offense, ravaged by injuries and unable to capitalize in the red zone at times, the ball at the Teurlings 20.

Three plays later, Cougars running back Joel Moreau scored from four yards out. Moreau is listed as a defensive back on the roster but moved into the offensive backfield due to injuries to two of the Cougars' top three backs (STM starting running Chris Primeaux also left the game with his own injury).

On the ensuing Teurlings drive, which started at the Rebels' 20-yard line but was backed up to 10 by a holding penalty, STM linebacker Ben Thibodeaux intercepted Wesley Blazek and returned the ball 14 yards for a touchdown. Thibodeaux was responsible for forcing the aforementioned fumble, which was recovered by safety Cade Broussard, on the previous possession.

STM then made it a three-point game when the Cougars faked an extra point. Holder Dalen Cambre lofted an easy pass to Luke Howard for the two-point conversion.

Finally, with STM lining up to punt the ball back to Teurlings with 6:38 left in the game, the Rebels were flagged for roughing the punter. It gave the Cougars an automatic first down and allowed them to bleed to clock.

The Rebels didn't get the ball back until only 15 seconds remained in the

game, hardly enough time to get into field goal range from their own 20.

So the loss will certainly be difficult for Charpentier and the Rebels to swallow. But this matchup, one I won't soon forget, said more to me about what kind of team STM is. Considering the number of injurles they're dealing with — something Teurlings has had its own issues with as well — the Cougars are absolutely resilient.

Aside from the injuries to the top three tailbacks, STM sophomore quarterback Caleb Holstein played the entire game due to an injury to senior Peyton Landry.

The Cougars have been splitting reps between Landry and Holstein for the entire season, so I'm sure that experi-

ence helped Holstein for games like this one. But managing an entire game is obviously more challenging. And doing so on the road against the Cougars' biggest rival? That's a tall task for a second-year player. He wasn't perfect, but as Cougars

He wasn't perfect, but as Cougars offensive coordinator Shane Savoie pointed out, his stat line was hindered by a few dropped passes.

But mostly importantly, he did the one thing a quarterback must do in road contests against quality opponents, especially ones of this magnitude: protect the football.

The turnover margin is usually a good indicator of who won a game, and it was by far the biggest reason STM is celebrating its third straight win over Teurlings. That was what frustrated Charpentier the most: The Rebels gave STM extra opportunities. As Charpentier said, you have to beat the Cougars for four quarters. You can't just expect them to go away.

But the STM defense made plays when they absolutely needed them. Cougars defensive coordinator Terry Tidwell felt like his unit didn't play poorly in the first half; it just didn't play smart, he said.

After Teurlings marched 80 yards on 12 plays on the first series of the third quarter, capped off Blazek's third touchdown pass, STM's defense seemed to adjust. Tidwell said the biggest key was stopping a counter run play the Teurlings uses with Blazek. The Rebels quarterback still had some success on the ground, but Tidwell felt STM defense forced Blazek to beat the Cougars through the air.

Did either team truly deserve to lose this game? Call me overly optimistic if you want, but I don't believe so. In a matchup between two premier programs in this city, it was everything you'd hope it would be and more.

The Cougars are now in the driver's seat to win the district, and I believe they'll enter the playoffs with only one loss. As for Teurlings, the Rebels have to find a way to flush this loss and move on to a tricky Westgate tearn next week.


And for me, sign me up for 2018 version of this epic rivalry. I'll try not to ask the losing coach a dumb question next time.



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

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Rebels slow Westgate's rushing attack

Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier knew that a 35-14 lead wasn't safe, not against a team with the athletic ability and quick-strike capability like the Westgate Tigers.

That's why he was breathing a sigh of relief not long after the Rebels had secured a 42-28 Homecoming victory over the Tigers, one that wasn't certain until Landon Trosclair broke loose on a 53-yard scoring run with 1:47 left.


"I'm just happy to get out of here with a win," Charpentier said. "They have so much athletic ability and size, we had to play bend-and-don't-break all night."

It helped that the Rebels led 14-0 early in the second quarter after not taking an offensive snap in the game's first 11 and one-half minutes. Dylan Langlinais' 36-yard interception return provided half of that margin on the game's fifth play, and after a nine-minute Westgate drive netted no points, Rebel quarterback Wesley Blazek led a 90-yard drive and scored himself on a keeper from three yards out 55 seconds into the second period.

Eventually the Rebels (4-4, 2-1 District 4-4A) built 28-7 and 35-14 leads on two early third-quarter scores, but the Tigers came right back with two fourthquarter tallies behind quarterback Darien Charles. His scoring runs of 45 and one yard sandwiched around a 43-yard scoring pass to Tyron Davis brought Westgate (4-4, 0-3) back within one score with 2:39 left.

But a second straight onside kick attempt didn't work, and two plays later, Trosclair found daylight on the left side and got the final 53 of his game-high 138 rushing yards for a clinching touchdown.

"We certainly didn't want it to be that close," Charpentier said, "We've got to learn to finish better. We made way too many mistakes."

One thing the Rebels did right, though, was slow down Westgate's rushing attack, after the Tigers were hugely successful early. The Tigers' 72-yard drive that took up the lion's share of the first period featured only one pass play for seven yards, and Westgate converted two fourth-downs in that march that didn't result in any points.

But one series later, after Blazek's score, Westgate standout running back Tyresse Jackson broke a tackle on a sweep left and went 51 yards for a touchdown. Jackson had 111 yards by halftime, but the Tigers were held to fewer than 100 rush yards in the second half.

"They moved more guys into the box," said Westgate coach Ryan Antoine, "but mostly their defensive line wore us down in the second half."

Jackson had been slowed by injuries for much of the last two weeks, and as a result the Tigers threw the ball 30 times two weeks ago in a loss to St. Thomas More. The Rebels saw more of an infantry attack.

"He (Jackson) is back in the game now and we wanted to utilize him," Antoine said.

The Rebels, though, came back with a power-running attack of their own led by Blazek, whose quarterback keepers accounted for 94 of Teurlings' 292 team rush yards. He also had two key completions to Hunter Landry — one on third down and one on fourth down — that set up Trosclair's four-yard scoring run 27 seconds before halftime.

Those two scores came after Langlinais' early pick-six.

"That was huge for us," Charpentier said. "It's not many times you play a whole quarter and you don't have the ball. Our defense hung in there."

The Rebels appeared to take control when Trosclair returned the secondhalf kickoff 86 yards to the Westgate 11 and Zander Garber scored from four yards out three plays later for a threescore lead. Trosclair also had a 59-yard kickoff return later in the quarter to set up a drive that Hayden Judice capped with a one-yard scoring run. But Charles broke loose on a quarter-

But Charles broke loose on a quarterback sweep for a 45-yard touchdown in between those scores, and after an apparent Rebel interception was nullified by a roughing-the-passer penalty, he hit Davis with 9:27 left.


After forcing a punt, the Tigers drove again and Charles powered across from one yard out to keep it close in the closing moments.

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

In a backfield without a true bell-cow threat, Teurlings Catholic junior running back Landon Trosclair played the role for one night at least in last Friday's 42-28 win over Westgate.

On the night, he rushed for 138 yards and two touchdowns on nine carries. But that doesn't include two long kickoff returns — one into Westgate's red zone and the other across midfield.

"It was all in the flow of the game," Teurlings coach Dane Charpentier said. "We didn't say, 'We're going with Trosclair tonight.' I actually thought Garber had some really good runs too. He (Trosclair) just popped some big ones and then had the two big kickoff returns.

"And the great thing about his two returns is both followed them scoring to make it a one-score game."

In other words, the roles haven't really changed in the Rebels' balanced backfield.

"We always start off with the (Zander) Garber kid, because he's such a good inside runner," Charpentier said. "He gets four yards when there's nothing there. He can take the most work. Trosclair is kind of like the change-ofpace runner. He's a little bit faster and he's a better receiver. We use him a lot more when we want to get the backs out in running situations."

For the season, Trosclair now has 347 yards and three touchdowns on 51 carries.

"He's like a slasher," Charpentier said. "He can bounce it outside with good speed and good vision. I guess you'd call him our third-down back."

It's been a long, tough, sometimes-



"I thought the offense as a whole showed up and played hard," Charpentier said. "We've got a bunch of seniors who don't get to get into a lot of games, and we played for them tonight. We tried to get ahead early so those guys could experience some high school football."

Two important keys to victory for the Rebels were controlling the line of scrimmage on offense and consistently covering the Vikings' receivers on defense throughout the night.

"I thought our offensive line and tight ends did a great job of controlling the line of scrimmage," Charpentier said. "Defensively we did a great job of matching up with their receivers. I thought we did a better job than we have done in the past of covering people."

The Rebels are now 5-4 after a 2-game winning streak, and will be taking on the Carencro Bears next week at home in their regular season finale. Charpentier is excited about his team's playoffs chances, but realizes that his team needs to stay focused on next week's opponent.

"We've got to beat Carencro and get ready to prepare for them and finish the district season first," said Charpentier. "The idea is to try and peek at this time of the year and get ready for a playoff run. If we do a good job of preparing for Carencro, that will set us up for where we want to be."

The Vikings will look to put their 6-game losing streak behind them next week and will be taking on Westgate at home.

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GOING OUT WITH A BANG

McGuire, Rebels' defense step up in new beginning

OK, so the Teurlings Catholic Rebels are ready ... to well, start the season all over again.

Most of the season was played shorthanded on defense, and all of those starters have now returned.

Sure, they're still missing a starting running back, but the Rebels' offense was certainly operating at maximum efficiency for most of Friday's 42-13 victory over the Carencro Golden Bears on Senior Night.

And since the regular season is over with a 6-4 overall and 4-1 runner-up showing in District 4-4A, coach Dane Charpentier's squad will, in effect, be able to do just that.

The state playoff brackets will be released by the LHSAA on Sunday afternoon and the second season begins Friday night.

If Friday's performance is any indication, the Rebels certainly appeared

ready to take advantage of a mulligan.

"I feel good about where we are," Charpentier said. "They made a few big plays on us in the secondary, but when their guys are just more athletic, that's going to happen sometimes.

"I think our offense's efficiency level was where it needed to be tonight. That helps get our defense on and off the field quickly."

The pregame strategy to assist the

secondary centered around applying loads of pressure on Carencro's quarterbacks.

No one listened to that point of emphasis more than senior defensive end Reid McGuire, who contributed three sacks on the night.

"I kind of thought that we'd be able to hurt them with the speed rush," McGuire said.

"With their speed, we knew we had to be aggressive. We couldn't let them to come to us."

Not only did McGuire provide the desired pass rush off the edge, but he did so at the most important time.

Once the Rebels jumped out to a quick 14-0, then 21-0 and then 28-0 lead early in the second period, the visiting Golden Bears didn't spend much time within striking distance.

"Jumping out to that 28-0 lead against a team as athletic as Carencro is was big," Charpentier said. "It took the air out of the stadium."

The one time Carencro really began to raise some eyebrows was late in the first half. After a 12-yard TD pass from Chance Prejean to Artrell Marks narrow the Rebels' lead to 28-7 with 39 seconds left until halftime, the Bears then recovered a Teurlings fumble on the ensuing kickoff at the Rebels' 30.

Instead of yielding the momentum, McGuire quickly stepped up with two quick sacks to squash the potential rally.

Two Teurlings drives into the second half and the Rebels were on easy street

again.

"We're coming together at the right time," McGuire said.

"We knew we had a harder schedule than everyone else, so we knew we had to work harder. All of that hard work ended up paying off."

Teurlings entered Friday's finale as the No. 7 seed. If that remains the same, that would be the No. 10 seed — currently Loyola Prep — in the first round and them No. 2 University High the following weekend.

However that bracket ends up, the Rebels are feeling it again. No longer are they just treading water.

McGuire knows he's got plenty of support again, led by senior linebacker Cole Newland's return. "He (Newland) can't go hard for four quarters just yet, but he was such a difference-maker in the first half," Charpentier said.

Offensively, the backfield was loaded with playmakers Friday. Quarterback Wesley Blazek threw for 229 yards and three scores and ran for 33 more and a fourth TD.

Landon Trosclair caught for 87 yards, ran for 30 and scored a touchdown. Zander Garber ran for 52 with a score and also had 43 yards receiving.

The Rebels even perfectly executed a wide receiver pass for 49 yards by Noah Romero to the 1 to set up a touchdown.

"We've got key members back just at the right time," McGuire said.

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Rebels prepared for bigger playoff run

Teurlings Catholic coach Dane Charpentier is about as much fun to talk sports with as any coach I've dealt with in my 34 years of working at The Daily Advertiser.

He's got a little Larry Dauterive, a little Carroll Delahoussaye, a little Mac Barousse and obviously a lot of his father, Sonny Charpentier, in him.

We certainly don't agree on everything.

I had to rebuke him after one of his kids fumbled a punt with a doubledigit lead in last week's regular-season finale against Carencro, much like I did on the Advertiser's Facebook Live this past Sunday when the Saints pulled similar shenanigans.

Naturally, he disagreed with me about the need to return punts, especially with a big lead. (He was wrong.) But one issue we've agreed on for

years is the goofiness of the current structure of Louisiana's football playoff system.

I know, I know, that's an old ship that I seriously let sail into the deep blue yonder a long time ago. That battle was fought and lost years ago, and most of us have learned to live with it.

But I couldn't help but shake my head this week when analyzing Teur-

lings Catholic's lot in the Division II playoff bracket.

On Friday, Charpentier's Rebels open the postseason with a 5-5 Loyola Prep Class 3A team from Shreveport.

I've been around long enough to know how crazy first-round playoff games can be, but we all should realize these two teams shouldn't be competing in the playoffs against each other.

Those are my words.

Despite his usual candor, Charpentier is still a coach.

"Loyola Prep looks sound to me on

film," he said. "Their schemes are really good. They're a well-coached team that does a lot of good things. I have a lot of respect for what they're doing. It's good stuff. They're very multiple and they execute at a pretty high level."

But a 4A team like Teurlings, with the season it had, should probably be about a 10 or 11 seed in a 4A bracket and Loyola should be a No. 20-something seed in a 3A bracket.

As it is, they're both part of 13-team private school bracket, which would then have Teurlings meeting No. 2 University High next Friday.

If things were done properly, that's the kind of matchup that should be played in the quarterfinals of a true 32team bracket.

The colorful Charpentier put it best.

"It's like if you get something for Christmas and your brother gets something way better for Christmas, and you're just sitting there acting like you like it, but you're just looking at him playing with his toy," Charpentier said.

"The 32-team bracket is just so much more fun. Even though there are still some poor teams in there (32team bracket), at least it feels like the playoffs. Ours feels like a football tournament, not the playoffs. It's just not the same."

Naturally, today's players aren't

concerned about the past.

Of course, I still remember when two "semifinal caliber" 10-0 teams used to meet in the regional round in the even-older predetermined brackets, which is why the coaches pushed for the power-ranking format we're currently under.

OK, enough of that.

The 2017 Rebels (6-4) may not have any control over the playoff format. What they can do is ensure they're as tough an out as possible no matter which bracket they're in.

"Our kids are fired up and very enthusiastic about the postseason," Charpentier said. "All they know is that two teams out of this bracket are going to get to play on the carpet and they want to be one of them."

One factor that should aid Teurlings in that drive to reach the state finals is its rugged schedule.

"We've already been in the arena," Charpentier said. "Whoever those two teams are, we've already played teams that are that good or better. We know what it's going to take to get there. We know the level of execution we have to play at to get on the carpet this year. It's going to be a matter of how much better we've actually gotten during the course of the season."

In Charpentier's mind, that requires quick upgrades in three areas.

"The first thing is," he said, "we've got to stop people on third-and-8plus. Our defense all season has done a good job of getting people into thirdand-8-plus. But we haven't done a good job of having solutions to getting off the field on third-and-eight-plus. Hopefully, we get better at getting some stops and getting off the field."

The next chore for the defense is somehow forcing more turnovers. It's hard enough to beat some of the elite teams in the Division II bracket. Trying to do so without turnovers makes it even tougher.

"We've been a really bad team all year at getting takeaways," he said. "We've played really good defense the last five weeks, but we're still minus in the turnovers. We're not turning it over on offense, but we're not forcing any turnovers on defense. It doesn't matter if we play good teams or bad teams. We never get any turnovers. I've never seen anything like it in my life."

On the offensive end, the goal is to stay balanced.

"When we've been able to throw the ball, nobody's really stopped us," Charpentier said.

But Notre Dame and Catholic High stifled the Rebels' passing game and the results weren't pleasant.

Despite the midseason injuries, Charpentier thinks the Rebels are close to where they would have been on offense without the injuries.

Meanwhile, the defense has taken longer to get back to what Charpentier was envisioning for that unit prior to the injuries.

"It's getting closer," he said. "If you miss five weeks of repetition, it just takes time to get back to game speed, no matter how good or how athletic you are."



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

"I think they have the most complete group of skill guys we've played," Charpentier said. "All five skill positions, they don't have a guy that you can say, 'OK, we're going to make them beat us.' I guess the closest comparison from the teams we've played is Rummel. They might not have a receiver quite as good as the kid at Rummel, but they have more of them."

The Cubs are led by running back Michael Hollins, who's already been offered by Utah.

"On film, you see them making big plays in the passing game, but when you run all the data, it comes back that the running back is about 50 percent of their offense," Charpentier said. "They run the stretch play about as good as anybody we've seen."

With all of that said, Charpentier is pleased with his team's preparation and attitude entering this huge challenge.

"Our seniors have had a great week of practice so far," Charpentier said. "They had a meeting after the game last Friday night and they dedicated themselves to having the best week of practice that they could and going in there prepared and just compete."



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Teurlings' sputtering offense fails to upset Cubs

Despite forcing three turnovers and a safety, No. 7 Teurlings wasn't able to complete the upset against No. 2 University High in the Division II quarterfinals, losing 35-9.

Teurlings wasn't able to move the ball, and it when it did, the Rebels' drives were stalled by turnovers or unable to convert crucial third downs. The Rebels opened the second half with an II-play drive, but quarterback Wesley Blazek was intercepted at the goal line to end the drive. The Cubs scored one drive later to put the game away at 28-9.

Rebels coach Dane Charpentier blamed of some of the offense's struggles on his play-calling decisions on first down of that second-half drive. "It's a combination of things," Charpentier said about the back-breaking drive. "I think that if we would've finished that drive off, we would've put ourselves in position to be in a tight ball game in the second half, but it didn't happen."

The Rebels' defense kept them in the game early, picking off University High quarterback John Gordon Mckernan twice in the first half and forced a fumble in the redzone that halted the Cubs' potential scoring drive late in the first half.

Their special teams even chipped in — blocking a punt late in the third quarter, cutting the Cubs' lead to 21-9 — but Teurlings' offense stalled when they got the ball back.

But Teurlings couldn't muster enough points from those gifts.

Those missed opportunities could haunt Charpentier.

"I thought our defense really played winning football tonight," the 33-yearold coach said. "But we weren't really able to put it together on offense, that's a credit to their players. They put a lot of speed out there on the field and the margin for error becomes very small."

The Rebels were able to see some success in the first half offensively, engineering a scoring drive behind Blazek late in the first half to avoid being shutout with a one-yard touchdown run by Seth Laviolette to cap off a five-play drive.

Teurlings' season comes to an end and caps off Charpentier's first season as head coach at of the Rebels.

Charpentier — who took over the program after his father, Sonny, stepped down last season — would have liked to continue his inaugural season, but was satisfied with what he was able to accomplish this season. "I'm just proud of them," Charpentier said. "I thought it was a really competitive close-knit group, especially the senior group. I thought they represented our school well all year. I thought they prepared hard, and I thought they were a classy group."

And Charpentier didn't hold his head down following the loss, His pride for his team comes from the fact that his squad was built and brought up in their own backyard.

"We really got a lot to be proud of," Charpentier said. "These are all Teurlings' kids. These all are kids that came up with our feeder program and with the situation that our playoffs are in right now, not everybody can say that

"I learned that Teurlings kids are going to fight; Teurlings kids are competitive. They're going to give it their all. That's what we need; that's what we want."

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
