Opening up for me is no easy feat. Once I realized that, I began to understand the severity of my sins, by completing a full examination of conscience. I didn't just write down mortal sins, I wrote down every single sin I committed, forcing myself to remember and listen.

The more I wrote, the more I realized the heavy presence on my soul, feeling like I was being weighed down by something. I then realized it was my sins.

That is when it made complete sense. I had been trying to deepen my faith with Jesus for a while now, but I didn't have the grace given in Confession to grow closer. This made me feel stupid and angry at the exact same time (I'm not joking). In that moment, I no longer felt ashamed because Jesus knew my sins. **He knew my flaws, but wanted me to grow closer to him.** However, my pride was in the way to truly see that. It took being vulnerable to confess and receive the absolution and grace I desperately needed. At the senior retreat, I confessed my sins for the first time in two years, and I made my first good confession for the first time in five years. I felt that weight being lifted off my chest, and I was able to receive the grace I needed to deepen my relationship with Christ.
